NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

Floyd Healthcare Management, Inc., a Georgia not-for-profit Corporation, (Corporation) provided management services to the Hospital Authority of Floyd County through December 31, 1997 pursuant to a management agreement. The following entities comprised the Hospital Authority of Floyd County (Authority) prior to a lease of the facilities as described below: Floyd Medical Center, an acute care hospital providing inpatient, outpatient, primary care and home health services; Floyd Behavioral Health Center, a long-term care psychiatric facility; and Heyman HospiceCare at Floyd.

Pursuant to the Lease, Transfer and Reversion Agreement between Hospital Authority of Floyd County and Floyd Healthcare Management, Inc. (Lease) the Authority leased the above described operations and substantially all of its net assets to Floyd Healthcare Management, Inc., effective January 1, 1998. The Corporation sold the home healthcare services in 2007. The above mentioned management agreement was replaced and superseded by the Lease. The consideration to be paid by Management consists primarily of: payment of principal and interest on the Hospital Authority of Floyd County Revenue Anticipation Certificates; payment equal to the contribution which the Authority is required to make to satisfy minimum funding obligations under the Authority's Pension Plan with respect to benefits which had accrued under such plan prior to the Lease; and the provision of healthcare services to indigent, charity and other needy patients equal but not limited to a minimum dollar amount annually as set forth in the Lease.

The combined financial statements include the accounts of the Corporation and its affiliates, Floyd Medical Center, Floyd Behavioral Health, Floyd Primary Care, Heyman HospiceCare at Floyd, Floyd Emergency Physicians, Floyd Emergency Medical Services, Floyd Retail Services and Floyd Neonatology Physicians, LLC. Significant intercompany transactions have been eliminated.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less.

The Corporation routinely invests its surplus operating funds in money market mutual funds. These funds generally invest in highly liquid U. S. government and agency obligations.

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The Corporation provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based on evaluation of the overall collectability of the accounts receivable. As accounts are known to be uncollectible, the account is charged against the allowance.

Risk Management

The Corporation is exposed to various risks of loss from torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; business interruption; errors and omissions; employee injuries and illnesses and natural disasters. Commercial insurance coverage is purchased for claims arising from such matters. The Corporation is self-insured for employee health and accident benefits and medical malpractice claims and judgments, as discussed in Note 8.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities.

Inventory

Inventories are valued at lower of cost or market, as determined by the first-in, first-out method.

Assets Limited As To Use

Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the Board for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes; assets held by a trustee for malpractice payments and assets held by trustees under indenture agreements. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Corporation have been reclassified in the balance sheet at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Deferred Financing Cost

Costs related to the issuance of the 2002 and 2003 Revenue Certificates were deferred and are being amortized using the effective interest method over the life of the related debt. The costs related to the issuance of the 2009 Revenue Certificates were deferred and are being amortized over the life of the related debt using the straight-line method, which approximates the effective interest method.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The statement of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses as a performance indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the performance indicator, consistent with industry practice, include permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, defined benefit actuarial gains and losses and the resulting amortization associated with those gains and losses, defined benefit prior service costs and credits and the resulting amortization associated with those costs and credits, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Corporation has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Corporation at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement arrangements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Charity Care

The Corporation provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Corporation does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Corporation are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the

statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

Estimated Malpractice Costs

The provision for estimated medical malpractice claims includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported.

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The Corporation evaluates on an ongoing basis the recoverability of its assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is required to be recognized if the carrying value of the asset exceeds the undiscounted future net cash flows associated with that asset. The impairment loss to be recognized is the amount by which the carrying value of the long-lived asset exceeds the asset's fair value. In most instances, the fair value is determined by discounted estimated future cash flows using an appropriate interest rate. The Corporation has not recorded any impairment charges in the accompanying combined statements of operations and changes in net assets for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Income Taxes

The Corporation is a not-for-profit corporation that has been recognized as tax-exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Corporation applies accounting polices that prescribe when to recognize and how to measure the financial statement effects of income tax positions taken or expected to be taken on its income tax returns. These rules require management to evaluate the likelihood that, upon examination by the relevant taxing jurisdictions, those income tax positions would be sustained. Based on that evaluation, the Corporation only recognizes the maximum benefit of each income tax position that is more than 50% likely of being sustained. To the extent that all or a portion of the benefits of an income tax position are not recognized, a liability would be recognized for the unrecognized benefits, along with any interest and penalties that would result from disallowance of the position. Should any such penalties and interest be incurred, they would be recognized as operating expenses.

