These consolidated financial statements are the responsibility of the Center's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion

As more fully described in Note 1, the Center has elected not to follow the requirements of U S GAAP, which requires an organization with a controlling financial interest in an entity through direct or indirect ownership of a majority voting interest to consolidate that entity. In our opinion, accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Center follow the consolidation requirements which would result in the consolidation of all controlled affiliates.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not consolidating all controlled affiliates as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Oaklawn Psychiatric Center, Inc. and Affiliate as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 28, 2011, on our consideration of the Oaklawn Psychiatric Center's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic consolidated financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards for the year ended June 30, 2011 is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and is not a required part of the 2011 basic consolidated financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the 2011 basic consolidated financial statements taken as a whole

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization and Nature of Business Oaklawn Psychiatric Center, Inc. ("OPC") is an Indiana not-for-profit corporation that owns, operates, and leases mental health care facilities in Elkhart County and St Joseph County, Indiana Oaklawn Community Mental Health Center, Inc ("OCMHC"), also an Indiana not-for-profit corporation, is an affiliated entity because the officers, administrator, and directors of OPC serve in the same capacity for OCMHC. All operations are conducted by OPC, OCMHC is a dormant organization and has no continuing business activities

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by OPC and OCMHC (individually and collectively referred to as the "Center") which have a significant effect on the consolidated financial statements

<u>Basis of Accounting</u>. The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U S GAAP)

Principles of Consolidation. The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of OPC and its The consolidated financial statements do not include the accounts of Oaklawn Foundation for Mental Health, Inc (the "Foundation"), Oaklawn Apartments, Inc (the "Apartments"), Oakland Estates Apartments, Inc (the "Estates"), Madison Residential Services, Inc (the "Uhrig Apartments"), Simadon Corporation (the "River Court Apartments"), and Riverside Corporation (the "Group Home") As discussed in Note 8, the Foundation, Apartments, Estates, Uhrig Apartments, River Court Apartments, and Group Home are affiliated organizations of the Center US GAAP requires an organization with a controlling financial interest in an entity through direct or indirect ownership of a majority voting interest to consolidate that entity The Center's decision not to consolidate the Foundation, Apartments, Estates, Uhriq Apartments, River Court Apartments, and Group Home is a variance from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America The Center has not consolidated the Foundation, Apartments, Estates, Uhrig Apartments, River Court Apartments, and Group Home because the operations of these entities are separate from and not related to the Center's operations Additionally, these entities are not part of the obligated group under the Promissory Note, Series 2006, nor were they part of the obligated group under the Promissory Note, Series 1996 (see Note 5). The Bond Trustees under both obligations require audited financial statements of the obligated group only

If the Foundation, Apartments, Estates, Uhrig Apartments, River Court Apartments, and Group Home and other affiliated entities were consolidated with the Center, total assets would be increased by \$6,232,070 and \$3,994,228, long-term debt, including current maturities, would be increased by \$4,468,947 and \$1,983,273, and net assets would be increased by \$1,573,430 and \$1,974,849 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively Additionally, net revenues from operations would be increased by \$967,635 and \$567,531, and the change in net assets would be increased by \$222,568 and \$52,389 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively Condensed unaudited financial information of the Foundation, the Apartments, the Estates and other affiliated entities is presented in Note 8

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

<u>Financial Statement Presentation</u> The consolidated financial statements report the changes in, and totals of each net asset class based on the existence of donor restrictions, as applicable. Net assets are classified as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted and are detailed as follows

Unrestricted net assets represent the part of the net assets of the Center that is neither permanently restricted nor temporarily restricted by donor-imposed stipulations

Temporarily restricted net assets represent the part of the net assets of the Center resulting from contributions and other inflows of assets whose use by the Center is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that either expire by the passage of time or by actions of the Center There were no temporarily restricted net assets at June 30, 2011 and 2010

Permanently restricted net assets represent the part of the net assets of the Center resulting from contributions and other inflows of assets whose use by the Center is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by actions of the Center. The Center does not have permanently restricted net assets

Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period Areas where significant estimates, that are sensitive to change in the near term, are used in the accompanying financial statements include the allowance for doubtful accounts and bad debt expense, contractual allowances and discounts to report patient receivables at net realizable value, valuation of long-lived assets and other intangible assets, estimated third-party payor settlements, valuation of interest rate swaps, and accrued liability for self-funded medical claims. Actual results could differ from those estimates

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u> Cash and cash equivalents consist of bank deposits in accounts that are either interest bearing and federally insured up to \$250,000, or non-interest bearing and fully guaranteed by the federal government. Additionally, for purposes of the consolidated statement of cash flows, the Center considers all highly liquid investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, substantially all the Center's cash and cash equivalents were with one financial institution. At times amounts on deposit are in excess of federally insured limits, which represents a concentration of credit risk. However, management monitors this risk and believes the likelihood of loss to be remote.

<u>Patient Funds</u> The Center receives and holds personal funds of patients under an agency arrangement These personal funds are reported as an asset, with a corresponding amount reported as a liability in the consolidated statements of financial position

Patient Accounts Receivable: Patient accounts receivable represents the unpaid amounts billed to patients and third-party payors. Contractual adjustments, discounts and an allowance for doubtful accounts are recorded to report receivables for mental health care services at net realizable value. The allowance for contractual adjustments was \$1,174,300 and \$966,500 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Past due receivables are determined on contractual terms. The Center does not accrue interest on any of its patient accounts receivables. Patient accounts receivable from Medicare and Medicaid programs were approximately 55% and 52% of patient accounts receivable at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts
The allowance for doubtful accounts is determined by management based upon the Center's historical losses, specific patient circumstances and general economic conditions
Management evaluates the patient accounts receivable aging on a monthly basis and records a provision for bad debts based on current circumstances, and charges off receivables against the allowance when all attempts to collect the receivable are deemed to have failed in accordance with the Center's collection policy
Management believes the allowance for doubtful accounts of \$2,351,000 and \$1,515,400 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, is adequate to cover potential losses from uncollectible accounts

Property, Buildings, and Equipment. Property, buildings, and equipment are recorded at cost Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the applicable assets. Amortization of equipment capitalized under capital lease obligations is computed using the straight-line method over the term of the capital lease obligation. Interest costs incurred as part of the historical cost of acquiring certain buildings and equipment are capitalized and amortized over the lives of the asset.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets are to be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash and other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as temporarily restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service. All donated assets are valued at fair value. See note 5 for additional information

The Center has a capitalization policy that states all property and equipment in excess of \$500 are to be capitalized and depreciated

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets On an ongoing basis, the Center reviews long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or circumstances indicate that the carrying amounts may be overstated. The Center recognizes impairment losses if the undiscounted cash flows expected to be generated by the asset are less than the carrying value of the related asset. The impairment loss adjusts the assets to fair value. As of June 30, 2011 and 2010, management believes that no impairment existed.

Assets Whose Use Is Limited Assets limited as to use primarily include investments held by a trustee which qualify as cash and cash equivalents. These investments are stated at cost. Income on the investments held by the trustee is reported as interest income. See Note 5 for additional analysis of funds held by a trustee.

<u>Debt Issuance Costs</u> The debt issuance costs relate to the issuance of the Series 2006 Revenue Refunding and Improvement Bonds The total debt issuance costs incurred were \$384,616 and are being amortized by the effective interest method over the life of the related debt issue (see Note 5)

<u>Derivatives</u> The Center has entered into an interest rate swap agreement as part of its interest rate risk management strategy. Although the Center believes the swap agreement would qualify as a hedge, it has elected for simplicity to report the swap agreement as freestanding derivative. As a result, gains and losses are recognized in the Center's change in net assets

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

The swap agreement is separated into current and non-current assets, or liabilities, based on its expected cash flows. Cash inflows expected within one year, including derivative assets that the Center intends to settle, are reported as current assets. Cash inflows expected beyond one year are reported as non-current assets. Cash outflows expected within one year, including derivative liabilities in which the counterparty has the contractual right to settle, are reported as current liabilities. Cash outflows expected beyond one year are reported as non-current liabilities (See Note 6)

Net Patient Service Revenue: Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Revenue is recorded at the Center's established billing rates at the time services are performed and provides a specific level of patient financial assistance based on a patient's ability to pay. The difference is recorded as contractual allowances to reduce patient service revenue to a net realizable amount.

