- b. State whether aid is presently being sought from other foundations and sources or whether such solutions are contemplated and if so, name them. (This is for information purposes only and not to be construed to mean we discourage aid from other sources; rather we prefer to participate with other donors.)
- c. All applications must be executed by persons so authorized on behalf of the tax-exempt organization. Applications and/or letters of inquiry signed by a division or departmental head must be approved and countersigned by the chief executive officer of the institution or organization.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE BYLAWS OF MCGREGOR FUND

(a Michigan Nonprofit Corporation)

This First Amendment to the Bylaws of McGregor Fund (this "Amendment") is made and entered into as of March 23, 2009, by and among the Trustees of McGregor Fund (the "Fund").

RECITALS

- A. The Trustees of the Fund previously adopted the Restated Bylaws of McGregor Fund on September 15, 2008 (the "Restated Bylaws").
- B. Pursuant to Article XIV of the Restated Bylaws, the Trustees have the authority to amend the Restated Bylaws.
- C. The Trustees now desire to modify and amend the Restated Bylaws as provided below.

COVENANTS

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

1. The following shall be added to the end of Article III:

"The Board of Trustees may grant any Trustee a leave of absence from all meetings, Member, Trustee and committee, upon a Trustee's prior written request to the Board of Trustees, which shall provide the applicable time period such Trustee shall be on leave, along with a reasonable explanation for such request. A majority vote of the Board of Trustees, not including the Trustee requesting leave, is required to approve the request.

While a Trustee is on leave, such Trustee will not be counted as necessary for any of the quorum requirements set forth in these By-Laws. Accordingly, a variable quorum shall apply during a Trustee's leave of absence whereby the quorum set forth in these By-Laws shall be reduced by one. Additionally, a Trustee on leave shall not receive any type of notice or communication pursuant to Section 6 of Article V of these By-Laws.

Upon a majority vote, the Board of Trustees may designate an interim Trustee to serve in the place and stead of the Trustee to whom leave was granted. An appointed interim Trustee shall be subject to the provisions of these By-Laws."

- 2. Any capitalized term without a definition in this Amendment shall have the meaning ascribed to such term in the Restated Bylaws.
- 3. Except as expressly modified by the terms and conditions of this Amendment, the terms and conditions of the Restated Bylaws shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of any inconsistency or conflict between this Amendment and the provisions of the Restated Bylaws, the provisions of this Amendment shall govern and control.
- 4. This Amendment may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original and all of which together shall constitute one instrument. Copies (whether photostatic, facsimile or otherwise) of this Amendment may be made and relied upon to the same extent as an original.

RESTATED BYLAWS

OF

MCGREGOR FUND

(A Michigan Nonprofit Corporation)

ARTICLE I

CORPORATE PURPOSES

The purposes of the Corporation are as set forth in Article III of the articles of incorporation of the Corporation.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

The membership of this Corporation shall consist of such persons as may be chosen from time to time to serve as Trustees of this Corporation in accordance with Article IV hereof, each to serve until his or her membership shall terminate by ceasing to be a Trustee or by death, resignation or removal as hereinafter provided.

Any Member may be removed for any good or reasonable cause by the vote of not less than two-thirds of all of the Members.

ARTICLE III

TRUSTEES

The general management of the property and affairs, the receipt of gifts and contributions, the investment and reinvestment of the funds of this Corporation and the making of gifts and the disbursements of funds in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation, as amended, and these By-Laws, shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of nine Trustees.

Trustees shall be elected for terms of up to three (3) years by the Members at the annual meeting of the Members, provided that such terms shall be established so that at least one-third of the Board shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Members. Each Trustee so elected shall hold office during the term for which he or she was elected and/or until his or her successor shall be elected and qualified; provided, however, that if any vacancy occurs in the office of Trustee by death,

resignation, removal or otherwise between the dates of the annual meetings of Members, the remaining Trustees may elect a Trustee to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term and the Trustee so elected shall hold office for such unexpired term and or until his successor shall be elected and qualified.

A Trustee may be removed from office at any time for any good or reasonable cause by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of all the Members of the Corporation.

