On June 24, 2008 the Wenner-Gren Foundation awarded a grant in the amount of \$125,000 to the Department of Social and Cultural Anthropology at the National University of Mongolia. The purpose of the grant is to upgrade the institutional capacity of the Department of Social and Cultural Anthropology in order to make the department an institution that offers internationally sound anthropological research and training in Mongolia, and thus establish the field of socio-cultural anthropology firmly in Mongolia

The specific objectives of the project are to 1) develop a sound doctoral program that meets international standards, 2) train four new doctorates jointly with the Mongolian and Inner Asian Studies Unit (MIASU) and the Department of Social Anthropology, University of Cambridge, and recruit them as faculty members in the Department of Social and Cultural Anthropology, and 3) build an up-to-date resource collection on socio-cultural anthropology and upgrade technical capacity of the department.

1. On August 14, 2008 the Wenner-Gren Foundation awarded a grant in the amount of \$65,000 to the Royal Anthropological Institute (RAI) to support the RAI's Urgent Anthropology Fellowship Program. **Achievements in the academic year of 2008 to 2009**

**Background**

In 2009 the project implementation conducted as we planned in the project proposal. According to the original plan, four of our staff members spent sometimes in Cambridge, first, to set a curriculum of doctoral studies under the consultancy of Cambridge professors, second to develop six course syllabi which will be taught in Mongolia from the academic year from 2009 to 2010, and third, to purchase books for those courses. The other minor task was to purchase a PC and a printer to supply doctoral students with better facilities.

**Members in the project implementation team**

We have so far around eight anthropologists participated at the project. Four of them are our departmental staff members who were introduced in the project proposal. On the other hand from Cambridge side four anthropologists started to participate. They are all members of Mongolia and Inner Asia Studies Unit, Social Anthropology Department, Cambridge, namely, Prof C Humphrey, Dr David Sneath, chair of Social Anthropology, Dr E Bulag, and Dr H Diemberger. They are all anthropologist specialised on Mongolia and Inner Asia studies. The duty of our Cambridge partners is to consult on curriculum and syllabi designs, and supervise our doctoral students and hold a membership in the board of doctoral committee.

### **Curriculum development**

In January and February 2009 Dr D Bumochir, the present chair and the coordinator of the project, spent two months in Cambridge and arrived there one month earlier than the rest of the group to develop the curriculum under the supervision of Cambridge collaborators. Discussion on curriculum continued after the rest of the group joined and we all agreed to on ten courses which we planned to develop along the project implementation. In the first place, the six courses we selected are the following courses

Dr N Danzan prepared two courses Inner Asian kinship, family and gender

Urban Anthropology Dr S Dulam prepared two courses

Mongolian symbolism and anthropology

Inner Asian religion and ritual Dr B Dulam prepared one course

Research design and methodology Dr L Munkh-Erdene prepared one course Theories of Ethnicity and Nationalism

All the above courses will be taught at the department for our new doctoral researchers starting from the academic year of 2009 to 2010

### **Library resource collection**

According to the original plan we calculated 500USD to collect books for each course we are developing along the project. Since we are developing six new courses we have altogether 3000 USD this for book allowance. Our staff members visited Cambridge were in charge of purchasing books and making photocopies of relevant articles and chapters for courses they were obliged to develop. Altogether we managed to buy around 30 books, made photocopies of about 20 articles and chapters. From 3000USD we also had to send all the books by cargo to Mongolia which was costly.

### **Purchase of Equipments**

As we planned in the project the department bought a PC (DELL, Dual Core) and printer (Canon LBP 2900) for the use of new doctoral researchers

### **Plan for the academic year of 2010 to 2011**

#### **Doctoral students**

We are planning to elect four doctoral students in the October 2009 as we planned. The announcement is now available in the departmental and university websites. It will also published in one of the national newspapers. The election will happen in the mid of October 2009. All four students will get a stipend from Wenner-Gren and two of them are coming to Cambridge to work for a term. As we discussed with Mongolia and Inner Asia Studies Unit, they are capable of hosting our students after December 2009. Therefore we are planning to send two of them to Cambridge in Lent term (from mid December 2009 to mid March 2010)

### **Curriculum development**

In the project we planned to develop two more courses syllabi in the year of 2010 to 2011. This time Dr Bumochir Dulam (myself) will spend about a month in Cambridge to prepare two course syllabi such as Power and Politics in Mongolia and Inner Asia, and Anthropology and Area Studies (Anthropology of China, Russia, Central Asia etc). Both will be supervised by Dr Bulag and Dr Sneath. The visit will happen while the two doctoral researchers reside in Cambridge in order to assist them. Book allowance expenses will follow the development of two courses.

