FUND DESCRIPTIONS

(As of June 30, 2011)

The Shaker Schools Foundation depends upon the generosity of donors to fulfill its mission of providing resources to enrich the educational experiences of students of the Shaker Heights City School District. The Foundation is especially pleased to honor or memorialize a person, family, or alumni class. This can be accomplished with a donation of \$5,000 or more to set up a named fund. A special purpose endowment fund can be created with a gift of \$25,000 or more.

The Foundation's original named funds were established during its first year of existence. Income from these funds helps support teaching and learning in the Shaker Heights City Schools; now nearly 80 such funds exist. Many of the fund descriptions below contain a brief historical account. Most have ongoing activity in the form of additional donations by the fund sponsor or other contributors.

THE RUTH S. AFFELDER READING FUND – 085-AF, GR

The Ruth S. Affelder Reading Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1991 in tribute to Ruth S. Affelder's 70th birthday and to her years of service to the Shaker Schools and commitment to children's reading development. This fund may be used to improve the teaching of reading and language arts in the elementary grades and for staff development or the acquisition of materials, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

NIKKI BABBIT MEMORIAL FUND – 620, AW

The Nikki Babbit Memorial Fund was established as a special purpose endowment fund in 2008 in memory of Nikki Babbit. The mother of three graduates of the Theatre Arts Department (Ross, 1986; Jamie, 1989; and Rider, 1992), Nikki was a devoted follower and supporter of the Theatre Arts Department until her death in 2006. This fund will provide an award to a senior student who has provided outstanding technical service to the Shaker Heights High School Theatre Arts Department. This includes set, costume, light, or sound design, set construction, light board operation, and other activities that support performances.

DAVID M. BERGER MEMORIAL FUND – 140, AW

The David M. Berger Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1984 in memory of David Berger, a former student of the Shaker Heights public schools, who was slain while participating in the 1972 Munich Olympic Games. The initial contributions were received from his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Benjamin Berger. The fund may be used to provide an annual academic/athletic award presented on Senior Honors Day at Shaker Heights High School or other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

DANIEL R. BIELLO MEMORIAL FUND – 150, AW

The Daniel R. Biello Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1986 with contributions from friends in memory of Daniel R. Biello, a 1965 graduate of Shaker Heights High School and a distinguished radiologist and expert in nuclear medicine. The fund may be used for an award on Senior Honors Day to an outstanding student-athlete or other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

MADELINE AND DENNIS BLOCK FUND – 614, SP

The Madeline and Dennis Block Fund was established in 2010 by the Blocks. Their daughters Amanda (SHHS1995) and Lindsay (SHHS 1997) are Shaker graduates, and their grandchildren

currently are attending Lomond Elementary School. This is a special purpose expendable fund that will support the music program at the High School. The Block Fund will underwrite annual projects identified by the department chair as being needed, but not covered by the budget. These can include masterclasses for string and vocal programs; the commissioning of new music; and other enrichment projects.

JEAN BRATTIN PHYSICS FUND – 115, GR

The Jean Brattin Physics Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1989 in memory of Jean Brattin, who taught physics for eighteen years at Shaker Heights High School. This fund may be used for the improvement of physics instruction through the purchase of equipment, funding of special science projects, and recognition of innovative science teaching. It may also be used to award outstanding students in the sciences, particularly in physics, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

DAVID BRELAND FUND FOR INNOVATION IN MUSIC AND TECHNOLOGY – 517, GR

The David Breland Fund for Innovation in Music and Technology was established in 2005 as a special purpose endowment fund in memory of David, a high school senior, who had a passion for integrating music and technology. His musical compositions reflected his creative and innovative nature. This fund will support an enrichment grant.

LAURA ALMEADA BROOKS MEMORIAL FUND – 018, AW

The Laura Almeada Brooks Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 2002 in memory of Laura Almeada Brooks, a lifetime educator and teacher of 35 years. This fund may be used for a student award to be given to a senior who has demonstrated a passionate concern for teaching and education and has achieved a 3.0 or higher grade point average, preferably bound for an Ohio or Tennessee college/university, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

BUIE DATA PROCESSING FUND – 145, GR

The Buie Data Processing Fund was established as an endowment fund in December 1989 with an individual contribution of \$2,000 by Mr. Richard Buie. The fund may be used for the support of innovative teaching in data processing and computer science and projects involving technology as it is applied to education or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

PHYLLIS P. BRANDON FUND – 888-PB, EN

The Phyllis P. Brandon Fund was established in 2011 by her five children and their spouses, 15 grandchildren, and husband, to celebrate Phyllis Brandon's milestone birthday on April 30, 2011. The Brandon Fund is a special purpose endowment created to support a new reading program for Kindergarten students in the lower quartile. Beginning in fall 2011, these children will receive a series of books that meet Shaker and state academic standards. To underscore the importance of reading, Shaker teachers will work with the parents and families of these Kindergarteners to support their exploration of books.

CHARLOTTE BRAVERMAN MUSIC ENRICHMENT FUND – 618, SP

The Music Enrichment Fund is a special purpose endowment established in 2006 with an anonymous donation in honor of the Shaker Heights High School band program. The initial gift was matched by additional contributions to provide funding for the enrichment of the instrumental program. This includes, but is not limited to, group instrument lessons for

disadvantaged middle and high school students who would not otherwise be able to afford instruction, work with guest conductors, clinics with composers, and master classes with professional musicians.

LUCILLE M. BURKETT FUND – 060, AW

The Lucille M. Burkett Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1986 in tribute to Lucille M. Burkett's thirty-three years of service as a Shaker Heights School District teacher and administrator who retired in 1986. Revenues were raised from a special event in her honor. This fund may be used to support innovative teaching in physical education and to provide an award to an outstanding female athlete who has contributed time and participation in many school and community activities and has worked and achieved her academic potential, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

RASHAD BURNLEY MEMORIAL FUND – 178, AW

The Rashad Burnley Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 2000 to honor an outstanding minority achievement scholar, enhance opportunities for the Minority Achievement Committee (MAC) Scholars, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

PENNY CHANG FUND – 171, GR

The Penny Chang Fund was established as an endowment fund in 2000 to support various enrichment projects that benefit the students in the Shaker Heights City Schools as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

CLASS OF 1938 SPECIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND – 075, GR

The Class of 1938 Harry Horvitz and C. C. Tippit Award Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1990 in tribute to the Class of 1938 alumni. The fund was created by alums Harry Horvitz and C. Carlisle Tippit and may be used for providing current students and faculty with opportunities for advanced study or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

CLASS OF 1949, including the Class of January 1950 Fund – 074, GR

The Class of 1949, including the Class of January 1950 Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 2000 in tribute to the alumni of both classes. This fund may be used to provide opportunities for advanced study by students and/or to enhance instruction at Shaker Heights High School or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

CLASS OF 1954 ALUMNI FUND – 437, GR

The Class of 1954 Alumni Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 2004 from contributions honoring the fiftieth reunion of the Class of 1954. The proceeds of this fund will be used to enrich the educational experience of the students of Shaker Heights High School.

CLASS OF 1973 FUND – 073, GR

The Class of 1973 Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1994 in tribute to the Class of 1973 by the twentieth-year reunion committee, with proceeds from the event and additional contributions from the members of the class. This fund may be used to enhance learning and teaching at Shaker Heights High School or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

SHAKER HEIGHTS HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 2001 FUND – 016, GR

The Shaker Heights High School Class of 2001 Fund was established as an unrestricted expendable fund in 2001 in tribute to the Class of 2001 by the Shaker Heights High School After Prom Committee. This fund may be used for any purpose as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

“COMMITMEN” FUND – 630, AW

The “CommitMEN” Fund was established in 2006 as an expendable fund by six Shaker natives: Justin Erkins (Shaker 1998), Patrick Hicks (Shaker 2000), Landon Lockhart (Shaker 1999), Trenton Marsh (Shaker 1998), Brad Picot (Shaker 1998) and Philip Smith (St. Ignatius 1999). This Fund will provide a \$500 award each year to an African-American male senior who earns at least a 2.5 GPA, has been accepted into a post-secondary program, and is a well-rounded person who demonstrates integrity, leadership, and service to others.

JAMEALA A. CROOM CAMP HOPE FUND – 660, SP

The Croom Camp Hope Fund was established in 2007 in memory of Jameala, a fifth grade Woodbury student who believed in humanitarian efforts and in giving service to others. The fund will provide annual scholarships for sixth grade Shaker students to attend summer camp. Beginning Spring 2008, funds will be available for students who have financial or health impairments to attend the Sixth Grade Camp.

