Unique Support for Each Child and Family

- DEPC launched its Family First system, a resource & referral system that has yielded nearly 7,200 contacts with 3,200 clients (parents and children). The system tracks referrals to nearly 200 services in Nash and Edgecombe counties, services provided, and other case management data.
- Family support programs offered through Family Resource Centers, School Systems, Departments of Social Services, and Library served over 5,300 parents and children.

High Quality Early Care & Education Environments

- DEPC has built the quality of childcare to the extent that 69% and 70% of children in Nash and Edgecombe counties are in the highest quality care. From salary supplements to training and technical assistance, DEPC served over 800 childcare providers in the two counties, affecting thousands of children in childcare.
- DEPC has worked with 14 out of 19 elementary schools on its Ready Schools Initiative to ensure that elementary schools are ready to receive all children. Schools that completed their Ready Schools plan improved in four dimensions of the High/Scope Ready

School Assessment: Leaders and Leadership, Transitions, Family, School, and Community Partnerships and Respecting Diversity.

Access to Coordinated Community Resources

DEPC has grown its networks of community leaders from businesses, faith-based organizations, civic organizations, human service agencies, and other grassroots. To date, this has included over 75 community leaders that have completed a leadership development program, over 60 faithbased leaders who have participated in education forums, 60 community members participating on community-school teams, and over 50 partners that joined the Healthy Kids Collaborative.


