

June 30, 2011

1. Organization

Mercy Health (f/k/a Sisters of Mercy Health System, Inc) (Mercy) was incorporated in September 1986 and became the sole corporate member of various health care corporations sponsored by the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, Regional Community of St Louis, a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church (Sisters of Mercy) In fiscal 2008, the Sisters of Mercy applied to the Vatican for a change in Mercy's sponsorship model In June 2008, approval was granted, and Mercy's sponsorship was changed to a public juridic person The new Catholic sponsoring body, Mercy Health Ministry, is governed by members that include Sisters of Mercy and lay leaders

Mercy is incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation under the laws of the state of Missouri and is a tax-exempt organization as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code)

Mercy and Subsidiaries (the Health System) comprise the following corporations and their subsidiaries

Each subsidiary above is a separately incorporated not-for-profit corporation and is tax-exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Code All significant intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated in consolidation

Significant Acquisitions and Divestitures

On June 30, 2010, Mercy committed to sell Mercy Health Plans, Inc (MHP) MHP, a for-profit corporation, is a health insurance organization that provides health maintenance organization (HMO) and preferred provider organization (PPO) insurance plans and health management services to subscribing employee groups and individuals in areas served by Mercy Effective October 1, 2010, Mercy sold MHP for \$106.7 million (see Note 6), subject to working capital adjustments. In May 2011, a working capital adjustment of \$2.0 million was received, further consideration is not expected to be material

During fiscal 2011, effective July 28, 2010, and February 1, 2011, two of the Health System's subsidiaries entered into asset purchase agreements to acquire the sole corporate membership in a hospital, ambulatory surgery center, medical office buildings, ancillary equipment, and physician practices for approximately \$70 8 million in cash and the assumption of a note payable of \$8 0 million. The transactions were accounted for as acquisitions in accordance with Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 958-805, *Business Combinations – Not-for-Profit Entities* (see Note 12)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Investments in highly liquid debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased, excluding amounts classified as assets limited as to use or restricted, are considered cash equivalents. The Health System routinely invests in money market mutual funds. These funds generally invest in highly liquid U.S. government and agency obligations. Financial instruments that potentially subject the Health System to concentrations of credit risk include the Health System's cash and cash equivalents. The Health System places its cash and cash equivalents with institutions with high credit quality. However, at certain times, such cash and cash equivalents are in excess of government-provided insurance limits.

Accounts Receivable and Related Allowances

The Health System provides health care services through inpatient and outpatient care facilities located in several states. The Health System grants credit to patients in return for health care services rendered to said patients, substantially all of whom are local residents of the communities served. The Health System generally does not require collateral or other security in extending credit to patients, however, it routinely obtains assignment of (or is otherwise entitled to receive) patients' benefits payable under their health insurance programs, plans, or policies (e.g., Medicare, Medicaid, HMOs, and commercial insurance policies). At June 30, 2011 and 2010, approximately 30% and 34%, respectively, of net accounts receivable were collectible from governmental payors (including Medicare and Medicaid), with approximately 48% and 49%, respectively, of net accounts receivable collectible from commercial insurance and managed care payors

Patient accounts that are uncollected, including those placed with collection agencies, are initially charged against the allowance for uncollectible accounts in accordance with collection policies of the Health System and, in certain cases, are reclassified to charity care if deemed to otherwise meet the Health System's charity care policy. The provision for uncollectible receivables is based upon management's assessment of historical and expected net collections considering business and economic conditions, trends in health care coverage, and other collection indicators. Periodically throughout the year, management assesses the adequacy of the allowance for uncollectible receivables based upon the payor composition and aging of receivables as of the reporting date with consideration of the historical payment and write-off experience by payor category. The results of these reviews are then used to make any modifications to the provision for uncollectible receivables to establish an appropriate allowance for uncollectible receivables. After satisfaction of amounts due from insurance, the Health System follows established guidelines for placing past-due patient balances with collection agencies.

