Community Outreach and Engagement

The Foundation's program of community outreach and engagement actively supports the development of capacity within nonprofit organizations and public agencies to more effectively develop resources that address community problems, attract volunteers and other public support for their work, and promote their work within their target communities.

The Foundation works directly with nonprofit and governmental agencies across Mississippi, within its own professional networks of grant-makers and service providers to nonprofits, and with individuals engaged locally in charitable activities and services to identify and reach out to underserved populations throughout the state of Mississippi, and to encourage those closest to the problems and issues to actively assist the Foundation in targeting its resources and programs to achieve the best and most effective results.

The goals of this work are to increase the level and effectiveness of philanthropy in local communities and to enable local nonprofits to more effectively and efficiently achieve their charitable missions. Toward this end, the Foundation's Director of Programs allocates approximately 25% of his time on the following community outreach and engagement activities:

- 1. Serving as a lead trainer in workshops and seminars offered by the Mississippi Center for Nonprofits and others to other charitable organizations and government agencies throughout Mississippi in the fields of fundraising, proposal writing, board development and governance, and financial and program management.
- 2. Providing direct technical assistance to Foundation grantees, Mississippi nonprofit agencies and networks via telephone and electronic inquiries and responses.
- 3. Providing one-on-one and group training to Foundation grantees and other Mississippi nonprofit personnel in the areas of fundraising, proposal writing, board development, and financial management
- 4. Serving as a resource contact for nonprofit leaders throughout the region (including Mississippi) served by the Foundation.
- 5. Organizing, developing and working with the Mississippi Association of Grantmakers to increase philanthropy and its effectiveness throughout the state of Mississippi.

Page 7, Part IX-B, Summary of Program-Related Investments

1. Charitable Purposes of PRI Program

The Maddox Foundation makes program-related investments in Maddox Hockey, Inc., which owns and operates the Mississippi RiverKings minor league professional hockey team, that enable and encourage the team's management, coaches and players, season ticket holders, sponsors and fans to support the charitable purposes of the Foundation to the maximum extent possible. The Foundation acquired the RiverKings franchise in 2002, and has since operated the team as a program-related investment. The Foundation's goal is to operate the RiverKings team as a unique charitable asset that provides benefits to the entire Northwest Mississippi community, and that promotes and serves broader philanthropic purposes throughout the region.

Ownership and operation of the RiverKings as a program-related investment gives the Foundation unique opportunities to create and expand programs in its traditional areas of interest, such as education and services to youth. The team's operations generate additional financial resources, expand volunteer support for and increase public awareness of charitable programs and causes in the community. This supports the Foundation's broader mission of increasing the capacity of nonprofit organizations to better and more effectively serve their local communities.

The Foundation's investments have enabled the RiverKings to (1) promote the expansion of programs providing educational and recreational opportunities for young people, by linking the team to programs supporting local schools and existing recreational programs serving area youths; (2) establish an alternative community investment program that improves the viability and impact of nonprofit and charitable organizations in the region, and, (3) design community support programs that maximize interaction between the team and local charities in ways that help such charities achieve their charitable missions within the community.

Another charitable purpose of the Foundation's program-related investments in the RiverKings is to support general community and economic development objectives in Desoto County and surrounding areas. Economic impact studies have shown that the RiverKings franchise generates as much as \$6 million annually in business volume and personal income in Desoto County, and directly or indirectly provides up to 70 full-time jobs for area residents. The presence of a professional sports team in the county is also an asset by local officials involved in attracting business and industry, residents and tourists to this region.

A final objective of these investments has always been to lessen the burden of government (Desoto County, MS) by ensuring the retention of the team as an anchor tenant for the DeSoto Civic Center. The study commissioned by DeSoto County that led to the construction of the Civic Center stated that the attraction and retention of a professional sports team, particularly a hockey team, was critical to the economic viability of the Civic Center. The presence of the RiverKings hockey team provides substantial financial support to the Civic

Center, allowing the facility to retire its public debt and lessen its dependence on public funds for its operations. The Foundation and the RiverKings work with Civic Center officials to improve public awareness of the facility and increase the use of the facility for public and private events.

2. Specific PRI Program Activities and Results

<u>Fundraising and Community Support</u>. All charities are faced with the issues of raising funds to support their work, recruiting volunteers to assist in their efforts, and generating publicity about their work that will attract both funds and volunteers. The <u>MVP (Money-Volunteers-Publicity) Program</u> was designed by the RiverKings to assist nonprofits and charitable causes with all of these issues.

