The Rule of Law Initiative implements legal reform programs in Africa, Asia, Europe and Eurasia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and the Middle East and North Africa Working in collaboration with host country partners, ABA ROLI concentrates its efforts in the following seven focal areas - Access to Justice and Human Rights - Anti-Corruption and Public Integrity - Criminal Law Reform and Anti-Human Trafficking - Judicial Reform - Legal Education Reform - Legal Profession Reform - Women's Rights FJE ROLI has been actively engaged in legal reforms in twenty-six countries this year The majority of ROLI's work is accomplished in cooperation with, and with the goal of strengthening, local partners In Africa, FJE ROLI has been active in training local partners in anti-trafficking in persons, combating gender-based violence, training judges on international gender equality principles and family codes, and helping to re-integrate former child soldiers into society by training judges, police and lawyers on their legal needs In Russia and the former Soviet states, FJE ROLI operates legal clinics for refugees and victims of political violence, instituted a mentoring program that brings together female law students and practicing lawyers, drafted ethical codes for lawyers and judges, drafted a legal education reform index to analyze legal education and monitor the progress of improvements in legal education, launched local programs of continuing legal education emphasizing human rights, operated legal clinics providing assistance to displaced persons, developed and released a judicial reform index to analyze court progress, analyzed judicial needs, trained police, courts and prosecutors in anti-trafficking, provided judicial education and training, organized local bar associations to provide ethics and other training, and provided organizational assistance for women's bar associations to strengthen women's rights and integration into society In the Middle East, FJE ROLI focused on legal education reform, including moot court training and alternative dispute resolution, and in strengthening women's rights through efforts designed to strengthen women's roles in the legal system In Central and South America, FJE ROLI worked with local partners to assist in the transition to a modern criminal justice system, including training judges, attorneys, police, and law students, and drafted legal code reform focusing on human rights In Asia, FJE ROLI worked on modernization of courts, including small claims courts that relieved judicial backlogs, election reform, legal education reform, and legal assistance to victims of gender-based violence More information about the Rule of Law Initiative's work is available at www.abanet.org/rol/

Center on Children and the Law operates programs that focus on the legal needs of children, especially in abuse & neglect and juvenile justice In FY08-09, accomplishments included - The U S Department of Justice (Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention) published five volumes of a Toolkit on Court Performance Measures in Child Abuse and Neglect Cases, developed under the leadership of the Center - The Center completed development of Judicial Excellence in Child Abuse and Neglect Proceedings Principles and Standards for Court Organization, Judicial Selection and Assignment, Judicial Administration, and Judicial Education (which was instantly endorsed by the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges) - The Center continued to serve as the federally-supported (HHS) National Child Welfare Resource Center on Legal and Judicial Issues, with its focus on aiding courts and child welfare agencies in efforts to enhance the safety, permanency and well-being of children in foster care Under the Resource Centers auspices, the Center published Child Safety A Guide for Judges and Attorneys, that includes bench cards to help in assessing dangers and child vulnerability, and objectively guiding key judicial decisions on child removal and reunification - State contractual work by the Center continued to aid victims of abuse/neglect through improving legal skills In Wyoming the Center followed up on its 2d Edition of a Wyoming Child Welfare Legal Resource Manual by producing an online version, and the Center offered its Trial Skills Program for Agency, Parent and Childrens Attorneys to over 110 lawyers (as well as a training for caseworkers) in Pennsylvania, and offered the Centers third Child Welfare Trial Skills Training in New Hampshire - The Center held its 13th ABA National Conference on Children and the Law (keynoted by U S Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan) It had over 300 attendees It was preceded by the first-ever National Conference for Attorneys Representing Parents in Child Protection Cases (part of a groundbreaking National Project to Improve Representation for Parents Involved in the Child Welfare System) Parent representation material from both conferences is available at www.abanet.org/child/parentrepresentation/home.html - Partnering with Casey Family Programs, the Center used that support for four nationally important projects 1) a Legal Center for Foster Care and Education that produced new information on federal laws increasing educational opportunities for older youth in foster care and checklists to help states implement educational provisions of the new federal Fostering Connections Act, 2) the Bar-Youth Empowerment Project that examined every state dependency law and court rule to determine whether a child is considered a party, is entitled to notice of proceedings, and has a right to be present during proceedings, and produced On Your Own, But Not Alone A Handbook to Empower Florida Foster Youth Leaving Foster Care, 3) A Grandfamilies State Law and Policy Resource Center (www.grandfamilies.org) project that supported development of a website with user-friendly state and federal statutory information related to kinship care, and 4) the above-mentioned National Project to Improve Representation for Parents Involved in the Child Welfare System - The Centers Partners in Program Planning for Adolescent Health Initiative was a partner in a National Initiative to Improve Adolescent Health by the Year 2010, and this Initiative hosted a meeting of a legal coalition to better address