

The mission of the Las Vegas Clark County Urban League is to “Empower communities and ensure equal opportunity for Low-Income People”. The Agency is a 501(c)(3) non-profit founded in 2004 and an affiliate of the National Urban League. The Agency is governed by a multi-racial tripartite board composed of elected public officials, low-income persons, and the community at-large. In 2006 the Urban League accepted the State’s request to become the Community Action Agency (CAA for Clark County). Parent Circles are held at the Shade Tree Shelter, located in 89101, where 70 percent of the children who reside there are under the age of 9. These youngsters demonstrate poor social and developmental skills and have a disruptive history relative to schooling. Site ten is located at Desert Rose Adult High School and draws from a group of low-income parents interested in improving their children's educational opportunities, particularly those from non-English speaking households, or families in which English is the secondary language. The Boys and Girls Club is site 11.

How program, services, benefits, affect human health and welfare of the target population:

Despite major progress toward racial and economic equality over the last 50 years, there remains an academic chasm between low-income black and Hispanic students and students residing in middle class families and communities. While closing this disparity is a complicated undertaking with debate focused on improving schools, enhancing the quality of teaching, and developing new learning techniques; the Urban League's Read and Rise program is focused on a major deterrent to academic failure--family engagement. Home and family experiences critically affect children's cognitive development in the formative and elementary school years. However, the parents/caregivers targeted in this program lack the requisite skills and knowledge to engage in the educational lives of their children and to assist in the attainment of core academic competencies. The need to teach parents how to help their children acquire a solid foundation for learning is critical as parents are a child's first and most important teacher. Participants report that the program helps know what to do to support their children, become more confident, and as a result; become more engaged in school events and activities.

Description of the programs, services, benefits provided in calendar year 2010: The Las Vegas Urban League was selected to administer the federal Broadband Technology Opportunities Program, which expanded the capacity of 14 public computer centers and created 16 new computer centers in public housing developments and community and senior centers throughout the most economically disadvantaged communities in Clark County, Nevada. The Centers offer computer classes in English and Spanish, job training and certification programs, and community health programs through local partner organizations. The project increased the number of users from 1,600 to 4,600 per week. The 30 public computer centers are in the following locations that provide access to vulnerable populations; including, public housing developments, low-income and high unemployment communities and senior citizens:

Description of the programs, services, benefits provided in calendar year 2010: The Agency's Weatherization Assistance Program enables North Las Vegas low-income residents to reduce energy bills by making homes more energy efficient at no cost. Department of Energy funds are used to improve the energy performance of homes for needy residents using the most advanced technologies and testing protocols available in the housing industry. Typical weatherization activities include air sealing to reduce infiltration, attic insulation, low flow shower heads, energy efficient light bulbs, solar screens, and repair/replace air conditioners and refrigerators.

How program, services, benefits, affect human health and welfare of the target population: Families receiving weatherization services see their annual energy bills reduced by about \$437. The energy improvements that make up weatherization are long lived and the savings add up over time to substantial benefits for weatherization clients and their communities. Additionally, the energy conservation resulting from this program helps the community and, in turn, the country reduce its dependence on foreign oil.