The Trustees, duly assembled as such, shall also have the power and it shall be their duty:

- (a) To elect, appoint or employ, and to remove at pleasure, all officers, agents or employees of the Corporation, to prescribe their powers and duties, and to fix their compensation.
- (b) To approve the appointment of committees.
- (c) To review and approve an operating expense budget for the ensuing year as submitted by the President.
- (d) To designate by resolution the manner in which notes, checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Corporation shall be signed and endorsed.
- (e) To change the location of the principal office of the Corporation from time to time, whenever it is necessary or convenient to do so.
- (f) To do anything and everything that may be lawful and necessary or convenient to carry out the purposes for which this Corporation has been formed and as generally described in the Articles of Incorporation, as amended, and these By-Laws.

ARTICLE IV

TRUSTEES EMERITUS

Section 1. The Members may, in their sole discretion, recognize valued and meritorious service to the Corporation by any Trustee by conferring upon him or her the title of Trustee Emeritus upon his or her disassociation from the Board of Trustees.

Section 2. A Trustee Emeritus shall upon request receive all notices and minutes of meetings of the Trustees, all reports of Committees pertaining to proposed grants, and other information pertinent to Fund activities, and shall be encouraged to attend meetings of Trustees and to speak on any question but without the right to vote.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS OF MEMBERS AND TRUSTEES

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Members for the election of Trustees and for such other business as may properly come before the meeting shall be held on or before December 31st of each year at a time which shall from time to time be determined by the President, provided proper notice of the annual meeting date is given pursuant to Section 6 of this Article, unless such action is taken by written consent as provided in Section 8 of this Article.

Section 2. Election of Trustees shall be by vote of the Members. Nominations shall be solicited from the Members. The Governance Committee shall consider such nominations, together with those proposed by the Committee, and prepare recommendations for submission to the Members at or prior to the annual meeting of Members. Each Member present may vote for as many Trustees as are to be elected, and the persons receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected. Cumulative voting shall not be permitted.

- Section 3. The Members may by resolution provide for additional regular meetings of Members.
- Section 4. The annual meeting of the Trustees shall be held on or before December 31st of each year at a time which shall from time to time be determined by the President, provided proper notice of the annual meeting date is given pursuant to Section 6 of this Article, unless such action is taken by written consent as provided in Section 8 of this Article.
- Section 5. Special meetings of Members or Trustees shall be called by the Secretary or any other officer at any time upon order of the Chairman or Vice Chairman, or a majority of the Members or Trustees.

Section 6. When notice or communication of a meeting is required by these bylaws or by law, such notice shall contain the time, place and purpose of the meeting and shall be served either personally or by mail upon each Member or Trustee not less than three (3) days before the meeting. If mailed, the notice shall be directed to each Member or Trustee at his or her address as it appears in the records of the Corporation unless he or she shall have filed with the Secretary thereof a written request that notices intended form him or her to be mailed to some other address, in which case it shall be mailed to the address designated in such request. The notice or communication is given when deposited, with postage thereon prepaid, in a post office or official depository under the exclusive care and custody of the United States Postal Service. Written notice may also be given by telegram, telecopy, telex, radiogram, cablegram, mailgram or by a form of electronic transmission to which such Member or Trustee has consented, and such notice shall be deemed to be given when the recipient receives the notice personally, or when the notice, addressed as provided above, has been delivered to the Corporation, or to the equipment transmitting such notice. Meetings may be held without notice if all Members or Trustees are present in person or if notice of the time, place and purpose of such meeting is waived by telegram or other writing, including facsimile transmission, or by electronic transmission, either before or after the holding thereof, by all

Members or Trustees not present at such meeting.

Section 7. A majority of the Members or Trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, except where a larger number may be required by law, but a lesser number may adjourn from time to time without further notice until a quorum shall be present, and at any such adjourned meeting any business may be transacted which could be transacted at the meeting as originally called. Members and Trustees shall vote personally and not by proxy.