### **Purchase of equipments**

Accordingly to the project we are purchasing three personal computers for the use of our doctoral students.







**Anthropological Doctoral Program at the Museum of Anthropology, Universidad Nacional de Córdoba, Argentina**

**Annual progress report 2009**

The Anthropological Doctoral Program at the Museum of Anthropology of Córdoba aims to prepare professionals for research and academic education in Anthropological Sciences, with specialized training in the three classic sub-areas of research social anthropology, archaeology and bioanthropology

As we mentioned in the application to the IDG, doctoral studies are oriented towards intensive theoretical and practical training in order to produce trained professionals who will be able to undertake independent research projects, exercise leadership of scientific research teams, communicate their research results, and teach at the university. It is hoped that through this program the students will also acquire various experiences in diverse academic contexts and form external relationship which will open possibilities for exchange and dialogue with other anthropologists, while generating their own future networks. It is hoped that this would impact positively on their education and in their personal and institutional performance

During the first 9 months of development of the program it can be said that we have accomplished most the goals for the first year, while the other ones are currently on execution or planned for the next two months, according to the proposed schedule

Specifically, during this period, we have conducted the following activities

- a We have completed all legal and administrative obligations of the doctorate, in accordance with existing regulations regarding accreditation of doctoral programs both by the Universidad Nacional de Córdoba and the Comisión Nacional de Acreditación Universitaria (*National University Accreditation Comission*) of the Ministerio de Educación (*Education Ministry*)
- b We have acquired equipment, both for classroom and field work (including two notebooks, a LCD projector, a GPS, digital recorder, a camera), and some furniture (a desk and bookshelves)
- c We have acquired 27 books, in Spanish and in English, for updating the library of the Museo de Antropología
- d On June we applied and won a grant from the National Ministry of Science and Technology to invite one of the teachers of our staff, Dr. Beatriz Alasia de Heredia, from Brasil, that will allow us to invite her to stay at Córdoba three other times during this year
- e From June to August we opened the enrolment of students. We have 70 students enrolled and 55 eligible (39 in Social Anthropology, 14 in Archaeology and 2 in Bioanthropology). Non eligible students were invited to join next year, after an introductory training in anthropology. Students come not only from Córdoba, but also from other provinces of the country (Mendoza, Catamarca, Buenos Aires, Santa Fe, Jujuy) and from abroad (Peru, Colombia, Chile, Paraguay and one argentine student living in Dubai)

- f With the teachers of the Doctorate we planned the courses for this year and the next one (see Appendix A)
- g We began with the courses, one given in July, and three more will be dictated before the end of the year
  - i Dr Benjamin Alberti, from Farmington College, USA, taught a course "New Approaches to Materiality in Archaeology"
  - ii Dr Beatriz Alasia de Heredia, from the Universidade Federal do Rio de Janeiro, Brasil, will teach a course on Community, Locality and Nation, from September 21st to the 30th
  - iii Dr Kelly from the University of Wyoming, USA, will teach a course on Hunter-Gatherer ecology from October 19th to the 30th.
  - iv Dr Conrado Rodríguez Martín, from the Instituto Canario de Bioantropología, Spain, will teach a course on Forensic Bioanthropology in November
- h In October and November, they will be held two seminars in charge of Dr Beatriz Alasia de Heredia, centered on research in social anthropology and aiming to coordinate a research group in political anthropology with some students
  - i We have developed a virtual classroom at open software platform with Moodle (<http://aulavirtual.fyh.unc.edu.ar>) with two rooms opened until now, in support to the regular courses

It is hoped that this will help them define their field of interest and promote links with teachers and research projects, so that the following year can begin with a more focused definition of their own object of study. The continuous updating of the library will enhance the possibilities of the students to prepare for their exams as well as their future theses

## **Interim Project report on Religious Narratives of Uyghurs in Xinjiang**

**Rahile Dawut**

**Center for Anthropology and Folklore**

**School of Humanities**

**Xinjiang University, China**

My project work is nearing completion. With the generous support of the RAI during these two years of project work, we have not only documented a lots of disappearing religion rituals; even more importantly, we have gotten to know a great deal of local knowledge related to religion and other field. This project has been our best chance so far to improve our understanding of religion life of Uyghurs in Xinjiang.

