from James R. Donnell to the Rucker Donnell foundation. The property is currently listed

TAX ANALYSIS

The 105.46 acre tract is currently identified in the Rutherford County Tennessee Property Assessors Office as Map 123, Parcel 2.00. According to the property record card the site is appraised for a total of \$494,600. The property is located outside the city limits of Murfreesboro in western Rutherford County. The current tax rate for Rutherford County is \$2.74 per \$100 of assessed value. Tennessee law requires that all residential and agricultural property be taxed on 25% of its local tax assessor's appraised value for real property. Therefore, the total 2009 real estate tax liability for the 105.46 acre site is $$494,600 \times 25\%/100 \times 2.74) \$3,388. The new tax rate will be set July, 2010.

The subject property is currently under "Greenbelt Regulations" which allows a significant reduction in taxes if the property exceeds 15 acres and is under active cultivation. Under the greenbelt the subject property is appraised at \$141,500 and the current tax liability is $(141,500 \times 25\%/100 \times \$2.74)$ \$969.28

AREA ANALYSIS

The locale of the property under study is Rutherford County, the City of Murfreesboro and the area that surrounds the city. The major cities in the county are Lavergne, Smyrna and Murfreesboro, the County Seat.

It should be noted that these three cities are located within a seven-mile northwest/southeast corridor of one another, and have somewhat of a shared economic base for business and industry. Two major transportation routes connect the three via Federal Highway 41/70S and Interstate 24.

The largest private employers in Rutherford County, in addition to Nissan, consist of Bridgestone, the VA Hospital, Ingram Publishing, and Middle Tennessee State University. These four employ over 5,000 workers.

The City of Murfreesboro is located southeast of Nashville, approximately 30 miles, and is the county seat of Rutherford County. It is the site of Middle Tennessee State University, and the campus is located on the easterly side of the city Rutherford County is one of the seven counties that, along with Davidson County, form the Nashville MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area).

The city is served by several highways, the principal one of which is Interstate 24, passing to the south of the city. It is also served by U.S. Highways 41, 231, and 70. Interstate 840, running east/west through Rutherford County, between Murfreesboro and Smyrna, links I-40 East, I-24, I-65 South, and I-40 West.

The economy of Murfreesboro is extremely well diversified. The city has to date been very successful in attracting new industry. It is known as the dairy center of the state Manufacturing is a major component of the economy. A breakdown of employment for

Murfreesboro and Rutherford County residents, published by the Rutherford County Chamber of Commerce, is: manufacturing-38%; service industries-19%; wholesale and retail trade- 17%; government- 15%; and other- 11%.

An industrial park is located adjacent to Interstate 24 and within the city limits of Murfreesboro. Several warehouse buildings have just been completed and occupied. Another major employer in the city is the Veterans Administration Hospital located on the north side of town. As mentioned previously, Middle Tennessee State University is located on the easterly boundary of the city.

No discussion of the area would be complete without mention of Middle Tennessee State University, which is located to the east of the subject property. Middle Tennessee State University is a four-year public university with a current enrollment of 25,000± students. MTSU is the fastest growing university in the state system and this trend is expected to continue. Numerous buildings have either recently been constructed or are slated for development in the near future. These include a new recreation facility, nursing building and mass communications building, library and the new business/aerospace building.

The sharp rise in retail development by the national chains in the area is indicative of Rutherford County's economic strength and viability in the marketplace. Murfreesboro Town Centre is another retail center that is anchored by a 121,705 SF Target Store and the entire development will has 407,000 SF of retail space. The development cost around \$30,000,000. The development opened in July of 1998. Further, Middle Tennessee

Medical Center has built a 79,800 SF ambulatory surgery, medical office, and comprehensive cancer center at the corner of Bell Street and North Highland Avenue The cost of this construction was approximately \$10,000,000. Currently, a new hospital is under construction in the Medical Center Parkway area.

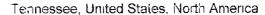
The Avenues is a new shopping mall recently opened and includes about 900,000 SF of retail space. In addition, the Stones River Mall is currently undergoing a \$53,000,000 expansion. Coupled with this building activity, the property valuations from the Rutherford County Tax Assessor's Office indicate value increases every year since 1974 In addition, state and local sales tax has increased every year since 1981.

