Medical Center, and construction of replacement hospitals for 60-year old facilities

Commissioner, said: "Everybody knew we needed a new hospital, but where was the
money [\$35 million] going to come from? I don't want to think how much longer we
would have had to wait if VH hadn't extended its hand."
Each hospital in the system offers community education programs and screenings to
identify health problems at their earliest and most easily treated phase. Some
exciting examples of our community

Internet we invite the public to take a free on-line Heart Aware survey that
identifies their risk for heart disease. Those with troubling results are eligible
for a free consultation. We provide substantial direct and in-kind support to Free
Clinics in Winchester, Front Royal, Woodstock and Luray VA and Martinsburg, WV.
VH's Mission is "To Serve the Regional Community by Improving Health." The
organization has embraced well-care as seriously as sick-care. We built the VH
Wellness and Fitness Center in Winchester, we operate the Hampshire Wellness and
Fitness Center, and we offer fitness programs in Front Royal, Luray and Berkeley
Springs. The system is the lead organization in an annual Safety Fair for kids. VH
provides numerous healthcare screening programs to detect such diseases as diabetes,
hypertension and many forms of cancer. Screenings provide reassurance that

process when it is easier to overcome. When acute health issues arise; VH is well
positioned with six hospitals to provide the necessary acute care services. At

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization: Valley Health (VH) was incorporated on November 4, 1983 as a not-for-profit holding company organized exclusively for charitable, benevolent, educational and scientific purposes to support and encourage health care and related services through providing financial, management and other assistance to its affiliates and other organizations. Subsidiaries of VH, all of which are wholly owned, are as follows:

- Winchester Medical Center, Inc (the Medical Center) a 411 bed not-for-profit acute care hospital located in Winchester, Virginia
- Winchester Medical Center Foundation (the Winchester Foundation) an independent, not-for-profit non-stock corporation. The purpose of the Winchester Foundation is to fund educational, scientific, and charitable endeavors. The Medical Center is the sole corporate member of the Winchester Foundation. The accounts and activity of the Winchester Foundation are consolidated with those of the Medical Center.
- Warren Memorial Hospital, Inc (Warren) a not-for-profit corporation that owns and operates a 46 bed general short-term acute care hospital, a 120 bed long-term care facility located in Front Royal, Virginia.
- Warren Memorial Hospital Foundation (the Warren Foundation) an independent, not-for-profit
 non-stock corporation. The purpose of the Warren Foundation is to fund educational, scientific,
 and charitable endeavors. Warren is the sole corporate member of the Warren Foundation. The
 accounts and activity of the Warren Foundation are consolidated with those of Warren.
- Shenandoah Memorial Hospital, Inc (Shenandoah) a not-for-profit corporation that owns and operates a 25 bed critical access hospital in Woodstock, Virginia.
- Shenandoah Memorial Hospital Foundation (the Shenandoah Foundation) an independent, not-for-profit non-stock corporation. The purpose of the Shenandoah Foundation is to fund educational, scientific, and charitable endeavors. Shenandoah is the sole corporate member of the Shenandoah Foundation. The accounts and activity of the Shenandoah Foundation are consolidated with those of Shenandoah.
- Valley Regional Enterprises, Inc. (Valley Regional) a for-profit organization which manages a
 home health care agency, leases and sells durable medical equipment and supplies, operates an
 ambulance service, an urgent care center, a retail pharmacy and provides physician office
 consulting services.
- Surgi-Center of Winchester, Inc. (Surgi-Center) a not-for-profit ambulatory surgical care center.
- Hampshire Memorial Hospital, Inc (Hampshire) a not-for-profit corporation that owns and operates a 25-bed critical access hospital and 30-bed skilled nursing facility in Romney, West Virginia

- War Memorial Hospital, Inc. (War) a not-for-profit corporation that owns and operates a 25-bed critical access hospital and a 16-bed skilled nursing facility in Berkeley Springs, West Virginia See Note 22 for details of the acquisition by Valley Health effective April 1, 2010
- Hampshire Wellness Center, Inc On January 19, 2008, East Mountain Health Advantage entered into a long-term lease agreement to lease and operate a 60,000 square foot wellness center. The lease agreement with the Hampshire County Development Authority is for a period of 20 years.

In 2008, Hampshire Wellness Center, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation, was established to operate the wellness center and assume responsibility for the lease East Mountain Health Advantage is the sole corporate member of Hampshire Wellness Center, Inc.

- Page Memorial Hospital, Inc. (Page) a not-for-profit corporation that owns and operates a 25bed critical access hospital in Luray, Virginia See Note 21 for details of acquisition by Valley Health effective January 1, 2009.
- Valley Physician Enterprise, Inc. (VPE) a not-for-profit corporation formed for the purpose of employing physicians and providing office management services to non-employed physicians in the communities served by VH.

