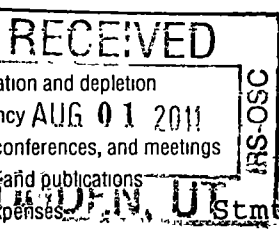




KYASIRA HOME OF HOPE
Fostering Resilience in Orphans and Vulnerable Children
Executive Summary

The Kyasira Home of Hope was founded in 1995 and became an official Non-Governmental Organization, similar to U.S. nonprofit organizations in 2003. (NGO Registration No. S.5914/4736). The mission of KHH is to provide an opportunity for the rehabilitation of Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC) through programs designed to enhance their self-esteem, restore hope and enable them to lead fulfilling lives. Current annual operating expenses are \$77,495.

The KHH is located in the Wakiso District of Uganda on the shores of Lake Victoria, approximately 32 kilometers from the capital city of Kampala. The Homes surroundings create a calm and conducive environment to provide services to orphaned, street and otherwise vulnerable children while providing 64 acres of land, a valuable and vital resource for building a sustainable home for the children it serves.

Currently, KHH takes in children orphaned or abandoned and living on the streets of Kampala and provides for them a safe haven. KHH is home to 35 orphans and also sponsors and provides services to 15 additional children who live in the Kyasira community. Although the home has the physical capacity to support 55 residents, it lacks the financial resources to provide the operational support necessary to provide adequate care. KHH is run and managed by the Good Samaritan Sisters of Nalukolongo.

The International HIV/AIDS Alliance estimates that there are approximately 1,000,000 children orphaned by AIDS in Uganda. When parents are ill or lost, children are forced to become primary caregivers of their sick parents and younger siblings, forced to spend their time as caregivers and workers in order to provide for their basic needs, deprived of an education and forced to miss school due to lack of time and money for school fees and mandatory expenses, subjected to psychological effects associated with losing a parent and the lack of care, support and encouragement, are mistreated, abused, neglected by family and neighbors who take them in, are beaten or emotionally abused, experience grief, anger and lack of concentration, are depressed, lonely and hopeless; are subjected to the danger and exposed to dangerous and traumatic experiences of sexual violence and exploitation.

To overcome adversity, children need the capability to understand the adverse events of their lives, and to believe they have some control over and can cope with a crisis and to give the adverse event deeper meaning. KHH staff have scheduled daily activities addressing each of the following goal areas to provide a structured environment for OVC to live and learn. The daily routine of the children create an atmosphere that encourages individual responsibility, team work, common respect and understanding, education, skill development and spiritual, physical and emotional health. KHH requires financial and in-kind support to achieve goals in the following need areas:

- Basic OVC Needs: food, clothing, shelter (capital improvements)
- OVC Psychosocial Support: caregivers, social worker, psychosocial programs
- OVC Education: school fees, uniforms, school supplies
- OVC Spiritual Direction: religious instruction
- KHH Income Generating Activities: agricultural projects, long term sustainability
- KHH General Operating Expenses: water, electricity, computer, equipment, supplies, facilities maintenance.

KHH has received material and financial donations from the following: Indian Community in Kampala, World Food Programme (WFP) through Feed the Children Uganda (support expires November 2007), Italian Cooperation Development, Kampala Archdiocese and local farmers and agricultural engineers.

KHH has also begun several agricultural income generating activities that utilize the land and resources available. Agricultural projects including: pig, poultry and fish farms and a large garden, are in the beginning stages of development. As the projects grow, they will supply KHH with the food and income necessary to meet the nutrition and income needs of the home, thus increasing its self-sufficiency and decreasing its dependence on foreign aid. Further, the projects provide a forum for the children to learn valuable food production and income generating skills.

KYASIRA HOME OF HOPE

Fostering Resilience in Orphans and Vulnerable Children

HISTORY AND INTRODUCTION

Kyasira Home of Hope (KHH) was founded by Rev. Sr. Liz Alarie, a Canadian Missionary from White Sisters Foundation in 1995, in collaboration with the Archbishop of Kampala Catholic Archdiocese and the Indian Community in Kampala. KHH became an official Non-Governmental Organization (Registration No. S.5914/4736) in 2003.

The location of KHH is its biggest asset and resource. The Home is located in Wakiso District, on Kampala Entebbe highway, approximately 32 kilometers from Kampala. The home is located on the shores of Lake Victoria, the 2nd largest fresh water lake in the world. Its view of and access to the lake, fresh air, cool climate and natural surroundings create a calm and conducive environment to provide services to orphaned, street and otherwise vulnerable children. Further, KHH's 64 acres of land provide a valuable and vital resource for building a sustainable home for the children it serves.

