Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Entity

Good Samaritian Hospital Association (the "Association") consists of Heart of America Medical Center (the "Hospital") and Haaland Estates located in Rugby, North Dakota The Association is the sole member of Good Samaritan Health Services Foundation (the "Foundation") The Association and Foundation are organized as North Dakota nonprofit corporations. The Hospital operates a 25-bed acute-care hospital and an 80-bed long-term-care skilled nursing facility. Effective October 1, 2010, the Hospital acquired and began operating rural health clinics located in the cities of Rugby, Dunseith, Maddock, and Towner, North Dakota

Haaland Estates operates a 68-bed basic care nursing facility and a 37-unit assisted living complex

The Foundation is organized to raise funds to support the mission of the Association

Principles of Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Association and the Foundation (collectively "the Organization") All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization follows accounting standards contained in the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) The ASC is the single source of authoritative accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) to be applied to nongovernmental entities in the preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Use of Estimates in Preparation of Consolidated Financial Statements

The preparation of the accompanying consolidated financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that directly affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from these estimates

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents, excluding amounts whose use is limited and short-term investments

Short-Term Investments

Nonnegotiable certificates of deposit, whose use is not limited, with original maturities greater than three months and remaining maturities less than one year, are classified as short-term investments and are carried at cost plus accrued interest in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

Patient and Resident Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy

Patient and resident accounts receivable are uncollateralized patient obligations that are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. These obligations are primarily from local residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payer agreements. The Organization bills third-party payers on the patients' or residents' behalf, or if a patient or resident is uninsured, the patient or resident is billed directly. Once claims are settled with the primary payer, any secondary insurance is billed, and patients or residents are billed for copay and deductible amounts that are the patients' or resident's responsibility. Payments on patient and resident accounts receivable are applied to the specific claim identified on the remittance advice or statement.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Patient and Resident Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy (Continued)

The Organization has a policy to charge interest on past-due accounts where the patient or resident has not entered into a payment plan or has not made required payments under such payment plan

The carrying amounts of patient and resident accounts receivable are reduced by allowances that reflect management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected. Management provides for contractual adjustments under terms of third-party reimbursement agreements through a reduction of gross revenue and a credit to patient and resident accounts receivable. In addition, management provides for probable uncollectible amounts, primarily from uninsured patients and amounts patients are personally responsible for, through a charge to operations and a credit to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of historical collection and the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to patient and resident accounts receivable.

Patient and resident accounts receivable are recorded in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets net of contractual adjustments and allowance for doubtful accounts

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets set aside under terms of a bond indenture agreement and assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Organization have been classified as current assets

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

Investment income (including unrealized and realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is reported as other income and is included in the excess of revenue over expenses (operating indicator) unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law Realized gains or losses are determined by specific identification

Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. GAAP provides a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). Assets or liabilities measured and reported at fair value are classified and disclosed in one of the three following categories.

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Property, Equipment, and Depreciation

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost or, if donated, at fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included with depreciation expense in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Estimated useful lives range from 5 to 20 years for land improvements, 5 to 20 years for major movable equipment and equipment under capital lease obligations, and from 5 to 40 years for buildings and fixed equipment

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from the the operating indicator, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Asset Impairment

The Organization reviews its property, equipment, and intangible assets periodically to determine potential impairment. If an impairment exists, an impairment loss is recognized. No asset impairments were recognized in 2011 and 2010.

Asset Retirement Obligations

ASC Topic 410, Accounting for Conditional Asset Retirement Obligations , clarifies when an entity is required to recognize a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation. The Organization has considered ASC Topic 410, specifically as it relates to its legal obligation to perform asset retirement activities, such as asbestoes removal, on its existing properties. The Organization believes there is an indeterminate settlement date for the asset retirement obligations because the range of time over which the Organization may settle the obligation is unknown and cannot be estimated. As a result, the Organization cannot reasonably estimate the liability related to these asset retirement activities as of March 31, 2011 and 2010.

Resident Trust Funds

The Association holds funds under an agency relationship for the residents of the Hospital's long-term care facility, swing-bed units, and basic care facility, and also holds damage deposits for the residents of Haaland Manor Resident trust funds are recorded as an asset and liability on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

Intangible Assets

Intangible assets, which include assets acquired with the purchase of the rural health clinics in 2011, are amortized on the straight-line basis over the expected useful lives

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Charitable Gift Annuities

The charitable deduction portion of each gift annuity is recognized as a donation in the year received. The noncharitable deduction portion is shown as a payable and is reduced by the tax-free portion of the periodic annuity payments to the annuitant until the annuity obligation is fulfilled.

Net Assets

Unrestricted net assets consist of investments and otherwise unrestricted amounts that are available for use in carrying out the mission of the Organization and include those expendable resources that have been designated for special use by the Organization's Board of Directors. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity

Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

Net patient and resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payers, and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payers Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Charity Care

The Organization provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Organization maintains records to identify the amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under the charity care policy. Because the Organization does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Contributions

Contributions are considered available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Organization are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and consolidated statements of changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions.

