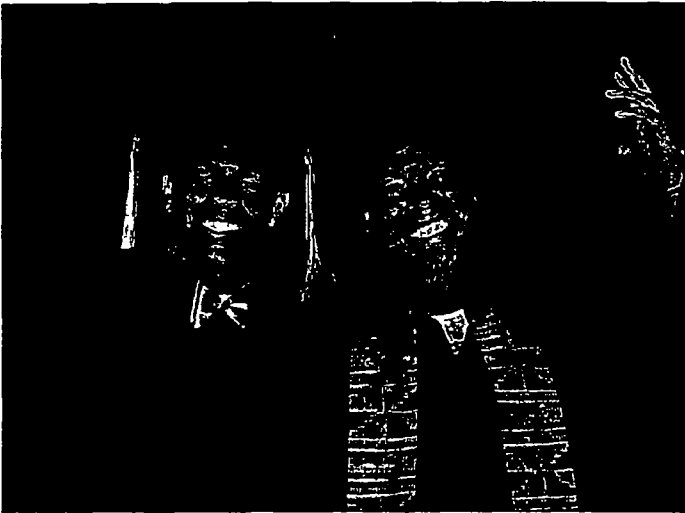

Young People Need a Strong Educational Foundation to Become Healthy, Resilient Adults

Located in NW Pasadena, Muir is the lowest performing of four public high schools in the Pasadena Unified School District with a 2011 API score of 650. (The state target is 800.)

Muir's student population is 60% Latino and 34% African American. Nearly three-fourths qualify for the federal free and reduced lunch program, an indicator of family poverty.

These students face numerous socio-economic challenges that present obstacles to school achievement.

20+ Educational and Enrichment Programs and a Safe Place to Go When School is Out
Programs are offered before, during and after-school hours, Monday through Thursday, and on weekends during the school year.

Our wide range of activities includes college preparation, leadership development, art, dance, music, theatre, sports, yoga, cooking, life skills, mentoring, homework assistance and credit recovery classes. We utilize a project-based approach that connects to in-school learning.

These programs broaden skills and knowledge, foster healthy personal development and provide critically needed remedial academic support, enabling students to graduate on time.

A family literacy component for parents and other relatives of Muir students includes continuing education, financial literacy and parenting workshops.

MOTM serves more than 80% of Muir students.

Changing Lives, One Match at a Time

Washington Middle School students, identified as high-need and high-risk, are paired with volunteer mentors from the Pasadena Police and Fire Departments.

We focus on youth with grade point averages well below 2.0 and high truancy and absentee rates.

The mentors provide emotional support and guidance and serve as positive role models, meeting weekly with the youngsters, either one-on-one or in small groups.

Mentors make a one-year minimum commitment. However, most matches continue on through high school.

Prior to being matched, all mentors attend a basic mentoring training. In addition, Flintridge provides ongoing sessions in mentoring best practices throughout the year.

All Youth Need Guidance and Support from Caring Adults

Located in NW Pasadena, Washington is the lowest performing of six middle schools in the Pasadena Unified School district with a 2011 API score of 667. (The state target is 800.)

More than three fourths of the student population is Latino and 90% qualify for the federal free and reduced lunch program, an indicator of family poverty.

These youngsters face numerous socio-economic challenges that present obstacles to school achievement.

Promoting Mentorship by Building Skills

Flintridge services include intensive training in evidence-based mentoring practices. These workshops are free and open to anyone interested in mentoring.

Flintridge helped create and now manages Pasadena Mentoring Partners, a coalition of local agencies providing mentoring services.

We Get Results

As of fall 2011, 27 students have been matched with police and firefighter mentors.

71% of students in the program show improved grades after a year, along with positive changes in their attitudes, relationships and behavior.

Most importantly, these kids know that their mentors believe in them, and they see possibilities for achieving their dreams.

A tutoring component and social skills and anger management training are planned to provide additional supports for the youngsters, along with workshops for the parents and caregivers.

