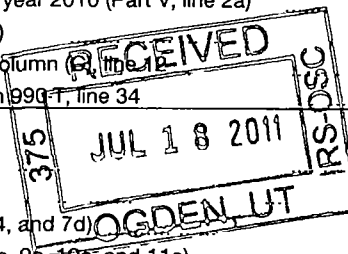

Line 4a. International Low-Enriched Uranium Fuel Bank

In December 2010, the International Atomic Energy Agency's (IAEA) Board of Governors agreed to create an international low-enriched uranium fuel bank. This fulfilled the conditions of a \$50 million pledge aiming to help prevent the spread of uranium enrichment technology, proposed by the Nuclear Threat Initiative (NTI) and Warren Buffett, a key NTI adviser who financially backed and enabled NTI's commitment.

The fuel bank will create a low-enriched uranium stockpile to support nations that make the sovereign choice not to build indigenous nuclear fuel cycle capabilities. More and more nations are seeking peaceful nuclear energy to meet their development needs and are weighing available options to determine what will be the most secure and most economical way to ensure a reliable supply of nuclear fuel in the event of a supply interruption. The fuel bank will make commercial nuclear fuel supplies more secure by offering states reliable access to a nuclear fuel reserve. If their supply arrangements are disrupted, states would have access to a fuel reserve under impartial IAEA control. This would make a state's voluntary choice to rely on the market more secure.

Since NTI's announcement in 2006, countries, including the United States, the European Union, Norway, the United Arab Emirates and Kuwait, provided matching funds.

Responding to the IAEA vote, former Senator Sam Nunn, Co-Chairman of NTI, said "This is a breakthrough in global cooperation to enable peaceful uses of nuclear energy while reducing the risks of proliferation and catastrophic terrorism. If every country interested in nuclear energy also chooses to pursue uranium enrichment, the risk of proliferation of dangerous nuclear materials and weapons would grow beyond the tipping point. The IAEA fuel bank now gives countries an alternative to that choice and direction."

The idea for a fuel reserve is not new, and it is provided for in the International Atomic Energy Agency's statute. NTI's commitment was designed to help move the discussion from words to deeds in this vital area of nuclear cooperation.

Line 4b. Communications & Public Education

NTI's Communications and Public Education program aims to provide resources to nonproliferation professionals, and to educate and inform the public on the risks and threats

from nuclear, biological and chemical weapons, terrorism and related issues. NTI manages a number of websites which provide comprehensive, in depth online content. www.nti.org is the most visited site.

The program also tries to engage and expand the network of individuals interested in efforts to reduce the threats from nuclear, biological and chemical weapons and materials with the goal of inspiring individuals to become personally involved in efforts to expand and accelerate the pace of work to reduce these threats.

Specific accomplishments during the tax year include:

Global Security Newswire

NTI supports the publication of Global Security Newswire by the National Journal Group, which provides daily news on nuclear, chemical and biological weapons, terrorism and related issues. National Journal produces original reporting and a comprehensive snapshot of the day's global news on these issues for a readership which includes both professionals and those with a lay interest. It appears exclusively on NTI's website.

Online Research Center and Library

NTI funds the James Martin Center for Nonproliferation Studies at the Monterey Institute for International Studies to produce a research library containing information, analysis and educational materials relating to the threats from nuclear, biological and chemical weapons, missile development programs and terrorist activities. The library builds on the most comprehensive open-source nonproliferation databases in the world and brings together a range of expert opinion and analysis on these issues.

Line 4c. The Nuclear Security Project

The Nuclear Security Project (NSP) is an effort to galvanize global support for and action on the vision of a world free of nuclear weapons and the urgent steps needed to reach that goal. Former Secretary of State, George P. Shultz, former Defense Secretary William J. Perry, former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and former Senator Sam Nunn ("the NSP principals") joined together to form the NSP in the wake of their Wall Street Journal op-eds which have re-framed the terms of the global debate on nuclear issues. Through the project, NTI has partnered with organizations across five continents, and engaged officials at the highest levels of government internationally to promote dialogue, education and action on the Vision and the Steps toward a World Free of Nuclear Weapons. Through grant-making, conferences and meetings, and educational outreach, we have enabled analytic studies and expended support for the project by bringing together key subject experts, senior statesmen, and political and military leaders. In September 2009, the United Nations Security Council implicitly endorsed the agenda of the Nuclear Security Project through the adoption of UNSC Resolution 1887.