Medicare reimbursement for inpatient psychiatric services is based primarily on a combination of cost and prospective payment rates subject to certain limitations as defined by each program. The determination of cost requires interpretation of the applicable laws and regulations and the application of relatively complex cost accounting techniques. Such determinations are subject to audit and adjustment by the respective programs. Services rendered to program beneficiaries are included in patient service revenue at normal rates, and provisions for contractual allowances are recorded to reduce such revenue to estimated reimbursable amounts. Retroactively calculated contractual adjustments arising under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Center derived 62% and 54%, respectively, of its net patient service revenues from the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

<u>Charity Care</u> The Center has a policy to provide charity care for patients who meet certain criteria and do not have the financial ability to pay established rates. The Center does not record charity care as revenue, nor does it attempt to collect these fees. The Center maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care provided. These records are maintained at the Center's established rates for services and supplies provided under its charity care policy. Charges foregone for charity care at the Center's established rates were \$4,177,176 and \$3,482,891 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively

<u>Contributions</u>. Contributions are recognized in the year the Center receives a gift, or an unconditional promise to give from a donor. All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. If a restriction is fulfilled in the same accounting period in which the contribution is received, the contribution is reported as unrestricted

<u>Fair Value of Financial Instruments</u> As of June 30, 2011 and 2010, the carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, other receivables, accounts payable, and assets limited as to use approximate fair value because of the relatively short maturities of these financial instruments. The fair value of long-term debt (determined using discounted future cash flow, using interest rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements) approximated \$12,307,200 and \$12,443,500 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

<u>Income Taxes</u> OPC and OCMHC are not-for-profit organizations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and are exempt from federal and state income taxes pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code and corresponding state tax provisions

U.S. GAAP requires that a tax position is recognized as a benefit only if it is "more likely than not" that the tax position would be sustained in a tax examination, with a tax examination being presumed to occur. The amount recognized is the largest amount of tax benefit that is greater than 50% likely of being realized on examination. For tax positions not meeting the "more likely than not" test, no tax benefit is recorded.

Due to its tax-exempt status, the Center is not subject to U S federal income tax or state income tax. The Center's Form 990 has not been subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service or the state of Indiana for the last three years. The Center does not expect the total amount of unrecognized tax benefits to significantly change in the next 12 months. The Center recognizes interest and/or penalties related to income tax matters in income tax expense. The Center did not have any amounts accrued for interest and penalties at June 30, 2011 or 2010.

<u>Subsequent Events</u> Management has performed an analysis of the activities and transactions subsequent to June 30, 2011 to determine the need for any adjustments to and/or disclosures within the audited financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2011 Management has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through October 28, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued

The state of Indiana provides Medicaid disproportionate share payments ("DSH payments") to Indiana hospitals and healthcare providers (individually referred to as a "provider") meeting certain eligibility requirements. The amount of the basic DSH, which is based on a formula approved by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services requires certification of eligibility and is subject to a provider's specific limit, defined as the provider's Medicaid shortfall plus the costs of caring for uninsured patients less any payment received

The Center is eligible for basic DSH because of its status as a free-standing inpatient psychiatric facility, and the \$240,000 receivable at June 30, 2011 (\$65,000 at June 30, 2010) represents management's estimate of the basic DSH receivable as of the balance sheet date DSH funds are included in grants and other operating income