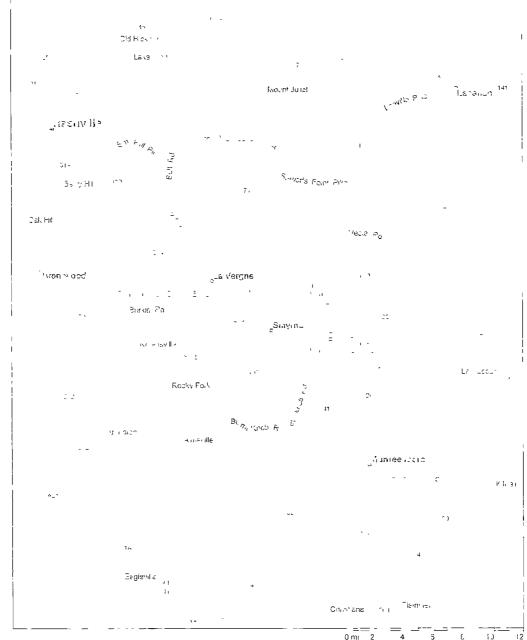
Rutherford County - Summary

In summary, the Murfreesboro and Rutherford County market is considered to represent a stable, average to middle class economy, generally growing at a stable rate in terms of populations and income. The economy is relatively stable and diverse, especially with the interjection of the Nissan Plant, which is a strong positive factor. Middle Tennessee State University (along with several other employers) is expanding, further enhancing the growth potential. An additional point to consider is that the substantial growth in income levels also has important implications for the whole spectrum of real estate values within the community. The increasing affluence of the local population eventually filters back to

the purchase of additional goods and services to the enhancement of general property values and retail sales

The area is well located between Nashville and Chattanooga, with growth projected to increase into the future, including expansion of both the industrial and population basis. The area is well served by interstate transportation, which provides an excellent central location for continued industrial and employment expansion. The area has taken a progressive attitude in regard to growth and accommodations to large potential employers, indicating that the area is fertile for industrial development and expansion. Transportation arteries have been improved and the future for Murfreesboro appears positive. These factors, all acting in concert, provide growth impetus to the urban area, along with the major development incentives. The combination of these factors support the premise that Murfreesboro and Rutherford County is a reasonable area for real estate investment due to stability and continued growth over the long term.

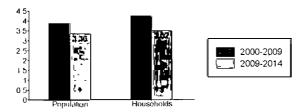

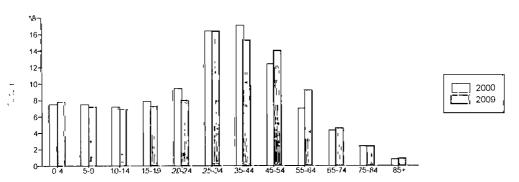

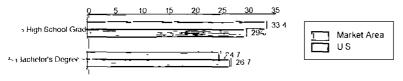

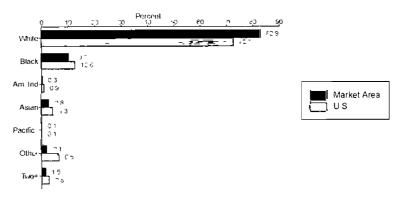

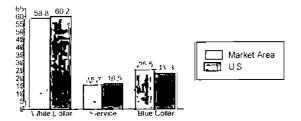

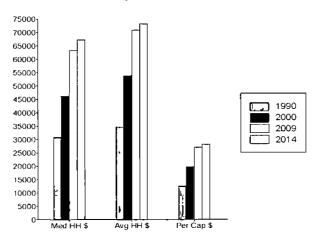

NEIGHBORHOOD DATA AND ANALYSIS

The locale of the property under study is in the western part of Rutherford County The four major cities in the county are Murfreesboro, LaVergne, Eagleville and Smyrna

For purposes of this report, the term "neighborhood" is defined as follows

"A portion of a larger community, or an entire community in which there is homogeneous grouping of inhabitants, buildings, or business enterprises. Inhabitants of a neighborhood usually have a more than casual community interest and a similarity of economic level or cultural background. Neighborhood boundaries may consist of well defined natural and manmade barriers, or they may be more or less well defined by a distinct change in land use or in the character of the inhabitants."

Although the above definition is a comprehensive one, a more current definition of "neighborhood" is provided by the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers in the recently published <u>Dictionary of Real Estate Appraisal</u> and is simply defined as "a group of complementary land uses".

