was the first cancer charity to focus funding on research into diet and cancer prevention, and it was the first cancer charity to consolidate and interpret global research to create a practical message on cancer prevention Today the Institute continues Funding research on the relationship of nutrition, physical activity and weight management to cancer risk Interpreting the accumulated scientific literature in the field Educating people about the choices they can make to reduce their risk of developing cancer Research Research is the basis of all programs at the Institute Interpretation Starting in the late twentieth century the number of studies on diet and cancer began growing rapidly Given the nature of science, it is not surprising that these studies do not always agree As the mass of literature on the subject grows, there is need for consolidation, analysis, and interpretation The first major report to attempt this task was produced by the National Academy of Science (NAS) in 1982 Recognizing the value of the document, the Institute repackaged it and distributed it to scientists across the US That report, along with subsequent updates from the US Surgeon General, the US Food and Drug Administration and other groups formed the foundation for AICR's programs in cancer education for 15 years The First Expert Report That foundation and its attendant guidelines underwent a major update in 1997 with the publication of Food, Nutrition and the Prevention of Cancer a Global Perspective, the next major report to interpret the literature on diet, physical activity and cancer This landmark international report was a joint effort of the AICR and one of its international affiliates, the World Cancer Research Fund (WCRF UK) The report set new directions for cancer research and education in the US and around the world This report was a unique endeavor in many ways It was the first truly comprehensive review of the literature in this rapidly expanding research area It was also the first time the issue of cancer prevention was approached from a global perspective While cancer has never been confined by geographical or political borders, it has been a disease most commonly seen in developed, industrialized nations There are a number of reasons for this Lifestyle changes related to diet and exercise have traditionally occurred as nations become more industrialized Also, longer lifespans (an important factor for a disease such as cancer which usually strikes later in life) are traditionally associated with developed nations and higher levels of medical care Modern trends, however, had begun to make cancer a growing problem for developing nations as well Increasing amounts of urbanization, changes in diet and levels of physical activity, and general increases in lifespan around the world helped to fuel rapidly increasing rates of cancer The World Health Organization (WHO) currently estimates the number of cancer cases around the world at about 8 million each year, and expects that number to grow to almost 12 million The report was produced by an expert panel of 15 of the world's leading researchers in diet, nutrition and cancer In addition, observers from the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC), the World Health Organization (WHO) and the US National Cancer Institute (NCI) participated in developing this report The peer review process included almost 100 other scientists Food, Nutrition and the Prevention of Cancer a Global Perspective, was more than 660 pages long and written for scientists and those involved in public health policy More than 30,000 copies of the report were distributed free to researchers, academics, scientists and policy makers around the world The Second Expert Report In 2001, the Institute and its international affiliates, began a process that culminated in the second expert report Again, this process involved the review of all germane scientific literature including that published since the conclusion of the earlier process and the assembly of an expert panel of scientists to formulate health recommendations based on that review In addition, the institute and its affiliates developed a methodology for assessing this body of research This methodology involves standardized and transparent procedures that can be adopted by all scientists involved in research on diet and cancer To produce the second expert report, the Institute and its affiliates commissioned research teams from 9 universities or research centers to conduct 20 systematic literature reviews These reviews involved comprehensive data collection and comparison The collected data was then reviewed by a panel of 21 experts on nutrition and chronic disease Based on its review of this data (drawn from approximately 7,000 studies), the expert panel issued health and dietary recommendations for cancer prevention The second expert report, entitled Food, Nutrition, Physical Activity and Cancer a Global Perspective, was published in November, 2007 The ten evidence-based recommendations contained in the document then became the basis of the Institute's 2008 education programs Recommendations for