Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with U S generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Big Horn Hospital Association as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, and the results of its operations, changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles

Introduction

Big Horn Hospital Association, (the Hospital) offers readers of our financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Hospital for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the Hospital's financial statements, including the notes thereto.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Hospital's audited financial statements. The financial statements are composed of the balance sheet, statement of net revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets, and the statement of cash flows. The financial statements also include notes to the financial statements that explain in more detail some of the information in the financial statements. The financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Hospital finances.

Required Financial Statements

The Hospital's financial statements report information about the Hospital using accounting methods similar to those used by private sector healthcare organizations. These statements offer short and long-term information about its activities. The balance sheet includes all of the Hospital's assets and liabilities and provides information about the nature and amounts of investments in resources (assets) and the obligations to the Hospital's creditors (liabilities). The balance sheet also provides the basis for evaluating the capital structure of the Hospital and assessing the liquidity and financial flexibility of the organization.

All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of net revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets. This statement measures the financial success of the Hospital's operations over the past two years and can be used to determine whether the Hospital has successfully recovered all of its costs through its patient service revenue and other revenue sources. Revenues and expenses are reported on an accrual basis, which means the related cash could be received or paid in a subsequent period.

The final required statement is the statement of cash flows. The statement reports cash receipts, cash payments and net changes in cash resulting from operations, investing and financing activities. It also provides answers to such questions as where did cash come from, what was cash used for, and what was the change in cash balance during the reporting period.

Financial Highlights

Total assets increased in FY2011 by \$2,594,655 from FY2010 and increased \$390,943 from FY2009 to FY2010. The increase in the current year is primarily driven by investments in capital assets, including the addition of a capital lease for MRI equipment.

The Hospital's operating margin has fluctuated in the past three fiscal years. The operating margin is as follows for the past three years: FY2009 -1.53%, FY2010 0.17% and FY2011 1.64%. The net margin has increased steadily over the same time frame. The net margin went from -0.56% in FY2009, increasing to 1.60% in FY2010 and then increasing again to 3.55% in FY2011.

Financial Analysis of the Hospital

The balance sheet and the statement of net revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets report the net assets of the Hospital and the changes in them. The Hospital's net assets - the difference between assets and liabilities - is a way to measure financial health or financial position. Over time, sustained increases or decreases in the Hospital's net assets are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. However, other non-financial factors such as changes in economic conditions, population growth and new or changed governmental legislation should also be considered.

Net Assets

A summary of the Hospital's balance sheets at June 30, 2011, 2010 and 2009 is presented below:

Operating and Financial Performance

The following information summarizes the Hospital's statements of net revenue, expenses, and changes in net assets between June 30, 2011 and 2010 and 2009.

Volume: Inpatient admissions decreased by 13% (42 admits) in FY2011 following a similar decrease of 13% (46 admits) from FY2009 to FY2010. Inpatient admissions (including Newborn admissions) for the past three fiscal years are as follows: FY2009 (365); FY2010 (319) and FY2011 (277). Swing Bed admissions have decreased slightly in FY2011 (5 admits) from FY2010 after a slight increase (3 admits) from FY2009 to FY2010. Swing Bed admissions for the past three fiscal years are as follows: FY2009 (70) to FY2010 (73) to FY2011 (68).

Volume (Continued): Inpatient days decreased by 6% (41 days) in FY2011 following a decrease in FY2010 of 20%. Inpatient days are down 226 days from FY2009 (down 25%) and 41 days from FY2010 (down 6%) The days for the last three fiscal years are as follows: FY2009 (909 days); FY2010 (724 days) and FY2011 (683 days). Swing Bed days have increased in FY2011 after a similar increase in FY2010. Swing Bed days are up 545 days (up 14%) from FY2010 and up 1029 days (up 29%) from FY2009. The swing beds days are as follows; FY2009 (3,528 days); FY2010 (4,012 days) and FY2011 (4,557 days).