The Center has entered into several lease agreements for office equipment which are accounted for as capital leases. The cost of the capitalized leased equipment and the accumulated amortization totaled \$331,392 and \$281,683 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and June 30, 2010, respectively. As of June 30, 2010, the cost of the capitalized leased equipment and the accumulated amortization totaled \$331,392 and \$215,404, respectively. Amortization related to these leased assets totaled \$66,278 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and is included in depreciation and amortization expense of \$817,904 and \$889,346, respectively, within the consolidated statements of activities

The Center also has a lease agreement with Rest Haven, Inc. ("Rest Haven"), a not-for-profit organization Rest Haven was formed to provide a separate treatment facility for individuals of the Amish faith. Rest Haven solicited \$250,000 of donations from Amish individuals, churches and districts that were contributed to the Foundation which in turn contributed the solicited funds to the Center. In addition, Rest Haven coordinated the construction of the Rest Haven facility by obtaining donated services, machine hire, planning and labor having an agreed-upon value of \$150,000. The Center used the contributed funds to purchase materials for the construction of the Rest Haven facility. Under the terms of the lease agreement, which includes options to renew for an additional thirty-four years, at five year intervals, Rest Haven is currently leasing this facility from the Center for five-year term expiring December 31, 2011.

In consideration of the \$250,000 of cash contributions and the \$150,000 of noncash contributions, no specific amount of rent is required under the lease agreement. The lease agreement provides that in the event Rest Haven chooses not to renew the lease, the Center would be obligated to pay Rest Haven the unamortized balance, as defined, of the \$250,000. If the Center chooses to terminate the lease, the Center would be obligated to pay Rest Haven for the unamortized balance, as defined, of the \$400,000. The Center is accounting for the \$400,000 as deferred lease income to be amortized over the thirty-nine year period (initial lease term and all renewal periods). Deferred lease income at June 30, 2011 and 2010, aggregated \$302,564 and \$312,821, respectively

NOTE 4 - SHORT-TERM BORROWINGS

The Center had obtained a \$1.5 million bank line of credit from Charter One Bank, N A, a division of RBS Citizens, N A ("RBS") Borrowings under this line of credit were subject to a borrowing base of eligible receivables

Interest on outstanding borrowings was payable monthly at the RBS' prime rate plus 15%. The line of credit was collateralized by a first priority perfected security interest in the same collateral as was the direct pay letter of credit issued by RBS (see Note 5). The line of credit expired on November 30, 2010, and was not subsequently renewed.

On August 16, 2006, the Center was a party to a debt refinancing transaction, whereby the Hospital Authority of Elkhart County, Indiana (the "Authority") issued \$14,385,000 Series 2006, Adjustable Rate Demand Revenue Refunding and Improvement Bonds, (the "Series 2006 Bonds") The proceeds for the Series 2006 Bonds were loaned to the Center by the Authority under the terms of the Series 2006 Note between the Center and the Authority. The Center used the bond proceeds to pay off the \$12,360,000 promissory note under the Series 1996 Bonds to pay bond issuance costs and other costs associated with the debt refinancing transaction and the balance of the proceeds (held by trustee in the Project Fund) were available to finance the acquisition, construction, equipping and installation of renovations to the Center's health care facilities and related improvements

NOTE 5 - LONG-TERM DEBT (Continued)

Interest on the Series 2006 Note is payable monthly to the trustee at the interest rate or interest rates borne by the Series 2006 Bonds. The interest rate is calculated and adjusted weekly by the remarketing agent. The variable interest rate on the Series 2006 Bonds was 1.83% and 1.93% at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Center will have the option, with the approval of the bank and upon certain conditions, to convert on one or more occasions to a weekly, one-month, three-month, six-month, one-year, five-year or a fixed rate. In addition to monthly interest payments, the Center makes an annual principal payment to the trustee that began on August 1, 2007 and continues until maturity of the Series 2006 Bonds on August 1, 2031, subject to redemption or purchase prior to maturity. In connection with this debt refinancing transaction, the Center had entered into an interest rate swap agreement to exchange \$9,330,000 of floating rate debt for a fixed interest rate of 3.84% under the terms of the interest rate swap agreement. As a result of the deterioration of the financial markets this agreement was terminated on October 23, 2008. See Note 6 for more information.