THE MAE STUART DALRYMPLE MEMORIAL FUND – 022, AW

The Mae Stuart Dalrymple Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1995 in memory of Mae Stuart Dalrymple by Byron W. and Ellen F. Dalrymple. Mrs. Dalrymple, who grew up in Shaker Heights, lost her life in a tragic automobile accident in 1933. This fund may be used for activities that support student writing such as the publication of student newspapers and literary magazines or a student award for writing or other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

FRED DAVID MEMORIAL FUND – 053, GR

The Fred David Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1997 in memory of Fred David, a longtime educator in the Shaker Heights City Schools, by his friends and colleagues. He served as a teacher, Treasurer, and Assistant Superintendent, totaling nearly thirty years of service. This fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

M. EVELYN DILLEY FUND – 021, AW

The M. Evelyn Dilley Fund was established as a special purpose endowment fund in 2007 as part of a bequest from Kenneth J. Suid. Mr. Suid, a 1958 Shaker Heights High School graduate, received encouragement, support, and inspiration from Miss Dilley. She taught him the concept of “making your best better,” and Mr. Suid lived by and shared this motto throughout his life. This fund will provide an award to a graduating student who exemplifies the personal goals and ideals expressed the motto, “make your best better,” and a commemorative medal will be given with the cash award.

RICHARD WILLIAM EPPS MEMORIAL FUND – 043, GR

The Richard William Epps Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1993 in memory of Richard W. Epps, an active member of the Shaker community, by his friends. This fund may be used for general purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

FINE AND PERFORMING ARTS FUND – 050, GR

The Fine and Performing Arts Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1985 from many contributors to enhance the dramatic, musical, and visual arts programs in the schools. This fund may be used for providing artists-in-residence, mentorships for students, visual aids, production costs, or for the acquisition of video and photography equipment for production and presentation, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

JEFFRY E. FOX MEMORIAL FUND – 888-JF, EN

The Jeffrey E. Fox Memorial Fund was established in 2010 as a named endowment fund by family members and friends. Jeffrey graduated from Shaker in 1973 and was a talented musician. This fund will support students who are unable to afford their interest in music and provide for instrument rental, private music lessons, participation in camps and trips sponsored by the High School's music program, and/or other similar needs as identified by the High School's music program.

LINDA FREEMAN FUND – 173

The Linda Freeman Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1999 to support various enrichment projects that benefit the students in the Shaker Heights City Schools as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

KATIE GALVIN FUND – 040, AW

The Katie Galvin Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1985 in memory of Katie Galvin, a former Middle School student who passed away. This fund may be used to honor an eighth grader for excellence in the arts or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

CAROLYN GARVIN SCHOLARSHIP FUND – 149, AW

The Carolyn Garvin Scholarship Fund was established as an endowment fund in 2001 by family and friends to honor Carolyn as the recipient of the Martin Luther King Human Relations Award. The fund may be used to provide an award to a senior who demonstrates leadership abilities and a grade point average of at least 2.5, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

BARBARA P. GEISMER FUND FOR CULTURAL ENRICHMENT IN GRADES K-3 – 502, GR

The Barbara P. Geismer Fund for Cultural Enrichment in Grades K-3 was established in July 2005 as a special purpose endowment fund by Meg Ostrum, Alan Geismer, and Mollie Geismer in honor of the birthday of their mother, Barbara Geismer. The proceeds from the fund will be used to support a teacher grant that focuses on cultural enrichment in the primary grades.

JENNY GOLDMAN LANGUAGE EXCELLENCE FUND – 636, AW

The Jenny Goldman Language Excellence Fund was established as a special purpose endowment fund in 2006 in memory of Jenny Goldman, Class of 2005, who loved languages and cultures. A junior at the time of her death, she was already fluent in French and Japanese and was studying German and Russian. She helped with student exchange programs and made each participant feel welcome. The Jenny Goldman Language Excellence Award is presented in her memory. It is awarded to a junior or senior who has excelled in more than one language and who has also demonstrated a love of learning languages by efforts beyond the classroom or academic requirements.

