# Part V: Other Information

33. Did the organization engage in any activity not previously reported to the IRS? YES

In its initial Application for Recognition of Exemption ("Form 1023"), MAC indicated on Line 14(a) that it did not and will not make grants, loans, or other distributions to foreign organizations. MAC further stated this intention in its response, dated June 16, 2008, to the IRS' request for more information pursuant to Form 1023, by stating that it "will not be a grant-making body and [it does not] intend to provide grants, gifts or donations to any foreign organization or any other organizations or intermediary organizations". These responses were based on the Board of Director's best appraisal at that time of the most effective way of achieving MAC's proposed exempt purpose

Since fully commencing activities following its receipt of its tax-exempt status pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) on October 10, 2008, it became evident to MAC's Board of Directors that the necessary administrative and overhead costs associated with program implementation diminished the value of funds raised in terms of the percentage directed to actual health programs. The costs of establishing full administrative, finance, human resources, and logistics function within the United States, particularly within the first operational years of the organization, would result in a disproportionate balance between direct and overhead costs, with the latter claiming 100% of expenses in 2008 and 43% of expenses in 2009. Given that there are other well-established humanitarian organizations working on the issues of primary interest to MAC, namely in the areas of primary health and maternal and child health, psychosocial health, environmental health, and community health education, and given that many of these organizations are already operating in the countries that MAC chose to target for health interventions, the MAC Board of Directors decided to review its operational strategy.

To ensure that the highest possible proportion of funds raised by MAC is directed toward its exempt purpose of ensuring humanitarian care, MAC now believes that a more effective and efficient use of contributions will be to make grants to an established organization with specific projects that qualify under MAC's stated mission and further MAC's exempt purpose Specifically, MAC's Board of Directors has concluded that its resources would be better utilized, and its mission better fulfilled, by the provision of grants to Comité d'Aide Médicale ("CAM"), a non-profit organization established under French associations law in 1990 that currently undertakes humanitarian programs in Europe, Asia, and Africa, and whose organizational goals and missions closely match MAC's own goals and missions. Consequently, while MAC had always intended to work closely with CAM while operating as an independent non-grant making organization, MAC now hopes to become a "Friends of" organization to fund specific CAM projects that MAC believes further its charitable and exempt purposes

In Revenue Ruling 63-252, the IRS discussed whether a contribution paid to a corporation in five different scenarios would be deductible under Section 170. The IRS later clarified in Revenue Ruling 66-79, that contributions paid to a domestic charity that are solicited

for a specific project of a foreign charitable organization are deductible under Section 170 where the domestic charity has reviewed and approved the project as being in furtherance of its own exempt purposes and has full control of the donated funds and discretion as to the use of the contributions

To ensure that MAC meets the requirements laid out by the IRS in Revenue Ruling 66-79, such that contributions that are solicited for a specific project to be undertaken by CAM are deductible under Section 170, MAC has adopted various safeguards. On September 9, 2009, MAC amended its by-laws and installed new officers to ensure the independence of its Board of Directors. In addition, MAC adopted a grant-making policy and established a grant application process to ensure that MAC exercises full discretion and control over funds donated to MAC According to the grant making policy adopted by MAC's Board of Directors on September 9, 2009, MAC will accept inquiries and applications for grants from all organizations whose activities further MAC's exempt purpose and comply with U S. law MAC believes, however, that almost all of its grants will be made to support particular projects conducted by CAM

The MAC Board of Directors is comprised of U.S. citizens who are not acting on behalf of CAM or any other foreign organization. Furthermore, it is MAC's intention that this "Friends of" arrangement with CAM will not merely be a fundraising exercise for CAM in the US, instead, MAC hopes to raise funds for, and support specific, contained projects, to be carried out by CAM. The specific CAM projects that MAC chooses to support will be determined on the basis of grant applications, which will be submitted to MAC and which will specify how the grant funds will be used by CAM and how the intended use furthers MAC's exempt purposes. These grant applications will be reviewed and approved on an individual basis by MAC's Board of Directors pursuant to Section 8.2 of MAC's amended by-laws. As part of the grant application process, MAC will require, pursuant to Section 8.3 of its amended by-laws, that CAM agree to provide a periodic accounting to ensure that the grant funds are used for their intended purpose.