Principles of Consolidation: The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Valley Health and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as VH in the accompanying footnotes). All significant intercompany balances and transactions are eliminated in consolidation.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents: Cash and cash equivalents are highly liquid interest-bearing bank deposits and repurchase agreements. The carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents approximates fair market value. For purposes of the statement of cash flows, VH considers all highly liquid financial instruments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Patient Accounts Receivable: Patient accounts receivable are carried at the original charge less an estimate made for doubtful or uncollectible accounts. The allowance is based upon a review of the outstanding balances aged by financial class. Management uses collection percentages based upon historical collection experience to determine collectibility. Management also reviews troubled, aged accounts to determine collection potential. Patient accounts receivable are written off when deemed uncollectible. Recoveries of accounts previously written off are recorded as a reduction to bad debt expense when received. Interest is not charged on patient accounts receivable.

Investments: Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities. VH does not require collateral to secure its investments

Assets Limited as to Use: Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements and designated assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of VH have been reclassified in the balance sheets at December 31, 2010 and 2009.

Inventory of Supplies: The inventory of supplies is maintained on a first-in, first-out basis and is stated at the lower of cost or market.

Property and Equipment: Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used, and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets, are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Deferred Financing Costs: Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the obligation is outstanding using the straight-line method, which is not materially different than the effective interest method. Amortization expense related to the deferred financing costs was \$231 thousand and \$181 thousand for 2010 and 2009, respectively

Goodwill: VH records as goodwill the excess of purchase price over the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired. The FASB codification topic 350-10-165, Goodwill and Other Intangible Assets, prescribes a two-step process for impairment testing of goodwill, which is performed annually, as well as when an event triggering impairment may have occurred. The first step tests for impairment, while the second step, if necessary, measures the impairment. VH has elected to perform its annual analysis during the fourth quarter of each fiscal year. No indicators of impairment were identified during the year ended December 31, 2010 and 2009.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets: Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by VH has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by VH in perpetuity

Excess of Revenues over Expenses: The statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on derivatives and investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, changes in pension funding status and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

Net Patient Service Revenue: VH has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Charity Care: VH provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because VH does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue

Donor – Restricted Gifts: Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to VH are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or a purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted gifts and bequests in the accompanying financial statements.

Income Taxes: VH and its subsidiaries have been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) and Section 501(a), respectively, of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC), and similar sections of state statutes, and are exempt from Federal and State income taxes, except for Valley Regional, which is a for-profit corporation subject to income taxes at the statutory Federal and State rates.

Unrelated Business Income Tax: There is currently very little guidance in the IRS Code on what activities should be subject to unrelated business income tax (UBIT). The IRS has indicated that they are studying the issue and may issue additional guidance. As a result, at this time there is uncertainty regarding whether VH should pay income tax on certain types of net taxable income from activities that may be considered by taxing authorities as unrelated to the purpose for which VH was granted non-taxable status. In the opinion of management, any liability resulting from taxing authorities imposing income taxes on the net taxable income from activities deemed to be unrelated to VH's non-taxable status is not expected to have a material effect on VH's financial position or results of operations.

Derivative Instruments and Hedging Activities: VH utilizes derivative financial instruments to reduce interest rate risk. VH does not hold or issue derivative financial instruments for trading purposes. VH recognizes all derivatives as either assets or liabilities and measures those instruments at fair value. The changes in the fair value of VH derivative instruments are recorded as changes in net assets as they qualify for hedge accounting.

Subsequent Events: VH has evaluated subsequent events through March 30, 2011, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued

Reclassifications: Certain amounts in the 2009 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2010 presentation. The reclassifications have no impact on previously reported change in net assets

New or Recent Accounting Pronouncements: Health Care Entities Topic 954 (Accounting Standards Update No. 2010-23) of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification *Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure* is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010. Management's policy for providing charity care, as well as the level of charity care provided, shall be disclosed in the financial statements. Such disclosure shall be measured based on the provider's costs of providing charity care services. If costs cannot be specifically attributed to services provided to charity care patients (for example, based on a cost accounting system), management may estimate the costs of those services

using reasonable techniques This should be applied retrospectively to all prior periods presented Earlier application is permitted. VH will be required to adopt Topic 954 (No. 2010-23) in its 2011 annual financial statements.

Health Care Entities Topic 954 (Accounting Standards Update No 2010-24) of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification *Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries* is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010. A health care entity should not net insurance recoveries for medical malpractice claims against a related medical malpractice claim liability Additionally, the amount of the claim liability should be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. A cumulative-effect adjustment should be recognized in opening net assets in the period of adoption if a difference exists between any liability and insurance receivables recorded as a result of application. Early application is permitted. VH will be required to adopt Topic 954 (No. 2010-24) in its 2011 annual financial statements.