Section 8. Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the Members or of the Trustees or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if a written consent thereof is signed by all Members, Trustees or Members of such committee then in office. Such written consent shall be filed with the minutes or proceedings of the Members, Trustees or the Committee.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Corporation shall be Chairman, Vice Chairman, President, Secretary and Treasurer. There may be one or more Assistant Secretaries and Assistant Treasurers, all as may be determined by the Trustees. Any two of such offices may be held by the same person except the offices of Chairman and Vice Chairman. All officers of the Corporation except the Corporation's President and Assistant Secretaries shall be Trustees. The Corporation's President and Assistant Secretaries may be elected Trustees.

Section 2. The officers shall be elected by the Trustees at their annual meeting to serve until the next annual meeting or until their successors are elected and shall have qualified, but the officers shall always be subject to removal by the Trustees.

ARTICLE VII

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. <u>Chairman</u>. The Chairman shall be elected or appointed by, and from or among the membership of, the Board of Trustees. He or she shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees and of any executive committee. He or she shall perform such other duties and functions as shall be assigned to him or her from time to time by the Board of Trustees. He or she shall be, ex officio, a member of all standing committees. Except where by law the signature of the President of the Corporation is required, the Chairman shall possess the same power and authority to sign all certificates, contracts, instruments, papers and documents of every conceivable kind and character whatsoever in the name of and on behalf of the Corporation which may be authorized by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2. <u>Vice Chairman</u>. During the absence or disability of the Chairman, or while that office is vacant, the Vice Chairman shall preside over all meetings of the Board of Trustees and of

any executive committee, and shall perform all of the duties and functions, and when so acting shall have all powers and authority, of the Chairman. The Vice Chairman shall, in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Vice Chairman and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. <u>President</u>. The President shall be the chief operating officer, and shall perform such duties as may be delegated to him or her by the Board of Trustees, any executive committee, the Chairman or Vice Chairman, and the performance of any such duty by the President shall be sufficient evidence of his or her right to do so for the protection of any person dealing with the Corporation in reliance upon such action. The President shall, in general, perform all duties incident to the office of President and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

- Section 4. <u>Secretary</u>. The Secretary shall keep and preserve the corporate minutes and records, and shall perform all the duties usually incident to such office.
- Section 5. <u>Treasurer</u>. The Treasurer shall keep proper books of account and records of securities and other evidence of property belonging to the Corporation, and shall perform all the duties usually incident to such office.
- Section 6. <u>Assistant Secretaries and Assistant Treasurers</u>. The Assistant Secretary or Assistant Secretaries, in the absence or disability of the secretary, shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the Secretary, and such other duties as the Trustees may provide. The Assistant Treasurer or Assistant Treasurers, in the absence or disability of the Treasurer, shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the Treasurer, and such other duties as the Board of Trustees may provide.

ARTICLE VIII

COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be a standing Finance Committee which shall have the authority to act in place of the Board in investment and reinvestment of the funds of the Corporation, in directing or approving the investment and reinvestment of such funds, or in supervising the investment and reinvestment of such funds by one or more qualified agents, including independent investment counsel or managers, banks or trust companies, to whom such authority has been delegated by the Board or by whom such responsibility has been assumed by contract with the Board. In supervising the investment and reinvestment of the funds of the Corporation by one or more agents, the Committee shall meet periodically with a representative of each such agent to receive the reports of such agent and to review and evaluate investment results. Such reports shall be transmitted to the Board at their next regularly scheduled meeting.

Section 2. There shall be a standing Program Committee which may be a committee of the entire Board as may be determined by the Chairman and approved by the Board of Trustees. The Program Committee shall investigate, review and make specific recommendations to the Trustees regarding proposals for grant funding.

Section 3. There shall be a standing Committee on Private Liberal Arts Colleges and Universities which, on an annual basis, shall investigate, review and make specific recommendations to the Board regarding proposals from eligible educational institutions for grant funding.

Section 4. There shall be a standing Governance Committee which shall consider and report periodically to the Board on all matters relating to the selection and qualification of members of the Board as well as matters relating to the duties of the members of the Board. The Committee shall act as a nominating committee with respect to candidates for Trustees and shall make recommendations to the full Board concerning the size and tenure of the Board and the structure of the committees of the Board. The Committee shall also assist the Board with oversight of corporate governance matters.

