Charity Care is calculated by determining the total amount from patient billing that is written off to charity care charge codes or allowances. This amount matches the number that is reported on our fiscal year ending 2010 audited financial statements. The total charity care dollar amount is then reduced to cost by applying the Hospital's cost to charge ratio as calculated on IRS schedule H - worksheet 2

The hospital does not have sufficient information at this time to determine if subsidized services exist based on the definition and calculations required by the IRS and is working to provide such information in next year's return

The percent of charity care and certain other benefits at cost as a percent of total expenses less bad debt is 8 29%

The hospital strongly believes that its charity care and the related community benefit obtained from such care, is understated because of those patients that potentially qualify for charity care but do not wish to apply for it. In addition, some care is not classified as charity due to missing documentation on patient resources. Thus, the hospital's bad debt includes a portion that could be classified as charity care if application for such care was sought and/or completed. Currently, the hospital is implementing processes, procedures and systems to more effectively determine charity care that will reduce a patient's documentation requirements and ease the patient's emotional burden in applying for charity care. This will provide a more accurate reporting of charity care services provided by the hospital. The bad debt expense on the financial statements includes write-offs from the patient billing system less bad debt recoveries and adjustments to the bad debt allowance account. The adjustments to the allowance account are necessary to ensure that the allowance for bad debts on the balance sheet accurately reflects estimated future bad debt write-offs (net of recoveries) for the current A/R. The reported total bad debt amount matches our fiscal year ending 2010 audited financial statement. The bad debt number is then reduced to cost by applying the Hospital's cost to charge ratio as calculated on the IRS schedule H - worksheet 2.

The hospital continually strives to provide excellent patient care in the most cost effective fashion. Nonetheless, the Medicare program, in many cases, does not provide payment that covers the full cost of the care provided. Since it is the mission of the hospital to respond to community need, hospital management continually advocates for improved Medicare payment so that the cost of quality care to those patients that are not able to afford it is not compromised and is fairly subsidized by all payers. While this shortfall in Medicare payments is not classified as community benefit by the IRS, we nonetheless believe it is an important contribution made by the hospital to the health and well being of the community. Our mission calls us to serve all patients with the highest possible quality and efficiency, even if we are not paid fully for doing so

Any patient that has an account sent to a collection agency has an opportunity to complete a financial application for Charity/Christian Care. If an account meets the qualifications for financial assistance after it has been sent to collections, St. John's notifies the collection agency to make a Christian Care adjustment. At the end of every month, the collection agency provides a list of patients, accounts, and amounts that should be reclassified as charity care. As a result, an adjustment is made to reclassify the dollars from the bad debt account to charity.

We determined our community needs for fiscally ear 2010 through a thorough review of the following secondary data sets o Sangamon County Residents Death Certificates, o IDPH / IPLAN Data Sets, o IDPH Behavioral Risk Factor Sur veillance System Data, o U.S. Census Data, o 2006 United Way of Central Illinois Community Needs Assessment, o Healthy People 2010 and o Greater Springfield Chamber of Commerce Eco nomic Development Report The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) Illinois Planning for Local Assessment of Need (IPLAN) information indicated that cancer, heart disease, re spiratory diseases, diabetes, obesity and maternal/fetal risk are among the leading health threats to the residents of Sangamon County Currently, St. John's Hospital provides ongoing education and health outreach programs that address six of these top 10 Sangamon Count y identified needs. One area for particular attention was Childhood Health and Wellness with a focus on preventing / decreasing Childhood Obesity Illinois ranks fourth in the country for childhood obesity Based on a thorough look at secondary data sets as well as Scho of District information, we identified a trend of increasing weight from Kindergarten through High School Data shows us that >26% of incoming kindergarteners were overweight or oblese, >35% incoming 5th graders were overweight or obese and >38% incoming high school stud ents were overweight or obese. In addition, data reveals that over 60% of District 186 stu dents come from low-income