Management does not believe these new standards will have a material impact on the consolidated financial statements

Note 2. Net Patient Service Revenue

VH has agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement to VH at amounts different from its established rates. Contractual adjustments under third-party reimbursement programs represent the difference between VH billings at established rates for services and amounts reimbursed by third-party payors. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows:

Medical Center, Warren, Shenandoah, Hampshire, Page and War

Medicare

The Medical Center and Warren are reimbursed by Medicare under a prospective payment system (PPS). Under this methodology, inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Inpatient nonacute services, and defined capital and medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based upon a cost reimbursement method, with a limited amount per discharge on certain nonacute patients. Reimbursement for cost reimbursable items is at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The majority of outpatient services are paid at prospectively determined rates per medical procedure. Classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subjected to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract.

Shenandoah, Hampshire, Page and War are licensed as Critical Access Hospitals. Inpatient services and most outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries at Shenandoah, Hampshire, Page and War are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology at 101% of allowable cost. Other outpatient services are paid based on fee schedules.

Medicaid

Reimbursement for inpatients is based entirely on prospectively determined rates per discharge based on primary diagnosis code. Outpatient services are reimbursed based upon a cost reimbursement methodology. Hampshire and War are located in West Virginia and are reimbursed for inpatient and most outpatient services under a cost reimbursement methodology.

Anthem

Inpatient services are reimbursed based on a prospectively determined rate per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Outpatient services are reimbursed by percentage of charges or fee schedule based on diagnosis and are not subject to retroactive adjustment.

The Hospitals have also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 46 percent and 10 percent, respectively, of VH's gross patient revenue, for the year ended December 31, 2010 and 46 percent and 10 percent, respectively, of VH's gross patient revenue, for the year ended December 31, 2009. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. The 2010 and 2009 net patient service revenue increased approximately \$6.5 million and \$220 thousand, respectively, due to the addition of allowances not previously estimated that are considered necessary, as a result of final settlements and years that are no longer subject to audits, reviews and investigations

Valley Regional and Surgi-Center

Valley Regional and Surgi-Center are reimbursed under agreements with Medicare, Medicaid, and Anthem at prospectively determined rates for each procedure or service rendered

Charity Care

VH maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under its charity care policy, the estimated cost of those services and supplies, and equivalent service statistics. The following information measures the level of charity care provided during the years ended December 31 (in thousands).

Note 3. Cash Concentrations

At December 31, 2010, VH had approximately \$53 million on deposit with financial institutions that would not be covered by Federal deposit insurance. However, management believes these financial institutions are financially sound and these concentrations do not present a significant risk to VH

Purchase Commitment

Investment agreements with TIFF Realty and Resources II, GMO Renewable Resources, and MIT Private Equity Fund contain investment commitments of \$10 million, \$10.2 million and \$3.1 million, respectively, of which approximately \$6 million is outstanding at December 31, 2010. Future increases in the investments will be made as requested by the manager of these funds and is based upon planned acquisitions of investment properties.

Impairment

Impairment is evaluated using numerous factors, and their relative significance varies case to case. Factors considered included length of time and extent to which the market value has been less than cost; the financial condition and near-term prospects of the issuer, and the intent and ability to retain the security in order to allow for an anticipated recovery in market value. If, based on the analysis, it is determined that the impairment is other-than-temporary, the security is written down to fair value, and a loss would be recognized in the statement of operations. At December 31, 2009, VH determined that no write-downs were necessary. During 2010, VH determined that the investment in Private Advisors was impaired and wrote the investment down \$720 thousand, which approximated 25% of the investment market value at December 31, 2010. No other investments were deemed to be impaired during 2010.

Effective January 1, 2009, VH adopted the applicable provisions of Topic 958-205 of the FASB Standards Codification (formerly FASB Staff Position No. 117-1, Endowments of Not-for-Profit Organizations - Net Asset Classification of Funds Subject to an Enacted Version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act, and Enhanced Disclosures for All Endowment Funds), which, among other things, provides guidance on the net asset classification of donor-restricted endowment funds for a not-for-profit organization that is subject to an enacted version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Act of 2006 (UPMIFA) and additional disclosures about an organization's endowment funds.

The endowments include both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments. Net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Board of Directors of VH has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, VH classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the

donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, VH considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted funds:

- 1. The duration and preservation of the fund
- 2. The purpose of the Foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- 3. General economic conditions
- 4 The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- 5. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- 6 Other resources of the Foundation
- 7. The investment policies of the Foundation

VH has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that VH must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specific period(s) as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce a real return, net of inflation and investment management costs, of at least 5% over the long term. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, VH relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). VH targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based and alternative investments to achieve its long-term objective within prudent risk constraints.

