### Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Principal Business Activity and Principles of Consolidation

Agnesian HealthCare, Inc ("Agnesian HealthCare") is a tax-exempt, nonstock corporation owned and operated by the Congregation of Sisters of St. Agnes of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin (the "Congregation"), a religious community of women within the Roman Catholic Church

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Agnesian HealthCare, Inc. and its affiliates (collectively "Agnesian"). All significant intercompany balances have been eliminated in consolidation. Following is a brief description of each organization.

- Agnesian HealthCare, Inc. operates St. Agnes Hospital ("St. Agnes"), a 167-bed general acute care hospital, which provides inpatient and outpatient hospital services, inpatient psychiatric services, physician services, and home health services primarily to residents of Fond du Lac and Dodge counties
- Agnesian HealthCare, Inc. is the sole corporate member of Waupun Memorial Hospital, Inc. ("Waupun"), St. Francis Home of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, Inc. ("St. Francis Home"), and is 100% owner of Consultants Laboratory of Wisconsin, LLC. ("Consultants Lab") and Agnesian HealthCare Enterprises, LLC ("Enterprises")

Effective June 1, 2011, Agnesian HealthCare, Inc. affiliated with Ripon Medical Center, Inc. ("Ripon") and became the sole corporate member of Ripon Agnesian HealthCare, Inc. was also the sole corporate member of Fond du Lac Surgery Center, LLC ("Fond du Lac Surgery Center") through October 1, 2009, at which time Fond du Lac Surgery Center was dissolved as described below

 Waupun operates a Medicare-certified, 25-bed critical access hospital, which provides inpatient and outpatient services to residents of Fond du Lac and Dodge counties

Principal Business Activity and Principles of Consolidation (Continued)

- Ripon operates a Medicare certified, 25-bed CAH, which provides comprehensive inpatient medical and surgical services, as well as outpatient, emergency, and professional services to residents of Fond du Lac County and the surrounding area Ripon also operates a number of primary care and specialty medical clinics
- Consultants Lab is a limited liability corporation that provides clinical laboratory services to customers located primarily in central and southern Wisconsin A majority of Consultants Lab's services are provided to Agnesian
- St Francis Home is a tax-exempt corporation which operates a 107-bed skilled nursing facility and a facility for senior residents which includes 30 independent living units and 123 assisted living units. St Francis Home serves residents of Fond du Lac and the surrounding area.
- Enterprises is a limited liability corporation that operates retail pharmacies and sells and rents durable medical equipment. Enterprises serves residents of Fond du Lac, Waupun, and the surrounding area
- Fond du Lac Surgery Center was a limited liability corporation designed for
  patients requiring surgery who can be accommodated without an overnight stay
  It is located four miles from St. Agnes. During fiscal year 2010, Fond du Lac
  Surgery Center was dissolved, and all assets and liabilities were transferred to
  Agnesian HealthCare

#### Financial Statement Presentation

Agnesian follows accounting standards contained in the Financial Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) The ASC is the single source of authoritative accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) to be applied to nongovernmental entities in the preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP

#### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

## Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Use of Estimates in Preparation of Consolidated Financial Statements

The preparation of the accompanying consolidated financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that directly affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from these estimates

Agnesian considers critical accounting estimates to be those that require more significant judgments and include the allowance for contractual adjustments and doubtful accounts, amounts due to/from third-party reimbursement programs, reserves for losses and expenses related to self-funded health insurance, and the liability associated with the professional services agreement (PSA) with Fond du Lac Regional Clinic, S C (FDLRC SC)

#### Cash Equivalents

Agnesian considers money market funds and all highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents, excluding amounts held as short-term investments in Agnesian's investment portfolio and amounts limited as to use or restricted

#### Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy

Accounts receivable are uncollateralized patient obligations that are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. These obligations are primarily from local residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. Agnesian bills third-party payors on the patients' behalf, or if a patient is uninsured, the patient is billed directly. Once claims are settled with the primary payor, any secondary insurance is billed, and patients are billed for copay and deductible amounts that are the patients' responsibility. Payments on accounts receivable are applied to the specific claim identified on the remittance advice or statement. Agnesian does not have a policy to charge interest on past due accounts.

#### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

## Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy (Continued)

The carrying amounts of accounts receivable are reduced by allowances that reflect management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected. Management provides for contractual adjustments under terms of third-party reimbursement agreements through a charge to contractual adjustments and a credit to the allowance for contractual adjustments. In addition, management provides for probable uncollectible amounts, primarily from uninsured patients and amounts patients are personally responsible for, through a charge to operations and a credit to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of historical collection likelihood and the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable.

Accounts receivable are recorded in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets net of contractual adjustments and allowance for doubtful accounts

#### Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost, determined on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method, or market

Investments and Investment Income

Investments are measured at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets

Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is reported as other income and is included in excess of revenue over expenses unless the income is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses unless the investments are trading securities. Realized gains and losses are determined by specific identification.

Agnesian monitors the difference between the cost and fair value of its investments. A decline in market value of an individual investment security below cost that is deemed to be other-than-temporary results in an impairment, and Agnesian reduces the investment's carrying value to fair value. A new cost basis is established for the investment, and any impairment loss is recorded as a realized loss in investment income.

#### Fair Value Measurements

ASC Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that Agnesian has the ability to access

Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement Valuation techniques used maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use represent investments set aside under terms of bond trust indenture agreements, investments held in trust under deferred compensation agreements, investments set aside to fund restricted donations, and investments set aside by the Board of Directors for resident refunds

Property, Equipment, and Depreciation

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost if purchased, fair value at date received if contributed, or net book value if transferred from a related party. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is generally computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included with depreciation expense in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Estimated useful lives range from 5 to 25 years for land improvements, 5 to 40 years for buildings and building improvements, 3 to 23 years for movable equipment, and 5 to 10 years for automobiles.

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets in accordance with ASC Topic 835-20, *Capitalization of Interest Cost* 

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

## Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Asset Retirement Obligations

ASC Topic 410-20, *Asset Retirement Obligations*, clarifies when an entity is required to recognize a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation. Agnesian has considered ASC Topic 410-20, specifically as it relates to its legal obligation to perform asset retirement activities, such as asbestos removal, on its existing properties. Agnesian believes there is an indeterminate settlement date for the asset retirement obligations because the range of time over which Agnesian may settle the obligation is unknown and cannot be estimated. As a result, Agnesian cannot reasonably estimate the liability related to these asset retirement activities as of June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Interest in Net Assets of Foundations

Agnesian is financially interrelated with Agnesian HealthCare Foundation, Inc. ("Agnesian Foundation") and, as of June 1, 2011, Foundation for Ripon Medical Center, Inc. ("Ripon Foundation") Accordingly, Agnesian recognizes its interest in the net assets of Agnesian Foundation and Ripon Foundation and adjusts its interest for its share of the change in net assets of the foundations in accordance with ASC Topic 958-20, *Financially Interrelated Entities* 

Investment in Unconsolidated Affiliate

Investment in unconsolidated affiliate is accounted for using the equity method

**Deferred Financing Costs** 

Costs related to issuance of long-term debt are amortized over the life of the related debt using the straight-line method

## Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Intangibles

Intangibles represent the amount paid for goodwill, noncompete agreements, tradenames, and other intangible assets acquired during business acquisitions. Prior to July 1, 2010, all intangibles assets were amortized on a straight-line basis over 2 to 15 years. Effective July 1, 2010, in accordance with ASC Topic 350-20, *Intangibles – Goodwill and Other*, goodwill and other intangible assets deemed to have indefinite lives are not amortized. Goodwill is subject to tests for impairment at least annually. For purpose of assessing the impairment, Agnesian evaluates goodwill at each reporting entity's level. Agnesian estimates the fair value of the reporting unit, which includes the allocated goodwill. For the purposes of these analyses, Agnesian estimates fair value primarily using the multiplier and discounted cash flow approaches. Agnesian performed its annual impairment tests of goodwill at June 30, 2011, and concluded that no goodwill impairment charge was required as a result of these analyses.