homes and for many of these students, their main meal of the day is lunch provided by the school. These facts alone prompted St John's Hospital to incre ase our dialogue with local school districts to educate teachers, students and families to decrease the alarming figures noted above. Lastly, a 2005 life-expectancy analysis combined with research conducted by Harvard University lead analysts to make the claim that if d rastic measures are not taken, this generation of parents will be the first to outlive the ir children. The Response. Once information was compiled, data sets and recommendations we re-presented to our St. John's Board of Directors The need to act immediately to turn this epidemic around was obvious and the St. John's Board voted to develop the Community Bene fit Sub Committee (CBSC) to begin looking at ways to address this need as well as to begin building the infrastructure for our 2010 Community Needs Assessment The first step in de veloping the CBSC was to identify community stakeholders to sit on the committee (please s ee attachment I, CBSC Charter, for an overview of the committee's goals and responsibilities) Additionally, St John's Hospital became an anchor partner, and main sponsor, with the genH, "Generation Healthy", coalition This grassroots coalition is focused on improving the health and wellbeing of all children genH has 12 anchor partners throughout the comm unity with St John's Hospital being the main donor of monetary and in-kind resources. During FY2010, St. John's contributed staff, legal and physician expertise to provide free sc reenings for families, free counseling for at-risk families and free legal advice for esta blishing and incorporating an organization. Through our partnership we have been instrumental in changing school policy on daily physical activity and laid the foundation for changing policy of school nutrition. The Future. The Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS) is currently working on a standard approach to completing our 2012 Community Needs Assessment. Our overarching goal is to work collaboratively with our Sister Hospitals to identify nee ds. Through this streamlined initiative, we will be able to mobilize our collective resources to ensure our communities' needs are not only known but that strategic efforts are in place to respond to our greatest needs. Economic Development St John's Hospital is involved in a variety of economic development initiatives. Examples of these initiatives include, but are not limited to, active staff participation with the following organizations. United Way of Central Illinois, Springfiel d Park District, District 186 school mentoring program, District 186 school Coordinated Approach to Child Health (CATCH) elementary school program, Central Illinois Community Blood Center, Hospital Sisters Mission Outreach, Homeless United for Change, Greater Springfiel d Chamber of Commerce, Downtown Springfield Inc., Pregnancy Care Center, Elizabeth Ann Se ton Program, Mid Illinois Medical District, Lincoln Land Community College Workforce Inves tment Board, Sangamon County Public Health Department WIC program, and various State of Il linois advisory boards for Public Health, Information Technology and Emergency Management Community Support WIC and the Farmer's Market - St John's staff involvement with Downto wn Springfield Inc. has lead to the development of a vibrant Farmers' Market The Farmer's Market helps to promote healthy food choices for our community and it is a way local farm ers can create business relationships with their surrounding community members. Each year the market continues to grow and it is open from May to October. With this growth. St. Joh n's has identified an opportunity at the Farmer's Market to help serve low income families. Our initiative for a healthy lifestyle and our focus on reducing childhood obesity has o pened up a partnership with St. John's Hospital, the Sangamon County Public Health Department, and recipients of the WIC program. This is St. John's Hospital's second year in supporting the WIC program and the Farmer's Market In FY 2010, St John's Hospital spent over \$6,000 in the Farmer's Market WIC program. We were able to provide 600 bags of food for 10 0 different families for six weeks. St. John's provided a participating vendor at the Farm er's Market with reusable shopping bags. Each week the farmer would fill the bags full of fresh produce worth \$10.00. St. John's would purchase these bags from the vendor and then the bags were picked up by WIC recipients during scheduled times throughout the day. Provi ding fresh produce to low income families help these people to choose healthier foods for themselves and for their children. The Extension Office provides cooking demonstrations on how to prepare these fresh fruits and vegetables at the market. This not only helps to te ach our communities how to use the foods they receive, it also encourages families to choo se healthy, fresh foods. Since the WIC program began offering farmers' market vouchers to clients in 1995, participation has been average. In 2008, about 43% of clients who receive dithe