(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Organization and Purpose

The Hudson Hospital. Inc and subsidiary consolidated financial statements include the consolidated operations of Hudson Hospital. Inc (the Hospital) and Hudson Hospital Foundation. Inc (the Foundation), collectively referred to herein as Hudson Hospital. The Hospital is a not-for-profit corporation, incorporated under the laws of the state of Wisconsin. The Hospital is licensed as a 25-bed critical access acute care hospital located in Hudson. Wisconsin. The Foundation was established to provide financial support and assistance to Hudson area health facilities, community health education programs, education activities of students in healthcare fields, and for such other charitable purposes as determined by the Foundation's board of directors

On December 19, 2008, the Hospital entered into a Membership Transfer Agreement (Agreement) among the Hospital, Hudson Health Corporation, the Foundation, Group Health Plan, Inc., and RH-Wisconsin HealthPartners, Inc (HPI) is the parent organization of Group Health Plan, Inc. and RH-Wisconsin. The Agreement, which became effective January 1, 2009, transferred the Membership Interest of the Hospital to RH-Wisconsin and Group Health Plan, Inc. As a result of this transfer, the Hospital's legal name was changed to Hudson Hospital. Inc. In addition, the Hudson Health Corporation was dissolved and the Hudson Health Foundation, Inc. changed its name to the Hudson Hospital Foundation, Inc. and was reorganized as a direct subsidiary of the Hospital

(b) Basis of Accounting

The consolidated financial statements are prepared in conformity with US generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

(c) Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions, including contractual allowances, allowances for doubtful accounts receivable and charity care, due to third-party payors, general and professional liability claims that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less

(e) Patient Receivables

The Hospital provides an allowance for uncollectible accounts based on management's judgment Patients and residents are not required to provide collateral for services provided Payment for services is required within 30 days of receipt of invoice Past-due accounts are individually analyzed for collectibility and then turned over to collection agents. Accounts for which no payments have

been received are analyzed and after approval are written off. In addition, an allowance is estimated for other accounts based on historical experience of the Hospital

(f) Inventories

The inventories are recorded at the lower of cost or market using the latest invoice cost, which approximates the first-in, first-out method

(g) Investments

Hudson Hospital has classified its entire investment portfolio as trading, with unrealized gains and losses included in investment income. Unrealized gains and losses on temporarily restricted and permanently restricted investments are reported as temporary or permanently restricted, if the use of investment income is restricted by donors.

(h) Assets Limited as to Use

Held by Trustee under Bond Agreement

Consists of funds of the Hospital held by the Trustee under the bond indenture agreements for bond reserves and debt sinking funds

Donor Restricted

Consists of deposits and investments at fair value set aside by the Foundation's board of directors for an endowment and for capital expenditures, and restricted by donors for capital and other expenditures

(i) Unamortized Bond Issuance Costs

Unamortized bond issuance costs of the Hospital are being amortized over the period the obligation is outstanding, using the straight-line method, which approximates the effective interest rate method

(j) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

Management periodically reviews the carrying value of long-lived assets for potential impairment by comparing the carrying value of these assets to the estimated undiscounted future cash flows expected to result from the use of these assets. Should the sum of the related, expected future net cash flows be less than the carrying value, an impairment loss could be recognized dependent upon other considerations. There were no impairments taken in 2010 and 2009.

(k) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment

(l) Pledges Receivable

Pledges, less an allowance for estimated uncollectible amounts and discounts on pledges, are recorded as receivables and temporarily restricted net assets in the year the pledge is made, unless the donor explicitly states that the gift is to support current activities

(m) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those assets whose use by Hudson Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by Hudson Hospital in perpetuity.

(n) Excess of Revenue over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenue over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions that by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

(o) Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period, the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

(p) Charity Care

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, and therefore, they are not reported as revenue. Charges foregone for charity care amounted to \$587,196 and \$628,736 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

(q) Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to Hudson Hospital are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional payments to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted net assets if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as

received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements

Hudson Hospital reports gifts of goods and equipment as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained. Hudson Hospital reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are place in service.

