

Providence also conducts an assessment of each collection agency's adherence to the policy. Such assessments are conducted at least annually.

On a routine basis we conduct a formal community assessment to determine who in our communities is experiencing the greatest need. This outreach connects us to many not-for-profits and social service agencies as well as care providers and their clients in the communities. To ensure that we conduct a comprehensive assessment, our process includes research, meetings, interviews, focus groups and surveys.

Additionally, Providence ministries have community and foundation boards. The civic leaders that serve on Providence Boards connect our Mission with a local perspective on community needs.

Our assessment findings are assembled to make certain we understand and respond to local and regional needs, which often vary from one city or county to another. Identified areas of need not only guide our community benefit giving, but also guide our strategic planning. We believe meaningful community needs assessment provides insight into the complete community benefit that is required, beyond just free and discounted care.

Providence hospitals post notices regarding the availability of financial assistance to low-income uninsured patients. These notices are posted in visible locations throughout the hospital such as admitting/registration, billing office, emergency department and other outpatient settings.

Every posted notice regarding financial assistance policies contains brief instructions on how to apply for financial assistance or a discounted payment. The notices also include a contact telephone number that a patient or family member can call to obtain more information.

Providence ensures that appropriate staff members are knowledgeable about the existence of the hospital's financial assistance policies. Training is provided to staff members (i.e., billing office, financial department, etc.) who directly interact with patients regarding their hospital bills.

When communicating to patients regarding their financial assistance policies, Providence attempts to do so in the primary language of the patient, or his/her family, if reasonably possible, and in a manner consistent with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations.

Providence shares their financial assistance policies with appropriate community health and human services agencies and other organizations that assist such patients.

Part VI, Line 4: Providence St. Joseph Medical Center is a 22 bed

acute care, Joint Commission accredited, critical access hospital located on the Flathead Indian Reservation in Polson, Montana, which is about one and a half hours north of Missoula, Providence St. Joseph Medical Center provides community hospital care for the more than 28,000 residents of Lake County. At Providence St. Joseph Medical Center, 36% of patients are covered by Medicare, another 28% are covered by Medicaid and 5% are self-pay and uninsured. Providence St. Joseph Medical Center serves a higher percentage of older adults, with 14% of the primary service area's population over the age of 65. With approximately 16% of the population living in poverty, the community is characterized by lower income levels than the national average.

The service area where Providence St. Joseph Medical Center is located encompasses rural communities from Lake, Lincoln, Flathead and Sanders counties with approximately 147,000 residents living in an area of 12,967 square miles. Each of these counties is designated a Mental Health Professional Shortage Area by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. The Median Household Income is \$36,232 or 16% below the median for Montana. From the 2009 U.S. Census Quick Facts for Montana, these counties have a higher percentage (17.25%) of residents who are older than 65 living in the four county service area compared with the state (14.6%).

Part VI, Line 5: Providence St. Joseph Medical Center's daily operational management is directed by an independent governing community board which helps direct the hospital in its endeavors. The composition of the governing board represents the diversity of the community by having representatives from local government, social service agencies, medical providers, independent business representatives and interested community

members. The Providence St. Joseph Medical Center Community Board of Directors reviews and develops the community benefit plan, providing information and insight into community needs and resources and helping set priorities for what community needs are to be addressed. They also receive regular updates on the overall community benefit strategy and specific programs to assess whether the organization is having an impact on the health of the community. The providers and staff and Providence St. Joseph Medical Center provide education to the broader community on certain health benefits, risks and preventative medicine and is provided at no cost.

The hospital has been serving the needs of the community since 1916 and has expanded over the years in response to the growing population and changes in health care. As a ministry of Providence Health & Services, Providence St. Joseph Medical Center participates in shared purchasing, information systems and financial management support that benefits the community hospital. In 2010, the medical center had 528 admissions and 78,641 outpatient visits. Providence St. Joseph Medical Center also includes St. Joseph Retirement Community, an assisted living center providing 12,307 resident days during 2010.

