

#### Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Nature of Operations

The consolidated financial statements of Trinity Mother Frances Health System and Subsidiaries (the Health System) include the accounts of Trinity Mother Frances Health System (the System) and its wholly owned subsidiaries 

Entities included in the consolidated financial statements of the Health System are

- Mother Frances Hospital Regional Health Care Center and Subsidiaries (the Consolidated Hospital Group)
- Trinity Clinic (the Clinic)
- Mother Frances Hospital Jacksonville (Jacksonville)
- Mother Frances Hospital Winnsboro (Winnsboro)
- Mother Frances Hospital Corsicana (Corsicana)
- The Regional Healthcare Alliance (TRHA)
- Tri-State Financial, L L C (Tri-State)
- TrinCare, Inc (TCI)
- HealthPlan of Texas, Inc (HOT)

The sole member organization of the System is the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church

Mother Frances Hospital Regional Health Care Center (the Hospital) is an acute care facility whose operations consist primarily of inpatient and outpatient acute care medical services to residents of Tyler. Texas, and surrounding areas. Wholly owned subsidiaries included in the consolidated financial statements of the Consolidated Hospital Group include Texas Health Facility Insurance Corporation, Ltd. (THFIC), and Regional Medical Services Association (RMSA). THFIC is a captive insurance company incorporated in the Cayman Islands for the purpose of providing primary excess professional liability coverage for the Hospital, which is then ceded to a reinsurance company. RMSA is a nonprofit corporation that recruits and employs physicians to serve the Hospital.

The Hospital also owns approximately 50% of HealthSouth Rehabilitation Hospital - Tyler d/b/a/ Trinity Mother Frances Rehabilitation Hospital (HealthSouth) Because the Hospital does not exercise control of HealthSouth, this investment is accounted for using the equity method of accounting

The Hospital also owns a 51% interest in Tyler Radiation Equipment Leasing, LLC (TREL), which is also accounted for using the equity method of accounting due to a lack of Hospital control

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

The Clinic, a nonprofit corporation, is a multi-specialty physician group organized to own and operate outpatient medical clinics serving residents of Tyler, Texas, and surrounding areas

Jacksonville is a tax-exempt critical access hospital providing services to residents in and around Jacksonville. Texas As a critical access hospital. Jacksonville's acute length of stay may not exceed 96 hours and its total acute-care beds cannot exceed 25

Winnsboro is a tax-exempt acute care hospital providing inpatient and outpatient medical and psychiatric services to residences in and around Winnsboro. Texas In 2011, Winnsboro was designated as a critical access hospital. The Health System became the sole member of Winnsboro on March 1, 2010. The Health System accounted for its acquisition of Winnsboro in a manner similar to a pooling of interests. As such, the Health System recognized an increase in net assets of \$6,208,719 during 2010 due to its assumption of control. The prior owner of Winnsboro retained all cash and accounts receivable of the entity, as well as most liabilities. No cash or other consideration was paid by the Health System.

Corsicana is a nonprofit corporation organized with the intent of operating an acute care hospital providing services to residents in and around Corsicana. Texas During 2007, the Health System ceased planning for operations in Corsicana

TRHA, a nonprofit, taxable corporation, is a preferred provider organization. The System appoints the governing body of TRHA

Tri-State is a taxable limited liability company organized to serve as a collection agency for health care providers. Tri-State is wholly owned by the System. Tri-State is a dormant company as operations ceased in February 2001.