Unfortunately, during these two years, various circumstances in China and in Xinjiang particularly affected our field work to rural area in Xinjiang at some degree. After a riot in Urumqi on July 5, 2009 in Xinjiang, conducted field research in rural area become very difficult. We have to postpone some of our field work since the hash political situation in this region. From July, 2009 to the June, 2010, the Internet has been completely unavailable throughout Xinjiang, and as a result, we cannot access the research materials related to our field. Despite these various obstacles and limitations, we did our best to document more religious voices of disappearing culture.

One of my project work is about Shrine(*Mazar*) visitation among the Uyghurs. Big shrine visitation provide a space for epic narration, songs, and poetry related to Islam and Sufism, and that, due to Xinjiang's political environment and the fact that at this point most performers of these works are elderly, these cultural aspects are in danger of disappearing; therefore, I set aside a great deal of time to record these examples of folk culture.

My next focus is about Sufi Sisterhood among the Uyghurs.

Since the Sufi sisterhood and religious rituals regarded as superstition and illegal religious activities and banned in many area their cultural space withdrew and the practices associated with them are quickly disappearing. Some Sufi Sisterhood

begin to perform their rituals underground. So we spent an amount of time to document the practices, narratives, and rituals which are still performed among the women Sufi communities.

In order to obtain the most comprehensive record of *Mazar* and women Sufi practices, we carried out ethnographic research in three traditional Uyghur centers---Hotan, Kashgar and Turpan. We documented one big shrine festival and oral epic narratives related to religion in Hotan, two women's sufi sisterhood in Kashgar, one women's Sufi sisterhood and one man's Sufi brotherhood in Turpan. In all of them, we recorded and videotaped the rituals, the music and songs, the chants, the narratives, the dance, and other artistic expressions. Now we are going to write ethnographies on Religious life of Uyghurs according to the findings.

We have edited video and audio recordings of some of the materials we had. Our interview materials have also been fully edited and organized. Now we are on the process of making a number of ethnographic films on the basis of these materials. We are also currently preparing these materials for use as a teaching resource. We are going to work on English translation of the ethnographic materials in the coming months. At present, I have published two articles on the basis of this research.

Since our video documentations comes from different Sufi groups and Mazars in different area so how to organise these video materials and make an ethnographic film become a problem we face currently. Maybe it is better to make three different ethnographic film according to the contents.

Since it is difficult to find research materials published in English related to my field here in my university and also I need time for writing up my project I would like to go to Anthropology department of Kent University on December this year for a few months. I expect to complete my project by February, 2010

I am writing to request a no-cost extension to my RAI fellowship in urgent anthropology through October 2010 in order to complete final fieldwork this summer and write-up of my project results this autumn. My project, "Using Local Knowledge to Assess Environmental Change and Restoration in Coastal Marine Ecosystems," seeks to contribute to our need to better understand and management changing coastal marine ecosystems of vital importance to indigenous peoples of the North Pacific. To date my investigations into marinescapes in Southeast Alaska and Sakhalin Island, Siberia have revealed, among other things, critical connections between indigenous areas of historical occupation and use and contemporary coastal hotspots for biocultural diversity and ecological restoration. As testimony to the urgency of the project, recently, I was invited to testify in front of a special session of the Alaska State Legislature's Fisheries Committee on my findings concerning the depleted status of Pacific herring, a critical biological foundation and cultural keystone species, and its effects on coastal ecosystems.

Unfortunately, due to recent volcano activity, which grounded flights in the UK for parts of this spring, I was not able to complete a planned fieldwork trip to Alaska, and have rescheduled the trip for July and August 2010, along with a second trip to Siberia. Upon completion of this fieldwork and compilation of the results, I propose to submit my final report by 1 November 2010.

Also, please note I have recently accepted a permanent post in the UK, as Senior Research Fellow and MSc Course Director at the Environmental Change Institute, School of Geography and Environment, University of Oxford. My full contact details are listed below.

