COMMITMENT TO BENEFITING OUR COMMUNITIES CHRISTUS Spohn Health System is part of CHRISTUS Health, formed in 1999 to strengthen the 144-year-old, faith-based health care ministries of the Congregations of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word of Houston and San Antonio Founded on the mission "to extend the healing ministry of Jesus Christ," CHRISTUS reaches out to, and beyond, the more than 60 communities we serve to help those in need The vision of CHRISTUS Health as a Catholic, faith-based ministry, is to be a leader, a partner and an advocate in creating innovative health and wellness solutions that improve the lives of individuals and communities so that all may experience God’s healing presence and love CHRISTUS Spohn Health System responds to the health care needs through services provided at CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Corpus Christi with three campuses -- the 557-bed Shoreline campus, the 341 bed Memorial campus, and the 158-bed South campus Additionally, we serve our communities through CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Kleberg with 100 beds in Kingsville, CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Alice with 186 beds in Alice, and CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Beeville in Beeville with 69 beds Each of the facilities of CHRISTUS Spohn Health System share one objective -- which is to lead the way to a healthier community The CHRISTUS Spohn Health System is located along the lower Texas coastal area (often called the Coastal Bend), its service area includes a 15-county area with a population of more than 586,000 individuals In our 2010 fiscal year alone, we were privileged to serve hundreds of thousands of individuals in various ways including 177,183 visits to our emergency departments, 11,683 inpatient surgery procedures, 14,021 outpatient surgery procedures, 44,604 patients who were admitted to our hospitals for care and 470,270 patients who received outpatient care at our facilities Touching the lives of the people around us is what makes CHRISTUS Spohn Health System stand apart Allowing others to touch us gives us a vision for the medically needy in each of the communities we serve Whether it is the life of a child expecting a future filled with miracles, the life of a man in need of a critical heart surgery, or the life of a woman about to give birth to her first child, CHRISTUS Spohn Health System's health care services work to provide the highest quality care regardless of an individual's ability to pay By collaborating with communities, churches, businesses and other health care organizations, CHRISTUS Spohn Health System's various entities have strengthened their roles as major providers of comprehensive, accessible health care services These partnerships with the community have been a blessing to CHRISTUS Spohn Health System in helping us learn how to better respond to those in need Furthermore, investment in community services would not be possible without dedicated employees and volunteers They help to build strong relationships between the hospitals and other health care ministries and the communities, nurturing CHRISTUS' mission to meet the needs and make a difference in the lives of others Our employees work both inside and outside the walls of our health care facilities and are committed to reaching beyond the traditional hospital walls to help our communities maintain good health Understanding the need to provide access to health care to as much of our publics as possible, CHRISTUS Health participates in government-sponsored health care programs, including Medicaid, Medicare, CHAMPUS, TRICARE and others In addition, we provide specific programs to provide free or discounted services to those in need who do not have medical insurance or who do not participate in government-sponsored programs CHRISTUS Spohn Health System provides a full range of inpatient and outpatient services to the people from the communities it serves It conducts its activities and serves its health care purpose without regard to race, color, creed, religion, gender, orientation, disability, age or national origin Each of the six hospitals of CHRISTUS Spohn Health System provides a 24-hour emergency room that is open to serve all those in need of emergent care, regardless of their ability to pay CHRISTUS Spohn Health System also supports many local community health services, offering convenient locations for primary care through the CHRISTUS Spohn Family Health Centers, rural health clinics, and a mobile outreach clinic In addition, CHRISTUS Spohn collaborates with the Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) in our region, as well as other not-for-profit health clinics in the area that are committed to creating greater access to primary care As one example, CHRISTUS Spohn provided free lab services for over 1,200 patients seen by Mission of Mercy, a not-for-profit, free health clinic that utilizes the services of volunteer physicians and nurses and uses donated space in churches located throughout the region As a not-for-profit organization and as part of CHRISTUS Health, a regional governing board comprised largely of independent community members representing the makeup of the area we serve, guides the CHRISTUS Spohn Health System We are privileged to have an open medical staff comprised of qualified physicians who work with us to provide care to our communities All qualified physicians who are granted privileges to serve with us in our hospitals must undergo a thorough and comprehensive credentialing and orientation process