TCI is a taxable corporation organized to provide various clinical and management services TCI is wholly owned by the System TCI currently operates a reference laboratory which began operations during 2010, and two optical shops which began operations in 2011

HOT is a taxable, for-profit corporation organized primarily to create new health care resources and health care arrangements to be offered to the general public and third-party payers. HOT was originally licensed to operate as a health maintenance organization in Texas in accordance with Article 20A of the Texas Insurance Code, but was re-licensed as a third-party administrator in December 2005. HOT is wholly owned by the System

The System holds a nonvoting membership interest in ContinueCARE Hospital of Tyler. Inc (CCHT), a long-term acute care hospital. In accordance with the terms of the membership agreement, 80% of annual cash dividends from CCHT are distributed to the System. During 2011 and 2010, CCHT distributed approximately \$1,610,000 and \$4,761,000, respectively, in cash dividends under this arrangement, which are recognized as other operating revenues by the System

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

The Health System owns a 50% interest in Champion EMS, a joint venture with an unrelated medical center to provide ambulance services in Northeast Texas This investment is accounted for under the equity method of accounting

#### **Principles of Consolidation**

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the System, the Consolidated Hospital Group, the Clinic, Jacksonville, Winnsboro, Corsicana, TRHA, Tri-State, TCI and HOT All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

#### Cash Equivalents

The Health System considers all liquid investments with maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers.

#### Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. Other investments, other than those previously disclosed as accounted for using the equity method of accounting, are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value, if determinable

The Health System also invests in alternative investments, including hedge funds. Fair value of these investments are estimated using the net asset value per share of the investment based on information provided by the investment managers.

Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments stated at fair value, and realized gains and losses on other investments. Investment return is reflected in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

#### Assets Limited As To Use

Assets limited as to use include (1) assets held by trustees under bond indenture and escrow agreements. (2) assets set aside by the Board of Governors (the Board) and held by trustees under self-insurance, deferred compensation and supplemental retirement plan trust agreements. (3) assets set aside by the Board for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes and (4) assets restricted by donors for specific purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Health System are included in current assets.

#### Patient Accounts Receivable

Patient accounts receivable are stated at net realizable amounts from third-party payers, patients and others. The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro provide an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding receivables, historical collection information and existing economic conditions. As a service to the patient, third-party payers are billed directly and bills are sent to the patient when the patient's liability is determined. Patient accounts receivable are due in full when billed. Accounts are considered delinquent and subsequently written off as bad debts based on individual credit evaluation and specific circumstances of the account.

#### Inventories

The Health System states inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method or market

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

The Health System capitalizes interest costs as a component of construction in progress, first based on interest costs of borrowing specifically for the project, net of interest earned on investments acquired with the proceeds of the borrowing and then based on the weighted-average interest expense incurred on other funds expended for the project

#### Long-lived Asset Impairment

The Health System evaluates the recoverability of the carrying value of long-lived assets whenever events or circumstances indicate the carrying amount may not be recoverable. If a long-lived asset is tested for recoverability and the undiscounted estimate future cash flows expected to result from the use and eventual disposition of the asset is less than the carrying amount of the asset, the asset cost is adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss is recognized as the amount by which the carrying amount of long-lived asset exceeds its fair value. No asset impairment was recognized during the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010

#### Interest in Net Assets of Trinity Mother Frances Health System Foundation Center for Health Care Philanthropy (the Foundation)

The Foundation and the Health System are financially interrelated organizations. The Foundation seeks private support for and holds net assets on behalf of the Health System. The Health System accounts for its interest in the net assets of the Foundation (Interest) in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the Interest are included in change in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Foundation and the Health System are recognized as increases or decreases in the Interest.

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

### **Deferred Financing Costs**

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt Such costs are being amortized using the interest method

### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Health System has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. The interest in the net assets of the Foundation includes permanently restricted net assets, which have been restricted by donors at the Foundation to be maintained in perpetuity.

#### Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro have agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the entities at amounts different from their established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known.

#### Charity Care

The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro provide care without charge or at amounts less than established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under their charity care policies. Because the Health System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, those amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

#### **Contributions**

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are accrued at estimated fair value at the date each promise is received. Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

### **Estimated Malpractice Costs**

An annual estimated provision is accrued for the self-insured portion of medical malpractice claims and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported

### Income from Operations

The Health System considers investment income from assets held by trustee under bond indenture agreements and trust accounts established to fund physician-deferred compensation agreements as operating income. In addition, the Health System considers earnings from its investment in Health South as operating income and considers donations to community service organizations as non-operating expense. All other investment return is included in non-operating income.

