COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

In 2009, the Trust supported organizations that assisted more than 9,000 people with skills training, career planning and job placement services.

BUILDING COMMUNITY

Affordable housing, civic engagement and workforce development strengthen Chicago's struggling neighborhoods.

In the face of the most devastating economic downturn since the Great Depression, the Trust is even more focused on alleviating poverty and fostering the economic prosperity of the Chicago region's residents. In 2009 the Community Development Program supported nonprofits engaged in grassroots community organizing, economic and workforce development, affordable housing and civic participation to improve the social and economic conditions of struggling neighborhoods.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

The Trust fostered civic participation and grassroots leadership development by supporting organizations that seek to eradicate poverty in their communities through campaigns such as education reform, housing, criminal justice, homelessness, job creation and immigration reform. For example, the Center for Economic Progress prepared over 15,000 tax returns in 2009, claiming more than \$24 million in refunds for low-income families.

COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING


The Trust continued leading the Regional Home Ownership Preservation Initiative, a program designed to combat foreclosures in metropolitan Chicago. Grants helped organizations provide homeowner and financial literacy counseling, legal aid, homeowner and tenant advocacy, and technical assistance. Organizations funded by the Trust assisted more

TRUST AIMS TO KEEP FORECLOSURES AT BAY

There was hope in the air on Aug. 29, 2009, at the Cicero Community Center as hundreds of people from Chicago and the suburbs lined up in hopes of saving their homes from foreclosure.

The Keep Your Home event, funded by The Chicago Community Trust and organized by the Neighborhood Housing Services of Chicago, Illinois Housing Development Authority and the Attorneys' Title Guaranty Fund, is a collaboration with dozens of municipalities and local nonprofits. It was the first in the suburbs to offer homeowners an opportunity to work with lawyers or loan officers to apply on the spot for the Making Home Affordable program. This federal initiative is helping homeowners avoid foreclosure through refinancing and loan modification.

When homeowners work with housing counselors, it can take weeks or months to get an appointment, as these counselors have an average caseload over 200, according to Jane Bilger, assistant executive director for IHDA. Keep Your Home workshops help submit applications in a matter of days.

A 51-year-old man from Evanston who declined to give his name is grateful for this event. He was laid off from a school administration job in June, and now worries about losing his home. "If you can reduce your mortgage payments, then that will help you get through it until things pick up," he says. "This is one of the nicest things our government can do to help us keep our homes."

Of the 350 families who attended the Keep Your Home event, 21 percent avoided foreclosure, 12 percent were denied federal assistance, and the remaining applications are still being reviewed by the lenders as of February 2010, according to Michael van Zalingen, director of home ownership services at Neighborhood Housing Services of Chicago.

Bilger notes that even those who don't get federal assistance now have contacts, resources and knowledge to draw on.

"[Helping individuals avoid foreclosure] obviously makes a big difference in individual lives and the lives of a community," says Bilger. "It keeps families in the community, it keeps houses from being vacant, and events like this become a rallying point for the community as the local community and local government do the outreach. It brings people together."

than 3,000 troubled homeowners to resolve or prevent foreclosure. They also helped 1,600 families who rent in buildings at risk of foreclosure to stay in place or relocate into quality apartments.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

To help residents find employment during this tough labor market, the Trust made grants to organizations that provide job skills training and placement and that serve populations with significant barriers to employment such as out-of-school youth and ex-offenders. Grants supported organizations like Instituto Del Progreso Latino and Jobs for Youth that provide career services for unemployed and dislocated workers as well as wrap-around supportive services.

JUSTICE SYSTEM REFORM

The Trust supported organizations that work toward systemic change in the criminal justice system and reintegrating ex-offenders into society through policy reform and direct services. Grants to Cabrini Green Legal Aid and the Institute for Metropolitan Affairs (Roosevelt University), for instance, went to improve criminal record expungement, which is critical to the successful re-entry of ex-offenders into society.

A STRONGER NONPROFIT SECTOR

Cost-effective capacity-building services and tools are critical to helping nonprofit agencies meet the needs of their constituents and sustaining the sector. So the Trust worked with agencies to build the organizational capacity of nonprofit groups such as Lumity, Executive Service Corps, Taproot/Chicago and Goodcity.



