

Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, and evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of Munson Healthcare and Subsidiaries as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, and the consolidated results of their operations and their cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

June 30, 2011

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity and Corporate Structure

Munson Healthcare is a non-profit parent company and is responsible for the governance and management of its subsidiaries which provide primary, secondary, and tertiary care to residents of the northern portion of Michigan's Lower Peninsula. The overall mission of Munson Healthcare is to work with its partners to provide superior quality care and promote community health.

Basis of Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the parent and its subsidiaries (collectively, the Organization): Munson Healthcare; Munson Medical Center (Hospital) and its wholly owned subsidiaries, Munson Support Services and Munson Medical Group (see Note 12); Paul Oliver Memorial Hospital and its wholly owned subsidiary, Paul Oliver Memorial Hospital Foundation; Munson Home Health and its wholly owned subsidiaries, Munson Home Care and Munson Home Services; Munson Services, Inc. and its wholly owned subsidiary, Sixth Street Drugs; North Flight, Inc.; Munson Mobile Imaging, Inc.; Munson Healthcare Regional Foundation; Munson Dialysis Center; Munson Medical Building Partnership; and Northern Michigan Supply Alliance, L.L.C. All material intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Although actual results could differ from those estimates, management believes estimated amounts recorded are reasonable and appropriate.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and investments in highly liquid investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding those amounts included in investments.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Reclassifications

Certain amounts previously reported in 2010 have been reclassified to conform with the presentation used in 2011.

Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services provided and include estimated retroactive revenue adjustments due to future audits and reviews. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known. Net patient service revenue increased by \$4.0 million and \$1.2 million for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, related to changes in estimated third-party settlements for prior years.

A significant portion of the Organization's services is provided to patients under Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan, and other agreements with third-party contractual agencies. Such contracts provide for payment or reimbursement to the Organization at other-than-standard charges. For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, approximately 80.6% and 81.4%, respectively, of the Organization's net patient service revenue is received from the Medicare, Medicaid, and Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan programs. Estimated settlements have been reflected in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets for differences between interim payments and the total payments to be received under the contracts.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action, including fines, penalties, and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

Inventories

Inventories, consisting primarily of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals, are stated at the lower of cost or market value.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets. For the purpose of recognizing investment returns as a component of excess of revenues over expenses, substantially all the Organization's investments are considered to be trading securities. Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenue over expenses unless a donor or law restricts the income or loss. Gains or losses with respect to disposition of marketable securities are based on the specific identification method.

Equity securities expose the Organization to market risk, performance risk, and liquidity risk. Market risk is the risk associated with major movements of the equity markets, both foreign and domestic. Performance risk is that risk associated with a company's operating performance. Liquidity risk tends to be higher for foreign equities and equities related to small capitalization companies.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost, if purchased, or at fair market value at the date of donation. Depreciation on property and equipment, excluding construction-in-progress, is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The general range of estimated useful lives of the assets is twenty to forty years for buildings, ten to twenty years for land improvements and three to ten years for equipment. Outlays for construction-in-progress are capitalized as incurred.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Asset Impairment

The Organization considers whether indicators of impairment are present and performs the necessary test to determine if the carrying value of an asset is appropriate. Impairment writedowns, except for those related to investments, are recognized in operating income at the time the impairment is identified.

Other Assets, Including Intangible Assets

Other assets consist of deferred charges, which represent bond issuance costs that are being amortized over the term of the bonds, intangible assets, and an interest in a closely held medical liability insurer and integrated risk management company valued at cost.

