Christian A. Johnson Endeavor Foundation

A Brief History

Christian A. Johnson (1904-1964) established the Endeavor Foundation in 1952 in order to help others achieve their aspirations and make a contribution to society. He believed that everyone should have the opportunity to acquire a fine education, to experience the inspiration of the arts, and to live in a society committed to personal freedoms and opportunities for all

Mr Johnson emigrated to the United States from Sweden at the age of five with his mother, father, and younger brother. The family settled in New York's borough of the Bronx, where Christian's father began to work as a carpenter After a time, three more children were born and, though resources were limited, Christian's parents placed great emphasis on education, encouraging reading and reflection, and managing to scrape together enough money for violin lessons.

Christian proved to be a gifted violinist and performed at Carnegie Hall at the age of sixteen. His violin career was cut short, however, by the death of his father soon after his debut. Through ingenuity and hard work, Christian managed to support the remaining family of six and to graduate from DeWitt Clinton High School with high honors. Over time, he worked his way through college, earning a CPA degree with distinction from Pace University, while pitching for a time for the Yankee's farm team. Eventually, he became one of the outstanding financiers of his generation, centrally involved in the creation of the Public Utility Holding Company Act of 1939. Known as the "wizard of Wall Street" in the 1940s and 50s, he was asked, though he declined, to join President Eisenhower's Council of Economic Advisors.

Mr. Johnson's early years taught him a set of values that became the cornerstone for the rest of his life: the meaning of family and responsibility to others, the necessity for hard work, the willingness to take risks, and the value of an education. He was also reminded regularly, primarily by his endlessly curious and adventurous mother, of the daily joys of freedom provided to those fortunate enough to live in the United States. The freedom to be who you want to be, to live where and how you wish to live, and to stretch yourself to the limit of your abilities had not been part of his mother's life in Sweden. It was for these freedoms, along with the endlessly stimulating and interesting nature of the "melting pot," that they had come to America.

Despite Mr. Johnson's success in the business world, he always remained modest, reserved, and mindful of the feelings, struggles, and triumphs of others, a gentleman in every way. He believed that the most important key to his professional achievements was the trust that people knew they could place in him. Indeed, it was known that no more than a handshake was necessary to count on a commitment from C.A. Johnson. He treated all people as equals, believing that nobility of spirit was not related to wealth, or so-called success, but could be found everywhere, in all spheres of life.

Under the auspices of the Foundation, Mr Johnson, quietly and anonymously, sought to help people acquire the necessary tools to make the most of their lives and their talents and to become responsible and productive members of society. Mr. Johnson believed that an individual's education is of paramount importance in the realization of human potential and that exposure to the arts should provide not only inspiration but also encouragement to take risks in attempting to achieve new solutions to old problems. He believed above all in the power of the human spirit to change the world when individual commitments and enthusiasm are undaunted by the prospect of hard work or the risk of failure. Hence, the Foundation continues to regard as its mission the strengthening of educational institutions, the support of artistic endeavors, the encouragement of individual initiative and innovation, and provision of assistance in building new democratic societies.

Mr Johnson died in 1964 at the age of 59. His widow, Charlotte Jean Johnson, renamed the Foundation in his honor at that time. In keeping with his wishes, it has remained a family-run foundation ever since. Mrs. Johnson guided its giving for many years with inspiration, wisdom, and modesty, and the Foundation is currently managed by their daughter, Julie Johnson Kidd.

Overview

The Christian A. Johnson Endeavor Foundation is dedicated to the life of the mind and spirit. Since its founding in 1952, the Foundation has focused its attention primarily on the field of education, which nurtures and liberates the best in human imagination and action. The qualities fostered by a liberal education, such as intellectual discipline, questioning, analysis, and inspiration, can help individuals realize their highest aspirations and fullest human potential.