#### Impairment

Agnesian reviews its property, equipment, and intangible assets periodically to determine potential impairment. If an impairment exists, an impairment loss is recognized Management has determined no assets were impaired at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Interest Rate Swap

Agnesian uses a derivative instrument to manage its risk related to interest rate movements Agnesian's interest rate risk management strategy is to stabilize cash flow requirements by maintaining the interest rate swap contract to convert a portion of its variable rate debt to a fixed rate. At the inception of the agreement, Agnesian HealthCare documented its risk management strategy and the hedge's effectiveness. The interest rate swap was deemed to be effective in achieving this objective and was designated as a cash flow hedge. Under a cash flow hedge, the change in fair value of the derivative related to the effective portion of the hedge is recorded as a change in unrestricted net assets. Any ineffective portion would be reported as other income (expense) If the ineffectiveness of the hedge exceeds certain prescribed levels, the derivative would no longer be eligible for hedge accounting, and all future changes in fair value of the derivative would be reported in other income or expense in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets, and the change that was recorded through net assets from the beginning of the interest rate swap would be amortized into earnings over the remaining life of the swap. In the event the interest rate swap is terminated, the total amount that was recorded in net assets from the beginning of the interest rate swap would be reclassified into earnings

#### **Net Assets**

Unrestricted net assets consist of investments and otherwise unrestricted amounts that are available for use in carrying out Agnesian's mission and include those expendable resources which have been designated for special use by the Board of Directors Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets are those restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity

#### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

## Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Excess of Revenue Over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include the classification excess of revenue over expenses, which is considered the operating indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from the operating indicator, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, the effective portion of the interest rate swap valuation adjustment, permanent transfer of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets

#### Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

#### Community Care

Agnesian provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its community care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates

Agnesian maintains records to identify and monitor the level of community care it provides. These records include the amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under the community care policy.

Agnesian also provides substantial community benefit through the provision of services to individuals supported by public programs such as Medicaid These services are provided at reimbursement levels that are substantially below Agnesian's established rates

**Donor-Restricted Gifts** 

Contributions are considered available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to Agnesian are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions

Unemployment Compensation

Agnesian has elected reimbursement financing under provisions of the Wisconsin unemployment compensation laws. Unemployment compensation claims are paid to the State of Wisconsin as incurred. Agnesian has obtained a letter of credit of approximately \$1,074,000 to meet state funding requirements.

Income Taxes

Agnesian HealthCare, Waupun, St. Francis Home, and Ripon are tax-exempt corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and are exempt from federal income tax on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. Agnesian HealthCare, Waupun, St. Francis Home, and Ripon are also exempt from state income tax on related income.

Income Taxes (Continued)

Enterprises and Consultants Lab are limited liability corporations. Enterprises and Consultants Lab's income or loss is required to be reported on Agnesian HealthCare's tax returns. Agnesian pays tax on certain activities considered taxable in accordance with Code regulations.

In order to account for any uncertain tax positions, ASC Topic 740, *Income Taxes*, requires an organization to assess whether it is more likely than not that a tax position will be sustained upon examination of the technical merits of the position, assuming the taxing authority has full knowledge of all information. If the tax position does not meet the more-likely-than-not recognition threshold, the benefit of the tax position is not recognized in the financial statements

Agnesian recorded no assets or liabilities for uncertain tax positions or unrecognized tax benefits. Federal returns for the years ended 2008 and beyond remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through September 20, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were issued

#### Note 2 Affiliation With Ripon Medical Center, Inc.

Agnesian HealthCare and Ripon share a mission and commitment to meeting the health care needs of residents of the communities they serve. Agnesian HealthCare and Ripon desire to build on their similar missions and to strengthen Ripon's position with enhanced services and resources. Effective June 1, 2011, Agnesian HealthCare became the sole corporate member of Ripon. No consideration was paid by Agnesian HealthCare related to this affiliation. In accordance with the affiliation agreement with Ripon, however, Agnesian HealthCare agreed to implement an electronic medical record system at Ripon and to arrange financing to construct and equip a replacement hospital for Ripon. In the event that a building permit for the replacement hospital has not been obtained by May 31, 2014, Ripon Foundation has the option to unwind the affiliation agreement with Agnesian HealthCare.

Agnesian HealthCare recorded a contribution related to this acquisition of \$11,052,000. The accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets includes activity related to Ripon from June 1, 2011 to June 30, 2011.

### Note 3 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors

Agnesian has agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement at amounts which vary from its established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows

#### Hospitals

St Agnes - Medicare - Inpatient acute care services are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Inpatient psychiatric services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid based on a blend of prospectively determined rates per discharge and a cost reimbursement method limited by a target rate per discharge. Outpatient services are paid primarily on prospectively determined rates, also based on a patient classification system, or fixed fee schedules

St Agnes - Medicaid - Inpatient services are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors similar to the Medicare system. Outpatient services are paid based on a prospectively determined rate per occasion of service.

Waupun and Ripon- Medicare - Hospital inpatient, outpatient, and swing-bed services are based upon a cost-reimbursement methodology with the exception of certain lab services which are reimbursed based on a fee schedule

Waupun and Ripon - Medicaid - Hospital inpatient and outpatient services are paid based upon a cost-reimbursement methodology with the exception of certain lab and therapy services which are reimbursed under fee schedules

St Agnes, Waupun, and Ripon - Other - St Agnes, Waupun, and Ripon have also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge and discounts from established charges.

#### Note 3 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors (Continued)

**Nursing Home** 

*Medicare* - Reimbursement is based on a predetermined rate per resident day which varies depending on the resident's level of care and the types of services provided

Medicaid - Reimbursement is based on a predetermined rate formula under a contractual arrangement with the Medicaid program Rate adjustments under this program are reflected in income when determinable

Home Health

*Medicare and Medicaid* - Reimbursement is based upon a predetermined rate which varies depending on the patient's level of care and types of services provided

Physician Services, Consultants Lab, and Enterprises

Reimbursement from third-party payors for physician, laboratory, and other services are primarily based on established fee schedules

Accounting for Contractual Arrangements

St Agnes, Waupun, and Ripon are reimbursed for certain items at an interim rate, with final settlements determined after audit of the hospitals' related annual cost reports by the respective Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediaries. Estimated provisions to approximate the final expected settlements after review by the intermediaries are included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. St. Agnes's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2007, with the exception of the June 30, 2005 cost report, which remains subject to audit. St. Agnes's Medicaid cost reports have been audited by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2003. Waupun's cost reports have been audited by the Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediaries through June 30, 2009 and 2004, respectively. Ripon's cost reports have been audited by the Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediaries through September 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively.

### Note 3 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors (Continued)

#### Compliance

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations, particularly those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in the imposition of fines and penalties, as well as repayments of previously billed and collected revenue from patients' services. Management believes Agnesian is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) uses recovery audit contractors (RACs) as part of CMS's further efforts to ensure accurate payments. CMS uses RACs to search for potentially inaccurate Medicare payments that may have been made to health care providers and that were not detected through existing CMS program integrity efforts. Once a RAC identifies a claim it believes is inaccurate, it makes a deduction from or addition to the provider's Medicare reimbursement in an amount estimated to equal the overpayment or underpayment.

## Note 6 Community Benefit and Community Care

Agnesian has a policy of providing health care services, without charge or at amounts less than established rates, to those unable to pay a portion of their charges and who meet certain eligibility criteria established under Agnesian's community care policy. Because Agnesian does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as community care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue. The amount of charges forgone for services furnished under the Agnesian community care policy aggregated approximately \$7,471,000 and \$5,946,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

Agnesian provides health care services and other financial support through various programs that are designed, among other matters, to enhance the health of the community including the health of low-income patients. Agnesian actively provided or participated in the following community-based activities and programs during 2011 and 2010.