MAC is committed to the close review of grant applications and to ensuring that only grants that further its mission of humanitarian aid through primary health care, psychosocial support, environmental health, and community health education will be approved. As a result, under Section 8 4 of its amended by-laws, the MAC Board of Directors has the right, at its absolute discretion, to refuse to make any grants or contributions or otherwise render financial assistance for any or all purposes for which funds were requested. In addition, under its newly amended by-laws and the terms and conditions of its grant application and its grant making policy, "No money received by MAC will be earmarked for specific projects or grant applications prior to the application and approval process." Furthermore, pursuant to Section 8 5 of its amended by-laws, MAC retains the right, at all times after a grant has been approved, to withdraw approval of the grant and use the funds for other charitable purposes. These new policies of MAC will be made known to potential donors in fundraising materials

To further regulate MAC's relationship with CAM, the respective Boards of Directors of MAC and CAM have approved a Memorandum of Understanding that clearly delineates the relationship between, and relative powers of, each organization. In this document, Section 3 5 indicates that, "Funds raised by MAC may be used to support the humanitarian programs and

operations of its implementing partner, CAM, upon the review and approval of MAC's Board of Directors MAC's Board of Directors shall at all times have the right to withdraw approval of the grant and cancel funding of any projects for any reason." Likewise, Section 3 7 stipulates that, "MAC will retain total independence as to how its contributions will be utilized and will implement procedures to regularly review how funds have been used by CAM."

34. Were any changes made to the organizing or governing documents? YES.

MAC has amended its by-laws to reflect its change in approach to carrying out its exempt purposes as described above, and to ensure that MAC meets the requirements laid out by the IRS in Revenue Ruling 66-79, such that contributions that are solicited for a specific project of CAM are deductible under Section 170, MAC amended its by-laws on September 9, 2009

Specifically, MAC's amended by-laws, dated September 9, 2009, now contain the following provisions:

Section 8.1 of MAC's bylaws states that, "The corporation, in furtherance of its exempt purposes, shall have the power to make grants to any organization organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. The making of grants and contributions and otherwise rendering financial assistance for the purposes expressed in the corporation's Articles of Organization are within the exclusive power of the board of directors"

Section 8.2 of MAC's bylaws states that, "The board of directors shall review all written requests for funds from other organizations, but shall require that such requests specify the use to which the funds will be put, and, if the board of directors approves the request, shall authorize the payment of the funds to the approved grantee"

Section 8.3 of MAC's bylaws states that, "The board of directors shall require that the grantees furnish a periodic accounting to show that the funds were expended for the purpose approved by the board of directors"

Section 8.4 of MAC's bylaws states that, "The board of directors may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to make any grants or contributions or otherwise render financial assistance for any or all purposes for which funds were requested"

Section 8.5 of MAC's bylaws states that, "After the board of directors has approved a grant to a foreign organization for a specific project or purpose, the corporation may solicit funds for the grant to the specifically approved project or purpose of the other organization; at all times, however, the board of directors has the right to withdraw approval of the grant and to use the funds for other charitable, scientific, or educational purposes."

# AMENDED AND RESTATED BY-LAWS

#### **OF**

# MEDICAL AID COMMITTEE, INC.

# Section I. ARTICLES OF ORGANIZATION, CORPORATE SEAL AND FISCAL YEAR

# 1.1 Articles of Organization.

The name and purposes of the corporation shall be as set forth in its Articles of Organization. These By-laws, the powers of the corporation and of its members and directors and officers, shall be subject to the Articles of Organization as in effect from time to time. The principal office of the corporation in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts shall initially be located at the place set forth in the Articles of Organization.

