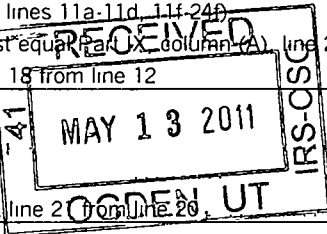

Taylor Hospice provides physical, emotional, and spiritual care for terminally ill patients and their families. Taylor Hospice served a total of 336 patients in their homes in 2008-2009.

Every patient's unique needs are assessed on an ongoing basis. Nurses, home health aides, and allied health professionals provide for the patient's clinical and other physical needs. We assist families in obtaining medicines and medical equipment and attend to patient's grooming and hygiene. All of our clinical care providers are fully

Taylor Hospice Residence provides a comfortable, home-like environment for hospice patients to enjoy during their final phase of life.

Located in Ridley Park, Pennsylvania, the residence offers affordable assisted living to hospice patients and their families needing additional support. While receiving care from an interdisciplinary team of hospice professionals, families and friends are comforted in knowing that their loved ones are receiving quality care 24 hours a day in a beautiful and warm environment. Taylor Hospice Residence served a total of 175 patients in 2008-2009.

The total number of students receiving collegiate scholarship funding during 2009-2010 was 67, and total number of grants awarded in 2009-2010 was 80.

Taylor Community Foundation also leads community-based programming in the arena of health through the planning and execution of the annual Health Awareness Day, believed to be the largest health fair in Delaware County. Free health screenings, health, wellness, and safety education and implementation, and a variety of healthy activities in the gymnasium, pool, and track are conducted throughout the day. TCF also offers frequent "Teddy Bear Clinics" throughout the year helping the youngest members of the community learn to be comfortable with and communicate effectively with their health care providers.

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Taylor Community Foundation (the "Foundation"), is a nonprofit corporation. The Foundation's mission is to provide support, education and funding to other nonprofit organizations, institutions, and individuals to promote health and wellness in the Foundation's service area ("TCF Service Area"). The overriding objective of any TCF scholarship or grant is to enhance the quality of life for community members of the TCF Service Area.

Taylor Hospice (the "Hospice") and Taylor Hospice Residence (the "Residence") are operated as divisions of the Foundation, providing direct services to the community.

The mission of the Hospice and the Residence is to provide a quality program of physical, spiritual, and emotional care for patients with a terminal illness and their family members.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader. The basic financial statements and notes are representations of management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board regarding financial statements for not-for-profit organizations. Accordingly, the Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Basis of Accounting

The Foundation's policy is to prepare the financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly, reflect significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Foundation considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable are recognized based on a gross market-based fee for services reduced by a contractual allowance to reflect reduced expected payments from major third-party providers. The contractual allowance at June 30, 2010 and 2009 is \$114,588 and \$68,779, respectively.

Bad debts are provided on the allowance method based on historical experience and management's evaluation of outstanding accounts receivable. At June 30, 2010 and 2009, the allowance for doubtful accounts is \$6,211 and \$7,682, respectively.

Unconditional Promises to Give

Unconditional promises to give are recognized as revenues or gains in the period received and as assets. Allowances for estimated uncollectibles are based on an analysis of the collectibility of the individual pledges.

Conditional promises to give are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. At June 30, 2010 and 2009, the Foundation had no conditional promises to give.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is carried at cost and consists of land, building and improvements, furniture and equipment, and computer software. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred; costs of renewals and betterments are capitalized. When assets are sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the accounts, and any gain or loss is included in the statement of activities. The Foundation follows the practice of capitalizing all expenses for capital assets having an initial, individual cost of \$1,000 or more. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets ranging from 3 to 40 years.

Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are also included in the statement of activities.

Investment income and gains restricted by donors are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either a stipulated time period ends or a purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

Donated Assets

Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of donation.

Donated Property and Equipment

Donations of property and equipment are recorded as support at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Such donations are reported as unrestricted support unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use, and contributions of cash that are used to acquire property and equipment, are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Foundation reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time.

Donated Services

The Foundation recognizes donated services that create or enhance nonfinancial assets or that require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. The Foundation did receive donated services that met this criteria for fiscal years 2010 and 2009.

Contributions

Contributions are considered available for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor. Bequests are recorded as support at the time the Foundation has an established right to the bequest and the proceeds are measurable.

Advertising

The Foundation uses advertising to promote its programs. The costs for advertising are expensed the first time the advertising takes place. The Foundation incurred advertising costs of \$14,774 and \$11,091 for the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

Expense Allocation

The costs of providing program services and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. Such allocations are included in the statement of functional expenses.

Income Taxes

Taylor Community Foundation is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the Foundation's tax exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Foundation qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2).

