Research - In this age of scientific promise, federal funds for cancer research are declining Fulfilling the promise of today's advances relies on funding for research projects and support for investigators who wish to pursue a career in clinical and translational cancer research Without continued, well-targeted research, there would be no meaningful progress As a charitable organization, The ASCO Cancer Foundation (TACF) supports progress by funding cancer researchers at all stages of their careers, enabling oncology's best and brightest to pursue promising research Each year, TACF funds and awards multiple research grants designed to help attract and retain the best scientific minds in cancer research and to support their efforts Highlights of 2009 research activities and accomplishments include Advanced Clinical Research Award (ACRA)-\$1,000,000 in funding provided two (2) three-year awards intended to fund investigators who are committed to a clinical cancer study and who wish to conduct original research currently not funded Translational Research Professorship Award(TRPA)-\$550,000 in funding provided a five-year award designed to provide flexible funding to outstanding translational researchers who have made, and are continuing to make, significant contributions that have changed the direction of cancer research, and who provide mentorship to future translational researchers Career Development Award (CDA)- \$2,500,000 in funding provided twelve (12)three-year awards intended to support clinical research of clinical investigators who have received their initial faculty appointment and are establishing an independent clinical cancer research program Young Investigator Award (YIA)-\$3,600,000 in funding provided fifty-five (55)one-year awards designed to encourage and promote high-quality research in clinical oncology by providing funds to promising investigators during the transition from a fellowship program to a faculty appointment Gianni Bonadonna Breast Cancer Research Fellowship -\$50,000 in funding provided a one-year fellowship that enables an early-career investigator to undertake a breast cancer project under the mentorship of the Gianni Bonadonna Breast Award RecipientClinical Trials Participation Award (CTPA)-\$27,000 in funding provided a program that publicly honors oncology practices and institutions that actively participate in clinical trials research This program is designed to encourage oncology practices that currently participate in clinical trials to increase their accrual rates in order to support cancer research and advances Ment Awards- \$301,500 provided funding for the Bradley Stuart Beller Ment Award along with 175 Ment awards which promote clinical research by young scientists and provide fellows with an opportunity to present their research and interact with other clinical cancer investigators at ASCO scientific meetings and disease-specific symposia A select number of TACF Merit Awards were given out to recognize outstanding abstracts submitted for presentation consideration at different ASCO scientific meetings The ASCO Cancer Foundation also raised funds for a number of awards provided by ASCO in order to recognize and encourage individuals or organizations that have made significant contributions to ASCO, the practice of clinical oncology, and cancer patients Highlights of awards supported by the Foundation in 2009 included Gianni Bonadonna Breast Cancer Award and Lecture- This award recognized an active clinical or translational researcher with a distinguished record of accomplishments in advancing the field of breast cancer as well as exceptional mentoring abilities The Award winner gave a lecture during the Breast Cancer Symposium

Professional EducationThe field of oncology is a dynamic arena where developments and discoveries occur nearly every day Staying abreast of these developments is critical in allowing cancer physicians and other healthcare professionals to provide each person with cancer the best treatment options available Through its support of the educational and scientific programs of its non-profit, charitable, related organization, the American Society of Clinical Oncology, the Foundation provides educational and scientific opportunities for oncologists and other healthcare professionals from around the globe To ensure that the highest-quality cancer education continues to be available to doctors in an independent and unbiased forum, funds from the Foundation are used to support ASCO's comprehensive scientific and educational programs that provide the latest data to cancer doctors and other healthcare professionals worldwide through both live meetings and print and electronic education offerings Highlights of the professional educational and scientific meetings supported by the Foundation and presented to the public in 2009 include * The 2009 Annual Meeting featured over 250 educational and scientific sessions Over 4,000 abstracts were presented or published Over 1,000 presentations were captured