(r) Tax-Exempt Status

The Hospital and the Foundation are Wisconsin nonprofit corporation's exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Hudson Hospital's accounting policy provides that a tax benefit from an uncertain tax position may be recognized when it is more likely than not that the position will be sustained upon examination, including resolutions of any related appeals or litigation processes, based on the technical merits. Hudson Hospital recorded no liabilities in 2010 or 2009 for unrecognized tax benefits

(s) Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In June 2009, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued FASB Statement No 168. The FASB Accounting Standards Codification and Hierarchy of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles – a replacement of FASB Statement No 162 (The Codification) The Codification reorganized existing U S accounting and reporting standards issued by FASB and other related private sector standard setters into a single source of authoritative accounting principles arranged by topic. The Codification supersedes all existing U S accounting standards, all other accounting literature not included in the Codification (other than Securities and Exchange Commission guidance for publicly traded companies) is considered nonauthoritative. The Codification was effective on a prospective basis for interim and annual reporting periods ending after September 15, 2009. The adoption of the Codification changed the Hudson Hospital's references to U S GAAP accounting standards but did not impact Hudson Hospital's consolidated balance sheets or consolidated statements of operations.

In September 2006, the FASB issued FASB Statement No 157, Fair Value Measurements, which is now part of Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurement and Disclosures (ASC 820), establishing a framework for reporting fair value and expanding disclosures about fair value measurements. Hudson Hospital adopted the guidance in 2008 and has made the appropriate disclosures in note 4

In February 2007, the FASB issued FASB Statement No 159, which is now part of ASC 825, *Financial Instruments* (ASC 825), permitting an entity to elect fair value as the initial and subsequent measurement attribute for many financial assets and liabilities. Entities electing the fair value option are required to recognize changes in fair value in earnings. Hudson Hospital adopted the guidance in 2008 with no significant impact to the consolidated financial statements.

In August 2008, the FASB issued Staff Position No 117-1. Endowments of Not-for-Profit Organizations Net Asset Classification of Funds Subject to an Enacted Version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act, and Enhanced Disclosures for All Endowment Funds (FSP 117-1) FSP 117-1 provides guidance on the net asset classification of donor-restricted endowment funds for a not-for-profit organization that is subject to an enacted version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act of 2006 (UPMIFA), which is effective for Hudson Hospital for the year ended December 31, 2008 FSP 117-1 also improves disclosures about an organization's endowment funds (both donor-restricted endowment funds and board-designated endowment funds) whether or not the organization is subject to UPMIFA Hudson Hospital has adopted FSP 117-1 for the year ended December 31, 2008 The adoption had no effect on Hudson Hospital's consolidated net assets or the change in net assets

(2) Net Patient Service Revenue

Third-Party Reimbursement Agreements

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

(a) Medicare

The Hospital has been designated a Critical Access Hospital (CAH) for Medicare reimbursement purposes As a CAH, the Hospital is reimbursed for inpatient, swing bed, and outpatient services to Medicare patients on a reasonable cost basis. Medicare reimburses the Hospital for these services using interim rates, with a final settlement determined based on an annual cost report that is filed by the Hospital. This cost report is subject to audits by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited and settled by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through December 31, 2007.

(b) Medicaid

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed based upon reasonable cost subject to certain limits

Net revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 26% and 7%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended 2010, and 27% and 6%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended 2009. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

The 2010 and 2009 net patient service revenue increased approximately \$567,578 and \$295,000, respectively, due to removal of allowances previously estimated that are no longer necessary as a result of final settlements and years that are no longer subject to audits, reviews, and investigations

(4) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

All financial instruments are carried at fair value, except for long-term debt, which had a carrying value of \$23,605,000 and \$24,270,000 and a fair value of \$24,157,000 and \$24,752,000 at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instruments

(a) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents approximates fair value because of the short maturity of those investments

(b) Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

The fair values are based on quoted market prices at the reporting date where available. For securities not actively traded, fair value is estimated based on investments with similar interest rates, credit quality, yield, and maturity.

(c) Long-term Debt

The fair value of the Hospital's long-term debt is estimated based on the quoted market prices for similar issues, as advised by the Hospital's investment bankers

Hudson Hospital established a three-level fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The determination of the level within the hierarchy is based on the lower level input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below.

- Level 1 Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly

The fair value of mutual funds prices are derived from the underlying security values and are based on quoted prices from national exchanges and commonly used third-party pricing services. Hudson Hospital obtains one price for each mutual fund primarily from a national exchange or third-party pricing service, which generally uses Level 1 and Level 2 inputs for the determination of fair value.

(a) FHA-Insured Mortgage Revenue Bonds Series 2002

Wisconsin Health and Educational Facilities Authority (WHEFA) FHA-Insured Mortgage Revenue Bonds (FHA Revenue Bonds). Series 2002 (Hudson Memorial Hospital. Inc. Project). were issued on behalf of Hudson Memorial Hospital. Inc. in the total original amount of \$27,475,000 in April 2002. Substantially all of the mortgaged property of the new Hospital campus is pledged as collateral on the FHA Revenue Bonds.