On July 1, 2009, the Foundation adopted professional standards which clarify the accounting for uncertainty in income taxes recognized in the Foundation's financial statements and prescribe a recognition threshold and measurement attribute for the financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken on a tax return. The standards also provide guidance on derecognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken on a tax return. The adoption of the standards did not have a material effect on the Foundation.

The Foundation files information tax returns in the U.S. federal jurisdiction. The Foundation's federal tax returns for tax years 2007 and beyond remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service.

The Foundation did not have any unrecognized tax benefits as of June 30, 2010 and does not expect this to change significantly over the next twelve months. The Foundation will recognize interest and penalties accrued on any unrecognized tax benefits as a component of income tax expense. As of June 30, 2010, the Foundation has not accrued interest or penalties related to uncertain tax provisions.

Fair Value - Definition and Hierarchy

The Foundation adopted professional standards regarding fair value measurement effective July 1, 2008. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e. the "exit price") in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The standards established a fair value hierarchy for inputs used in measuring fair value that maximizes the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs by requiring that the most observable inputs be used when available. Observable inputs are those that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity. Unobservable inputs reflect the reporting entity's assumptions about the inputs market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability developed based on the best information available in the circumstances. The fair value hierarchy is categorized into three levels based on the inputs as follows:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date.

Level 2 - Quoted prices in markets that are not active or for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the prior year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform with the presentation in the current year financial statements.

NOTE 3 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

At June 30, 2010 and 2009, the Foundation's cash deposits are held by two financial institutions. These deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. The June 30, 2010 and 2009 deposits totaling \$774,385 and \$583,713 held by the financial institution are in excess of FDIC limits in amounts of \$369,161 and \$179,468, respectively.

NOTE 4 - NET PATIENT REVENUE

The Hospice has agreements with Medicare and Medicaid that provide for reimbursement of items according to a fixed rate schedule. The Medicare agreement requires submission of an annual cost report by the Hospice to the Medicare fiscal intermediary. Medicare third party reimbursement represents 87% and 89% of net patient service revenue during the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

NOTE 8 - PENSION PLAN

The Foundation has a defined contribution 401(k) plan that covers substantially all employees who qualify as to length of service. The Foundation makes a matching contribution of 2% for those employees who contribute 4% or more to the plan. In addition the Board of Directors may authorize discretionary contributions. Total pension expense amounted to \$58,785 and \$49,061 for the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

NOTE 9 - COMMITMENTS

In the normal course of business, there are outstanding various commitments and contingencies in addition to the normal purchases of goods and services. The Foundation does not anticipate losses as a result of these commitments and contingencies.

Line of Credit

The Foundation has available a \$250,000 secured revolving line of credit bearing interest at prime (3.25% at June 30, 2010). Effective May 18, 2010, a minimum interest rate of 4.25% is assessed against amounts drawn on the line of credit. There were no amounts outstanding on the line of credit of June 30, 2010 and 2009. The line of credit expires May 17, 2011.

Accrued Expenses

As of June 30, 2009, Taylor Hospice, a division of Taylor Community Foundation, has accrued a \$102,000 liability, included with accrued expenses. The liability represents a portion of a claim from Medical Assistance to recapture previously recognized revenues. The claim is currently in the appeal process. The liability represents management's estimate, and actual results could differ from that estimate. The timeframe for resolution is undetermined as of June 30, 2010.

Pledges Payable

On June 30, 2005, the Foundation committed \$500,000 to Taylor Hospital (an unrelated third party) for the "Growth and Expansion Project". The commitment (grant award) is contingent upon Taylor Hospital remaining a not-for-profit "acute care" hospital with an active emergency department. The grant is payable in five \$100,000 installments with the first to be paid on July 6, 2005, and the remaining four equal installments to be paid on June 1 of each subsequent year. The final installment was not disbursed as of June 30, 2009 but management anticipates the grantee will meet the requirements for disbursement. At June 30, 2010, the remaining pledge payable was \$100,000.

Scholarship Awards Program

The Foundation sponsors an academic scholarship awards program for college students enrolled in an allied health profession major. The scholarship provides up to \$2,500 per year for college expenses for up to four consecutive academic years. The renewal of the scholarship is dependent upon submission of evidence of continued matriculation in an allied health profession major and suitable academic performance and progress. The Foundation reserves the sole discretion in establishing the conditions by which suitable academic performance and progress are defined. The Foundation is able to effectively measure suitable academic performance related to scheduled scholarship payments and accrues for those anticipated disbursements at June 30, 2010. Due to the history of recipients achieving the renewal conditions, the Foundation has accrued the remaining potential commitment as a change in accounting estimate effective June 30, 2010, as follows:
