1. Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Ephrata Community Hospital ("ECH"), the controlling parent, and The Northern Lancaster County Medical Group (the "Medical Group") (collectively the "Hospital"). All significant inter-corporate transactions and balances have been eliminated in consolidation.

Nature of Operations

The Hospital's primary operations are conducted within ECH, which operates a not-for-profit acute care hospital that provides inpatient, outpatient, and emergency care services, and employs certain specialty care physicians. The Medical Group employs primary care and specialty care physicians. The Hospital's primary service area includes Ephrata, Pennsylvania and surrounding communities in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less, excluding assets whose use is limited and investments

Assets Whose Use is Limited

Assets whose use is limited includes assets set aside by the Board of Directors (the "Board") for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes, assets held under deferred compensation agreements, assets held by a bond trustee under trust indenture, and donor-restricted investments. Amounts available to meet current liabilities of the Hospital have been reclassified as current assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

Accounts Receivable, Patients and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable, patients and other receivables are reported at net realizable value. Accounts are written off when they are determined to be uncollectible based upon management's assessment of individual accounts. The allowance for doubtful collections is estimated based upon a periodic review of the accounts receivable aging, payor classifications, and application of historical write-off percentages.

Inventories of Drugs and Supplies

Inventories of drugs and medical and surgical supplies are valued at the lower of cost or market. Cost is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Investments and Investment Risk

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value. Cash and cash equivalents and certificates of deposit are carried at cost which approximates fair value. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends, and net unrealized gains and losses on trading securities) is included in the determination of revenues in excess of (less than) expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities are excluded from the determination of revenues in excess of (less than) expenses. Donor-restricted investment income is reported as an increase in temporarily restricted net assets. Interest income is measured as earned on the accrual basis. Dividends are measured based on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities and realized gains and losses are recorded on a trade-date basis.

The Hospital's investments are comprised of a variety of financial instruments. The fair values reported in the consolidated balance sheet are subject to various risks including changes in the equity markets, the interest rate environment, and general economic conditions. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the fair value of investment securities, it is reasonably possible that the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated financial statements could change materially in the near term.

The Hospital's investments in joint ventures are accounted for using the equity or cost method of accounting depending on its ownership interest.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based upon the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset. Depreciation was \$8,743,000 in 2011 and \$8,035,000 in 2010.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings or equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Other Assets

Financing costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt have been deferred and are being amortized over the term of the debt using the straight line method, which approximates the effective interest method. Amortization of deferred financing costs was \$54,000 in 2011 and \$186,000 in 2010. In 2010, the Hospital had amortization of goodwill of \$175,000.

Beneficial Interest in Perpetual Trusts

The Hospital has received as contributions various perpetual trusts. Under the perpetual trust arrangements, the Hospital has recorded the asset and has recognized permanently restricted contribution revenue at the fair market value of the Hospital's beneficial interest in the trust assets. Income earned on the trust assets and distributed to the Hospital is recorded as investment income in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations, unless otherwise restricted by the donor. Subsequent changes in fair values are recorded as valuation gain (loss), beneficial interest in perpetual trusts in permanently restricted net assets. Annual distributions from the trusts are reported as contribution income in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations, unless otherwise restricted by the donor, in the year received.

Estimated Medical Malpractice Claims Liability

The provision for estimated medical malpractice claims includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported.

Derivative Financial Instrument

The Hospital has entered into an interest rate swap agreement, which is considered a derivative financial instrument, to manage its interest rate and related cash flow exposure on certain long term debt. The interest rate swap agreement is reported at fair value in the consolidated balance sheet.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific purpose or time periods. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity.

Revenues in Excess of (Less Than) Expenses

The consolidated statement of operations includes the determination of revenues in excess of (less than) expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the determination of revenues in excess of (less than) expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gain on derivative financial instrument, pension liability adjustment, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

Net Patient Service Revenues

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, per diem payments, and contracted amounts. Net patient service revenues are reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. It is reasonably possible that the estimates used could change in the near term.

Charity Care

The Hospital provides charity care to patients who meet certain criteria without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenues. The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges foregone for services rendered and supplies furnished under its charity care policy. Charges foregone, based on established rates, were \$9,078,000 in 2011 and \$5,002,000 in 2010.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions.

Income Taxes

ECH and the Medical Group are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and are exempt from federal income taxes on their exempt income under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Hospital accounts for uncertainty in income taxes recognized in its financial statements using a recognition threshold of more-likely-than-not to be sustained upon examination by the appropriate taxing authority. Measurement of the tax uncertainty occurs if the recognition threshold has been met. Management determined there were no tax uncertainties that met the recognition threshold in 2011 and 2010.

The Hospital's federal Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Returns for 2008, 2009, and 2010 remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service.

Advertising Costs

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred and were approximately \$478,000 in 2011 and \$521,000 in 2010.

Subsequent Events

The Hospital evaluated subsequent events for recognition or disclosure through October 24, 2011, the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Reclassifications

Certain amounts relating to 2010 have been reclassified to conform to the 2011 reporting format.

2. New Accounting Principles

Charity Care

The Hospital will be required to adopt amended guidance related to health care entities which requires that direct and indirect costs be used as the measurement for charity care disclosure purposes. The guidance was also amended to require disclosure of the method used to identify or determine such costs. The amended guidance is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010. Adoption of the amended guidance will revise disclosure in the notes to the Hospital's consolidated financial statements but will not impact amounts reported in the primary consolidated financial statements.

Insurance Claims

The Hospital will be required to adopt amended guidance which clarifies that health care entities may not net insurance recoveries against a related claim liability. In addition, the amount of the claim liability should be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries and estimated insurance recoveries, if any, should be measured and presented separately within the consolidated balance sheet. The amended guidance is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010. The Hospital has not completed the process of evaluating the impact, if any, of this amended guidance on its consolidated financial statements.

Provision for Doubtful Collections

The Hospital will be required to adopt amended guidance related to health care entities which requires a change in reporting the provision for bad debts associated with net patient service revenues. As a result of this guidance, the provision, which is currently reported as an operating expense in the Hospital's consolidated statement of operations, will be reported as a deduction from patient service revenues, net of contractual allowances and discounts. The guidance also enhances required disclosures regarding the policies for recognizing net patient service revenues and assessing bad debts. In addition, the guidance requires disclosure of net patient service revenues and qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts, both by major payor sources. The amended guidance is effective for fiscal years and interim periods beginning after December 15, 2011. Adoption of the amended guidance will require retrospective restatement of the consolidated statement of operations and prospective consolidated financial statement disclosures.

3. Net Patient Service Revenues

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A significant portion of the Hospital's net patient service revenues are derived from those third-party payor programs. A summary of the principal payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

- Medicare - Inpatient acute, non-acute, outpatient, and home health services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined amounts. These rates vary according to patient classification systems that are based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Reimbursements for cost reimbursable expenditures are received at tentative interim rates, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization. The Medicare cost reports have been settled by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2007.
- Medical Assistance - Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medical Assistance program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Inpatient non-acute services are paid at prospectively determined per diem rates. Outpatient services and home health services are paid based on a published fee schedule.
- Blue Cross - Blue Cross inpatient acute and non-acute services and outpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates. Home health services are paid based on prospective rates subject to payment limitations. The Hospital is tentatively reimbursed on an interim basis at other than contract rates with final settlement subsequently determined based on an analysis of actual claims.

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, preferred provider organizations, and other organizations. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, or prospectively determined daily rates.

Revenue received under third-party arrangements is subject to audit and retroactive adjustment. The Hospital included in net patient service revenues favorable adjustments of \$91,000 in 2011. The adjustments related to tentative and final settlements of prior year cost reports and other settlements.