Providence Medical Group manages 32 primary care and specialty provider practices, employing 133 total providers. Providence St. Joseph Medical Center and Providence Medical Group collectively build and support coordinated services across the continuum of care to meet regional residents' needs, while mutually supporting organizational, operational, and fiscal health. Joint ventures include research collaborations (cardiac, neuroscience and oncology) with the University of Montana;

affiliations with long term care facilities; a community based mental health center and the Indian Health services clinic, among others.

Part VI, Line 6: Providence Health & Services owns and operates 27

general acute care hospitals, six long-term care facilities, seven homecare and hospice entities, five assisted living facilities, a children's nursing center and Montessori school, a high school, a university, 12 low-income housing projects, the Health Plan, a health services contractor, two programs of all inclusive care for the elderly, and 20 controlled fundraising foundations.

The Health System provides inpatient, outpatient, primary care, and home care services in Alaska, Washington, Montana, Oregon and Southern California. The Health System operates these businesses primarily in the greater metropolitan areas of Anchorage, Alaska; Everett, Seattle, Spokane and Olympia, Washington; Missoula, Montana; Portland and Medford, Oregon; and Los Angeles, California.

As a ministry of Providence Health & Services, Providence St. Joseph Medical Center is guided by a Mission and set of core values based on Catholic health care and inspired by the legacy of the Sisters of Providence. As one Catholic health system committed to caring for the poor and vulnerable, Providence Health & Services has developed a single framework for consistently reporting charity care and community benefit. Our responsibility to stewardship drives us to a standardized approach to supply chain so that we can deliver excellent patient care while reducing the cost of delivered supplies. Our commitment to respect and fairness means Providence has a system-wide compensation policy. Locally,

Providence St. Joseph Medical Center is empowered to apply these policies to meet the local needs of their community.

Providence St. Joseph Medical Center conducts local assessments to make sure the needs of the community are met. The community board of directors oversees and approves the annual community benefit plan that addresses the health care disparities within the community. The community benefit plan is developed and reviewed annually to ensure that the proposed outcomes are being met. This plan is implemented in concert with others in the community to increase the accountability that we share with them to improve the health of our community and to not duplicate services.

In addition to acute inpatient care, Providence St. Joseph Medical Center provides primary care and specialty physician clinics.

Whether tenderly holding a special-needs child who requires
round-the-clock care, or easing the way for a stroke patient who faces
both physical and financial struggles, the people of Providence are
called to a mission of service. Our lifework is to provide excellent
care for everyone, at all stages of life, regardless of ability to pay.

This has been the Providence mission since the Sisters of Providence
arrived on the shores of the Columbia River 150 years ago, committed to
the care and healing of poor and vulnerable frontier neighbors.

On March 13, 1984, after 67 years serving the Polson community so well
and lovingly, the Hospitalier Sisters transferred sponsorship of the
local hospital to the Presentation Health System. In 1990, St. Joseph
Hospital was in dire economic circumstances. The Sisters of Providence
assumed responsibility for the hospital on March 1, allowing St.
Joseph's to continue providing health care services to the community.

Under the sponsorship of Providence Health & Services, St. Joseph
Hospital participates as a member of a system of hospitals and an
affiliate of St. Patrick Hospital in Missoula. Expansion of services,
shared purchasing and management expertise provide fundamental value to
the community through the services St. Joseph Hospital provides. The
Sisters of Providence understand that the hospital is vital to the well

being of the community. Indeed, St. Joseph Hospital belongs to the

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community. Faced with an old building in need of extensive upgrades to meet standards and maintain its operating license, the St. Joseph Hospital Board of Directors reviewed options and concluded that new construction was the solution. The options included closing St. Joseph Hospital, renovating and upgrading the existing facility, joining with St. Luke Community Hospital in Ronan to build a replacement facility in Pablo, or doing nothing. Clearly, closure of St. Joseph Hospital would deny essential access to excellent health care to the people of Polson.

