On Saturday, October 27th, 2001 The Temple University School of Dentistry and Give a Smile invited the public to an oral screening for children and youth up to 22 years of age. Dr. Oscar Arevalo of Temple Dental School's Community Relations actively recruited volunteers to participate that day, arranged for necessary supplies and forms for the evaluations including free toothpaste and toothbrushes for all.

Three Children's Health Insurance Program (or CHIP) area providers, including AmeriChoice KidsChoice, Aetna U.S. Health Care and The Caring Foundation for Children (of The Independence Blue Cross and Pennsylvania Blue Shield) answered questions and accepted applications from parents and interested individuals to make health insurance available for children of low-income families.

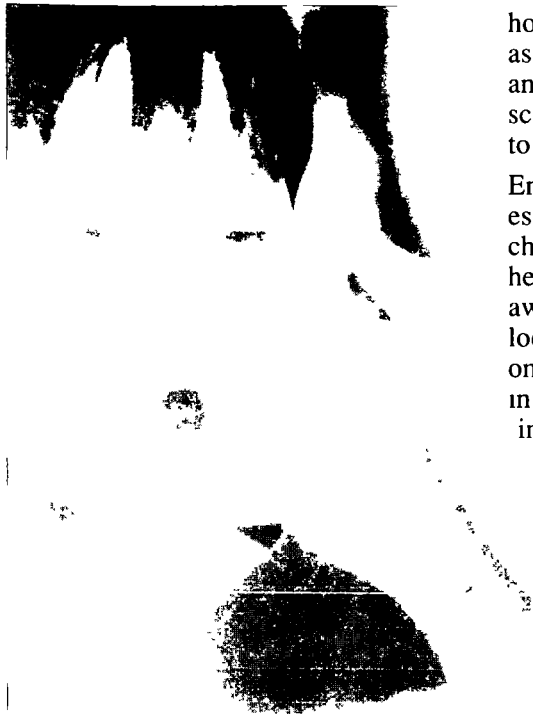
GIVE A SMILE HELPS YOUTH AND FAMILIES WITH MEDICAL/DENTAL CARE

Give a Smile was created as a non-profit children's health agency to assist area individuals, families and agencies who can not afford to pay for oral, eye and plastic reconstructive surgery. With advice and suggestions from Rev. Richard R. Fernandez (Executive Director of Northwest Interfaith Movement) and David W. Lacey (Vice-President of Human Resources of Technitrol, Inc.), Jeanne Edwards became the founder of a statewide agency.

Formally Give a Smile also known as Pennsylvania Smile was incorporated as a charitable organization on December 20, 2000. With the aid of Congressman James C. Greenwood and his dedicated staff, the new agency was granted 501(c)(3) non-profit status in a short period of time. This IRS designation is appropriate due to the nature of its services, assisting children and youth from infancy through 22 years of age in need of complex medical/dental procedures in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The agency's Board of Directors was formed initially from a core group of caring business and civic-minded leaders including: David Lacey, Rev. Ralph E. Blanks (at that time pastor of Mother Zoar United Methodist Church and Board Member of the Philadelphia Board of Education), Dr. Amit Mitra (Chief of Plastic

GIVE A SMILE HELPING KIDS SMILE

A 4 year-old boy with cataracts; an 8 year old with chipped teeth from a playground accident; a teenage girl with face burns; a college student with impacted wisdom teeth – what do these kids have in common?? **Give a Smile** has helped them all this year and, surprisingly, medical insurance did not cover any of these costs.

Most people do not realize that plastic reconstructive surgery, which often is not covered by insurance, is considered optional and not "necessary," especially when the accident, abuse or original occurrence happened more than a year ago. A fire or a trauma may cause injuries, confusion, loss of

home and personal belongings as well as many changes. It is only in time, and perhaps years later, that external scars remaining become more difficult to bear.

Emotionally a child's self-esteem, especially in relation to other children, can become more fragile as he or she gets older and self-awareness increases. Anyone who looks markedly different, especially on the face, can be the target of abuse in school or even at home. An individual's appearance can also have an impact on friendships, dating and even the ability to get a job.

Give a Smile offers to arrange plastic reconstructive, oral and eye surgery (e.g. facial deformities, impacted wisdom teeth and severe eye problems) as well as complex medical/dental care by working with physicians and specialists to help each child referred. Services are provided by calling Give a Smile at (215) 242-9730 for any infant and youth up to age 22, including college students.

Based in Philadelphia, Give a Smile is available to anyone living in Pennsylvania or attending college here and does **not** require U.S. citizenship.