Inventories

Inventories, which consist principally of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals, are stated at the lower of cost or market Cost is determined principally using the average cost method

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost or, if donated, at fair value at the date of receipt

Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of land and leasehold improvements, buildings, and equipment The estimated useful lives are as follows land and leasehold improvements, 2 to 30 years, buildings, 3 to 40 years, and equipment, 2 to 20 years

Internal-use software costs are expensed or capitalized depending on whether they are incurred in the preliminary project stage, application development stage, or post-implementation stage Costs associated with business process re-engineering, which are expensed as incurred, were \$40.8 million and \$36.6 million, respectively, in 2011 and 2010 Amounts capitalized are being amortized over eight years beginning at the time of implementation at each subsidiary. The total amount capitalized was \$382.2 million and \$338.3 million at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Amortization expense was \$43.5 million and \$33.7 million for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Asset Impairment

The Health System periodically evaluates the carrying value of its long-lived assets for impairment when indicators of impairment are identified. These evaluations are primarily based on the estimated recoverability of the assets' carrying value. Impairment write-downs are recognized in operating income at the time the impairment is identified.

Assets and Liabilities Held for Sale

A long-lived asset or disposal group of assets and liabilities that is expected to be sold, and for which it is probable that the sale will be completed within one year, is classified as held for sale For long-lived assets held for sale, an impairment charge is recorded if the carrying amount of the asset exceeds its fair value less costs to sell

Other Assets

Other assets consist primarily of investment securities held under deferred compensation arrangements, land held for future development, fair value of interest rate swaps in asset positions, and investments in unconsolidated affiliates

Goodwill

The Health System records goodwill arising from a business combination as the excess of purchase price and related costs over the fair value of identifiable tangible and intangible assets acquired and liabilities assumed At June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Health System had goodwill of \$31.5 million and \$24.6 million, respectively Beginning in 2011, the Health System annually reviews, as of January 1, the carrying value of goodwill for impairment In addition, a goodwill impairment assessment is performed if an event occurs or circumstances change that would make it more likely than not that the fair value of a reporting unit is below its carrying amount Management has determined that the Health System has seven reporting units at which fair value is measured. If such circumstances suggest that the recorded amounts of any of these assets cannot be recovered, the carrying values of such assets are reduced to fair value. If the carrying value of any of these assets is impaired, a material charge may be incurred to results of operations.

Net Assets

The Health System's net assets and activities are classified into two classes, restricted and unrestricted, based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Restricted net assets comprise temporarily restricted net assets (70% and 72% of restricted net assets at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively), whose use by the Health System has been limited by donors to a specific time period or for a particular purpose, and permanently restricted net assets (30% and 28% of restricted net assets at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively), which must be maintained by the Health System in perpetuity with the related investment income expendable to support the donor-designated purpose. The general nature of the donor restrictions is to support the Health System's indigent care mission and health education programs and to assist with capital projects

Net Patient Service Revenues

Net patient service revenues are reported at estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and include estimated retroactive revenue adjustments due to future audits, reviews, and investigations Retroactive third-party adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known Adjustments to revenue based on prior periods increased net patient service revenues by approximately \$14.2 million and \$14.3 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively, due to revised estimates consisting primarily of retroactive third-party adjustments for years that are subject to audits, reviews, and investigations

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 36% and 9%, respectively, of the Health System's net patient revenues for the year ended June 30, 2011 Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 36% and 10%, respectively, of the Health System's net patient revenues for the year ended June 30, 2010 Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term Noncompliance with Medicare and Medicaid laws and regulations can make the Health System subject to significant regulatory action, including substantial fines and penalties, as well as exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs

Capitation Revenues and Medical Claims Expense

Certain Health System acute care providers (the Providers) have entered into various risk-based contracts with certain HMOs Under these arrangements, the Providers receive capitated payments based on the demographic characteristics of covered members in exchange for providing certain medical services to those members. The Providers recognize medical claims expense for services provided. The medical claims expense represents claims paid, claims reported but not yet paid, and claims incurred but not reported (IBNR). The IBNR amount is estimated based upon prior experience modified for current trends. The claims IBNR amount was \$20.8 million and \$19.6 million at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and was included in accrued liabilities and other on the consolidated balance sheets.