vouchers actually redeemed them This past season, the percentage of vouchers redeem ed increased to 48% St. John's Hospital feels that this is an important program, and has also donated over 153 staff hours and over \$4,600 in salary expenses for time spent on pla nning, organizing and working at the Farmer's Market. This worthy program takes much of our participation and could not happen without our dedicated support. While at the Farmer's Market, St. John's opens a booth where we can hand out healthy eating receipt cards, we can take blood pressure, provide body mass screenings and help show our support for our comm unity Partners in Education - St John's staff members and physicians understand that sha ring our knowledge with others helps to make our community stronger. It is gratifying to s hare our experience, talents and resources with students ranging from pre-school to reside nt physicians at the SIU School of Medicine Some staff members share an hour over their I unch to serve as mentors to children at local "at risk" schools. Others take the time to talk to students about their lives and the challenges they face as healthcare providers. St. John's Hospital has built Partners in Education with Jane Addams, St. Patrick's, McClern end, and Ridgley schools located in the Springfield area. In FY 2010, St. John's donated o ver \$3,800 to the schools for supply items and financial assistance St John's staff has also donated 24 hours of volunteer time and 3 hours of staff time toward helping to mentor these students Samaritan Guild Line - The Samaritan Guild Line is a service to our commu nity for the elderly, infirm, or those who live alone. If we are unable to reach the individual, then a pre designed procedure is followed. The Samaritan Guild Line devoted 24 volunteer hours and 144 staff hours in fiscal year 2010 to check on these individuals and just let them know that someone cares SHARE & SHARE Burial - Share is a Bereavement Support Program foir families that have experienced pregnancy and inf

ant loss. This program is available to assist in the grieving process. The program may include a burial, memorial service and support group at the family's option. The program's me morial kits are presented to the parent/s to help them remember baby and this is grant supported, but the caring staff at St. John's Hospital is supported entirely by St. John's In FY 2010, St. John's Hospital devoted over 84 staff hours to assisting 213 persons who we're a part of the SHARE program. The SHARE program and staff are there to help these parent s and families through the difficult time of loosing a child. Coalition Building Healthy Springfield - The goal of Healthy-Springfield is to educate the community about the choices they have available for their own aspects of holistic health and wellness. There is a dis connect between the traditional and complementary medical world. Individually, we work every day in some capacity to enhance the well-being of our clients, patients and/or customers. By coming together as a unified front of professionals, we can empower the people of the Springfield community's conscious awareness of health and wellness. As a healing ministry of the Catholic Church and an affiliate of the Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS), St. John's Hospital is committed to p. royiding quality medical healthcare to all who need care regardless of race, creed, sex, n ational origin, handicap, age, religion or ability to pay The hospital was founded over 1 35 years ago to bring a healing presence and improve the health of our community, especial ly for people who are sick, poor, and disadvantaged. Because of the hospital's purpose and tradition, it is organized to promote the health of Springfield and surrounding areas The hospital is governed by a Board of Directors, the majority of which is comprised of pers ons who reside in the organization's primary service area. The Board ensures that St. John 's Hospital is responding to community need in accordance with the process described under item #2 above Also consistent with its exempt purpose, St John's Hospital has an open m edical staff with privileges available to all qualified physicians in the area. St. John's Hospital is a tertiary care center with a designated Children's Hospital including Neonat al Intensive Care Unit and comprehensive Pediatric Services St John's shares designation as a Level I Trauma Center with Memorial Medical Center and SIU School of Medicine St. John's offers extensive cardiac, oncology, medical, surgical and obstetrical services. St. John's Hospital is affiliated with the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine in the medical education of 297 residents Programs include Family Practice, Surgery, Obstetrics & Gynecology, Pediatrics, Psychiatry, and Radiology In addition, the hospital operate's an emergency department that is open 24 hours to all persons regardless of their ability to pay. As a not-for-profit hospital. St. John's Hospital reinvests surplus funds into the mission of the organization and health of the community rather than distributing them as profits