MANECCS BUDGET NARRATIVE FOR 2010

The Middle Atlantic and New England Council for Canadian Studies (MANECCS) successfully met its goals of reaching out to members of our organization, our students and the region at large.

Our most successful implementation of our goals was our 2009 biennial conference, held at the Hilton Hotel in Providence. From September 30 to October 3, our MANECCS members, students and Canadian attendees took advantage of panels and Canadian speakers who shared their research and expertise, thereby further enlightening the membership with information and perspectives that will be disseminated in classrooms and communities throughout the MANECCS region.

In addition, MANECCS awarded two Scholar Exchange grants that were used to bring speakers to middle Atlantic and New England campuses.

We are especially pleased that we were able to award 7 graduate students with Young Scholar awards that allowed them the opportunity to share their research at the conference and integrate them into on-going MANECCS activities.

MANECCS also funded a cross-border academic conference on Hockey in Buffalo, providing an opportunity for an exchange of information between MANECCS members and Canadian scholars.

The MANECCS Executive Board has begun to plan its next biennial conference for 2011, and solicit applications for scholar exchanges and program development at many home institutions of MANECCS members.

John Ivison, Political columnist for the National Post

PLENARY SESSION

The plenary, Paul Gross's Passchendaele: Documenting and Communicating the Canadian Rite of Passage to Modern-day Audiences, will take place on Saturday, October 2nd from 10:45 a.m.~12:15 p.m.

The session will feature panelists:

Jeremy Diamond, Managing Director, Historica Dominion Institute Norman Leach, Author and historical consultant on the film Passchendaele Jonathan Weier. PhD student at the University of Western Ontario and freelance researcher The 2008 Paul Gross film Passchendaele presents an artifact by which to examine how the struggles of the Canadian armed forces in World War I helped forge a new understanding of Canadian identity. The film not only brings together life on the battlefield and life on the home front, it also raises important questions about moral ambiguities and hard choices which are potentially unpopular on several levels. Meanwhile, the film's companion book, website, and other associated resources take individuals deeper into these personal and political conflicts via letters, photographs, and newspaper clippings. Taken together, these resources afford a new generation of Canadians and other people throughout the world an opportunity to hear Canada's coming-of-age story in the words of the men and women who personally experienced the event. Indeed, Passchendaele more than the other battle is where not only the Canadian soldler, but also the Canadian people as a whole became "blooded." It is "the moment" in history where Canadians took measure of themselves as a distinct people and a distinct nation. It is the moment in which English-Canadians understood that they were British no longer.

Against this backdrop, individuals who were involved in the production of the film and/or its associated educational resources will address the following questions:

- 1. How are teachers bringing the story of Passchendaele to their classes and their students?
- 2. Which of the associated educational initiatives seem to be most effective in helping a new generation of Canadians grasp the fundamental meaning of Passchendaele? Which seem to be less successful?
- 3. Does the film set the stage for more histories, for more authenticating narratives, to be presented to the audiences of Canada and the world?
- 4. To what extent can we see the film as a document which authenticates the Canadian identity?
- 5. If it is the meaning of the story of Passchendaele we wish to understand, if it is the meaning that we wish to pass on to the next generation, to what extent is historical accuracy in each detail something that counts?
- 6. Does the film romanticize or mythologize the role that the Canadian soldier played in the development of a new sense of nationhood or does it instead afford an opportunity to value the role that a sense of duty and commitment to a moral ideal play in the formation of the character and conduct of the Canadian people as members of both a national and global community?