In connection with business combinations, the Organization has recorded goodwill and definite-lived intangible assets on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. The Organization reviews annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances suggest impairment may have occurred, the carrying value of the goodwill and intangible assets for impairment and to determine if an adjustment, for definite-lived intangibles, to the amortization period is necessary. If circumstances suggest that the recorded amounts of any of these assets cannot be recovered, the carrying values of such assets are reduced to fair value. If the carrying value of any of these assets is impaired, a material charge may be incurred to results of operations. It has been determined that there was no significant impairment to intangible assets, including goodwill, as of June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Derivative Financial Instruments

The Organization has entered into interest rate swap agreements with banks to manage its investments and capitalization, including risks associated with changes in interest rates. The Organization records its derivative instruments as either assets or liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at fair value. The cash flows associated with the swap agreements flow through other operating expenses on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. The unrealized derivative gain or loss related to the change in fair value is included in swap market value changes on the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as part of excess of revenue over expenses.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Net Assets

Net assets of the Organization are classified as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted depending on the presence and characteristics of donor-imposed restrictions limiting the Organization's ability to use or dispose of contributed assets or the economic benefits embodied in those assets. Donor-imposed restrictions that expire with the passage of time or that can be removed by meeting certain requirements result in temporarily restricted net assets. Permanently restricted net assets are endowment funds to be held in perpetuity by the Organization. Earnings, gains, and losses on restricted net assets are classified as unrestricted unless specifically restricted by the donor or by applicable state law.

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Organization are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets.

In fiscal 2009, the Organization became aware of its historical ownership interest in a privately held company and recorded the original \$3,743,000 cost basis of this investment in the consolidated statement of changes in net assets for the year ended June 30, 2009. In fiscal 2010, the Organization divested its entire ownership interest in this company and recognized a gain of \$6,388,179 within other gain (loss), net.

Operating Indicator

The Organization's operating indicator (operating income) includes all net patient service revenues and other revenues and expenses from the Organization's operations for the reporting period. The operating indicator excludes other gain (loss), net and swap market value changes.

Performance Indicator

The Organization's performance indicator (excess of revenue over expenses) includes all changes in unrestricted net assets other than transfers to affiliates, net assets released from restrictions, and pension and other postretirement benefit-related changes other than net periodic pension costs.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Amount Received From Shared Services

Total operating expenses are reduced by the amount reported as less shared services revenue, which represents revenue received from affiliates and other health care providers for the purchase of goods and services. The expenses related to this revenue are included in the operating expense line items.

Charity Care

The Organization provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because the Organization does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. Gross charges for charity care for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010 were \$20,588,422 and \$21,082,995, respectively.

Tax Status

All entities are tax-exempt under various provisions under the Internal Revenue Code except for Munson Support Services; Munson Services, Inc.; Sixth Street Drugs, Inc.; Munson Medical Building Partnership; and Northern Michigan Supply Alliance, L.L.C. Any tax provision for these entities is not material to the overall consolidated financial statements.

Adoption of New Accounting Standards

Effective for the year ended June 30, 2011, the Organization adopted new accounting guidance related to fair value measurement and disclosures. The amended guidance requires reporting entities to disclose additional information regarding assets and liabilities that are transferred between levels of the fair value hierarchy. Reporting entities are also required to disclose information in the Level 3 reconciliation regarding purchases, sales, issuances, and settlements on a gross basis. In addition to these new disclosure requirements, the new guidance further clarifies existing guidance pertaining to the level of disaggregation at which fair value disclosures should be made and the requirements to disclose information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in estimating Level 2 and Level 3 fair value measurements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Accounting guidance was recently issued for mergers and acquisitions involving not-for-profit entities. This guidance establishes principles to assist not-for-profit entities in determining if a combination is to be accounted for as a merger or an acquisition. The guidance applies the carryover (similar to pooling) method to accounting for a merger, and the purchase accounting method to accounting for an acquisition, and clarifies the valuation basis to be used in determining the values of the assets and liabilities acquired. In addition, this guidance makes provisions related to goodwill fully applicable to not-for-profit entities. Effective July 1, 2010, the Organization adopted this guidance.

