INTRODUCTION: Purpose, Goals, and Commitment to Community

Purpose

The mission of the YMCA of Greater Nashua is to instill values and provide opportunities for lifelong personal growth and the development of a healthy spirit, mind, and body for all. Financial assistance is available for those who can not afford to pay the full cost of any program or service.

Community Impact

During the year ending August 31, 2009, the YMCA of Greater Nashua served 23,033 people including 8,749 children, 13,343 adults and 941 seniors. Over 325 programs and services are offered annually to engage those of all ages and abilities in activities that promote good health, strong families, youth leadership and community development.

The YMCAs Goals and Commitment to the Greater Nashua Community

• Ensuring Access to All

In FY 2009, \$283,996 in financial assistance was provided to 1,770 local children, adults and families that otherwise would be unable to afford to participate in YMCA programs and services.

• Supporting Youth Development

The YMCA of Greater Nashua offers more than 100 different programs at any given time that help build the developmental assets and encourage growth in mind, body and spirit needed to help children thrive. In FY 2009, we served more than 8,700 children and youth. We also collaborate with other youth organizations in the region including Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Community Council, Boys & Girls Club, and Girl's Inc. to share resources so that we can all reach out to more youth.

A youth wellness center in the Nashua YMCA provides those ages 6-12 the opportunity to work with YMCA trainers to improve their health using a variety of traditional and interactive wellness equipment. Grant funding enables local pediatricians to "Prescribe the Y" to youth facing weight issues to use the center at no cost. Over 23,000 children, adults and seniors were involved in YMCA of Greater Nashua programs and services last year. A variety of free education programs are available to the entire community at the YMCA including – Healthy Kids Day, America on the Move Week programming, walking clubs, nutrition seminars and more.

• Engagement and Volunteerism

- The YMCA of Greater Nashua engages with a broad array of community stakeholders to achieve community well-being. Last year we partnered with dozens of local non-profits to provide free pool time to groups like the Special Olympics, use of the media center for internet safety classes, blood drives, health fairs, nutrition seminars, retreats and more. The value of donated space was \$26,168.
- Volunteers play a crucial role in our YMCA. 675 individuals volunteered at our YMCA in FY 2009 with an estimated value of \$480,645.
- Our YMCA raised \$894,653 in individual, business, government and foundation contributions and grants, demonstrating broad support from our community.
- We reached more than 23,000 members of our community from those that are involved everyday as a YMCA member, children participating in programs or attending a community event at the YMCA.

• Our Commitment to be an Asset to our Community

A. YMCA AQUATICS

YMCA aquatic programs are part of the YMCA's overall goal of building healthy spirit, mind, and body. The aquatic department continues to be a leader in aquatic programming and in offering a full range of programs for all ages. Along with the regular preschool and grade school swimming programs the YMCA also offers aquatic exercise (including classes specifically for seniors and those with arthritis), life guarding, scuba, and time for recreational and lap swimming. In addition to providing specific swimming and water safety skills, they promote good health through regular exercise. They also promote teamwork, self-confidence, and leadership. The YMCA's aquatic professionals are recognized as leaders in the aquatic field and serve as trainers for the YMCA of the USA in this region for national aquatic certifications. The YMCA's aquatic programs are offered at fees affordable to the community at large, with financial assistance for those who can't afford the full fee. Additionally, the YMCA offers our pool, life guards and instructors at no charge to groups such as Special Olympics, Area Agency and others who use aqua therapy with their disabled clients.

B. YMCA DAY CAMP

The YMCA of Greater Nashua served local families by summer camp experiences to hundreds of local children. Some campers attend one week, while others attend all nine weeks. In many instances camping programs serve as child care for parents in the summertime, allowing them to remain gainfully employed. All camp programs are offered on a below-cost basis to parents unable to afford the full fee.

<u>Camp Sargent</u> is located on Lake Naticook in Merrimack and has 13 cabins, recreation hall, newly renovated bathrooms and arts and crafts cabin, a new playground, large pavilions, playing fields, and basketball/volleyball courts. Transportation to and from Camp Sargent is provided along with pre and post camp day care.

The YMCA's day camping programs are educational; they promote physical activity (including swimming and boating), arts, educational lessons, hands on activities (including woodworking) and a respect and understanding for the environment. Campers (ages 5 to grade 10) at Camp Sargent are grouped by age and participate in coed activities including swimming, boating and canoeing, archery, arts and crafts, sports and games, and outdoor skills. Special events include family nights and theme weeks. Through these activities and the use of natural surroundings, YMCA day camping seeks to help participants achieve their fullest potential in spirit, mind, and body.

<u>Special Interest Camps</u> - Based out of the Merrimack facility (age 5 to grade 8) all camps include recreational swimming, outside play, and group activities to balance the child's day. Specialty camps include: Sports (baseball, basketball, soccer, swimming, lacrosse, tennis, fitness, cheerleading); Arts (Creative, Visual, Theater, Ballet, tap, Jazz/Hip hop, Dance Intensive, Junior Music); Media Camp; Young Explorers and Recreation Camp. In each special interest camp, youth are involved in age and skill appropriate activities, taught new techniques and allowed to express themselves and develop leadership skills.