Pasadena-Altadena Vision 20/20 Initiative is a coalition of community-based, faith-based, philanthropic, business, civic, and educational organizations working to stop gang and community violence. The broad based, grassroots collaborative develops and implements strategic action solutions for violence prevention and intervention that focus on the highest risk, highest need and gang-impacted youth, young adults and families.

THE NEED

"The violence, inter-ethnic conflict, youth issues, and safety in our neighborhoods are not simply a District 1 problem, nor should they be referred to as an African American, Latino, poor or rich person's problems. These are community-wide problems that require all of our commitment to solve. I'm calling on people of faith and people of goodwill to join together to transform our community, making it safe, healthy and beneficial to all of our residents, especially our young people. The Pasadena Mayor and City Council are deeply concerned and strongly committed to addressing these issues in the days ahead." (Pasadena First District Councilmember Jacque Robinson, September 2007)

The initiative was launched by Councilmember Robinson in response to an alarming rise in violence in 2007 when homicides and gang activity spiked. The violence shocked the community and brought to the attention of the city's leaders the reality that Pasadena is home to hundreds of gang members, their affiliates, and individuals with former gang ties and/or criminal histories. In response, representatives from various sectors of the city joined forces to identify possible solutions to the gang problem. Spearheaded by Councilmember Robinson, with technical support from the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations and coordination by Flintridge Center, Vision 20/20 seeks to engage all members of the community, including youth and young adults, in creating and supporting practical solutions to prevent and reduce community, gang and other forms of violence.

GOALS/PURPOSE

- Advocated for acceptance of the Gap Analysis Report, which led to the designation of Flintridge as the Institutional Home for all gang and community violence prevention and intervention programs in Pasadena.
- Advocated for the further development of and funding for the Neighborhood Outreach Worker (NOW) Program, which supports the transformation of participants through life-changing workshops and employment as outreach workers who serve as positive role models for gang-impacted young adults.

Creating Opportunities for Meaningful Employment

The free Apprenticeship Preparation Program (APP) is a pathway to careers in the construction trades for unemployed and under-employed men and women, age 17-1/2 and up.

The certificate course, taught by instructors from Pasadena City College, is offered three times a year at two local community centers. Afternoon and evening sessions are available, except during summer.

Over a 16-week period (ten during summer), we cover basic safety, construction math, blueprints, rigging, hand and power tools, "green" building concepts and other topics, including employability skills, to help students successfully apply for paid union apprenticeships.

Students also go on field trips to union apprenticeship training facilities, construction sites and LEED-certified buildings.

Mission: To build hope and resilience in the lives of youth and their families in Northwest Pasadena and West Altadena. We work in partnership with the community to provide life-changing services and to act as a catalyst for pragmatic solutions that reduce community violence, improve academic achievement, and launch career paths for the benefit of the greater Pasadena/Altadena area.

In addition, we provide case management and peer-to-peer support services to help individuals overcome challenging life issues that are barriers to employment.

Economic Self-Sufficiency Transforms Lives

California's high unemployment rate (over 12%) is even higher for African Americans and Latinos. Unemployment in NW Pasadena has reached 18% for adults and 50% for young adults.

Chronic joblessness affects community well-being as much as families. A loss of hope can lead to crime and gang involvement.

Flintridge developed the Apprenticeship Preparation Program in 2008 in partnership with Councilmember Jacque Robinson, L.A. County Commission on Human Relations and an alliance of community stakeholders to provide high-risk individuals with a chance for productive and rewarding lives.

The construction trades offer health insurance, retirement options and opportunities for advancement. Prior gang connections, tattoos or a criminal record are not deterrents to career success.

Vision: A healthy, safe community where families thrive, youth reach their full potential, and equality and opportunity are accessible to all.

We Get Results

Nearly 200 students have completed the course.

Graduates have gone on to union apprenticeships, are working in construction-related or other fields, or are pursuing additional education.