COMMUNITY BENEFIT REPORTING - CHARITY CARE AND MEDICAID CHRISTUS adheres to the Catholic Health Association's "A Guide for Planning and Reporting Community Benefit" (2008), and complies with the State of Texas requirements for reporting Community benefit, reported as unpaid costs, includes both Chanty Care and Community Services To the limits of its resources, CHRISTUS Health is an institution of purely public charity, thus, the most tangible expression of CHRISTUS Health's charitable purpose is the provision of health care services to those persons who are unable to pay This falls into two categories Chanty Care and Unpaid Government Indigent Care In keeping with the mission, values, and vision of CHRISTUS Health, CHRISTUS Spohn Health System provides Chanty Care services in a manner that respects the dignity of the patients and their families Chanty Care is defined as services provided without charge or at a charge that is less than the usual charge for such services The determination as to the amount to charge, if any, is according to a patient's ability to pay as determined by the established eligibility criteria For uninsured patients whose economic circumstances place them at or under 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPL), services are provided without any expectation of payment Uninsured patients whose economic circumstances place them between 200 and 400 percent of FPL are charged based on a sliding scale, and those above 400 percent receive discounts based on the uninsured fee schedule CHRISTUS Spohn also discounts care for those whose medical expenses would deplete their financial resources If a bill, after all payments, is still in excess of 25% of the family's annual gross income, the remaining bill is discounted No patient is refused necessary medical care due to inability to pay CHRISTUS Health is an active participant in the States of Texas and Louisiana Medicaid Programs Those programs seek to provide payment for health care services to individuals who meet certain financial and other requirements Financial requirements include evaluation of both assets and income

OTHER GOVERNMENT SPONSORED SERVICES In addition to the provision of Chanty Care and other community services, CHRISTUS Health provides services to persons covered under government-sponsored programs, including Medicare and TRICARE The non-reimbursed cost of these services is reported to the State of Texas, but is not included in federal reports since CHRISTUS Health follows Catholic Health Association guidelines CHRISTUS Health provides services to persons covered under the federal Medicare Program, and in fact, this is the largest single payor classification of patients served by this health system The payment rate for inpatient services is on a case rate, calculated based on the diagnostic-related group (DRG) into which the patient is categorized Outpatient services are reimbursed per the Medicare fee schedule

The footnote to the CHRISTUS Health consolidated financial statements says, "The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States requires management of the system to make assumptions, estimates, and adjustments that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements, including the notes thereto, and related disclosures of commitments and contingencies, if any. The system considers critical accounting policies to be those that require more significant judgments and estimates in the preparation of its financial statements, including the following: recognition of net patient revenues, which includes contractual allowances, provisions for bad debt, reserves for losses and expenses related to health care professional and general liabilities, determination of fair values of certain financial instruments, and risks and assumptions for measurement of pension and retiree medical liabilities. Management relies on historical experience and on other assumptions believed to be reasonable under the circumstances in making its judgment and estimates. Actual results could differ materially from these estimates." In order to determine the bad debt expense at cost (Schedule H, Part III, Section A, Line 2), the organization's total bad debt expense (total of all hospital facilities) in accordance with the organization's financial statements was multiplied by the cost-to-charge ratio.

Accounts with a balance of less than \$2,000 are screened for charity care qualification based on systematic screening criteria unless patient contact is made. Accounts with a balance of \$2,000 or greater are manually reviewed to determine if any potential eligibility programs are applicable based upon front-end screening tool documentation and review of diagnoses and services provided. If a patient completes a financial aid application and qualifies for charity care or falls under a charity care account based on the presumptive charity test, all debt collection activities cease. Accounts that are not deemed eligible for charity care or medical indigence will continue the collection cycle until they are written off as bad debt.