Income Taxes, Continued

Based on the results of management's evaluation, no liability is recognized in the accompanying balance sheet for unrecognized income tax positions. Further, no interest or penalties have been accrued or charged to expense as of June 30, 2011 and 2010 or for the years then ended. The Corporation's open audit periods are for tax years ended 2008-2010.

Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurement and Disclosures* defines fair value as the amount that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e., an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. FASB ASC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy that requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value.

FASB ASC 820 describes the following three levels of inputs that may be used:

- <u>Level 1</u>: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets and liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.
- <u>Level 2</u>: Observable prices that are based on inputs not quoted on active markets but corroborated by market data.
- <u>Level 3</u>: Unobservable inputs when there is little or no market data available, thereby requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

Prior Year Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the fiscal year 2010 combined financial statements to conform to the fiscal year 2011 presentation. These reclassifications had no impact on the change in net assets in the accompanying financial statements.

Subsequent Event

In preparing these financial statements, the Corporation has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through October 24, 2011, the date the financial statements were issued.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued

2. Net Patient Service Revenue

The Corporation has arrangements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Corporation at amounts different from its established rates. The Corporation does not believe that there are any significant credit risks associated with receivables due from third-party payors. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare

Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Inpatient psychiatric services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. Inpatient rehabilitation services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge.

Outpatient services rendered to Medicare beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. The Corporation is reimbursed for certain reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Corporation and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Corporation's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Corporation. All Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare intermediary through June 30, 2007.

Medicaid

Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at a prospectively determined rate per admission. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Outpatient services rendered to the Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology. The Corporation is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Corporation and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary. Medicaid cost reports have been audited by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2007.

The Corporation contracts with certain managed care organizations to receive reimbursement for providing services to selected enrolled Medicaid beneficiaries. Payment arrangements with these managed care organizations consist primarily of prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, or prospectively determined per diems.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS. Continued

2. Net Patient Service Revenue, Continued

• Medicaid, Continued

The Corporation qualified as a Medicaid disproportionate share hospital for the years 2011 and 2010 and received increased payment adjustments reflected in net patient service revenue. It is uncertain if the payment adjustments will continue in future periods. The financial statements include payment adjustments for 2011 and 2010 of approximately \$5.800,000 and \$5.900,000, respectively.

The Medicare, Medicaid, and SCHIP Benefits Improvement and Protection Act of 2000 (BIPA) provides for enhanced payments to Medicaid providers under the Upper Payment Limit (UPL) methodology. Subsequent to the implementation of the UPL methodology, federal budget concerns have led to reconsideration of the BIPA legislation with possible elimination of enhanced Medicaid payments. The financial statements include enhanced payments for 2011 and 2010 of approximately \$2,600,000 and \$900,000, respectively.

During 2010, the state of Georgia enacted legislation known as the Provider Payment Agreement Act (the Act) whereby hospitals in the state of Georgia are assessed a "provider payment" in the amount of 1.45% of their net patient revenue. The Act became effective July 1, 2010, the beginning of state fiscal year 2011. The provider payments are due on a quarterly basis to the Department of Community Health. The payments are to be used for the sole purpose of obtaining federal financial participation for medical assistance payments to providers on behalf of Medicaid recipients. The provider payment will result in an increase in hospital payments on Medicaid services of approximately 11.88%. Approximately \$2,700,000 relating to the Act is included in operating expenses in the accompanying statement of operations for the year ended June 30, 2011.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 32% and 16%, respectively, of the Corporation's net patient revenue for the year ended June 30, 2011, and 33% and 17%, respectively, of the Corporation's net patient revenue for the year ended June 30, 2010. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is a possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued

2. Net Patient Service Revenue, Continued

The Corporation believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations and is not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing. However, there has been an increase in regulatory initiatives at the state and federal levels including the initiation of the Recovery Audit Contractor (RAC) program and the Medicaid Integrity Contractor (MIC) program. These programs were created to review Medicare and Medicaid claims for medical necessity and coding appropriateness. The RAC's have authority to pursue improper payments made on or after October 1, 2007. While no such regulatory inquiries have been made to date, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

The Corporation also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Corporation under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

3. <u>Uncompensated Services</u>

The Corporation was compensated for services at amounts less than its established rates. Charges for uncompensated services for 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$633,000,000 and \$581,000,000, respectively.

