AMENDED AND RESTATED BY-LAWS
OF
STATE FARM COMPANIES FOUNDATION

(as amended and restated through April 7, 2010)

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of the corporation is STATE FARM COMPANIES FOUNDATION.

ARTICLE II

Offices

The Corporation shall maintain its principal offices as 1 State Farm Plaza, Bloomington, McLean County, Illinois, and such other offices at such other places as the purposes of the Corporation require. The registered office shall be the principal office or such other place within the State of Illinois as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine or the activities of the Corporation may require.

ARTICLE III

Corporate Seal

The corporate seal shall be a circle inscribed, "STATE FARM COMPANIES FOUNDATION, ILLINOIS, CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE IV

Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Corporation shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE V

Members

1. Election. The members of the Corporation shall be the persons signing the Articles of Incorporation and such other persons or corporations as a majority of the members shall elect at any annual or special meeting of the members.

2. Termination. Membership shall terminate upon death, written resignation delivered to the Secretary of the Corporation, or upon the affirmative vote of the majority of the members.

3. Rights of Members. Each member shall be entitled to one vote upon any question submitted to the members. No member shall be entitled to any funds, property or assets of the Corporation during the term of his, her or its membership, or upon his, her or its resignation, neither shall he, she or it be entitled to share in the distribution of the corporate assets upon dissolution of the Corporation.

4. Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the members shall be held in the spring at such time and place as may be fixed by the Board of Directors for the purpose of electing directors and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting.

5. Special Meeting. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the Chairman of the Board, or by the President, or by any two directors of the Corporation, or by the Secretary upon the written request of not less than one-third of the members entitled to vote.

6. Notice of Meeting. Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting, and, in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than five nor more than sixty days, or in the case of a removal or one or more of the Directors, a merger, consolidation, dissolution or sale, lease or exchange of assets, not less than twenty nor more than sixty days, before the date of the meeting by or at the direction of the Chairman of the Board, the President, the Secretary, or the officers or persons calling the meeting, to each member entitled to vote at the meeting. Delivery shall be made personally, by first class mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the person at his, her or its address as it appears on the records of the Corporation, or by electronic transmission to the e-mail address, facsimile number or other contact information appearing in the records of the Corporation. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the U.S. Mail. If sent by electronic transmission, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered upon transmittal of such notice by the sender.

7. Quorum. A majority of the members of the Corporation entitled to vote represented in person or by proxy shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the members. If less than a majority of the members of the Corporation are represented at a meeting, a majority of the members so represented may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice. At any meeting or adjourned meeting, at which a quorum shall be present or represented, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified. The members present at a duly organized

meeting may continue to transact business until adjournment notwithstanding withdrawal of enough members to leave less than a quorum.

8. Place of Meeting. All meetings of the members shall be held at the principal offices of the Corporation at 1 State Farm Plaza, Bloomington, Illinois; provided the Board of Directors may designate any other place, either within or without the State of Illinois, as the place for the holding of any annual or special meeting of the members.

9. Telephonic or Interactive Technology. Members may participate in any meeting through the use of a conference telephone or interactive technology, including but not limited to electronic transmission, Internet usage or remote communication, by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can communicate with each other. Participation in such meeting shall constitute attendance and presence in person at the meeting of the person or persons so participating.

10. Proxies. At all meeting of members, a member may vote either in person or by proxy executed in writing by the member or his duly authorized attorney-in-fact and filed with the Secretary of the Corporation before or at the time of the meeting. No proxy shall be valid for more than eleven months after the date of its execution.

11. Voting List. The members entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of the members of the Corporation shall be those persons or corporations whose names appear on the records of the Corporation as members thereof on the date of issuance or notice of such meeting.

ARTICLE VI

Directors

1. Election. The affairs of the Corporation shall be managed by a board of directors elected by the members of the Corporation; such elections shall be held at the annual meetings of the members. Directors need not be residents of the State of Illinois nor members of the Corporation.

2. Number. The number of the directors of the corporation shall be not less than three nor more than eight.

3. Classes and Terms. The directors named in the Articles of Incorporation shall serve as Directors until the annual meeting of the members to be held on the second Monday in March in the year 1964, at which meeting directors shall be classified with

respect to the time for which they shall severally hold office by dividing them into two classes; the first class shall consist of three directors, each of whom shall serve for a term of two years; and the second class shall consist of two directors, each of whom shall serve for a term of one year; and at each annual meeting of the members thereafter directors shall be elected for a term of two years to succeed the directors whose terms then expire. All directors of the corporation shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

4. Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors and any directorship to be filled by reason of an increase in the number of directors may be filled by the Board of Directors, and such vacancy or directorship so created shall be filled until the next annual meeting of the members. In the event the number of directorships is decreased by amendment of the By-Laws adopted by the Board of Directors, each director then in office shall serve until his or her term expires or until his or her resignation or removal as herein provided.

5. Resignation. Any director may resign at any time by delivering written notice thereof to the Chairman of the Board of Directors or to the President of the Corporation. A resignation is effective when the notice is delivered unless the notice specifies a future date.