Changes in endowment funds for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, are immaterial and therefore not disclosed

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowments funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires VH to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. These deficiencies result from unfavorable market fluctuations that occurred shortly after the investment of new permanently restricted contributions and continued appropriation for certain programs that was deemed prudent by the Board of Directors. There were no significant deficiencies of this nature which are reported in unrestricted net assets as of December 31, 2010 and 2009.

A detail description of the bond indebtedness follows:

In November and December 2009, the Industrial Development Authority of the City of Winchester (the Winchester Authority) issued \$175 million Industrial Development Authority of the City of Winchester Hospital Revenue Bonds, Series 2009. In December 2009, the West Virginia Hospital Finance Authority (the West Virginia Authority) issued \$25 million Hospital Revenue Bonds, Series 2009. The Series 2009 Bonds were used for the purposes of financing certain capital needs of the Winchester Medical Center, Shenandoah Memorial Hospital, Warren Memorial Hospital, and for construction of a new facility at Hampshire Memorial Hospital, (collectively the Obligated Group), and to reimburse the Obligated Group for certain past capital expenditures. The bonds are secured by a pledge of payment pursuant to the Loan Agreement under the Master Trust Indenture dated as of September 1, 1986. Each member of the Obligated Group has recorded their respective portion of the obligation. The bonds are secured by a pledge of payment pursuant to Loan Agreements between the Obligated Group, the Winchester Authority and the West Virginia Authority, respectively. In accordance with the respective trust indentures, the Winchester Authority and the West Virginia Authority assigned the promissory notes and the payment thereon to the Bond Trustees. Payments of principal and interest are made directly to the Bond trustees for the account of the Authorities.

On January 30, 2007, the Industrial Development Authority of the City of Winchester (the Winchester Authority) issued \$88.3 million Industrial Development Authority of the City of Winchester Hospital Revenue Bonds, Series 2007. The Series 2007 bonds were issued for the purpose of financing and refinancing certain capital needs of the Medical Center, Warren and Shenandoah (the Obligated Group). The bonds are limited obligations of the Winchester Authority and will be payable solely from the Obligated Group. The bonds are secured by a pledge of payment pursuant to the Loan Agreement under the Master Trust Indenture dated as of September 1, 1986. A portion of the proceeds were used to refinance Warren's Series 2003 bonds and Shenandoah's Series 2003 bonds. Each member of the Obligated Group has recorded their respective portion of the obligation.

The Medical Center has also entered into promissory notes with the Winchester Authority whereby the Medical Center has become obligated under Hospital Facility Revenue Bonds, Series 1991 and Series 1993. In addition to its notes with the Winchester Authority, the Medical Center has entered into promissory notes with the Industrial Development Authority of Clarke County, Virginia (the Clarke County Authority) whereby the Medical Center has become obligated under Hospital Facility Revenue Bonds, Series 2000 In accordance with the respective trust indentures, the Authorities assigned the promissory notes and the payments thereon to the Bond Trustees. Payments of principal and interest are made directly to the Bond Trustees for the account of the Authorities. The payment of principal and interest on the Series 1991 and Series 1993 bonds is insured by municipal bond insurance policies issued by AMBAC Indemnity Corporation The payment of principal and interest on the Series 2000 and Series 2007 bonds is insured by Financial Security Assurance. All bond issues are rated A1 by Moody's and A+ by Standard and Poor's as of the latest rating date. Under the Bond Indenture of Trust, the Medical Center was required to place the majority of proceeds into certain trust funds. The Series 1991 bonds were used to finance the construction of an imaging center, purchase hospital equipment, and refund the term bonds of the Series 1986 issue. The Series 1993 bonds refunded the remainder of the Series 1986 bonds and the entire Series 1990 issue. The Series 2000 bonds were used to finance certain improvements to the Medical Center's facilities. The bonds are secured by the Medical Center's Trust Agreements to the respective Authorities in the amount of the bonds payable. The Trust Agreements are secured by all revenue and receipts and pledged assets of the Medical Center Pledged assets consist of accounts receivable with a net book value of approximately \$53 million, inventories, general intangibles and various other assets

The trust indentures include various restrictive covenants, one of which requires the Medical Center to maintain a debt service coverage ratio of 1 1 to 1 0 (defined in the indentures as the ratio of income available for debt service to annual debt service commitments). The Series 2009 Bonds include additional covenants, including a debt services coverage ratio of 1 25 to 1, a debt to capitalization ratio of not greater than .65, and requires the days cash on hand to be not less than 100 days. Upon the occurrence of events of noncompliance with such covenants, the principal of the bonds could be declared due and payable immediately by the Bond Trustees. As of and for the year ended, December 31, 2010 and 2009, Valley Health was in compliance with such covenants.