Cancer Prevention 1 Be as lean as possible without becoming underweight 2 Be physically active for at least 30 minutes every day 3 Avoid sugary drinks Limit consumption of energy-dense foods (particularly processed foods high in sugar, or low in fiber, or high in fat) 4 Eat more of a variety of vegetables, fruits, whole grains and legumes, such as beans 5 Limit consumption of red meats, such as beef pork and lamb, and avoid processed meats 6 If consumed at all, limit alcoholic drinks to 2 for men and 1 for women a day 7 Limit consumption of salty foods and foods processed with salt (sodium) 8 Don't use supplements to protect against cancer Special Population Recommendations 9 It's best for mothers to breastfeed exclusively for six months and then add other liquids and foods 10 After treatment, cancer survivors should follow the recommendations for cancer prevention And always remember- do not smoke or chew tobacco The report is now a key reference tool in the scientific and medical community Copies can be found in research facilities and university classrooms around the globe The report provides individuals, communities, scientists, governments and policymakers with the most definitive knowledge and best advice available on cancer prevention For the knowledge contained within its pages to have a true societal impact, however, it was necessary to place the collected evidence into a practical policy context In FY 2009, AICR and its global affiliates did just that From Research to Action The Policy Report In February 2009 the Institute, together with the WCRF global network, launched Policy and Action for Cancer Prevention, a groundbreaking, evidence-based report that makes recommendations for how different groups in society can affect the kind of systemic societal changes that will help prevent millions of cancers Its recommendations form a roadmap that empowers policymakers in the US and around the world to take decisive action to reduce cancer rates Policy and Action for Cancer Prevention sets out 48 recommendations aimed at nine different actor groups - groups of people in society who have a responsibility to help make cancer prevention choices the easy choices for individuals The actor groups are -> Multinational bodies -> Civil society -> Government -> Industry -> The media -> Schools -> Workplaces and institutions -> Health and other professions -> People

Policy and Action for Cancer Prevention was welcomed by influential organizations and key stakeholders in the field of food, nutrition, physical activity and cancer in the US. (For information on the launch of the Policy Report, including media coverage, see "Press Efforts.") A key component of the Policy Report is a new set of estimates on the preventability of cancer. These figures, derived by a special committee of AICR/WCRF experts, have provided policymakers in the US and around the world with a clear indication of what could be achieved if society followed the recommendations of our Policy Report and worked together to enable people to make healthier choices to prevent cancer. To ensure that the Institute's recommendations continue to reflect the current scientific evidence, the Continuous Update Project is dedicated to building on the solid foundation of our Second Expert Report through the continuous monitoring and analysis of new research in this vital area. New data are continually added to what is already the largest and most comprehensive database of scientific studies on the links between diet, physical activity, body fat and cancer. In 2009, we published the first update, which was focused on breast cancer. The new evidence supports the existing findings on the links between lifestyle and breast cancer and represents the clearest picture we have ever had on the causes of this type of cancer. Because of this vital work, we are now more sure than ever before that women can significantly reduce their risk by limiting the amount of alcohol they drink, maintaining a healthy weight, being physically active and breastfeeding their children. Media coverage of this major event is summarized under "Press Efforts."</p> <p><b>Education</b> The public education programs at the American Institute for Cancer Research (AICR) are based on science. That includes research that it funds and the conclusions drawn in its expert reports. The Institute utilizes a wide range of vehicles ranging from leaflets to the consumer media to present its health message to the public. All these vehicles carry a cancer prevention message that is consensus science rendered in common language.</p> <p><b>AICR Newsletter</b> The Institute has published the quarterly AICR "Newsletter" since 1983. This popular publication reaches a large public audience with practical, usable educational information on diet, good nutrition and cancer. It provides updates on cancer research, information on nutrition and physical activity, and a variety of articles on selecting, buying and preparing foods that meet the dietary guidelines to lower cancer risk. During the past year, quarterly issues of the Newsletter were distributed free to as many as 1 million households across the country. According to a recent reader survey, 91 percent of those who receive the AICR "Newsletter" say it has helped motivate them to take the healthy, cancer-preventive steps outlined in its pages.