	COMMUNITY BENEFIT REPORTING - CHARITY CARE AND MEDICAID CHRISTUS adheres to the Catholic Health Association's A Guide for Planning and Reporting Community Benefit (2008), and complies with the State of Texas requirements for reporting Community Benefit, reported as unpaid costs, includes both Chanty Care and Community Services. To the limits of its resources, CHRISTUS Health is an institution of purely public charity, thus, the most tangible expression of CHRISTUS Health's charitable purpose is the provision of healthcare services to those persons who are unable to pay. Charity Care falls into two categories. Charity Care and Unpaid Government Indigent Care. In keeping with the mission, values, and vision of CHRISTUS Health, CHRISTUS Health provides Charity Care services in a manner that respects the dignity of the patients and their families. Charity Care is provided without charge or at a charge that is less than the usual charge for such services. The determination as to the amount to be charged, if any, is made according to a patient's ability to pay as determined by the established eligibility criteria. For uninsured patient's whose economic circumstances place them at or under 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPL), services are provided without any expectation of payment. Uninsured patients whose economic circumstances place them between 200 and 400 percent of FPL are charged based on a sliding scale and those above 400 percent receive discounts based on the uninsured fee schedule. No patient is refused necessary medical care due to inability to pay CHRISTUS Health facilities provide other Charity Care by funding or otherwise financially supporting health care services provided to financially indigent patients through other nonprofit or public outpatient clinics, hospitals or health care organizations. CHRISTUS Health is an active participant in the States of Texas and Louisiana Medicaid Programs. Those programs seek to provide payment for health care services to individuals who meet certain

	OTHER GOVERNMENT SPONSORED SERVICES In addition to the provision of Charity Care and other community services CHRISTUS Health provides services to persons covered under government-sponsored programs, including Medicare, DOD and TRICARE. The non-reimbursed costs of these services are reported to the State of Texas but are not included in reports prepared following Catholic Health Association guidelines. CHRISTUS Health provides services to persons covered under the federal Medicare Program, and in fact, this is the largest single payor classification of patients served by this health system. The payment rate for inpatient services is on a per case rate, calculated based on the diagnostic-related group (DRG) into which the patient is categorized. Outpatient services are reimbursed by Medicare based on a fee schedule. CHRISTUS Health doa US Family Health Plan also provides the uniform medical benefit for 9,976 military family members under contract with the Department of Defense. Under this program, comprehensive medical services are provided to families of active duty military personnel, and to retirees and their families in all age categories including those over age 65. CHRISTUS Health also participates in the TRICARE standard program and many of our hospitals contract with the Managed Care Support Contractor for the South Region to provide services under the provision of TRICARE Prime.

These accounts do not qualify as charity care as defined by the organization's charity care guidelines because the patients' income is above 200% FPL. The patient account balances were multiplied by the cost to charge ratio computed using Schedule H, worksheet 2.

THE total expense from Form 990, Part IX, line 25, column (A) IS \$255,709,060 The bad debt expense included in this amount IS \$14,000,357 This leAVES a total expense of \$241,708,703 for purposes of calculating line 7, column (f)

The footnote to the CHRISTUS Health consolidated financial statements says, "The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States requires management of the System to make assumptions, estimates, and adjustments that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements, including the notes thereto, and related disclosures of commitments and contingencies, if any. The system considers critical accounting policies to be those that require more significant judgments and estimates in the preparation of its financial statements, including the following recognition of net patient revenues, which includes contractual allowances, provisions for bad debt, reserves for losses and expenses related to health care professional and general liabilities, determination of fair values of certain financial instruments, and risks and assumptions for measurement of pension and retiree medical liabilities. Management relies on historical experience and on other assumptions believed to be reasonable under the circumstances in making its judgment and estimates. Actual results could differ materially from these estimates." In order to determine the bad debt expense at cost (Schedule H, Part III, Section A, Line 2), the organization's total bad debt expense (total of all hospital facilities) in accordance with the organization's financial statements was multiplied by the cost-to-charge ratio.