# 1.2 Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the corporation shall end on December 31st in each year.

# 1.3 Corporate Seal.

The directors may adopt and alter the seal of the corporation.

#### 1.4 Gender.

The pronoun "he" or "his", when appropriate, shall be construed to mean also "she" or "her" and the word "chairman" shall be construed to include a female.

#### Section II. MEMBERS

# 2.1 No Members.

The corporation shall not have any voting members. Any action or vote permitted to be taken by members pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 180 shall be taken by action or vote of the same percentage of the directors of the corporation.

#### Section III. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

## 3.1 Powers.

The corporation shall have a board consisting of directors who shall have the powers and duties of a board of directors under Massachusetts law. The directors shall be responsible for the general management and supervision of the business and affairs of the corporation.

# 3.2 Number and Election.

There shall be five initial directors and they shall be those persons named as directors in the Articles of Organization. Thereafter, the directors shall be elected by vote of a majority of the directors then in office at the annual meeting. The number of directors may be increased or decreased from time to time by a vote of a majority of the directors then in office.

#### 3.3 Term of Office.

Each director shall hold office for a term ending upon the date of the next annual meeting of the Board of Directors, but shall hold office until such time as his successor shall be duly appointed, elected and qualified.

# 3.4 Resignations.

Any director may resign at any time by delivering his resignation in writing to the chairman of the board, if any, the president, the clerk, or to the corporation at its principal office. Such resignation shall be effective upon receipt unless specified to be effective at some other time.

#### 3.5 Removals.

A director may be removed with or without cause by the vote of a majority of the directors. A director may be removed for cause only after reasonable notice and opportunity to be heard before the board.

# 3.6 Vacancies.

Any vacancy in the board of directors may be filled by vote of the remaining directors at any meeting. Each such successor shall hold office for the unexpired term until his successor is chosen and qualified, or until he sooner dies, resigns, is removed or becomes disqualified. The directors shall have all their powers notwithstanding the existence of one or more vacancies in their number.

# Section IV. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

# 4.1 Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the board of directors shall be held each year and shall be called by the chairman, president or any director. In the event the annual meeting is not held, a special meeting in lieu of the annual meeting may be held with all the force and effect of an annual meeting. As provided in Section 5. below, at the annual meeting, the directors shall elect the president, treasurer and clerk and any other officers of the corporation.

# 4.2 Regular Meetings.

Regular meetings of the directors may be held at such places and at such times as the chairman, the president, or the directors may determine.

# 4.3 Special Meetings.

Special meetings of the directors may be held at any time and at any place when called by the chairman, the president, or by one or more directors.

# 4.4 Place of Meetings.

All meetings of the directors shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Massachusetts or at such other place within or without the United States as shall be fixed by the president, the chairman, or by the directors.

# 4.5 Notice of Meetings.

Notice of the time and place of each meeting of the directors shall be given to each director by mail at least five days or by facsimile, e-mail or other electronic means at least forty-eight hours before the meeting, addressed to him at his usual or last known business or residence address, or in person or by telephone at least twenty-four hours before the meeting. Notice need not specify the purposes of the meeting unless required by law, the Articles of Organization, these By-laws, or unless there is to be considered at the meeting (i) contracts or transactions of the corporation with interested persons, or (ii) removal or suspension of an officer or director.

Whenever notice of a meeting is required, such notice need not be given to any director if a written waiver of notice, executed by him (or his duly authorized attorney) before or after the meeting, is filed with the records of the meeting, or to any director who attends the meeting without protesting the lack of notice to him before or at the commencement of the meeting.

# 4.6 Quorum.

At any meeting of the directors, a majority of the directors then in office shall constitute a quorum, but a smaller number may adjourn a meeting from time to time without further notice.

# 4.7 Action by Vote.

When a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of the directors present and voting shall decide any question, including election of officers and appointment or election of committees, unless otherwise provided by law, the Articles of Organization, or these Bylaws.