ROBERT C. GOODMAN SCIENCE FACULTY ENRICHMENT FUND – 035, GR

Formerly known as the Robert C. Goodman Memorial Fund, the Robert C. Goodman Science Faculty Enrichment Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1993 in memory of Robert C. Goodman by his family. Bob, a 1945 graduate of Shaker Heights High School, taught physics and chemistry in the High School science department for thirty years. This fund may be used for equipment, supplies, and activities that advance the instruction of chemistry and physics, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

THE GRACE B. GRAHAM LEARNING FUND – 170, AW

The Grace B. Graham Learning Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1998 by David M. Gleason, a 1950 Shaker Heights High School graduate, Shaker Heights High School Alumni Hall of Fame inductee, and a member of the All Time Shaker Football Team. The fund was established in memory of his teacher and mentor, Grace B. Graham, who was the chairperson of the English Department and taught at Shaker Heights High School from 1924-1960. The fund may be used to provide for two awards: an award to a student athlete who excels in academics and/or extra-curricular activities due to the strong mentoring of a teacher, and an award to the teacher whose constant encouragement taught the student receiving the award to excel, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

THE GRANDPARENTS FUND – 165

The Grandparents' Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1996 to encourage grandparents to honor their grandchildren and conversely, for grandchildren to honor their grandparents. The fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

PAT GUSE EARLY CHILDHOOD FUND – 172

The Pat Guse Early Childhood Fund was established in 2000 to support early childhood enrichment opportunities or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

JOHN HARBOURT MEMORIAL FUND – 888-JH, EN

The John Harbourt Memorial Fund was established by Grant K. Goodman in 2009 as a named endowment fund in memory of John Harbourt, who was a member of the Shaker Heights High School social studies faculty from 1928 until his retirement in 1965. Dr. Goodman is a 1942 Shaker graduate and was so inspired by Mr. Harbourt that he became a history professor at the University of Kansas. This fund will support the teaching of academics, with a focus on history.

JUNE MARIE HARNEY FUND FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS – 095, AW

The June Marie Harney Award for the Performing Arts was established as an endowment fund in 1991 in memory of June Marie Harney, a 1941 graduate of Shaker Heights High School, who excelled in the dramatic arts. This fund may be used for an award to a student who excels in the performing arts and humanities. It also can support that curriculum by providing books, music, equipment, supplies, and other needed expenditures in the performing arts and humanities, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

FRED HEINLEN FUND – 642, AW

The Fred Heinlen Fund was established as an expendable fund in 2006 to honor Fred Heinlen, who served as Shaker Heights High School's physical education teacher and baseball coach from 1946 to 1980 and was athletic director for 25 years. He won 466 games, 8 Lake Erie League championships, state championships in 1965 and 1976, and was inducted into the Ohio High School Coaches Hall of Fame. An annual, honorary award will be given to a junior or senior Varsity baseball player who demonstrates the values Fred instilled in his teams: respect, hard

work, leadership, and integrity. The fund also supports scoreboard and baseball field maintenance.

SARITA HERRON FUND – 615, SP

The Sarita Herron Fund was established in 2009 from gifts in memory of Sarita, who was a student at Lomond Elementary School at the time of her death. The Sarita Herron Fund is an expendable fund that will support and enrich art projects at Lomond.

THE ROB HERSHMAN FUND – 433, GR

The Rob Hershman Fund was established in 2004 as a special purpose endowment fund in memory of Rob Hershman, a 1971 graduate of Shaker Heights High School, whose broadcasting and journalism career earned him many prestigious awards and recognitions. This fund honors his deep intellect, activism, and strength of character. The proceeds will be used to support projects/activities for students in literature, history, or foreign language classes that use broadcasting and/or journalism to bring about societal change.

