A History of SAIS-SACS Accreditation

SAIS and SACS member schools are part of a remarkable history of quality assurance in education

SAIS began its organizational life in 1903 as the "Mid-South Association of Independent Schools," providing training for teachers in private schools and some early public schools in the southeastern states. In 1953, another organization began as the Southern Association of Independent Schools, providing a forum for independent school administrators to work with public schools through SACS and to contribute to the larger interest in accreditation in the southeast. MAIS and SAIS merged in 1986 to form the present SAIS, with an emphasis on accreditation through SACS for independent schools and professional development for administrators, trustees, and teachers. Today, SAIS works to help both established and emerging schools approach these issues with creativity and innovation. Working at the state, regional, and national levels, SAIS serves and strengthens member schools through the promotion of the highest quality educational standards and ethical conduct.

Established in 1895, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (commonly referred to as SACS) is a non-governmental, voluntary organization that accredits more than 13,000 public and non-public institutions from early childhood through university. Since its inception, SACS has served the educational community by dedicating its mission to helping schools improve student learning. Today, SACS is the largest accrediting agency in the world and is one of only six agencies that accredit both public and nonpublic educational institutions.

The current partnership offers schools a process for achieving SAIS-SACS accreditation. In today's world of accountability in schooling, accreditation serves as a critical component of a school's demonstrated effectiveness and ability to provide successful schooling for children. A school that is able to achieve accreditation demonstrates a commitment to a process that requires the school to meet a set of rigorous, research-based standards, to engage in a program of continuous school improvement; and to demonstrate quality assurance to its stakeholders through self-evaluation and peer review. SAIS-SACS accreditation provides schools access to an integrated network of services and technical assistance that supports every school's ability to identify and meet its goals for improving student performance and the teaching and learning process.

A SAIS-SACS accredited school is part of an international network of accredited schools which have demonstrated success in educating children. As such, SAIS-SACS accreditation is recognized throughout the world as a symbol of quality in education for students and teachers

To earn accreditation, schools must meet quality standards, be evaluated by an outside group of peer professionals, and implement a school plan focused on strategic improvement and student performance Accreditation is voluntary and must be renewed each year

The Review

A team representing SAIS and SACS conducted an on-site visit to review this school's self-study and standards compliance. The team was comprised of team members whose diverse independent school backgrounds provided an array of expertise. The visiting team sought the answers to these four critical questions within the framework of the school's self-study. The following pages contain the findings

In conducting the on-site reviews, the visiting team was responsible for:

- 1 Assessing the adequacy of the self-study process,
- 2 Identifying strengths of the school deserving commendation,
- 3 Developing recommendations that may help to strengthen the programs of the school,
- 4 Assessing compliance with the standards of SAIS-SACS;
- 5 Developing a written report of the findings

To fulfill the team's responsibilities, team members:

- 1 Reviewed documentation provided by the school,
- 2 Conducted interviews with board members, parents, school personnel, students, and community members,
- 3 Applied the standards for accreditation;
- 4 Developed a draft of commendations and recommendations;
- 5 Contributed to the content and focus of the written report;
- 6 Provided input as to the determination of accreditation.

The primary focus of the self-study process is to demonstrate the capacity of a school to meet the requirements for accreditation. A typical self-study consists of:

- Analysis and response to accreditation standards;
- Identification and demonstration of a continuous process of improvement;
- Implementation of methods that provide for quality assurance.

The study addresses four critical questions.

- 1. **PROFILE:** Where is the school today? The PROFILE should include clear, comprehensive information reflecting current student performance data, stakeholder perspectives, community characteristics, and analysis of strengths and limitations in the areas of student learning and school performance.
- 2. **VISION:** Where does the school want to go? The VISION is a clear, compelling purpose communicated through the school's vision and mission statements, beliefs, and core values
- 3. **PLAN:** What is the plan to get there? The PLAN should be based on an analysis of pertinent data, research of best practices, and alignment with generally-accepted expectations for student learning at schools with similar missions.
- 4. **RESULTS:** How will the school know when it has accomplished its plan? The RESULTS are documented evidence demonstrating successful implementation if strategies that resulted in accomplishment of the school's mission and student achievement gains related to the school's mission.