At December 31, 2010, interest rates range from .16% to .40% on the serial and term bonds, 4.85% on the RIBS/SAVRS and 4.85% to 5 5% on the IFRNS/SURFS.

The Series 2000 bonds and Series 2007 bonds bear interest at a variable rate which resets to market weekly. The rate for the Series 2000 bonds was 31% at December 31, 2010 The rates for the Series 2007 bonds was 5.0% to 5.25% at December 31, 2010.

The RIBS/SAVRS mature on the second business day preceding the interest payment date on or immediately succeeding each January 1. All other bonds mature on January 1 each year.

Note 11. Interest Rate Risk Management

Medical Center, Shenandoah, Warren and East Mountain Health Advantage (the Hospitals)

The Hospitals have interest rate related derivative instruments to manage interest rate exposure on their debt instruments. The Hospitals do not enter into derivative instruments for any purpose other than interest rate management purposes. That is, the Hospitals do not speculate using derivative instruments

By using derivative financial instruments to hedge exposures to changes in interest rates, the Hospitals expose themselves to credit risk and market risk. Credit risk is the failure of the counter-party to perform under the terms of the derivative contract. When the fair value of a derivative contract is positive, the counter-party owes the Hospitals, which creates credit risk for the Hospitals. When the fair value of a derivative contract is negative, the Hospitals owe the counter-party and, therefore, it does not possess credit risk. The Hospitals minimize the credit risk in derivative instruments by entering into transactions with high-quality counter-parties.

Market risk is the adverse effect on the value of a financial instrument that results from a change in interest rates. The market risk associated with interest rates is managed by establishing and monitoring parameters that limit the types and degree of market risk that may be undertaken.

The Hospitals use variable-rate debt to finance their operational and capital needs. The debt obligations expose the Hospitals to variability in interest payments due to changes in interest rates. Conversely, fixed-rate debt obligations can be more expensive to the Hospitals in times of declining interest rates. Management believes it is prudent to monitor and manage its cost of capital on a regular basis. To meet this objective, management from time to time may enter into interest rate swap agreements to manage fluctuations in cash flows resulting from interest rate risk

The Hospitals have entered into interest rate swap agreements in the notional amount of approximately \$234 million related to the Series 1991, 2000, 2007 and 2009 bonds. The purpose of the swaps was to convert the variable-rate cash flow exposure on the debt obligations to fixed rate cash flows. Under the terms of the interest rate swaps, the Hospitals receive a variable interest rate payment based on the Bond Rate, or if certain triggering events occur, an alternative floating rate in exchange for making fixed interest rate payments to the swap counter-party, thereby creating the equivalent of fixed-rate debt.

In September 2001, the Medical Center entered into an interest rate swap agreement in the notional amount of \$70 million related to the Series 2000 bonds. The purpose of the swap was to convert the Medical Center's variable-rate cash flow exposure on the debt obligations to fixed rate cash flows. Under the terms of the interest rate swap, the Medical Center receives a variable interest rate payment (based on the Bond Rate, or if certain triggering events occur, an alternative floating rate which is the Bond Market Association (BMA) Municipal Bond Index or 68% of 1 month LIBOR) in exchange for making fixed interest rate payments (4.44%) to the swap counter-party, thereby creating the equivalent of fixed-rate debt. In September 2008, Lehman Brothers, the swap counter-party, filed for bankruptcy which terminated the swap. The impact of changing interest rates reversed the swap to a positive value. A claim has been filed with the bankruptcy court for the sum of \$8 million dollars. Due to the possibility that the funds will not be collected, a reserve has been made for \$8 million at December 31, 2010 and 2009.

In August 2005, the Medical Center refinanced the outstanding bonds of its 1991 series in the amount of \$54.6 million. Holders of the bonds were requested to tender the bonds at a \$2.73 million premium Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc. (Merrill Lynch) purchased the tendered bonds. The purpose of the refinancing was to obtain an interest rate lower than the 6.05% fixed rate on the bonds. The Medical Center entered into two interest rate swap agreements with Merrill Lynch. Under the terms of the first interest rate swap, the Medical Center receives a floating interest rate payment semi-annually based on the BMA Municipal Bond Index, or if this index is no longer published, Merrill Lynch will set the rate based on prevailing rates. For 2010 and 2009, the Medical Center received \$2.7 million and \$3.2 million, respectively, for this swap. Under the terms of the second interest rate swap, the Medical Center receives a fixed rate of 3.113% and semi-annually pays Merrill Lynch the difference between the fixed rate and 67% of LIBOR. For 2010 and 2009, the Medical Center paid Merrill Lynch \$881 thousand and \$1 million, respectively, for this swap.

