As discussed herein, Kennestone Hospital, Inc (an affiliate of Wellstar Health System, Inc) operates as a charitable organization consistent with the requirements of Internal Revenue Code Section 501 (c) (3) and the "community benefit standard" of IRS Revenue Ruling 69-545 In this regard, the governing body of the organization and/or its parent is composed of prominent citizens in the community, medical staff privileges in the hospital are available to all qualified physicians in the area, consistent with the size and nature of the facility, one of the hospitals operates a full-time emergency room open to all regardless of the ability to pay, the hospital provides care to needy members of its community consistent with its charity care policy regardless of their ability to pay for these services and admits as patients those able to pay for care, either themselves or through third-party payers such as private health insurance or government programs such as Medicare and Medicaid, and the hospital's excess funds are generally applied to expansion and replacement of existing facilities and equipment, amortization of indebtedness, improvement in patient care, community benefit activities, and charity care Kennestone Hospital, Inc consists of two hospitals, Wellstar Kennestone and Wellstar Windy Hill These hospitals combined to invest approximately \$42 million in capital expenditures for the fiscal period Wellstar Kennestone Hospital is a general acute hospital which provides a full range of inpatient and outpatient services for the overall health of the community The hospital is located in Marietta, Georgia The original hospital was constructed in 1950 The present main building was constructed in 1975 Kennestone is licensed to operate 633 beds and is currently staffed to operate 586 beds Wellstar Windy Hill Hospital is located in the unincorporated area of Cobb County in northwest metropolitan Atlanta It is an acute care hospital concentrating at the present time on long term care inpatient and outpatient services The original structure was built in 1973 and renovated in 1987 The beds at Windy Hill serve medically complex patients whose average stay is approximately 30 days Kennestone Hospital, Inc affiliated with Northwest Georgia Health System in 1993 In 1994 Northwest Georgia Health System helped form the Promina Health System and changed its name to Promina Northwest Health System In 1998 Promina Northwest changed its name to Wellstar Health System Wellstar became totally independent of Promina in 2000 Kennestone Hospital, Inc was organized in 1993 and is subordinate to, and subject to the authority of, Wellstar Health System and its governing board Kennestone offers most major inpatient clinical services, a variety of outpatient services, women's services and open heart surgery It is one of the largest hospitals in the state of Georgia Kennestone is also home to a variety of state-of-the-art procedures and equipment not offered elsewhere in the larger Atlanta metro service area The hospital has also opened several satellite outpatient imaging centers to provide easier access to our patient population One additional service offered on the campus of Kennestone is called Atherton Place This residential facility provides independent housing as well as assisted living to residents needing these services--especially the elderly (Windy Hill has transitioned its focus to long-term inpatient and outpatient services These services include a concentration in geriatrics, rehabilitation, orthopedics impact of approximately \$1 5 billion and are responsible for creating over 8,000 jobs for the local and state economy Community Benefits Detail Kennestone and Windy Hill, affiliates of Wellstar Health System, participate in many community and educational programs for the overall health and benefit of the area that it serves The following are examples of programs or services that are provided by Kennestone Hospital, Inc for the charitable benefit of the community (and the program's value if known) Community Health/Education Wellstar's Marketing and Public Relations department provides free brochures on a variety of health-related topics such as blood pressure, diabetes, cholesterol, osteoporosis, and nutrition Kennestone Hospital specifically offers the community the space and instructors for many support groups and educational opportunities--some free of charge and others at a nominal fee (examples of the offerings are women's health, palliative care, birthing classes, etc) Kennestone and Windy Hill also offer free and/or low cost screenings for health issues such as blood pressure, cholesterol, flu shots, and others The hospitals also help sponsor an annual "Latino" health fair to reach out to the ever expanding Hispanic community that it serves System-wide for the reporting period over 200,000 area residents were seen at either the screenings or health fairs School Health Program This program is operated in conjunction with area school systems and seeks to teach school-aged children about health and safety topics such as dental health, water safety, seat belt safety and others Safe Kids-Cobb/Cherokee Wellstar and the Cobb Public Health Department sponsor safety education events on an annual basis to the community, specifically the Cobb County area The safety initiatives are centered around car seat checks, bike helmets, water safety and other preventive initiatives The mission is to reduce the number of accidental injuries for children ages 14 and under The SafeKids Cobb program provided 1,750 car seat checks and distributed 750 free car seats to families in need Women's and Children's Resource Center The Women's and Children Resource Center of Kennestone had unreimbursed costs of approximately \$225,000 This program provides much needed support for mothers and their newborn babies The program demonstrates our commitment to the health and well-being of new mothers and babies in our community Other Programs Kennestone Hospital and Wellstar sponsor several other programs which may not have a specific value associated with them but offer health and education to the community The Partner-in-Education program provides health-related supplies and support to area elementary and middle schools Through the "Partners in Ministry" program, the Pastoral Care Department leads a partnership between the health system and local area congregations to link between the spiritual and clinical community needs As a component with our relationship with the International Theological Center, Wellstar Windy Hill hosted 10 seminary students for a semester of time to provide on-the-job experience to pastoral students The training allowed students to become familiar with the needs associated with the long term care needs of patients, families and Wellstar staff Wellstar offers a Disease Management program in which five chronic diseases are monitored for patients through periodic updates by a Wellstar clinician (via phone) This program helped reduce both hospital admissions and ER visits for those patients in the program Sponsorships and Community Activities Employees participated in the Heart Walk in support of those suffering from heart disease A group of Kennestone Hospital employees also volunteered to participate in the "Relay for Life" event to raise funds and awareness of cancer treatment and prevention The event benefited the American Cancer Society A portion of the Kennestone Hospital community is beneficiary of some of Wellstar's sponsorships and contributions Windy Hill Hospital staff and physicians conducted a mock patient evacuation to assess emergency preparedness in the event of a disaster The drill was deemed a huge success Several fund raising events were sponsored by the System for the benefit of not only the health-related organizations such as American Cancer Society and American Heart Association but also the Cobb County area