Services to the Community

In support of its mission, the Health System provides care to patients who personally bear a significant financial burden relative to their health care services and are deemed to be medically indigent The Health System does not report charity care as net patient service revenues. The amount of charity care and services provided to the medically indigent, determined on the basis of charges, was 3 2% and 2 9% of gross patient service revenue for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively In addition, the Health System provides services to other medically indigent patients under various state Medicaid programs. Such programs pay providers amounts that are less than the costs of the services provided to the recipients The Health System classifies the resources utilized for the care of patients bearing a significant health care financial burden as compared to their resources as traditional charity care and unpaid cost of Medicaid Traditional charity care includes the cost of services provided to persons who cannot afford health care because of the financial burden of the health care services and/or who are uninsured or underinsured Charity care includes accounts for which the patient may not participate in the charity care process but are otherwise deemed to meet the Health System's charity care policy Unpaid cost of Medicaid represents the unpaid cost of services provided to persons covered by Medicaid

In addition to uncompensated costs, the Health System maintains community benefit programs designed to positively impact the health status of the communities served. These services include various clinics and outreach programs (designed to deliver health care services to underserved communities), medical education and research activities, and direct cash and in-kind charitable contributions

These community benefit programs also include the activities of Mercy Ministries of Laredo (MML), Mercy Caritas, Catherine's Fund, and Sister of Mercy Ministries that are administered by Mercy These programs finance charitable activities to help meet the needs of the poor, sick, and uneducated

Assets Limited as to Use or Restricted

Assets limited as to use include assets set aside through resolution by the Board of Directors for future long-term purposes, including capital improvements and self insurance. In addition, assets limited as to use include amounts contributed by donors with stipulated restrictions. Investments in equity securities and debt securities are measured at fair value. The cost of securities sold is based on the specific-identification method The Health System accounts for its ownership interest in alternative investments under the equity method. For purposes of recognizing investment returns as a component of excess of revenues over expenses, substantially all investments, other than alternative investments, are considered to be trading securities. Interest, dividends, realized gains (losses), and unrealized gains (losses) on assets held in the professional liability trust fund are reported as other operating revenues. The professional liability trust fund was terminated as of June 30, 2011 (see Note 7) All other unrestricted investment returns, including alternative investments, are included in nonoperating gains (losses) in the consolidated statements of operations Investment returns arising from donor-restricted resources are reported as a direct increase in restricted net assets in the consolidated statements of changes in net assets, consistent with the donors' restrictions. In addition, cash flows from the purchases and sales of marketable securities designated as trading are reported as a component of operating activities in the accompanying consolidated statements of cash flows

Derivative Financial Instruments

Derivative instruments are contracts between the Health System and a third party (counterparty) that provide for economic payments between the parties based on changes in some defined market security or index or combination thereof. The Health System's derivative financial instruments are primarily interest rate swaps utilized as part of its debt management process. The Health System recognizes all derivative instruments as either assets or liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets at fair value. The Health System does not account for any of its interest rate swap agreements as hedges, and accordingly, realized and unrealized gains (losses) and net settlement payments are reflected as a component of nonoperating gains (losses) in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations

Pledges, Bequests, and Gifts for Specific Purposes

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received, which is then treated as cost Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received Gifts are recorded as an increase in restricted net assets if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the assets Upon expenditure in accordance with a donor's restrictions and when the asset is placed in service, net assets restricted for capital acquisitions are reported as direct additions to unrestricted net assets, and assets restricted for operating purposes are reported as an increase in other operating revenues Donor-restricted contributions for operating purposes whose restrictions are met within the same year as received, and contributions received by donors without restrictions, are reflected as other operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations

Unconditional promises to give, less an allowance for uncollectible amounts, are recorded as receivables in the year made. Net pledges receivable of \$3.3 million and \$8.2 million were included in other current assets and other assets, respectively, at June 30, 2011. Pledges receivable of \$7.4 million and \$6.9 million were included in other current assets and other assets, respectively, at June 30, 2010. Functional Classification of Expenses

The Health System provides general health care services to residents within communities served, including acute inpatient, subacute inpatient, outpatient, ambulatory, long-term, and home care, as well as related general and administrative services

The Health System does not present expense information by functional classification because its resources and activities are primarily related to providing health care services. Furthermore, since the Health System receives substantially all of its resources from providing health care services in a manner similar to a business enterprise, other indicators contained in these consolidated financial statements are considered important in evaluating how well management has discharged its stewardship responsibilities.

Performance Indicator

The Health System's performance indicator (excess of revenues over expenses) includes all changes in unrestricted net assets other than pension liability adjustments, loss from discontinued operations, net assets released from restrictions for property acquisitions, and other

Operating and Nonoperating Gains (Losses)

The Health System's primary mission is to meet the health care needs in its market areas through a broad range of general and specialized health care services, including inpatient acute care, outpatient services, physician services, and other health care services. Activities directly associated with the furtherance of this purpose are considered to be operating activities. Other activities that result in gains or losses peripheral to the Health System's primary mission are considered to be nonoperating. Nonoperating activities include investment returns, net, excluding the earnings from the investments held by the professional liability trust fund, and realized and unrealized gains (losses) on interest rate swaps

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U S generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period Actual results could differ from those estimates

The objective of ASU 2010-07 is to improve the comparability of the information that a not-for-profit entity provides in its financial reports about a combination with one or more other not-for-profit entities, businesses, or nonprofit activities The guidance applies the carryover (similar to pooling) method to accounting for a merger, and the purchase accounting method to accounting for an acquisition, and clarifies the valuation basis to be used in determining the values of the assets and liabilities acquired In addition, this guidance makes provisions related to goodwill fully applicable to not-for-profit entities Effective July 1, 2010, the Health System adopted this guidance and ceased amortization of goodwill and indefinite lived intangible assets at that date A transitional impairment test was performed as of July 1, 2010, and no impairment was indicated All business combinations that occurred during the year ended June 30, 2011, were deemed to be acquisitions and were accounted for in accordance with this guidance

Recent Accounting Guidance Not Yet Adopted

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU 2010-23, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954): Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure* ASU 2010-23 is intended to reduce the diversity in practice regarding the measurement basis used in the disclosure of charity care ASU 2010-23 requires that cost be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes and that cost be identified as the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care, and requires disclosure of the method used to identify or determine such costs. This ASU is effective for the Health System on July 1, 2011. Management is currently evaluating the impact the adoption of this pronouncement may have on the Health System's disclosures.

In addition, the amount of the claim liability must be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. This ASU is effective for the Health System on July 1, 2011. In July 2011, the FASB released ASU 2011-7, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Entities ASU 2011-7 requires health care entities to change the presentation of their statement of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient services revenues (net of contractual allowances and discounts) In addition, enhanced disclosures will be required surrounding the entity's policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts ASU 2011-7 is effective for fiscal years and interim periods within those fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2011 Management is evaluating the effect of adopting ASU 2011-7

The Health System's investments are exposed to various kinds and levels of risk Fixed income securities expose the Health System to interest rate risk, credit risk, and liquidity risk As interest rates change, the value of many fixed income securities is affected, particularly those with fixed rates Credit risk is the risk that the obligor of the security will not fulfill its obligations Liquidity risk is affected by the willingness of market participants to buy and sell given securities Equity securities expose the Health System to market risk, performance risk, and liquidity risk Market risk is the risk associated with major movements of the equity markets, both foreign and domestic Performance risk is the risk associated with a company's operating performance Liquidity risk as previously defined tends to be higher for foreign equities and equities related to small capitalization companies

Certain of the Health System's investments are made through alternative investments, primarily limited partnership investments, including hedge funds, and private equity funds. These investments provide the Health System with a proportionate share of the investment gains and losses and take their positions in part through derivative contracts. They generally contract with a manager who has full discretionary authority over the investment decisions. The hedge funds and private equity funds present risks similar to those of traditional investments, as well as some additional risks. Due to the fact that these funds are invested through limited partnerships or other limited access-type vehicles, pricing is infrequent and liquidity may also be limited in some cases, up to 12 months. These investments may also employ leverage, which may lead to additional risk of loss. These investments are subject to market risk, default risk, interest rate risk, and credit risk as well as various other types of risks. At June 30, 2011, the Health System has commitments to fund \$35.1 million in these investments.

At the balance sheet dates, receivables and payables for investment trades not settled are presented with other current assets and other current liabilities. Unsettled sales resulted in receivables due from brokers of \$85.6 million and \$19.2 million at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Unsettled buys resulted in payables of \$60.3 million and \$23.3 million at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

4. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurements and disclosures topic of the FASB ASC establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurement)

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy and a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value are as follows

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date

Level 2 – Pricing inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1, which are either directly observable or can be derived or supported from observable data as of the reporting date

Level 3 – Pricing inputs include those that are significant to the fair value of the financial asset or financial liability and are not observable from objective sources. These inputs may be used with internally developed methodologies that result in management's best estimate of fair value.