DOUGLAS E. HICKS MEMORIAL FUND – 130, AW

The Douglas E. Hicks Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1983 in memory of Douglas E. Hicks, a former student of Shaker Heights City School District, who died shortly after graduation. The initial contribution of \$2,000 was received from Ms. Anna Apley. The fund may be used for annual awards to be presented on Senior Honors Day at Shaker Heights High School in the area of instrumental music or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

HIRSCH FAMILY FUND – 142, GR

The Hirsch Family Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 2000, by Carl Hirsch, a 1964 graduate of Shaker Heights High School. The fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

JOHN S. HOLDSTEIN MEMORIAL FUND – 096, AW

The John S. Holdstein Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 2001 in memory of John Holdstein, a 1971 graduate of Shaker Heights High School. This fund may be used for an award to an outstanding senior scholar athlete, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

DOROTHY HUMEL HOVORKA AWARD FOR SCHOLASTIC ACHIEVEMENT – 080, AW

The Dorothy Humel Hovorka Award for Scholastic Achievement was established as an endowment fund in November of 1990 by Dorothy Humel Hovorka, a 1938 graduate of Shaker Heights High School. This fund may be used for an annual recognition award to either the highest achieving African American male or female of the junior class of Shaker Heights High School as determined by cumulative grade point average in the spring of the junior year. The fund also provides a cash award to that student in the senior year, or supports other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

BRIAN HUTTON MEMORIAL FUND – 045, SP

The Brian Hutton Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1990 in memory of Brian Hutton, a junior at Shaker Heights High School, by numerous individuals. This fund may be used for financial assistance to deserving high school band participants to purchase/rent band

uniforms, instruments, or travel expenses, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

KASSEN BOULEVARD BOOK FUND – 047, SP

The Kassen Boulevard Book Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1999 in tribute to Aileen and Julian Kassen. This fund may be used for purchasing books for the Boulevard School Library, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

JUDY WILKOFF KAUFMAN FUND – 019, SP

The Judy Wilkoff Kaufman Fund was established as a special purpose endowment in 2007, in memory of Judy Kaufman. Judy was a 1955 Shaker graduate and organized many of her class reunions. Four of her classmates – Art Brooks, Mary Jo Chiara, Ab Glickman, and Edie Fellinger Hirsch – solicited the Class of 1955 in order to create this fund, which will support women's athletics at the High School.

LIBRARY FUND – 030, SP

The Library Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1982 with a \$5,000 award to the Shaker Heights School District Library Media Centers from the American School Libraries Association and the Encyclopedia Britannica Foundation. This fund may be used for Library Media activities within the Shaker Heights City School District or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

THE ERIC AND SUSAN LINDQUIST MEMORIAL FUND – 573, AW

The Eric and Susan Lindquist Memorial Fund was established with an anonymous gift in 2007 as a special purpose expendable fund. It will provide annual scholarships to up to four students (considering a mix of both genders) in the senior class who either have been enrolled in Shaker's Career Prep Program and/or have been accepted into a post high school trade, apprentice, or vocational school, or a two-year arts school. In addition, the candidates will exhibit the characteristics of both Eric and Susan Lindquist in their desire to give back to the Shaker Schools and community. This fund honors the lives and work of siblings Eric and Susan Lindquist, both members of the Class of 1973. The first awards were given in 2008.

THE LAWRENCE LISAK MEMORIAL FUND – 648, SP

The Lawrence Lisak Memorial Fund was established as a special purpose endowment fund in 2006 to honor Mr. Lisak, who was a teacher in the Shaker Heights City Schools from 1956 to 1999. He taught social studies and history at Woodbury Junior High (1956 to 1987) and Shaker Heights High School (1987 to 1999), where he also supported the library through the donation of many books. The Lawrence Lisak Memorial Fund will provide support to the Shaker Heights High School Library for activities, projects, and the purchase of resources and equipment.

LINDA LOEFFLER SCIENCE FUND – 525, GR

The Linda Loeffler Science Fund was established as an expendable fund in 2005 in memory of Linda Loeffler. Her passion for science was lifelong, although she began her professional career as a commercial artist. Linda taught science in the Shaker Heights City Schools for nearly 20 years and was particularly interested in encouraging girls to pursue science. This fund may be used to support innovative teaching and learning in the sciences, such as biology, chemistry, engineering, and other related sciences.

The William James and Kathleen Suzanne MacIntyre Fund was established at Kate MacIntyre's request as a special purpose endowment fund in 2008 in honor of her father, Dr. William James MacIntyre, and to support her interest in promoting writing and journalism. Dr. MacIntyre is an emeritus professor of nuclear physics at Case Western Reserve University. A 1970 Shaker alum, Kathleen earned graduate degrees in public administration and journalism and pursued her love of writing and the arts and her advocacy of women until her death in 2007. This fund will provide biennial support for projects related to High School physics and other investigatory science classes, including the new engineering applications course. In alternate years, the fund will provide support for projects to enrich the creative writing and/or journalism courses at Shaker Heights High School. These can include the award-winning student newspaper (*The Shakerite*) or the journal for writers, artists, and poets (*The Semanteme*).