these issues, similar Center work on infant/toddler issues included a new Center Child-Babylaw listserv and a policy and practice brief series - The Center continued its Closed Circuit Television and Video Recording Technology Project (to aid child victims of crime in describing their victimization with the least degree of trauma) The Project convened a regional training for its grantees Over \$537,000 in federal funds were distributed by the Center to provide on-site technical assistance and training in the areas of using closed-circuit television and recording technology to help reduce child victim system trauma - The Center also continued work on several other grant-funded projects These included 1) Studying how to improve legal representation of youth involved in juvenile status offense proceedings, 2) Working to enhance identification, location, and positive involvement of non-custodial fathers in cases where their children are in foster care, including producing a new article, Engaging Non-Resident Fathers in the Court Process, 3) Developing an online CLE tutorial on interventions with substance abusing parents involved in child protection cases, Understanding Substance Use Disorders, Treatment, and Family Recovery A Guide for Legal Professionals, at <http://www.ncsacw.samhsa.gov/tutorials/tutorialDesc.aspx?cid=3>, 4) Writing materials to inform attorneys and judges on the protection of, and needed services to, LGBTQ youth in foster care - The Center continued to publish its monthly ABA Child Law Practice, a preeminent journal for pediatric law practitioners, and the ABA Child CourtWorks, a newsletter on judicial system improvements to aid abused and neglected children The Center also continued as a co-editor of the Childrens Legal Rights Journal in partnership with Loyola (Chicago) Law Schools Child Law Program - The Center also provided staff support to the ABA Commission on Youth at Risk in its third year, and aided in both policy and program discussions/events - The Center director had two journal articles published during this period "Federal Law and State Intervention When Parents Fail Has National Guidance of Our Child Welfare System Been Successful?" (Family Law Quarterly) and "When It Happens in a Family Aiding Parents of Substance-Abusing Adolescents" (Family Court Review)

4c (Code) (Expenses \$ 3,975,601 including grants of \$ 308,723) (Revenue \$ 5,018,624)
The Council on Legal Education Opportunity's (CLEO) mission is to increase the entrance into and success in law school of populations under-represented in the profession of law, including racial and religious minorities and those of impoverished background Since 1968, the Six-week Summer Institute, a rigorous, residential program to prepare students for a successful law school experience, has remained the core component of the CLEO programs Eighty-one students participated in the institutes held at the University of Pittsburgh School of Law and the Southern Illinois University School of Law Eighty-one participants enrolled in 57 law schools at the conclusion of the institute CLEO also provides "Achieving Success in the Application Process (ASAP) " This seminar is a three-day program that is designed to provide college juniors and seniors with the tools they need to become competitive law school applicants It exposes participants to aspects of the application process that are often overlooked by students, including how to select a law school, drafting effective personal statements, preparation strategies for the LSAT and its impact in the admissions process, letters of recommendations and debt management 177 students attended both seminars in two cities in July 2009 Attitude is Essential (AIE) - AIE is a three-day weekend seminar to familiarize students, already admitted to law school in the upcoming fall, with the demands associated with the first year of law school and acquaint them with resources available to help them meet those demands 261 students attended both seminars in two cities in July 2009 Lawyers and Leaders in Training (LLIT) - This initiative is designed to provide outreach to underserved and ethnically diverse secondary school students from across the country and allow CLEO to put measures into place that are critical to expanding the law school applicant pool and exposing secondary education students to careers in the legal profession CLEO's execution of this program is in partnership with the Just the Beginning Foundation and the National Association of Women Judges This initiative reached 216 students throughout the country Mid-Summer Professional Development Seminar- This seminar provides a wide range of professional development workshops and career enhancement opportunities The seminar addresses such topics as resume writing, job searches, interviewing skills, legal ethics and public interest careers 181 CLEO students participated in the seminar Mid-Winter Bar Preparation Seminar - This seminar reinforces analytical, writing and test-taking skills necessary to pass the bar examination In addition, a panel of state bar examiners from around the country is convened to discuss the requirements and expectations of bar examiners 125 CLEO 3L students participated in the seminar College Scholars Programs - These programs include six one-day seminars that are held in six regions of the country The Road to Law School program provides information about the law admissions process and exposes college freshmen to analytical reasoning and critical reading and writing The Sophomore Super Saturday program is a skills-building seminar designed to help college sophomores understand the importance of improving logic, analytical reasoning, reading comprehension and writing skills that are tested by the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) and are considered essential to success in law school The Juniors Jumpstart the LSAT program helps college juniors understand how LSAT scores impact law school admission decisions and exposes them to various preparation strategies that can help them achieve competitive LSAT scores The CLEO College Scholars programs reached 467 students in six cities across the United States The CLEO program also provides over \$300,000 in scholarships in the form of tuition payments to enable 121 CLEO graduates to attend 29 law schools across the U S