Uncompensated care includes charity and indigent care services of approximately \$63,700,000 and \$59,000,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively. Charity and indigent care services provided to Floyd County residents in 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$39,300,000 and \$32,600,000, respectively. The cost of charity and indigent care services provided during 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$20,100,000 and \$17,800,000, respectively computed by applying a total cost factor to the charges foregone.

Revenue Anticipation Certificates, Series 2009 were issued to (i) finance or refinance the cost of the acquisition, construction, installation and equipping of certain additions, extensions and improvements to Floyd Medical Center; (ii) refund all of the outstanding Revenue Anticipation Certificates, Series 2005 and Series 2006; (iii) fund a debt service reserve fund securing the Series 2009 Certificates; and (iv) pay all or a portion of the costs of issuance of the Series 2009 Certificates.

Revenue Anticipation Certificates, Series 2002 were issued to provide for the acquisition, construction, renovation, equipping and installing of certain additions of the Corporation. All proceeds are being used to pay the costs of issuing the Series 2002 Certificates and to finance the acquisition, construction, renovation, equipping and installation costs of certain facilities of the Corporation.

Both the Authority and the Corporation are members of the obligated group of the Revenue Anticipation Certificates Series 2009. Series 2003, and Series 2002. Additionally, if the Authority and the Corporation cannot meet their obligation under the Series 2002 Certificates. Floyd County has agreed to make payments to the Certificate Trustee sufficient to guarantee the payment of the principal and interest on these certificates pursuant to Georgia law and the constitutional power of the County.

At its option, to be exercised on or before the 45th day preceding any sinking fund redemption date, the Corporation may (a) deliver to the Certificate Trustee for cancellation Series 2009, Series 2003, or Series 2002 Certificates of the appropriate maturity in any aggregate principal amount desired or (b) receive a credit in respect of its sinking fund redemption obligation for any Series 2009, Series 2003, or Series 2002 Certificates of the appropriate maturity which prior to said date have been redeemed (otherwise than through the operation of the mandatory sinking fund obligation) and cancelled by the Certificate Trustee and not theretofore applied as a credit against any prior mandatory sinking fund redemption obligation. Under the terms of the 2009, 2003, and 2002 indentures, the Corporation is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee. Such deposits are included with assets limited as to use. The indentures also places limits on the incurrence of additional borrowings and requires that the Corporation satisfy certain measures of financial performance as long as the Certificates are outstanding. In the opinion of management, all measures of financial performance have been satisfied.

Capital Lease Obligation

In 2004, the Corporation entered into a sale-leaseback agreement under which a medical office building owned by the Corporation was sold for approximately \$3,600,000 to a partnership, of which the Corporation owns a 28% share. A portion of the medical office building was subsequently leased back to the Corporation pursuant to a 10-year master capital lease.

In 2011, the Corporation entered into a capital lease agreement under which the Corporation leases an office suite devoted to long term acute care. The lease payments end in January 2031.

In 2011, the Corporation entered into a capital lease agreement under which the Corporation leases premises located within the Rome Cancer Center. The lease payments end in April 2026.

Line of Credit

The Corporation has a revolving line of credit agreement for a maximum amount of \$10,000,000 bearing interest of 1.94% as of June 30, 2011. If default occurs, the lender has the right to place a lien against the Corporation's deposit accounts also held by the bank. At June 30, 2011, approximately \$2,570,000 of unused borrowing remains on the line of credit.

7. Employee Benefit Plans

At January 1, 1998, the Corporation implemented a defined benefit pension plan (Plan) covering substantially all of its employees. The benefits are based on 1.75% of earnings for each year after January 1, 1998, with the total benefit subject to thirty-five years of benefit service maximum. The Corporation's funding policy is to contribute annually an amount intended to provide not only for benefits attributed to service to date but also for those expected to be earned in the future. Employees hired after September 30, 2005 are not eligible to participate in the Plan.

Defined Contribution Plan

Floyd Healthcare Management, Inc. established a 401(k) retirement plan effective January 1, 2006. The plan is a defined contribution 401(k) profit sharing plan covering full-time employees over the age of twenty-one with at least one year of service who are not participating in the defined benefit pension plan. Employees may contribute between 1% and 25% of their salary, subject to the maximum dollar limit allowed by the IRS. The Corporation will match 100% of the employee's contributions up to 3% of their salary plus 50% of the next 2% of the employee's contributions. The employer contributions during the fiscal years ending June 30, 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$1,582,000 and \$1,308,000, respectively.