#### Income Taxes

The System, the Hospital, RMSA, the Clinic, Jacksonville, Winnsboro and Corsicana have been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, these entities are subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

THFIC is not considered to be engaged in a United States trade or business and, therefore, is not subject to United States income taxes. If THFIC were to be considered engaged in a United States trade or business, it could be subject to federal income tax. THFIC is currently exempt from income taxes in the Cayman Islands. Accordingly, no provision for taxes has been made.

With a few exceptions, the Health System is no longer subject to U S federal examinations by tax authorities for years before 2008

#### Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include certain changes in defined benefit pension liabilities, permanent transfers to and from affiliates for other than goods and services and contributions of long-lived assets with no donor restrictions (including assets acquired using contributions, which, by donor restriction, were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets). Contributions of long-lived assets with donor-imposed restrictions that were not met in the same year are included in the change in temporarily restricted net assets

### Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices). Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the actual transfer date

#### Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2010 consolidated financial statements to conform to the 2011 consolidated financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets

#### Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro have agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include

### **Medicare**

Inpatient and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries of the Hospital are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge or occasion of service. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. The Hospital is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports, which are subject to audits by the Medicare administrative contractor.

Jacksonville and Winnsboro have been classified as critical access hospitals (CAH) by the Medicare program. As a CAH, payments for inpatient and outpatient services are made based on the reasonable costs of providing care to Medicare program beneficiaries. CAH status places certain operating constraints on Jacksonville and Winnsboro, including limitations on patient census and average length of stav.

Services to Medicare beneficiaries provided by the Clinic are primarily reimbursed under a fee schedule methodology

### <u>Medicaid</u>

Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a mixture of prospective and cost-based methodologies. Outpatient and physician services are reimbursed under a mixture of cost reimbursement and fee schedule methods. The Hospital, Jacksonville and Winnsboro are reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports, which are subject to audits by the Medicaid administrative contractor.

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

Approximately 43% and 45% of net patient service revenue was from participation in the Medicare and state-sponsored Medicaid programs for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term

The Health System participates in the State of Texas' Disproportionate Share Program (Dispro) and private Upper Payment Limit (UPL) programs. Under the private UPL program, various governmental agencies make intergovernmental transfers (IGT) on behalf of the Health System. These transfers are used by the state of Texas Medicaid program to draw down federal funding for the Medical Center based on its UPL gap, which is approximately equal to the difference in what Medicare would have paid for the Health System's Medicaid charges and what Medicaid actually paid. The state generally remits these amounts to the Medical Center on a quarterly basis. Total UPL and Dispro funds received during the years ending June 30, 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$21,942,000 and \$10,098,000 respectively. Recent changes in the Texas Medicaid program will alter the manner in which UPL payments are made, and it is reasonably possible the Health System's payments may be reduced by a material amount in future years.

The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro have also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and other plans, which provide for payments at discounted rates, per-diem amounts or predetermined amounts per case or encounter

The provision for uncollectible accounts as reflected in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets reflects charges due from uninsured and underinsured patients that were deemed uncollectible. The related expense recognized in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets is approximately \$46.379.000 and \$35.074.000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Hospital, Jacksonville and Winnsboro have programs whereby uninsured patients are given an automatic discount on their gross charges of approximately 30%. Charges reduced under this program are not reflected in net patient service revenue.

