#### Notes to Financial Statements

## 1. Organization

Foundation for Child Development (the Foundation) is an independent New York-based private foundation dedicated to the principle that all families should have the social and material resources to raise their children to be healthy, educated, and productive members of their communities. The Foundation seeks to understand children, particularly the disadvantaged, and to promote their well-being. Toward this goal, the Foundation expends funds through grants, internally administered programs and direct charitable activities to support initiatives in policy-relevant research, policy analysis, advocacy, leadership development and communications.

The Foundation is exempt from federal income tax under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501 (c)(3) and is a private foundation as defined in Section 509(a) of the Code. The Foundation is subject to a Federal excise tax of 2% on its net investment income, as defined, for tax purposes. However, the excise tax is reduced to 1% if certain conditions are met.

## 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

### Accounting Changes

In July 2009, the FASB Accounting Standards Codification (the ASC) became the single source of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) in the United States. The ASC did not change GAAP, however, it introduced a new structure to the accounting literature and changed references to accounting standards and other authoritative accounting guidance. Application of the Codification did not have an effect on the Foundation's financial condition, changes in net assets of cash flows.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of the Foundation's financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

## Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the Foundation present contributions and net assets in three categories: permanently restricted, temporarily restricted and unrestricted. Permanently restricted contributions and net assets are those that include donor-imposed restrictions requiring that resources be maintained permanently but directing expenditure of part or all of the income. Temporarily restricted contributions and net assets are those which include donor-imposed restrictions that permit the Foundation to expend the assets as specified. The restrictions are satisfied either by passage of time or by actions of the Foundation. All other contributions are reported as unrestricted.

Notes to Financial Statements

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents represent short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less, except for those short-term investments managed by the Foundation's investment managers as part of their long-term investment strategies.

#### Fair Value Measurements

The Foundation follows Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) guidance on Fair Value Measurements which defines fair value and establishes a fair value hierarchy organized into three levels based upon the input assumptions used in pricing assets. Level 1 inputs have the highest reliability and are related to assets with unadjusted quoted prices in active markets. Level 2 inputs relate to assets with other than quoted prices in active markets which may include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities or other inputs which can be corroborated by observable market data. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs and are used to the extent that observable inputs do not exist.

#### Investments Valuation

Investments are carried at fair value. The fair value of alternative investments (hedge funds and private equity) has been estimated using the Net Asset Value ("NAV") as reported by the management of the respective alternative investment fund. FASB guidance provides for the use of NAV as a "Practical Expedient" for estimating fair value of alternative investments. NAV reported by each alternative investment fund is used as a practical expedient to estimate the fair value of the Foundation's interest therein and their classification within Level 2 or 3 is based on the Foundation's ability to redeem its interest in the near term.

#### Investment Income Recognition

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are included in the determination of changes in net assets.

#### Property and Equipment

Equipment and furniture are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method over an estimated useful life of five to ten years. Leasehold improvements are amortized over the remaining lease term of the premises which is shorter than the life of assets. Additions, improvements and betterments in excess of \$1,000 with an estimated future life of more than one year are capitalized.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

#### Functional Allocation of Expenses

The cost of providing program and other activities has been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated between programs and other activities.

## Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes

The Foundation recognizes the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not of being sustained. Management has determined that the Foundation had no uncertain tax positions that would require financial statement recognition. The Foundation is no longer subject to audits by the applicable taxing jurisdictions for periods prior to 2007.

#### Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events for disclosure and/or recognition in the financial statements through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, which is June 24, 2010.

#### 3. Concentration of Credit Risk

The Foundation's financial instruments that are potentially exposed to concentration of credit risk consist of cash, cash equivalents and investments. The Foundation places its cash and cash equivalents with quality financial institutions in the United States. At times, cash balances may be in excess of FDIC insurance limits. The Foundation routinely assesses the financial strength of its cash, cash equivalents and investment portfolio. As a consequence, concentrations of credit risk are limited.

#### Investments Risks and Uncertainties

Alternative investments consist of non-traditional, not readily marketable investments, some of which may be structured as offshore limited partnerships, venture capital funds, hedge funds, private equity funds and common trust funds. The underlying investments of such funds, whether invested in stock or other securities, are generally not currently traded in a public market and typically are subject to restrictions on resale. Values determined by investment managers and general partners of underlying securities that are thinly traded or not traded in an active market may be based on historical cost, appraisals, a review of the investees' financial results, financial condition and prospects, together with comparisons to similar companies for which quoted market prices are available or other estimates that require varying degrees of judgment. Because of the inherent uncertainty of valuations, the estimated fair values may differ significantly from the values that would have been used had a ready market for such investments existed or had such investments been liquidated, and those differences could be material.

#### 8. Employee Retirement

The Foundation has a 403(b) defined contribution retirement plan covering all employees. Contributions are paid to the Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association of America – College Retirement Equities Fund for premiums under individual annuity contracts purchased for each participant. Employees may contribute up to a maximum allowed by law; the Foundation contributes 15% of salary. The Foundation's contributions were \$113,464 and \$105,694 for the years ended March 31, 2010 and 2009.

## 9. Federal Excise Tax

Deferred taxes principally arise from differences between the cost and fair value of investments. At March 31, 2010 and 2009, the fair value of the Foundations investments exceeded the total cost; accordingly, provisions for the deferred Federal excise tax were made for the tax on the net appreciation of investments.

The Foundation is required to make minimum distributions (expenditures related to its mission) in accordance with a formula based on undistributed income as determined under IRC Section 4942(c). Accordingly, undistributed income of approximately \$3,000,000, as of March 31, 2010, must be distributed by March 31, 2011. Minimum distributions were met for the year ended March 31, 2010. However, for the year ended March 31, 2009 minimum distributions were underspent by approximately \$1,200,000.

#### Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Directors of the Foundation has interpreted the Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act (UMIFA) and the New York State Trust Laws as requiring the preservation of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations of investment returns to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument, when applicable. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets to the extent the donor restricted income earned on such endowments to a particular purpose or time, and in all other cases is classified as unrestricted net assets. Such amounts recorded as temporarily restricted net assets are released from restriction when the donor stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the required time period has elapsed.

## 11. Related Not-For-Profit Entity

In a prior year, a Fund was established with the Fidelity Charitable Gift Fund, through a gift of \$250,000 by Jane G. Dustan, for the benefit of the Foundation. The name of the Fund is the Jane G. Dustan Fund FBO-Foundation for Child Development (Dustan Fund).

The Dustan Fund is to be used to assist not-for-profit organizations to purchase consulting services to assist in strategic planning and/or implementation of such plans. During the fiscal years ended March 31, 2010 and 2009, the Dustan Fund did not make any grants. The Dustan Fund was valued at \$51,143 and \$88,704 as of March 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. The Dustan Fund maintains its own accounts and its transactions and balances are not included in the Foundation's financial statements.