STRENGTHENING SCHOOLS

Students benefit from improved teaching, higher goals for learning and purposeful partnerships that do both.

With primary support from The Searle Funds at The Chicago Community Trust, the Trust continued to make education a high priority in 2009.

BUILDING CAPACITY IN CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Searle family and the Trust continued to support the improvement of teaching and learning in the Chicago Public Schools in literacy, math, science, social studies, arts and language development.

Five universities partnered with the CPS curriculum offices and more than 50 schools to strengthen teaching by providing advanced courses for teachers of literacy, math and science. University coaches also worked in classrooms and with teams of teachers to strengthen teaching and build more powerful, coherent pathways for learning inside their schools.

To raise goals for learning in CPS in social studies, arts and language development, the district's curriculum departments used their grants to create frameworks for higher level teaching from pre-kindergarten through high school. As a result, the district now has its own *Chicago Guide for Teaching and Learning in the Arts* that provides a common agenda for teachers and arts partners working in the schools. With Trust support, the district is also developing a social science framework and a strategy for dual-language schools. The social science framework is also supported by JPMorgan Chase and CME Trust.

STRENGTHENING MATH AND SCIENCE INSTRUCTION

The students in Little Village Academy's 8th grade algebra class are attentive and focused as they try to solve some challenging algebra problems. As they immerse themselves in the world of variables and complex equations, these 8th graders may not realize the effort required to provide them with algebra in 8th grade.

Little Village is one of 24 Chicago public schools involved in the Cluster 4 Middle Grades Project, funded by the Chicago Public Schools, the McDougal Family Foundation and The Searle Funds at The Chicago Community Trust. The goals of this project are to improve math and science teaching and learning in grades 6-8 and to improve CPS students' preparation for high school.

"We want to make sure they have a strong foundation and can be prepared and can be successful in high school," says Gina L. Grant, 6th-8th grade project manager for the Office of Teaching and Learning at the Chicago Public Schools and project manager for C4MGP. "So that is going to require that they've been exposed to science and mathematics and getting high-quality instruction from teachers who understand [the subject matter] and have been trained [to teach at higher levels]."

Teachers in the project take graduate-level courses in math, algebra and science as well as adolescent psychology to earn endorsements, which are certificates of expertise. They are trained by the CPS Offices of Math and Science to use high-quality materials. Finally they receive math coaching from the University of Illinois at Chicago and science coaching from Loyola University.

With the project now in its fourth year, 17 schools have teachers qualified to teach 8th grade algebra. About 150 teachers in the program are working toward endorsements in math and science or being qualified to teach algebra.

"My skills have improved because I became knowledgeable of how the adolescent learns," says Elsa Carmona, principal of Little Village. "[C4MGP] made my program for my middle school children the best it can be. It made it quality."

Little Village Academy participates in the Cluster 4 Middle Grades Project, designed to improve mathematics and science teaching and learning in grades 6-8 and to improve CPS students' preparation for high school.

The Trust strengthened teaching in more than 50 Chicago public schools, raised goals for teaching and learning in arts, social studies and language development, and leveraged federal grants totaling more than \$20 million.

Underlying all the capacity-building efforts in the Chicago schools has been the creation of partnerships among multiple players to achieve major changes in expectations and teaching. Partnerships among universities, funders, arts organizations, and between the district's educators and these external resources have been fundamental to the Trust's grant decisions regarding supports for schools.

BUILDING CAPACITY IN SCHOOLS BEYOND CPS

The Trust also continued to support the Big Shoulders Fund and the Chicagoland Lutheran Educational Foundation to strengthen instruction in core academic subjects in schools serving high-needs communities in Chicago.

Two grants to the University of Illinois at Chicago's Learning Sciences Research Institute this year set the stage to improve math teaching and learning in high-needs suburban school districts.

BUILDING PURPOSEFUL PARTNERSHIPS

Throughout 2009, Education Program staff worked with the Council of Chicago Area Deans of Education and, in particular, with four Chicago universities to strengthen elementary teacher education. The new project, involving Loyola University, National Louis University, Northeastern Illinois University and University of Illinois at Chicago, focuses on improving recruitment, preparation and development of new teachers for high-needs urban elementary schools.