Effective July 1, 2010, the Hospital is subject to a Quality Care Assessment (the "Assessment") imposed by the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare ("DPW") under Pennsylvania Act 49 of 2010, which is 2.95% of net inpatient revenue from the Hospital's 2008 federal fiscal year cost report. The Assessment was pursued by Pennsylvania in an effort to increase the federal share of Medical Assistance funding under the Medicaid Modernization Act. In turn, DPW provides additional reimbursement to the Hospital.

The Assessment totals \$1,726,000 for the year ended June 30, 2011, which is included in supplies and expenses in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations. Additional reimbursement to the Hospital was \$3,276,000 for the year ended June 30, 2011, which is included in net patient service revenue.

5. Fair Value Measurements and Financial Instruments

Fair Value Measurements

Accounting guidance on fair value measurements defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and defines disclosures about fair value measurements.

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or the price that would be paid to dispose of a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The framework for measuring fair value includes a hierarchy used to classify the inputs used in measuring fair value. The hierarchy prioritizes the inputs used in determining valuations into three levels. The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement falls is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

Level 1 – Fair value is based on unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible to the Hospital for identical assets. These generally provide the most reliable evidence and are used to measure fair value whenever available.

Level 2 – Fair value is based on significant inputs, other than Level 1 inputs, that are observable either directly or indirectly for substantially the full term of the asset through corroboration with observable market data. Level 2 inputs include quoted market prices in active markets for similar assets, quoted market prices in markets that are not active for identical or similar assets, and other observable inputs.

Level 3 – Fair value would be based on significant unobservable inputs. Examples of valuation methodologies that would result in Level 3 classification include option pricing models, discounted cash flows, and other similar techniques.

Financial Instruments

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents and estimated third-party settlements and advances approximate fair value at June 30, 2011 and 2010 due to the short-term nature of these instruments.

Marketable equity securities are valued at fair value based upon quoted market prices in active markets for those securities. Certificates of deposit are valued based upon amortized cost which approximates fair value. Mutual funds are valued at the net asset value of shares held by the Hospital at year end. Corporate bonds, municipal bonds, and U.S. government bonds and notes are valued based on recently executed transactions, market price quotations, bond spreads and credit default spreads for securities with similar maturities. The beneficial interest in perpetual trusts is valued at fair value using the Hospital's percentage of the earnings of the underlying assets applied to the fair value of those assets, which approximates the present value of estimated future cash flows to be received from the trust.

The carrying amount of long-term debt approximates fair value at June 30, 2011 and 2010 based on borrowing rates available to the Hospital for debt with similar terms, maturities, and credit risk

The Hospital measures its derivative financial instrument at fair value based on proprietary models of an independent third party valuation specialist. The fair value takes into consideration the prevailing interest rate environment and the specific terms and conditions of the derivative financial instrument. The fair value was estimated using the zero-coupon discounting method and considers the credit risk of the Hospital and the counterparty. This method calculates the future payments required by the derivative financial instrument, assuming that the current forward rates implied by the yield curve are the market's best estimate of future spot interest rates. These payments are then discounted using the spot rates implied by the current yield curve for a hypothetical zero-coupon rate bond due on the date of each future net settlement payment on the derivative financial instrument. The value represents the estimated exit price the Hospital would pay to terminate the agreement.

The Hospital has a 51% interest in Physiotherapy Associates ("PA"), formerly Benchmark Medical, Inc., a for-profit corporation providing rehabilitation services to patients in northern Lancaster County. approximately \$757,000 in 2011 and \$427,000 in 2010. Distributions received were approximately \$333,000 in 2011 and \$557,000 in 2010.

The Hospital has a 14% interest in Cassatt Insurance Company, Ltd. ("Cassatt"), a not-for-profit multi-provider captive insurance company. Cassatt is the owner of a Risk Retention Group, Inc. through which the Hospital has its malpractice insurance coverage. The Hospital accounts for its interest in Cassatt under the cost method of accounting.