Emergency room visits continued their upward trend in FY2011 at 4,280 visits. This is a 7% increase from FY2010. The ER visits for the last three fiscal years are as follows: FY2009 (3,639 visits); FY2010 (3,998 visits) and FY2011 (4,280 visits). Total outpatients visits continued to increase as well in FY2011 to 7,550 visits, up 1% from the 7,452 outpatient visits in FY2010 and up 6% from the 7,049 in FY2009. A large portion of this outpatient visit increase is due to continued growth in the usage of the CT Scanner and MRI services as well as increased volume in reference labs.

Surgeries decreased again in FY 2011 to 144 surgeries. This is down from 176 surgeries in FY2010 (18% decrease) and 212 surgeries in FY2009 (32% decrease).

Total observation days have increased slightly in FY2011 to 94 days. This is a 8% increase (7 days) from FY2010 but a 1% (1 day) decrease from FY2009. Total observation days for the past three fiscal years are as follows: FY2011 (94 days); FY2010 (87 days) and FY2009 (95 days).

Long term care (Heritage Acres) days increased again in FY2011 to 12,649. The days have increased 4% (491 days) from FY2010 days of 12,158 and 11% (1,259 days) from the FY2009 days of 11,390. Occupancy has increased from 87% in FY2009 and 93% in FY2010 to 96% in FY2011.

Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue: Net patient and resident service revenue has continued to rise in the past three fiscal years. The net revenue has increased by \$854,655 since FY2010. This is due to several factors including rate increases (a maximum of 10% each year) and the increased utilization of outpatient services and swing bed visits.

Salaries and Wages: Salaries and wages increased by \$464,630 in FY2011 compared to increases of \$555,288 and \$448,270 in FY2010 and FY2009, respectively. Even though the salary dollars have continued to increase; the portion of total operating expenses that salaries make up has remained fairly consistent. The percentage of salaries within total operating expenses is as follows: FY2009 (51%), FY2010 (52%) and FY2011 (53%). The increases in FY2011 is just due to standard wage increases and market adjustments. The Hospital is also in a competitive wage market and utilizes the MHA salary survey to ensure a competitive wage.

Employee Benefits: Employee benefits expense has decreased by \$43,663 in FY2011 compared to increases of \$151,364 and \$151,952 in FY2010 and FY2009, respectively. The cost of employee benefits has decreased to 10% of the total operating expenses in FY2011 from 11% and 10% in FY2010 and FY2009, respectively. The Hospital attributes this decrease to mainly to a decrease in worker's compensation expense, as other costs like health insurance have continued to rise.

The Hospital continues to pay two thirds of the premium for all categories of the employee's health and dental insurance. This has cost the Hospital the following amounts: FY2009 \$389,400, FY2010 \$485,993 and FY2011 \$549,961. The cost the Hospital paid in FY2011 increased \$63,968 from FY2010. This large increase is due to continued increases in health insurance premiums for calendar year 2011 as well as the Hospital continuing to add more employees that receive benefits compared to more temporary employees in prior years.

The Hospital also contributes to each participating employee's retirement. Employee's who have met the requirements of 1,000 hours worked and are still employed on December 31st of each calendar year will receive a full matching contribution of the lesser of 3.5% of the employee's compensation or an amount equal to the employee's contribution, not to exceed \$2,500. The Hospital has contributed the following amounts; \$69,176 (FY2009), \$86,903 (FY2010) and \$89,082 (FY2011).

Supplies and Other: Supply expenses increased by \$120,013 in FY2011, \$36,964 in FY2010 and \$28,952 in FY2009. The increase is due to increased utilization and the increase in the cost of the supplies themselves.

Non-Operating Revenues and Other Changes in Net Assets: Non-operating revenue and other changes in net assets come from several different areas within the Hospital. These areas include the Foundation, Big Horn County Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, Heritage Acres Auxiliary, investment income and the lease of a building to the Hardin Clinic. Non-operating revenue and other changes in net assets has varied in the past three fiscal years. Non-operating revenue and other changes in net assets were \$399,382 in FY2009; \$340,440 in FY2010 and \$1,149,282 in FY2011.

