The hospital strongly believes that its charity care and the related community benefit obtained from such care, is understated because of those patients that potentially qualify for charity care but do not wish to apply for it. In addition, some care is not classified as charity due to missing documentation on patient resources. Thus, the hospital's bad debt includes a portion that could be classified as charity care if application for such care was sought and/or completed. Currently, the hospital is implementing processes, procedures and systems to more effectively determine charity care that will reduce a patient's documentation requirements and ease the patient's emotional burden in applying for charity care. This will provide a more accurate reporting of charity care services provided by the hospital. The bad debt expense on the financial statements includes write-offs from the patient billing system less bad debt recoveries and adjustments to the bad debt allowance account. The adjustments to the allowance account are necessary to ensure that the allowance for bad debts on the balance sheet accurately reflects estimated future bad debt write-offs (net of recoveries) for the current A/R. The reported total bad debt amount matches our fiscal year ending 2010 audited financial statement. The bad debt number is then reduced to cost by applying the Hospital's cost to charge ratio as calculated on the IRS schedule H - worksheet 2.

The hospital continually strives to provide excellent patient care in the most cost effective fashion. Nonetheless, the Medicare program, in many cases, does not provide payment that covers the full cost of the care provided. Since it is the mission of the hospital to respond to community need, hospital management continually advocates for improved Medicare payment so that the cost of quality care to those patients that are not able to afford it is not compromised and is fairly subsidized by all payers. While this shortfall in Medicare payments is not classified as community benefit by the IRS, we nonetheless believe it is an important contribution made by the hospital to the health and well being of the community. Our mission calls us to serve all patients with the highest possible quality and efficiency, even if we are not paid fully for doing so.

Any patient that has an account sent to a collection agency has an opportunity to complete a financial application for Charity/Christian Care. If an account meets the qualifications for financial assistance after it has been sent to collections, St. John's notifies the collection agency to make a Christian Care adjustment. At the end of every month, the collection agency provides a list of patients, accounts, and amounts that should be reclassified as charity care. As a result, an adjustment is made to reclassify the dollars from the bad debt account to charity.

Each year the market continues to grow and it is open from May to October. With this growth, St John's has identified an opportunity at the Farmer's Market to help serve low income families. Our initiative for a healthy lifestyle and our focus on reducing childhood obesity has opened up a partnership with St John's Hospital, the Sangamon County Public Health Department, and recipients of the WIC program. This is St John's Hospital's second year in supporting the WIC program and the Farmer's Market. In FY 2010, St John's Hospital spent over \$6,000 in the Farmer's Market WIC program. We were able to provide 600 bags of food for 100 different families for six weeks. St John's provided a participating vendor at the Farmer's Market with reusable shopping bags. Each week the farmer would fill the bags full of fresh produce worth \$10.00. St John's would purchase these bags from the vendor and then the bags were picked up by WIC recipients during scheduled times throughout the day. Providing fresh produce to low income families helps these people to choose healthier foods for themselves and for their children. The Extension Office provides cooking demonstrations on how to prepare these fresh fruits and vegetables at the market. This not only helps to teach our communities how to use the foods they receive, it also encourages families to choose healthy, fresh foods. Since the WIC program began offering farmers' market vouchers to clients in 1995, participation has been average. In 2008, about 43% of clients who received the vouchers actually redeemed them. This past season, the percentage of vouchers redeemed increased to 48%. St John's Hospital feels that this is an important program, and has also donated over 153 staff hours and over \$4,600 in salary expenses for time spent on planning, organizing and working at the Farmer's Market. This worthy program takes much of our participation and could not happen without our dedicated support. While at the Farmer's Market, St John's opens a booth where we can hand out healthy eating receipt cards, we can take blood pressure, provide body mass screenings and help show our support for our community. Partners in Education - St John's staff members and physicians understand that sharing our knowledge with others helps to make our community stronger. It is gratifying to share our experience, talents and resources with students ranging from pre-school to resident physicians at the SIU School of Medicine. Some staff members share an hour over their lunch to serve as mentors to children at local "at risk" schools. Others take the time to talk to students about their lives and the challenges they face as healthcare providers. St John's Hospital has built Partners in Education with Jane Addams, St Patrick's, McClernand, and Ridgley schools located in the Springfield area. In FY 2010, St John's donated over \$3,800 to the schools for supply items and financial assistance. St John's staff has also donated 24 hours of volunteer time and 3 hours of staff time toward helping to mentor these students. Samaritan Guild Line - The Samaritan Guild Line is a service to our community for the elderly, infirm, or those who live alone. We have committed to calling a list of 5 individuals 365 days a year between 900-930 a.m. to ensure they are all right. Many are delighted just to hear a friendly voice. If we are unable to reach the individual, then a pre-designed procedure is followed. The Samaritan Guild Line devoted 24 volunteer hours and 144 staff hours in fiscal year 2010 to check on these individuals and just let them know that someone cares. SHARE & SHARE Burial - Share is a Bereavement Support Program for families that have experienced pregnancy and inf