- Agnesian, through "Journeys A Health Resource Center," shares its professional staff and expertise to offer health education classes, health screenings, support groups, and other health promotion activities through the year
- Health information on the Agnesian website and through health-related publications is distributed at no charge. Agnesian also provides services information through service clubs and churches, via the Agnesian parish and school nurse programs, locally at the system's Samaritan Health Clinic, and through other collaborative efforts
- Courtesy transportation services are provided to low-income patients to allow safe transportation to clinics, cancer care, and adult day services
- Support and training are provided for staff and inmate volunteers at the Dodge Correctional Institution in Waupun, which opened a hospice program, the first such program in a Wisconsin correctional setting
- Agnesian supports efforts to educate families on the importance of tissue donations

### Note 6 Community Benefit and Community Care (Continued)

 Agnesian meets the needs of the community through various programs, including Sharps Disposal Services, Adopt-A-Family, donations to food pantries, and leadership participation in community nonprofit organizations

Agnesian also provides services at Samaritan Health Clinic Samaritan Health Clinic provides patients with important basic health services, medications, and urgent dental needs at no charge to the patient Agnesian's expense to operate Samaritan Health Clinic is estimated to be \$386,000 and \$352,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

In addition, Agnesian is a provider under the Wisconsin Medicaid program. Under this program, Agnesian is legally bound to accept the amount determined by the state as payment in full for each patient's charges. Accordingly, services provided under these programs are reported as net patient service revenue. Agnesian maintains records and monitors the level of unreimbursed and partially reimbursed care it provides. Medicaid costs in excess of reimbursement are estimated to be \$17,400,000 and \$17,200,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

Investments, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of certain investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Management assesses individual investment securities as to whether declines in market value are other-than-temporary and result in impairment. For equity securities, Agnesian considers whether it has the ability and intent to hold the investment until a market price recovery. Evidence considered in this includes the reasons for the impairment, the severity and duration of the impairment, changes in value subsequent to year-end, the issuer's financial condition, and the general market condition in the geographic area or industry in which the investee operates. For debt securities, if Agnesian has made a decision to sell the security, or if it is more likely than not Agnesian will sell the security before the recovery of the security's cost basis, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred. If Agnesian has not made a decision or does not have an intent to sell the debt security, but the debt security is not expected to recover its value due to a credit loss, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred.

Because Agnesian has the intent and the ability to hold investment securities until a market price recovery or maturity, investment securities at June 30, 2011 and 2010 are not considered other-than-temporarily impaired No impairment losses were recognized by Agnesian during 2011 and 2010

#### Note 8 Fair Value Measurements

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value

Quoted market prices are used to determine the fair value of investments in publicly traded common stocks and mutual funds. U.S. government obligations and corporate debt securities are valued using quotes from pricing vendors based on recent trading activity and other observable market data. Certificates of deposit are valued at historical cost which management believes approximates fair value.

Fair value of hedge funds is determined by Level 3 inputs consisting of unobservable data points of the asset, and includes situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the asset

The interest rate swap valuation is recorded at the amount at which it could be settled, based on estimates by a third-party valuation service

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while Agnesian believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date

Information regarding investment strategy and redemption restrictions of the hedge funds is as follows