#### **Deposits**

Effective July 21, 2010, the FDIC's insurance limits were permanently increased to \$250,000. At June 30, 2011, the Health System's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$868,000. The Health System's cash includes approximately \$67,000,000 in repurchase agreements that are swept from the Health System's operating cash account each night

The financial institution holding the Health System's cash accounts is participating in the FDIC's Transaction Account Guarantee Program—Under that program, through December 31, 2010, all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts are fully guaranteed by the FDIC for the entire amount in the account—Pursuant to legislation enacted in 2010, the FDIC will fully insure all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts beginning December 31, 2010 through December 31, 2012, at all FDIC-insured institutions

#### Alternative Investments

Alternative investments include an investment in a single hedge fund structured as a limited liability partnership. The fair value of the hedge fund has been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investment. This fund's objective is to preserve capital and generate consistent long-term appreciation and returns across all market cycles. This fund invests across a broad range of asset classes and strategies. Fund redemptions can generally be requested quarterly. If redemption requests exceed 10% of the total fund assets, then redemptions are made on a pro-rata basis. Full redemptions are subject to a 5% hold-back pending completion of the fund's annual audit. The Health System does not have any unfulfilled commitments related to this fund. The value of this fund at June 30, 2011 and 2010 was \$4,930,125 and \$4,501,484, respectively.

### Note 5: Interest in Net Assets of Trinity Mother Frances Health System Foundation Center for Health Care Philanthropy

The Foundation was established to solicit contributions principally to support the operations of the Health System. Funds are distributed to the Health System as determined by the Foundation's Board. The Health System's interest in the net assets of the Foundation is reported in the consolidated balance sheets and was \$9,995,898 and \$8,914,715 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

### Note 6: Risk Management

The Health System is self-insured for the first \$3,000,000 of each medical malpractice claim. The Health System purchases commercial insurance coverage above the self-insurance limits. Losses from asserted and unasserted claims identified under the Health System's incident reporting system are accrued based on estimates that incorporate the Health System's past experience, as well as other considerations, including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. Accrued malpractice losses have been estimated by professional insurance consultants.

The Health System is also self-insured for employee health care and workers' compensation claims. A reserve has been established for unpaid claims, and claims incurred but not received, and is reflected in estimated self-insurance costs in the consolidated balance sheets.

A provision is accrued for self-insured claims, including both claims reported and claims incurred but not yet reported. The accrual is estimated based on consideration of prior claims experience, recently settled claims, frequency of claims and other economic and social factors. It is reasonably possible that the Health System's estimate will change by a material amount in the near term

(A) Series 2007A Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the 2007A Bonds) in the original amount of \$65,550,000 with a premium of \$1,239,990 dated May 16, 2007, interest ranging from 4 25% to 5 25%. The 2007A Bonds are payable in annual installments through July 1, 2033. All of the 2007A Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after July 1, 2017, at face value

The Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation (the Corporation) issued the 2007A Bonds on behalf of the Hospital. The 2007A Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a mortgage lien on the land and buildings constituting the main campus of the Hospital. The 2007A Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation. The 2007A Bonds were issued to advance refund \$20,000,000 of outstanding 2003 Bonds and all of the outstanding 2001 Bonds, which totaled \$40,000,000 at the time of the advance refunding.

- (B) Series 2007B Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the 2007B Bonds) in the original amount of \$23,000,000 with a premium of \$53,130 dated May 16, 2007, bearing interest at 5% The 2007B Bonds are payable in annual installments from 2035 to 2038 All of the 2007B Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after July 1, 2017, at face value
  - The Corporation issued the 2007B Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 2007B Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a mortgage lien on the land and buildings constituting the main campus of the Hospital The 2007B Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation
- (C) Series 2003 Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Bonds (the 2003 Bonds) in the original amount of \$59.550.000 with a premium of \$1.203.954 dated May 8, 2003, interest ranging from 2% to 5.75%. The 2003 Bonds are payable in annual installments through July 1, 2033. All of the 2003 Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after July 1, 2013, at face value.
  - The Corporation issued the 2003 Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 2003 Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a mortgage lien on the land and buildings constituting the main campus of the Hospital The 2003 Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation As mentioned previously, \$20,000,000 of the outstanding 2003 Bonds were advanced refunded through the issuance of the 2007A Bonds
- (D) Series 1997B Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Bonds (the 1997B Bonds) in the original amount of \$40,000,000 dated December 29, 1997, which bear interest at a variable rate (currently 0 3%), not to exceed 12%. The Hospital may select a fixed interest rate mode for all or any portion of the bonds. The 1997B Bonds are due July 1, 2020, with mandatory annual principal redemptions required between fiscal years 2015 and 2021. All of the 1997B Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option prior to their stated maturity at face value.

