Guidelines**Overview**

Incorporated in 1985, the Conservation, Food and Health Foundation seeks to promote the conservation of natural resources, improve the production and distribution of food, and improve health in the developing world. The foundation helps build capacity within developing countries in its three areas of interest with grants that support research or projects that solve specific problems.

The foundation supports projects that demonstrate strong local leadership, promote professional development in the conservation, agricultural, and health sciences; develop the capacity of local organizations; and address a particular problem in the field. It prefers to support projects addressing under-funded issues and geographic areas.

Geographic Focus

The foundation's geographic focus is the developing world. It prefers to support organizations located in developing countries or to developed country organizations whose activities are of direct and immediate benefit to developing countries. The foundation does not consider the states of the former Soviet Union or former Eastern Bloc countries as within its geographic focus.

Fields of Interest

The Conservation, Food & Health Foundation supports special projects and programs of non governmental organizations in three primary fields of interest: conservation, food, and health. Examples of areas of interest within these fields follow, but are not meant to be exclusive.

Conservation

- Conservation grants help improve ecological and environmental conditions in the developing world. The foundation supports field research and related research activities, training, and technical assistance efforts that:
- help conserve viable ecosystems and protect biological diversity in developing countries train local leaders in conservation and protection of resources, with an emphasis on technical and scientific training

Food

Food grants support focused efforts to improve access to food for consumption in developing countries. Areas of interest include projects that:

- promote or develop specific sustainable agriculture practices with potential to advance science and practice in other countries;
- develop new approaches that address fuel and resource problems related to food production and preparation in developing countries;
- explore and refine innovative education and training interventions for small scale food producers and farmers; and
- advance new approaches to control pests and diseases affecting important food crops of developing countries

Health

The foundation supports public health programs that are preventive rather than curative in nature. It supports research, technical assistance, and training projects that:

- improve public health through community-based efforts that address health promotion, disease prevention, family planning, and reproductive health; and
- increase the understanding and treatment of tropical diseases

Types of Support

The foundation does not provide general operating support. It favors research, training, and technical assistance projects that:

- employ and/or train personnel from developing countries
- are led by organizations with strong records of accomplishments in a particular field and have potential for replication
- focus on regional or cross-boundary issues and opportunities
- feature collaborative partnerships embedded in strong networks
- strengthen local leadership and scientific capacity
- influence public discourse and policy
- focus on prevention rather than remediation
- attract additional support and hold promise for continuation or impact beyond the period of foundation support

Exclusions

The Conservation, Food & Health Foundation does not provide support for:

- buildings, land purchase, or vehicles
- quantity purchases of durable medical equipment
- endowments or fundraising activities
- famine or emergency relief
- direct medical care or treatment
- feeding or food distribution programs
- films, videos, or web-site production
- scholarships, fellowships, or travel grants
- conferences
- re-granting through intermediaries
- general operating support, or
- individuals

Eligibility

Ordinarily the foundation limits its support to those organizations that have received a letter of determination of tax exemption under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code and are "not a private foundation" under section 509(a). However, the directors wish to remain open to the possibility of supporting certain equivalents, such as a domestic or foreign governmental unit or agency, or nongovernmental, foreign organization determined to be the equivalent of a 501(c)(3) organization, which can provide secure evidence of its nongovernmental status and charitable purpose.

Policies

- Most grants are made on a one-time basis.
- There is no policy concerning a minimum or maximum grant size. The average grant is approximately \$17,000. Grants exceeding \$25,000 are rarely awarded.
- The foundation will not consider more than one proposal from an organization in any calendar year and will not fund an organization more than once in a funding year.
- The foundation will not fund overhead or indirect costs of projects.
- The foundation is very willing to cooperate with other funding sources with compatible interests to support a joint project or to provide matching funds. From time to time the foundation may also set matching requirements for grantees, particularly in cases where the foundation cannot provide full funding for the project.
- The political beliefs of the applicants or the political relations of any state with the United States shall not be taken into account in making or not making any grant, except that the foundation will comply with any requirements imposed by law.
- Grantees are expected to meet the foundation's reporting requirements within one year of the previous proposal application. Returning applicants should submit an interim report with all copies of the proposal for renewal. A report outline will be sent with the initial grant letter. Reporting requirements are designed to maintain a reasonable balance between obtaining sufficient information for the foundation to assess expenditures, accomplishments and difficulties and avoiding burdensome work for grantees.

Foundation Office

The directors maintain a small, part-time staff in Boston, Massachusetts. Staff provide initial review of applications and meet with applicants when necessary in order to gain an important perspective on a particular request. Requests for meetings will be honored by staff whenever possible.

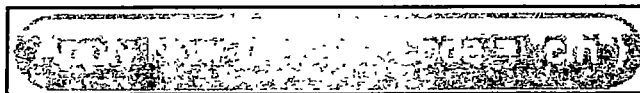
How to Apply On-Line

The foundation receives many more applications than its \$800,000 of funds can support annually. To reduce the number of applicants turned down for lack of available funds and to save time loss and expense to applicants, the foundation has adopted an online, two-phase application system comprised of a short concept application, followed by a limited number of invited full proposals. To create a more manageable pool of applications for a thorough review by the trustees, this system screens out projects at the concept application level which appear unlikely to receive funding.