- (a) The Skybridge Multi-Advisor Hedge Fund is designed to serve as a core hedge fund holding with the goal of providing additional diversification to an overall investment portfolio. The fund's investment objective is to seek capital appreciation by realizing attractive risk-adjusted returns over a three- to five-year investment horizon. The portfolio allocation includes 40% fixed income arbitrage mortgage-backed securities, 17% event-driven equity, 10% event-driven multi strategy, and 33% other.
- (b) The Weatherlow Offshore Fund is a diversified fund of hedge funds with a mix of investments of approximately 50% equity, 25% event driven, 20% relative value, and 5% global macro. The Weatherlow Offshore Fund has a one-year hard lockup
- (c) Permal Macro Holdings provides investment opportunities across global financial markets. The investment strategy is global exposure with investments with a mix of investments of approximately 50% discretionary, 30% systematic, 10% natural resources, 5% relative value arbitrage, and 5% cash
- (d) Private Advisors Hedged Equity Fund places its capital with a variety of experienced portfolio managers who employ diverse styles and strategies. The fund anticipates that the investment strategies employed will be long/short equity investing driven by fundamental bottom-up research, as well as various investment strategies which may include, but are not limited to, convertible arbitrage, merge or risk arbitrage, distressed debt, multi-strategy, and market-neutral strategies. The fund's strategy includes 50% lower volatility multi-strategy style and 50% long/short equity style.
- (e) Paulson Advantage Plus Master is a fund that seeks to achieve capital appreciation through trading in securities, primarily by using event-driven strategies, including merger arbitrage, distressed securities, relative value, and special situations. The majority of the positions are generally mid to large cap (greater than \$1 billion market cap)

#### Note 8 Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

- (f) Avenue Strategic Partners is a fund of a hedge funds focused on distressed, special situations, deep-value, or event-driven strategies. The funds capitalize on expertise in the distressed markets and seek to build the optimal combination of portfolio funds to exploit investment opportunities throughout the distressed cycle. The strategy allocation includes 65% distressed, 14% event-driven credit arbitrage, 12% event-driven other, and 9% special situations. Funds are primarily invested in North America and developed non-North American markets, with a small percentage in emerging markets. The Avenue Strategic Partners fund includes a 5% holdback for redemptions during an 18-month lock-up period.
- (g) Pointer Offshore fund invests with a selection of alternative money managers who specialize in long/short equity based on fundamental, bottom-up research and also typically invests a percentage of assets with managers specializing in distressed/credit, commodities, special situations, etc. The strategy allocation includes 53% hedged global, 16% distressed/credit, 10% commodity related, 6% domestic, 6% special situations, and 9% other. Pointer Offshore fund redemptions in full are subject to a holdback of 10%. There is a 117-day redemption notice period after a 2-year lock-up has expired.
- (h) The Lighthouse Diversified Fund is a fund of funds whose investment objective is to seek consistent stable returns by allocating the Fund's assets to sub-advisers who use a variety of different investment strategies and invest across a wide range of financial instruments. The portfolio is composed of relative value arbitrage, market neutral equity, long/short equity, fixed income, global trading, credit, cash, and options. Redemptions in first year are subject to a redemption fee equal to 2%. There is also a 10% holdback on all redemptions.
- (i) The Selectinvest ARV fund investment objective is to develop and actively maintain an investment portfolio of alternative asset managers who will seek to earn above-average, risk-adjusted, long-term returns with a low correlation to traditional equity and fixed income markets. The allocation strategy includes 33% equity long/short, 14% credit event, 13% event drive, 11% global macro, 10% relative value, 7% commodities, 4% emerging markets, and 8% other. The Selectinvest ARV fund has a 5% redemption holdback.

#### Note 11 Investment in Unconsolidated Affiliate

The Agnesian HealthCare/Beaver Dam Community Hospital Joint Venture, LLC (the "Joint Venture") was a tax-exempt limited liability company which provided dialysis services to residents of Fond du Lac and Dodge counties. Prior to June 30, 2011, Agnesian HealthCare and Beaver Dam Community Hospital, Inc. owned the Joint Venture equally Effective June 30, 2011, Agnesian HealthCare purchased Beaver Dam Community Hospital, Inc's share of the Joint Venture for \$370,000 and dissolved the Joint Venture Prior to the dissolution, Agnesian HealthCare accounted for its share in the Joint Venture under the equity method. Subsequent to the dissolution, Agnesian HealthCare accounted for the Joint Venture activity as part of St. Agnes' operations. Agnesian HealthCare's investment totaled \$229,000 as of June 30, 2010. Agnesian HealthCare recorded income of \$157,000 and \$63,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively, for its share of the resulting operations of the Joint Venture, as part of nonoperating income. The Joint Venture did not make any distributions in 2011 or 2010.