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 1

Kennestone Hospital, Inc is an affiliate of Wellstar Health System, Inc (EIN 58-1649541) which on an annual basis issues a community benefit report for the system This report is subsequently distributed in and around the five county service areas for the health system

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 1

As stated previously we use a cost to charge ratio to determine the percentages of community benefit expense to total expense (less the bad debt totals for the organization) The cost to charge ratio is based on the Medicare cost report and the state annual hospital financial survey

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 1

Wellstar Health System and Kennestone Hospital Inc use the cost to charge ratio from our FY2009 Hospital Financial Survey filed with the state of Georgia This cost to charge ratio reconciles with the community benefit reporting done both internally in the system and with our annual published community benefit report which is distributed to the Wellstar service areas as well as reported to the Georgia Hospital Association for its annual report to the community We then compare the cost to the total expense from Form 990 Part IX line 25 column A to determine the ratios in Schedule H Part 1 Line 7 column f as stated We also adjust the total expenses to deduct the amount of bad debt expense prior to the calculation of the percentage of community benefit expense

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 1

The costing methodology used in determining the amounts reported on lines 2 and 3 for Part III Bad Debt, Medicare and Collection Practices is calculated using the same ratios used for charity care to apply against the bad debt expense and determine the costs associated with those expenses. While most of the costs of bad debt is not applicable for community benefit we have determined that some patient accounts that were previously classified as bad debt are subsequently determined to qualify for charity and indigent care adjustments. This determination can occur due to inadequate information being available at the time of service as well as throughout the collection cycle as the patient's financial status may periodically change. One example of this scenario would be undocumented aliens and crime victim patients eligible for charity and indigent care who refuse to provide the paperwork necessary to either qualify for that assistance or a government program. The percentage of accounts that we feel meet this criteria is a conservative estimate. Generally speaking however, Wellstar does not treat bad debt as uncompensated care.

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 1

The Medicare shortfall reported on Line 7 of Form 990 Schedule H Part III is determined from the difference between the reimbursement from Medicare and the cost of those Medicare charges generated at Kennestone and Windy Hill Hospitals. A large portion of that shortfall represents co-pays and deductibles for Medicare beneficiaries. These Medicare patients often lack the financial resources to pay these bills and subsequently become bad debt accounts which may contribute to the calculated shortfalls. While Medicare will recognize bad debt as a reimburseable item on the annual cost report, it will only be reimbursed at approximately 70% of the amount submitted.