Section 5. There shall be a standing Audit Committee which shall have the authority to act in place of the Board in matters pertaining to oversight of the Corporation's Financial responsibilities by reviewing the financial reports and other financial information of the Corporation provided to the public and the Board, the Corporation's system of internal controls and the Corporation's auditing, accounting and financial reporting processes. The Committee shall meet at least annually with the independent accountants to receive their report and required communications regarding the annual audit of the Corporation's financial statements. The Committee shall be responsible for reporting all communications with the independent accountants to the Board.

Section 6. Standing committees shall consist of such number of Trustees as the Board may determine, and shall be appointed by the Chairman with the approval of the Board, to serve until the next annual meeting of the Board, or until their successors are appointed and shall have qualified. Vacancies in any standing committee shall be filled in the same manner. The Chairman shall be ex officio a member of each standing committee. The President shall be ex-officio a member of each standing committee, except the Audit Committee. A majority of the Members of a committee shall constitute a quorum.

Section 7. The Board may establish such additional standing committees or special committees from time to time as it shall deem appropriate to conduct the activities of the Corporation, and shall define the powers and responsibilities of such committees. Members of committees shall always be subject to removal by the Board.

ARTICLE IX

DUTY OF TRUSTEES AND OFFICERS; INDEMNIFICATION

Section 1. Duty of Trustees and Officers.

A trustee or an officer shall discharge the duties of that position in good faith and with that degree of diligence, care, and skill which an ordinary prudent person would exercise under similar circumstances in a like position.

In discharging his or her duties, a trustee or an officer, when acting in good faith, may rely upon the opinion of counsel of the Corporation, the report of an independent appraiser selected with reasonable care by the Board of Trustees, or financial statements of the Corporation represented to him or her to be correct by the President or the Treasurer, or as stated in a written report by an independent public or certified public accountant or firm of such accountants fairly to reflect the financial condition of the Corporation.

Section 2. Indemnification

- The Corporation shall, to the fullest extent authorized or permitted by the Michigan (a) Nonprofit Corporation Act ("the Act") or other applicable law, as the same presently exists or may hereafter be amended, indemnify a director or officer (the "Indemnitee") who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to a threatened, pending, or completed action, suit, or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative and whether formal or informal, other than an action by or in the right of the corporation, by reason of the fact that he or she is or was a director, officer, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of another foreign or domestic corporation, business corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, whether for profit or not for profit, against expenses, including attorneys' fees, judgments, penalties, fines, and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by the Indemnitee in connection with the action, suit, or proceeding, if the Indemnitee acted in good faith and in a manner the Indemnitee reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the corporation, and with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, if the Indemnitee had no reasonable cause to believe the conduct was unlawful. The termination of any action, suit or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction, or upon a plea of nolo contendere or its equivalent, does not, of itself, create a presumption that the Indemnitee did not act in good faith and in a manner which the Indemnitee reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the corporation, and with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, had reasonable cause to believe that the conduct was unlawful.
- (b) The Corporation shall, to the fullest extent authorized or permitted by the Act or other applicable law, as the same presently exists or may hereafter be amended, indemnify an Indemnitee who was or is a party to or is threatened to be made a party to a threatened, pending, or completed action or suit by or in the right of the corporation to procure a judgment in its favor by reason of the fact that the Indemnitee is or was a director, officer, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of another foreign or domestic corporation, business corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, whether for profit or not, against expenses, including actual and reasonable attorneys' fees, and amounts paid in settlement incurred by the Indemnitee in connection with the action or suit, if the Indemnitee acted in good faith and in a manner the Indemnitee reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the corporation. However, indemnification under this Section shall not be made for a claim, issue, or matter in which the Indemnitee has been found liable to the Corporation unless and only to the extent that the court in which the action or suit was brought has determined upon application that, despite the adjudication of liability but in view of all circumstances of the case, the

Indemnitee is fairly and reasonably entitled to indemnification for the expenses which the court considers proper.