Specific accomplishments during the tax year include:

Nuclear Tipping Point:

In January 2010, the NSP launched “Nuclear Tipping Point” – a documentary film about nuclear dangers and the need to combine the vision of a world free of nuclear weapons with steps to move toward that goal. In “Nuclear Tipping Point,” Shultz, Perry, Kissinger, and Nunn share the personal experiences that led them to write the three *Wall Street Journal* op-eds describing their efforts to reduce reliance on nuclear weapons, to prevent their spread into potentially dangerous hands and ultimately to end them as a threat to the world. The film is introduced by General Colin Powell, narrated by actor Michael Douglas and includes interviews with California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger and former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev, among others. The NSP is distributing the film, free of charge, as part of the of our education and outreach efforts. The film website has been an especially useful tool and the NSP is utilizing the site and other social media outlets to promote and distribute the film and advance the NSP goals. The film has been distributed to every state in the United States and countries worldwide. Screening events and discussions have been and continue to be held across the country and around the world.

Internationalizing the NSP:

The NSP has set up partnerships with a number of trusted security and defense institutions around the world that support the analytic agenda of the NSP and help build on the political momentum behind the vision and steps by stimulating dialogue and action within their circles of influence on the urgent dangers of today’s nuclear threat. Engaging reputable “Project Partners” around the world on the vision and steps agenda plays a valuable role in helping to expand the international reach of the NSP by: ensuring that the vision and steps agenda remains a priority in key countries and regions; building the support of senior political, military and diplomatic figures internationally; helping shape the analytic agenda in key countries to ensure they complement and build on the global momentum behind the vision and steps; expanding support and action for the vision and steps to broad audiences within key countries - including, policy makers, subject matter experts, the public and media; and ensuring that NSP products reach a broad international audience.

Analytic Studies:

The NSP continued its analytic studies, focusing on verification which culminated in the publication of a book – *Cultivating Confidence: Verification, Monitoring, and Enforcement for a World Free of Nuclear Weapons (Nuclear Threat Initiative, 2010)* – exploring the key technical, political and diplomatic challenges associated with verification, monitoring and enforcement of a world free of nuclear weapons and potential solutions to these challenges.

Line 4d. Other program services

NTI aims to create projects that catalyze further governmental and international action on nuclear, biological and chemical threats, through multi-year projects, all of which were active in this tax year.

NTI's biological program, the Global Health and Security Initiative works around the world to prevent, detect and respond to biological threats. The threats arising from natural or deliberately induced disease outbreaks are both a health and a security issue. To find solutions to the extraordinarily complex biological threat, NTI is pioneering new approaches toward health and security. Specifically in the tax year, GHSI focused on improving global capacity for the prevention of and preparedness for biological threats through enhancing disease surveillance, early detection and response.

Section A.

Line 1a – NTI's governing body, the Board of Directors, meets semi-annually. Between meetings, it delegates authority under NTI's by-laws to the Executive Committee, which is composed of not less than three and not more than five members who must have been or are to be upon election, Directors of NTI, and includes the co-chairmen of the Board. The Executive Committee is appointed annually by the Board. During the fiscal year ended December 31, 2010, the Executive Committee was made up of the co-chairmen of the Board, and the President of NTI. During intervals between meetings of the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee possesses and may exercise all the powers and functions of the Board of Directors in the management and direction of the affairs of NTI in all cases in which specific direction has not been given by the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee can also resolve any matter in which the co-chairmen fail to agree. All actions of the Executive Committee are required to be reported to the Board of Directors at its next meeting. Contemporaneous minutes of the proceedings of the Executive Committee are kept. A majority of the voting members of the Executive Committee in office at the time are necessary to constitute a quorum and in every case, an affirmative vote of a majority of the voting members of the Committee present at a meeting is necessary for taking any action.