The Corporation issued the 1997B Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 1997B Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a letter of credit established with a bank. The 1997B Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation.

The Hospital had a letter of credit (LOC) which expired on September 29, 2010. As of June 30, 2010, no amounts were outstanding under this LOC. The Hospital entered into a new LOC with an effective date of September 29, 2010, and an expiration date of January 1, 2014. Any advances under this LOC are due in equal installments over a three year period, which begins the 367th day immediately succeeding the date of the advance. Any remaining principal balance would be due on the expiration date.

(E) Series 1992 Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Bonds (the 1992 Bonds) in the original amount of \$45,000,000 dated April 15, 1992, bearing interest at rates ranging from 6 125% to 6 6% The 1992 Bonds are due in varying amounts including mandatory sinking fund payments through July 1, 2022

In 2003, \$4,140,000 of the 1992 Bonds outstanding were redeemed and the remaining \$33,620,000 of the 1992 Bonds outstanding were tendered as part of a total return swap transaction (See *Note 8*)

The Corporation issued the 1992 Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 1992 Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and an irrevocable policy of municipal bond insurance issued by Financial Guaranty Insurance Company, which unconditionally guarantees the payment of principal and interest. The 1992 Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation

- (F) Note payable to bank for the System, originally due in equal monthly installments of \$67,864, including interest at 5 2%, from May 1, 2009 through March 1, 2014, with a lump-sum payment of \$8,467,286 representing the entire balance of principal and unpaid interest shall be due on April 1, 2014. The note was modified at March 2, 2011. The new terms require payment of equal monthly installments of \$67,855 including interest at 5 25% from April 1, 2011 through April 1, 2029. Any outstanding principal balance and accrued interest is due in full on April 1, 2029. The note is secured by certain Hospital property and equipment.
- (G) Note payable to bank for the Clinic, due in equal monthly installments of \$100,000 plus interest at varying rates of LIBOR plus 0.85%, (currently 1.04%). Any outstanding principal balance and accrued interest is due in full at maturity on October 1, 2013. The note is secured by certain equipment.

- (H) Note payable to bank for the Clinic, due in equal monthly installments of \$100,000 plus interest at varying rates of LIBOR plus 0.85%, (currently 1.04%). Any outstanding principal balance and accrued interest is due in full at maturity on August 1, 2013. The note is secured by certain equipment.
- (I) Tax exempt note payable to bank for the System, due in equal monthly installments of \$43,471, including interest at 4 99%, from October 30, 2009 through September 30, 2014, with a lump-sum payment of \$4,110,804, representing the entire balance of principal and unpaid interest, due on September 30, 2014

The indenture and loan agreements require that certain funds be established with a trustee Accordingly, these funds are included as assets limited as to use and held by trustee in the consolidated balance sheets. The agreements also require the Hospital to comply with certain restrictive covenants, including minimum insurance coverage, maintaining a historical debt-service coverage ratio of at least 1 20, and restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt and disposition of assets

Should the Health System be required to utilize the LOC to fund non-remarketed 1997B Bonds, the potential maturities and sinking fund requirements would be different than scheduled maturities. #### Note 8: Derivative Financial Instruments

In 2008 as a strategy to take advantage of the lower variable interest rates available in the market and to more closely correlate its fixed and variable rate debt to its fixed and variable rate investments, the Hospital entered into a total return swap agreement for its fixed rate debt related to the 1992 Bonds issue (the Total Return Swap). The Total Return Swap agreement included two components, the first of which provides for the Hospital to receive interest from the counterparty of between 6% and 6.1% on an amortizing notional amount of \$31,430,000 and to pay interest to the counterparty at a floating rate tied to the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association Municipal Swap Index (SIFMA). The terms of the agreement have undergone several revisions. The most recent revision on April 15, 2011 changed the amount paid by the Hospital to SIFMA, plus between 65 and 200 basis points depending on the Hospital's bond rating on an amortizing notional amount of \$25,095,000. As of June 30, 2011, the amount paid by the Hospital is SIFMA plus 200 basis points. The maturity date is April 15, 2014. The agreement contains an early termination option. Under the agreements, the Hospital pays or receives the net interest amount monthly, with the monthly settlements included in interest expense in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