This work, initially funded by a Trust donor, is now also supported by a \$16 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

HEALTH

PREVENTIVE MEASURES

Access to medical care and lifestyle choices lead to good health.

The Chicago Community Trust thinks of health as more than just medical care. It encompasses physical, mental and social well-being. Factors such as demographics, income, social status, cultural beliefs, education and public health measures determine the health of individuals and a community. With that in mind, the Trust's grant making continues to reflect a full range of health issues, including lifestyle, the physical environment and access to health care services.

FIT AND HEALTHY

Over the last year, the Trust supported programs to address childhood obesity, one of the nation's top health threats. The Sinai Health System received another year of funding for its Pediatric Weight Management Program, which helps mostly obese Latino children and their families lose weight and embrace healthy habits. The Consortium to Lower Obesity in Chicago Children has developed community programs that encourage children to pursue healthy eating and physical activity. The Open Streets event in the summer closed 8 miles of Chicago's boulevards and streets to car traffic to provide a safe place for people to ride bikes, skate, dance, walk or just be active.

In addition, the Trust participates in the Fresh Taste Initiative, a collaborative fund that works with grantees like Growing Power and Seven Generations Ahead to encourage the development of local food systems that support healthy eating in Illinois.

WEAVING A SAFETY NET

The Trust also supported initiatives that provide a safety net for at-risk groups. The Chicago School of Psychology will use its grant to develop the Latino Mental Health Network. It will create a pipeline of mental health practitioners who are trained to be sensitive to the unique cultural and linguistic needs of Latino patients with mental disorders. To reduce the high infant mortality rate in Englewood, a neighborhood on the southwest side of Chicago, the Trust supported the Illinois Maternal and Child Health Coalition, which has been instrumental in lowering infant mortality throughout the state.

Several grants supported access to health care for the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender population in Chicago. The Howard Brown Health Center will develop the infrastructure to care for senior LGBT patients, who are more likely to age alone and not have access to needed services that heterosexual elders usually have. The Trust also supported the Illinois Safe Schools Alliance to provide safe environments for LGBT teenagers in public schools.

CeaseFire, a nonprofit organization that seeks to reduce and prevent violence, continues to receive Trust support for preventing street violence among Chicago's most at-risk communities. Nearly 100 people trained as street violence interrupters have helped to curb violence in 15 of Chicago's most violent neighborhoods. CeaseFire, which has been hailed by President Barack Obama as a successful model for violence prevention, continues to provide technical support to several cities across the country.

RESIDENTS RULE THE STREETS FOR CAR-FREE FUN

Even a little rain couldn't dampen spirits at the second annual Open Streets event as thousands of bike riders, walkers, skateboarders and dancers in Chicago took to the boulevards from Logan Square to Little Village Aug. 1, 2009, to enjoy five-and-a-half hours of car-free fun.

"This is great because it gives the kids more space to play and ride — and it's good for their health," says Adriana Casillas, a working mom who spent the morning with her mother-in-law chasing her three young daughters on their bikes. "They're loving it. If we weren't doing this, we'd probably be inside watching TV."

The 8-mile route snaked through parts of Logan Square, Humboldt Park, North Lawndale, East Garfield Park and Little Village — all predominantly low-income neighborhoods in Chicago where obesity rates fall well above the national norm.

Local health organizations took advantage of the event, setting up periodic stations to educate residents about free or low-cost resources for healthy living. The West Side Culture and Arts Council passed out coupons for fruits and vegetables at a local grocery store, while a volunteer with Mt. Sinai Hospital provided information about free, local HIV testing. Breast cancer survivors and their supporters, meanwhile, jubilantly hiked the path, singing songs, cheering each other on and passing out literature.

"This is a great opportunity," says Azucena Urbina of the Lawndale Christian Health Center, who spent her day counseling participants on healthy living and conducting complimentary, on-site diabetes and blood pressure screenings. "I've already found people who don't have a doctor and don't have insurance, and I've been able to help them."

According to one event organizer, Alfonso Hernandez of the Active Transportation Alliance, Open Streets also gave police officers, community leaders and residents an opportunity to interact with each other in a fun, positive way.