The Series 2006 Bonds are limited obligations of the Authority and were collateralized under the terms of the Trust Indenture between the Authority and trustee and by a direct pay letter of credit that was to expire on August 15, 2011 in the initial principal amount of \$14,562,350, issued by RBS. The letter of credit was collateralized by a first priority perfected security interest in all existing and hereafter acquired assets of the Center, including receivables, equipment and real property.

During the year ended June 30, 2009, the impact of the deteriorating financial market also impacted the decreased credit-worthiness of RBS Citizens Bank, NA (dba Charter One) This resulted in a decreased rating of the Series 2006 Bonds, and required the purchase of the bonds out of the active market. On July 31, 2009 OPC executed a first amendment to the Trust Indenture and Loan Agreement and a new tax certificate and agreement in connection with the Series 2006 Bond Issue In lieu of seeking an extension to the existing direct pay letter of credit issued by RBS Citizens, NA, (dba Charter One Bank), this amendment provided for Charter One to purchase the bonds for its own investment portfolio amendments also provided for a new interest rate mode, the "Bank Purchase Mode", while the bonds are held by Charter One At the end of each Bank Purchase Period, which is defined as three (3) years from the date of closing and every five (5) years thereafter, there will be a mandatory tender following which the bonds may be remarketed in any other mode permissible under the bond indenture or in Bank Purchase Mode All other terms and conditions, including affirmative and negative covenants and financial covenants, as provided for in the Credit, Reimbursement and Pledge Agreement dated August 16, 2006, and amended from time to time remain in effect. These covenants include the maintenance of a required minimum days cash on hand, a required minimum operating margin and maintenance of a specified debt service coverage ratio As of June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Center was in compliance with all of the restrictive covenants.

During September 2010, the Center was named the community mental health center (CMHC) for St. Joseph County, Indiana by the Indiana Family and Social Services Agency, Division of Mental Health and Addictions (DMHA) During this process Madison Center, Inc (former St Joseph CMHC) transferred certain assets and liabilities to the Center Included, but not limited to, were two properties that had loans and/or grants associated with the properties. The HUD Supportive Housing Program Loan and the HOME Neighborhood Participation Program Loan both are related to the same piece of property. The Center assumed liability of the loans when Madison Center, Inc. transferred ownership in April 2011. The St Joseph County Housing Consortium Loan is related to another piece of property transferred from Madison Center, Inc. during September 2010.

NOTE 5 - LONG-TERM DEBT (Continued)

Both the HUD Supportive Housing Program Loan and the HOME Neighborhood Participation Program Loan are to mature June 30, 2026 The Federal Home Loan Bank Affordable Program of Indiana is set to mature September 1, 2011 As of the date of these financial statements, management believes they have met the criteria and no interest or principal payments are anticipated. All three loans bear no interest and repayment is not required as long as the housing projects remains available for the purpose stated in the grant and/or loan documents. If a default occurs under the terms of these loans, at the option of the holder of these loans, the entire principal and accrued interest should at once become due and payable without notice.

NOTE 6 - BOND INTEREST RATE SWAP

The Center had entered into an interest rate swap agreement pursuant to the terms of the 2006 Bond Issue. This interest rate swap agreement was scheduled to expire on August 1, 2025, and permitted the Center to exchange \$9.3 million of its floating rate debt for a fixed rate of 3.84%. However, due to the deterioration of the financial markets, the institution with which the Center had entered into the interest swap agreement, Lehman Brothers Special Financing, Inc., sought relief under the bankruptcy laws of the United States of America. This situation caused the Center to exercise its right to terminate the interest rate swap agreement with Lehman Brothers. The termination of the interest rate swap was effective October 23, 2008.