Principal and interest payments on the bonds are due each January 15 and July 15 through maturity of January 15, 2029 Interest rates on bonds range from 3 00% to 5 70%

(b) Leases

(9) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

(a) Permanently Restricted Net Assets

The Foundation's endowment was established by the donor for which income is expendable to support the mission of the Foundation and is included in the investments account of the Foundation As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including designated by the board of directors as to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The State of Wisconsin's State Management of Institutional Funds Act (the Act) was effective in 1972, and amended through 1999. The board of directors of the Foundation has interpreted the Act as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets (1) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. (2) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (3) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance

with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Foundation has adopted an investment policy for their investment funds, including the permanent endowments that attempt to provide a balance of long-term capital appreciation, preservation of capital, and income production to support additional resources for the continuation and expansion of the charitable mission of the Foundation Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Foundation must hold in perpetuity. Under this policy, as approved by the board of directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that outperform the S&P 500 Index

Strategies Employed for Achieving Results

To satisfy its long-term capital appreciation and expected results, the Foundation relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Foundation targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term objectives within the risk constraints.

Spending Policy

The Foundation has a policy, based upon the intent of the donor-restricted endowed assets, to spend the earnings from the endowment fund for current operations to support the mission of the Foundation

Permanently restricted net assets of \$81,690 are investments in perpetuity, the income of which is available for nursing scholarships and capital expenditures

(10) Clinic Lease

The Hospital has a Lease Agreement (Lease) with Western Wisconsin Medical Associates. S.C. (WWMA) for the buildings and equipment of the clinic facility located on the Hospital's campus. The Lease Agreement associated with the campus became effective on July 1, 2003 and extends until June 30, 2029 WWMA has the right to terminate the lease at the end of the 120th full month of the term, the 180th full month of the term, and the 240th full month of the term, and at no other time, subject to certain termination fees as specified in the Lease

In addition to the annual base rent, WWMA is responsible for additional rent payments including, but not limited to, real estate taxes, utilities, building operating costs, property/casualty insurance, future capital improvements, and other expenses. Total revenue recognized by the Hospital for rent was approximately \$538,867 and \$483,600 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively, and is included in the consolidated statements of operations as other revenue.

(11) Affiliated Organizations

Key management personnel of the Hospital, including the chief executive officer and chief financial officer, are employees of Regions Hospital (Regions), a related organization of the Hospital and a subsidiary of HPI. The Hospital reimburses Regions for their salaries and benefits expenses. In addition the Hospital also purchases certain emergency physician services, training services, and other items from HPI. The amounts paid to HPI in relation to these contracts and services amounted to \$8,678,101 and \$7,055,960 for the fiscal years ended 2010 and 2009, respectively. Amounts due to HPI as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 totaled \$2,043,009 and \$448,747, respectively.

(12) Pledged Assets

The State of Wisconsin allows organizations to invest in certificates of deposit to fund the State of Wisconsin unemployment reserve fund. At December 31, 2010 and 2009, the Hospital has a certificate of deposit at a local bank totaling \$315,339 to fund the unemployment reserve fund. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, no amounts were drawn on the certificate of deposit.

(13) Defined Contribution Pension Plan

The Hospital has established a defined contribution plan for all its eligible employees. The Hospital contributes 3% of annual compensation for those plan participants contributing a minimum of 1% of their annual compensation. For those employees attaining 15 or more years of continuous service, the Hospital

will contribute between 4% and 8% of the employees' annual compensation assuming the employee contributes an equal percentage. Pension expense for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009 was approximately \$392,280 and \$379,028, respectively

(15) Commitments and Contingencies

Malpractice Insurance

The Hospital has professional liability insurance with limits of \$1,000,000 per claim and \$3,000,000 in aggregate for claims made during a policy year (claims-made basis). Losses in excess of the professional liability insurance are fully covered through the Hospital's mandatory participation in the Wisconsin Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund. No liability for claims incurred but not reported as of the balance sheet date has been provided based on management's assessment of hospital-specific claim incurral and reporting patterns.

Risk Management

Hudson Hospital is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets, errors and omissions, injuries to employees, and natural disasters. These risks are covered by commercial insurance purchased from independent third parties. There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage from the previous year in any of the Hudson Hospital's policies.

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Recently, government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by healthcare providers. Violation of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.