Unreimbursed Medicaid PART I, LINE 7B CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation reinvests all surplus funds back in to the communities we serve through expanded health services, new technologies, and better facilities. Cash and In-Kind Contributions to Community Groups PART I, LINE 7I CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation made over \$789,000 in cash and in kind contributions. The aforementioned amount is determined in accordance with reporting rules for Schedule H, Worksheet 8. As such this amount differs from grants reported at Form 990, Schedule I, Grants and Other Assistance to Organizations, Governments, and Individuals and Part IX, Lines 1 through 3 Grants and Other Assistance. CHRISTUS Health established the CHRISTUS Fund, a grant fund to provide resources to nonprofit agencies and groups whose vision, mission, and goals are consistent with CHRISTUS Health's mission, values and philosophy of a healthy community. CHRISTUS Fund grants totaling \$422,340 benefitted the community that CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation serves. The grant dollars were used by CHRISTUS Spohn to support programs that promote the health of the community. The CHRISTUS Fund grants used directly by CHRISTUS Spohn were used to introduce Community Health Workers and a care management program called "CARE Partners," aimed at chronic disease management for underserved patients in CHRISTUS Spohn family health centers and clinics. This program has proven to be instrumental in reducing the number of preventable hospitalizations for our patients. The CHRISTUS Fund grant amount also includes grants made by CHRISTUS Health to nonprofit organizations located in the communities served by the Spohn region, as well as grants made by CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation to other nonprofit organizations. All grants made to outside organizations through the CHRISTUS Fund are made to nonprofit organizations that support the health of the community. CHRISTUS Health has also established an Education and Research Fund. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation received \$44,913 from the fund and used such resources to benefit the community by providing research and educational projects sponsored by the CHRISTUS Spohn Region.

The participants included CHRISTUS Spohn Healthcare System, Coastal Bend Council of Governments/Area Agency on Aging, Nueces County MHMR, Workforce 1, Nueces County Community Action Agency, Driscoll Children's Hospital, Coastal Bend Community Foundation, Coastal Plain MHMR, Accessible Communities, Corpus Christi Medical Center, and United Way of the Coastal Bend. A new community needs assessment was conducted during the third and fourth quarters of FY 2010. A Community Benefit Planning Committee initiated by Spohn Health System was formed and is comprised of physicians, associates, and community members to ensure that the CHRISTUS Spohn community benefit plan accurately reflects the needs of the community and is community owned. CHRISTUS Spohn Board members will review and approve the plan. The group has committed to continued work related to the community health needs assessment in the Spohn region for the long-term. This includes regular meetings of this group of community stakeholders.

Part VI, Line 3 CHRISTUS Spohn makes every effort to educate patients on its Charity and Discount Policy and about their eligibility for assistance under federal, state, or local government programs during registration, pre registration (for scheduled tests and surgeries), post registration (during their hospitalization) and following discharge (telephone or written inquiry) in languages appropriate for the population being served. Patients are given information and forms by a financial counselor who helps them complete the forms during their inpatient and outpatient visits. Patients are asked to bring or mail supporting documentation to determine income, assets and household expenses. The Business Office reviews the application based on the information provided by the patient. If the patient qualifies for charity care or a discount, a new bill is generated. Patients who do not provide the required documentation are considered ineligible and are billed accordingly. If the documentation is provided at a later time, the patient may then be determined to be eligible for charity care or a discount. Documentation is retained by the billing office for seven years. A public notice regarding the charity care policy is posted in prominent places throughout the hospital, including but not limited to the emergency room waiting area, and the admissions office waiting area as required by both the State of Texas Community Benefit Standard (which addresses the duties and responsibilities of nonprofit hospitals) and CHRISTUS Health Community Benefit Guidelines #050. In addition, a public notice regarding the charity care policy and information on financial assistance are also posted on the CHRISTUS HEALTH Website. The information on financial assistance includes explanations on the availability of financial assistance, who qualifies, and how to apply for financial assistance.