On November 24, 2008, a new interest rate swap agreement was entered into with RBS Citizens Bank, NA (dba Charter One) This agreement is effective for a period of ten years and has permitted the Center to exchange \$7 million of its floating rate debt for a fixed rate of 2 53%. Accordingly, the change in the net liability is recorded as an increase or decrease of unrestricted net assets in the current period. Based on the Center's derivative position at June 30, 2011 and 2010, a liability in the amount of \$289,696 and \$341,899 has been recorded, respectively, for the fair value of the interest rate swap agreement. The change in fair value of the liability was \$(52,203) and \$213,890 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively

NOTE 7 - RETIREMENT PLAN

The Center maintains a tax sheltered annuity plan, pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 403(b), for all eligible employees. The amount of the employer contributions to the plan represents a discretionary matching of employee contributions up to a maximum of 3% of participating employee salaries and wages. The employer stopped making the discretionary matching contributions effective 1/31/10 Expense under this plan aggregated \$0 and \$112,029 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Because the Center's plan is considered a church plan, it is not subject to the audit requirements prescribed for other 403(b) plans by the U.S. Department of Labor.

NOTE 8 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (UNAUDITED)

As previously mentioned, the Foundation, Apartments, Estates, Uhrig Apartments, River Court Apartments, and Group Home are considered related parties (affiliates) of OPC because certain of the officers and the directors of OPC serve in the same capacity for the Foundation, Apartments, Estates, Uhrig Apartments, River Court Apartments, and Group Home

The Foundation, a not-for-profit organization, solicits and receives contributions in support of programs operated by the Center and contributes such funds to the Center on a periodic basis. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, OPC has recognized a contribution receivable (included in other receivables) from the Foundation of \$7,600 and \$1,983, respectively, which represents pledges from the Foundation to OPC Contribution income from the Foundation aggregated \$259,750 and \$284,595 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively

The Apartments mortgage note is with the Federal Housing Administration ("FHA") under Section 207 pursuant to Section 223(f) of the National Housing Act, as amended. The original amount of the mortgage is \$964,900 and the loan agreement provides, among other items, the following: a term of 35 years maturing on April 1, 2042, an interest rate of 6 14% per annum, monthly principal and interest payments of \$5,593, monthly deposits to a reserve fund for replacing assets of the community, monthly deposits to a debt service savings escrow, and establishment of a repair escrow with an initial deposit of \$77,439. The liability of Oaklawn Apartments, Inc. is limited to the underlying value of the property and equipment collateral in addition to other amounts of deposit.

OPC has advanced funds to the Apartments to assist with payment of certain operating expenses. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, outstanding advances from OPC aggregated \$800 and \$3,410, respectively

During the year ended June 30, 2009, the Center assumed the oversight responsibilities of the Estates The Estates was organized to construct, own and operate a 12-unit apartment community in Elkhart, Indiana, pursuant to Section 811 of the National Affordable Housing Act, as amended. The Estates has executed a regulatory agreement with HUD which governs the operation of the Estates with the Federal Housing Administration Section of HUD. The Estates has also entered into a Project Rental Assistance Contract with HUD. The contract expires on October 26, 2011.

The Estates has entered into a Capital Advance Program Mortgage Note (the "Note") for a capital advance in the amount of \$1,045,800. The Note bears no interest and repayment is not required as long as the housing project remains available for very low-income persons with disabilities in accordance with Section 811 of the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990 and the Project Rental Assistance Contract and is operated in accordance with the Regulatory Agreement and HUD Regulations. The Note is secured by the mortgage upon the land, building and equipment and other amounts held by the Estates

<u>Self Insurance Plan</u> OPC is a member of a pooled self insurance plan. Pursuant to the plan agreement, each member is required to make monthly contributions to the plan's administrator that are available to satisfy the insurance claims of each members' participating employees. The plan calls for all claims to be paid out of the pool, but once any individual's aggregated claims exceed \$250,000, the plan's stop-loss amount, for June 30, 2011 and 2010, all remaining claims for that individual are covered under the plan's insurance. Each member is directly responsible for claims up to a maximum dollar amount. The level set for such exposure impacts the contributions paid by the members. As of June 30, 2011, OPC has elected to be directly responsible for claims up to \$116,000 per individual (\$102,000 per individual at June 30, 2010). Any claims in excess of \$116,000, but less than \$250,000, are paid out of the members' pooled funds (\$102,000 at June 30, 2010).