BYLAWS  
of  
The WENNER-GREN FOUNDATION  
FOR ANTHROPOLOGICAL RESEARCH,  
A corporation organized in the State of Delaware

ARTICLE I

The Board of Trustees

(1) Powers. All the powers of the Corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees ("Board") consisting of not less than seven and up to a maximum of seventeen members. All Trustees are voting members.

(2) Members. The members of the Corporation shall be known as the Trustees thereof and all references herein to Trustees shall mean members. The entire membership of the Corporation shall constitute the Board

(3) Election and Term of Office. Trustees shall be elected by a majority vote at a meeting of the Board.

(a) Term. The term of office of each Trustee, other than a Trustee *ex officio*, shall commence at the meeting at which such Trustee is elected. If elected at an annual meeting, the Trustee's term shall continue until the conclusion of the annual Board meeting taking place in the third year following the commencement of such term or until his or her death, resignation or removal. If elected at any other Board meeting, the Trustee's initial term shall continue through the annual meeting taking place in the fourth year following the Trustee's election or until his or her death, resignation or removal. The term of office of a Trustee *ex officio* shall be as provided in Article III.

(b) Additional Terms. A Trustee, other than a Trustee *ex officio*, may serve for up to three additional three-year terms upon re-election by the Board. No Trustee who has served four consecutive three-year terms shall be eligible for re-election. However, the Chair may continue to serve as Trustee for an extended period of time as provided in Article III.

(c) Decrease in Number of Trustees. No decrease in the number of Trustees shall shorten the term of any incumbent Trustee.

(4) Trustee Duties. A Trustee elected to office and a Trustee ex officio shall have the same duties, rights and powers, including but not limited to the rights to vote and be counted toward the existence of a quorum.

(5) Resignation and Removal. Any Trustee may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Chair, the President, the Secretary, or the entire Board. Such resignation shall take effect at the time specified therein or, if not so specified, upon receipt thereof. Any Trustee may be removed at any time, either for or without cause, by the vote of two-thirds of the total number of Trustees in office at the time, at any meeting the notice or waiver of which shall have specified the proposed removal. The removal of an officer who is also serving as a Trustee, as both officer and Trustee shall require separate votes.

## ARTICLE II

### Meetings of the Board

(1) Meetings The Board shall meet at least two times per calendar year. The first meeting in any calendar year shall constitute the annual meeting of the Corporation and shall be held no later than May 31<sup>st</sup> of any given year.

(2) Place of Meetings. Meetings may be held at the Corporation's offices or another location as specified in the notice of the meeting.

(3) Notice Notice of a meeting stating the place, date and time shall be given to each Trustee in the manner provided in Article XV of these Bylaws. Any business pertaining to the affairs of the Corporation may be transacted at any Board meeting without special notice.

(4) Quorum At any meeting of the Board, a majority of the total number of Trustees in office at the time shall be necessary and sufficient to constitute a quorum for the

transaction of business, and the act of a majority of the Trustees present at any meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board. In the absence of a quorum at the time and place set for a meeting, a majority of the Trustees present may adjourn the meeting to a subsequent time and place without notice other than announcement at the meeting. At any such subsequent meeting at which a quorum is present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally noticed.

(5) Action Without a Meeting. Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the Board may be taken without a meeting if all the Trustees entitled to vote on such action consent thereto in writing which may be in the form of an electronic transmission, and such written consents are filed with the minutes of the Board

(6) Telephonic or other Electronically Facilitated Meetings. Members of the Board, or any committee designated by the Board, may participate in a meeting of the Board, or such committee, as the case may be, by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other. Such participation in a meeting shall constitute presence in person at the meeting

(7) Conflicts of Interest. Members of the Board will be governed by the Foundation's conflicts of interest policy, which may be changed from time to time by a Board resolution

(8) Compensation of Trustees. Trustees will not be compensated for their services as such but the Board may by resolution determine the expenses in the performance of such services for which a Trustee is entitled to reimbursement. All discussions and decisions by the Board on compensation shall be documented in writing.