The policy written for collection practices at all Wellstar Health System entities incorporates guidelines for personnel in the patient registration areas to be trained in identifying patients that might qualify for charity care or other financial assistance. It is also the policy of all Wellstar hospitals to have at least one employee available 24 hours a day (especially in hospitals with emergency rooms) on duty to provide assistance for the paperwork necessary to qualify for charity care or governmental assistance programs.

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 1

Wellstar Kennestone Hospital is a general acute care hospital providing a full range of services, is licensed to operate 633 beds and is presently staffed to operate 586 beds. It is located on an approximately 41-acre campus in Marietta, Georgia with a complex of buildings containing a total square footage in excess of 1.2 million square feet. The original hospital was constructed in 1950 with several major additions in the 1960s. The present main building was constructed in 1975 and several more additions have been completed that make up the current campus including a new tower several years ago which makes Kennestone one of the largest hospitals in the state of Georgia. Wellstar Windy Hill Hospital, located in the unincorporated area of Cobb County in northwest metropolitan Atlanta, is an acute care hospital concentrating on long-term care inpatient and outpatient services. The hospital is licensed to operate 115 beds and is presently staffed to operate 55 beds, is located on an approximately 15-acre campus, and contains total square footage of approximately 100,000 square feet. The original hospital was constructed in 1973 and went through a major renovation in 1987. The services provided include a full range of long-term acute care services and several specialty areas including a sleep disorder center.

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 2

Wellstar Health System (including its affiliates Kennestone and Windy Hill Hospitals) is a key stakeholder in MAPP, Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships. MAPP, developed by the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) in collaboration with the CDC, provides a structured guidance on creating and implementing a community-wide strategic planning process focused on improving the health and safety of our population. Through MAPP, a broad collection of community partners and residents come together to identify and prioritize health and safety issues and to identify resources for addressing them. The process results in an actionable Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) for measureable improvements in the community's health and quality of life as well as a scorecard for implementation and evaluation. The resulting community plan does not focus on one agency or community health challenge, rather, MAPP provides a long-term strategy that addresses the multiple factors that affect health in the community. Community involvement throughout the creation and the implementation of a health improvement plan results in creative solutions to community health problems with an improved focus on priorities, reduced duplication of services, increased collaboration on projects and activities, and increased capacity to garner additional resources. Moreover, continuous community involvement leads to community ownership of the process. Community ownership, in turn, increases the credibility and sustainability of the health improvement efforts.

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 3

Kennestone and Windy Hill Hospital provide patients with financial counselors who are trained in all of the charity and uncompensation programs, payment plans, discounted payments plans and other programs offered across the health system. This includes at least one counselor in the emergency room on duty at all times. The counselors are well versed in eligibility for Medicare and Medicaid if appropriate for the patient. If the patient is pregnant and not covered by insurance or another government program the counselor can assist the patient in obtaining Medicaid coverage (based on their income level) regardless of the patient's citizenship. If the patient is indigent or charity eligible they will be offered assistance through the hospital's Charity and Indigent Care Policy including the application for the state's Indigent Care Trust Fund. If the patient has no other insurance and fails to qualify for indigent care the financial counselor can then offer the patient an opportunity to accept a payment plan with discounted options based on their ability to pay at time of service or over time. All patients are afforded these opportunities.

Form 990 Schedule H, Part VI - Supplemental Information, Line 4

Kennestone and Windy Hill Hospitals are two of five hospitals that are affiliated with the parent corporation, Wellstar Health System. The primary service area of the system is located in Northwest GA and receives the majority and is expected to receive the majority of its patients from one of the following five counties--Bartow, Cherokee, Cobb, Douglas and Paulding--generally about 85 to 90%. While these five counties are in the metropolitan Atlanta area (or border on the metro area) they are in some of the fastest growing areas in the entire country. The system has therefore expanded to bring many services to the geographic area that previously were not available except in the Atlanta community. Economically the region is strong in per capita income but as in many areas of the country the system has seen an increase in overall population unemployment and thus an increase in the uninsured or underinsured and indigent population for the patients it serves. The system is however poised to meet many of these challenges with a completely integrated health system of hospitals, physician offices, outpatient imaging centers, urgent care centers and eventually health parks.