For most RiverKings home games, one area nonprofit is selected as that night's "MVP" organization, with the work of that agency being spotlighted in ways that raise funds and awareness for their programs. Each MVP organization is recognized through pre-game and post-game press releases prepared by RiverKings staff and distributed to the RiverKings publicity network. They are also recognized in announcements during the game and featured during the radio broadcast of the game. They are granted the opportunity to place an informational booth in the arena concourse, and the ability to conduct a silent auction or raffle during the game that may include donated RiverKings merchandise. MVP nonprofits also have a representative make the ceremonial puck drop before the game.

The RiverKings also operate a <u>Ticket Fundraising Program</u> that allows nonprofits to raise substantial funds to support their work, with no risk and with relatively little investment of time or resources. Nonprofits can receive tickets, sell them for face value, and retain a significant percentage of the ticket price for their organization. In 2010, nonprofits received as a direct grant from the RiverKings \$3 for each ticket sold after a minimum of 20 tickets are sold and \$5 per ticket sold after 200 tickets are sold. The Maddox Foundation then matches, dollar for dollar, those funds earned by nonprofit organizations selling 200 tickets or more. Therefore, an organization selling 200 tickets gets a return of \$2,000 in funds, half from the RiverKings and half from Maddox Foundation. During 2010, a total of 23 organizations raised \$33,265 from the RiverKings and a matching amount of \$33,265 from Maddox Foundation through this program.

The <u>Ticket Fundraising Program</u> also allows nonprofits to build their capacity in two other essential areas, volunteer development and public awareness. The best way for a nonprofit organization to generate a large number of ticket sales in the program is to mobilize its constituents in volunteer efforts to promote the fundraising event. By reaching out into the larger community, the nonprofit organization can increase awareness about its programs and work. Nonprofits participating in the Ticket Fundraising Program can also take advantage of other aspects of the RiverKings community investment program, for instance, by scheduling player appearances to help promote ticket sales and focusing community awareness on the work of the nonprofit.

Since 2002, hundreds of nonprofit organizations have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars in funds, increased their volunteer base, and improved community awareness of their work through the <u>Ticket Fundraising Program</u> and other aspects of the RiverKings Community Investment Program. It also serves as a point of entry for many nonprofits to become involved in other aspects of Maddox Hockey's Community Investment Program, such as Face Off Field Trip and Player Appearances.

<u>Direct Charitable Donations</u>. The RiverKings regularly donate official team merchandise, some of which is autographed, tickets, vouchers and other items to local nonprofits for use in their fundraising efforts, such as silent auctions and raffles. In 2010, donations were made to over 100 organizations, including schools, local and national charities, hospitals and churches, for a total of approximately 150 community events. At least \$30,000 in retail value of tickets and merchandise was donated to area agencies in 2010

RiverKings With a Cause. A team-supervised club, RiverKings with a Cause raised funds for local charitable causes, give fans opportunities to do volunteer work with local agencies, organizes participation by team members in community activities, and supports the team's charitable activities. RiverKings with a Cause also raises funds through silent auctions, raffles and other in-game events, as well as through local events in which player participate (player-waiter dinner, bowling event). In 2010, the club supported and raised funds for Assists for Autism, Hockey for Humanity (Memphis Habitat for Humanity), the Ronald McDonald House and a number of agencies involved in service and support for survivors of breast cancer.

Special Projects. Over the past decade, the RiverKings have developed a number of special projects and program activities that promote charitable giving and community causes. Since 2003, the annual Face Off Field Trip is a regular RiverKings home game which is scheduled to start in the morning as an educational field trip for area elementary school students. This project has brought thousands of students, sponsored by local charities and corporations, to a regularly scheduled professional hockey game. It annually draws 6,000 to 8,000 students from the entire region, including parts of Tennessee and Arkansas. Educational activities are interwoven into the game's breaks in action and public address announcements, and a workbook distributed to the students gives teachers the opportunity to reinforce lessons when they return to the classroom. The RiverKings subsidize this event by underwriting tickets and other costs in excess of \$60,000 so that all school children can attend

The RiverKings also schedule several <u>Theme Nights</u> throughout the year, some of which are designed to focus on charitable organizations or causes. One such night is "Pink at the

Rink", which promotes breast cancer awareness and involves a number of cancer prevention agencies. Other theme nights that featured nonprofits in 2010 were Ducks Unlimited night, featuring conservation programs, Southland Gaming Night, featuring a greyhound adoption program, the Teddy Bear Toss Night (Toys for Tots), and St. Jude Children's Hospital Night.

Youth Sports Programs: Maddox Foundation, through funding of Hernando Youth Sports, has supported the development of an in-line roller hockey arena at the Hernando Civic Center property. RiverKings players serve as coaches for a summer youth roller hockey league (Jr. StreetKings), which instructs young people in sportsmanship as well as the physical skills of the sport itself, and introduces children and their families to the world of hockey. The players also serve as coaches for winter youth hockey leagues and/or clinics (Jr. RiverKings) that are operated at the DeSoto Civic Center. The RiverKings also partner with the Memphis Youth Hockey League to field a youth ice hockey team in the local league.