Capital Assets

During FY2011, FY2010 and FY2009, the Hospital invested \$1,403,353, \$469,881 and \$270,156, respectively, in capital assets. The capital assets have been upgrades and/or equipment purchases funded primarily through grants and contributions.

Long-Term Debt

At the end of FY2009, FY2010 and FY2011, the Hospital had \$897,289, \$870,487 and \$1,904,054 outstanding in long-term debt, respectively. Much of this long term debt is from the 1998A Series MT Health Facility Authority Bond in the amount of \$1,425,000 that was issued on February 1, 1998. This bond was issued to build the Hardin Clinic which the Hospital leases to St Vincent's Healthcare for a physician practice. The long-term debt in FY2010 decreased by \$26,802 due to principal payments offset by the addition of a capital lease for medical equipment. In FY2011 the long-term debt increased by \$1,033,567, due to the addition of a capital lease for MRI equipment, offset by principal payments during the year.

Economic and Other Factors and Next Year's Budget

The Hospital's board and executive management considered many factors when setting the FY2011 budget. Some of these factors are as follows:

- Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement rates
- Increased costs due to maintaining a competitive wage for all areas of the hospital and nursing home
- The current and projected utilization in both inpatient and outpatient areas
- The impact of healthcare reform

NOTE 1 NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Organization and Reporting Entities

Big Horn Hospital Association (Hospital) is a Montana non-profit organization which is considered a political subdivision of Big Horn County and is exempt from federal taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Hospital consists of: Big Horn County Memorial Hospital and Nursing Home and Heritage Acres. The financial statements also include data of Big Horn County Memorial Hospital and Health Care Foundation (Foundation), Big Horn Hospital Auxiliary and Heritage Acres Auxiliary, separate legal entities which are blended component units in the financial statements. The foundation and auxiliaries are organized as Montana nonprofit corporations, exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

For financial reporting purposes, the Hospital has included all funds, organizations, agencies, boards, commissions and authorities. The Hospital has also considered all potential component units for which it is financially accountable and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the Hospital are such that exclusion would cause the Hospital's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board has set forth criteria to be considered in determining financial accountability. These criteria include appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body and (1) the ability of the Hospital to impose its will on that organization or (2) the potential for the organization to provide specific benefits to or impose specific financial burdens on the Hospital. The Hospital has no component units which meet the Governmental Accounting Standards Board criteria, except those noted above.

Big Horn County Memorial Hospital and Nursing Home is a 25-bed acute care hospital. Heritage Acres is a 36-bed skilled nursing facility, 10-bed assisted living facility, and a 10-unit apartment building. Both facilities are located in Hardin, Montana. The hospital property and equipment is owned by Big Horn County and leased to the Hospital at a nominal fee.

Method of Accounting

The Hospital reports in accordance with *Audit and Accounting Guide for Health Care Entities* published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants which prescribes accounting and reporting policies, some of which are unique to providers of health care services.

Basis of Accounting and Presentation

The financial statements of the Hospital have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting using the economic resources measurement focus. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange transaction takes place, while those from government-mandated nonexchange transactions (principally federal and state grants and county appropriations) are recognized when all applicable eligibility requirements are met. Operating revenues and expenses include exchange transactions and program-specific, government-mandated nonexchange transactions. Government-mandated nonexchange transactions that are not

program specific, investment income and interest on capital assets-related debt are included in nonoperating revenues and expenses. Operating expenses are all expenses incurred to provide healthcare services. The Hospital first applies restricted net assets when an expense or outlay is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

In reporting its financial activity, the Hospital applies all applicable GASB pronouncements for the proprietary funds as well as the following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless these pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements: Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedure.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Hospital considers all liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Resident Trust Funds

The Hospital acts as custodian for the funds of the nursing home residents. Those funds appear as restricted cash and accounts payable in the balance sheets.