The following is a description of the Health System's valuation methodologies for assets and liabilities measured at fair value Fair value for Level 1 is based upon quoted market prices. The fair value of certain Level 2 securities was determined through evaluated bid prices provided by third-party pricing services if quoted market prices were not available. These Level 2 investments include cash equivalents, international equities, corporate debt securities, government agencies, government obligations, and commingled funds. The fair values of the interest rate swap contracts, also Level 2 measurements, are determined based on the present value of expected future cash flows using discount rates appropriate with the risks involved. The valuations reflect a credit spread adjustment to the London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) discount curve in order to reflect nonperformance risk. The credit spread adjustment is derived from other comparable rated entities' bonds priced in the market. The fair values of other securities in the deferred compensation plan's assets are based on unobservable inputs and are recorded based on information provided by the trustee

The carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, notes receivable, pledges receivable, and current liabilities are reasonable estimates of their fair values due to the short-term nature of these financial instruments. The fair value of the Health System's fixed-rate bonds is based on quoted market prices for the same or similar issues and approximates \$9.5 million and \$11.6 million as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The carrying amount approximates fair value for all other long-term debt, and excludes the impact of third-party credit enhancements.

Due to the volatility of the stock market, there is a reasonable possibility of changes in fair value and additional gains and losses in the near term subsequent to June 30, 2011

6. Discontinued and Held for Sale Operations

On June 30, 2010, Mercy committed to sell Mercy Health Plans, Inc (MHP) MHP, a for-profit corporation, is a health insurance organization that provides HMO and PPO insurance plans and health management services to subscribing employee groups and individuals in areas served by Mercy Effective October 1, 2010, Mercy sold MHP for \$106 7 million, subject to working capital adjustments In May 2011, a working capital adjustment of \$2 0 million was received Management does not expect that further adjustments will be material

The operations of MHP have been classified as discontinued operations in accordance with ASC 205, *Discontinued Operations*, because the associated operations and cash flows have been eliminated from ongoing operations, and the Health System does not have significant continuing involvement in the operations of MHP For all periods presented, the operating results for these operations have been removed from continuing operations and presented separately as discontinued operations in the consolidated statements of operations, and the assets and liabilities are presented as held for sale on the consolidated balance sheets. The notes to the consolidated financial statements were adjusted to exclude discontinued operations.

7. Liability Programs

The Health System administers a liability program to provide for general and professional liability risks within certain limits. The recorded liabilities are based upon actuarial estimates of reported claims and IBNR claims using historical claim experience and other relevant industry and hospital-specific factors and trends, discounted at an interest rate of 4.75% and 5.00% for 2011 and 2010, respectively. Until June 30, 2011, the Health System maintained assets in a revocable trust fund to cover these risks. On June 30, 2011, the trust was terminated, and the funds were merged into board-designated funds for investment purposes. Management, however, continues to monitor and track these funds separately. The discounted general and professional liability was \$141.0 million and \$145.9 million at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, which is included in accrued liabilities and insurance reserves in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Health care professional liabilities in excess of self-insured limits are insured on a claims-made basis subject to an annual maximum of \$20,000 over the self-insured retention of \$10,000, after which the Health System would again be responsible

8. Employee Retirement Plans

The Sisters of Mercy created a single defined benefit retirement plan (the Plan) to provide coverage under a single plan for groups acquired in business combinations. Sponsorship of the Plan and certain defined-contribution plans described below were transferred from Sisters of Mercy to the Health System during fiscal 2007. Pension benefits are provided to substantially all Health System employees through the Plan. As new employee groups were transitioned to the Plan, the Plan was modified through plan amendments to provide credit for service with the acquired provider. Plan benefits were calculated using a cash balance-type formula that is based on employee compensation and number of years of service. All participants' plan balances are credited with a guaranteed annual rate of interest based on the 30-year U.S. Treasury bill rate, subject to a floor of 5.25%. Amounts are contributed to the Plan consistent with actuarial funding requirements.