- (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 2(a) and 2(b) of this Article, the Corporation shall not indemnify an Indemnitee in connection with any action, suit, proceeding or claim (or part thereof) brought or made by such Indemnitee; unless such action, suit, proceeding or claim (or part thereof) (i) was authorized by the Board, or (ii) was brought or made to enforce this Article and such Indemnitee has been successful in such action, suit, proceeding or claim (or part thereof).
- (d) An indemnification under Sections 2(a) or 2(b) of this Article, unless ordered by a court, shall be made by the Corporation only as authorized in the specific case upon a determination that indemnification of the Indemnitee is proper in the circumstances because the Indemnitee has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Sections 2(a) and 2(b) of this Article. This determination shall be made promptly in any of the following ways:
 - (i) By a majority vote of a quorum of the Board consisting of directors who were not parties to the action, suit, or proceeding.
 - (ii) If the quorum described in subdivision (i) is not obtainable, then by a majority vote of a committee of directors who are not parties to the action. The committee shall consist of not less than two (2) disinterested directors.
 - (iii) By independent legal counsel in a written opinion.
- (e) Expenses incurred in defending a civil or criminal action, suit, or proceeding described in Sections 2(a) or 2(b) of this Article shall be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of the action, suit, or proceeding upon receipt of any undertaking by or on behalf of the Indemnitee to repay the expenses if it is ultimately determined that the Indemnitee is not entitled to be indemnified by the corporation. The undertaking shall be by unlimited general obligation of the person on whose behalf advances are made but need not be secured.
- (f) If an Indemnitee is entitled to indemnification under Sections 2(a) or 2(b) of this Article for a portion of expenses including attorneys' fees, judgments, penalties, fines, and amounts paid in settlement, but not for the total amount thereof, the Corporation shall indemnify the Indemnitee for the portion of the expenses, judgments, penalties, fines, or amounts paid in settlement for which the Indemnitee is entitled to be indemnified.
- (g) Any person who is not covered by the foregoing provisions of this Article and who is or was an employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the corporation as a trustee, director, officer, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of another foreign or domestic corporation, business corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, whether for profit or not for profit, may be indemnified to the fullest extent authorized or permitted by the Act or other applicable law, as the same exist or may hereafter be amended, but in the case of any such amendment, only to the extent such amendment permits the

corporation to provide broader indemnification rights than before such amendment, but in any event only to the extent authorized at any time or from time to time by the Board.

- (h) The indemnification or advancement of expenses provided under Sections 2(a) to 2(g) of this Article is not exclusive of other rights to which a person seeking indemnification or advancement of expenses may be entitled under the articles of incorporation, these bylaws, or a contractual agreement. However, the total amount of expenses advanced or indemnified from all sources combined shall not exceed the amount of actual expenses incurred by the person seeking indemnification or advancement of expenses. The indemnification provided for in Sections 2(a) to 2(g) of this Article continues as to a person who ceases to be a trustee, director, officer, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, and administrators of the person.
- (i) The Corporation shall have the power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of the corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, director, officer, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of another corporation, business corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise against any liability asserted against the person and incurred by the person in any such capacity or arising out of the person's status as such, whether or not the corporation would have the power to indemnify the person against such liability under the provisions of the Act.
- (j) The right to indemnification conferred in this Article shall be deemed to be a contract between the Corporation and each director or officer who serves in any such capacity at any time while this Article is in effect, and any repeal or modification of any such law or of this Article shall not affect any rights or obligations then existing with respect to any state of facts then or theretofore existing or any action, suit or proceeding theretofore or thereafter brought or threatened based in whole or in part upon any such state of facts. In the event this Article is repealed or modified, the corporation shall give written notice thereof to the directors and officers and any such repeal or modification shall not be effective for a period of sixty (60) days after such notice is delivered.
- (k) The definition for "Corporation" found in Section 569 of the Act, as the same exists or may hereafter be amended, is and shall be, specifically excluded from application to this Article. The indemnification and other obligations of the corporation set forth in this Article shall be binding upon any resulting or surviving corporation after any merger or consolidation of the corporation. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein or in Section 569 of the Act, unless determined otherwise by the Board, no person shall be entitled to the indemnification and other rights set forth in this Article for acting as a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, nondirector volunteer or agent of another corporation prior to such other corporation entering into a merger or consolidation with the corporation.
- (l) Each and every paragraph, sentence, term and provision of this Article shall be considered severable in that, in the event a court finds any paragraph, sentence, term or provision to be invalid or unenforceable, the validity and enforceability, operation, or effect of the remaining