<u>Litigation</u> The Center is involved in litigation and routine regulatory surveys arising in the course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Center's future financial position or results from operations.

<u>Third-Party Payor Audit</u>. During the year ended June 30, 2005, the Center was the subject of a retrospective audit of its Medicaid reimbursement claims submitted during the period October 1, 2001 through December 31, 2002. This audit resulted in the issuance of a determination letter dated December 3, 2004 requesting a repayment by the Center of \$1.1 million, plus accrued interest. The Center and its legal counsel filed a request for administrative appeal of that determination in accordance with Indiana law and the matter was assigned to an administrative law judge.

In July 2007, the Center underwent another retrospective audit of its Medicaid reimbursement claims for the period January 1, 2005 through March 31, 2006. This audit resulted in a final determination notice dated May 7, 2008 requesting a repayment by the Center of \$17,138, which included \$1,114 in interest. This notice was in response to the Center's rebuttal to the initial request for a repayment of \$146,757 based on the results of the July audit. Since the final settlement amount was reduced to the \$17,138, the Center has not requested an administrative appeal of that determination.

During the year ended June 30, 2010, an agreement was reached regarding the filed appeal relating to the Medicaid reimbursement claims audit conducted during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005. As a result, the Center paid \$175,090 to the State of Indiana. The recorded estimated liability related to the appeal was \$810,450. The difference between the recorded liability and paid amount was recognized as income during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010.

Management believes the existing accrual for the estimated third party payor audits are adequate to provide for the ultimate resolution of any exposure related to potential audits of the years subject to audit as of the year ended June 30, 2011.

<u>Grants</u> As of the year ended June 30, 2011, the Center has agreements relating to two properties for which grant monies have been received. There are certain restrictions on these properties, and if those restrictions are not met, the Center will be obligated to repay all or part of the original grant amounts

NOTE 10 - ACCRUED INTEREST RATE SWAP SETTLEMENT

The Organization is involved in a lawsuit relating to the allegedly improper termination of certain interest rate swap transactions and certain transaction confirmations relating thereto. Claims have been asserted in the form of a Derivatives Alternative Dispute Resolution Notice and a liability of \$820,000 was recorded by the Organization for the year ended June 30, 2011, as a reasonable estimate of the total liability that will be incurred.

NOTE 12 - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

U S GAAP defines fair value as the price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the Center's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date

This guidance establishes a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

Level 1 Inputs Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Center has the ability to access as of the measurement date. The fair values of debt and equity investments that are readily marketable are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges. The Center has no financial instruments utilizing level 1 inputs

Level 2 Inputs Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted price for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data

Level 3 Inputs Significant unobservable inputs that reflect a reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability. The Center has no financial instruments utilizing level 1 inputs

In many cases, a valuation technique used to measure fair value includes inputs from multiple levels of the fair value hierarchy. The lowest level of significant input determines the placement of the entire fair value measurement in the hierarchy.

The derivative instruments consist of the interest rate swap. The fair value of the derivatives is determined based on the relative values of the fixed and floating rate portions of the interest rate contracts. The valuation model utilized involves current interest rates, projected yield curves and volatility factors to determine the fair value of the instruments as of the date of measurement. As such, significant fair value inputs can generally be verified and do not involve significant management judgments (Level 2 inputs).

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

Management of Oaklawn Psychiatric Center is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting. In planning and performing our audit, we considered Oaklawn Psychiatric Center's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Oaklawn Psychiatric Center's internal control over financial reporting.