The subject property is located in western Rutherford County slightly north and east of the Rockvale community and west of the city limits of Murfreesboro by approximately two miles. The immediate neighborhood surrounding the subject property extends west and south to the Rockvale community and east to the area of the St Andrews/ Hwy 99 intersection. The neighborhood is primarily rural in nature but in recent years the neighborhood has been transitioning toward more commercial and higher density residential uses. This trend is primarily occurring east of the subject property as Murfreesboro continues to expand west along Hwy 99.

The subject property and neighborhood are within the rapidly developing area west of Interstate 24. This area was targeted several years ago by city officials as where they wanted the city of Murfreesboro to expand. Infrastructure improvements including sewer and new road construction has spurred both commercial and residential development in this area. The bulk of this development has occurred east of the subject property as the city of Murfreesboro expands in a westerly direction

West of the subject property land uses are primarily agricultural and residences on larger lots. Rockvale Elementary School is located approximately 2 miles east of the subject and the new Rockvale High School opened recently across Hwy 96 from the elementary school.

Commercial land uses moving east of the subject include WT's market, a vet clinic, a Walgreens drugstore, a self storage facility and a new Publix that is currently under construction Recently developed single family subdivisions include Weston Park (currently owned by Pinnacle Bank), Belle Reve, Kimbo Woods and Southern Meadows. One of the larger developments in the area is Marymont Springs a 660 acre mixed use development slated for development with 1358 dwelling units on 570 acres and a Town Center with 500 units of town homes and apartments, 250,000 square feet of office and 225,000 square feet of commercial development. Marymont Springs is located on the west side of Mooreland Lane north of the subject property. Another proposed development is the Boxwood property located in the southeast quadrant of Hwy 99 and St.Andrews Drive. The 100 acre site is in the city limits and has been master planned for

commercial and residential development. The property was recently purchased for

\$6,200,000. At the time of appraisal the property is being utilized as a private residence

and farm.

A major influence on the subject neighborhood is the construction of Veterans Parkway,

a four lane divided thoroughfare that will extend from State Route 840 to US Hwy 231S

(Shelbyville Highway) and intersecting with both Hwy 99 and Hwy 96. The first leg from

State Route 840 to Highway 96 was completed last year. The second leg, from Highway

96 to Highway 99 is currently under construction with an estimated completion date of

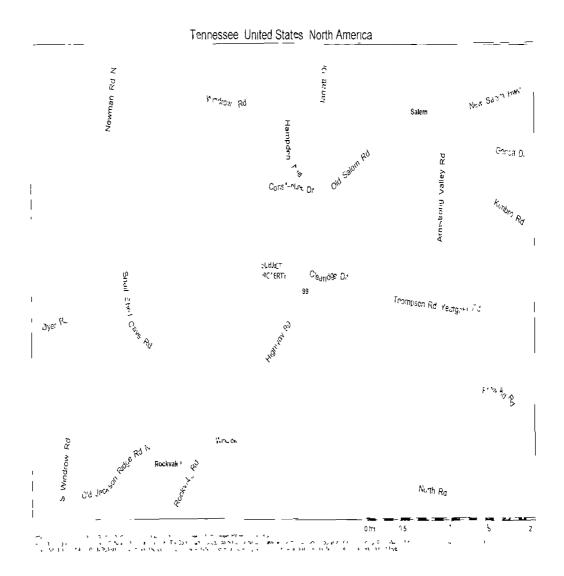

ZONING ANALYSIS

The property falls within the R-15 zoning classifications of the Planning Department of Rutherford County, TN. This classification allows for the development of single family residences and Type "A" mobile homes on lots no smaller than 15,000 Square Feet with a minimum setback of 40 feet, a minimum side yard of 20 feet and a minimum rear yard of

Topography:

No site drainage problems are known to exist and none of the site is located in a federally designated flood zone. Topography is below the grade of State Highway 99 and reasonably level.

Environmental:

No environmental problems are known to exist. This appraisal is based on the assumption that there are no environmental risks or hazards present in, on or around the site.

Streets:

State Highway 99 is a two-lane asphalt paved state highway with open ditches on both sides of the road and utilities in place.

Utilities.

Water, electric, sewer, and telephone service are available to all of the properties. (Sanitary sewer will require special permission from the city due to the site's location outside the Urban Growth Boundary.