Section B.

Line 11A – NTI's Form 990 is prepared by its Finance department. It is initially reviewed by the Treasurer/CFO and then an independent review is provided by Avalon Financial Advisors, LLC. Next, the CFO reviews the Form 990 with management – the Executive Vice President, and the President. NTI's Board of Directors has delegated its review of the Form 990 to the Executive Committee. However, the final Form 990 is required to be sent to all members of the Board for informational purposes prior to being filed.

Line 12c – NTI's bylaws require that a copy of NTI's Conflict of Interest Policy, as adopted by the Board, be furnished to each Director, Officer and operational staff member serving at or associated with NTI. NTI's policy states that a conflict of interest exists:

- When an officer or member of the staff takes part in a decision in which it appears that she/he may be unable to remain impartial in choosing between the interests of the

- Nuclear Threat Initiative and his/her personal interests or the personal interest of his/her related parties or the interests of his/her reportable affiliates, or
- When an officer or member of the staff uses privileged information gained in the course of service at NTI for personal benefit or gain, or for the personal benefit of gain or his/her related parties or the interests of his/her reportable affiliates, or
- When an officer or member of the staff, by virtue of his/her relationship to NTI, receives a benefit that represents a transfer of NTI's financial resources that is not related to the accomplishment of NTI's tax-exempt purposes.

Related parties are defined as spouses, parents, children, siblings, in-laws and any individuals who reside in an officer or member of the staff's household.

Reportable affiliate means an institution, corporation or business organization for which an officer or member of the staff or a related party (who to the knowledge of the officer or staff member) serves as an officer, director, partner, employee, or agent; holds more than 1% of the voting stock (if any); or has dealings from which he or she has materially benefitted (i.e. received more than \$1,000 exclusive of dividends or interest).

NTI prohibits participation by officer or staff in any matter or otherwise engage in any activity for which a conflict of interest exists. Board members are recused from decisions of the Board in which a conflict of interest might arise. Board members, officers and staff member are required to disclose to NTI any related party and any reportable affiliate which is likely to apply or otherwise be considered by NTI for a grant award or financial transaction. The information provided must be updated annually, or more frequently as appropriate. NTI requests annual updates from its Board members and staff through reissuance of the policy together with a standard form for them to complete.

Line 15 – Annually the CEO presents a memorandum to NTI's Compensation Committee, in which he recommends compensation levels for NTI's CEO and Officers.

In 2005, NTI commissioned a compensation comparability study to assess its levels of compensation as compared to equivalent organizations and the market. NTI used the study in conjunction with analysis carried out in 2000 by PWC, adjusted for inflation, to set compensation levels in 2005. In 2010 NTI commissioned a further compensation study from PWC. We are using this data in setting 2011 compensation.

In subsequent years, including 2010, NTI proposed increases based on the 2005 compensation, adjusted for inflation as determined by the Washington area Consumer Price Index (CPI). In addition, the CEO also takes into account the importance of retaining a uniquely qualified team at NTI, and in certain circumstances has made a case for small merit increases.

In 2010, the Compensation Committee was made up of three independent members of the Board of Directors. Per NTI's bylaws, the members of the Compensation Committee may not include current or former Directors who are also salaried senior executives of NTI. The Compensation Committee presents its recommendations to the Board of Directors in executive

session. The recommendations include specific salary levels for the CEO, the President and all officers. Officer salaries are approved by majority vote of NTI's Board of Directors, as directed by NTI's bylaws.

Minutes of the Compensation Committee are maintained with NTI's corporate files at the office of NTI's Secretary.

Line 19 – NTI states on its website that its governing documents, conflict of interest policy and financial statements are available to the public upon request, and provides a link to contact information.