The Total Return Swap also includes a total return component. The terms of this component were not changed as a result of the various amendments. As the 1992 Bonds are paid, and upon the termination of the agreement for any 1992 Bonds still outstanding, the Hospital will pay the counterparty the difference in the fair value of the bonds and 100% of par, if fair value is less than par. If fair value exceeds the par amount of the applicable bonds, the counterparty will pay the Hospital 85% of the difference.

The Hospital has elected not to apply hedge accounting treatment to the Total Return Swap Therefore, the change in the fair value of the swap agreement is recognized as a gain or loss in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets, as a component of excess of revenues over expenses. The Total Return Swap requires collateral posting if it has a negative value. No collateral was required to be posted as of June 30, 2011 and 2010. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, the amount of collateral posted in previous periods that was recoverable by the Hospital was \$1,249,297 and \$1,188,690, respectively.

As a strategy to lower the overall interest expense incurred on its existing long-term debt, the Hospital entered into a non-amortizing basis swap during 2007 (the Basis Swap). The Basis Swap agreement provides for the Hospital to receive interest from the counterparty of 67% of LIBOR, plus 0 274% on a notional amount of \$75,000,000 and to pay interest to the counterparty at a floating rate tied to SIFMA. Under the Basis Swap agreement, the Hospital pays or receives the net interest amount monthly, with the monthly settlements included in interest expense.

The Basis Swap does not qualify for hedge accounting treatment. Therefore, the change in the fair value of the swap is recognized as a gain or loss in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets, as a component of excess of revenues over expenses.

The agreement terminates on June 7, 2027, but can be terminated by the Hospital on any business day provided that the Hospital has given prior written notice of at least five days to the counterparty

The Basis Swap requires the Hospital to post collateral to the extent the swap liability exceeds \$5,000,000

### Note 10: Charity Care

In support of its mission, the Health System voluntarily provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established charges to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to be charity care, such amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

In addition, the Health System provides services to other medically indigent patients under certain government-reimbursed public aid programs. Such programs pay providers amounts which are less than established charges for the services provided to the recipients, and many times the payments are less than the cost of rendering the services provided.

In addition to uncompensated charges, the Health System also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services, which meet otherwise, unfilled community needs Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. Such programs include

- Health screening and assessments
- Community education activities
- Pediatric center to provide immunizations and support a child abuse intervention program
- Women's center to provide prenatal and postnatal care, along with bilingual parenting education
- Various support groups

### Note 12: Pension and Other Post-Retirement Benefit Obligations

#### **Defined Contribution Pension Plans**

The System has two defined contribution pension plans that cover substantially all full-time employees. One plan is organized under section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code. Upon one year of service, the System makes a matching contribution to the plan, equal to 50% of an employee's elective deferral, up to a maximum of 2% of the employee's compensation. Pension expense related to this plan was \$1.541,792 and \$1.341,874 for 2011 and 2010, respectively

The other defined contribution plan is organized under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. All employees are eligible and are automatically enrolled in the plan. Employees become fully vested after 3 years of service. Employer contributions vary by years of service. The System contributes 1.25% for employees with less than 5 years of service, 1.75% for 5-10 years of service and 2.25% for over 10 years of service. Pension expense related to this plan was \$4,200,404 and \$1,883,841 for 2011 and 2010, respectively

#### Defined Benefit Pension Plans

The System also has a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan covering all employees who meet the eligibility requirements (the Employee Plan) The System's funding policy is to make the minimum annual contribution that is required by applicable regulations, plus such amounts as the System may determine to be appropriate from time to time. This plan was frozen as of December 31, 2009.