The Foundation devotes most of its funds to projects that make a significant institutional difference in independent liberal arts colleges for it believes that they foster just such values in their core mission. The remainder of the Foundation's funds (dispersed by invitation only) are designated for arts organizations, school enrichment, projects that assist newly independent states in the formerly Soviet-dominated region, civic programs in New York City, and other special endeavors that are related to the Foundation's focus.

To help make the grants process more efficient and effective for the Foundation's grantees and for our small staff, we have set forth below defined areas of interest and a process for submission of letters of inquiry (where appropriate). From among these letters, a small number of institutions are then invited to submit full proposals. The following pages describe the Foundation's areas of interest with regard to liberal arts programs, outline the components of a letter of inquiry, and explain the proposal invitation process and the calendar for submissions and decisions. The Foundation is especially interested in providing challenge grants as a means of securing the support of others for a given institution and project. Please note that the Foundation **does not** award grants to individuals; to neighborhood or community projects; to federal, state, or city agencies or projects; to organizations or institutions controlled by religious groups; to health care or medical research; or to building projects.

The Liberal Arts College Program

committed to the goals of liberal education

The Foundation is wholeheartedly committed to the goals of liberal education—the development of intellectual curiosity, critical and creative thinking, and empathy for the human condition. We believe that liberal education also fosters ethical behavior and the ability to articulate new frameworks of understanding and to invent new methods of action to achieve them. A liberal education seeks to place students in the stream of history, acquaint them with the methods of science, expose them to the power of the arts, and cultivate their appreciation of the intrinsic value of learning for its own sake. Simultaneously, a liberal education develops in students an awareness of their own and others' individual natures and motivations, and cultivates their ability to solve problems interdisciplinarily. Moreover, a liberal education is transforming in nature because students are provided with the opportunity to become the best they can be as individual citizens and leaders, able to advance community and international understanding.

small, private, residential liberal arts colleges The Foundation believes that small, private, residential liberal arts colleges provide the best environment for the accomplishment of these ends. They are both philosophically and structurally suited to this endeavor. Philosophically, their attributes include a primary focus on undergraduate teaching, a concern for a general and coherent curriculum, engagement of students inside and outside the classroom, a quest for genuine community, and an emphasis on what it means to be a good person and a just society. Their structures as residential, undergraduate institutions with a commitment to small class size provide the framework in which these principles can flourish.

faculty and administrators
who work closely with
students

Within this environment, students require a faculty that is not only demanding and talented, but also dedicated to working closely with individual students and to building a strong and cohesive community of the institution as a whole. The environment requires faculty and administrators who understand the adolescent development process and who create a campus culture that encourages students to seek out and become confident in the use of their own voices manifest in their writing, speaking, and ethical behavior.

the education of traditional-age students

The Foundation is especially interested in the education of traditional-age students, because it believes such students are in an elastic, formative stage of development at which a strong foundation for future leadership can be fostered. A liberal arts college is particularly well-suited to creating an environment appropriate for the intellectual, social, and psychological development during these years.

Curriculum

In an increasingly complex world, the goals of educating for breadth and depth of learning may often be in tension with each other. Educating for citizenship and civic leadership in the context of international interdependence increases the difficulty. Many students and faculty are too often caught between superficial understanding, on the one hand, and a narrow specialization, on the other. For this reason, the Foundation is particularly committed to those endeavors that can increase curricular coherence and that sacrifice neither breadth nor depth in the process. Curricular projects that examine fundamental human questions, promote civic participation and international understanding, and create a community of discourse are particularly important to the Foundation. Integrative methods, such as core curricula, thematic approaches across the disciplines, and team teaching, are some examples that might be considered.

Reading, Writing, and Speaking

The Foundation understands that acquiring imaginative, critical, coherent, and articulate thinking requires intensive and extensive reading, writing, and speaking. In the view of many observers, however, these have diminished in quantity and quality in higher education. The Foundation is interested in supporting projects dedicated to restoring the rigor required and the passion for extensive reading, writing, and speaking in the curriculum. Comprehensive reading and examination requirements, mandatory capstone projects and oral presentations, student research, faculty tutorials, and emphasis on writing and speaking across the curriculum are but a few examples that might be considered.