8. Self-Insurance

Malpractice

In 1977, the Authority adopted a self-insurance program under which a trust fund was created to be used only for the limited purposes specified. These purposes include, but are not limited to the payment of such sums as the Authority shall become legally obligated to pay any claim up to 2 million dollars and 4.5 million dollars in aggregate for damages resulting from the course of operations. In 1991, a resolution was adopted to provide for payment of settlements and judgments rendered against the Corporation.

Additionally, payment is restricted to expenses incurred in connection with the investigation, adjustment, settlement, and defense of any claim or suit against such, an officer, director, member, trustee of Authority or the Corporation. The management of the trust fund is the responsibility of a bank, functioning as an independent fiduciary. Losses from asserted and unasserted claims are accrued by the Corporation based on claims reported and estimated claims incurred but not reported as derived from the Authority's or the Corporation's risk management program. Also, the Corporation has employed outside consultants to estimate the annual contribution to the fund.

Malpractice claims in excess of the self-insurance retention limits are insured with commercial insurance carriers on a claims-made basis. The policy covers malpractice claims up to 20 million dollars in aggregate.

Employee Hospitalization

The Corporation has a self-insurance program for employee health insurance under which a third party administrator processes and pays claims. The Corporation reimburses the third party administrator monthly for claims incurred and paid to other providers. The charges, less any deductibles and coinsurance for covered services provided to employees by the Corporation, are written off against gross patient service revenue. In addition, the Corporation has entered into a loss financing agreement with ten Georgia hospitals through a program developed by Georgia ADS, LLC. The program is designed to provide for the financing and payment of covered claims between \$150 thousand and \$500 thousand. The program also buys a reinsurance policy to cover claims reaching \$1 million. Further, the Company purchased additional insurance to cover claims up to \$5 million. Payments received from the program must be repaid over a specified period of time with interest. Under this self-insurance program, the Corporation paid or accrued and expensed approximately \$3,322,000 and \$2,708,000 during the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Corporation wrote off services to employees net of deductible and coinsurance of approximately \$14,009,000 and \$10,160,000 during the years ended June 30. 2011 and 2010, respectively.

13. Commitments and Contingencies, Continued

Litigation: The Corporation is involved in litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Corporation's future financial position or results from operations.

Regulatory Compliance: The healthcare industry has recently been subjected to increased scrutiny from governmental agencies at both the federal and state level with respect to compliance with regulations. Areas of noncompliance identified at the national level include Medicare and Medicaid, Internal Revenue Service, and other regulations governing the healthcare industry. The Corporation has implemented a compliance plan focusing on such issues. There can be no assurance that the Corporation will not be subjected to future investigations with accompanying monetary damages.

Hospital Authority of Floyd County Pension Plan: Pursuant to the Lease described in Note 1, the Corporation agreed to make an annual payment equal to the contribution which the Authority is required to make to satisfy minimum funding obligations under the Authority's Pension Plan with respect to benefits which had accrued under such plan, prior to the Lease. The pension liability as actuarially determined was approximately \$8,476,000 and \$8,573,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The liability is included in Due to the Hospital Authority of Floyd County.

14. Health Care Reform

In recent years, there has been increasing pressure on Congress and some state legislatures to control and reduce the cost of healthcare on the national or at the state level. In 2010 legislation was enacted which included cost controls on hospitals, insurance market reforms, delivery system reforms and various individual and business mandates among other provisions. The costs of certain provisions will be funded in part by reductions in payments by government programs, including Medicare and Medicaid. There can be no assurance that these changes will not adversely affect the Corporation.

15. Contribution From Floyd Healthcare Resources, Inc.

Floyd Healthcare Resources, Inc., a Georgia not for profit organization, was organized for the purpose of benefiting the healthcare needs of the citizens of Floyd County and the Northwest Georgia region. During 2010, Floyd Healthcare Resources, Inc. made a contribution to the Corporation of \$2,000,000 to be used at the discretion of the Corporation. The contribution is included as nonoperating income. Additionally, a contribution of land and a building was made to the Corporation in the amount of \$468,000 in 2010.