to shareholders or individuals. Funds not committed to ongoing operations are gen erally used to upgrade facilities, secure new technologies, improve patient care, and supp ort initiatives designed to promote health and ensure access for all For example, St. Johin's Hospital is currently working with its parent organization, Hospital Sisters Health Sylstem, to continuously enhance quality and improve coordination of care both inside the hos pital and with a growing number of physician partners. The following is an overview of the many programs and services that St. John's Hospital engaged in d. uring FY 2010 Responding When there is a need in the community, the staff members at St John's Hospital are always ready to lend a hand In Springfield, numerous community organ izations, led by Homeless United for Change (HUC), have been working diligently to address the basic needs of food and shelter for those in the community who are homeless. A vacate d church in downtown Springfield provides emergency accommodations for about 50 homeless residents each evening from November 1 through April 30 The shelter relies on volunteers for help with meal preparation and facility oversight. Recognizing the need, dozens of St John's staff members stepped up and cooked and served meals for residents on designated evenings during the months the shelter was in operation. Staff members also held special col lections at the hospital throughout the year for shelter residents and others in need. During four different collections, staff collected nearly 1,500 pounds of food items, personal hygiene items and clothing that went to clients of the homeless shelter, the Salvation A rmy, the Central Illinois Foodbank, Springfield Pregancy Care Center, Kumler Neighborhood Ministries' Food Pantry and Catholic Charities Responding to our community includes helping take care of those who are most vulnerable. The Pregnancy Care Center of Springfield, Inc., provides prenatal care for pregnant women, with an emphasis on serving young women with limited financial means or challenging family dynamics. The program serves low-income pregnant and parenting women and their children. The program provides mentoring, education and practical assistance St John's Hospital has helped to support this program by pro viding them with free office space, speakers, and various operating needs, such as printing of materials. St. John's Hospital has always understood the importance of helping those who are less fortunate. Our ministry of helping to feed the homeless and the hungry date black to the days when the Sisters provided sandwiches at the back door of the hospital Tod ay, St John's is proud to continue this tradition by supporting St John's Breadline Foo ditems from St John's cafeteria are packaged and sent to the Breadline, along with one-half pint milk cartons specifically purchased for this use St John's also provides mainte nance and repair work, pan washing and clean-up services. The foundational mission principles of Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS) embody the belief that every life is a sacred gift and every human being is a unity of body, mind and spirit. Our health c are ministry calls on us to foster healing, serve with compassion, and promote wellness for all persons, with special attention to our neighbors who are sick, poor, underserved, andd most vulnerable. These principles have made it possible for HSHS to provide high quality, cost-effective and compassionate health care for millions of people in Illinois and Wisc onsin. Our health care ministry consists of 13 hospitals and numerous physician partners committed to continuing the healing ministry of Jesus Christ Beyond functioning as a primary source for health care in the 12 primary communities we serve, HSHS also provides a wide array of Community Benefits that expand residents' access to health care, enhance their overall health status, and further medical education. In the Fiscal Year that ended June 3 0, 2010, HSHS hospitals provided \$152.2 million in Community Benefits (or 8.5% of total expenses), an increase of \$28 million from FY 2009 Of this amount, \$32.3 million was provided for charity care and \$89.2 million was the amount of unreimbursed care provided under t he Medicaid program. In addition, HSHS hospitals provided \$159.3 million in health care se rvices primarily to the elderly beneficiaries of the Medicare program in excess of governm ental and managed care contract payments. HSHS hospitals also recorded \$95 million in unco llectible accounts. HSHS is committed to sustaining and strengthening the health of our communities by continually reinvesting any surplus revenue from operations and investments i nto new medical technology, facility infrastructure and health care services. These ongoin g enhancements ensure that our hospitals can continue to provide high quality, compassiona te care to our patients. During Fiscal Year 2010, HSHS continued to pursue a Care Integrat ion strategy designed to continuously enhance quality and improve coordination of care bot hinside the hospital and with a growing number of physician