6. Removal. Any director may be removed at any time on the unanimous vote of the members of the Corporation. In the event a director shall also be a member of the Corporation he or she shall not be entitled to vote on any proposition affecting his removal.

7. Meetings The meetings of the Board of Directors, regular or special, shall be held at the principal offices of the Corporation at 1 State Farm Plaza, Bloomington, Illinois, or at such other place, within or without the State of Illinois, as the directors may appoint. The regular annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held without notice in the same place as and immediately following the annual meeting of the members of the corporation; other regular and special meetings shall be held at the call of the Chairman of the Board or the President of the Corporation.

8. Notice of Meetings. Written notice stating the place, date and hour of any meeting, except the annual meeting of the directors which shall be held without notice in the same place as and immediately following the annual meeting of the members of the Corporation, shall be delivered not less than five nor more than forty days before the date of the meeting. Delivery shall be made personally, first class mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the person at his, her or its address as it appears on the records of the corporation, by electronic transmission to the e-mail address, facsimile number or other contact information appearing on the records of the corporation. If mailed, such notice

shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail. . If sent by electronic transmission, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered upon transmittal of such notice by the sender. Attendance of a director at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting unless a director attends with the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because such meeting was not lawfully called or convened. Neither the business to be transacted nor the purpose of any meeting, regular or special, of the Board of Directors need be specified in the notice or wavier of notice of such meeting.

9. Telephonic or Interactive Technology. Directors or nondirector committee members may participate in and act at any meeting of the Board or committee through the use of a conference telephone or other communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can communicate with each other. Participation in such meeting shall constitute attendance and presence in person at the meeting of the person or persons so participating.

10. Quorum. A majority of the whole Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum, and the acts of a majority of the directors present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be acts of the Board of Directors.

11. Committees. The Board of Directors, by resolution adopted by a majority of the directors in office, may designate and appoint one or more committees, each of which shall consist of two or more directors, which committees, to the extent provided in such resolution, shall have and exercise the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of the Corporation, except that such committees shall not have the authority of the Board of Directors in reference to the following: (1) adopting, amending, or repealing the By-Laws or the Articles of Incorporation; (2) filling vacancies on the board or any of its committees; (3) electing, appointing or removing any officer or director or member of any committee, or fixing the compensation of any member of a committee; (4) adopting a plan of merger or consolidation with another corporation; (5) authorizing the sale, lease, exchange or mortgage of all or substantially all of the property and assets of the Corporation; (6) authorize the voluntary dissolution of the Corporation or revoking proceedings therefor; (7) adopting a plan for the distribution of the assets of the Corporation; or (8) amending, altering or repealing any resolution of the Board of Directors which by its terms provides that it shall not be amended, altered or repealed by such committee.

The designation and appointment of any such committees and the delegation thereto of authority shall not operate to relieve the Board of Directors, or any individual director, of any responsibility imposed upon it or him by law.

The Board of Directors by resolution, adopted by a majority of the directors present at a meeting, at which a quorum is present, may designate and appoint other committees not having the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of the Corporation and consigning of at least one director and such other persons as may be appropriate.

12. Compensation. Directors shall not receive any salary for services as such, but by resolution adopted by the Board, the expense of attendance at each regular or special meeting of the Board may be allowed to each director. The Board of Directors shall have power in its discretion to contract for and pay any director rendering unusual or exceptional services to the Corporation special compensation appropriate to the value for such services and to pay the expenses of any director incurred in performing any special duty assigned to that director by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Informal Action by Members or Directors.

Any action required by the By-Laws of this Corporation, or by the General Not For Profit Corporation Act of the State of Illinois to be taken at a meeting of the members or directors of the Corporation, or any other action which may be taken at a meeting of the members or directors of the Corporation may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing setting forth the action to be taken has been signed by all of the members entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof or all of the directors, as the case may be; such consent shall have the force and effect as a unanimous vote and may be stated as such. The action taken shall be effective when all the members or all the directors, as the case may be, have approved the consent unless the consent specifies a different effective date.

ARTICLE VIII

Officers

1. The officers of the Corporation shall be a Chairman of the Board, a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers and assistant officers as the Board of Directors may provide and appoint. Each officer shall be appointed annually by the Board of Directors; provided, however, the Board may, in the event it deems necessary, contract for the employment of officers for terms not to exceed three years, but any such contract shall be terminable at the pleasure of the Board of Directors. Any two or more offices, except President and Secretary may be held by the same person.

2. The Chairman of the Board shall be elected by the Board of Directors from their own number and shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors and of the members of the Corporation at which he or she is present. The Chairman of the Board shall have such other powers and duties as may from time to time be conferred by the Board of Directors.

3. The President shall be chief executive officer of the Corporation and in the recess of the Board of Directors shall have the general control and management of its operations and affairs subject to the right of the Board of Directors to delegate any specific powers to any other officer or officers of the Corporation. The President shall preside at all meetings of the members and the Board of Directors in the absence of the Chairman of the Board.