Recently Issued Accounting Standards Not Yet Adopted

In August 2010, new accounting guidance was issued that requires cost to be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes and, for those purposes, defines cost as the direct and indirect costs of providing charity care. This guidance also requires disclosure of the method used to identify and determine costs. This guidance is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010. The Organization is currently evaluating the impact of adoption of this guidance on its consolidated financial position and results of operations, but the impact is not expected to be material.

In August 2010, new accounting guidance was issued that clarifies that expected insurance recoveries of health care entities should be reported separately from the related claim liability. In addition, the claim liability is determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. A cumulative-effect adjustment is to be recognized in the opening net assets in the period of adoption if a difference exists between any liabilities and insurance receivables recorded as a result of applying this new guidance. This guidance is effective for annual or interim periods beginning after December 15, 2010. The Organization is currently evaluating the impact of adoption of this guidance on its consolidated financial position and results of operations, but the impact is not expected to be material.

In July 2011, new accounting guidance was issued that requires health care entities change the presentation of their statements of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts). Additionally, enhanced disclosures will be required related to the entity's policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. The guidance is effective for fiscal years and interim periods within those fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2011. The Organization is evaluating the effect of adoption and does not consider that its adoption will have a material effect on its consolidated financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Health Care Legislation

In March 2010, Congress adopted comprehensive health care insurance legislation, the Patient Care Protection and Affordable Care Act and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act. This legislation, among other matters, is designed to expand access to coverage to substantially all citizens by 2019 through a combination of public program expansion and private industry health insurance. Changes to existing Medicare and Medicaid coverages and payments also are expected to occur as a result of this legislation. Regulations to implement these legislative acts are in the process of being developed, and accordingly, the specific impact of the legislation on the Organization is not determinable at this time.

2. Accounts Receivable

The Organization provides health care services through inpatient, outpatient, and ambulatory care facilities and grants credit to patients, substantially all of whom are local residents in the communities served by the Organization. The Organization generally does not require collateral or other security in extending credit to patients; however, it routinely obtains assignment of (or is otherwise entitled to receive) patients' benefits payable under their health insurance program, plans, or policies, including, but not limited to, Medicare, Medicaid, health maintenance organizations, and commercial insurance policies.

The allowance for uncollectible accounts is based upon management's assessment of historical and expected net collections considering business and general economic conditions in its service area, trends in health care coverage, and other collection indicators. Throughout the year, management assesses the adequacy of the allowance for uncollectible accounts based upon historical write-off experience by payor category and other factors. The results of these reviews are then used to make any modifications to the provision for uncollectible accounts to establish an appropriate allowance for uncollectible accounts. The Organization follows established guidelines for placing certain past-due patient balances with collection agencies.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

2. Accounts Receivable (continued)

The Hospital has a program of factoring accounts receivable with recourse to a third party. The Hospital is obligated to repurchase factored receivables upon occurrence of certain conditions of the program. Accordingly, the Hospital accounts for the factoring as a secured borrowing, maintaining the factored receivables within other current assets, at their net realizable value until receivables are collected by the third party. As of June 30, 2011 and 2010, a total of \$4,472,281 and \$4,170,804, respectively, of accounts receivable has been factored and still has recourse potential. The Hospital has an allowance for recourse of \$700,000 and \$1,080,000 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Total factored receivables for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010 were \$7,918,934 and \$8,989,492, respectively.

Due to changing market conditions, the interest rates for the variable rate notes relating to the Organization's Dutch auction rate securities (Series 2001A, 2002A, 2005A, 2005B) reset at a higher rate. The resetting of the interest rate occurs periodically every 7 to 28 days subject to the results of the auction process and is established based on the then-outstanding market conditions, which can increase or decrease the interest rate but cannot exceed 125% of the high-grade commercial paper rate for Series 2001A, 2005A, and 2005B and 150% of the high-grade commercial paper rate for Series 2002A.