16. Subsequent Event

On August 30, 2011, the Authority and the Company entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with Cedartown-Polk County Hospital Authority (Lessor) to lease all of Lessor's assets associated with the current Polk Medical Center by the Authority. The day-to-day operations of Polk Medical Center will be managed by a Georgia nonprofit corporation to be called Polk Medical Center, Inc. (PMCI). The Company will be the sole member of PMCI. Through this affiliation, the Authority and the Lessor will make additional facilities and care available in the Lessor's service area. The Company and PMCI will enter into agreements with the Lessor to construct a new hospital to be owned by the Lessor to replace the current facilities of Polk Medical Center at no cost to the Lessor.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011 (Unaudited)

Summary of Financial Condition and Results of Operation

The financial results for Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011 reflect several positive events. These events helped produce excess of revenues over expenses in the amount of \$11.9 million on total revenues, gains and other support of \$330 million. Management's Discussion and Analysis of Financial Condition and Results of Operations will review the financial results for fiscal year 2011 the significant events impacting financial performance and management's outlook.

Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. recorded gross patient revenues during fiscal year 2011 of \$926 million, up 10.7% over the previous year. Revenue deductions (including contractual adjustments for Medicare, Medicaid and managed care plus provisions for indigent and charity care) and bad debt expenses for the fiscal year totaled \$633 million, an increase of 8.9% or 68.3% of gross patient revenues. Operating expenses for the fiscal year were \$267.1 million, an increase of 15.2% over the previous year, a result of increased volume and Cerner electronic medical records implementation costs. Operating expenses as a percent of total revenues, gains and other support increased from 80.3% to 80.9% in fiscal year 2011.

The operating gain on earnings before interest, depreciation and amortization (EBIDA) increased to \$33.2 million in fiscal year 2011 from \$30.1 million in the prior year. The EBIDA margin for fiscal year 2011 was 10.1% compared to 10.4% in the previous year. Capital expenses, including depreciation, amortization and interest were up 19.4% to \$25.2 million. Total expenses for fiscal year 2011 were \$322.1 million, an increase of 15.2% over fiscal year 2010. Non-operating income and expenses included investment gains of \$3.7 million.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS, Continued Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011 (Unaudited)

The financial performance during the fiscal year continued to be strongly influenced by uncontrollable external and internal issues. Unreasonably low Medicare payments for inpatient and outpatient services continued to impact Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. during fiscal year 2011. Additionally, the State of Georgia's managed care program continued to reimburse Floyd at below cost. Medicare and Medicaid patients make up approximately 57% of Floyd Healthcare Management Inc.'s patient base. In spite of challenges, Floyd Healthcare Management Inc.'s positive financial performance for fiscal year 2011 is the result of continued process improvements and an increase in market share.

Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. has been and will continue to be a vital health care resource for Rome, northwest Georgia and northeast Alabama. Management remains optimistic that the programs completed, in progress and planned will insure the long-term growth and viability of the health care system.

The following sections of Management's Discussion and Analysis of Financial Condition and Results of Operations will provide expanded information on the financial results and significant events.

Patient Volume, Gross Revenue and Net Revenue

During fiscal year 2011, Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. recorded total inpatient admissions of approximately 15,975, a decrease of 216 admissions over the previous year. The total is comprised of 14,117 patients admitted to the main campus facility and 1,858 admitted to Floyd Behavioral Health Center. Total inpatient days for fiscal year 2011 increased 1,794 days or 2.5% to 72,922. The average length of stay reduced .1 days to 4.5 days from 2010. Overall outpatient volumes of 411,057 for the System showed an increase of 45,874 or 12.6% when compared to the prior year. Included in the total is Floyd Outpatient Services with 160,891 visits and Floyd Primary Care with 215,409 visits during fiscal year 2011.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS, Continued Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011 (Unaudited)

Gross patient revenues for Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. for the fiscal year increased to \$926 million, an increase of 10.7% over the previous year. Outpatient gross revenues increased \$45.1 million, an increase of 10.2% over the previous year, and represented 52.4% of gross patient revenues at year-end, down from 52.6% in the prior year. Gross patient revenues by major payer sources included Medicare, commercial insurance and Medicaid representing 37%, 29%, and 20%, respectively, for fiscal year 2011. Medicare and Medicaid revenues combined for 57% of gross patient revenues, which is up slightly from the prior year. Revenue deductions and bad debt expense combined to account for over \$633.0 million in fiscal year 2010. Expressed as a percent of gross patient revenue, total revenue deductions and bad debt expense for fiscal year 2011 consumed 68.3% of each gross patient revenue dollar, down from 69.5% in the prior year. Net patient service revenue, excluding bad debt expense, increased 14.7% to \$323.4 million.