The Self-Study

Emerson Waldorf School in Chapel Hill, North Carolina (hereinafter referred to as EWS) is an Early Childhood through 12th grade school that is a fully sponsored member of the Association of Waldorf Schools of North America The school enrolls 235 students, has a full-time faculty numbering 22, offers a curriculum with a rich blend of academics and arts, and has an annual budget of \$2.28 million

The school began in 1984 with 28 students in grades K-3 renting space in a local church. By 1987, the school's enrollment had swelled to 146 students in grades K through 8, and the initial 15 acres of the present campus were purchased along with the first classroom building. Over the next fifteen years, additional acres continued to be acquired and structures continued to be built or renovated, culminating in the construction of the high school building in the fall of 2003 and the addition of a Nursery School and Morning Garden Parent-Child program in 2006. Today the school sits on 54 acres, including a farm that provides both playing fields and the land to support a farm and a gardening program. This year's graduating class - the fifth in the school's young history- will include 12 students

It was readily apparent to the visiting team that on numerous fronts EWS's best days are on the near horizon. The impressive effort on the strategic plan of 2009 and especially the rigorous introspection and endless discussions that proved the foundation for this first self-study appear to have crystallized and formalized some important policies and programs and have added a welcome sense of permanence and stability to the school. EWS is still a young school in many ways, but much of the recent planning and codification of practices have helped issue in a stage of maturity in the school that is attractive

That 2010-2015 strategic plan (begun in the spring of 2009) was divided into two phases, one that could be accomplished on a more immediate basis and one that required significant additional funding. The first phase focused on three general areas: enriching the professional culture at the school and expanding and enhancing a whole host of existing programs; maintaining and increasing the sustainability of the school, and enriching the community culture. The second phase addressed four general challenges, further developing new programs and hiring the faculty to administer those programs; improving facilities; strengthening administration, and developing a financial plan to sufficiently support the aspirations articulated in the plan

The self-study is also a document that has and will continue to prove especially useful as a guiding map in the months and years ahead. The data from the myriad surveys reveal much about how the community perceives various aspects of the school, and the conversations among the various constituent groups - especially as they related to curriculum and school policies - will provide a framework for continued improvement

The visiting team recognizes and commends both the significant progress that has occurred in a wide array of areas in the last few years at the school and the work done previously to make possible these recent accomplishments. Both the Administrator and the College of Teachers deserve special mention for their work and successes in these areas.

PROFILE

Emerson Waldorf School's *Who Are We* section and portions of the *What We Do* section of the self-study provide comprehensive insight into all aspects of where the school is today. Survey results and the testing data reflect broad and deep support both for what the school is becoming and the kind of student that it is graduating.

Commendations:

The visiting team commends EWS for

- Engendering an enthusiasm and expression of mutual respect evident among the members of the faculty, students, and staff as observed by the visiting team during formal and informal conversations
- Developing an EC-12th grade curriculum that integrates both the academics and the arts with experiential learning in an age-appropriate blend
- Developing a faculty of experienced, trained Waldorf teachers
- Creating a well-established Early Childhood and Grade School that can provide the foundation for further developing a high school
- Providing an atmosphere where faculty, staff, and students feel safe and valued
- Implementing a Professional Development Process that is based on Peer Review and Evaluation
- Developing a Social Inclusion Program that strives to promote social responsibility in the community
- Strengthening the college guidance process in the high school
- Creating a healthy, collaborative relationship between the faculty, administration, and Board of Trustees
- Creating and sustaining a website that provides valuable school information to all stakeholder groups
- Communicating effectively with parents regarding the academic progress and overall development of their children
- Providing data to the visiting committee that was thorough and providing meaningful and useful information to the school community to be used for monitoring initiatives for school improvement
- Adding a Service Learning component to the Senior Trip

- Implementing with enthusiasm the festivals which annually bind the school together, especially the year-beginning and year-ending candle passing ceremonies
- Hiring and supporting a School Administrator who appears to be extremely active and constructive in linking the various circles of responsibilities at the school