Overall, population growth is flat in the region with the exception of Aransas County and the 78414 zip code, where CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Corpus Christi - South is located. The population by age is allocated as follows: 0-14 (21%), 15-17 (4.6%), 18-24 (10.8%), 25-34 (13.2%), 35-54 (26.1%), 55-64 (10.8%), 65+ (12.8%). Population declines are expected to continue in the rural areas. Flat growth is expected in pediatric and the population under 45 years of age, with strongest growth in the population of 65 years of age or older. The region is made of 60 percent Hispanics, 35 percent Caucasian, 4 percent African American, and 1 percent Asian Pacific Islanders. Approximately 55 percent of households live at or below the federal poverty level, with the median household income in the region being \$45,000. Nearly 50 percent of the population is Medicaid or uninsured. Looking at the region's demographics and the "Healthy People 2010 Health Status Indicators" relative to other counties across the country, the following health indicators appear "unfavorable" relative to peer counties: Premature birth weights, Births to unmarried teens, Hispanic infant mortality in rural areas, Obesity, Diabetes, Stroke, Coronary heart disease, Colon Cancer, and breast cancer. In addition to the six facilities that comprise the CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation, there are four other hospitals in the region: Corpus Christi Medical Center's three campuses (Bay Area Hospital, Heart Hospital and Doctor's Regional Hospital) which are for-profit entities owned by HCA, and Driscoll Children's Hospital, a nonprofit hospital. Additionally, Coastal Bend Surgical Hospital, a new for-profit surgical hospital opened in Corpus Christi in December of 2009.

Part VI, Line 5 The CHRISTUS Health Board of Directors approved funding of a Community Direct Investment (CDI) loan program to ensure that the work of social accountability and moral and ethical stewardship continues in spite of challenging fiscal conditions faced by local operating entities. The purpose of the CDI program is to support community driven initiatives, primarily for affordable housing and economic development by providing financing at below market interest rates to nonprofit organizations at terms not exceeding more than five years. Though outstanding loan balances vary throughout the year, the outstanding loan balance at the end of Fiscal Year 2010 was \$2,531,934. The income earned at the market rate less our loan rate (foregone income) is considered a community benefit for reporting purposes. The foregone interest for CHRISTUS Spohn in fiscal year ending June 30, 2010 was \$72,133. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation has partnered with various local agencies including ACCION of Texas and Nueces County Community Action Agency. The Nueces County community Action Agency is a nonprofit organization that provides low income housing those improving the quality of life for those underserved populations that have chronic conditions. The Nueces County Community Action Agency also provides programs related to education, health, disabilities, mental health, nutrition, and family services which were all identified as community needs for vulnerable populations. The CHRISTUS Health Advocacy department is working in partnership with local, state and federal policy makers to ensure activities and programs are in place that will enhance public health and advance general knowledge. During FY 2010, CHRISTUS Health advocated for improving public policies, working to establish and in some instances augment grassroots advocacy and greater access to healthcare services for the constituents we serve. Some of the main Community Building Activities are improving access to health services, enhancing public health, and advancing knowledge to include expanding the current enrollment program for indigent and Medicaid recipients to offer low insurance products for those ineligible for Medicaid/CHIP.