The shortfall on Part III, Line 7 is not counted as a community benefit. The amount on Schedule H, Part III, Line 6 is determined by calculating Medicare Allowable costs using Worksheet A of the Medicare Cost Report. Worksheet A of the Medicare cost Report requires the organization to remove non-allowable expenses from total expenses via the Adjustments to Expenses worksheets within the Medicare Cost Report. Collection activity occurs for a minimum of 60 days on self-pay accounts before the presumptive charity process is completed if no contact with the patient/guarantor is made. If the 60-day period expires and no contact with the patient/guarantor is made or there is insufficient information to document eligibility for charity care, a presumption of eligibility may be made based on statistical data and other reliable assumptions. Accounts with a balance of less than \$2,000 are screened for charity care qualification based on systematic screening criteria unless patient contact is made. Accounts with a balance of \$2,000 or greater are manually reviewed to determine if any potential eligibility programs are applicable based upon front-end screening tool documentation and a review of the diagnoses and services provided If a patient completes a financial aid application and qualifies for charity care or falls under a charity care account based on the presumptive charity test, all debt collection activities cease. Accounts that are not deemed eligible for charity care or medical indigence will continue the collection cycle until they are written off as bad debt.

The organization budgets charity care for internal financial purposes only. The provision of charity care is not limited to amounts established for budgetary purposes. Cash and In-Kind Contributions to Community Groups Part I, Line 7: CHRISTUS Gulf Coast made over \$48,000,000 in cash and in kind contributions. The CHRISTUS Fund grants were used directly by CHRISTUS Health Gulf Coast to fund various clinics and health programs that serve underserved youth and adults. The CHRISTUS Fund grant amount also includes grants made by CHRISTUS Health to nonprofit organizations located in the communities served by the Gulf Coast region, as well as grants made by CHRISTUS Health Gulf Coast to other nonprofit organizations. All grants made to outside organizations through the CHRISTUS Fund are made to nonprofit organizations that support the health of the community CHRISTUS Health has also established an Education and Research Fund CHRISTUS Health Gulf Coast received \$15,359 from the fund and used such resources to benefit the community by providing research and educational programs sponsored by the region. Indigent Funding Expense to nonprofit organizations of \$46,447,299 is included in Schedule H, Part I, Line 7(i)

CHRISTUS Health follows in principle Healthcare Financial Management Association Statement No 15. The system has adopted an uncompensated care policy in which revenue from services provided to the uninsured is recognized at the time of payment, rather than at the time of service. This policy is the result of a lack of reasonable assurance of collection for service provided to the uninsured due to the system's historically low collection rate. Management has estimated that the difference between recording revenue from the uninsured on a cash basis, rather than the accrual basis, is immaterial. Accordingly, all accounts receivable from the uninsured have been fully reserved in the allowance for uncompensated care.

Part VI, Line 2 CHRISTUS St John Hospital developed the 2010 Community Benefit Plan based on the Greater Houston 2008 Healthy Needs Assessment The objectives for FY 2010 are proposed to meet the identified needs in the communities we serve Each community in the region had a significant population growth and increased needs. The highest projected increase in residents is the Hispanic population Health Care Priorities Include Primary Care Access, Geographic Disparities, Under/Uninsured/Working, Poor, Teen Births, Prenatal Care, Childhood Immunizations, Access to Information/Referrals, Cardiovascular Disease, Diabetes, Respiratory Cancer and other Chronic Diseases, Senior Population, 45 to 64 Year Old Population Group, and Mental Health Service. An additional area of focus overlapping many of these priorities is the already high and increasing percentage of Consolidated Metropolitan Statistical Area (CMSA) residents of Hispanic descent. Barriers to Access Health Care Include Limited access, Inability to pay for services, Lack of transportation, Language barriers and cultural differences, Socioeconomic Factors Impacting Access to Healthcare, Lack of employment opportunities, increase in the number of residents with median income of < \$25,000, and Diminished health coverage.