Under the provisions of the master trust indenture for the Series 2005A and 2005B, the bond insurer may give notice to the Organization to convert the bonds to a fixed interest rate. 7. Interest Rate Swap Agreements

The Organization has entered into fixed payor and basis interest rate swap agreements to manage interest rate risk exposure. The fixed payor interest rate swap agreement used by the Organization effectively modifies the Organization's exposure to interest rate risk by converting the Organization's floating rate debt to a fixed rate basis for the next 12 to 25 years, thus reducing the effect of interest rate changes on future interest expense. These agreements involve the receipt of floating rate amounts in exchange for fixed rate interest payments over the life of the agreement without an exchange of the underlying principal amount. The Organization's basis swap derivative instrument contains provisions that require the Organization's debt to maintain an investment grade credit rating from each of the major credit rating agencies. If, on the measurement date, the Organization's debt was to fall below investment grade and the derivative instruments were in a net liability position in an amount exceeding a stated threshold, the counterparties to the derivative instrument could request immediate and ongoing full overnight collateralization. For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Organization's basis swap was in a positive position, requiring no collateral to be posted for either of the years.

The Organization's fixed payor swap derivative instruments are insured and do not contain collateralization requirements. Under these interest rate swap transactions, various early termination events may occur, triggering an early termination payment. An early termination event occurs upon the happening of the Organization's rating downgrade and non-performance or the rating downgrade of the swap insurer, as specified in the swap agreement.

The net interest rate swaps are recorded in other liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

The cash flows associated with the swap agreements flow through other operating expenses on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets in the amount of \$1,575,086 and \$1,458,347 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The changes in fair value are reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as part of excess of revenue over expenses. The unrealized loss in fair value of the basis swaps decreased by \$1,763,406 and increased by \$2,199,521 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

8. Fair Value Measurements

Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, provides a framework for measuring fair value of certain assets and liabilities and expands disclosures about fair value measurements. As defined in ASC 820, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. ASC 820 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurement).

The carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, third party settlements, and accounts payable are reasonable estimates of fair value due to the short-term nature of these financial instruments. Investments are recorded at their fair value. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, the fair value of the Organization's long-term debt as estimated by discounted cash flow analyses using current borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements and adjusted for credit was approximately \$131,560,000 and \$135,260,000, respectively (see Note 6).

Certain of the Organization's financial assets are measured at fair value on a recurring basis, including money market and fixed income and equity instruments. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy and a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value are as follows:

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date. Level 1 primarily consists of cash and financial instruments such as money market securities and listed equities.

Level 2 – Pricing inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are either directly observable or that can be derived or supported from observable data as of the reporting date. Instruments in this category include certain U.S. government agency and sponsored entity debt securities and interest rate swap contracts.

Level 3 – Pricing inputs include those that are significant to the fair value of the financial asset or financial liability and are not observable from objective sources. These inputs may be used with internally developed methodologies that result in management's best estimate of fair value.

The methods previously described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different estimate of fair value at the reporting date.

9. Medical Malpractice Claims

Based on the nature of its operations, the Organization is at times subject to pending or threatened legal actions that arise in the normal course of its activities.

The Organization is insured against medical malpractice claims under a claims-made policy, whereby only the claims reported to the insurance carrier during the policy period are covered regardless of when the incident giving rise to the claim occurred. Terms of the policy require the Organization to be responsible for a deductible. The Organization also bears the risk of the ultimate costs of any individual claims exceeding the policy limits for claims asserted in the policy year. In addition to the primary layer of medical malpractice coverage, the Organization maintains a secondary layer of coverage through a segregated portfolio in an offshore captive insurance company. An umbrella policy provides additional coverage in addition to the primary and secondary layers. The reserve for estimated malpractice claims, recorded as other liabilities on the balance sheet, was \$3,437,000 and \$1,185,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, including deductibles.

If the claims-made policy was not renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on the occurrences during the claims-made term, but reported subsequently, would be uninsured.

The Organization is not aware of any medical malpractice claims, either asserted or unasserted, that would exceed the policy limits. No claims have been settled during the past three years that have exceeded policy coverage limits. The cost of the Organization's insurance policy and any deductibles paid represent the Organization's cost for such claims for the year and have been charged to operations as a current expense.