ant loss. This program is available to assist in the grieving process. The program may include a burial, memorial service and support group at the family's option. The program's memorial kits are presented to the parent/s to help them remember baby and this is grant supported, but the caring staff at St. John's Hospital is supported entirely by St. John's. In FY 2010, St. John's Hospital devoted over 84 staff hours to assisting 213 persons who were a part of the SHARE program. The SHARE program and staff are there to help these parents and families through the difficult time of losing a child. Coalition Building Healthy Springfield - The goal of Healthy-Springfield is to educate the community about the choices they have available for their own aspects of holistic health and wellness. There is a disconnect between the traditional and complementary medical world. Individually, we work every day in some capacity to enhance the well-being of our clients, patients and/or customers. By coming together as a unified front of professionals, we can empower the people of the Springfield community's conscious awareness of health and wellness. This collaboration of community is working toward enhancing community health by blending Healing Art Therapies & Conventional Medicine for Complete Health, providing an arena for the community to explore what locally can support them to achieve a healthy lifestyle, and, providing an awareness of how individually we effect the collective whole of the community. The overarching goal of Healthy -Springfield is to bridge the gap between traditional and complementary therapies, educate the community on the importance of caring for the Whole self, and introduce the seven dimensions of health while raising awareness of options in Springfield to address each dimension. In FY10, St. John's Hospital devoted 15 staff hours, 21 volunteer hours, and \$867 in salary expense for the planning of the upcoming 10-10-10 event. Kidzeum Children's Museum - The idea of developing a new children's museum budded right here with a staff member from St. John's Hospital who happen to also be an active member of the community. Kidzeum of Health and Science is the beginning of a partnership with St. John's Hospital, SIU School of Medicine, District 186 and various other community businesses. The new children's museum will provide family focused health education that will foster an environment to promote health awareness, encourage healthy choices, promote a healthy lifestyle, and increase science education through interactive play. The best thing about Kidzeum is that it will be accessible to children of all abilities and also can be utilized as a site for pediatric rehab services. The hospital is committing \$1.25 million to help establish and construct a children's museum at the Edwin Watts Southwind Park in Springfield. During FY 2010, St. John's contributed \$475,000 to Kidzeum. This was our second payment on this multi-year commitment. St. John's also contributed staff time and knowledge for planning. United Way - St. John's Hospital supports the United Way community service. Our support includes committee involvement, Team Captains and Loaned Executives. Our hospital Loaned Executives for the United Way call on United Way accounts and assist businesses in setting up their United Way Employee Campaigns. In FY 2010, St. John's Hospital donated over 44 staff hours and over \$2,600 in salary expenses to help in the United Way campaign. St. John's Hospital alone raised \$93,083 for the United Way campaign. Community Health Improvement Advocacy. Advocacy for Community Health Improvement - St. John's Hospital is very privileged to have amongst its staff a number of caring professionals who not only care for our patients, but also work toward a healthier community by serving on several committees and boards in the community. Our staff's involvement with these community groups help to provide expertise on policy and decisions related to