partners. Supported by the system investments in information technology, this strategy is designed to better coordinate care, improve health outcomes, create new efficiencies, and help ensure that patients (es pecially those with chronic conditions) get well and stay well. The Care Integration strat egy includes, among other efforts, three "Medical Home" pilot projects, the coordination of care for cardiac patients living in rural communities through the use of telemedicine, and development of a "clinical integration network" that will help independent physicians i mprove quality and the patient experience by benchmarking their care against best practice s. HSHS also placed a special emphasis on investing in interoperable health information te chnologies and robust health information exchanges. We recognize that our investments in information technology will have a positive impact on the quality, safety and efficiency of health care. These investments also ensure that the patient is at the center of a high gu ality, highly integrated, compassionate health care delivery system. Expanding access to health care At the heart of our health care ministry is the commitment to care for every patient who seeks our help. Because not all patients have health insurance, HSHS hospitals have generous Charity Care program guidelines that cover 100% of hospital charges for individuals and families who earn less than 250% of the federal poverty level. Under these guid elines a family of four without health insurance that has an annual household income of \$5,125 or less is eligible for a 100% discount on their hospital bill HSHS Charity Care programs have a sliding scale, in some instances providing up to a 60% discount on charges for those earning up to 600% of the federal poverty level. Hospitals have created a simple two page form for those wishing to apply for Charity Care and assign counselors to visit with inpatients who are uninsured to let them know about our charity care policies and provide assistance filling out applications for financial assistance or enrollment in publicly funded health care programs. The gratitude of the people who have benefitted from our Charity Care program (sometimes referred to as Christian Care) is reflected in some of the thank you letters sent to St. Anthony's Memorial Hospital in Effingham, IL Comments include d "When I opened your letter today and read that you gave me a 100% Christian Care adjust ment, I gasped and started crying. For example, St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Belleville, IL hosts a FQHC primary care clinic adjacent to its Emergency Department and St. John's Hospital in Springfield, IL coordinates specialty physician referrals with the local FQHC and provides free health care to its clients. HSHS hospitals work collaboratively in their communities to support the various social services that together make up the fabric of the health care safetly net Sacred Heart Hospital in Eau Claire, WI provides leadership, staff support and labo ratory and radiology services for the Chippewa Valley Free Clinic During FY2010 Sacred He art's Lab performed 676 tests for patients from the clinic St. Mary's Hospital Medical Center in Green Bay, WI supports a Women's Place, which provides health care services and referrals for men and women in the Latino community "Because of language barriers, erratic work schedules and the lack of insurance and transportation, many in the Latino community a ren't able to access our health system," explains Program Director Carol Ponce "I feel it is important to overcome those barriers and build bridges for people in the Latino community to access health care and other services that contribute to their well-being. Our programs not only bring health care to the Latino community but joy and connection to other people from Mexico, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru and Puerto Rico "In rural Illinois, Prairie H eart Institute of Illinois (PHII), a physician group affiliated with HSHS, is bringing a higher level of cardiovascular care to patients in their communities through extensive coll aboration with local hospitals and physicians. Through regularly scheduled clinics and sha ring of protocols and best practices, rural hospitals across central and southern Illinois can more rapidly and accurately identify heart attack patients and speed treatment to min imize damage to the heart muscle. Meanwhile, access to clinical trials provides opportunities for patients in rural areas to have access to drugs and treatments available only thro ugh PHII "The result of this unique commitment is that regardless of where a patient live s, they will have access to care designed to detect heart disease earlier. We can also off er previously unavailable life-saving techniques and drugs and ensure a return to a quality of life," explains Jim Zito, PHII CEO. The benefits of this type of collaboration are mainy, including the standardization of quality assurance measures, the sharing of successful patient safety strategies, the addition of clinical research, workforce development and internal benchmarking.