10. Retirement Plans

Munson Medical Center maintains a defined benefit pension plan and two separate retirement savings plans (RSP) covering substantially all of its employees as well as employees of certain affiliates. Munson Medical Center bills its affiliates for pension costs based on a percentage of covered wages.

Munson Medical Center maintains two separate RSPs.

The first plan is for employees who continue to accrue benefits under the defined benefit plan. Prior to August 28, 2009, this plan allowed for an employer-matching contribution up to a maximum of 50% of the participants' deferrals that did not exceed 2% of compensation. Subsequent to August 28, 2009, the employer-matching contribution was eliminated.

The second plan allows for an employer-matching contribution up to a maximum of 100% of the participants' deferrals that did not exceed 3% of compensation prior to August 28, 2009, and 67% of the participants' deferrals that did not exceed 3% of compensation subsequent to August 28, 2009, with an additional 3% discretionary contribution at year-end. All employees who chose to freeze their benefit accruals in the Organization's defined benefit pension plan, employees hired after January 1, 2006, and those employees hired during 2005 who did not meet the eligibility requirements of the defined benefit plan, participate in the second plan. Accrued pension expense includes \$1,082,379 and \$2,746,270 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for this plan.

Expenses charged to operations under these plans were \$3,825,305 and \$6,008,219 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

11. Postretirement Benefit Obligation

The Organization has a postretirement health plan that benefits certain employees. Substantially all of the Organization's employees hired prior to December 31, 2005, may become eligible for benefits if they have ten years of service after age 45. Under provisions of the plan, the Organization's liability is limited to a fixed amount per retiree; retirees are required to make monthly contributions and are liable for any increase in the cost of health care benefits. The plan is not funded. Employees hired after December 31, 2005, are not eligible for the plan, as participation in the plan has been frozen as of that date.

At June 30, 2010, the percentage of active employees anticipated to participate in the plan was changed from 85% to 40% to better reflect recent and future experience.

In January 2011, the Hospital entered into agreements to integrate with two physician groups and formed Munson Medical Group (a subsidiary of the Hospital). The integrations were designed to enable the Hospital to provide the patients and communities served with improved delivery of cardiology services.

All of these transactions were accounted as acquisitions with the operating results included in the consolidated financial statements from the date of integration forward. Total consideration paid for these acquisitions totaled \$13,102,601, net of cash acquired. The allocation of the purchase price included \$506,139 of net current assets, \$4,785,000 of goodwill and other intangible assets, and \$7,811,462 of property and equipment.

The allocations were generally based on the fair value of these assets determined using the cost approach. These fair value measurements were based on significant inputs not observable in the market and thus represent Level 3 fair value measurements.

13. Functional Expenses

The Organization provides inpatient, outpatient, and long-term health care services to patients in northwest Michigan. Expenses related to providing these services for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, are as follows:

14. Subsequent Events

The Organization evaluated events and transactions occurring subsequent to June 30, 2011, through September 21, 2011, the date of issuance of the consolidated financial statements. During this period, there were no subsequent events requiring recognition in the consolidated financial statements. In August 2011, the Obligated Group advance refunded the Series 1998A, Series 2001A, Series 2002A, Series 2005A, and Series 2005B (detailed in Note 6) and terminated swaps related to Series 2002A and 2005A (detailed in Note 7) with proceeds from the County of Grand Traverse Hospital Finance Authority Revenue Refunding Bonds Series 2011A (\$81,520,000), the County of Grand Traverse Hospital Finance Authority Variable Rate Revenue Refunding Bonds Series 2011B (\$24,825,000), and the County of Grand Traverse Hospital Finance Authority Revenue Refunding Bonds Series 2011C (\$22,000,000).

Effective July 1, 2011, Munson Mobile Imaging, Inc. was removed from the Obligated Group.