paragraphs, sentences, terms, or provisions shall not be affected, and this Article shall be construed in all respects as if the invalid or unenforceable matter had been omitted.

Right of Officer or Director to Bring Suit. If a claim for indemnification is not paid in full by the corporation within forty-five (45) days after a written claim has been received by the corporation, the Indemnitee who submitted the claim may at any time thereafter bring suit against the corporation to recover the unpaid amount of the claim. If successful in whole or in part in any such suit or in a suit brought by the corporation to recover advances, the Indemnitee shall be entitled to be paid also the expense of prosecuting or defending such claim. In any action brought by the Indemnitee to enforce a right hereunder (other than an action brought to enforce a claim for expenses incurred in defending any proceeding in advance of its final disposition where the required undertaking, if any, has been tendered to the corporation) it shall be a defense that, and in any action brought by the Corporation to recover advances the Corporation shall be entitled to recover such advances if, the Indemnitee has not met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Sections 2(a) or 2(b) of this Article. Neither the failure of the Corporation (including its Board or independent legal counsel) to have made a determination prior to the commencement of such action that indemnification of the Indemnitee is proper in the circumstances because he or she has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth herein, nor an actual determination by the corporation (including its Board, independent legal counsel, or its shareholders) that the Indemnitee has not met such applicable standard of conduct, shall be a defense to an action brought by the Indemnitee or create a presumption that the indemnitee has not met the applicable standard of conduct. In any action brought by the Indemnitee to enforce a right hereunder or by the corporation to recover payments by the corporation of advances, the burden of proof shall be on the corporation.

ARTICLE X

CORPORATE PRACTICES

Section 1. The funds of the Corporation shall be deposited in such banks or other financial institutions as may be designated by the Board. Except as otherwise provided by resolution of the Trustees, such deposits shall be made subject to withdrawal only on the signatures of any two of the following officers (one of which must be a Trustee), Chairman, Vice Chairman, President, Treasurer and Secretary or by any two Trustees designated by the Board.

Section 2. The funds of the Corporation shall be disbursed only pursuant to resolutions or other authorization of the Board.

Section 3. In the absence of a direction to the contrary in any Will or other instrument conveying shares of stock or other registerable securities to the Corporation, shares of stock or other registerable securities may be held in the name of a nominee of any agent employed by the Corporation under the terms of an agreement whereby the agent assumes full responsibility for the acts of its nominee. Whenever shares of stock or other registerable securities owned by the Corporation are held in the name of a nominee, the Corporation shall keep adequate records to show at all times its real interest in such shares of stock or other registerable securities which the Corporation shall request the

agent to verify on appropriate occasions.

Section 4. The Corporation shall not carry on activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, (b) by a corporation contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or (c) by a nonprofit corporation organized under the law of the State of Michigan pursuant to the provisions of Act 162, public Acts of 1982, as amended.

Section 5. The Board of Trustees and the Corporation as an institution shall not knowingly directly or indirectly engage in, promote or support other organizations or individuals who engage in or promote terrorist activity. The Board and the Corporation shall not knowingly make its facilities or resources available to support any activities of organizations whose purpose is subversive to the interests of the United States Government or to the national security of the United States.

Section 6. No part of the assets or net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of or be distributable to its trustees, officers, or other private persons, except as otherwise set forth in these bylaws.

No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements) any political campaign on behalf of (or in opposition to) any candidate for public office.

The Corporation will not engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in Section 4941(d) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended.