# 4.8 Action by Writing.

Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the directors may be taken without a meeting if all the directors consent to the action in writing and the written consents

are filed with the records of the meetings of the directors. Such consents shall be treated for all purposes as a vote at a meeting.

# 4.9 Presence Through Communications Equipment.

Unless otherwise provided by law or the Articles of Organization, members of the board of directors may participate in a meeting of such body by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time, and participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.

# Section V. OFFICERS AND AGENTS

# 5.1 Number and Qualification.

The officers of the corporation shall be a president, treasurer, clerk and such other officers, if any, as the directors may determine. The corporation may also have such agents, if any, as the directors may appoint. An officer may but need not be a director. The clerk shall be a resident of Massachusetts unless the corporation has a resident agent duly appointed for the purpose of service of process. A person may hold more than one office at the same time. If required by the directors, any officer shall give the corporation a bond for the faithful performance of his duties in such amount and with such surety or sureties as shall be satisfactory to the directors.

#### 5.2 Election.

The president, treasurer and clerk shall be elected annually by the directors at the annual meeting of the directors. Other officers, if any, may be elected by the directors at any time.

#### 5.3 Term.

The president, treasurer and clerk shall each hold office until the next annual meeting but shall hold office until his successor is chosen and qualified. Each other officer shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the directors unless a shorter period shall have been specified by the terms of his election or appointment, or in each case until he sooner dies, resigns, is removed or becomes disqualified. Each agent shall retain his authority at the pleasure of the directors.

#### 5.4 Chairman of the Board of Directors.

If a chairman of the board of directors is elected, he shall reside at all meetings of directors and members at which he is present, except as the directors shall otherwise determine, and shall have such other power and duties as may be determined by the directors.

#### 5.5 President and Vice Presidents.

Unless the directors otherwise specify, the president of the corporation shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation and, subject to the control of the directors, shall have general charge and supervision of the affairs of the corporation. The vice president, or first vice president if there are more than one, shall have all the powers and duties of the president during the absence of the president or in the event of his inability to act. Vice presidents, if any, shall have such other duties and powers as the directors shall determine.

#### 5.6 Treasurer.

The treasurer shall be the chief financial officer and the chief accounting officer of the corporation. He shall be in charge of its financial affairs, books of account, accounting records and procedures, funds, securities and valuable papers, and he shall keep full and accurate records thereof. He shall also prepare or oversee all reports and filings required by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the Internal Revenue Service, and other governmental agencies. He shall have such other duties and powers as designated by the directors or the president.

# 5.7 Clerk.

The clerk shall record and maintain records of all proceedings of the directors and of the members in books kept for that purpose, which shall be kept within the Commonwealth at the principal office of the corporation or at the office of its clerk or of its resident agent. Such books shall also contain records of all meetings of incorporators and the original, or attested copies, of the Articles of Organization and By-laws and names of all directors and members and the address of each. If the clerk is absent from any meeting of directors, a temporary clerk chosen at the meeting shall exercise the duties of the clerk at the meeting.

# 5.8 Resignations.

Any officer may resign at any time by delivering his resignation in writing to the chairman of the board, if any, the president, the clerk or to the corporation at its principal office. Such resignation shall be effective upon receipt unless specified to be effective at some other time.

# 5.9 Removals.

An officer may be removed with or without cause by the vote of a majority of the directors. An officer may be removed for cause only after reasonable notice and opportunity to be heard before the board.

# 5.10 Vacancies.

The directors shall elect a successor if the office of the president, treasurer or clerk becomes vacant and may elect a successor if any other office becomes vacant. Each such successor shall hold office for the unexpired term and in the case of the president, treasurer and clerk until his successor is chosen and qualified, or in each case until he sooner dies, resigns, is removed or becomes disqualified.