REQUIREMENTS FOR A CONCEPT APPLICATION

Application Steps

1. **Click Apply Now.** Submit a concept application by going to the online grant application page:



2. **Register.** Prior to submitting a concept letter application through the foundation's online grants system, applicants must complete a one-time registration. You will need to supply your contact information and create a password to log in to the system. The foundation prefers that the principal investigator or primary contact register. Be sure to save your password where you can find it again because you will need it if you are invited to submit a full proposal.
3. **Start New Application.** Once you are in the system, click *Start New Application* on the top left side of your screen.
4. **Enter Access Code.** Enter the initials: cfh (all lowercase) as the Access Code box on the middle left side of your screen.
5. **Click Link to Open Form.** Click the link CFH Foundation to open the Concept Application Form. Click on Print Question Legend above your name to get a list of Concept Application questions with explanations.
6. **Draft Application.** Complete your on-line application. Save frequently. If you want to leave your application before it is complete, click on Save as Draft at the bottom of the screen. You can come back later and continue your application by signing in with your password and continuing to work on the application.
7. **Click Submit Button When Complete.** Your application must be submitted when you are done in order to remove it from draft status. After clicking submit, a new screen will appear confirming receipt of your application.

Assurances of nonprofit Status – If your organization does not have a U.S. 501(c)(3) designation, and you are not working with a registered U.S. organization that will act as your fiduciary, you must submit evidence of your charitable status in your country. Your official charitable designation certificate, translated into English if necessary, should be uploaded at the time of your registration in the online concept application process.

The concept application must be submitted via the online application system in English, and the budget information must be presented in U.S. dollars.

Deadlines for Concept Applications

Concept applications must be submitted by January 1 and July 1 in order to be reviewed for the foundation's May and November meetings. In the case of a weekend or holiday, the deadline is the next business day. All applications will be acknowledged as soon as possible by e-mail, and applicants will be informed of the foundation's decision regarding the concept application within 30 days of the concept deadline. This schedule is designed to give each invited applicant adequate time to prepare the full proposal if invited by the trustees. Applicants should submit only one application per review cycle.

From Applicants:

What are the deadlines?

The foundation has two 4-month funding cycles each year. The first begins in January and ends in May. The second begins in September and ends in December.

Concept applications received by January 1 will be considered for eligibility for the March 1 full proposal deadline. Grant payout for this cycle will be in June.

Concept applications received by July 1 will be considered for eligibility for the September 1 full proposal deadline. Grant payout for this cycle will be in December.

May I fax or e-mail my concept application or proposal?

No. Use <https://www.grantinterface.com/gma/Common/LogOn.aspx> to access the online proposal application.

Will the foundation support indirect costs or administrative overhead?

No. You have a better chance of competing for scarce dollars if you allocate direct costs to the CFH grant.

May we submit our application in a language other than English?

Unfortunately, we lack the capacity to translate proposals submitted in other languages.

Can an organization submit two concept applications for consideration?

In fairness to other organizations seeking support, we ask that organizations submit only one concept application per round of funding.

Does the foundation provide multi-year funding?

The foundation does not make multi-year grants. Applicants must re-apply through the competitive grants process each year. The foundation provides continued funding on a case-by-case basis depending on the past success of the project.

Will the foundation support organizations that it has never heard of?

Yes. However, it is difficult to evaluate concept applications submitted from organizations totally unknown to us, particularly from organizations in the developing world, where it is difficult for the foundation to obtain information. Applicants not well known in the United States may provide references and printed materials showing the nature and functioning of the organization.

Does the foundation require a format for reporting on grants?

Yes, please refer to the reporting instructions that were sent with your grant check. If you are requesting continued funding, send an interim report and a financial status report form. We also enjoy reading the publications that emerge from research supported by the foundation.

Will the foundation support travel costs to the developing world?

The foundation prefers to maximize the impact of its grant dollars by supporting project expenses in developing countries. The money spent on one plane ticket, for example, could support the salary of a health worker, researcher, or agricultural extension agent for several months in a developing country. That being said, the foundation may consider supporting a small portion of travel expenses when costs are an integral and reasonable part of the project budget.

Will the foundation support fellowships, scholarships, and training activities for university students?

The foundation prefers to support the project-based technical and scientific training of early-career or established professionals from the developing countries who: 1) are working in the field on specific issues that address priority research concerns in its main areas of support, and 2) demonstrate leadership potential in their field in their home countries. These grants are relatively rare.

Will the foundation support comprehensive village level anti-poverty programs in developing countries, many of which address the intersection of conservation, food, and health?

The foundation prefers to support specific projects and strategies, which have potential for broad applicability to other organizations or communities in developing countries. It seldom funds projects that only have a local impact. The foundation focuses its areas of interest with the hope of supporting projects that offer potential benefit beyond local action. One-third of all concept applications reviewed by the foundation are not considered for funding because they seek support for very general village improvement efforts, basic organic farming, animal husbandry training projects, or for general operating support.

From Current Grantees:**May we reapply for funding next year?**

Grantees may submit a proposal for continued funding if the project substantially continues the work of the currently funded project. In other words, if you need money for a totally new project or a very new direction or phase of the current project, please submit a new concept application.

Should current grantees submit a concept application to request continued support?

Only if they are seeking support for a totally new project. Please notify us as soon as possible if you plan to resubmit.

How do we reapply for funding?

Follow the proposal instructions on the web site as in the past. The proposal guidelines and forms may change from year to year, so make sure your information is up to date.

If we reapply, should we complete the entire form again including the attachments?

Yes. Do not assume that the reviewers remember your organization or your work. The foundation reviews many similar requests. Having all of the information readily available will help the reviewers answer questions that may support their understanding of the project.

When do we report on the project?

We encourage you to keep us up to date about the project. Always upload a short interim report with any request for follow-up support. Please email in a final report at the end of the grant period or project phase. Even if the particular phase of your project is not completed by the time you spend all of the grant money, let us know when you will send a final accounting of the project.

How should we report?

Please follow the guidelines provided by the foundation. We encourage you to bullet out evidence or indicators of progress on the objectives that you identified in the proposal.