In November 2006, the Medical Center entered into an interest rate swap agreement in the notional amount of \$91.8 million related to the Series 2007 bonds. Under the terms of the interest rate swap, the Medical Center receives a floating interest rate payment monthly based on the BMA Municipal Bond Index, or if this index is no longer published, Merrill Lynch will set the rate based on prevailing rates, or if certain triggering events occur, an alternative floating rate of 67% of 1 month LIBOR plus .365%. In 2010 and 2009, the Medical Center received \$342 thousand and \$389 thousand, respectively, for this swap.

On February 7, 2008, the Medical Center entered into an interest rate swap agreement in the notional amount of \$100 million related to the financing arrangements incurred in 2009. Under the terms of the interest rate swap, the Medical Center will receive a floating interest rate payment based on 67% of 1 month LIBOR. The purpose of this swap was to lock into current bond rates for the 2009 Bonds (Note 8) As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, a \$1.4 million and \$9 million unrealized loss was recorded, respectively. For 2010 and 2009, the Medical Center paid \$3.3 million and \$1.1 million, respectively, for this swap

Valley Health Plan

Interest rate contracts

VH has a defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all of its employees and the employees of its subsidiaries. Benefits under the pension equity formula are expressed in terms of a lump sum based on final average earnings and pension credits earned for years of service. Some employees' benefits are grandfathered using a prior formula that based annuity amounts on final average earnings and service. The pension plan has been amended to allow for supplemental pension benefits under a one-time early retirement program (the Program) for employees meeting certain age and length of service requirements. VH makes annual contributions to the Valley Health System Employees Retirement Plan (the Plan) in accordance with funding requirements determined by an actuary. Contributions are intended to provide not only for benefits attributed to service to date, but also for those expected to be earned in the future. Contributions of \$4.5 million and \$18 million were made in 2010 and 2009, respectively

Effective January 1, 2011, Valley Health elected to soft-freeze the Valley Health System Employees Retirement Plan Participation is frozen such that there shall be no new participants in the Plan after January 2, 2011. Participants as of January 1, 2011 will continue to participate with no change to the years of services rules or the benefits calculation. The Valley Health contributory 403(b) plan will remain in place

Valley Health's overall investment strategy is to generate a return, which is sufficient to meet its current and expected future financial requirements. The Plan Assets will be structured in a manner that most efficiently matches Valley's investment risk and return characteristics with the long-term objectives. Short-term uncertainties of investment results are recognizable risks, and will be managed appropriately through specific asset allocation strategies and diversification based upon the Plan's investment time horizon. The Plan Asset's target return will be based upon the fund's actuarial review which calculates the "minimum required return" for Valley Health's and Shenandoah's pension portfolio as well as its investment time horizon.

Tax Sheltered Annuity Plan

In addition, VH also offers an option allowing employees to contribute to a tax sheltered annuity plan (the Annuity Plan) under Internal Revenue Code section 403(b). Under the Annuity Plan, VH matches 50% of the employees' contributions up to a maximum of 2% for employees who contribute at least 4% of their base compensation. VH's contributions are 100% vested for employees after six years of service. VH's contributions to the Annuity Plan totaled \$2.7 million and \$2.6 million for 2010 and 2009, respectively

Shenandoah Memorial Hospital Plan

Defined Benefit Retirement Plan

Shenandoah has a noncontributory defined benefit retirement plan covering substantially all of its employees. The Plan was amended effective January 1, 1991 to pay benefits based upon the last five highest years salary out of the last ten years of service. Prior to this change, benefits were based upon employees' years of service and compensation. Shenandoah makes annual contributions to the plan in accordance with funding requirements determined by an actuary.

Note 17. Related Party Transactions

Piedmont Medical Laboratory

VH was an investor in Piedmont Medical Laboratory (Piedmont) along with three unrelated hospitals and a physician group. VH accounted for its investment in Piedmont, an approximate 58 percent owned affiliate, by the equity method of accounting, under which VH's share of the net income of the affiliate was recognized as income in VH's statement of operations and added to the investment account, and distributions received, if any, were treated as a reduction of the investment account.

On July 31, 2009, Piedmont Medical Laboratory was sold for approximately \$15.8 million after applicable adjustments at closing. This sale resulted in an approximate gain of \$7.6 million to Valley Health, which is recorded in unrestricted revenues, gains and other support on the Consolidated Statement of Operations in 2009.