The System also has a supplemental executive retirement plan (SERP) covering certain members of management. The System's funding policy is to contribute the amount of pension benefit payments at the time the benefit is paid. The System expects to contribute approximately \$890,000 to the SERP in 2012, with funds already designated for that purpose

Plan assets of the pension plan are held in the Texas Hospital Association Retirement Trust for member hospitals, which invests plan assets for the plans of approximately 40 participating hospitals. The investment objectives for the trust are to provide returns, which improve the funded status of the participating hospital's plans over time and reduce pension costs and to receive favorable performance from the pension fund's active managers in exchange for the fees paid to the investment management fund

#### Pension Plan Assets

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, plan assets are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of plan assets with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows. Level 2 plan assets include interest in a pooled investment trust fund Level 2 inputs include the net asset value reported by fund managers.

In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, plan assets are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. A non-qualified plan trust has been created for the purpose of funding SERP obligations. However, certain rights are retained by general creditors of the System with respect to assets held in trust and, therefore, the trust assets would not be treated as sufficiently separated from the employer to constitute plan assets under Accounting Standards Codification Topic 715 *Compensation - Retirement Benefits* The assets held in this trust are reported on the consolidated balance sheets as a component of assets limited as to use (See *Note 4*)

### Other Post-retirement Obligations

The Health System has entered into agreements with certain employees to pay for health insurance and long-term care insurance in retirement. The estimated cost of these obligations was approximately \$1,100,000 and \$1,080,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively and has been recorded in other liabilities on the consolidated balance sheets.

#### **Deferred Compensation Plans**

The Health System offers a nonqualified deferred compensation plan organized under section 457(b) of the Internal Revenue Code for certain physicians and executives of the Clinic and RMSA. Benefits generally vest immediately. The assets of the plan are recorded in assets limited as to use, internally designated and held by trustee, deferred compensation plan in the consolidated balance sheets and are approximately \$6.281,000 and \$4.314,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. There is an equal offsetting liability recorded in accrued expenses in the consolidated balance sheets.

Investment income related to the plans and corresponding changes in the offsetting liability are recorded as a component of employee benefits in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets

The Health System offers a nonqualified deferred compensation plan organized under section 457(f) of the Internal Revenue Code for certain physicians and executives of the Clinic Benefits generally vest 24 months after termination of employment subject to certain limitations. The assets of the plan are recorded in assets limited as to use, internally designated and held by trustee, deferred compensation plan in the consolidated balance sheets and are approximately \$7.526,000 and \$6.373,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. There is an equal offsetting liability recorded in other long-term liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets. Investment income related to the plans and corresponding changes in the offsetting liability are recorded as a component of employee benefits in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

### Note 13: Deferred Payments

The Clinic acquired the assets of various physician practices between 1996 and 2004. The purchase of assets included intangible assets representing the value of physician's covenants not to compete executed in connection with the physician's employment agreements. The value of the noncompete agreements depends on the length of time the physician complies with the restrictions on competition.

The amounts allocated to each physician will only be paid if the physician remains an employee of the Clinic for five years from the date of the agreement and complies in full with the restrictions on competition. After termination, payments are made in equal annual installments over four to seven years based on the specific provisions of each agreement.

Interest accrues on the unpaid balance of the amount due to physicians from the date of the agreement at 8% annually. The interest accrued is due and payable annually each December 31, except at the election of the physician employees to defer receipt. The related liability is included in other liabilities on the consolidated balance sheets and totaled \$1.879.847 and \$1.981.263 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

### Note 14: Related-party Transactions

The Health System leases space and provides various other services to CCHT, which is discussed in *Note 1* Amounts due the Health System pursuant to these agreements were \$1,156,900 and \$603,434 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively

The Health System holds a non-controlling membership interest in the Pineywoods Service Organization and the Service Organization of North and East Texas (collectively, the Service Organizations) The primary purpose of the Service Organizations is to improve the health care of residents in east Texas through multiple means. A member of management of the Health System serves on the Board of Directors of the Service Organizations. During 2011 and 2010, the Health System contributed approximately \$8,415,000 and \$1,941,000, respectively, to the Service Organizations.