Part VI, Line 3 CHRISTUS Gulf Coast makes every effort to educate patients on its Charity and Discount Policy and about their eligibility for assistance under federal, state, or local government programs during registration, pre registration (for scheduled tests and surgeries), post registration (during their hospitalization) and following discharge (telephone or written inquiry) in languages appropriate for the population being served. Patients are given information and forms by a financial counselor who helps them complete the forms during their inpatient and outpatient visits. Patients are asked to bring or mail supporting documentation to determine income, assets and household expenses. The Business Office reviews the application based on the information provided by the patient. If the patient qualifies for charity care or a discount, a new bill is generated. Patients who do not provide the required documentation are considered ineligible and are billed accordingly. If the documentation is provided at a later time, the patient may then be determined to be eligible for charity care or a discount. Documentation is retained by the billing office for seven years. A public notice regarding the charity care policy is posted in prominent places throughout the hospital, including but not limited to the emergency room waiting area, and the admissions office waiting area as required by the State of Texas Community Benefit Standards (which addresses the duties and responsibilities of nonprofit hospitals), and CHRISTUS HEALTH website. The information on financial assistance includes explanations on the availability of financial assistance, who qualifies, and how to apply for financial assistance.

Part VI, Line 4 CHRISTUS Health Gulf Coast responds to the health care needs through services provided at CHRISTUS St Catherine Hospital in Katy, Texas, a 102-bed hospital, CHRISTUS St John Hospital in Nassau Bay, Texas a 178-bed hospital and various clinics and outreach programs. CHRISTUS Health Gulf Coast services several counties to the west and southeast of Houston. The organization's service area comprises a population of 854,674. In the organization's service area 28.7 percent of households are at or below 200 percent poverty limit and 17.7 percent are uninsured. There is a noted increase in senior residents (i.e., 65 to 74 years of age) in the communities served by CHRISTUS Gulf Coast thus impacting the inpatient and outpatient demand for health care services, particularly with chronic health problems including heart disease, diabetes, cancer, and respiratory diseases. The service area's population consists of 26.5 percent.

Line 5 The CHRISTUS Health Board of Directors approved funding of a community direct investment (CDI) loan program to ensure that the work of social accountability and moral and ethical stewardship continues in spite of challenging fiscal conditions faced by local operating entities. The purpose of the CDI program is to support community driven initiatives, primarily for affordable housing and economic development by providing financing at below market interest rates to nonprofit organizations at terms not exceeding more than five years. The income earned at the market rate less our loan rate (foregone income) is considered a community benefit for reporting purposes. The foregone interest for CHRISTUS Gulf Coast Region in fiscal year ending June 30, 2010 was over \$33,652. Though outstanding loan balances vary throughout the year, the outstanding loan balance at the end of Fiscal Year 2010 was \$616,569 Included as Physical Improvements to Housing at Schedule H, Part II, Line 1 are some of the aforementioned loans made for low income housing to include "New Hope Housing", an Economically Linked Deposit (ELD) benefitting the ongoing operation of a 133 unit permanent housing, single room occupancy project helping the formerly homeless and those at risk of homelessness, the Tejano Center for Community Concerns Affordable housing for families earning less than 80% of the median area income and low income housing in Acres Home CHRISTUS also provided financing of the Women's Home, a multi-unit apartment complex for women who have graduated from a drug rehabilitation program. Economic Development-Gulf Coast demonstrates its commitment to the economic development of the communities served through various micro-financing loan programs to include Accion Texas serving low and moderate income for development of small businesses. These individuals would not be able to obtain traditional financing. These small businesses are in underserved communities. Community Support -Gulf Coast shows its commitment to the community by its involvement in literacy and mentoring programs of primary school students. Environmental Improvements-Gulf Coast participates in programs in conjunction with the local Chamber of Commerce for community improvement.
