Students learn from each other and the police officers and they build positive relationships among their peers, as well as form an encouraging, mentoring relationship with a member of law enforcement. The police officers volunteer their time in the program to serve as mentors and role models, and occasionally invite guest speakers and resources from outside agencies to attend the meetings. PAL has hired a clinical social worker as a consultant to the program on a part time basis. The social worker supports the volunteers and provides occasional training on youth and youth development. Police volunteers, the social worker, and PAL staff refer participants to after school programs at community organizations and work with families to identify other resources as needed. Youth in the BreakfastLunch Club enroll in PAL's summer camps, participate in workshops on leadership and decision-making skills, and attend events and field trips. The trips are structured to foster civic engagement, allow youth to experience aspects of Boston beyond the school setting, and expose them to new cultural information and ideas. They provide a vehicle for students to interact with one another and their mentors outside of the typical lunch hour. The first year of Y QOI will be the foundation year, on which the successive years will build. Beginning September 2009, Center on Halsted will work with nonprofit community partners (shelter Action Coalition (LAC) and Youth Housing Task Force (YHTF)) to train a core group of 15 youth organizers. Youth will meet once per week for four to six hours. There will be two weekly groups: one for the homeless youth who attend the morning breakfast club, and one for the youth who come to the afterschool drop-in program. The first quarter of year one will focus on: a) effective community engagement and organizing techniques; b) identifying key community and social issues affecting their lives; and, c) research historical data and current affairs of identified issues. The second quarter of year one, trained youth will: a) identify at least 12 community stakeholders; b) contact stakeholders and arrange issue meetings; c) prepare agendas, goals, and expected outcomes for each stakeholder; and, d) meet with each respective stakeholder. Year one, quarter three will be two-fold. First, creating a goal-oriented action plan of clear and delineated tactics and strategies to make progression towards lasting social and community change. Second, engaging more youth in community organizing. The 15 youth who have been trained, will provide peer-based outreach to other 50 other Center on Halsted youth, as well as youth in other Lakeview youth service organizations, educate them on the identified issue, train them on community organizing techniques, and engage them in the action plan. The first quarter of year one will focus on implementation of the action plan. The youth will organize and engage community partners and stakeholders to effectively implement the tactics and strategies set out in the action plan. The second year, youth organizers will: a) Continue the implementation of their action plan; b) engage 50 more youth in Y-QOI through peer-based training; c) and provide youth-led community change. At the end of the second year, youth with support of COH, YHTF and LAC will evaluate their movement along their strategic action plan including: goal attainment and community organizing effectiveness. Based on the outcomes of the community organizing evaluation, youth will then decide the next steps for Y QOI. Next steps could include: a) continuing with the strategic action plan as created; b) strengthening and expanding community organizing efforts; c) or selecting a new community issue. Regardless of the action steps decided, first and second year youth will outreach to, train and engage an additional 50 youth organizers. Y-QOI is a dynamic leadership development program, through which the skills that have been nurtured in the COH leadership program will put into action in our community. Y QOI youth will gain not only the soft and hard skills of leadership development and community organizing, but an empowered sense of esteem and self-worth in seeing their ideas, talents and work translated into social change. Without Comcast support, the Y QOI project, as part of our overall youth program, will continue, however it will not have a sustainable infrastructure on which to build in successive years. These infrastructure costs ensure that our youth are properly trained, skilled and equipped to tackle their social issues. We will work with the Boys & Girls Club to develop additional partnerships with schools and other community organizations. We will recruit Council members from schools youth programs and general publicity. Interested youth will complete an application and an interview process. Training to selected members includes an orientation followed by ongoing training. Youth on the council will learn and apply the following civic leadership skills: meeting facilitation public speaking assessing community needs project planning ability to work with diverse individuals and groups and running a mini-grants process. The Council typically meets weekly for 1-1.5 hours with additional time involved planning for and participating in various Council projects. Each Council member has the opportunity to lead at least one meeting. Early in the Council year members assess community needs to determine which issues they will address. This will include holding a Youth Adult Connections session to get youth and adults working together to identify and solve problems facing youth. The Council then organizes volunteer service projects to address the identified needs. Examples of projects from other SCI Youth Councils include a "Don't Spot the Dot" campaign to reduce litter in Dorchester and a Harmony Among Lynn Teens conference to address youth violence. This program meets on a monthly basis at UNO's newest flagship campus, the Veterans Memorial Charter Campus in Archer Heights, an Chicago's southwest side. The program is facilitated by UNO management-including the Chief Executive Officer, and is directly overseen by the Director of Outreach and Leadership Development.