VH received laboratory services from Piedmont for which it paid approximately \$919 thousand in 2009 These fees are included in operating expenses in the accompanying statements of operations

Medical Circle, LLC

The Medical Center is a 51% member of Medical Circle, LLC t/a Valley Open MRI, a company formed to provide imaging services. In July 2009, the company began leasing space in the Hurst House, which is located on the campus of the Medical Center. In preparing the space for the joint venture, VH incurred expenditures of \$878 thousand of which \$538 thousand was a capital contribution and \$340 thousand was treated as a loan to Medical Circle with an interest rate of 4.6%. The loan was paid in full in January 2010.

On June 10, 2009, the Medical Center's interest in Medical Circle, LLC was transferred to Valley Health. Valley Health is accounting for its investment under the equity method of accounting. Valley Health's interest in the Company was \$924 thousand and \$878 thousand, at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Included in the Consolidated Statement of Operations are equity earnings on the investment of approximately \$895 thousand and \$93 thousand for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Total cash distributions received from the investment by VH in 2010 and 2009 were approximately \$910 thousand and \$0, respectively. Medical Circle's financial statements were not consolidated in the financial statements of VH due to immateriality.

Winchester Open MRI, LLC

VH is a member, owning a 50% interest, in Winchester Open MRI, LLC (Open MRI), a company formed to benefit the community by providing more accessible imaging services. Valley Health is accounting for its investment under the equity method of accounting. Valley Health's interest in Open MRI was \$515 thousand and \$571 thousand, at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Included in the Consolidated Statement of Operations are equity earnings on the investment of approximately \$2.6 million and \$3.2 million for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Total cash distributions received from the investment by VH in 2010 and 2009 were approximately \$2.55 million and \$3 million, respectively.

Note 18. Commitments and Contingencies

Malpractice Insurance

During 2004, VH and other healthcare organizations participated in the development of Virginia Solutions SPC LTD (the Captive), an insurance company located in the Cayman Islands. VH was one of five founding members of the Captive. The Captive qualifies as a captive insurance company in the domicile where it operates and provides certain insurance coverage to its members. The Captive has established trusts for professional and general liability insurance. Under this program, the Captive retains the first \$750 thousand per claim. The Captive has purchased reinsurance contracts to provide for claims in

excess of \$750 thousand. VH is charged periodic premiums by the Captive Premiums are determined based on actuarial calculations, and information provided by risk managers, legal counsel and past experience. The effective date of this program was July 15, 2004.

Litigation

VH is involved in litigation arising in the ordinary course of business. Claims alleging malpractice have been asserted against VH and are currently in various stages of litigation. It is the opinion of management, however, that estimated malpractice costs accrued at December 31, 2010 are adequate to provide for potential losses resulting from pending or threatened litigation as well as claims arising from unknown incidents from services provided to patients that may be asserted.

Loan Guarantee

VH has guaranteed certain debt obligations from a local bank to Winchester Open MRI, LLC, an affiliated entity, for approximately \$2 million. The proceeds of the loans were used to purchase equipment and fund a construction project. The balance of the loans at December 31, 2010 and 2009 was \$523 thousand and \$885 thousand, respectively

Medical Staff Deferred Compensation Plan

Effective January 1, 2006, VH adopted a nonqualified deferred compensation plan under Internal Revenue Service Code Section 457, to provide compensation for unassigned call services provided by participating physicians at the Medical Center VH, as the Plan sponsor, is responsible for funding the Plan based upon predetermined levels of payment which was \$3.2 million in 2010 and \$3.1 million in 2009. VH is also responsible for maintaining a trust in which the contributions to the Plan will be maintained and from which qualifying disbursements will be made. Contributions to the Plan vest to the benefit of the participating physicians under various methods based upon years in the Plan and/or age. VH recognizes, for financial reporting purposes, the related trust assets and a corresponding liability. The Plan allows VH to modify future payments to the Plan based on a variety of operating factors at the discretion of the Board of the Medical Center. Due to physicians becoming fully vested in 2011, and payouts being anticipated, approximately \$14.4 million was reclassified to other current liabilities in the Consolidated Balance sheets at December 31, 2010.

Asset Retirement Obligation

The Asset Retirement and Environmental Obligations Topic 410 FASB Accounting Standards Codification, clarifies when an entity is required to recognize a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation Management has considered this Topic, specifically as it relates to its legal obligations to perform asset retirement activities, such as asbestos removal, on its existing properties. Management of VH believes that there is an indeterminate settlement date for the asset retirement obligations because the range of time over which VH may settle the obligations is unknown and cannot be estimated. As a result, management cannot reasonably estimate a liability related to these potential asset retirement activities. However, management does not believe that remediation of such obligations will have a material effect on the consolidated financial statements

Note 19. Fair Value Disclosures

Fair Value Measurements

The Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures Topic 820 FASB Accounting Standards Codification defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value and expands disclosures about fair value measurements

Under the FASB's authoritative guidance on fair value measurements, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, VH uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, VH often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. VH utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques VH is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair value. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