Currently, KHH focuses its efforts on serving children who have been orphaned or abandoned and who are living on the streets of Kampala. KHH is home to 35-40 children who are orphans. KHH also sponsors and provides services to 10-15 additional children who live in the Kyasira community. KHH is run and managed by the Good Samaritan Sisters of Nalukolongo. The Home is run by four full-time Sisters. KHH is also assisted by volunteers including a social worker and a Peace Corps volunteer who assist with childcare and organizational development. The home employs three gardeners who assist with maintaining the grounds and agricultural projects. Further, KHH is governed by its Board of Directors, which consists of five members.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of KHH is to provide an opportunity for the rehabilitation of Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC) through programs designed to enhance their self-esteem, restore hope and enable them to lead fulfilling lives. The mission of KHH is based on the belief that every child, especially those who have no alternative option, deserves a safe home and an opportunity to live a healthy and happy life. The home is intended to provide a safe place for OVC to live and provide them with the support needed to be reintegrated in their communities where possible. The aim of KHH is "to give a home to those who do not have but the desire to have one."

POPULATION SERVED

The central government of Uganda reported that there are 80,000 OVC living in Wakiso District (the suburban ring surrounding Kampala). OVC is defined as any child who has lost one or both parents, who has been abandoned, or who is otherwise vulnerable due to extreme poverty, lack of care, exposure to abuse, lack of education or violation of rights.

Currently, KHH focuses its services on children who are orphaned and are often living on the streets of Kampala. KHH is also home to an elderly man. There are a total of 35 children between the ages of 3 and 18 living at KHH. Further, KHH provides support to 15 children who are orphans in the Kyasira community who are living with relatives and neighbors. Although the home has the physical capacity to support 55 residents, it lacks the financial resources to provide the operational support necessary to provide adequate care.

STATEMENT OF NEED

Need for OVC Care in Uganda

The International HIV/AIDS Alliance estimates that there are approximately 1,000,000 children orphaned by AIDS in Uganda. When children lose one or both of their parents, often due to HIV/AIDS or related illnesses, it leaves them vulnerable in many ways. A study conducted by Human Rights Watch in Kenya, South Africa and Uganda outlined several of the major issues faced by OVC. When parents are ill or lost, children are often forced to become primary caregivers of their sick parents and younger siblings. There is often a lack of income in the family. So, OVC are forced to spend their time as caregivers and workers in order to provide for their basic needs. Further, they are often forced to miss school due to lack of time and money for school fees and mandatory expenses. Thus, OVC are often deprived of education.

OVC struggle with the psychological effects associated with losing a parent and the lack of care, support and encouragement. The study showed, that even when OVC are taken in by extended family or neighbors, they are mistreated, abused, neglected and deprived of the privileges of other children in the family. They are often beaten or emotionally abused and made to work rather than go to school. As a result of their loss and the subsequent lack of care and support, many OVC experience grief, anger and lack of concentration. OVC often feel depressed, lonely and hopeless as they are forced to fend for themselves.

Further, OVC are subjected to the danger and abuse that can accompany extreme poverty and vulnerability. OVC may attempt to live on the streets where they can beg for money. Yet, living on the streets exposes them to many potentially dangerous and traumatic experiences. OVC, especially girls, are often subjected to sexual violence and exploitation. Sex acts are exchanged for the money that is needed to survive and pay for school fees. Girls who are orphaned are also more likely to be raped.

The direct effects of losing a parent on the children are exacerbated by additional challenges in the community. For example, when a woman is widowed, she is often subjected to "property grabbing" because her property is not protected by the law. Thus, the family's level of poverty increases leaving the family more vulnerable. Further, government aid is often promised for OVC yet rarely materializes. In the same sense, international funding for OVC care is often caught up in government or Non-government Organization sponsored programs that decrease the chances of the money actually reaching those in need.

KHH Operational Needs

KHH requires support for the following which are based on its goals, objectives and activities listed below

- Basic OVC Needs: food, clothing, shelter (capital improvements)
- OVC Psychosocial Support: caregivers, social worker, psychosocial programs
- OVC Education: school fees, uniforms, school supplies
- OVC Spiritual Direction: religious instruction
- KHH Income Generating Activities: agricultural projects, long term sustainability
- KHH General Operating Expenses: water, electricity, computer, equipment, supplies, facilities maintenance

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

As outlined above, OVC are at risk of exploitation and increasing impoverishment. However, it is also possible that OVC can demonstrate resilience in the face of adversity. In "Building Resilience in Children Affected by HIV/AIDS," Catholic AIDS Action, Namibia defines resilience as "the human capacity to face, overcome and be strengthened, or even transformed, by the adversities of life and the ability to bounce back after stressful and potentially traumatic events." To overcome adversity, children need the capability to understand the adverse event, to believe they have some control over and can cope with a crisis and to give the adverse event deeper meaning.

Fostering resilience in children requires the following resources (Catholic AIDS Action, Namibia):

External Resources:

- A close and secure relationship with a caregiver/family
- Enough food, shelter, clothing and medical services
- Education
- Financial stability
- Close links to culture and community.

Internal Resources:

- Emotional stability
- Autobiographical memory
- Sense of belonging
- Interest in others - altruism
- Value and belief system
- Creativity, innovation and curiosity
- Self-confidence

Developing resilience in OVC is possible by providing a safe, nurturing environment in which basic needs are consistently being met. OVC need time and attention from caregivers and a place where they can participate daily in structured, routine activities, cultural events, religious rituals and festivals. They also need guidance in developing appropriate communication and social skills so they can communicate feelings, solve conflicts and build strong and healthy relationships (Catholic AID Action, Namibia).