Assists for Autism is a team campaign of the RiverKings that helps raise funds for autism education and family support initiatives in Desoto County and the greater Memphis area. Fans can make pledges for assists made in games by the team, with funds supporting charities that help autistic children through early intervention, in-class training, teacher training and family support groups. Players make appearances at local schools to showcase this project, and participate in an annual 5K run that helps raise funds for this cause. RiverKings players also have developed an "Arts for Autism" project, in which art works composed by RiverKings players are sold at silent auction during a game to provide further benefits for autism programs.

<u>Newspapers in Education</u>: The RiverKings sponsor the delivery of newspapers to dozens of classrooms through the national Newspapers in Education Program. The program includes the distribution of education materials and player appearances in classrooms to promote reading and educational enrichment activities for thousands of students in the region. The RiverKings participated in NIE programs in Tunica and Panola Counties in 2010.

In-Game Activities. The RiverKings focus community attention on and support the work of nonprofit organizations through a variety of on-ice and game-related events. The team has awarded a wish to terminally-ill children through the Make-a-Wish Foundation on at least three occasions. The team periodically conducts post-game open skates, some of which are attended by players, where all the revenue raised goes to local nonprofit organizations. Representatives from local nonprofit organizations have sung the National Anthem prior to RiverKings games for additional exposure for those groups. The team regularly conducts locker room tours for children from area hospitals. The Mississippi National Guard swore in a group of recruits at center ice at one game; the team also organizes recognition for veterans' groups on Veterans Day.

A regular in-game activity is the <u>Puck Toss</u>, where fans purchase pucks which, during second intermission, are then tossed onto the ice in an attempt to land the puck in a target bucket to win cash prizes. This fundraising activity produces additional funds for designated charities (one fourth to the organization operating the puck toss table, and the remainder to the RiverKings youth hockey program). At selected games (usually 6-8 games per year), a <u>Jersey Auction</u> is conducted following the game, at which specially-designed jerseys worn during the game are auctioned off to support local charities. Jersey auctions regularly generate \$5,000 to \$7,500 for local charities, and have been known to generate over \$14,000 in a single night. At the end of the season, the players' warm-up jerseys and two of their three regular game jerseys are also sold through silent auctions to benefit local charities

<u>RiverKings and Kids</u>. The RiverKings Kids' Club for young RiverKings fans features exclusive meet and greet opportunities for youths with RiverKings players and mascots, participation on the ice in picking up pucks after the nightly Puck Toss in-game activity, locker room tours, and a variety of special events for club members.

A-Game Tickets. Through a special partnership with Desoto County Schools, the RiverKings reward students with all A's on their report cards with a free ticket to a home game following the first and second nine-weeks grading periods. The RiverKings will also work with schools across the region to develop incentive programs that use game tickets or vouchers to reward student achievement on report cards or on state-mandated tests. Over 10,000 ticket vouchers are distributed annually through this program.

<u>Player Appearances</u>: RiverKings personnel and players, including the team mascots, make personal appearances at charitable functions and fundraising events such as golf tournaments, and conduct visits to schools, nursing homes and other nonprofit organizations. The range of activities attended includes school assemblies, hockey clinics and demonstrations of hockey skills and play, distributing hockey equipment to school physical education classes ("Sticks for Kids" program), reading in classrooms and libraries, and corporate sponsored events. RiverKings' players regularly make trips to hospitals to visit sick children; some players have developed long-term relationships with such children and their families. Over 50 nonprofit organizations were served by player and mascot appearances during 2010. <u>Examples include</u>:

3. Summary of Community Investment Program

Traditionally, private foundations simply make grants to other organizations or individuals for charitable purposes. Most of these grants are to help pay the costs of operating programs or purchasing equipment or other capital assets. Relatively few private foundations make grants that are designed to increase the abilities of the grantees to expand their base of financial or volunteer support. And even fewer still have done what the Maddox Foundation has done with Maddox Sports and the Mississippi RiverKings hockey team--use the hockey team as a means for the community's charitable organizations to expand their financial and volunteer support through an activity that is fun and easy to access.

By developing a comprehensive Community Investment Program that utilizes programrelated investments in the operations of the Mississippi RiverKings hockey team, Maddox Foundation has leveraged multiple community resources to support its mission of increasing the ability of nonprofits to serve their constituencies across the region. These program-related investments help generate the resources that nonprofits need to sustain their operations, attract the volunteers required to provide needed community services, and actively promote the work of local agencies in the broader community and region. They also serve to increase philanthropic resources in a state where such resources are a critical need.