in audio and video to be made available electronically The ASCO Annual Meeting is the world's premier scientific and educational event in the oncology community It is structured as a series of educational and scientific sessions in disease-specific or oncology-related topics * GI Symposium - The Gastrointestinal Cancers Symposium is an annual three-day scientific and educational meeting on new advances in the prevention, screening and treatment of gastrointestinal cancers The meeting is co-sponsored by ASCO, the American Gastroenterological Association Institute, the American Society for Radiation Oncology, and the Society of Surgical Oncology * GU Symposium - The annual Genitourinary Cancers Symposium offers educational sessions and abstract oral and poster presentations focused on cancers of the testis, bladder, kidney and prostate organs The 2009 GU Symposium was co-sponsored by ASCO, the American Society for Radiation Oncology, and the Society of Urologic Oncology * Breast Cancer Symposium - The Breast Cancer Symposium features presentations on the latest multidisciplinary research from selected, theme-based translational and clinical abstracts, as well as related educational sessions The meeting is co-sponsored by ASCO, the American Society of Breast Disease, The American Society of Breast Surgeons, the American Society for Radiation Oncology, the National Consortium of Breast Centers, Inc , the Society of Surgical Oncology and has as its primary supporter Susan G Komen for the Cure * ASCO/COG Symposium - Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease among children in the U S between infancy and 15 years of age By addressing the ethical and practical challenges in drug discovery and development for children with cancer, the 2009 ASCO-Children's Oncology Group Symposium aimed to narrow competency gaps in efforts to improve pediatric patient care and outcomes The 2009 ASCO-Children's Oncology Group Symposium centered on 21st Century Challenges to Pediatric Oncology Drug Improvement * Best of ASCO Atlanta & Los Angeles - The Best of ASCO Meetings deliver highlights from the ASCO Annual Meeting in local settings A panel of ASCO experts selects abstracts from the ASCO Annual Meeting to create the Best of ASCO Meeting program * ASCO/AACR Methods Workshop - This intensive workshop, in partnership with the American Association of Cancer Research, brings together clinical fellows and junior faculty clinical researchers in all oncology subspecialties to learn about the essentials of effective clinical trial designs of therapeutic interventions in the treatment of cancer Print and Electronic Education Highlights of print and electronic education materials supported by the Foundation and available to the public in 2009 include Proceedings - The Proceedings publications for the ASCO Annual Meeting and select ASCO Thematic Symposia contain all the abstracts selected for presentation at the live educational meeting and allows those not able to attend access to the ground-breaking abstracts that were presented Educational Books -The Annual Meeting Educational Book contains manuscripts written by the faculty of the ASCO Annual Meeting's educational program Over 100 original manuscripts representing over 65 total sessions are captured in the Educational Books Abstracts on ASCO org - Quality and Access to CareAdvances in cancer care are occurring more and more frequently Yet, the full promise of such progress cannot be realized until high-quality cancer care is available to everyone The ASCO Cancer Foundation is aware of the divide between those with access to the fruits of research and timely care, and those without Programs related to quality and access to care supported by the Foundation in 2009 include State/Regional Affiliate ProgramThe ASCO State/Regional Affiliate Program provides guidance to community oncologists at the local level on the ever-changing healthcare environment and is designed to enhance their educational activities State Affiliate Grant ProgramASCO created the State Affiliate Grant Program to provide financial support to its separately incorporated State/Regional Affiliates as they seek to enhance the scope of their non-profit activities All 48 Affiliates were eligible to apply for a grant In 2009, TACF provided funding to ASCO to award five Affiliates grants of \$10,000 to engage in projects that will have an overall benefit to their members, ASCO members, other state societies, and the general oncology community Diversity in Oncology InitiativeThe ASCO Cancer Foundation Awards Program offers or provides funding for different types of award opportunities for oncology fellows, clinical practices, and international researchers One of the programs offered through The ASCO Cancer Foundation is the ASCO Diversity in Oncology Initiative, funded by Susan G Komen for the Cure The ASCO Diversity in Oncology Initiative was structured to facilitate the recruitment and retention of individuals from populations underrepresented in medicine