Patient and Resident Accounts Receivable

The Hospital reports patient and resident accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from third-party payors, patients, residents and others. The Hospital provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding receivables, historical collection information and existing economic conditions. As a service to the patient and resident, the Hospital bills third-party payors directly and bills the patient and resident when the patient and resident's liability is determined. Patient and residents are not required to provide collateral for services rendered. Patient and resident accounts receivable are ordinarily due in full when billed. Delinquent receivables are written off based on individual credit evaluation and specific circumstances of the patient and resident or third-party payor. In addition, an allowance is estimated for other accounts based on historical experience of the Hospital. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, the allowance for uncollectible accounts was approximately \$728,000 and \$612,000, respectively.

Pledges Receivable

Pledges, less an allowance for estimated uncollectible accounts, are recorded as receivables and support in the year pledges are made, unless the donor explicitly states that the gift is to support current activities.

Supplies

Supply inventories, including medical supplies, are stated at the cost using the first-in, first-out method.

Noncurrent Cash and Investments

Noncurrent cash and investments consist of money market funds, short-term certificates of deposit, and various government and equity securities. These assets include assets restricted under indenture agreement, donor restricted funds for terminal care of patients and internally designated for capital improvements and student loans. Amounts required to meet current liabilities are included in current assets. Investments in money market funds and certificates of deposit are carried at amortized cost, which approximates fair value. All other investments are carried at fair value. Fair value is determined using quoted market prices.

Investment Income

Investment income includes dividend and interest income, realized gains and losses on investments and the net change for the year in the fair value of investments carried at fair value. Investment income is included as non-operating income on the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or fair value at the date of donation if acquired by gift. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of each asset. Leasehold improvements and capital lease obligations are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives. The following estimated useful lives are being used by the Hospital:

Buildings and Improvements 5 - 40 Years Equipment 3 - 20 Years

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs of \$97,898 represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt and are being amortized over the life of the related debt. Accumulated amortization was \$83,918 and \$79,841 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Amortization expense for 2011 and 2010 was \$4,077 and \$4,514, respectively.

Compensated Absences

The Hospital has a paid-time-off (PTO) policy which incorporates PTO for holidays, vacations, and personal days. Employees begin earning PTO upon employment. Full-time employees may use PTO after a three-month probationary period and part-time employees may use PTO after a six-month probationary period. The maximum accrual is 240 hours for all employees. Accrued PTO is paid upon termination of employment. Accrued PTO is included with accrued compensation, benefits and related taxes on the balance sheets.

Deferred Rental Income

The Hospital received advance payments of rent from St. Vincent Health Center. The Hospital is recognizing income as it is earned.

Grants and Contributions

From time to time, the Hospital receives grants and contributions from individuals and private organizations. Revenues from grants and contributions (including contributions of capital assets) are recognized when all eligibility requirements, including time requirements are met. Grants and contributions may be restricted for either specific operating purposes or for capital purposes. Amounts that are unrestricted or that are restricted to a specific operating purpose are reported as non-operating revenues. Amounts restricted to capital acquisitions are reported after non-operating revenues and expenses.

Net Assets

Net assets of the Hospital are classified in three components. Net assets invested in capital assets, net of related debt, consist of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, and reduced by the current balances of any outstanding borrowings used to finance the purchase or construction of those assets. Restricted-expendable net assets are non-capital assets that must be used for a particular purpose, as specified by creditors, grantors or contributors external to the Hospital. Restricted net assets are reduced by any liabilities payable from restricted assets. Unrestricted net assets are remaining net assets that do not meet the definition of invested in capital assets, net of related debt or restricted-expendable net assets.

Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

Net patient and resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients and residents, third-party payors and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments and a provision for uncollectible accounts. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known.