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations include the classification excess of revenue over expenses, which is considered the operating indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from the operating indicator, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfer of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets including assets acquired using contributions that by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets

Advertising Costs

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Hospital, Foundation, and Haaland Estates are tax-exempt corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and are exempt from federal and state income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code

In order to account for any uncertain tax positions, ASC Topic 740-10, *Income Taxes*, requires an organization to assess whether it is more likely than not that a tax position will be sustained upon examination of the technical merits of the position, assuming the taxing authority has full knowledge of all information. If the tax position does not meet the more-likely-than-not recognition threshold, the benefit of the tax position is not recognized in the financial statements. Management does not believe the Organization has any material uncertain tax positions or unrecognized tax benefits.

The Organization's federal returns for tax years 2007 and beyond remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through September 2, 2011, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payers

Hospital

The Association has agreements with third-party payers that provide for reimbursement at amounts that vary from its established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payers follows

Medicare and Medicaid - The Hospital is designated a critical access hospital As such, all inpatient and outpatient hospital services rendered to Medicare and Medical Assistance beneficiaries are paid based on a cost-reimbursement methodology, with the exception of certain types of laboratory, mammography, and therapy services, which are reimbursed on prospectively determined fee schedules

Blue Cross- Inpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed at outpatient fee screen amounts or at established charges less a prospectively determined discount. The prospectively determined discount is not subject to retroactive adjustments.

Others - The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payers (Continued)

Skilled Nursing Facility and Basic Care Facility

Medicare - Reimbursement for Part A residents under the Medicare program in the Association's skilled nursing facility is based on a prospectively based case-mix system

Medicaid and Private Pay - The Association is reimbursed for services provided to residents of the skilled nursing and basic care facilities at established billing rates that are determined on a cost-regulated basis subject to certain limitations as prescribed by North Dakota Department of Human Services regulations. These rates are subject to retroactive adjustment by field audit. The Association's skilled nursing facility and basic care facility cost reports have been examined by the North Dakota Department of Human Services through June 30, 2010.

By North Dakota statute, a skilled nursing facility may not charge its private-pay residents in multiple-occupancy rooms per diem rates in excess of the approved Medicaid rates for similar services

Clinics

Certain physician and professional services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries qualify for reimbursement as Medicare-approved rural health clinic services. Qualifying services are reimbursed based on a cost-reimbursement methodology. Under federal law, a rural health clinic is also entitled to receive a wraparound payment for the difference between cost and the amount paid by Medicaid managed-care health plans.

Accounting for Contractual Arrangements

The Hospital is reimbursed for cost-reimbursable items at tentative rates, with final settlements determined after audit of the related annual cost reports by the respective Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediary. Estimated provisions to approximate the final expected settlements after review by the intermediaries are included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been examined by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary through March 31, 2010. The Hospital's Medicaid cost reports have been examined by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary through March 31, 2008.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payers (Continued)

Laws and Regulation

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and billing regulations. Government activity with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of such regulations by health care providers has increased. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayment for patient services previously billed. Management believes that the Organization is in compliance with applicable government laws and regulations. Although no significant regulatory inquiries have been made of the Organization, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has implemented a new project using recovery audit contractors (RACs) as part of its further efforts to ensure accurate payments under the Medicare program. The project uses RACs to search for potentially inaccurate Medicare payments that might have been made to health care providers and not detected through existing CMS program-integrity efforts. Once a RAC identifies a claim it believes is inaccurate, the RAC makes a deduction from or addition to the provider's Medicare reimbursement in an amount estimated to equal the overpayment or underpayment. The organization may either accept or appeal the RAC's findings. The Hospital's policy is to adjust revenue for decreases in reimbursement from the RAC reviews when these amounts are estimatable and to adjust revenue for increases in reimbursement from the RAC reviews when the increase in reimbursement is agreed upon. A RAC review of the Hospital's Medicare claims is anticipated, however, the outcome of such a review is unknown, and any financial impact cannot be reasonably estimated at March 31, 2011.

Mutual funds and corporate equities - The carrying value of mutual funds and corporate equities is based on quoted market prices

Money market mutual funds - The fair value of money market mutual funds is established by using \$1 as the net asset value

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Note 8 Surplus Notes Receivable

The Organization has advanced funds under the terms of note agreements to Heart of America Health Plan (HAHP). The note agreements bear interest at 2%, but accrues only upon the approval of the North Dakota State Insurance Commissioner. Principal and interest payments on the note agreements are made when approved by the North Dakota State Insurance Commissioner based on the annual financial performance of HAHP. Payments of principal totaling \$0 and \$60,000 during the years ended March 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, were approved by the North Dakota State Insurance Commissioner and paid to the Association. Total surplus notes receivable was \$354,182 at March 31, 2011 and 2010.