## ARTICLE III

### Officers

(1) The officers of the Corporation shall be the Chair of the Board, the Vice Chair of the Board, the President, the Vice President for Finance, the Treasurer, and the Secretary. The President, serving as Trustee ex officio, the Chair and the Vice Chair are required to be Trustees. None of the other officers need be a Trustee

(2) Election. The Chair shall be elected by the Board at the annual meeting at which the Chair's term expires or the position is otherwise vacated. The other officers, with the exception of the President, shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Board

#### (3) Term of Office.

(a) The term of office of the Chair shall commence at the time of his or her election and shall continue until the conclusion of the annual Board meeting taking place in the third year following the commencement of such term. The term of a Chair may be extended for an additional three years by a majority vote of the Board. If the duration of the Chair's term as Trustee shall expire before the completion of his or her term as Chair, the Chair shall remain Trustee until the expiration of his or her term as Chair

(b) The President serves as a Trustee ex officio and the term of office of the President shall coincide with the term of his or her employment with the Foundation

(c) Officers other than the Chair and President shall hold office for one year

(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Section, the term of any officer shall continue until his or her successor is chosen and qualified or until he or she shall die or resign. Any officer may be removed from office at any time, either for or without cause, by a vote of two-thirds of the total number of Trustees at any meeting the notice or waiver of which shall have specified the proposed removal. Any vacancy occurring among the officers shall be filled by the Board, but the person so elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office only until the next annual meeting of the Board and until his or her successor is chosen and qualified.

(4) Holding Two Offices. No one person shall hold at the same time the offices of Chair and President or of Vice President for Finance and Treasurer. No officer shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument in more than one capacity, if such instrument is required by law or by these Bylaws to be executed, acknowledged or verified by any two or more officers.

## ARTICLE IV

### Chair and Vice Chair of the Board

(1) The Chair. The Chair of the Board provides leadership to the Board and exercises general supervision, direction and control of the business of the Corporation, subject to the direction or approval of the Board or the Executive Committee. The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Board at which he or she shall be present and shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board.

(2) The Vice Chair. In the case of the absence or disability of the Chair, the Vice Chair of the Board shall perform the duties and shall have the powers of the Chair. The Vice Chair shall also perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board.

## ARTICLE V

### The President

The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation. Subject to and within the framework of policy decisions and guidelines established from time to time by the Board and by the Chair, the President shall be responsible for the day-to-day affairs of the Corporation including the operation and development of all programs and supervision of staff. The President shall have the power to perform all acts which are necessary to carry out the policies and actions of the Board, including the power to sign all documents in the name of and on behalf of the Corporation, unless otherwise provided in the Certificate or these Bylaws.

## ARTICLE VI

### Vice President for Finance

The Vice President for Finance shall be the chief financial officer of the Corporation. The Vice President for Finance shall have charge of the finances of the Corporation under the direction of the Board and the Investment and Budget Committee. The Vice President for Finance shall have the custody of the corporate funds and securities and keep a full and accurate account of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Corporation. The Vice President for Finance shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him or her by the Board, the Chair, or the President. The Vice President for Finance shall have the power to sign all documents in the name of and on behalf of the Corporation, unless otherwise provided in the Certificate or these Bylaws.

## ARTICLE VII

### The Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be responsible for the oversight of the investment and management of the endowment and shall serve as the Chair of the Investment and Budget Committee. The Treasurer shall have the power to sign all documents in the name of and on behalf of the Corporation, unless otherwise provided in the Certificate or these Bylaws.

## ARTICLE VIII

### The Secretary

The Secretary shall give notice, as provided in these Bylaws, of each meeting of the Board and send an agenda of business to be transacted at such meeting to each Trustee. The Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Board and make a permanent record of all votes and the minutes of all proceedings in a book to be kept for that purpose and shall perform like

duties for the standing committees when required. The Secretary shall have custody of the seal of the Corporation, shall affix it to such instruments as require its use, and when so affixed, shall attest it by signature. The Secretary shall sign all documents requiring the signature of the Secretary as an officer of the Corporation. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board, the Chair or President.

## ARTICLE IX

### Duties of Officers May Be Delegated

In case of the absence or disability of an officer of the Corporation, or in any other case that the Board may deem sufficient reason therefore, the Board, by a majority vote, may delegate for the time being any or all of the powers or duties of any officer to any other officer or to any Trustee. In the absence or disability of the President which prevents him or her from exercising and fulfilling the duties of that office, the Trustees may appoint an Acting President to act in his or her stead until such time as a successor to the office of President, if one be needed, shall have been elected, or until such time as the absence or disability shall have ended.