Mercy also sponsors 401(k) and 403(b) plans that are provided to substantially all Health System employees and include an employer matching contribution. In June 2010, the Health System's Board of Directors voted to transition future benefit accruals under the defined-benefit plan to the existing 401(k) plan by providing a non-matching service-based contribution and an enhanced employer matching contribution. This change occurred in July 2011

Fair value methodologies for Level 1 and Level 2 assets are consistent with the inputs described in Note 4 Level 3 securities, which consist of alternative investments (principally limited partnership interests in hedge funds and private equity funds) and a guaranteed investment contract, represent the Plan's ownership interest in the net asset value (NAV) of the respective partnership

Management opted to use the NAV per share, or its equivalent, as a practical expedient for fair value of the Plan's interest in hedge funds and private equity funds. Valuations provided by the respective fund's management consider variables such as the financial performance of underlying investments, recent sales prices of underlying investments, and other pertinent information. In addition, actual market exchanges at period-end provide additional observable market inputs of the exit price. The majority of these funds have restrictions on the timing of withdrawals, which may reduce liquidity, in some cases for up to 12 months. The Plan employs investment managers to invest fund balances in a structured portfolio of equity, fixed income, alternative investments, and real estate The Plan's current asset allocation policy was approved in fiscal 2009 by the Health System's Finance, Audit, and Compliance Committee The revised policy resulted in a reallocation of assets in order to meet the new target allocation. The full reallocation was initiated in fiscal 2010 and was completed in fiscal 2011. All manager performance is reviewed to test that market performance has been calculated accurately, to monitor performance versus peers and benchmarking, and to evaluate portfolio structure considering current and future needs based on economic forecasts and actuarial projections. The Plan's trustees believe that a diversified portfolio will limit the degree of risk to the Plan and stabilize the long-term results. The Plan's diversified blend of marketable securities also takes into consideration the cash flow requirements of the Plan to help ensure the ability to meet the monthly payout of benefits required. Projected rates of return for each asset category were selected after analyzing historical experience and future expectations of the returns and volatility for assets of that category

The Health System expects to contribute at least \$80 0 million to the Plan during fiscal 2012

Mercy's not-for-profit subsidiaries have executed a commitment agreement governing certain borrowing arrangements under the Mercy Master Trust Indenture and related agreements (Financing Agreements) While only the revenues of Mercy collateralize the outstanding borrowings of the Health System, each of these subsidiaries has committed to transfer such assets to Mercy to pay the amounts due on borrowings when they come due The Financing Agreements contain certain restrictive covenants, including debt service coverage and liquidity ratios

Tax-exempt revenue bonds have been issued by various issuing authorities, the proceeds of which were used by Mercy primarily to finance capital projects and to refinance existing indebtedness of certain subsidiaries

Mercy's Series 2001 A-C bonds are auction-rate securities aggregating to \$378.3 million. The interest rate is set through a weekly auction process among bond investors. Starting in fiscal 2008, due to the marketwide financial crisis, institutional buyers and investment banks opted not to participate in the market for securities of this type, causing a failure of the auction process and resulting in the bonds resetting to a rate predefined in the bond agreement based on the current LIBOR index.

In May 2008, Mercy issued variable-rate tax-exempt health facility revenue bonds aggregating \$110 0 million (the Series 2008 A-C Bonds) The Series 2008 A-C Bonds are subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption requirements beginning June 1, 2009, through June 1, 2019, with a current outstanding amount of \$76 4 million The Series 2008 A-C Bonds are backed by a standby bond purchase agreement in the event of a failed remarketing. If the bonds are not remarketed, the principal on the term loans would generally be payable beginning 366 days after a failed remarketing in 12 equal quarterly installments. The standby bond purchase agreement expires May 18, 2012.

In December 2008, Mercy issued variable-rate tax-exempt health facility revenue bonds aggregating \$300 0 million (the Series 2008 D-H Bonds) The Series 2008 D-H Bonds are subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption requirements beginning June 1, 2025, through June 1, 2039 The Series 2008 D-H Bonds are backed by standby bond purchase agreements in the unlikely event of a failed remarketing If the bonds are not remarketed, the principal on the term loans would generally be payable beginning 366 days after a failed remarketing in 12 equal quarterly installments The Series 2008 D-H Bonds contain a series of the bonds totaling \$150 0 million, which are backed by standby liquidity facilities with an expiration of March 14, 2012 The remaining \$150 0 million of bonds are backed by standby liquidity facilities with an expiration of March 14, 2014

Other notes payable, mortgage notes payable, and capital lease obligations are secured by certain property and equipment of the specific borrowers