Teen Adventure Camp - Based out of Nashua for grades 7 to 10. This unique program is for teens that enjoy challenging themselves physically and mentally. Teens are provided the opportunity to increase their self-esteem through participation in fun and challenging activities. Each day features a different trip which may vary from hiking, mountain biking, ropes courses, trips to Boston, canoeing, and much more. Teen Adventure camp provides positive, educational and once-in-a-lifetime experiences and physical activity for teens during the summer when they otherwise would be home alone in front of the TV or computer for hours at a time.

C. YMCA CHILD CARE

We are one of the largest providers of affordable child care in the Greater Nashua community. A community needs assessment conducted by the United Way of Greater Nashua showed that affordable childcare was viewed by 74% of human service providers as a "major problem".

The central focus of all YMCA child care programs is to foster growth and development, not only in children but also in their parents and families. 130 children were enrolled in the Merrimack YMCAs fulltime licensed childcare, full and part-time preschool and kindergarten programs during the 2008-2009 school year. These programs expose children to a variety of asset-building programs as well as enrichment programs. An additional 100 children were enrolled in School's Out afterschool programs at the Merrimack and Nashua YMCAs during the 08/09 school year. Daily activities for School's Out participants include: arts and crafts, group games, sports, music, swimming, free play, and homework time. These educational programs help kids develop moral and ethical behavior, self-esteem, and leadership. Parents play an important role in policy and program decisions. Transportation is provided from all elementary schools in the area each day to both locations. The Merrimack YMCA also provides a before school care program which includes bussing to Merrimack schools. On days off from school (vacation, teacher service, snow days, etc) when parents still have to work, the School's Out program runs all day for no additional cost with the exceptions of 5 major holidays when the YMCA is closed.

For parents who cannot afford the full fee, care is provided on a below-cost basis through the Y Cares Financial Assistance Program.

D. YMCA YOUTH, TEENS, AND FAMILY SERVICES

Youth - These programs promote an appreciation of one's own worth. Whatever the program, the focus is on full and equal participation of all, every child plays in every game. Leagues are organized on the basis of skills clinics. Win or lose, YMCA youth sports programs emphasize the development of skill, health and fitness, safety, cooperation, self-esteem, and respect for others. Dance and Arts Programming places a strong importance on self-esteem.

<u>Teens</u> - These programs give teens good role models to help them develop self esteem and good values, including, cooperation, respect for the body, good citizenship, and a strong work ethic.

Teen programs include:

- YMCA Youth and Government The YMCA sponsored teenagers from the surrounding communities in the State Wide YMCA Youth and Government model legislative assembly at the State House in Concord. This program serves as an excellent training tool for future leaders.
- <u>Church Basketball League</u> This is a teen basketball league utilizing the YMCA facility each week. The league is made up of churches from Greater Nashua to provide cooperation and friendly competition amongst the churches.
- <u>Police Officers/Teen League</u> Nashua police officers play pick-up basketball games on their own time with local teens at the Nashua YMCA on a weekly basis.
- <u>Employment Opportunities</u> Employment opportunities for high school students are available in aquatic, youth sports, camp, custodial services, and desk receptionist duties.

INTRODUCTION - The goals of all YMCA programs and practices are to help participants:

- Grow as responsible members of families and communities.
- Understand that well-being means a healthy body, mind, and spirit.
- Build self-esteem, an appreciation of one's own worth.
- Develop skills for leadership.

93a. YMCA AQUATICS

YMCA aquatic programs are part of the Y's overall goal of building healthy spirit, mind, and body. In addition to providing specific swimming, water safety skills, and educating participants how to be safe in and around the water, the programs promote good health through regular exercise. They also promote teamwork, self-confidence, and leadership. These programs are offered at fees affordable to the community at large, with financial assistance for those who can't afford the full fee. Additionally, the YMCA offers our pool, life guards and instructors at no charge to groups such as Special Olympics, Area Agency and others who use aqua therapy with their disabled clients.

93b. YMCA CHILD CARE

The central focus of all YMCA child care programs is to foster growth and development, not only in children but also in their parents and families. 130 children were enrolled in the Merrimack YMCAs fulltime childcare, full and part-time preschool and kindergarten programs during the 2008-2009 school year. These programs expose children to a variety of asset-building programs as well as enrichment activities. An additional 100 children were enrolled in School's Out afterschool programs at the Merrimack and Nashua YMCAs during the 08/09 school year. Daily activities for School's Out participants include: arts and crafts, group games, sports, music, swimming, free play, and homework time. These educational programs help kids develop moral and ethical behavior, self-esteem, and leadership. Parents play an important role in policy and program decisions. Transportation is provided from all elementary schools in the area each day to both locations. The Merrimack YMCA also provides a before school care program which includes bussing to Merrimack schools. On days off from school (vacation, teacher service, snow days, etc) when parents still have to work, the School's Out program runs all day for no additional cost with some exceptions on major holidays.

93c, YMCA DAY CAMP -

Some campers attended one week, while others attended all nine weeks. In many instances camping programs serve as child care for parents in the summertime, allowing them to remain gainfully employed. All camp programs are offered on a below-cost basis to parents unable to afford the full fee.