Part VI, Line 6 CHRISTUS Spohn Health System includes CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Corpus Christi with three campuses -- the 557-bed Shoreline campus, the 341 bed Memorial campus, and the 158-bed South campus. Additionally, we serve our communities through CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Kleberg with 100 beds in Kingsville, CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Alice with 186 beds in Alice, and CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Beeville in Beeville with 69 beds. CHRISTUS Spohn collaborates with communities, churches, businesses, and other health care organizations to facilitate and strengthen accessibility of quality comprehensive health care services for all, including those among vulnerable and underserved populations. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System other health care facilities include indirect partial ownership in two ambulatory surgery centers- Corpus Part VI, Line 6 Christi Surgicare, Ltd. and Shoreline Surgery Center, L.L.P. and two imaging centers- Portland Imaging Center, Ltd. and Coastal Bend PET Scan, Ltd. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation provides a full range of inpatient and outpatient services to the people from the communities it serves. It conducts its activities and serves its healthcare purpose without regard to race, color, creed, religion, gender, or orientation, disability, age or national origin. Each of the six hospitals of CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation provides a 24-hour emergency room that is open to serve all those in need of emergent care, regardless of their ability to pay. In FY2010, CHRISTUS Spohn was privileged to serve hundreds of thousands of individuals in various ways, including 1,771,183 visits to its Emergency Departments, 11,683 surgery procedures within its hospitals, 14,021 outpatient surgery procedures, 44,604 patients who were admitted to its hospitals for care and 470,270 patients who receive outpatient care at its facilities. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation also supports many local community health services, offering convenient locations for primary care through the CHRISTUS Spohn Family Health Centers and a mobile outreach clinic. In addition, CHRISTUS Spohn collaborates with the four Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC's) in our region, as well as other nonprofit health clinics in the area that are committed to creating greater access to primary care. Activities undertaken by the organization to improve access to health services, enhance public health and advance knowledge include: (1) Employment of four primary care physicians and three mid-level providers in the four CHRISTUS Spohn Family Health Centers. Recruitment effort continues to add 2 physicians to further increase capacity. Many of the clients seen are uninsured or on Medicaid/CHIP who receive primary care and chronic disease management. (2) Development and implementation of the Community Health Worker (CHW) and CARE management concept at all Corpus Spohn Family Health Centers to help patients with chronic illness prevent over-utilization of the Emergency Department and avoid preventable hospitalizations. (3) The mobile unit delivers OB/GYN care to the region's uninsured women including mammograms and prenatal care. In FY2010, 1,261 patients were served at an unreimbursed expense of \$1,033,018 to the CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation. This preventative and wellness care helps with early detection of conditions that otherwise might result in a more serious health issue that could require lengthier hospitalizations in the future. (4) The Hector P. Garcia and the CHRISTUS Medical Group faculty practice clinics are located onsite at CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Corpus Christi Memorial. An average of 125 to 150 patients are seen there on a daily basis. Most of these patients have Medicaid coverage or lack insurance. (5) Specialty clinics are located on the seventh floor at CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital - Memorial. These clinics exist for follow-up care and specialty care. Physician/providers offer a centralized area for easy access to care for those who would not normally be able to access specialty care outside of this type of controlled setting. (6) The revamping of Nueces County Health Department (NCHD) indigent care program has provided a reorganization of services in which one key goal is to route eligible participants to the appropriate settings. The following programs are included: (a) UM/CM plan, (b) Pre-approval of services with verification of medical necessity and a tie-in into the CARE management program, (c) An empanment of clients into a Medical Home concept, (d) Target of populations, i.e., diabetic patients with A1C's greater than 10, into full service track, (e) Weekly multidisciplinary diabetic clinic to meet target population's need, (f) Pharmaceutical Case Management, (g) Preferred provider list with CM/UM management, (h) Medical Director for Indigent Care Plan. (7) CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Memorial is the designated contract provider with Nueces County MHMR. It provides psychiatric onsite triage.