DR. LOUISE MARKS ACTIVE LEARNING FUND – 110, GR

The Dr. Louise Marks Active Learning Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1982 in memory of Dr. Louise Marks, a former teacher in the Shaker Heights City School District, who taught children with learning disabilities. This fund may be used for providing in-services and staff development to improve teaching; enhancement of basic learning skills; acquisition of materials and supplies that improve the educational environment; programs to help parents improve their children's learning abilities; related activities; or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

THE MASON FAMILY FUND – 135, GR

The Mason Family Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1989 with contributions from family and friends in memory of Elisabeth Mason Hopkins, a graduate of Shaker Heights High School. The fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

JENNIFER LYNN MOORE FUND – 065, AW

The Jennifer Lynn Moore Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1992 in memory of Jennifer Lynn Moore, a 1990 graduate of Shaker Heights High School, with contributions from family and friends. This fund may be used for an annual award to a graduating senior who has demonstrated a passionate concern for the environment and is an exceptional student, for environmental education, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

THE PETER MORGENSTERN-CLARREN GARDEN FUND – 435, SP

The Peter Morgenstern-Clarren Garden Fund was established in 2004 as a special purpose endowment in memory of Peter Morgenstern-Clarren, a 1999 Shaker School graduate. The fund honors Peter's passion for the environment and for the education of our youth. The proceeds will be used for the maintenance of the garden at Onaway School.

BOB MORRIS FUND – 020, GR

The Bob Morris Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1982 in tribute to Robert J. Morris, former deputy superintendent of the Shaker Heights City School District, who retired in 1982. This fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

TERRY POLLACK FUND FOR LEADERSHIP AND DIVERSITY – 432, AW

The Terry Pollack Fund for Leadership and Diversity was established in 2004 in honor of Terry's sixty-fifth birthday. It is a special purpose endowment fund and will support an annual senior award to a student who demonstrates an understanding of the social studies and who

This fund may be used for (1) an award to recognize a junior student who excels in creative writing or the study of foreign languages; (2) support of the publication of the literary magazine, visiting artists, and other enrichment activities as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

LORETTA QUADE COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP MEMORIAL FUND – 017, AW

The Loretta Quade Community Leadership Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 2001 in memory of Loretta Quade, a Shaker Schools parent and an active community supporter. This fund may be used for an annual award to a Shaker Heights High School senior who has demonstrated sustained and meaningful commitment and leadership to enhance and improve the Shaker Heights community, who has achieved academic success, and who is planning to attend a college or university following high school graduation.

RED & WHITE

The Benefit Fund for *A Night for the Red & White* was established as an expendable fund in 1991 with contributions from many individuals. This fund may be used to cover costs incurred for conducting fundraising events, which celebrate learning and teaching in the Shaker schools, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

FRANK RICHARDS MEMORIAL FUND – 025

The Frank Richards Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1992 in memory of Frank G. Richards, Jr. This fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

ROSEWATER FAMILY FUND – 670, AW

The Rosewater Family Fund was established in 2007 by Gail Rosewater, a Shaker graduate who taught French and Spanish for more than twenty years and tutored at Shaker Heights High School before her retirement. This special purpose endowment fund will provide an annual award to a senior who has completed at least four years of the same **modern** language at the high school level and has demonstrated diligence, dedication, and enthusiasm in the study of this language. This award will not be given to native speakers of modern languages, unless they have taken four years of a different modern language. The first award was given in 2008.

A. JACK RUMBAUGH FUND – 174, AW

The A. Jack Rumbaugh Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1999 in memory of Jack Rumbaugh, principal of Shaker Heights High School from 1987-1999. This fund provides for an award for a senior who will be attending Kent State University and who has a maximum grade point average of 3.5 or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

WILLIAM J. SCHERER FUND – 678, SP

The William J. Scherer Fund was established in 2011, with gifts in memory of William J. Scherer, who died early 2011. He was a teacher at the elementary school level for 30 years, retiring from Woodbury Elementary School at the end of the 2004-2005 school year. Bill also was very active in the Shaker Heights Teachers' Association, serving as its president for over 25

years. His guidance, perspective, kindness, and infectious smile will live on as his legacy. This is a special purpose expendable fund to benefit Woodbury Elementary School. The fund will be used to purchase a permanent memorial (sculpture, arbor, plantings) to commemorate Mr. Scherer and his contributions to the Shaker Heights City School District.