"A lot of the time these neighborhoods don't get the best press coverage," says Hernandez. "This was a great way for people both inside and outside of these areas to experience all of the positive things these communities have to offer."

Arts

CULTURAL VIBES

Marketing skills, arts education and world-class events foster the arts and culture scene in Chicago.

The Chicago Community Trust continued to build and maintain a vibrant cultural community in Chicago. The Trust focused on improving the business and marketing skills of arts organizations, delivering arts education to public schools and underserved students, and showcasing Chicago as a world-class venue for arts and culture.

MARKETING KNOW-HOW

The Arts Engagement Exchange, a collaboration among the Trust, the Wallace Foundation and the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs, sponsored a comprehensive series of free marketing sessions for the arts sector. Nationally recognized marketing experts spoke to hundreds of arts managers representing all artistic disciplines. "Learning Circles" and "Roundtables" allowed local consultants to work more intensively with attendees on marketing issues such as data management, internet marketing, psychographics and market research.

ARTS EDUCATION

Arts education made huge strides this year. Thanks to funding from the Education Program at the Trust, the *Chicago Guide for Teaching and Learning in the Arts* was completed. Arts organizations and schools can use this guide to define the strands, scope and sequence for effective, standards-based arts education across the school district.

The Trust continues to work with Chicago Public Schools to ensure access to the arts. The Trust funded 22 arts organizations that provided 301 public schools with a variety of arts programs. The Trust is also working with organizations to bring arts to underserved students as well, including those incarcerated at the Cook County Juvenile Detention Center.

CULTURAL EVENTS

The Trust made artistic and cultural excellence grants to productions that offered broad access and promoted the vitality of the surrounding businesses. The Trust was a major supporter of eight Millennium Park events, the Chicago and the Hyde Park Jazz Festivals, and the Folk 'n Roots Festival in Wells Park. The milestone Burnham Centennial celebrated the *1909 Plan of Chicago* developed by urban planner Daniel Burnham with special initiatives such as the Chicago Model City exhibit created by the Chicago Architecture Foundation and a documentary film produced by the Archimedia Workshop. The Trust also supported the Chicago History Museum's exhibit on U.S. President Abraham Lincoln and Mexican President Benito Juarez.

MANAGEMENT EXPERIENCE

The Fellowship in Arts and Culture Management, a Trust program that gives diverse professionals the opportunity to work at arts and culture organizations in the city, concluded its first round of two-year placements. The six fellows have gained management positions at cultural organizations and local foundations. The pilot project was featured at the American Association of Museums' National Conference in May 2009.

YOUTH STAGE SHOWCASES UP-AND-COMING MUSICIANS AT JAZZ FEST

Playing drums is not just a hobby for Yael Litwin. The 16-year-old plans to pursue a career as a drummer when she grows up. She was ecstatic when she got the chance to showcase her skills at the Chicago Jazz Fest in September 2009 on The Chicago Community Trust Young Jazz Lions Stage.

"I felt like I was part of history," says Litwin, a junior at the University of Chicago Laboratory School in Hyde Park.

Litwin was one of 160 students that performed on the Young Jazz Lions Stage. The Jazz Institute of Chicago, in collaboration with the Mayor's Office of Special Events, introduced the youth stage at the annual jazz festival as part of its mission to nurture and invest in young talent to keep Chicago's jazz heritage alive. It wanted to give these artists the experience of performing in a professional, world-class venue, while introducing Chicago to the next generation of jazz musicians.

"Being able to provide these kinds of opportunities is part of how the Jazz Institute provides a pathway for young musicians to enter the professional field," says Lauren Deutsch, executive director of the Jazz Institute.

The Jazz Institute selected nine bands from the city and suburbs that demonstrated talent and dedication to their craft. Students in the Jazz Ambassadors program, a six-week music camp sponsored by the Jazz Institute and Chicago Park District, also got a chance to perform. And as the winner of the Chicago Public Schools All City Jazz High School Band Competition, Lincoln Park High School's band got a slot as well.

The students not only had the chance to hone their music proficiency but also sharpen their life skills such as discipline, commitment and teamwork.

But it was their music skills that took center stage as the students played songs by such jazz greats as Charlie Parker and Sonny Rollins in front of a crowd of 1,500 people over the three-day event.