## ARTICLE X

### Committees

Board Committees shall have and may exercise the power and authority of the Board and manage the business and affairs of the Corporation, including the use of the Corporate Seal, to the extent provided in the Certificate, these Bylaws or delegated by Board resolution. All members of all Board Committees shall be Trustees.

(1) Standing Committees The standing committees of the Board are the Executive Committee, the Investment and Budget Committee, the Audit Committee, the Compensation Committee and the Nominating Committee.

(a) Executive Committee The Executive Committee shall manage, direct and control the business, affairs, and property of the Corporation in such a manner as it shall deem in the best interests of the Corporation, not contrary to any specific directions of the Board. The Chair of the Executive Committee shall be the Chair of the Board. The Executive Committee shall be comprised of at least three members in addition to the President.

(b) Investment and Budget Committee The Investment and Budget Committee shall be responsible for the investment of the Corporation's funds and for the supervision of the Corporation's budgeting activities. The Investment and Budget Committee policy statement adopted and modified from time to time by the Board shall describe the duties delegated to the Committee by the Board. The Investment and Budget Committee shall be comprised of at least three members in addition to the Chair and President.

(c) Audit Committee The Audit Committee shall oversee the quality and integrity of the accounting, reporting, and auditing practices of the Corporation. The Committee shall nominate the independent public accounting firm to conduct the annual audit for the Corporation. The Committee shall meet with the auditor to review and discuss the results of the annual audit and any recommendations that may arise from the audit. The Audit Committee shall report on its proceedings and present the financial statements to the Board for approval. The Audit Committee shall be comprised of two or more members in addition to the Chair.

(d) Compensation Committee The Compensation Committee shall conduct the annual performance reviews and establish the compensation for the Foundation's senior officers. Compensation decisions made by the Compensation Committee require the affirmative vote of a majority of the disinterested Trustees then members of the Committee. For the purposes of this subsection (d), an "interested" Trustee is a Trustee who during the past 12 months received any compensation from or otherwise engaged in a business transaction with the Corporation (other than in reimbursement of expenses incurred as a Trustee), or who at any time during the past 12 months was an officer or director of, or had a significant ownership interest in, an entity which transacted any business with the Corporation during such period. The Compensation Committee shall be comprised of two or more members in addition to the Chair.

(e) Nominating Committee The Nominating Committee shall coordinate the search for candidates for the Board and shall make recommendations as to possible candidates to the Board. The Nominating Committee shall be comprised of two or more members in addition to the Chair.

(2) Other Board Committees. The Board may, by resolution passed by a majority vote, designate one or more additional committees.

(3) Committee Membership. The Chair of the Board shall appoint the members to each of the Board committees. The Chair may designate one or more Trustees as alternate

members of any committee, who may replace any absent or disqualified member at any meeting of the committee. The Chair of the Board shall serve as an ex officio member on all committees. The President shall serve as an ex officio member on the Executive Committee and the Investment and Budget Committee.

(4) Committee Chairpersons The Chair of the Board shall name the Chairperson of each committee except the Investment and Budget Committee. The Treasurer shall serve as the Chair of the Investment and Budget Committee.

(5) Meetings

(a) Procedures. Any committee may meet at stated times, or on notice given in the manner provided in Article XV of these Bylaws. Each committee shall establish its own rules of procedure and shall have power to act in any manner permitted by law including the power to act without meeting upon the prior written consent of all members thereof, and shall meet at such times and at such place or places and upon such notice as may be provided by such rules.

(b) Quorum. At every meeting of a committee the presence of a majority of all members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum and shall allow the members to take actions on behalf of the entire committee; if there are only two members on a committee, both members must be present to constitute a quorum. The affirmative vote of a majority of the members present shall be necessary for the adoption by it of any resolution. At any meeting of a committee, in the absence or disqualification of any member of such committee for whom no alternate designated pursuant to paragraph (3) above is present and qualified to vote, the member or members thereof present at such meeting and not disqualified from voting, whether or not he or she or they constitute a quorum, may unanimously appoint another member of the Board to act at such meeting in the place of such absent or disqualified member with the same force and effect as if such person so appointed had been originally designated by the Board Chair to be a member of such committee, but only during the period of such absence or disqualification.