NTI normally receives a substantial part of its support from direct or indirect contributions from the general public. NTI also meets certain other requirements; the pertinent factors set forth in the regulations are discussed below:

i. Ten percent-of-support limitation

Based on support over previous years, NTI anticipates that its public support will continue to range between 20 and 35 percent of total support.

ii. Attraction of public support

NTI receives support primarily from a number of individual donors, foundations and public charities. NTI's fundraising department has also developed a database of approximately 100,000 supporters who follow NTI's activities through its website and e-mail and direct mail distributions. These supporters periodically donate to NTI through year end solicitations, upon receipt of NTI's annual report or for other reasons. NTI intends to continue this pattern of solicitation, and also hopes to further build support from the general public through its donor database, and other means.

iii. Percentage of financial support

As noted above, NTI expects that its public support will continue to consistently range between 20 and 35 percent. In FY08, support was 33.57%; in FY09, support was 29.18%; in FY10, support was 21.78%. The ranges are close to, or exceed, the 33.33 percent amount prescribed in section 170(b)(1)(A)(vi) and should therefore be favorably regarded.

iv. Sources of Support

NTI anticipates that it will continue to receive support from individual, but unrelated donors, foundations and public charities.

The primary website is at www.nti.org and has resources in English and Russian. The website is an information clearing house with unique resources as well as over 3,000 links to a wide array of relevant materials and views. In calendar year 2010, this website alone attracted 966,101 visitors making 1,603,381 visits and 3,082,454 page views.

The website's unique resources include:

- A free daily news service provided by National Journal Group covering global developments related to nuclear, biological and chemical weapons;
- A research library with the world's most comprehensive, open-source nonproliferation databases, as well as profiles of the nuclear, biological and chemical weapons programs of over 20 countries, and issue briefs that offer short introduction and in-depth analysis on a wide range of international security issues;

- Publications and source documents published by governments and nongovernmental organizations;
- A teacher's toolkit with self-guided tutorials on key issues, sample syllabi and links to an educational resources guide and a glossary of nonproliferation terms.

The website is available free of charge to all interested persons.

NTI is also conducts regular public outreach and education related to nuclear issues, and provides expert testimony to the US and other governments as requested. Currently NTI is conducting a public outreach program in support of its Nuclear Security Project, a project aimed at reducing reliance on nuclear weapons, preventing their proliferation and ultimately ending them as a threat to the world. NTI has made a documentary film featuring the four project principals, Henry Kissinger, Sam Nunn, William Perry, and George Shultz. The film will be screened to groups, and is available on DVD free of charge to interested parties through NTI's website. This is the second such project that NTI has undertaken. The first film, Last Best Chance, was made in 2005, and, together with a public education campaign about the risks of unsecured nuclear material, added significantly to NTI's public profile, supporter database, and outreach efforts.

NTI makes its conference space available to other public charity organizations and governments for meetings, upon request.

On July 1, 2009, NTI adopted the accounting standard on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes, which addresses the determination of whether tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded in the financial statements. Under this guidance, NTI may recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more likely than not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by taxing authorities, based on the technical merits of the position. The tax benefits recognized in the financial statements from such a position are measured based on the largest benefits that has a greater than 50% likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement. The guidance on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes also addresses de-recognition, classification, interest and penalties on income taxes, and accounting in interim periods.

Management evaluated NTI's tax positions and concluded that NTI had taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements to comply with the provisions of this guidance. Generally, the NTI is no longer subject to income tax examinations by the U.S. federal, state or local tax authorities for years before 2007.

Grants are monitored through the following activities:

1. Pre-grant Inquiry

NTI program personnel confirm the suitability of the grantee by reviewing prior history and experience, considering references and complying with export control regulations. Results are documented in a "decision memo" which is presented to either the Board of Directors or the President for approval, depending on the size of the grant.

2. Written Grant Agreement

Once a grant proposal is approved, a grant agreement is drawn up between NTI and the grantee. This sets out the purpose of the grant, the budget and details the legal commitments, including compliance with US export control laws and regulations, and limitations on use of funds being entered into by NTI and the grantee. All grant agreements are given a number for tracking purposes, and are signed by both parties.