The Hospital has a 10% interest in Central Pennsylvania Alliance Laboratory, LLP ("CPAL"), a limited liability partnership providing lab services to member hospitals located in the central Pennsylvania area.

The Hospital has a 10% interest in Quest Behavioral Health, Inc. ("Quest"), a not-for-profit corporation providing a behavioral health managed care plan. Distributions received from this venture were approximately \$15,000 in 2010.

The Hospital has a 67% interest in the Crossroads Surgery Center ("Crossroads"), a limited liability company established to provide non-emergency surgery services. Despite continued operating losses, management is committed to the mission of Crossroads and contractually obligated to support the working capital needs for future operations. The Hospital accounts for its interest in Crossroads under the equity method of accounting, as it does not retain contractual control of Crossroads through June 30, 2011. The Hospital's share of the losses of this venture was approximately \$747,000 in 2011 and \$457,000 in 2010. Advances to Crossroads were \$934,000 in 2011 and \$575,000 in 2010.

8. Demand Note Payable

The Hospital has a \$1,000,000 unsecured bank line of credit agreement. Borrowings bear interest at the bank's prime rate (3.25% at June 30, 2011). The line of credit expires on December 1, 2012. There were no borrowings at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Hospital Revenue Notes

On November 9, 2009, the Hospital entered into an Agreement with the Lancaster Municipal Authority (the "Authority"), whereby, the Authority issued, on behalf of the Hospital, a \$23,930,000 tax-exempt Revenue Note (Ephrata Community Hospital Project), Series of 2009 (the "2009 Note"). The proceeds of the 2009 Note were used to refund the 2006 Bonds and pay the costs of issuance of the 2009 Note. The 2009 Note is due in varying annual installments through January 1, 2031, plus interest at a variable rate of 72% of LIBOR plus 200 basis points (2.14% at June 30, 2011). The 2009 Note is secured by a security interest in the gross revenues of the Hospital.

On February 1, 2010, the Hospital entered into an Agreement with the Authority, whereby, the Authority issued, on behalf of the Hospital, a \$4,570,000 tax-exempt Revenue Note (Ephrata Community Hospital Project), Series of 2010A (the "2010A Note"). The proceeds of the 2010A Note were used to refund the 1997 Bonds and pay the costs of issuance of the 2010A Note. The 2010A Note is due in varying annual installments through April 1, 2021, plus interest at a variable rate of 72% of the sum of LIBOR plus 300 basis points but not less than 2.88% (2.88% at June 30, 2011). The 2010A Note is secured by a security interest in the gross revenues of the Hospital.

On July 1, 2010, the Hospital entered into an Agreement with the Authority, whereby, the Authority issued, on behalf of the Hospital, a \$5,100,000 tax-exempt Revenue Note (Ephrata Community Hospital Project), Series of 2010B (the "2010B Note"). The proceeds of the 2010B Note were used to refund the 1999 and 2000 Bonds and pay the costs of issuance of the 2010B Note. The 2010B Note is due in varying quarterly installments through October 1, 2014, plus interest at a fixed rate of 3.90%, determined as the tax-exempt rate at the date of the agreement. The 2010B Note is secured by a security interest in the gross revenues of the Hospital.

The debt agreements contain certain covenants which provide for, among other things, debt service coverage, limitations on future indebtedness and the transfer or sale of assets. At June 30, 2011, the Hospital was in compliance with the required covenants under the terms of the debt agreements.

Defined Contribution Retirement Savings Plan

On January 1, 2008, the Hospital began sponsoring a defined contribution plan that is available to substantially all employees. Retirement expense was \$2,795,000 in 2011 and \$3,078,000 in 2010.