10. Derivatives

The Health System has interest rate-related derivative instruments to manage its exposure on its variable-rate debt instruments and does not enter into derivative instruments for any purpose other than risk management Interest rate swap contracts between the Health System and a third party (counterparty) provide for the periodic exchange of payments between the parties based on changes in a defined index and a fixed rate and expose the Health System to market risk and credit risk Credit risk is the risk that contractual obligations of the counterparties will not be fulfilled Concentrations of credit risk relate to groups of counterparties that have similar economic or industry characteristics that would cause their ability to meet contractual obligations to be similarly affected by changes in economic or other conditions. Counterparty credit risk is managed by requiring high credit standards for the Health System's counterparties The counterparties to these contracts are financial institutions that carry investment-grade credit ratings The interest rate swap contracts contain collateral provisions applicable to both parties to mitigate credit risk The Health System does not anticipate nonperformance by its counterparties Market risk is the adverse effect on the value of a financial instrument that results from a change in interest rates The market risk associated with interest rate changes is managed by establishing and monitoring parameters that limit the types and degree of market risk that may be undertaken Management also mitigates risk through periodic reviews of the Health System's derivative positions in the context of its blended cost of capital

12. Acquisitions

During fiscal 2011, effective July 28, 2010, and February 1, 2011, two of the Health System's subsidiaries entered into asset purchase agreements to acquire the sole corporate membership in a hospital, ambulatory surgery center, medical office buildings, ancillary equipment, and physician practices for approximately \$70 8 million in cash and the assumption of a note payable of \$8 0 million. The transactions were accounted for as acquisitions in accordance with ASC Topic 958-805, *Business Combinations – Not-for-Profit Entities*

Acquisitions provided the Health System's patients with access to a greater number of specialists and enhanced the coordination of health services

Revenues of the acquired entities included in the consolidated statements of operations were \$36.9 million for the year ended June 30, 2011 Acquisition-related costs were expensed as incurred

13. Joplin Tornado Damages

An EF-5 tornado hit the city of Joplin on May 22, 2011 St John's Regional Medical Center (SJRMC) suffered significant physical damage to the acute care hospital and certain medical office buildings as a result of the tornado. The operations of SJRMC were expected to be approximately 5% of the Health System's consolidated net patient service revenues in fiscal 2011. The Health System continues to provide health care services in a temporary facility, but in a much diminished capacity.

For the year ended June 30, 2011, management has recorded a \$16.1 million impairment loss equal to the book value of the buildings and equipment impacted by the tornado. This is reflected in depreciation expense on the accompanying consolidated statement of operations. In addition, management has recorded a \$6.0 million impairment loss for inventory destroyed. This is reflected in supplies and other expense on the accompanying consolidated statement of operations.

The Health System expects to incur additional costs related to cleanup and security of the premises and has made a commitment to pay employees for an extended period of time. These expenses will be recorded as incurred. It is anticipated these costs will ultimately be covered by insurance.

The Health System maintains insurance coverage of \$750 million, which covers property damage, business interruption, and related costs, subject to a deductible During fiscal 2011, the Health System received a \$50 0 million initial payment from its insurance company related to this event Of the \$50 0 million, \$16 1 million is recorded as a reduction of depreciation expense to offset the impairment losses pertaining to buildings and equipment, and \$6 0 million is recorded as a reduction of supplies and other expense to offset the impairment losses pertaining to inventory. The remaining \$27 9 million is included in other operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations. The Health System expects the ultimate settlement of the related insurance claim to take several years to finalize. Future cash payments under the policy will be recorded when received in operating income.

14. Commitments and Contingencies

Regulatory Compliance

The U S Department of Justice and other federal agencies are increasing resources dedicated to regulatory investigations and compliance audits of health care providers. The Health System is not exempt from these regulatory efforts and has received correspondence from federal agencies with regard to such initiatives. In consultation with legal counsel, management estimates these matters will be resolved without a material adverse effect on the Health System's consolidated financial position or results of operations.

Litigation

The Health System is involved in litigation arising in the normal course of business After consultation with legal counsel, it is management's opinion that these matters will be resolved without a material adverse effect on the Health System's consolidated financial position or results of operations

15. Subsequent Events

The Health System evaluated events and transactions occurring subsequent to June 30, 2011, through September 26, 2011, the date the consolidated financial statements were issued During this period, there were no subsequent events that required recognition in the consolidated financial statements On September 1, 2011, the Health System received \$188 0 million from its insurance company as a partial settlement for hospital and medical office building losses related to the tornado that impacted SJRMC