- Level 1 Quoted prices for identical assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in less active markets, or other observable inputs that can be corroborated by observable market data. Level 2 also includes derivative contracts whose value is determined using a pricing model with observable market inputs or can be derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity for financial instruments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation; also includes observable inputs for nonbinding single dealer quotes not corroborated by observable market data.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value

Equity Securities

The fair value of equity securities is the market value based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers. If listed prices or quotes are not available, fair value is based upon externally developed models that use unobservable inputs due to the limited market activity of the instrument

Mutual and Other Funds

Valued at the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares held at year end

U.S. Government Obligations

Valuation inputs utilized by the independent pricing service for those U S Government securities under Level 2 include benchmark yields, reporting trades, broker/dealer quotes, issuer spreads, benchmark securities, bids, offers, and reference data including market research publications. Also included are data from the vendor trading platform.

Real Estate Investments

The underlying holdings are periodically valued by appraisers considering the current market conditions inputs are often unobservable, and therefore, these are level 3 investments

Partnerships and Ventures

Valuation is determined using an ownership percentage multiplied by the net assets of the partnership or joint venture.

Derivative Instruments

Derivatives are fair valued according to their classification as over-the-counter ("OTC"). OTC derivatives consist of interest rate swaps. These derivatives are fair valued under Level 2 using third-party services.

Observable market inputs include yield curves (the LIBOR swap curve and applicable basis swap curves), foreign exchange rates, commodity prices, option volatilities, counterparty credit risk, and other related data. Credit valuation adjustments are required to reflect both our own nonperformance risk and the respective counterparty's nonperformance risk. These adjustments are determined generally by applying a credit spread for the counterparty or VH as appropriate to the total expected exposure of the derivative

Note 20. Hampshire Wellness Center

On June 19, 2006, East Mountain Health Advantage entered into a long-term lease agreement to lease and operate a 60,000 square foot wellness center. The lease agreement with the Hampshire County Development Authority is for a period of 20 years at \$162 thousand per year plus all operating expenses of the facility and operations. In 2008, Hampshire Wellness Center, Inc. was established to operate the wellness center and assume responsibility for the lease. East Mountain Health Advantage became the sole corporate member of Hampshire Wellness Center, Inc.

The lease agreement contains a purchase option at the end of the lease term with the purchase price based upon the original cost of the facility less the sum of the lease payments made, 80% of operating losses not to exceed \$2 million, and cost of improvements, not to exceed \$150 thousand

Note 21. Affiliation with Page Memorial Hospital and Commitment

On October 28, 2008, VH executed an affiliation agreement with Page Memorial Hospital (Page), effective January 1, 2009. Page is a 25 bed Critical Access Hospital located in Luray, Virginia. Under the terms of the affiliation agreement, Page became part of VH's integrated healthcare delivery system, with VH becoming the parent corporation and the sole corporate member. The affiliation will allow Page to become part of an integrated healthcare system and is intended to enhance the provision of patient care services, reduce duplication of resources, increase efficiencies, and create cost savings to healthcare consumers and payors

The affiliation agreement may be terminated within the first three years of the agreement by either party with not less than ninety (90) days prior written notice, given that other termination provisions of the agreement are met. Termination must be approved by three fourths of the entire Page board and is effective unless three fourths of the VH board vote to disapprove An approved termination would take effect 180 days after approval by the VH board.

VH has committed to assist Page build a new hospital with an estimated cost of \$30 million with a targeted completion date in 2014. VH will assist Page with obtaining a certificate of public need and financing. If a new hospital cannot be built because of regulatory or reimbursement issues, VH has committed to assist Page with major renovations to the hospital facility of approximately \$5 million per year in 2011, 2012, and 2013.

VH has also committed to assist Page with the construction of a Medical Office Building Addition with an estimated cost of \$4.4 million and targeted completion date being the end of 2011.

The affiliation has been recorded as a purchase, and the financial position as of December 31, 2009 and results of operations and changes in net assets for the year then ended, of Page, have been included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

The effect of the transaction at January 1, 2009 was to increase consolidated net assets of VH by approximately \$10 6 million.

Note 22. Morgan County War Memorial Hospital Acquisition and Commitment

On April 1, 2010 War Memorial Hospital, Inc., a newly formed subsidiary of Valley Health, purchased substantially all of the assets and assumed substantially all liabilities of Morgan County War Memorial Hospital. The purchase price was \$1.5 million in addition to the liabilities assumed which approximated \$4 million.

The agreement includes a commitment to construct a replacement facility expected to cost approximately \$30 million. The new facility is expected to be completed in 2012. The agreement also includes a commitment to operate the current facility until the replacement facility is complete and to lease the existing facility for \$685 thousand annually