### Note 15: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the items listed as follows.

### Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustments included in net patient service revenue are described in *Notes 1* and 2

#### Malpractice Claims

Estimates related to the accrual for medical malpractice claims are described in *Notes 1* and 6

### Admitting Physicians

Over 55% of the Hospital's revenue is generated from patients referred by the Clinic and its physicians

More than 10% of the Hospital's revenue is generated from a local physician group that is unrelated to the Hospital

### Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Health System is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Health System's self-insurance program (discussed elsewhere in these notes) or by commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Health System evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

### **Deferred Compensation Agreement**

As discussed in *Note 12* and *13*, the amount of annual expense accrued for deferred compensation is based on an estimate of the total amounts payable under the contracts over the lifetimes of the beneficiaries

### Self-insured Employee Health Care and Workers' Compensation

Estimates related to the accrual for self-insured employee health claims and workers' compensation claims care are discussed in *Note 6* 

#### Defined Benefit Pension Plan

Estimates related to the Health System's obligation for its defined benefit pension plan are described in *Note 12* 

#### Investments

The Health System invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2011 and 2010

#### Health Care Reform

During 2010. Congress passed legislation that will significantly reform the United States of America health care system. The legislation will require certain changes through 2014 to private and public health care insurance plans. While the impact of these regulatory changes cannot currently be determined, it is reasonably possible that these changes will have a significant impact on the Health System's net patient service revenues and operations.

#### **Current Economic Conditions**

The current economic environment presents health systems with unprecedented circumstances and challenges, which, in some cases, have resulted in large declines in the fair value of investments and other assets, large declines in contributions, constraints on liquidity and difficulty obtaining financing. The consolidated financial statements have been prepared using values and information currently available to the Health System.

Current economic conditions, including the rising unemployment rate, have made it difficult for certain patients to pay for services rendered. As employers make adjustments to health insurance plans or more patients become unemployed, services provided to self-pay and other payers may significantly impact net patient service revenue, which could have an adverse impact on the Health System's future operating results. Further, the effect of economic conditions on the state may have an adverse effect on cash flows related to the Medicaid program.

Given the volatility of current economic conditions, the values of assets and liabilities recorded in the consolidated financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments in investment values (including defined benefit pension plan investments) and allowances for accounts and contributions receivable that could negatively impact the Health System's ability to meet debt covenants or maintain sufficient liquidity

#### Note 16: Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

ASC Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements, defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy, which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

**Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the inputs and valuation methodologies used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy

#### Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 securities include investments in money market mutual funds, corporate bonds, equities and mutual funds. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows. Level 2 securities include investments in U.S. Treasury and Agency obligations, corporate bonds and a hedge fund investment. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. The Health System did not hold any Level 3 securities at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Quoted market prices are used to determine the fair value of Level 1 items. For Level 2 investments, inputs include maturity and coupon rates and/or closing prices of similar securities from comparable industry financial data and the net asset value reported by investment managers.

#### Interest Rate Swap Agreements

The fair value is estimated using forward-looking interest rate curves and discounted cash flows that are observable or that can be corroborated by observable market data and, therefore, are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy

#### Note 17: Commitments

During 2011, the Health System contracted with a vendor to implement a new information technology system which incorporated electronic health records. The commitment to the vendor to implement the project is approximately \$20,000,000 through 2015.

The Health System has commenced construction on a heart hospital on the main campus. The total cost of the project is estimated to be approximately \$50,000,000, and construction is expected to be completed in Fall 2012. Management anticipates obtaining financing through a bond offering during Fall 2011 to pay for a portion of the construction.

Subsequent events have been evaluated through September 28, 2011, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were issued




### **Independent Accountants' Report on Supplementary Information**