Interdisciplinary Teaching and Learning

Inexorable advances in knowledge and the complex nature of modern problems increasingly require the crossing of traditional disciplinary boundaries. Neither students nor faculty find it easy to engage in interdisciplinary teaching or learning without significant curricular revision and collegial collaboration. The Foundation is interested in supporting projects that imaginatively overcome these problems. Interdepartmentally developed courses and programs, team teaching across disciplines, reading and writing assignments crossing disciplinary borders, and revision of tenure and promotion guidelines are a few examples that might be considered.

Active Student Learning

The Foundation is interested in supporting projects that significantly increase and improve the ways in which students can be more actively engaged in their studies. The Foundation encourages projects that provide faculty with opportunities to learn and practice forms of pedagogy that support active student learning. Projects that emphasize students' intellectual independence and responsibility such as peer tutorials, theses, research, increased opportunities for writing and speaking, reflective community involvement, internships, and group projects are but a few examples that might be considered.

Faculty Development

Essential for liberal arts education is a passionate, dedicated, and talented faculty that demonstrates a life-long commitment to its own growth and development. The Foundation is committed to supporting projects that help faculty to develop curricula and new strategies for teaching and evaluation, as suggested in the areas of interest above.

Assessment

The Foundation understands assessment to be an integral part of teaching and learning as well as the means of ensuring institutional and organization integrity. Prior grantees and researchers point to appropriate and timely assessment of student learning as a powerful teaching and learning tool for both students and professors. The Foundation is interested in supporting innovative projects that focus on assessment of student learning within courses, programs, and the cumulative results of four years of college

The Foundation is committed as well to assessment as it relates to its own activities, and will gather data over time and across Foundation grants to assess the efficacy of its own grant making. In this regard, the Foundation expects that each grantee will assess the outcomes of Foundation-sponsored projects and, when appropriate, will share the results with others in higher education.

Project Areas Supported by Foundation Request Only

enhancing the life of the mind and spirit

Enhancing the life of the mind and spirit can be accomplished in many ways and the Foundation from time to time supports projects, programs, and enterprises such as those that:

- assess the outcomes of liberal arts education across a variety of higher education programs and institutions,
- enhance the prospects for international peace, understanding, and cooperation,
- · strengthen democratic institutions and leadership,
- · embolden the arts,
- · engage in elementary and secondary school reform,
- support New York City civic endeavors,
- promote significant opportunities for citizenship education,
- · address significant issues in human growth and development.

Support for such projects is initiated by Foundation invitation only. The Foundation cannot respond to letters of inquiry or uninvited proposals submitted in these categories.

Procedures for submission of letters of inquiry and proposals appear on the back panel of this publication.

Procedures for Submission of Letters of Inquiry and Proposals

Proposals will be considered by invitation only after a letter of inquiry outlining the purpose, scope, and institutional support for the project is reviewed. Those letters of inquiry of most interest to the Foundation will be followed by an invitation to the president of the college to meet with appropriate staff of the Foundation. Such discussion may then lead to an invitation to submit a formal proposal. It will be necessary for any organization receiving grant approval to provide the Foundation with an annual report outlining what was accomplished, what improvements could be made, and the possibilities for sharing the results with others.

Letters of Inquiry

A letter of inquiry should include contextual information such as the demographics of the institution, endowment, current fund-raising in progress, and strategic objectives. This information should be followed by the purpose and nature of the proposed project, with specific focus on the impact on students, how the impact on students will be assessed, and how the project fits within the Foundation's program guidelines as outlined above. The letter should also include how, and the degree to which, faculty, administration, and the Board of Trustees support the project. Finally, a summary budget of no more than one page should be enclosed. The Foundation encourages projects requesting challenge grants.

Letters of inquiry/proposals may be submitted at any time during the year and decisions will be made as appropriate.