"This is the nation's true art form, and they should know about that and hopefully learn about it, enjoy it, participate in it and support it for years to come," says Diane Chandler-Marshall, education director at the Jazz Institute.

Basic Human Needs

2009 ANNUAL REPORT

STILL STANDING

The region perseveres through a budget crisis and the human toll of the recession.

With the Illinois state budget proposing catastrophic cutbacks and a recession taking its toll on the Chicago region, the Trust remained committed to meeting the basic human needs of the region by fighting homelessness, ensuring food for everyone, strengthening human service organizations and maintaining a sufficient safety net for those with inadequate resources

AVERTING A CRISIS

The budget crisis in Illinois dominated the Trust's work this year. As the state was preparing its "doomsday" budget in spring 2009 to deal with a record deficit, it proposed cutting funding for human services as much as 50 percent. The Trust worked with human services advocates statewide to oppose the cuts. It also created Illinois Partners for Human Services, an advocacy group committed to sustainable approaches to providing human services in the state, to help in the fight. As a result, current appropriations are about 85 percent of last year's budget, rather than the proposed 50 percent.

SECURING THE SAFETY NET

The Trust also renewed its commitment to organizations such as Voices for Illinois Children and the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless, which have created and sustained numerous state human service programs and protected and extended access to income support for the poor

To keep Chicago's homeless services system operating well, the Trust continued to support emergency and interim shelters, permanent housing, staff training in harm-reduction techniques, financial literacy training of the homeless and other client services. When federal funding was reduced for social services to the homeless, the Trust allocated \$500,000 to help agencies fill the service gap

The Trust's work in this field is reaping results. Studies have shown that the number of homeless people on the street and in shelters have declined in Chicago from 7,000 homeless people in 2003 to 5,000 in 2009

OPERATING EFFICIENTLY

The Trust made significant grants to organizations and collaboratives to develop their operational efficiencies. Christopher House used its \$150,000 grant to develop a data-sharing system across Erie House, Chicago Commons, Albany Park Community Center and Chinese American Service League. It wants to improve service delivery by comparing client outcomes across agencies. A grant to the Civic Consulting Alliance helped create CWICStats, which will evaluate workforce development programs funded by the City Colleges of Chicago, City of Chicago and Chicago Board of Education. The Trust was also the lead funder in developing a formal evaluation of Chicago's Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness. When completed in 2011, the evaluation will shape homeless services and policies locally and nationwide

ILLINOIS PARTNERS HELPS PREVENT MASSIVE BUDGET CUTS TO HUMAN SERVICES

Jahari is your typical 4-year-old. You can often find him playing with trucks or trying to get his hands on some junk food. But this caring little boy wasn't always so well-adjusted. After being shuffled through three foster homes since he was born, Jahari arrived at Tameika and Deshaun Jones' home in April 2009 with challenging behavioral problems such as yelling, hitting and disobedience. But a routine of consistent child care, therapy and activities like music and cooking lessons have enabled Jahari to thrive in his new home. So much so that the Joneses plan to adopt him.

But prospects weren't always so rosy. In mid-2009 the state warned the family that it could lose their foster care payments if Illinois passed the "doomsday" budget, which would have cut human services funding by 50 percent. Because Jahari's activities, medical care and services cost about \$2,500 a month, the Joneses would not have been able to support him on their modest salaries without the monthly payment from the state.

However the Joneses had a coalition fighting for them and the millions of Illinois residents who depend on human services. Illinois Partners for Human Service, an advocacy group that The Chicago Community Trust helped create in 2008, collaborated with other strong advocacy groups and partners to prevent the passage of the doomsday budget. They rallied the state to maintain current funding levels for human services, reimburse human service providers for the services they have already provided and give providers time to transition their clients off their services should their programs get cut.

As a result, the 2010 budget kept appropriations at 85 percent rather than 50 percent of the 2009 budget for state-funded agencies. The Joneses continued to receive their monthly foster payment.

Its work, however, is far from over. Many human service providers have still not been paid by the state, and future funding of human services is still precarious. To prepare for the battle ahead, Illinois Partners will increase its membership of coalition partners and train other nonprofits on how to advocate effectively.