St John's Hospital offers hope to our community in the tradition of the Hospital Sisters of the Third Order of St Francis. As a healing ministry of the Catholic Church and an affiliate of the Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS), St John's Hospital is committed to providing quality medical healthcare to all who need care regardless of race, creed, sex, national origin, handicap, age, religion or ability to pay. The hospital was founded over 135 years ago to bring a healing presence and improve the health of our community, especially for people who are sick, poor, and disadvantaged. Because of the hospital's purpose and tradition, it is organized to promote the health of Springfield and surrounding areas. The hospital is governed by a Board of Directors, the majority of which is comprised of persons who reside in the organization's primary service area. The Board ensures that St John's Hospital is responding to community need in accordance with the process described under item #2 above. Also consistent with its exempt purpose, St John's Hospital has an open medical staff with privileges available to all qualified physicians in the area. St John's Hospital is a tertiary care center with a designated Children's Hospital including Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and comprehensive Pediatric Services. St John's shares designation as a Level I Trauma Center with Memorial Medical Center and SIU School of Medicine. St John's offers extensive cardiac, oncology, medical, surgical and obstetrical services. St John's Hospital is affiliated with the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine in the medical education of 297 residents. Programs include Family Practice, Surgery, Obstetrics & Gynecology, Pediatrics, Psychiatry, and Radiology. In addition, the hospital operates an emergency department that is open 24 hours to all persons regardless of their ability to pay. As a not-for-profit hospital, St John's Hospital reinvests surplus funds into the mission of the organization and health of the community rather than distributing them as profits to shareholders or individuals. Funds not committed to ongoing operations are generally used to upgrade facilities, secure new technologies, improve patient care, and support initiatives designed to promote health and ensure access for all. For example, St John's Hospital is currently working with its parent organization, Hospital Sisters Health System, to continuously enhance quality and improve coordination of care both inside the hospital and with a growing number of physician partners. Supported by investments in information technology, this "care integration" strategy is designed to better coordinate care, improve health outcomes, create new efficiencies, and help ensure that patients (especially those with chronic conditions) get well and stay well. Although reimbursement for services rendered is critical to the operation and stability of St John's Hospital, it is recognized that not all individuals possess the ability to purchase essential medical services. Thus, our Mission to serve the community with respect to providing healthcare services and healthcare education is intrinsic. Inherent to our Mission, we provide care to the poor, the elderly and the needy of the community through various programs and services. These activities include wellness programs, community education programs, and special programs for the elderly, handicapped, medically underserved, and a variety of broad community support activities. In fiscal year 2010, St John's Hospital provided over \$33.5 million in community benefit services, including charity care at cost, unpaid costs of Medicaid and other public programs, and a range of diverse programs designed to enhance access and improve community health. Additionally, during this period, St John's provided over \$8 million (at cost) in uncompensated care to patients that did not qualify for charity care or public assistance and over \$13 million (at cost) in excess of Medicare payment for healthcare services. Through affiliation with Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, St John's Hospital invested approximately \$8,749,900 for the training of residents and support for clinical programs. Responding to Community Need. The array of community benefits provided by St John's Hospital is consistent with our mission and a long-standing commitment to our community. In many cases, these programs would likely not exist without the leadership role played by St John's Hospital, and they often relieve a burden that would otherwise be carried by government. Based on the assessment of community needs described under #2 above, St John's Hospital is focusing on the following priorities: Childhood Health and Wellness with a focus on preventing / decreasing Childhood Obesity, cancer, heart disease, respiratory diseases, diabetes, obesity and maternal/fetal risk. Currently, St John's Hospital's goal is to work collaboratively with our sister

r hospitals that belong to Hospital Sisters Health System to identify community needs. In the meantime, St. John's has identified that in addition to childhood health, community needs requiring a response relate to ongoing outreach programs and educational information on cancer, heart disease, respiratory disease, diabetes, obesity and maternal/fetal monitoring. St. John's Hospital offers access to free health screenings and health education. We donate our time and materials to help those in crisis. We help foster independence for seniors. We provide financial support to the uninsured and underinsured, and we collaborate with other organizations to enhance the overall quality of life in the community. The following is an overview of the many programs and services that St. John's Hospital engaged in during FY 2010.

Responding When there is a need in the community, the staff members at St. John's Hospital are always ready to lend a hand. In Springfield, numerous community organizations, led by Homeless United for Change (HUC), have been working diligently to address the basic needs of food and shelter for those in the community who are homeless. A vacated church in downtown Springfield provides emergency accommodations for about 50 homeless residents each evening from November 1 through April 30. The shelter relies on volunteers for help with meal preparation and facility oversight. Recognizing the need, dozens of St. John's staff members stepped up and cooked and served meals for residents on designated evenings during the months the shelter was in operation. Staff members also held special collections at the hospital throughout the year for shelter residents and others in need. During four different collections, staff collected nearly 1,500 pounds of food items, personal hygiene items and clothing that went to clients of the homeless shelter, the Salvation Army, the Central Illinois Foodbank, Springfield Pregnancy Care Center, Kumler Neighborhood Ministries' Food Pantry and Catholic Charities.