Recommendations:

The visiting team recommends that EWS consider:

- Strengthening the remedial and tutoring program in order to provide sufficient services for students
- Making a concerted, ongoing effort to obtain feedback from alumni evaluating their experience at EWS in terms of how well it prepared them for their college academic challenges, as well as their views on current EWS issues and developments
- Striving to determine the image and message that the school wants to communicate locally to perspective students and parents
- Promoting more vigorously the specifics of what makes the school experience at EWS a value added to families and worth the cost
- Continuing to involve all stakeholders in diversity and multiculturalism discussions
- Exploring the value of integrating computers in the high school
- Expanding the 6-12 grade program to offer greater variety of after-school activities (especially sports)
- Offering appropriate after-school activity for children in the grade school
- Expanding the classroom libraries in the grade school
- Researching and implementing effective strategies to strengthen the 8th to 9th grade retention as well as increased enrollment in the high school
- Adding a second foreign language in the high school
- Developing further the Social Inclusion Program throughout the grades
- Reconsidering its plans for a traditional library in light of newer and better ways of accessing resources
- Developing further the high school foreign exchange program
- Expanding the website to include more information regarding school-related activities throughout the year

VISION

The vision for Waldorf schools in general was birthed over a century ago in Austria by cultural philosopher and scientist Rudolph Steiner; and the central tenets of that philosophy, including the spiritual movement of anthroposophy, are certainly serving as the foundation for EWS today. But each Waldorf school has its particular interpretation of the supporting programs and policies to best implement Steiner's core beliefs about education and child development, and EWS's emerging adaptation is serving its families particularly well.

Anchoring EWS's unique vision is the recently created Shared Principles Document. This work is the result of many conversations and meetings between the board, the faculty, the administration and staff, and the parents; and focuses on six critical features of EWS life. Those are: On Speaking with Children, On Creating a Healthy Classroom Atmosphere, On Supporting Healthy Childhood Development, On Working with Parents, On Delivering the Curriculum, and on Working with Colleagues. These principles are at the heart of the school.

Commendations:

The visiting team commends EWS for

- Creating a mission statement that is clearly understood, adopted, and valued by the entire school community students, faculty, parents, alumni, and board
- Creating and sustaining in all stakeholders a demonstrated respect and love of the school
- Implementing an EC-12th grade curriculum that strives to meet the developmental needs of the students based on the philosophies of Rudolph Steiner
- Supporting the faculty's demonstrated and strong ability to establish a positive learning community of mutual respect and trust between faculty and students
- Acknowledging the need to attract families with diverse backgrounds to enrich the school
- Having a Board of Trustees that is actively and appropriately involved in the life of the school

Recommendations:

- The visiting team recommends that EWS consider:
- Expanding programs to offer a complete Waldorf education, especially in the high school
- Funding a full-time eurhythmy instructor and a full-time therapeutic support person
- Developing alumni and alumni parent relations
- Complete the scope and sequence, both horizontally and vertically, of the EC-12th grade curriculum
- Funding the necessary monies to support faculty and staff training and development

- Increasing the fine arts and performing arts opportunities for the students. Recommitting additional efforts in this area might prove an important and easily discernable distinguishing element of the school in the local marketplace, as well as allowing EWS students to more fully develop artistically
- Providing students opportunities to serve on school-wide committees
- Developing specific strategies to increase the diversity of the school community
- Developing a five-year technology plan divided into three broad categories administrative services (network infrastructure, communications, business services, institutional advancement programs, students records, reporting), classroom instruction (hardware, software, and training for faculty to enhance teaching, and student resources (hardware, software, services and skills for use by high school students in support of learning)
- Constructing an indoor, multipurpose facility that could serve as a venue both for performing arts and athletics that would support and inspire EWS students and their best efforts

PLAN

EWS plan for school improvement is again the outcome of a highly collaborative and increasingly organized and comprehensive school-wide conversation. Because EWS is a school in large part run by the faculty and to a lesser degree directed by the Administrator, conversations about future goals and the action plans to accomplish those goals are the rule rather than the exception, and they are inclusive rather than confined to a narrow group of staff or faculty

As these committees continue their work and first put into writing, and then into practice, all of these plans; the school will and has already improved in significant ways in many arenas. The visiting committee recognizes both that this is a school that supports a very established and well run pre-school through eighth grade program and that this is a school still in the process of refining and integrating a high school that is scarcely eight years old. That work will be ongoing; but the benchmarks for what the high school aspires to be are universally agreed upon and beginning to be put in place.