THE BOULEVARD SCHOOL FUND – 002, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

THE FERNWAY SCHOOL FUND – 003, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

THE LOMOND SCHOOL FUND – 004, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

THE MERCER SCHOOL FUND – 005, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

THE ONAWAY SCHOOL FUND – 006, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions and a \$2,000.00 gift from Marjorie Klimek Newman on behalf of her mother, Irene Sacks Schulman. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

ONAWAY THEATER FUND – 654, SER

This fund is an expendable fund established in 2007 for the purpose of funding a yearly student theatrical production at Onaway Elementary School.

THE WOODBURY SCHOOL FUND – 007, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions and a \$1,000.00 gift from Marjorie Klimek Newman on behalf of her mother, Irene Sacks Schulman. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

WOODBURY SCIENCE CLUB – 008

THE MIDDLE SCHOOL FUND – 015, SER

This fund was established in 1987 with an anonymous gift from a grateful family in honor of the Shaker Heights Middle School. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

THE HIGH SCHOOL FUND – 012, SER

This fund was created in 1990 with several individual contributions. The assets of the fund may be used for a variety of purposes by the faculty with the approval of the building's principal and executive director of the Foundation.

SGORR FUND – 667, SP

The SGORR Fund was established in 2008 as a special purpose endowment, in honor of the 25th anniversary of the Student Group on Race Relations and its founder Marcia Jaffe. This fund will support the activities of SGORR, especially team building and leadership development opportunities. These can include, but are not limited to, retreats for the entire group at the beginning of each school year, workshops for leadership development, and guest speakers.

SHAKER FIELDS DEVELOPMENT FUND – 675, SP

The Shaker Fields Development Fund was established in 2008 as a special purpose expendable fund to bring state-of-the-art, all-weather playing fields to Shaker Heights.

SHAKER LIFE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN JOURNALISM FUND – 606, AW

The Shaker Life Award for Excellence in Journalism was established in 2005 as an expendable fund. This fund provides a junior student who excels in journalism with a cash award and an opportunity during senior year to have an original article published in *Shaker Life Magazine*.

SHAKER HOCKEY ALUMNI FUND – 677, SP

The Shaker Hockey Alumni Fund was established with gifts from the hockey reunion in 2010. It is a special purpose expendable fund to support the hockey program at Shaker Heights High School. Initially, the Shaker Hockey Alumni Fund will provide money for banners and championship signs that celebrate the hockey teams' accomplishments over the past 40 years. Thereafter, the Fund will provide the resources to purchase equipment or materials identified by the coaches as being needed, but not covered by their budgets; academic awards to qualified graduating Shaker Heights High School seniors; and/or need-based scholarships for hockey camps.

SHAKER SPORTS BOOSTER CLUB FUND – 125, SP

The Shaker Sports Booster Club Fund was established in 1989 through a donation of \$3,000 from the Shaker Sports Booster Club. The fund provides worthy students from the Shaker Heights School District with tuition to summer sports camps or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

KAREN SHER FUND – 669, SP

The Karen Sher Fund was established in 2007 to honor Onaway Elementary School Kindergarten teacher Karen Sher, who retired from teaching after 26 years. This tribute was conceived and funded by grateful parents of many of the students Mrs. Sher taught during her career. This special purpose expendable fund will be used to purchase books for all reading levels and to support literacy projects, as determined or selected by the Onaway librarians.