Note 9 Student Loans Receivable

The Organization has advanced funds to professional staff for educational purposes. Under terms of the agreements, students commit to working for the Organization for a certain period of time after graduation. If a student fulfills the time commitment, the note is forgiven as of that period. If a student terminates employment prior to completion of the time commitment, the note must be repaid in full. Total student loans receivable as of March 31, 2011 and 2010, were \$109,432 and \$68,232, respectively

Note 10 Lines of Credit

At March 31, 2011 and 2010, the Organization had a line of credit of \$500,000 with a bank, bearing interest at 3 75%. The line of credit is unsecured and matures on June 2, 2012. Outstanding borrowings were \$200,000 and \$450,000 at March 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

At March 31, 2011, the Organization also had a line of credit of \$1,000,000 with a bank, bearing interest at 75% over the prime rate or 4 25% at March 31, 2011. The line of credit is secured by accounts of the Organization and matures October 15, 2011. Outstanding borrowings were \$465,000 at March 31, 2011.

Note 13 Permanently Restricted Net Assets

The Organization's permanently restricted net assets consist of funds established by donors to benefit the operations of the Association Net assets associated with the endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions

Donor-Restricted Endowments

The Board of Directors of the Organization has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA), as adopted by the State of North Dakota, as requiring the Organization to preserve the fair value of the donor's original gift, as of the date of the gift, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Organization classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of the donor's gifts to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of a donor's subsequent gifts to the permanent restricted endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds. (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Organization, and (7) the Organization's investment policies

Note 13 Permanently Restricted Net Assets (Continued)

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters, and Strategies

The Organization has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowments while seeking to preserve the fair value of the endowment assets. Under the Organization's investment policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that protects principal, grows the aggregate portfolio value in excess of the rate of inflation and achieves an effective annual rate of return that is equal to or greater than the designated benchmarks for the various types of investment vehicles, and ensures that any risk assumed is commensurate with the given investment vehicle and the Organization's objectives

To achieve its investment goals, the Organization targets an asset allocation that will achieve a balanced return of current income and long-term growth of principal while exercising risk control. The Organization's asset allocations include a blend of equity and debt securities and cash equivalents.

Spending Policy

The Organization has a policy of appropriating for operating expenses the investment earnings from its endowment assets that are held in perpetuity. The Organization's spending policy is such that the corpus of the endowment will be maintained in perpetuity

Funds With Shortfalls

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with the individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the historical dollar value of the fund. In accordance with GAAP, deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets. It is the Organization's policy to fund any deficiencies, accordingly, there were no such deficiencies at March 31, 2011 and 2010.

Note 15 Charity Care

The Organization provides health care services and other financial support through various programs that are designed, among other matters, to enhance the health of the community, including the health of low-income patients. Consistent with the mission of the Organization, care is provided to patients regardless of their ability to pay, including providing services to those persons who cannot afford health insurance because of inadequate resources or who are underinsured.

Patients who meet certain criteria for charity care, generally based on federal poverty guidelines, are provided care without charge or at a reduced rate, as determined by qualifying criteria defined in the Organization's charity care policy and from applications completed by patients and their families

Benefits for the community also include health screenings, community education through seminars and classes, and other health-related services

The amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under the Organization's charity care policy aggregated \$222,406 and \$215,848 for the years ended March 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

Note 16 Retirement Plan

The Organization has a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all employees. The Organization makes discretionary contributions totaling 2% of the employee's compensation for all eligible employees. The Organization's retirement plan expense totaled \$181,149 and \$148,308 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

Note 17 Professional Liability Insurance

The Organization's professional liability insurance for claim losses of less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$5,000,000 per year covers professional liability claims reported during a policy year ("claims made" coverage) The professional liability insurance policy is renewable annually and has been renewed by the insurance carrier for the annual period extending through January 1, 2012

Under a claims-made policy, the risk for claims and incidents not asserted within the policy period remains with the Organization. Although there exists the possibility of claims arising from services provided to patients through March 31, 2011, which have not yet been asserted, the Organization is unable to determine the ultimate cost, if any, of such possible claims, and accordingly, no provisions have been made for them

Patient and residents accounts receivable consist of amounts due from patients and residents, their insurers, or governmental agencies (primarily Medicare and Medicaid) for health care provided to patients and residents. The majority of the Organization's patients and residents are from Rugby, North Dakota, and the surrounding area



The Organization maintains depository relationships with area financial institutions that are Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insured institutions. On November 9, 2010, the FDIC issued a final rule implementing Section 343 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act, which provides for unlimited insurance coverage of non interest-bearing transaction accounts through December 31, 2012. In addition, the Organization maintains cash in interest-bearing accounts at these institutions, which are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000. At March 31, 2011, the Organization exceeded the insured limits by approximately \$1,465,000.