Expenses

Operating expense increased 15.2% to \$267.1 million in fiscal year 2011 from \$231.8 million in the prior year. The ratio of operating expense to total operating revenue increased slightly to 80.9% during fiscal 2011 from 80.3% in the prior year. Staffing expense, including salary, wages and employee benefit programs, increased 16.7% to \$157.2 million. Staffing expenses represent 58.9% of the operating expenses, up from 58.1% in the prior year. Staffing expense continues to reflect sustained or growing service needs for patient care; growing pressures on the availability and costs of selected technical personnel; and overall upward market pressures on wages and employee benefit levels. Operating expenses less staffing expenses for fiscal year 2011 account for approximately \$109.9 million. Depreciation and amortization expenses totaled \$19.4 million, up from \$15.3 million in 2010 due to the implementation of the Cerner electronic medical record. Interest expense on short term and long term debt totaled \$5.7 million, down from \$5.8 million in the previous year due to the Series 2009 bond interest. Total capital expenses for fiscal year 2011 were \$25.2 million, up 19.4% from the prior year. The ratio of capital expense to total revenue increased to 7.6%, up from 7.3% in the prior year.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS, Continued Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011 (Unaudited)

Liquidity, Investment and Debt

Unrestricted cash resources consisted of approximately \$43.0 million in short and intermediate term investments and \$10.1 million in operating cash for a total of \$53.1 million. For fiscal year 2011, Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. recognized investment income in the amount of \$3.7 million. Operating cash as of June 30, 2011 was \$10.1 million, a decrease of \$4.8 million over the prior year. The number of days cash on hand, measuring the equivalent days of operating expenses contained in Floyd Healthcare Management Inc.'s unrestricted cash resources, including cash, cash equivalents, temporary investments and funded depreciation were 71.1 days as of June 30, 2011 compared to 83.9 days as of June 30, 2010. The reduction in days was due to property and equipment being purchased with cash. During fiscal year 2012 a tax exempt bond issue is expected to occur which will be used to replenish capital reserves as well as pay for several major hospital renovation projects. As a result of this issue, days in cash are expected to increase by approximately 10 days. Had this issue been finalized in FY 2011 as expected, days in cash would have been approximately 81.1 days, a slight decrease from FY 2010.

The cumulative investment in property, plant and equipment, based on acquisition cost, was \$329.2 million at June 30, 2011. Accumulated depreciation for these assets at the end of fiscal year 2011 is \$161 million, yielding net property, plant and equipment of \$168.2 million. The average age of plant, an accounting measurement of overall plant and equipment age, decreased to 8.3 years at June 30, 2011 from 10.4 years at the end of fiscal year 2010. As of June 30, 2011, Floyd Healthcare Management Inc. was responsible for \$112.5 million in long-term debt, which includes \$40 million for the 2009 revenue certificates, \$30.1 million for the 2003 certificates, and \$35 million for the 2002 certificates. The debt service coverage ratio for fiscal year 2011 was 4.42, calculated in accordance with the revenue certificate covenant requirements.

Mission

On July 4, 1942, Floyd Medical Center opened its doors with a commitment to provide high quality, cost-effective healthcare to all the citizens of Floyd County. Through the years Floyd has responded to the changing needs of its growing communities, including Floyd County and the surrounding region, by increasing capacity, updating facilities, obtaining state-of-the-art technologies and developing new services.

In FY 2011 Floyd continued to respond to the changing needs of its growing communities. Floyd opened an Urgent Care center in Cherokee County. Alabama to provide after hours and immediate care to residents in this adjacent county. In addition, Floyd opened a larger replacement Urgent Care center in Bartow County that includes a Primary Care practice to better meet the growing needs of this burgeoning metro Atlanta county.

During 2011 Floyd continued its support of several initiatives aimed at improving the health status of low-income patients and to address the growing burden and cost of uncompensated care.

Floyd County Clinic and We Care Program

The Floyd County Clinic, which Floyd Medical Center operates through the Family Medicine Residency program, had 2,522 outpatient visits in FY 2011. The Clinic provides assistance to financially and medically indigent patients in an effort to reduce their need for emergency and inpatient hospital care. During fiscal year 2011 there were 510 outpatient visits through Floyd's We Care program. We Care, which is aimed at controlling and improving chronic conditions with preventive care, assists low-income patients without health insurance or governmental benefits.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS, Continued Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011 (Unaudited)

Indigent Outpatient Pharmacy Program

Floyd provides prescription pharmaceuticals to qualified low income uninsured outpatients at no cost to the patient through its hospital-based retail pharmacy. Qualifying low-income patients under the care of a Floyd physician, including Floyd Family Medicine residents. Floyd Emergency Care Center physicians, or Floyd Primary Care physicians are eligible to receive the prescribed medications. In FY 2011 Floyd provided over \$1.5 million in prescription pharmaceuticals to low income uninsured outpatients.