Flintridge works with a variety of agencies to identify jobs for graduates. These include the City of Pasadena's First Source Hiring Program, Alta/Pasa Community Improvement Center, B&P Painting and other contractors and builders.

In addition to helping graduates find jobs, Flintridge assists them with the union application process, including identifying funds for union fees and purchasing required equipment (boots, hard hat, tool belt, gloves, etc.).

Real lives, real work, real nope

Raised by a single mother in Pasadena, Kafshi got into drugs as a youth and dropped out of school. He joined a gang and was arrested for gun possession. "Never having finished anything before, what was hardest about the class was believing in myself," he says. But with encouragement from his instructor and classmates, Kafshi graduated APP. He went on to successfully complete the Laborers' Union 'boot camp' and was accepted as a paid apprentice with Local 300. His very first job took him to the Rose Bowl, where he helped install concrete piles. Kafshi is grateful that he can now support his family. He's on a career path with benefits, a pension and a real future. He gives thanks to Flintridge, saying, "Flintridge people have a heart for others."

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Northwest Empowering Communities, Helping Others (NW ECHO) is a program to strengthen community- and faith-based organizations serving at-risk youth in Northwest Pasadena/Altadena.

We provide customized capacity-building services such as training, consulting, workshops, and other resources to a cohort of 23 grassroots nonprofit agencies. The goal of the program is to enhance the capacity of these organizations to respond to the challenges that youth face growing up in our society. In addition, participating agencies explore ways in which they can work together to maximize their impact on the community.

The NW ECHO Program is funded in large part by a three-year, \$750,000 Communities Empowering Youth grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. This funding is part of a national initiative designed to reduce gang activity, youth violence, and child abuse/neglect, as well as to promote community partnerships.

THE NEED

The federal government has acknowledged that many communities in the U.S. are plagued by gang members and their violent activities. Pasadena/Altadena is no exception, hosting more than a dozen distinct gangs and hundreds of gang members. With over 20,000 vulnerable, school-aged youth in the Pasadena/Altadena community, it is imperative that children are connected to caring adults and enriching activities that support their academic and personal development and steer them away from gang involvement.

GOALS/PURPOSE

- To develop a network of service providers that support one another in a community-wide effort to reduce violence and gang activity.
- To make sure that every child has a safe place to go after school.
- To build the capacity of program partners in the areas of program delivery, leadership skills, organizational development, and community engagement.
- To raise awareness about violence and gang issues in our area, especially among community leaders, decision-makers, and elected officials.

POPULATION SERVED

- Twenty-three nonprofit organizations of all sizes from within the communities of Northwest Pasadena and Altadena that serve children, youth, and their families.
- These organizations serve a combined 4,000 at-risk young people and their families every year.
- Many of our partner organizations provide enrichment programs on campus at local schools, while others provide parenting classes, health care, counseling, child care, violence intervention, and related activities out in the community.

PROGRAM DETAILS

- Training activities are tailored to meet the specific needs of individual partner organizations and include workshops, one-on-one consulting, webinars, guest speakers, brown-bag lunch sessions, and peer learning opportunities.
- This past year, more than 70 skill-building activities were offered, representing over 200 hours of training.
- Partners collaborated with Art Center College of Design on a project to create outreach materials that would steer teens towards positive activities. The resulting media strategies include a text messaging system to inform teens about youth-oriented events in the community, giveaway trading cards featuring unconventional career choices, and other youth-accessible communications tools.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Thousands of children and youth are now involved in positive, enriching after-school programs every day provided by NW ECHO Program partners.
- Partners have improved their capacity by purchasing technology upgrades (computers, printers, copiers, etc.) with grant funds.
- Organizations have implemented new fund development plans, increased board effectiveness, and expanded or enhanced their services.
- Partners are collaborating on activities and programs that respond to the needs of teens in the community, such as the city's annual Youth Month during August and teen job fairs
- Partners surveyed youth and conducted focus groups to get teen input on services and programs for the new La Pintoresca Teen Education Center. More than 200 teens provided feedback.