4. The Vice President shall perform such duties as may be specifically designated by the President and the Board of Directors, and in the absence of the President perform the duties and exercise the authority of the President.

5. The Secretary shall have custody and control of the books, documents and records of the Corporation and the corporate seal. He or she shall perform all duties incident to the office of secretary, record the minutes of meetings of the members, and directors and of committees with authority of the directors, and perform such other specific duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors.

6. The Treasurer shall keep an account of all property and funds of the Corporation received and disbursed, and shall deposit all money and property in the name of and to the credit of the Corporation in such banks or other depositories as the directors may designate. All checks of the disbursement of monies of the Corporation shall be signed by the Treasurer and such other officer or employee as the Board shall from time to time designate. The Treasurer shall in general perform all the duties incident to the office of Treasurer, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

7. Salaries of all officers shall be fixed by the Board of Directors.

8. Removal. Any officer may be removed by the affirmative vote of the majority of the Board of Directors then in office whenever in their judgment the best interest of the Corporation will be served thereby.

ARTICLE IX

Indemnification

The Corporation may indemnify any person who was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative (other than an action by or in the right of the Corporation) by reason of the fact that he or she is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by such person in connection with such action, suit or proceeding, if such person acted in good faith and in a manner he or she reasonably believed to be in, or not opposed to, the best interests of the Corporation, and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, had no reasonable cause to believe his or her conduct was unlawful. The termination of any action, suit or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction, or upon a plea of nolo contendere or its equivalent, shall not, of itself, create a presumption that the person did not act in good faith and in a manner which he or she reasonably believes to be, in or not opposed to, the best interests of the Corporation, or with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, that the person had reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was unlawful.

The Corporation may indemnify any person who was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action or suit by or in the right of the Corporation to procure a judgment in its favor by reason of the fact that such person is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation against expenses (including attorneys' fees) actually and reasonably incurred by such person in connection with the defense or settlement of such action or suit, if such person acted in good faith and in a manner he or she reasonably believed to be in, or not opposed to, the best interests of the Corporation, provided that no indemnification shall be made in respect of any claim, issue or matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his or her duty to the Corporation, unless, and only to the extent that the court in which such action or suit was brought shall determine upon application that, despite the adjudication of liability, but in view of all the circumstances of the case, such person is fairly and reasonably entitled to indemnity for such expenses as the court shall deem proper.

To the extent that a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation has been successful, on the merits or otherwise, in the defense of any action, suit or proceeding referred to in the foregoing paragraphs of this Article, or in defense of any claim, issue or matter therein, such person shall be indemnified against expenses (including attorneys' fees) actually and reasonably incurred by such person in connection therewith.

Any indemnification under this Article (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation only as authorized in the specific case, upon a determination that indemnification of the director, officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances. Such determination shall be made (i) by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of Directors who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding, (ii)

if such a quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable, a quorum of disinterested directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in a written opinion, or (iii) by the members entitled to vote.

Expenses incurred in defending a civil or criminal action, suit or proceeding may be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding, as authorized by the Board of Directors in the specific case, upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the director, officer, employee or agent to repay such amount, unless it shall ultimately be determined that he or she is entitled to be indemnified by the Corporation as authorized in this Article. The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled. If the Corporation has paid indemnity or has advanced expenses under this Article, the Corporation shall report the indemnification or advance in writing to the members entitled to vote with or before the notice of the next meeting of such members.

The Corporation may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a Director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation against any liability asserted against such person and incurred by such person in any such capacity, or arising out of his or her status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify such person against such liability under the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE X

Books and Records

The Corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of account; it shall also keep minutes of the proceedings of its members, Board of Directors and committees having any of the authority of the Board of Directors; and it shall keep at its principal office a record giving the names and addresses of its members entitled to vote. All books and records of the Corporation may be inspected by any member, or his agent or attorney, for any proper purpose at any reasonable time.

ARTICLE XI

Restrictions

The Corporation shall not have or issue shares of stock. No dividends shall be paid and no part of the income of the Corporation shall be distributed or inured to the benefit of nor be loaned to its members, directors or officers; provided, however, that the Corporation may pay compensation and expenses in a reasonable amount to directors, as heretofore provided, and to members and officers for services rendered.

No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall involve carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation nor shall the Corporation participate in or intervene in any political campaign including the publication or distribution of statements for or on behalf of any candidate for public office. No part of the income, principal or net earnings the Corporation shall be contributed to corporations, net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual or any corporation a substantial part of which corporation's activities involve carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation or which corporation participates in, or intervenes in any political campaign, including the publication or distribution of statements, on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Upon dissolution of the Corporation all assets shall be distributed in a manner consistent with the purposes of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII

Conduct of Meetings

All meetings of the members of the Corporation and the Board of Directors shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order, to the extent they are not inconsistent with these By-Laws.

ARTICLE XIII

Amendments

The Board of Directors of the Corporation shall have the power to alter, amend or repeal the By-Laws or to adopt new By-Laws.