Financial Counseling

Financial Counselors in the Emergency Care Center and outpatient services departments assisted over 2,294 low-income patients seeking eligibility for Medicaid. PeachCare and other programs. In total 20,799 individual Medicaid and PeachCare patients were treated during the year for a total of 42,891 encounters.

Free Clinic of Rome

Floyd helped to create, contributed supplies and provided seed money to fund the Free Clinic of Rome, a local organization that provides free primary medical care to low income, uninsured patients in our community. The Free Clinic traces its roots to a volunteer mission effort to provide basic medical care services to Floyd County's homeless community. Now housed at the Floyd County Health Department, patients schedule appointments with volunteer physicians, dentists and nurses and receive free lab tests (via the Floyd Medical Center laboratory) and assistance with prescription medications.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS, Continued Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011 (Unaudited)

Northwest Georgia Dental Clinic

In caring for low-income, uninsured patients through our clinics and the We Care program, it became apparent that there is also a need for dental care for low-income, uninsured families in Rome and Floyd County. To help meet this need, Floyd partnered with the District Public Health office to plan and fund (in part by a Federal grant) the construction and operation of a comprehensive dental clinic for low-income residents of the region. In addition, Floyd makes its Outpatient Surgery Center facilities and staff available at no cost to dental clinic dentists to perform dental surgery on high risk patients.

Mobile Mammography

Floyd's mobile mammography coach, equipped with state-of-the-art digital mammography equipment, seeks to reach out to the mostly rural and underserved areas around Rome. This outreach program, which began service in November 2008, provided 2,378 mammograms to women in our service area in fiscal year 2011. Of those, 1,189 patients were past due for a mammogram, 594 women had never had a mammogram before and 315 screenings revealed an abnormality that required further testing. Eight women were diagnosed with cancer as a result of their visit to the mobile mammography coach. The goal of this program is to reach women who have never had a mammogram, in hope of reducing the breast cancer mortality rate in our region, which is among the highest in the nation. The coach traveled 7,776 miles in FY 2011 to women in four counties to make mammography and clinical breast exams convenient for them. This program seeks to provide services and education to these women in hopes of reducing that mortality rate and improving the lives of these women and their families.

Community Benefits

The Floyd Healthcare System, which includes Floyd Medical Center, Floyd Behavioral Health Center, Floyd Primary Care, Floyd Urgent Care, Floyd Outpatient Surgery Center, Floyd Physical Therapy and Rehab, Heyman HospiceCare of Floyd and a host of ancillary services, is a vital contributor to Rome, Floyd County and the entire Coosa Valley. In addition to health care services in over 40 specialties, Floyd serves as an economic force and civic leader in the region.

The Georgia Hospital Association estimates that Floyd, through its \$128.3 million annual payroll and benefits, as well as its purchases and other business relationships, generates more than \$457.7 million in economic activity in the state. The organization also is Floyd County's largest employer, with over 2,400 employees.

Services

Floyd's health care system provides a complete continuum of medical care to serve the healthcare needs of individuals in northwest Georgia and northeast Alabama through 38 physician offices, including 7 Urgent Care facilities, 21 Primary Care locations, diagnostic services, hospice, behavioral health and hospital services.

At the hub is Floyd Medical Center, a 304 bed, full-service acute care hospital and regional referral center that includes a Primary Stroke Center and Joint Replacement Program that have received the Joint Commission Gold Seal of Approval*, a Bariatric Surgery Center of Excellence, a Breast Imaging Center of Excellence, a state-designated level II Trauma Center, a level II Neonatal Intensive Care Unit as well as specialty centers for Pediatrics, Wound Care and Hyperbarics and breast care. Perhaps of most significance is the continuing commitment of Floyd to provide comprehensive health care services to all individuals regardless of ability to pay. In fiscal year 2011, \$63.7 million in care was delivered to individuals either in the form of indigent and charity care, medically indigent care or other unreimbursed care.