to cancer careers, with particular attention to the development of clinical practitioners and investigators Beginning in 2009, \$71,165 in funding was provided to three programs for individuals interested or currently practicing in the oncology field Loan Repayment Program Medical Student Rotation Resident Travel Award Although a number of programs exist to recruit individuals underrepresented in medicine, few of these programs focus specifically on recruitment to clinical oncology Ultimately, it is hoped that increasing diversity in the clinical oncology profession will lead to increased and improved cancer care for underserved populations as well as increased research on health disparities The Diversity in Oncology Initiative is part of the Susan G Komen for the Cure/ASCO Quality of Care Initiative, which is designed to support specific projects addressing quality cancer care issues, including cancer workforce, access to care, disparities, clinical trials, and survivorship, with general applicability to breast cancer

Patient Education and InformationWell-informed, educated patients are their own best advocates, as well as invaluable partners for doctors TACF supports both doctors and patients by funding accurate, doctor-approved cancer information, which is available publicly both in print and online, to provide trusted, authoritative information to people living with cancer and those who care for and about them Funding in this area allows the Foundation to continue and expand our work to inform patients Highlights of patient education and information programs and activities supported by TACF in 2009 include Patient Advocate Scholarship ProgramThe Patient Advocate Scholarship Program provides travel grants to a select number of patient advocates to attend the ASCO Annual Meeting and ASCO thematic meetings In 2009, TACF supported the attendance of patient advocates at the 2009 ASCO Annual Meeting and ASCO thematic meetings Cancer Net includes peer-reviewed information on more than 120 cancers and cancer-related syndromes, as well as content on caregiving, coping strategies, clinical trials, managing side effects, and survivorship, and finding an oncologist Information is delivered in written articles, videos, and audio podcasts This information is made available free to the public In 2009, there were more than 5,750,000 page views of Cancer Net -TACF continues to support the production of ASCO's printed patient information materials, such as Cancer Advances Summaries of research advances in clinical oncology from the Journal of Clinical Oncology, ASCO's Annual Meetings, and ASCO's Symposia Cancer News and Meetings Find information on ASCO's clinical cancer advances report, ASCO's annual meetings and symposia, and perspectives on breaking scientific findings ASCO Cancer Education Slides Prepared cancer slide presentations, adapted from select Cancer Net guides to cancer, are available for free download for oncologists, oncology nurses, and other members of the health care team Cancer Net en Espanol A growing amount of Cancer Net's information is being translated into Spanish, including 25 guides to cancer, information on managing Patient Guides Patient Guides are printed booklets containing comprehensive cancer information, including an overview of specific cancer types, symptoms, diagnosis, staging, treatment, clinical trials, and after treatment International ProgramsASCO and The ASCO Cancer Foundation share an international mission to engage the physician and healthcare professional community on a global scale to improve care to cancer patients and enhance the exchange of knowledge to facilitate advances in the care of people with cancer everywhere TACF funds support international programs including education, fellowship and grant opportunities to enable oncologists from opposite ends of the world to share ideas and build lasting collaborations that can enhance patient care locally and globally TACF supports these programs through its international program mission as well as through TACF's other mission areas (Research, Professional Education, Patient Education and Information and Quality of and Access to Care) TACF funds specifically supporting international activities include International Development and Education Award (IDEA)The ASCO Cancer Foundation International Development and Education Award provides support for oncologists in developing countries to participate in the ASCO Annual Meeting and visit a cancer center in the United States or Canada This award was designed to provide continuing medical education, assist in career development and help to establish strong relationships with leading ASCO members who serve as scientific mentors to each recipient Advanced Cancer Courses (ACC)The Advanced Cancer Courses are carefully designed to fill the need for advanced learning for international oncologists These courses can be chosen from ASCO's portfolio of educational products, or developed with the collaboration of volunteer oncologists