# Note 13 Long-Term Debt

In November 2010, the Wisconsin Health and Educational Facilities Authority (WHEFA) issued, for Agnesian's benefit, \$57,260,000 of adjustable rate revenue bonds ("Series 2010 Bonds") Proceeds from the Series 2010 Bonds were used to refund the WHEFA Series 2001 Revenue Bonds, fund the acquisition, construction, renovation, and equipping related to the private room construction project, and pay certain costs associated with the issuance of the Series 2010 Bonds

In December 2008, WHEFA issued, for Agnesian's benefit, \$49,330,000 of adjustable rate revenue bonds ("Series 2008 Bonds") Proceeds from the Series 2008 Bonds were used to refund the WHEFA Series 2005 Revenue Bonds and pay debt issuance costs. In June 2011, the Series 2008 Bonds were converted to bank-owned direct purchase bonds and reissued at \$48,680,000, the outstanding principal balance. Prior to June 30, 2011, the Series 2008 Bonds were secured by an irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit totaling \$50,043,596. As a result of the conversion to bank-owned bonds, the letter of credit was terminated.

In June 1998, WHEFA issued, for Agnesian's benefit, \$30 million of adjustable rate revenue bonds ("Series 1998 Bonds") Proceeds of the Series 1998 Bonds were used to pay cost of constructing and equipping a reception registration lobby, a diagnostic and treatment building, and other capital projects, and to pay for certain debt issuance costs

As security for the payment of the revenue bonds, Agnesian has granted to the Master Trustee a security interest in all of Agnesian's rents, revenue, income, and receipts, including all rights, title, and interest in and to all monies, earnings, and receivables, whether now owed or hereafter acquired subject to certain exceptions. Each organizational member of the Obligated Group (Agnesian HealthCare, Waupun, Consultants Lab, Enterprises, and St. Francis Home) is jointly and severally liable for the guarantee of principal and interest on all Master Notes issued under the Master Indenture

### Note 13 Long-Term Debt (Continued)

The Master Indenture requires the creation of funds to be held by a trustee for payment of construction costs and bond principal and interest. These funds, which are not available for general purposes, are classified as assets limited as to use. In addition, the Master Indenture requires maintenance of certain debt service coverage ratios, limits additional borrowings, and requires compliance with various other restrictive covenants. Management believes Agnesian is in compliance with all covenants at June 30, 2011.

### Note 14 Interest Rate Swap

Agnesian has a master swap agreement dated April 27, 2005, with a financial institution for an interest rate swap transaction for the purpose of hedging the variable interest rate on the Series 2008 Revenue Bonds (Note 13) The interest rate swap has a notional amount which amortizes over the term of the agreement and which totaled \$14,700,000 and \$15,000,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively The agreement has a fixed rate of 3 545% and matures July 1, 2033

Agnesian assesses the effectiveness of the interest rate swap as a cash flow hedge instrument on a periodic basis, and for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, determined the hedge to be effective, thus the change in the fair value of the hedge is shown as a decrease in unrestricted net assets

Agnesian is exposed to credit loss in the event of nonperformance by the counterparty to the interest rate swap. However, Agnesian does not anticipate nonperformance by the counterparty

The interest rate swap agreement is recorded at fair value and is recorded as a liability of \$1,574,000 and \$1,973,000 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The interest rate swap reflects a liability balance due to decreases in market rates since inception

### Note 18 Malpractice Insurance

Agnesian's professional liability insurance for claim losses of less than \$1 million per claim and \$3 million per year covers professional liability claims reported during a policy year (claims-made coverage). Losses in excess of these policy amounts are covered through mandatory participation in the Patients Compensation Fund of the State of Wisconsin. The professional liability and umbrella insurance policies are renewable annually and have been renewed by the insurance carrier for the annual period extending through July 1, 2012. In addition, Agnesian maintains umbrella coverage for claims in excess of the general liability limits to a maximum of \$15 million per occurrence and \$15 million per year.