Responding to our community includes helping take care of those who are most vulnerable. The Pregnancy Care Center of Springfield, Inc., provides prenatal care for pregnant women, with an emphasis on serving young women with limited financial means or challenging family dynamics. St. John's supports the Care Center with an annual stipend, free office space, various office needs, speaker engagements and other health professions as needed. Through this collaboration, the Care Center was able to serve clients from Sangamon and the five surrounding counties. Services provided include physician referrals, prenatal care, free classes and counseling. The Center also helps clients' access services provided by State agencies, such as All Kids. The Care Center networks with other agencies in the area to avoid duplication of services. The Elizabeth Ann Seton Program is a non-profit volunteer-based organization. The program serves low-income pregnant and parenting women and their children. The program provides mentoring, education and practical assistance. St. John's Hospital has helped to support this program by providing them with free office space, speakers, and various operating needs, such as printing of materials. St. John's Hospital has always understood the importance of helping those who are less fortunate. Our ministry of helping to feed the homeless and the hungry dates back to the days when the Sisters provided sandwiches at the back door of the hospital. Today, St. John's is proud to continue this tradition by supporting St. John's Breadline. Food items from St. John's cafeteria are packaged and sent to the Breadline, along with one-half pint milk cartons specifically purchased for this use. St. John's also provides maintenance and repair work, painting and clean-up services. What seems like such a small donation has a large return for the people who need it the most. In FY 2010, St. John's Hospital donated over \$20,000 in services to

St John's Hospital is an affiliate of Hospital Sisters Health System. The foundational mission principles of Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS) embody the belief that every life is a sacred gift and every human being is a unity of body, mind and spirit. Our health care ministry calls on us to foster healing, serve with compassion, and promote wellness for all persons, with special attention to our neighbors who are sick, poor, underserved, and most vulnerable. These principles have made it possible for HSHS to provide high quality, cost-effective and compassionate health care for millions of people in Illinois and Wisconsin. Our health care ministry consists of 13 hospitals and numerous physician partners committed to continuing the healing ministry of Jesus Christ. Beyond functioning as a primary source for health care in the 12 primary communities we serve, HSHS also provides a wide array of Community Benefits that expand residents' access to health care, enhance their overall health status, and further medical education. In the Fiscal Year that ended June 30, 2010, HSHS hospitals provided \$152.2 million in Community Benefits (or 8.5% of total expenses), an increase of \$28 million from FY 2009. Of this amount, \$32.3 million was provided for charity care and \$89.2 million was the amount of unreimbursed care provided under the Medicaid program. In addition, HSHS hospitals provided \$159.3 million in health care services primarily to the elderly beneficiaries of the Medicare program in excess of governmental and managed care contract payments. HSHS hospitals also recorded \$95 million in uncollectible accounts. HSHS is committed to sustaining and strengthening the health of our communities by continually reinvesting any surplus revenue from operations and investments into new medical technology, facility infrastructure and health care services. These ongoing enhancements ensure that our hospitals can continue to provide high quality, compassionate care to our patients. During Fiscal Year 2010, HSHS continued to pursue a Care Integration strategy designed to continuously enhance quality and improve coordination of care both inside the hospital and with a growing number of physician partners. Supported by the system investments in information technology, this strategy is designed to better coordinate care, improve health outcomes, create new efficiencies, and help ensure that patients (especially those with chronic conditions) get well and stay well. The Care Integration strategy includes, among other efforts, three "Medical Home" pilot projects, the coordination of care for cardiac patients living in rural communities through the use of telemedicine, and development of a "clinical integration network" that will help independent physicians improve quality and the patient experience by benchmarking their care against best practices. HSHS also placed a special emphasis on investing in interoperable health information technologies and robust health information exchanges. We recognize that our investments in information technology will have a positive impact on the quality, safety and efficiency of health care. These investments also ensure that the patient is at the center of a high quality, highly integrated, compassionate health care delivery system. Expanding access to health care. At the heart of our health care ministry is the commitment to care for every patient who seeks our help. Because not all patients have health insurance, HSHS hospitals have generous Charity Care program guidelines that cover 100% of hospital charges for individuals and families who earn less than 250% of the federal poverty level. Under these guidelines a family of four without health insurance that has an annual household income of \$5,125 or less is eligible for a 100% discount on their hospital bill. HSHS Charity Care programs have a sliding scale, in some instances providing up to a 60% discount on charges for those earning up to 600% of the federal poverty level. Hospitals have created a simple two-page form for those wishing to apply for Charity Care and assign counselors to visit with inpatients who are uninsured to let them know about our charity care policies and provide assistance filling out applications for financial assistance or enrollment in publicly funded health care programs. The gratitude of the people who have benefitted from our Charity Care program (sometimes referred to as Christian Care) is reflected in some of the thank you letters sent to St. Anthony's Memorial Hospital in Effingham, IL. Comments included "When I opened your letter today and read that you gave me a 100% Christian Care adjustment, I gasped and started crying. I am so grateful. I count this as an unexpected miracle from God working through people willing to show his love to others." - D.K.