Zoning:

The subject property is zoned R-15 and allows only for the development of single family residences and type A mobile homes on lots that are at least 15,000 square feet. All other types of mobile homes must be located on at least five acres with all other uses requiring a minimum of one acre.

The site is generally typical of other properties in their immediate neighborhood and is served by all municipal utilities to use the site to its highest and best use. No adverse easements or encroachments were noted upon inspection of the properties. A sanitary

sewer easement crosses the front of the property. The easement has little or no adverse influence on the property, but serves to make the site more usable.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The existence of hazardous substances, including without limitation asbestos, polychlorinated biphenyls, petroleum leakage, or agricultural chemicals, which may or may not be present on the property, or other environmental conditions, were not called to the attention of nor did the appraiser become aware of such during the appraiser's inspection. HIGHEST AND BEST USE

A fundamental proposition in land economics and an essential requirement to the value of real property is the assessment of a property's Highest and Best Use—Subject to the constraints imposed by law, prevailing market conditions, as well as the overall character of the property itself, Highest and Best Use may be defined as the optimum or most probable use/development of a property which yields the highest land value or net return to an owner/investor. The Appraisal Institutes terminology handbook states further

"That reasonable or probable use that will support the highest present value of the land, as of the effective date of the appraisal; -- that available use and program of future utilization/development which will maximize the potential net return of an investment over a given period of time--"

Important factors of consideration in such an analysis include legal regulations (zoning, deed restrictions, building requirements, etc.), market supply/demand conditions, neighborhood trends, and the locational and physical character of the property itself. The following analysis thus examines the subject property in light of each of these factors in order to determine which of the various alternatives are the most suitable and feasible uses

The Highest and Best Use of the subject is typically considered from two aspects -- the Highest and Best Use of the land "As-If-Vacant" and available for development and the Highest and Best Use in light of the existing improvements, or "As-Improved".

AS-IF-VACANT:

A careful study of the physical and locational characteristics of the subject property must be analyzed and compared with economic considerations to determine which type of use (or uses) will produce the greatest economic century to the land

In an effort to accurately estimate the Highest and Rest Lise of the subject property the uses must meet four mann criteria; the uses must be: (1) legally permissible: (2) physically possible; (3) financially feasible; and (4) maximally productive

Legally Permissible. Typically, in the absence of private restrictions, uses permissible under the applicable zoning ordinances are considered. As mentioned in the zoning section of this report, subject property is zoned R15 which allows for the subdivision of land into residential lots of 15,000 square feet or larger. The legally permissible use is a residential use that complies with zoning regulations

Sanitary sewer traverses the property roughly parallel to Hwy 99. The availability of sewer allows for a greater density than current zoning allows. In order to access the sewer the property would need to be annexed into the city or special permission would have to be obtained to have a county subdivision served by sewer. The property lies outside the Urban Growth Boundary of the City Of Murfreesboro. The Urban Growth Boundary delineates the area outside of which the City of Murfreesboro is not allowed to expand prior to 2025. Talks with the County Planning and water/sewer departments indicate that the city water system is amenable to providing sewer and the County Planning department.

would support a zoning change that would allow subdivision development with a density consistent with the availability of sewer to the property.

The frontage has been considered for development by several retail developers over the years. With sewer availability, the frontage could certainly be developed commercially

Physically Possible Physical constraints relative to location, size, shape, topography and availability of utilities all influence the use to which a property can be developed. As detailed in this report, the subject property has the physical characteristics necessary for residential use with some commercial development along the Hwy 99 frontage

<u>Financially Feasible and Maximally Productive:</u> Uses that are likely to produce adequate income or a return greater than the combined income required to satisfy expenses are considered financially feasible. Among financially feasible uses, the use that provides the maximum potential rate of return, or value (given a constant rate of return), is indicative of a property's Highest and Best Use. The financially feasible and maximally productive use "as if vacant" for the subject site is discussed as follows

Physical characteristics of the subject site are suitable for any use that can utilize a site with good ingress, egress and shape. The character of the area surrounding the subject is residential in nature. Such uses are permitted given the current zoning of the subject site and the physical features of the site, such as its size and shape permit. There exists historical demand for residential subdivisions in the neighborhood and this type use of the

site is representative of the highest and best use of the site as if vacant. Therefore, the highest and best use of the subject property is for residential development consistent with the availability of sanitary sewer and the possibility of commercial development along the Hwy. 99 frontage.