Today, people need to access health care services in ways compatible with their changing lifestyles and the capabilities of the information age. Physicians and patients need modern diagnostic imaging equipment, outpatient surgery, physical therapy, cardiovascular rehabilitation, home health services, and wellness and fitness programs. In short, today's patients need ready access to outpatient services, modern technology, and skilled staff and physicians more than they need long halls of patient rooms.

The resulting vision was one of the hospital and doctors working together to continue to provide primary health care services in a state-of-the-art facility, designed to meet the health care needs of the area's growing, diverse and aging population. The plan included replacing the 1933 building with a new structure that includes a modern imaging suite, a new emergency room, a new surgical suite, patient rooms, medical office space and administrative office areas. The cost of the project was estimated at \$10 million.

The community, combined with donations from foundations, generously

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contributed \$1.6 million. The balance of the project was financed through a Providence Bond Issue. We watched the old building go down and the new one rise in its place with great anticipation. The new building, St. Joseph Medical Center, allows us to have "one-stop-shopping" for medical services; patient convenience for doctor visits, added a complete retail pharmacy, which is available 6 days a week, and closer proximity to testing laboratories so folks don't have to leave the building. We expanded our Family Maternity Center to promote a wonderful experience with closer family interaction.

The new hospital takes full advantage of the beautiful views of Flathead Lake and is filled with lots of natural light, which combined with the care, competence and training of our staff, make this a special healing place.

The Assisted Living Program is based on the principles of choice, dignity, independence, privacy, individuality and homelike surroundings. The program is designed for seniors who desire or need to have some additional personal assistance with managing their daily activities.

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oversight associated with fulfillment of the Providence Mission, developing system policies, protecting the assets entrusted to the organization and overseeing the strategic and operational affairs of Providence's legal entities. Providence also maintains a network of community ministry boards with responsibility for quality of care oversight, community relations, advocacy and community needs assessments.

Providence has a consistent compensation philosophy for all of its employees, including our senior executives. Salaries for senior executives are determined by the Providence Board's Human Resources Committee and approved by the full Board of Directors, none of whom is a Providence employee.

The Board retains an independent consultant each year to review salaries of those in the most significant leadership roles in the organization. Part of the consultant's role is to review an extensive array of compensation surveys of large, not-for-profit health care systems in the United States. Providence is one of the larger health systems in the country, and as such, the Board benchmarks executive compensation against other large, not-for-profit health systems whose revenue is similar to that of Providence. Base salaries for Providence executives are set at the median level of the market, as identified by the independent consultant and reviewed with the Human Resources Committee.

Each year, the Board Chair conducts a formal performance evaluation of the President/CEO that considers input from the other directors and senior leaders reporting to the President. The evaluation is discussed with the Human Resources Committee and then a recommendation is made by the

committee to the full Board. The Board Chair and the Chair of the Human

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Resources Committee also meet with an independent consultant to develop a salary recommendation; which is reviewed and approved first by the committee and then by the Board of Directors.

Additionally, the President/CEO utilizes the market information provided by the consultant along with formal performance evaluations, to determine salary recommendations for other senior executives. This process includes a rigorous analysis of those recommendations with the Human Resources Committee as a part of the review and approval process.

Performance incentives allow executives to earn additional compensation if they achieve specific organizational and individual goals for furthering Providence operating principles - advancing the Providence Mission and core values, meeting benchmarks for charity care, achieving quality targets, delivering top-rated customer satisfaction, meeting employee satisfaction goals and reaching financial performance objectives. The Board of Directors conducts a thorough process to ensure performance incentives are aligned with appropriate practices for not-for-profit health care systems.

The Board's process for executive compensation fully complies with IRS standards and mirrors the best practices recommended in the "Report to Congress and the Nonprofit Sector on Governance, Transparency, and Accountability" submitted to the Senate Finance Committee by the Panel on the Nonprofit Sector.