3. Accounting for Grant Funds

The grant agreement specifies that grantees keep accurate and complete books and records of receipts and expenditures made in connection with the grant, maintaining such books and records in a manner that the receipts and expenditures of grant funds are shown separately.

4. Regular Reporting

The grant agreement requires that periodic (at least annual) narrative and financial reports are submitted to NTI detailing work accomplished and expenditure of grant funds against budget. Reports are reviewed by both NTI's program and financial personnel.

5. Project Oversight

NTI program personnel are in regular contact with grantee personnel and visit certain key projects to assess progress against grant goals.

6. Disbursement of Funds

NTI's grants are disbursed either up front, in tranches, or on an invoicing basis, dependent on the grant agreement. No funds are disbursed until a signed grant agreement has been received, export control checks have been reviewed and approved, and any other appropriate documentation received. For grants that are managed in tranches, or through invoicing, it is generally necessary that all reporting is up to date, and the appropriate stage of the grant project completed prior to subsequent funds being disbursed.

All accounting records are maintained on accrual basis and in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America (US GAAP). All unconditional grants are booked in full to the income statement at the point the grant agreement has been signed by both parties. In the short fiscal year ended December 31, 2010, NTI did not make any conditional grants.

Charter travel: NTI's travel policy states, "NTI does not, in the general course of business, use charter flights or private jets.

However, in the following exceptional circumstances, a charter flight may be considered:

- There are no scheduled flights available that will allow a staff member to meet business expectations with regard to attendance at critical speaking engagements, meetings, conferences, etc. and there is no appropriate, alternative staff member able to substitute;
- Medical reasons;
- Due to the number of people traveling, the cost of hiring a charter is comparable to paying for a scheduled flight;
- Use of a private jet is donated for accomplishment of a business purpose;
- Other reasons, not foreseeable at the writing of this policy, deemed appropriate by the President of NTI

Prior to making any charter flight reservation, the party requesting the charter or private jet must write a memo to NTI's President. The memo should be routed through the program Vice President, the Chief Financial Officer and the Executive Vice President respectively. The memo should document in detail the reasons for using the charter or private jet. It should also include who it is proposed will be using the service, where they will be flying between, the dates of travel, and the cost. The memo must be signed and approved by NTI's President." In calendar year 2010, NTI chartered a flight between Berlin and Munich for a high level meeting in connection with its Nuclear Security Project. The charter flight was approved by NTI's President in consideration of the health of some of the VIP participants. Twelve meeting participants and staff members used the flight.

First class travel: NTI's Board travel policy states that, "It is the general policy of NTI to provide reimbursement for business class (or the domestic equivalent) airfare [for its Board members], unless exception is made with the approval of either Co-Chairmen or the President to allow first class airfare for international travel in appropriate circumstances." In calendar year 2010, NTI paid for Board members William Perry and Sam Nunn to travel first class on certain occasions for reasons which were deemed appropriate by NTI's President, in compliance with the policy.

Travel for Companions: NTI's policy states that, "Spouses and accompanying assistants of Directors of NTI are specifically invited to and expected to attend meetings of the Board and to participate in Board dinner discussions to gain insight to the substantive programs of NTI to facilitate their ability to knowledgeably represent the work of the Initiative to government officials and leaders in their communities." In calendar year 2010, NTI paid travel costs to allow the spouses of three Board members, Fujia Yang, Eugene Habiger, and Rolf Ekeus, accompany their husbands to the NTI Board meeting, in accordance with policy. NTI additionally paid for the spouse of Board member and CEO, Sam Nunn, to attend the DC Premiere of its film, Nuclear Tipping Point.

NTI's Vice President and Chief Communications Officer, Mark Kitchens resigned employment at NTI, effective February 1, 2010. Mr. Kitchens continued to serve as a Senior Advisor to NTI until May 1, 2010. Accordingly, NTI paid him an amount of \$55,050 in compliance with the terms of his agreement.