</p> <p><b>Information and Referral Services</b> The Institute's education programs also include information and referral services for people nationwide. The Institute, for example, offers its educational brochures through the AICR "Newsletter," its website, and articles in newspapers and magazines across the country. Last year such offers led to distribution of over 410,000 copies of AICR publications in response to requests and at-cost purchases. In addition, the Institute provides a toll-free 800 number (1 800 843 8114) that gives people direct access to several of its educational services. The number is listed in telephone directories in most major cities across the country, as well as publicized through Institute publications and nationally distributed media releases. This service handled nearly 150,000 incoming calls during the past year. Through the Institute's toll-free 800 number, individuals are able to order free copies of education publications. They may also access the Institute's Research Information line, which provides non-technical updates on new research in the area of diet, nutrition and cancer. The toll-free number is also used by consumers ordering copies of CancerResource, the AICR information program for cancer patients and their families. AICR CancerResource operators have been specially trained to respond to the needs of those who call. An additional use for the toll-free 800 number is the Institute's Nutrition Hotline (1 800 843 8114). The Hotline allows the public to ask the experts questions about food, nutrition and cancer. Although the service cannot provide direct medical advice, callers with a nutrition and health question are called back by a Registered Dietitian who provides personal answers. This service is also available on-line through the Institute's website, <a href="http://www.aicr.org">www.aicr.org</a>.</p> <p><b>Professional Publications</b> As part of its educational programs the Institute also provides materials intended for health professionals and policymakers as well as materials health professionals may use to advise the public. The AICR report, Food, Nutrition, Physical Activity and the Prevention of Cancer: a Global Perspective, described above, is one example of a professional publication. To date, more than 20,400 copies have been distributed, and orders continue to come in. In FY 2009, the Institute also distributed over 500 copies of its new Policy Report to lawmakers and non-government organizations in the US. "The New American Plate" brochures described below are another example of materials widely requested and used by health professionals to educate their clients.</p> <p><b>Public Education Brochures</b> An important part of the Institute's education programs is the more than 50 brochures that it publishes on diet, nutrition, physical activity and cancer-related subjects. These publications are distributed free to consumers across the country at seminars, conferences, meetings and health fairs, as well as in response to written, telephoned and e-mailed requests. They are also provided in bulk at cost to health professionals and health organizations for use with clients, patients and in public health education programs. The public is also made aware of the availability of these publications through the AICR "Newsletter," press releases and e-mail publications. Carefully reviewed by both educators and researchers, these award-winning publications have been highly praised. These materials are developed to provide scientific information, which could seem technical or intimidating, in ways that are easy to understand. The Institute's "The New American Plate" series of six brochures continued to attract a lot of interest since its first publication. All of these brochures lay out simple guidelines concerning proportion of food on the plate and portion size to help Americans eat for a healthier weight and reduced risk of cancer and other chronic diseases. The Institute developed another new series of brochures in 2005. Entitled "Homemade for Health -- Cooking for Lower Cancer Risk," this series now contains five brochures and focuses on the ingredients in healthy meals and guides people in preparing their own meals. In 2006, the Institute produced another series entitled "Concepts in Cancer Research." This series introduces basic concepts involved in the research on cancer prevention and explains them in simple terms. Brochures on phytochemicals, antioxidants and nutrigenomics have been produced. In 2007, the Institute produced a new series of brochures entitled, "Healthy Living for Cancer Prevention." This series, which explains the recommendations for lower cancer risk in the 2007 report, were first distributed to the public in FY 2008. In addition, all the other brochures listed by the Institute have been revised to conform to the new report.</p>