Referrals are from school nurses, foster care workers and county/local child welfare agencies and families calling for help. An application is sent upon request. Depending on whether or not the child already has a doctor or specialist, the process can take at least a month. Give a Smile will make referrals to other medical and social service providers for crises and specific care as needed.

Special thanks goes to: **The Temple University School of Dentistry** and **McDonald's** at Broad and Allegheny (for gift certificates). Prizes for a free drawing were donated by **The Philadelphia Phillies**, **The Philadelphia Eagles** and **Please Touch Museum**.

About 120 individuals came to the dental screening with some children (including Asian, Hispanic and non-English speaking families) seeing a dentist for the first time.



JEANNE EDWARDS MSSA, LSW incorporated **GIVE A SMILE** in December 20, 2000 as a registered Pennsylvania charity and obtained IRS 501(c)(3) non-profit status, effective that date. The agency became a United Way donor option agency #14152 in August, 2001.

Ms. Edwards, a social service administrator, with a small Board of Directors formed the organization to help children in need in the Philadelphia area primarily to help youth needing oral surgery.

In June, 2000, her 18-year-old son David needed his impacted wisdom teeth removed. Surprised at the high cost, despite insurance coverage, Ms.

Edwards was inspired to help families and youth deal with this financial hardship. (David's smile at age 6 is featured on the agency's business card and brochure.) **DAVID** graduated from **Germantown Friends School**

and now is a sophomore at **Dartmouth College**.

Her daughter **LAURA PERANTEAU** designed the agency's brochure (pictured on p. 8). Laura is a junior at **Wesleyan University**. Her extensive knowledge and experience as a high school editor at **Springside School** in Chestnut Hill were especially helpful with the production of this newsletter.

Ms. Edwards has a Bachelor of Arts degree from **Ursinus College** and a Masters degree in Social Service Administration from **Case Western Reserve University** with more than 25 years experience in health and social services. She lives in the Chestnut Hill area of Philadelphia.

GIVE A SMILE HAS SPRING EVENT TO HELP CHILDREN

Give a Smile will host a wine and cheese reception on **Wednesday, May 15th** at the **Cresheim Cottage Café**, 7402 Germantown Avenue to raise funds to help area children who need medical and dental care. An assortment of hors d'oeuvres and beverages will be available from **6 to 8 p.m.** Anyone interested in making a reservation (required for attendance) can call (215) 242-9730 Mon.-Fri. 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Free parking is available (directly across the street).

All proceeds will be used to respond to requests from families with little or no insurance to enable their children to have recommended surgery or medical care and accept referrals of those in need from social service agencies, health/dental clinics and schools. Give a Smile is able to help youth and families through advocacy with individual practitioners. A network of medical professionals have been willing to volunteer their services or reduce their fees depending on the individual situation.

The agency relies on community volunteers of all ages to help with fundraising and public relation activities, for example, **Temple University School of Dentistry**, see article on page 1, and **The African-American Museum/ Give a Smile Family Day** (see article at right).

Drs. Stout and Lugo and Ms. Edwards are currently looking into a possible state grant as a collaborative effort involving dental community outreach and child abuse prevention services. Give a Smile would be called upon for its individualized approach and advocacy on behalf of individuals in need identified by medical/dental professionals. These combined services would enable children to receive the care and treatment needed.

Dr. Angela M. Stout is Coalition Chair of **PANDA (Prevent Abuse and Neglect through Dental Awareness)** of the **Pennsylvania Dental Association**. This statewide group educates dental professionals in child abuse prevention techniques as often the face, mouth and teeth can be severely injured through abuse. Also problem areas can be ignored in neglect situations.

In addition, our "Angel" is a Board

Member of **SCAN (Stop Child Abuse Now)** and a liaison with Temple's dental school for **Special Olympics**. In addition to her practice at **Chesheim Dental Associates** in Erdenheim, she is an active staff member with privileges in Pediatric Dentistry at **Temple University Children's Medical Center**, **Abington Memorial Hospital** and **Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh** and serves as a dentist of the **Springfield Township School District**.

Dr. Stout's extensive education in Pennsylvania includes a Masters in Public Health from the **University of Pittsburgh School of Public Health**, Certificate in Pediatric Dentistry from Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, D.M.D. in Dental Medicine from **Temple University School of Dentistry** and B.A. from **Lehigh University**. She is active on the Alumni Boards of Temple and her high school, **Mount Saint Joseph Academy**.