Commendations:

The visiting team commends EWS for

- Making the commitment to providing the full Waldorf curriculum to its students
- Ensuring that all faculty are fully qualified and prepared to excel with their responsibilities
- Recognizing the facility needs and beginning a plan to address those needs
- Expanding the school's admission work to cast a wider net and build the upper school program with qualified, diverse students who have the potential for success
- Including representation from multiple constituencies on planning committees

Recommendations:

The visiting team recommends that EWS consider:

- Combining its self-study school improvement plan and its most recent strategic plan and establishing as policy a five-year plan that incorporates an annual review and revision of more specific and measurable goals, objectives, and action items than the current school improvement document provides
- Hiring a full-time development director who can help the school secure the funding necessary to implement its Long-Range Plan
- Detailing ways to further strengthen the high school in the Long-Range Plan
- Prioritizing the high school facility needs (i.e. dedicated classrooms, improved science labs, and indoor gym space)
- Aggressively addressing retention and recruitment issues
- Reassessing the number of committees, which seem to have overlapping mandates

RESULTS

A careful reading of the *Monitoring Our Progress to Improve* section of the self-study and related *Appendices*, which includes the long-range planning document, the master plan for campus development piece, and the parent, alumni, and outreach surveys all reflect the deep commitment of EWS to intentionally follow a clear and articulated path to school improvement. Again, as EWS is a Waldorf school, the core beliefs of the school are non-negotiable and time tested. The reality of how the school evolves in specific ways to best meet their unique challenges will be guided by the information held in these documents.

Still, Emerson Waldorf will have accomplished a landmark stage of school improvement when the school has:

A fully realized Waldorf curriculum with the necessary support personnel to implement that curriculum

Capacity enrollment in all grades with a waiting list

A campus and facilities that support and inspire their students' best efforts

SUMMARY

The visiting team's stay could not have been more pleasant, productive, or uplifting. A real effort was made to allow extended formal and informal conversations with the board, the administration, the faculty in all its myriad roles, the students, and the parents, as well as providing unconditional and unlimited access to classes.

Each group that we met was impressive in their unique way, and, to a person, testified that they were genuinely enriched by, and an active advocate for, the EWS experience. That degree of brand loyalty was not lost on the committee.

It was also readily apparent to each member of the committee that EWS was, and is, genuinely interested in improving as a school; and that attitude and the obvious dedication of each constituent group almost guarantees that the school will do just that

A final note regarding the teachers at EWS... The visiting team was repeatedly taken aback by the talent and work ethic of each teacher. What each teacher is required/invited to do - both as a classroom facilitator and a contributing member of this highly collaborative community - and the glad heart with which they do it, defines much of what is extraordinary about EWS.

CONCLUSION

The visiting team would like to thank all of the members of the Emerson Waldorf School for their gracious hosting during our stay. We would especially like to thank Joanne Andruscavage, School Administrator, for her attention to detail and thoughtful planning and communications regarding this accreditation experience. With the exception of one member of our team who works for and helps lead a Waldorf school in another city, no one on the team had any prior experience with a Waldorf school. Having said that, in the three-day experience that we share with the EWS community, all of us witnessed the beauty and value of the school and have carried back many wonderful Waldorf-based ideas to integrate into our own respective schools.

The visiting team finds:

- 1 That EWS is in full compliance with all of the standards of the SAIS-SACS dual accreditation process.
- 2. That the self-study conducted by the school meets the standard of quality and thoroughness required by the dual accreditation process and answers the four critical questions as outlined in the Guidebook.
- 3 That the school is unanimously recommended for SAIS-SACS dual accreditation.