AMY MARGOLIS SILBERMAN FUND FOR EXCELLENCE IN THEATER ARTS – 160, AW

The Amy Margolis Silberman Fund for excellence in Theater Arts was established as an endowment fund in 1995 in memory of Amy Margolis Silberman, a 1981 graduate of Shaker Heights High School, with contributions from numerous individuals. Amy was a talented singer, dancer, writer, poet, and artist, whose life ended prematurely when she was hit by a stray bullet

during a 1994 New Year's Eve celebration. This fund provides for an award to be presented to a member of the junior class who demonstrates excellence in the arts or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

SUE SILVERMAN MEMORIAL FUND – 090, AW

The Sue Silverman Memorial Fund was established as an endowment fund in 1991 in memory of Sue F. Silverman, a 1957 graduate of Shaker Heights High School, by family and friends. This fund may be used for an annual award to a female student in the junior class who demonstrates excellence in the areas of leadership and communication, or for other purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

ALICE STEIN READING FUND – 672, SP

The Alice Stein Fund was established as a special purpose endowment fund in 2008 in memory of Alice Stein. She was an employee of the Shaker Heights City Schools for 31 years and a reading skills improvement specialist at Fernway Elementary School for 27 years. This fund will support reading enrichment activities at Fernway.

ELENA STEINBERG FUND – 612, SP

The Elena Steinberg Fund was established as a special purpose endowment fund in 2006 in memory of Elena Steinberg, a first grade student at Boulevard Elementary School. This fund will support educational enrichment and creativity. The purpose is to enable teachers to experiment outside of the standard curriculum and to provide for materials needed to support creative activities.

STOUT FAMILY FUND FOR ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY – 438, SP

The Stout Family Fund for Advanced Technology was established in November 2004 as a special purpose endowment fund. The Superintendent's Fund was established in 1982 as an unrestricted endowment fund in honor of Jack P. Taylor, a former superintendent of the Shaker Heights City School District. In August 2004, the fund received a large donation from the Martha Holden Jennings Foundation in honor of the current superintendent, Mark Freeman, who was selected to receive the Jennings Ohio Superintendent Outstanding Performance Award. The fund's purpose was changed at this time to provide travel opportunities for disadvantaged students or to provide other opportunities at the discretion of the superintendent.

COACH TEKIELI FOOTBALL FUND – 014, SP

The Coach Tekieli Football Fund was established with an anonymous gift in 2007 as a special purpose expendable fund to enrich the football program at Shaker Heights High School. This fund will support the development of high school student-athletes as dedicated, self-disciplined, goal-oriented, competitive, and compassionate people. It will provide funding for tutors to prepare student-athletes to take the SAT and ACT; for the purchase of equipment and training camp gear; and for off-season awards and the Tekieli scholarship.

The Peter W., William A. and Harold J. Theisen Memorial Fund was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in December 1989 in memory of Peter W. and William A. ALYN E. WALLER FUND – 676, SP

The Alyn E. Waller Fund was established by Dr. Waller in 2009 as a special purpose expendable fund. This fund creates the *Raider Men of Tomorrow* program at Shaker Heights High School and will support the development of student-athletes who understand and respect the educational process in life, academics, and athletics. The Waller Fund will help pay for tutors for the SAT and ACT and schoolwork; assistants to guide study groups; support for community service; scholarships for books and materials that enrich the educational process; and scholarships for sports camps. Alyn Waller was a football player and wrestler at Shaker, graduating in 1982.

RICK WARE FUND FOR CREATIVE EDUCATION AND TEACHING EXCELLENCE – 070, GR

The Rick Ware Fund for Creative Education and Teaching Excellence was established as an unrestricted endowment fund in 1988 in memory of Richard Ware, a Shaker Heights School District teacher, who died in 1988. This fund may be used for purposes as deemed by the Foundation trustees.

TRACI LOUISE PRINCE WILLIAMS FUND – 501, AW

The Traci Louise Prince Williams Fund was established in 2005 as an expendable fund in memory of Traci Williams, a 2001 Shaker graduate, who took the dare to live her dream during her twenty-one years. Active in co-curricular activities while a Shaker student, Traci's compassion for others was demonstrated as a pre-med student at Denison University. The fund will provide awards for books in the amount of \$500 each to five African-American graduating seniors, who have a minimum grade point average of 2.5, and who demonstrate the legacy left by Traci.

The Bob Wonson Fund was established in 2009 from gifts in memory of Bob Wonson, who was a social studies teacher and head basketball coach at Shaker Heights High School at the time of his death. The Wonson Fund is an expendable fund that will provide scholarships so that disadvantaged students can attend summer and pre-season basketball camps.