Education (continued)	Form 990, Part III, Line 4a	<p>In FY 2009, the Institute created a series of brochures geared specifically to cancer survivors, consolidating materials from across several brochure series in an effort to help them find pertinent information more easily. The "Survivor Series" includes practical advice and resources for patients, survivors and caregivers. In response to public requests for shorter, more quickly read educational material, AICR has developed several series of leaflets that briefly summarize specific cancer-related subjects. One series, called "Stopping Cancer," focuses on various forms of the disease and provides basic information on each, including colon cancer, skin cancer, breast cancer, prostate cancer and testicular cancer. In response to concern about the current crisis of obesity in the U.S., other brochures focus on controlling weight gain and avoiding obesity to lower cancer risk. The "Watch Your Waist" series offers practical information on weight management. "Don't Let it Happen" is targeted at adults who are currently at a healthy weight, and sets out a three-step strategy for avoiding weight gain with age. "Eating with Others" reveals how social situations can encourage overeating, and provides strategies to recognize, and defend against, those unconscious influences. The audience for the Institute's publications has also been dramatically expanded with the translation of seven brochures and the summary of AICR's Expert Panel Report into Spanish. The translations include brochures on reducing risk of breast, prostate, colorectal, skin and testicular cancers. These materials are being promoted in Spanish language publications around the country as part of the Institute's ongoing efforts to reach populations at higher risk for cancer. During FY 2009, the Institute distributed approximately 410,000 brochures, leaflets and health aids to individuals requesting a single, free copy and professionals purchasing multiple copies at cost for distribution to clients and patients. AICR's audience also has broadened with on-line access to brochures in PDF format. Visitors read the brochures online or download them. In FY 2009, visitors downloaded over 3,000 brochure PDFs.</p> <p><b>Special Health Aid Series</b> Because the public has a wide variety of interests and learning styles, the Institute has tried to design a selection of educational health aids that can motivate people to learn more about diet and cancer. These aids include special recipe cards, refrigerator magnets, note pads with nutrition notes, slide charts providing nutrition information on subjects such as Body Mass Index, vitamins, vegetable selection and meal planning, and instruction/reminder kits for breast self-examination. The Institute has distributed hundreds of thousands of these free materials to help consumers make good nutrition part of a healthier lifestyle. The Institute's CancerResource program was developed with advice from physicians, nurses, dietitians, psychologists and cancer patients. The program currently provides specific information on four of the most prevalent cancers - breast, colon, prostate and lung. Each CancerResource package provides cancer patients with basic information they need to help understand the disease they are facing, and to enable them to be active participants in the treatment of their illness. This information includes definitions of the many technical terms, lists of questions to ask doctors and nurses, advice on seeking second opinions, descriptions of the various treatment options, and the risks and side-effects which come with each. The package also includes the most recent information from the National Cancer Institute's Physicians' Data Query system on current treatment protocols for specific cancers, as well as a cancer-specific resource book with contacts for more information and local help. The materials within the program are reviewed and updated at least once per year to ensure that the public is receiving the most up-to-date information. The CancerResource program is offered to the public through newspaper and magazine articles, inserts in the AICR "New sletter" and on the AICR website. AICR Website/E-mail/Social Networks.</p> <p>The Institute continues to develop its website, <a href="http://www.aicr.org">www.aicr.org</a>, which provides wide-ranging information on diet, physical activity, weight management and cancer. A major site revamp occurred in FY 2009, which reorganized and greatly expanded the Institute's online content, including the addition of "audience pages" targeted to the specific needs of researchers, health professionals, supporters, the media, etc. The site now attracts 50,000 unique visitors per month and nearly 600,000 total visits every year. Top pages included "Foods That Fight Cancer," which highlights diet-cancer research in layman's language, "Recipes from the AICR Test Kitchen," which contains tested recipes developed to maximize flavor and health according to AICR recommendations, "The New American Plate," which offers a healthy eating plan for the prevention of cancer, and "Reduce Your Cancer Risk" which presents the Institute's advice