(6) Advisory Committees. The Board may, by resolution passed by a majority vote, designate one or more advisory committees. Advisory committee members shall have no power to vote, act on behalf of or otherwise bind the Corporation.

(7) Advisors to Board Committees. The Chair may appoint advisors to Board Committees. Such advisors shall have no power to vote on committee matters, act on behalf of or otherwise bind the Corporation.

## ARTICLE XI

### Indemnification

(1) Indemnification of Trustees and Officers Subject to section 8 of this Article, the Corporation shall indemnify and hold harmless any person from all costs, expenses, and liabilities imposed or reasonably incurred in connection with or resulting from any claim, action, or other proceedings, or in any other way arising out of such person being or having been a Trustee or Officer of the Corporation or by reason of such person serving or having served, at the written request of the Corporation, any other corporation or enterprise in which the Corporation has an interest This provision is intended to apply to the full extent, but only to the extent, permitted by applicable law This provision is in addition to and shall not affect any other rights to which the individuals involved or the Corporation may be entitled, except that no individual shall be entitled to be reimbursed or otherwise to recover twice for a single cost, expense, or liability "Costs, expenses, and liabilities" covered hereunder include, but are not limited to, attorneys' fees, court costs, judgments, penalties, interests, and amounts reasonably incurred in settlement of claims Indemnification may include payments incurred in defending any claim, action, or proceedings, in advance of final determination of a person's right to indemnification, upon the undertaking, in a form acceptable to and acknowledged by the Corporation, by the person indemnified to engage legal counsel acceptable to the Corporation and to repay such payments if it ultimately shall be determined that such person is not entitled to indemnification hereunder.

(2) Indemnification of Employees, Agents and Others The Corporation, in its sole discretion, may, but need not, indemnify and hold harmless persons incurring costs, expenses, or liabilities arising from their actions on behalf of the Corporation as employees, agents, volunteers, or otherwise. The extent and conditions of such indemnification shall be in the sole discretion of the Corporation, by majority vote of the Board

(3) Exceptions No person shall be indemnified or held harmless with respect to any amounts which such person shall be required (either through judgment, by compromise, or by settlement) to pay to the Corporation.

(4) Denial and Withdrawal of Indemnification. Upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Board, of the President or of the Vice President for Finance, the disinterested members of the Board shall consider whether a person otherwise entitled to or extended indemnification shall have it withdrawn. The disinterested members of the Board may deny or withdraw indemnification with respect to any matter in which it is determined by them that the person did not act in good faith or in a manner he or she reasonably believed to be in the best interests of the Corporation. In addition, with respect to any costs, expenses, or liabilities arising out of criminal proceedings, indemnification may be denied or withdrawn if a person of ordinary prudence under similar circumstances reasonably should have known that such conduct was unlawful. In the event disinterested members do not constitute a quorum of the full Board, the determination shall be made by written opinion of legal counsel engaged for that purpose.

(5) Conditional Indemnification. In advance of a determination of indemnification, the Corporation may grant conditional indemnification of fees and expenses incurred by the person in defending any claim, action, or proceedings, upon the undertaking, in a form acceptable to the Corporation, by the person to engage legal counsel acceptable to the Corporation and to reimburse the Corporation for such payments if it ultimately shall be determined or decided that such person is not to be indemnified hereunder.

(6) Retroactivity, etc. This article shall apply retroactively to potential liabilities incurred prior to the date of its adoption, and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, or administrators of any person indemnified hereunder.

(7) Not Exclusive. This article shall not be exclusive of any other rights to which persons may be entitled by law, agreement or otherwise.

(8) Private Foundation Status. No indemnification shall be provided hereunder to the extent that such indemnification would result in the imposition of tax under section 4941 of the Code.

(9) Procedure for Indemnification. Any indemnification or advance of expenses under this Article shall be made only against a written request thereof (together with supporting documentation) submitted by or on behalf of the person seeking indemnification or an advance of expenses. Except as provided in paragraph (5) of this Article, indemnification may be sought by an eligible person under this Article in respect of a proceeding only to the extent that both the liabilities for which indemnification is sought and all portions of the proceeding relevant to the determination of whether the person has satisfied any appropriate standard of conduct have become final. A person seeking indemnification may seek to enforce such person's rights to indemnification (as the case may be) in the Delaware Court of Chancery to the extent all or any portion of a requested indemnification has not been granted within 90 days of the submission of such request. All expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) incurred by such person in connection with successfully establishing such person's right to indemnification under this Article, in whole or in part, shall also be indemnified by the Corporation.