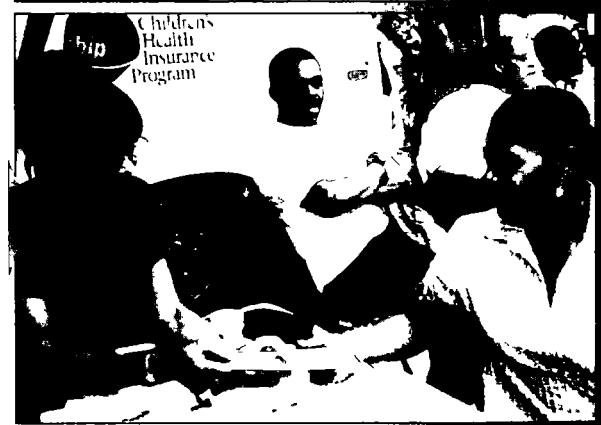

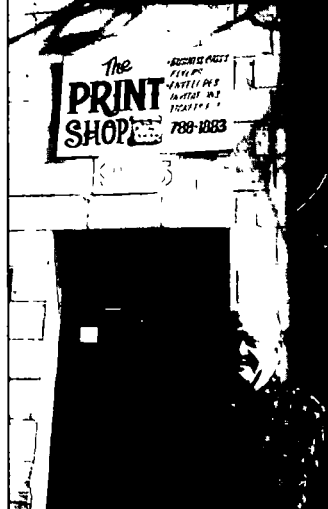

MEDIA HIGHLIGHTS FOR GIVE A SMILE

On March 11, 2002, **Leigh Richards** of **WXTU** featured Give a Smile on its show "**Public Air**" to be broadcast Sunday morning, March 16. **Jeanne Edwards** was interviewed and spoke about the agency's goals to help improve the quality of lives of children and increase access to medical and dental services, especially for the uninsured needing care. **Jeanne** discussed recent activities, particularly **Give a Smile Family Day** (Saturday, April 6) which included oral screenings for youth provided by volunteers from the Temple University School of Dentistry at the African-American Museum in Philadelphia.

In November, 2001, **Jimmy Tayoun**, former Philadelphia Councilman, invited Ms. Edwards to be on his Sunday morning talk show for **WYSP**. It's important to back people like **Jeanne Edwards** because she is very capable and has a generous spirit." **Marc Donahue**, a vice-president of marketing for **de lage landen**, a multi-national financial services operation remarked that he wants "to help **Jeanne** because she is a very caring, empathetic person. Many charities raise lots of money, but you don't know what the results are. Here you know you can change the lives of children completely around, and you will see the results immediately."

Reconstructive Surgery of **Temple University Hospital** and **Temple Children's Hospital**), **Dr. Karl Whitley**, Chairman, Department of surgery, **St. Joseph's Hospital**, staff otolaryngologist/head and neck surgeon of **North Philadelphia Health System** and on staff at **Mercy Catholic Medical Center**; **Marc Donahue** of **de lage landen** of **Amsterdam** and **Jeanne Edwards**. With these dedicated individuals, medical/dental professionals and other volunteers, Give a Smile was able to accept referrals from various agencies and dental/public health providers particularly in the Philadelphia metropolitan area.

In August, 2001 Give a Smile became a **United Way** donor choice agency #14152 so that interested individuals could donate quickly and easily through automatic payroll deductions and have a record of tax deductions of amounts given throughout the year,

e.g. \$5/week or \$260 annually.

Give a Smile's first referral was through **Pennsylvania's Health Department - Community Services** in Harrisburg. A handicapped father called for help for his 20 year-old son in college from the **Wilkes-Barre** area. "Todd" was in pain even on antibiotics and needed all his impacted wisdom teeth removed. The oral surgeon and the medical center quoted him a fee of \$960 for the total procedure with anesthesia. As they could only scrape



together \$200, the operation was "indefinitely postponed." The mother worked part-time with two other children at home. They faced medical bills from the father's surgeries last year who is now permanently disabled.

Give a Smile contacted a small family foundation which agreed to pay for part of the hospital surgery. **Jeanne** made arrangements with the surgeon and the hospital and negotiated fees for this hardship case. Needless to say,

the family was very grateful to Give a Smile for the help they desperately needed.

Other cases involved an Erie, Pennsylvania foster family with the family service agency and Give a Smile splitting costs for a teenage boy's eye care; an 8 year-old girl who cracked her front teeth on a school playground receiving restorative dental services; a varsity co-ed with a severely broken nose needing treatment; and a deaf boy, being ridiculed by his peers, who wanted plastic surgery for his protruding ears. Services were either voluntary or paid for in whole or in part by Give a Smile so that requests for help were granted with specialist referrals and followup as needed.

Throughout the year Give a Smile distributes brochures and attends local school and community fairs, e.g., **State Representative Leanna Washington's Wadsworth Street Day Fair**.