The Corporation will not retain any excess business holdings as defined in Section 4943(c) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended.

The Corporation will not make any investments in such manner as to subject it to tax under Section 4944 of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended.

The Corporation will not make any taxable expenditures as defined in Section 4945(d) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended.

ARTICLE XI

DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS

Subject to any limitations contained in the Articles of Incorporation, as amended, and in any gifts, grants, devises and bequests to this Corporation of any money or property, the principal and net income of such gifts, grants, devises and bequests may be distributed or applied for any purpose or purposes within the scope of the purposes of this Corporation upon affirmative vote, written consent, or

ratification of a majority of the Board.

ARTICLE XII

ANNUAL AUDITS

There shall be an annual audit of the financial affairs of the Corporation by an Independent Certified Public Accountant approved by the Board each year.

ARTICLE XIII

SEAL

The corporate seal shall be an impression of a circular device bearing the corporate name, the year "1925" and the words "Michigan" and "Corporate Seal". An impression thereof shall be placed in the record book and for purposes of identification shall be certified by the Secretary.

ARTICLE XIV

AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS

Section 1. These By-Laws, except Article X as to the Distribution of Funds, may be altered or amended at any duly called meeting of the Board by a majority vote of all Trustees, provided that written notice stating the substance of the proposed amendment has been sent to each Trustee at least ten days in advance of the date of meeting, unless such notice is waived by the Trustees.

Section 2. Article X as to the Distribution of Funds shall only be amended by the consent of four-fifths of all Trustees.

Section 3. Members or Trustees may adopt additional rules and regulations, general or special, for the conduct of their meetings, and the Trustees may adopt additional rules and regulations, general or special, for the conduct of the affairs of the Corporation, always provided the same are not inconsistent with these By-Laws.

ARTICLE XV

DEFINITIONS AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Section 1. Definitions:

Corporation. As used herein, "Corporation" shall include all constituent corporations absorbed in a consolidation or merger and the resulting or surviving corporation, so that a person who is or was a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, or agent of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise whether for profit or not shall stand in the same position under the provisions of this Article III with respect to the resulting or surviving

corporation as the person would if he or she served the resulting or surviving corporation in the same capacity.

Disqualified Person. As used herein, "disqualified person" shall include a person who is described in Section 4946 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Fines. As used herein "fines" shall include any excise taxes assessed on a person with respect to an employee benefit plan.

Not Opposed to the Best Interest of the Corporation. As used herein, a person who acted in good faith and in a manner he or she reasonably believed to be in the best interest of the participants and beneficiaries of an employee benefit plan shall be considered to have acted in a manner "not opposed to the best interest of the Corporation."

Other Enterprises. As used herein, "other enterprises" shall include employee benefit plans.

Serving at the Request of the Corporation. As used herein, "serving at the request of the Corporation" shall include any service as a director or officer of the Corporation which imposes duties on, or involves services by, the director or officer with respect to an employee benefit plan, its participants or beneficiaries.

Board. As used herein, "Board" shall be read to mean the Board of Trustees of the Corporation.

Electronic Transmission or Electronically Transmitted. As used herein, "electronic transmission" or "electronically transmitted" shall mean any form of communication that does not directly involve the physical transmission of paper, creates a record that may be retained and retrieved by the recipient, and may be directly reproduced in paper form by the recipient through an automated process.

Ex-Officio Member. As used herein, "Ex-Officio Member" shall be read to mean a person who is a member of a committee by virtue of his or her office, who shall have voting rights unless otherwise determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2. Captions. The captions, Article numbers and paragraph lettering used herein are inserted only as a matter of convenience and for reference only and in no way define, limit, construe or describe the scope or intent of such Sections or Articles of these Bylaws, nor in any way affect these bylaws.

ARTICLE XVI

DISSOLUTION

Section 1. Upon the termination, dissolution or winding up of the Corporation, the Board shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all liabilities of the Corporation, distribute all assets of the Corporation to an organization or organizations as are organized and

operated exclusively for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the circuit court in the county in which the principal office of the Corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes.