(10) Contract Right. The rights to indemnification provided by this Article shall be deemed to be separate contract rights between the Corporation and each Trustee and officer who serves in any such capacity at any time while these provisions as well as the relevant provisions of the DGCL are in effect, and no repeal or modification of any of these provisions or any relevant provisions of the DGCL shall adversely affect any right or obligation of such Trustee or officer existing at the time of such repeal or modification with respect to any state of facts then or previously existing or any proceeding previously or thereafter brought or threatened based in whole or in part upon any such state of facts. Such "contract rights" may

not be modified retroactively as to any present or former Trustee or officer without the consent of such Trustee or officer.

## ARTICLE XII

### Bank Accounts, Investment Accounts, Etc.

Such officers or agents of this Corporation as from time to time shall be designated by these Bylaws or the Board shall have authority to 1) establish, operate, maintain, and terminate accounts for the Corporation with financial institutions and investment management firms, and 2) deposit and withdraw funds in such accounts from time to time on behalf of the Corporation. The officers of the Corporation or any of them shall from time to time certify to the financial institutions and investment management firms in which funds of this Corporation are deposited, the signatures of the officers or agents of this Corporation so authorized to draw against the same, and such signatures may include the signature of such certifying officer.

## ARTICLE XIII

### Loans and Other Extensions of Credit

The Treasurer shall have the power to obtain loans or other extensions of credit on behalf of the Corporation, including the power to sign all documents and instruments relating thereto, provided that all documents and instruments evidencing any loan or other extension of credit or relating thereto shall bear the signature of the Chair or Vice Chair of the Corporation in addition to the signature of the Treasurer. Any loan or extension of credit in a maximum aggregate amount of less than 1% of the endowment of the Corporation, determined as of the most recent quarterly asset valuation date therefore, shall be approved by the President in writing in advance of the loan or extension of credit and reported to the Board at its meeting next following issuance of the loan or extension of credit. Any loan or extension of the credit in a maximum aggregate amount of 1% or more of the endowment of the Corporation shall

require approval by the majority vote of the total number of Trustees in office in advance of the loan or extension of credit.

## ARTICLE XIV

### Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Corporation shall end on the 31st day of December of each year.

## ARTICLE XV

### Notices

(1) How Given. Whenever notice is required to be given by the Certificate or by these Bylaws, it shall be made in writing and unless otherwise specifically required by law, may be made by mail, express mail, telecopy or electronic transmission. Notice of any meeting shall be given at least 10 days in advance thereof, but may be made with as little as 24 hours notice under special circumstances as determined by any officer of the Corporation

(2) Waiver of Notice. In lieu of notice, a written waiver of notice may be given by each individual to whom such notice was not given. The Secretary shall certify such notification to the Board and shall record and file any such waivers. The presence in person of a Trustee at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting by such Trustee. A written waiver of notice of meeting signed by a Trustee or a waiver by electronic transmission by a Trustee, whether given before or after the meeting time stated in such notice, is deemed equivalent notice

## ARTICLE XVI

### Offices

(1) Registered Office and Agent. The registered office shall be 2711 Centerville Road, Wilmington, Delaware, and the name of the registered agent at such address is Corporation Service Company (CSC).

(2) Other Offices. The Corporation may have other offices, either within or outside of the State of Delaware, at such place or places as the Board may designate from time to time or the business of the Corporation may require.

## ARTICLE XVII

### Seal

The Corporation shall have a Corporate Seal, which shall be in circular form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the Corporation, the year of its incorporation (1941) and the words "Corporate Seal Delaware", and may use the same by causing it or a facsimile thereof to be impressed or affixed or reproduced or otherwise

## ARTICLE XVIII

### Amendments

These Bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed by the majority vote of the total number of Trustees in office. No amendment, alteration, change or repeal of the Certificate of Incorporation or these Bylaws shall be effected which would result in the denial of tax-exempt status to the Corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
