This time last year, we were seeing a record-breaking increase in the number of people in Cook County who needed food. Although much has changed in a year, the need continues to grow. More and more people are turning to the Food Depository's network of 600 soup kitchens, food pantries, and shelters. In fact, in September 2009, there were 427,600 visits to our member food pantriesmaking it the busiest month in our organization's thirty-year history. This is 26 percent ahead of last year's pace in pantry visits, and 70 percent ahead of the pace of two years ago.

With your support, we can continue to provide food for hungry people while striving to end hunger in our community. Because of you, we will serve more meals to children through our Kids Cafes. We will pack our Mobile Pantries with staple items such as rice, meat and fresh produce, and drive them to priority communities on nights and weekends. We will continue to alleviate the root cause of hunger through increased SNAP Outreach efforts that can provide qualifying individuals and families with additional nutritious food.