AS IF IMPROVED

The subject property consists of 105.46 acres of vacant land zoned for residential development. The property does not have any improvements Thus, it is concluded that the Highest and Best use of this property is a for development with a combination of residential and commercial uses.

THE APPRAISAL PROCESS

The appraisal process is defined as a systematic analysis of the factors that bear upon the value of real estate. An orderly program by which the problem is defined, the work necessary to solve the problem is planned, and the data involved is acquired, classified, analyzed, and interpreted into an estimate of value. This process is a valuable aid to the appraiser, and has been applied to estimate the market value of the subject property as follows.

<u>Defining the Problem</u> The subject property has been physically and legally described; the rights under appraisal specified; the purpose of the appraisal stated; and the value, as defined, is estimated as of a certain date.

<u>Preliminary Survey:</u> The plan for development of the appraisal report, including the data needed, data sources, personnel and time requirements, etc.

<u>Data Collection and Analysis:</u> The collection of general data of a locational and economic nature; the collection of specific data about the subject property and comparative data which would include costs, sales, rentals, and expenses; and the analysis of this data in a logical manner has been made.

Using these steps as a beginning, an application of this data analysis will be made to formulate an estimate of value through different approaches. These different approaches are classically defined as the Cost Approach; the Income Capitalization Approach, and the Direct Sales Comparison Approach. Since all information involved is drawn from the marketplace, these approaches are a part of a larger market approach. When one or more of the approaches to a value estimate is not used in completing the appraisal assignment, it should be explained

<u>Direct Sales Comparison Approach</u> - is a direct comparison of the property under appraisal with other similar properties, which have sold. The most common units of comparison are price per acre, price per square foot, price per unit, price per room, price

per square foot of building area, per bay, per lot, etc., and the Gross Income Multiplier Analysis (the GIM is the sales price divided by the gross income of the property that has sold). The comparable sales are analyzed for cash equivalency, time, and then compared with each other and the subject for unit mix, condition, amenities, and condition or terms of sale, etc. Based on these adjustments, a value indication is arrived at by estimating the indicated price per lot, price per square foot, price per unit, price per room and the appropriate GIM (the GIM is not adjusted). The indications of value are reconciled into an estimate of value by the Direct Sales Comparison Approach. In the case of this property only the direct comparison method of the Direct Sales Comparison Approach is utilized.

<u>Income Capitalization Approach</u> - is a set of procedures in which an appraiser derives a value indication for income-producing property, converting anticipated benefits into property value. This approach is not processed since the subject property as currently improved could only be leased as farm land and is not consistent with the highest and best use analysis of development of a residential subdivision

<u>Cost Approach</u> - is based upon the estimated reproduction cost of the improvements, less accrued depreciation, plus land value. Depreciation includes estimates of physical deterioration due to wear and tear, functional obsolescence due to defects in design, and economic obsolescence due to changes in the political or economic conditions external to the subject. The subject does not currently have any improvements this approach is not processed.

The next step in the appraisal process, under typical circumstances, would be to consider the indicated value resulting from each approach. This would include a consideration of the relative applicability of each of the approaches, and the strengths and weaknesses of each approach would be identified and discussed. Emphasis for the final value estimate would then be placed on the most reliable and applicable solution to the specific appraisal problem at hand. This analysis of the approaches to value estimation is called reconciliation. The result is to end in a final estimate of defined value. It should be clearly understood that a value estimate is an appraiser's opinion based on his analytical ability, and is only an estimate. A determination of value is made only through the courts or other legally constituted authorities.

. DIRECT SALES COMPARISON APPROACH

The Sales Comparison Approach is an "approach through which an appraiser derives a value indication by comparing the property being appraised to similar properties that have been sold recently, applying appropriate units of comparison and making adjustments, based on the elements of comparison, to the sale prices of the comparables" (page 265 of **The Dictionary of Real Estate Appraisal**, **Second Edition**). The Sales Comparison Approach relies on the principle of substitution which implies that a prudent person will not pay more to buy a property than it will cost to buy a comparable substitute property. 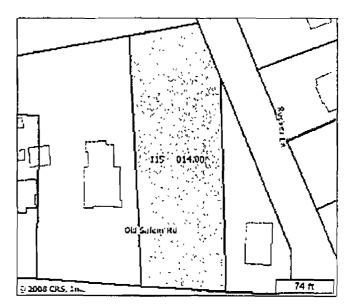