GOALS, OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOMES

The overall goal of KHH is to foster resilience in OVC to enable them to lead physically, emotionally and spiritually healthy and fulfilling lives by ensuring they have the resources they need. KHH aims to achieve the following goals, objectives and outcomes.

Goal 1: To provide the basic necessities to OVC that are necessary to live a healthy life.

Objective 1: To provide food, clothing and shelter to 35 OVC.

Objective 2: To provide medical care for 35 OVC.

Outcome 1: The basic needs of shelter, clothing and adequate nutrition will increase the standard of living for the children.

Outcome 2: The children will experience improved physical health due to the availability of medicine and medical care.

Goal 2: To provide psychosocial interventions necessary for fostering resilience in OVC

Objective 1: To provide post-trauma and ongoing individual and group counseling services to 35 OVC.

Objective 2: To provide life skills programming to 35 OVC.

Objective 3: To provide the opportunity for 35 OVC to experience healthy relationships with adult caregivers.

Outcome 1: The children will experience decreased feelings of helplessness, hopelessness and despair

Outcome 2: The children will experience increased self-esteem

Outcome 3: Children will learn and maintain the characteristics of resilience.

Outcome 4: Children will obtain the social skills necessary to build and maintain healthy relationships with others.

Goal 3: To provide educational services (formal and informal) to OVC.

Objective 1: To provide school fees, uniforms and school supplies for 50 OVC to attend formal education (P1-P7 and vocational training).

Objective 2: To provide informal education and tutoring services for 50 OVC

Objective 3: To provide training in hygiene, sanitation, domestic and agricultural education for 50 OVC.

Objective 4: To provide intentional programs that incorporate life skills including sports and recreation activities to 50 OVC.

Outcome 1: Children will gain the formal knowledge and education necessary to become self-sufficient and productive members of society.

Outcome 2: Children will gain the skills necessary to manage healthy and productive homes, produce food and generate income.

Outcome 3: Children will gain life skills to assist in building healthy relationships and maintaining physical health.

Goal 4: To enhance the spiritual health and provide religious education to OVC

Objective 1: To provide daily opportunities for 50 OVC to pray, sing and participate in religious ceremonies.

Objective 2: To provide religious instruction and spiritual direction regarding Catholic beliefs and values to 50 OVC

Outcome 1: Children will obtain a greater understanding of their own spirituality and relationship with God and how it can assist them in daily life.

Outcome 2: Children will gain knowledge regarding Catholic beliefs and values that will assist them in daily life.

ACTIVITIES

KHH staff have scheduled the daily activities to provide a structured environment for OVC to live and learn. The incorporation and combination of the following activities in the daily routine of the children create an atmosphere that encourages individual responsibility, team work, common respect and understanding, education, skill development and spiritual, physical and emotional health.

Basic Human Needs

KHH provides modest accommodation for residents in the form of dormitory rooms. Each child has a room and simple the simple necessities of a bed, blanket, sheets and mosquito net. The grounds also supply a natural environment for children to swim and engage in recreational activities. Basic meals and porridge are provided for the children. Further, the children are provided with clothing, which is often obtained in the used-clothing markets or through donations. The costs associated with child medical care is also met by KHH. However, KHH encourages preventative health through proper hygiene, sanitation, nutrition and health education.

Psychosocial Interventions

Psychosocial interventions are conducted by KHH staff and volunteers. The social worker is responsible for providing psychosocial interventions in the form of individual and group counseling, life skills training and intentional programming. Further, KHH staff are all responsible for child caregiving which allows the children to receive the love and support necessary for mental health and social development. Psychosocial interventions are also used in the resettlement, reintegration and follow-up process.

Education, Sports and Recreation

KHH provides the funds necessary for the children's school fees, uniforms and school supplies so that they can receive a formal education. The children also have time scheduled each day for schoolwork revision and tutoring. Life skills needed for daily life, including hygiene, sanitation, domestic skills, shopping and agricultural skills (gardening, poultry, piggery, fishery) are incorporated in daily activities. Agricultural skills may be utilized in the future to provide sources of income. Further, the children participate in sports and recreation activities to improve and maintain physical health.

Spiritual Direction

The children participate in daily prayer and singing ceremonies. Further, the Sisters provide religious education and guidance concerning Catholic beliefs and values and how these can enhance the spiritual and daily lives of the children.

KHH has received material and financial donations from the following: Indian Community in Kampala, World Food Programme (WFP) through Feed the Children Uganda (support expires November 2007), Italian Cooperation Development, Kampala Archdiocese and local farmers and agricultural engineers.

KHH has also begun several agricultural income generating activities that utilize the land and resources available. Agricultural projects including: pig, poultry and fish farms and a large garden, are in the beginning stages of development. As the projects grow, they will supply KHH with the food and income necessary to meet the nutrition and income needs of the home, thus increasing its self-sufficiency and decreasing its dependence on foreign aid. Further, the projects provide a forum for the children to learn valuable food production and income generating skills.