13. Derivative Financial Instrument

The Hospital entered into an interest rate swap agreement, which is considered a derivative financial instrument, to hedge its variable rate interest rate payments due on its 2006 Bonds, which were refinanced with the 2009 Note (Note 10). The Hospital documents its risk management strategy and hedge effectiveness at the inception of and during the term of the hedge. The objective of this swap agreement is to minimize the risks associated with financing activities by reducing the impact of changes in the interest rates on variable rate debt. The swap agreement is a contract to exchange variable rate for fixed rate payments over the term of the swap agreement without the exchange of the underlying notional amount. The notional amount of the swap agreement is used to measure the interest to be paid or received and does not represent the amount of exposure to credit loss. Exposure to credit loss is limited to the receivable, if any, which may be generated as a result of the swap agreement. Management believes that losses related to credit risk are remote. The Hospital's exposure to credit loss under this swap agreement is insured under the terms of a financial guaranty policy. The net cash paid or received under the swap agreement is recognized as an adjustment to interest

expense. As a result of this swap agreement, interest expense increased by \$391,000 in 2011 and \$403,000 in 2010.

The Hospital does not utilize interest rate swap agreements or other financial instruments for trading or other speculative purposes.

The fair value of the interest rate swap agreement, which is the approximate amount that the Hospital would pay to terminate the swap agreement, is \$1,277,000 at June 30, 2011 and \$1,574,000 at June 30, 2010, and was based on information supplied by an independent third party valuation specialist. To the extent that the interest rate swap is effective in converting the variable interest rate on the bonds to a fixed rate, the unrealized gain or loss on the cash flow derivative financial instrument is excluded from revenues in excess of (less than) expenses. Gains or losses resulting from hedge ineffectiveness are recognized in revenues in excess of (less than) expenses. A gain of \$297,000 in 2011 and a loss of \$454,000 in 2010 was recognized in revenues in excess of (less than) expenses as a result of hedge ineffectiveness. With the refinancing of the 2006 Bonds, the Hospital discontinued hedge accounting for the interest rate swap agreement due to it no longer being effective. As a result, prior losses of \$1,020,000 were reclassified into revenues in excess of (less than) expenses in 2010.

14. Deferred Compensation Plan

The Hospital maintains a deferred compensation plan covering certain key employees which incorporates the tax-deferred salary provisions of Section 457(b) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Hospital funds its obligations with the trustee for the plan. Included in assets whose use is limited and deferred compensation are the Hospital's investments and obligations of \$2,079,000 and \$1,504,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. There were no benefits paid in 2011 and 2010.

15. Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are available for betterments to plant facilities and purchases of equipment or for a particular purpose.

Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity.

During 2011 and 2010, total net assets were released from donor restrictions by satisfying their restricted purposes in the amount of \$701,000 and \$949,000, respectively.

During 2010, the Hospital was required to return grant monies received in prior years in the amount of \$137,000 to the Department of Community and Economic Development related to noncompliance with a grant agreement, which were previously released from restriction for use in operations.

16. Medical Malpractice Claims Coverage

At June 30, 2011, the Hospital's medical malpractice insurance coverages are provided under the provisions of insurance arrangements as follows:

Primary Coverage - Primary coverage is provided under the terms of an insurance contract which covers losses, if any, which are reported during the period the contract is in force, "claims-made coverage," subject to the per occurrence and aggregate limits of such contract.

MCARE Fund coverage - The Pennsylvania Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error Fund ("MCARE Fund") provides excess coverage per the Pennsylvania law governing the MCARE Fund. Pursuant to the per occurrence and aggregate limits set forth in the controlling Pennsylvania statutes, the MCARE Fund provides coverage for losses in excess of the primary coverage that was in effect on the date of the incident. The cost of MCARE Fund coverage is recognized as expense in the period incurred. Increases in annual surcharges and concerns over the MCARE Fund's ability to manage and pay claims continues to result in proposals to reform or restructure the MCARE Fund. MCARE Fund coverage is currently scheduled to be reduced in 2012, unless the State Insurance Commissioner determines that additional primary insurance capacity is not available at that time, and eliminated three years after such reduction. The Hospital will be required to purchase additional primary insurance to take the place of the MCARE Fund coverage if it is reduced. Depending upon the ultimate resolution of this matter, the Hospital may incur additional insurance costs.