#### Section VI. COMMITTEES

The directors may elect or appoint one or more committees, which shall consist solely of directors. The directors may delegate to any such committees any or all of the powers of the directors, except those which by law, by the Articles of Organization or by these By-laws they are prohibited from delegating. Unless the directors otherwise determine, the Executive Committee (if any) shall have all of the powers of the directors during intervals between meetings of the directors, except for the powers specified in Section 55 of Chapter 156B of Massachusetts General Laws.

Unless the directors otherwise determine, committee meetings shall be held at such places and at such times as the chairman of such committee shall determine. The provisions of Sections 4.5 (notice of meetings), 4.6 (quorum), 4.7 (action by vote), 4.8 (action by writing) and 4.9 (presence through communications equipment) shall apply to committee meetings as nearly as may be, the term "committee" or "committee member(s)" substituted for "board of directors" or "director(s)." The members of any committee shall remain in office at the pleasure of the directors.

# Section VII. SPONSORS AND OTHER SUPPORTERS OF THE CORPORATION

The directors may designate certain persons or groups of persons as sponsors, benefactors, contributors, advisors or friends of the corporation or such other title as they deem appropriate. Such persons shall serve in an honorary capacity and, except as the directors shall otherwise designate, shall have no right to notice of or to vote at any meeting, shall not be considered for purposes of establishing a quorum, and shall have no other rights or responsibilities.

# Section VIII. GRANTS TO ORGANIZATIONS WHICH ARE FOREIGN

## 8.1 Exclusive Power of the Board of Directors.

The corporation, in furtherance of its exempt purposes, shall have the power to make grants to any organization organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. The making of grants and contributions and otherwise rendering financial assistance for the purposes expressed in the corporation's Articles of Organization are within the exclusive power of the board of directors.

# 8.2 Review of Fund Requests.

The board of directors shall review all written requests for funds from other organizations, but shall require that such requests specify the use to which the funds will be put, and, if the board of directors approves the request, shall authorize the payment of the funds to the approved grantee.

#### 8.3 Periodic Review.

The board of directors shall require that the grantees furnish a periodic accounting to show that the funds were expended for the purpose approved by the board of directors.

#### 8.4 Discretion to Refuse.

The board of directors may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to make any grants or contributions or otherwise render financial assistance for any or all purposes for which funds were requested.

#### 8.5 Control of Funds.

After the board of directors has approved a grant to a foreign organization for a specific project or purpose, the corporation may solicit funds for the grant to the specifically approved project or purpose of the other organization; at all times, however, the board of directors has the right to withdraw approval of the grant and to use the funds for other charitable, scientific, or educational purposes.

# 8.6 Anti-Terrorism Laws.

No contributions will be made to organizations identified under Executive Order 13224 or subject to the Office of Foreign Asset Control sanctions under other listed-based programs.

## Section IX. EXECUTION OF PAPERS

Except as the directors may generally or in particular cases authorize otherwise, all deeds, leases, transfers, contracts, bonds, notes, checks, drafts and other obligations made, accepted or endorsed by the corporation shall be signed by the president, a vice president or the treasurer.

Any recordable instrument purporting to affect an interest in real estate, executed in the name of the corporation by the president or a vice president and the treasurer or an assistant treasurer (who may be one and the same person), shall be binding on the corporation in favor of any purchaser or other person relying in good faith on such instrument, notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of the Articles of Organization, By-laws, resolutions or votes of the corporation.

# Section X. COMPENSATION

Directors shall be entitled to receive for their services such amount, if any, as the directors may determine, which may include expenses of attendance at meetings. Subject to the Articles of Organization and to Section X below, directors shall not be precluded from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation for any such services.

# Section XI. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Subject to the Articles of Organization and any applicable law, the directors shall adopt a conflict of interest policy covering the corporation's directors, officers, and such staff as may be specified in the policy.

# **Section XII. AMENDMENT**

These By-laws may be altered, amended or repealed, in whole or in part, by vote of a majority of the directors present and voting at any meeting, the notice of which contains a statement of the proposed alterations or amendments.