in a clear, interactive and web-friendly format. In addition, four electronic "new sletters" are emailed from the website. The weekly Health-E-Recipe brings a recipe and commentary to 40,000 subscribers. The monthly AICR e new sletter delivers four articles about research on diet and cancer and healthy meals to 150,000 subscribers. The bi-weekly Cancer Research Update profiles the work of leading scientists and helps readers place the studies making headlines that week in a meaningful context. CRU, launched in mid-2008, enjoys a small (4,000) but growing - and highly dedicated -- readership. And the quarterly "Estate Planner e updates" goes to 5,000 attorneys and financial planners. In FY 2009, the Institute also established a presence on the social networking sites Facebook and Twitter, and made ready to launch an AICR blog (<a href="http://www.aicrblog.org">www.aicrblog.org</a>) and an activity-focused kids' website called The Taste Buddies (<a href="http://thetastebuddies.org">thetastebuddies.org</a>) at the beginning of FY 2010.</p> <p>The New American Plate Cookbook The Institute's award-winning program, The New American Plate, was the basis for a four-color cookbook. Recipes from the cookbook emphasize vegetables, fruits, whole grains and beans as part of the healthful living habits for lowering cancer risk that AICR advises. The hardcover cookbook contains 200 recipes and 80 photographs. It was published by the University of California Press in March 2005 to wide critical acclaim and continues to sell well; approximately 47,000 copies have been sold to date. All royalties from the cookbook were dedicated by the Institute's Board of Directors to cancer research. Food for the Fight DVD In FY 2008 the Institute collaborated with New York-Presbyterian Hospital to produce a DVD for cancer survivors, cancer patients and caregivers. Food for the Fight: Guidelines for Healthy Nutrition During and After Cancer Treatment contains expert advice from Dr. Mehmet Oz, Dr. Walter Willett and other experts, cooking demonstrations of healthy, protective and easy-to-prepare recipes, and up-to-date, evidence-based guidance for life during and after treatment. In FY 2009, it was promoted via a special online discount to oncology dietitians and featured in several health professional publications. To date, over 1,100 copies of the DVD have sold to hospitals, cancer centers, universities and individuals.</p>

SEMINARS AND CONFERENCES THE INSTITUTE HAS CONDUCTED A NUMBER OF FREE EDUCATIONAL SEMINARS THAT ALLOW PEOPLE IN VARIOUS CITIES TO LEARN FIRST-HAND ABOUT DIET AND CANCER. THE SEMINARS FEATURE A PRESENTATION BY A REGISTERED DIETITIAN, A QUESTION-AND-ANSWER PERIOD, AND A SELECTION OF FREE EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS. AICR HAS HOSTED ANOTHER CONFERENCE, "NUTRITION AFTER CANCER: THE ROLE OF DIET AND CANCER SURVIVORSHIP," IN SELECT CITIES SINCE 2001. IT PROVIDES AN OPPORTUNITY FOR PHYSICIANS, RESEARCHERS AND CANCER SURVIVORS TO CONDUCT A FREE-FLOWING DISCUSSION ABOUT THE ROLE DIET, PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AND WEIGHT CAN PLAY IN PREVENTING SECONDARY CANCERS AND RECURRENCE. THE INSTITUTE COMMITTED ITSELF TO FOSTERING MORE RESEARCH IN THIS UNEXPLORED AREA. THE ANNUAL AICR RESEARCH CONFERENCE OFFERS INSTITUTE STAFF AN OPPORTUNITY TO SHARE AICR'S MESSAGE WITH THE SCIENTIFIC AND HEALTH PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITIES, AND PROVIDES A MEANS TO COMMUNICATE THE INSTITUTE'S EVIDENCE-BASED INFORMATION VIA THE NATIONAL PRESS. (SEE PRESS OPPORTUNITIES, BELOW.) INSTITUTE STAFF ALSO NETWORK AND DISTRIBUTE MATERIALS AT A HOST OF RESEARCH CONFERENCES, CONVENTIONS AND ANNUAL MEETINGS, INCLUDING THOSE OF THE AMERICAN DIETETIC ASSOCIATION, THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF RETIRED PERSONS, THE OBESITY SOCIETY AND MANY OTHERS. IN FY 2009, INSTITUTE RESEARCHERS AND REGISTERED DIETITIANS MADE PRESENTATIONS ON DIET AND CANCER BEFORE NUMEROUS PROFESSIONAL, GOVERNMENTAL AND CONSUMER ORGANIZATIONS. THROUGH PARTICIPATION IN SUCH EVENTS, AICR IS ABLE TO INCREASE PROFESSIONAL AWARENESS OF THE ROLE OF DIET AND NUTRITION IN CANCER PREVENTION, AND CAN HELP MAKE HEALTH PROFESSIONALS AND EDUCATORS AWARE OF THE EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES AICR CAN PROVIDE IN THESE AREAS. PRESS EFFORTS THE INSTITUTE SEEKS TO INCREASE PUBLIC UNDERSTANDING OF THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN DIET AND CANCER THROUGH WHATEVER MEANS WILL REACH THE PUBLIC. THIS INCLUDES REGULAR DISTRIBUTION OF PRESS RELEASES, PROVIDING INTERVIEW AND RESOURCE MATERIAL TO OTHER PUBLICATIONS (BOTH LOCAL AND NATIONAL), AND PROVIDING MATERIALS FOR REPUBLICATION BY A WIDE VARIETY OF PUBLICATIONS ACROSS THE COUNTRY. EACH YEAR, PRESS RELEASES AND THE "HEALTH FEATURES PACKAGE" (SEE BELOW) GENERATE BETWEEN 8,000 AND 11,000 CLIPPINGS FROM NEWSPAPERS AND MAGAZINES THAT MENTION AICR AND ITS HEALTH MESSAGE. LAST YEAR, AICR SPOKESPEOPLE APPEARED IN HUNDREDS OF NEWSPAPER, MAGAZINE AND TELEVISION STORIES ACROSS THE COUNTRY. IN FY 2009, TWO AICR EVENTS MADE NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL NEWS.