Umbrella coverage - The Hospital has an umbrella liability insurance contract which insures against losses in excess of the above coverages reported during the period of policy coverage.

Excess coverage - The Hospital has an excess liability insurance contract which insures against losses in excess of the above coverages reported during the period of policy coverage

The above primary, umbrella and excess coverages are provided by Cassat Risk Retention Group, Inc. ("Cassat RRG"). Cassat RRG was formed as a reciprocal risk retention group to provide liability insurance, reinsurance and risk management services for its subscribers. The Hospital is a subscriber in Cassat RRG as a result of its investment in Cassat.

The Hospital's investment in Cassat is included in investments in joint ventures in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

The Hospital's estimated medical malpractice claims liability for both asserted and unasserted claims was \$824,000 and \$954,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The discount rate used in determining these liabilities was 3.5% at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. It is reasonably possible that the estimates used could change materially in the near term.

17. Significant Group Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Hospital's primary operations and service area include most communities of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, who are insured under third-party payor arrangements, primarily with Medicare, Medical Assistance, Blue Cross and various commercial insurance companies.

The Hospital maintains its cash and cash equivalents with several financial institutions. Cash and cash equivalents on deposit with any one financial institution are insured to \$250,000.

Rental expense on the above commitments was \$11,611,000 in 2011 and \$11,245,000 in 2010.

19. Contingencies

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time. Government activity continues to increase with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by healthcare providers of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed. Management is not aware of any material incidents of noncompliance other than noted below; however, the possible future financial effects of this matter on the Hospital, if any, are not presently determinable.

Effective July 1, 2010, DPW implemented Act 49 of 2010, which modernized Pennsylvania's fee-for-service hospital payment system, established enhanced hospital payments through the state's Medical Assistance managed care program, and secured matching Medicaid funds through the establishment of the Assessment (Note 3). The Act is only effective through June 30, 2013, after which time the additional reimbursement is not guaranteed to remain. The potential effects of this are not known at this time.

20. Self-Insurance Plans

The Hospital maintains a self-insurance program for its workers' compensation costs. Estimated self-insurance costs are accrued based upon data provided by the third-party administrator of the program and historical claims experience. At June 30, 2011, the Hospital had an outstanding letter of credit in the amount of approximately \$1,100,000. This letter of credit is required under law in the state of Pennsylvania for self-funded plans. The letter of credit calls for an interest rate of prime plus fifty basis points (if called). There were no outstanding borrowings on the letter of credit as of June 30, 2011 and June 30, 2010, respectively.

The Hospital also self-insures its employee health coverages. The Hospital accrues the estimated costs of incurred and reported and incurred and unreported claims, after consideration of its stop-loss insurance coverages, based upon data provided by the third-party administrator of the program and its historical claims experience.

21. Functional Expenses

The Hospital provides general acute care and related services to individuals within its geographic location. Expenses related to providing these services in 2011 and 2010 are approximately as follows:

22. Subsequent Events

Effective July 1, 2011, the Hospital acquired the remaining 33% interest in Crossroads Surgery Center, LLC. Effective August 31, 2011, the Hospital ceased performing surgical procedures at the center, while the pain management portion of the center continues to operate. The Hospital intends to convert pain management to a hospital based department in the current fiscal year. The Hospital has not yet completed the process of evaluating the impact, if any, of this acquisition on its consolidated financial statements.

Effective September 1, 2011, the Hospital acquired the assets of Heart Specialists of Lancaster, PC a cardiology physician group. The Hospital has not yet completed the process of evaluating the impact, if any, of this acquisition on its consolidated financial statements.