#### Note 19 Professional Services Agreement

Agnesian HealthCare has entered into a multiyear PSA with FDLRC SC, a multispecialty medical group. Under this agreement, Agnesian HealthCare purchases physician services from FDLRC SC in exchange for the rights to all proceeds from billings for such services. Payments to FDLRC SC are made on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined in accordance with the PSA. For 2011 and 2010, purchased services expense included \$50,927,000 and \$43,698,000, respectively, for FDLRC SC professional services.

#### Note 20 Retirement Plans

Agnesian has established the Retirement Savings Plan Plus (the "Savings Plan") and a related trust to provide retirement benefits for employees of organizations affiliated with or controlled by the Congregation. The Savings Plan is a defined contribution plan available to employees who have attained age 18. Participating employees can elect to contribute all or part of their qualifying earnings to the Savings Plan and/or to contribute a fixed sum. Agnesian contributes a discretionary amount based upon eligible employee compensation and contributions to the Savings Plan.

Expense for the Savings Plan totaled \$5,957,000 and \$3,733,000 for 2011 and 2010, respectively

### Note 21 Deferred Compensation

Under terms of the PSA with FDLRC SC discussed in Note 19, Agnesian HealthCare also sponsors a flexible benefit plan and an elective salary deferral plan covering eligible employees of FDLRC. In addition, under the terms of the flexible benefit plan, participants allocate their benefit allowances, generally equal to 7.5% of compensation, among a variety of investment vehicles. A new flexible benefit plan was established during fiscal 2010. Initial contributions to the new plan included life insurance amounts of eligible employees of FDLRC SC that were not previously recorded as assets or liabilities of Agnesian HealthCare. Physicians' contributions to these deferred compensation plans and earnings thereon are subject to a substantial risk of forfeiture in the event of termination.

Agnesian also has deferred compensation plans under Section 457 of the Code These plans provide enhanced benefits to eligible executives and physicians. Under the terms of these plans, amounts are deposited into investment accounts held for the benefit of the participant

Investments designated for deferred compensation are recorded as assets limited as to use and as a liability in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Investments included in assets limited as to use for deferred compensation totaled \$17,045,000 and \$12,237,000 at June 30, 2011, and 2010, respectively

For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, Agnesian's expenses related to the deferred compensation plans totaled \$2,779,000 and \$2,658,000, respectively

#### Note 22 Self-Funded Health and Dental Insurance

Agnesian sponsors a self-funded health care plan which provides medical and dental benefits to substantially all of its employees and their dependents. Employees share in the cost of health benefits. The health care expense is based upon actual claims paid, administration fees, and provisions for unpaid and unreported claims at year-end

On November 9, 2010, the FDIC issued a final rule implementing Section 343 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act that provides for unlimited coverage of non-interest-bearing transaction accounts through December 31, 2012. In addition, Agnesian maintains cash in interest-bearing accounts at these institutions which are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000. At June 30, 2011, Agnesian exceed the insured limits by \$33,233,000. In addition, other investments held by financial institutions are uninsured.

The initial agreement period ends December 31, 2014

The base fees (fixed annual charges) together with various indexing adjustments are payable in accordance with a predetermined pricing agreement. The agreement allows adjustments to the base fee for changes in services to be provided. In addition, the contract requires certain service level credits, which are reviewed and audited against source data on a monthly basis. ### Note 27 Hospital Assessments

The Wisconsin state legislature enacted legislation under which eligible hospitals, including Agnesian, are required to pay the state an annual assessment. The assessment period is the state's fiscal year which runs from July 1 to June 30. The assessment is based on each hospital's gross revenue, as defined. The revenue generated from the assessment is to be used, in part, to increase overall reimbursement under the Wisconsin Medicaid program. Agnesian's expense was approximately \$5,013,000 and \$4,403,000 for 2011 and 2010, respectively, and is included in supplies and other expense in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. Any increases in reimbursement from Medicaid are included in net patient service revenue.