s part of its contractual relationships with MHMR. This prevents patients from visiting the Emergency Department as a first resort. (8) Employed a CHW specifically for Behavioral Medicine. This helped to keep patients out of the Emergency Department and Psychiatric unit. This program was a finalist for a CHRISTUS Touchstone Award recognizing best practices across CHRISTUS Health. (9) CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation Hospitals Alice, Beeville, and Kleberg collaborate with the Community Action Corporation of South Texas' FQHC's in their respective areas. These clinics provide primary care to uninsured and underinsured patients. This keeps patients from utilizing the hospital emergency departments as their medical home. (10) Actively participates in Jail Diversion Program with Nueces County through Behavioral Medicine Services. (11) Continued initiatives with the Coastal Bend Rural Health Partnership and mental health providers to help keep psychiatric patients out of the Emergency Department. (12) Partner with Mission of Mercy, a national nonprofit organization, which provides free primary care to uninsured patients. Their five locations (Corpus Christi and rural areas) are open one day a week, alternating weeks, and are staffed by volunteer physicians and nurses. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation provides all the lab work and offers diabetes education to patients at no charge. In addition, its OB Mobile Clinic refers uninsured patients who need primary care to Mission of Mercy. Likewise, Mission of Mercy refers women needing a mammogram or prenatal care to the CSHS mobile unit. (13) Diabetes education is provided through Diabetes Self Management Training (DSMT) classes. These classes are offered at a new Diabetes Center established on the campus of the CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Memorial campus, as well as SAH, SBH, SKH and the CHRISTUS Spohn Robstown Family Health Center. Classes began at CHRISTUS Spohn Hospital Corpus Christi - Shoreline on Oct 7, 2009. Diabetes support groups currently meet at SMH, SAH, SBH and the Robstown FHC. Regional education is coordinated through the Coastal Bend Diabetes Community Coalition and Diabetes Health Fairs. All six campuses now hold the American Diabetes Association Accreditation for Diabetes Education. (14) Through the First Friday Program, CHRISTUS Spohn performed over 1500 free mammograms in fiscal year 2010 to assist persons who would not ordinarily have access to mammograms for early diagnosis of breast cancer. In fiscal year 2010, CHRISTUS Spohn provided free prostate cancer screenings to 79 men in the community and 133 free melanoma screenings. "COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR A BROADER COMMUNITY" is also a part of CHRISTUS Spohn's overall community benefit. The greatest share of these expenses is for educating health professionals (Graduate Medical Education, nursing students, allied health professionals, pharmacists, etc). Helping to prepare future health care professionals is a distinguishing characteristic of nonprofit health care and constitutes a significant community benefit. CHRISTUS Spohn provided more than \$8,435,000 in health professions education during FY2010 to include clinical experiences and other education for physicians and nurses. CHRISTUS Health also used cash donations as a vehicle to help our communities. The system made cash donations, in addition to grants awarded through the CHRISTUS Fund, to support causes like the fight against cancer, diabetes, heart disease, provision of a continuum of care for our elderly, those suffering from HIV/AIDS, and for many other equally worthy purposes. CHRISTUS Spohn reinvests all surplus funds back into the communities we serve through expanded health services, new technologies, and better facilities. As a nonprofit organization and as a part of CHRISTUS Health, a regional governing board comprised largely of independent community members representing the makeup of the area we serve guides CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation.

Part VI, Line 7 CHRISTUS Spohn is part of CHRISTUS Health, an international, Catholic, faith based, nonprofit health system comprised of almost 350 services and facilities including more than 50 hospitals and long term care facilities, 175 clinics and outpatient centers, and other community health ministries and community development ventures. CHRISTUS services can be found in Arkansas, Georgia, Iowa, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, Texas, and in six provinces of Mexico. A common mission, core values and vision unite the allied health system. Each region, including CHRISTUS Spohn, develops five-year and 10-year strategic plans that helps set the yearly operational plans and budgets. Regional strategic goals are set in collaboration with CHRISTUS Health including metrics that will be used to measure community benefit, clinical outcomes, patient satisfaction and Associate engagement. CHRISTUS Health provides updated market, demographics, and health indicator data on an annual basis. In addition, the CHRISTUS Spohn region works closely with the CHRISTUS Community Health Council to meet system wide initiatives for addressing community needs. Currently, these initiatives include increasing access to primary care, avoiding Emergency Department visits, preventable hospitalizations, a case management program for patients of our clinics who have chronic illness, diabetes education, and creating affordable senior housing opportunities in the region. Part VI, Line 7 The data supplied from CHRISTUS Health along with the system wide strategic initiatives are consistent with the community needs assessment of the region. CHRISTUS Spohn Health System Corporation, in turn, partners with other nonprofit groups (churches, health care providers, and government agencies) to create collaborations where health needs can be addressed and the general health of individuals and the community is improved.