Operating Revenues and Expenses

The Hospital's statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets distinguishes between operating and non-operating revenues and expenses. Operating revenues result from exchange transactions associated with providing health care services - the Hospital's principal activity. Non-exchange revenues, including grants and contributions received for purposes other than capital asset acquisition, are reported as non-operating revenues. Operating expenses are all expenses incurred to provide health care services.

Charity Care

The Hospital provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient and resident service revenue. Charges excluded from revenue under the Hospital's charity care policy were \$88,066 and \$84,489 for 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Reclassifications

Certain items in the prior year financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the overall net assets of the Hospital.

NOTE 2 NET PATIENT AND RESIDENT SERVICE REVENUE

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from established rates. These payment arrangements include:

Medicare

The Hospital is certified as a Critical Access Hospital (CAH) and receives reimbursement for services provided to Medicare beneficiaries based on the cost of providing those services. Interim payment rates are established for inpatient and outpatient services, with settlement for over or under payments determined based on year-end cost reports. The Hospital's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Hospital. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been finalized by the Medicare intermediary through June 30, 2010.

NOTE 2 NET PATIENT AND RESIDENT SERVICE REVENUE (CONTINUED)

Medicaid

Inpatient and outpatient acute care services related to Medicaid beneficiaries are paid based on the lower of customary charges, allowable cost as determined through the Hospital's Medicare cost report, or rates as established by the Medicaid program. The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate with the final settlement determined by the program based on the Hospital's annual Medicaid cost report. The Hospital's Medicaid cost reports have been finalized through June 30, 2009.

Other

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with Blue Cross and other commercial insurance carriers. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Resident Services

The Hospital is reimbursed for resident services at established billing rates which are determined on a cost-related basis subject to certain limitations as prescribed by Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services regulation. Under the Medicare program, payment for resident services is made on a prospectively determined per diem rate, which varies based on a case-mix adjusted patient classification system.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. The 2011 and 2010 net patient and resident revenue increased by approximately \$17,000 and decreased by approximately \$45,000, respectively, due to removal of allowances previously estimated that are no longer subject to audits, reviews, and investigations.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Hospital's deposits may not be returned to it in full. The Hospital's deposits in banks at June 30, 2011 were entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the Hospital's custodial bank in the Hospital's name. The Hospital's deposits in banks at June 30, 2010 were not entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the Hospital's custodial bank in the Hospital's name.

Interest Rate Risk

The Hospital implemented a formal investment policy during the year ended June 30, 2011 that addresses permissible investments, portfolio diversification and instrument maturities. The investment policy focuses on capital preservation, diversification and safety, while maximizing income.

Credit Risk

To limit risk the Hospital's investment policy allows for investment in the following:

- Common stocks listed on major U.S. stock exchanges (NYSE, AMEX and NASDAQ)
- Preferred stocks or convertible bonds listed on the above exchanges
- Obligations of the U.S. government and its agencies
- Bonds issued by U.S. corporations rated A or higher
- Foreign securities (Limited to 10% of the total market value of investments)
- SEC registered mutual funds
- Investment grade money market funds and money market instruments
- Certificates of deposit issued by financially sound banks
- Exchange traded funds (ETFs)

NOTE 5 DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Hospital's investment policy places limits on the amounts that can be invested in any one security or company. The Board of Directors of the Hospital, through the Finance Committee, are responsible for the formulation, documentation and monitoring of investment strategy consistent with the investment policy. The board of directors is also responsible for reviewing the investment policy annually. In general, investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the Hospital's account balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Series 1998A Bonds

Series 1998A Bonds were issued at \$1,425,000 and secured by a mortgage. The bonds mature serially at varying amounts through February 2018, with monthly principal payments at interest rates ranging from 3.8% to 5.1%. The Hospital is required under the terms of the loan agreement to deposit \$115,650 with a trustee, which is included in the balance sheets under restricted by trustee under indenture agreement. The loan agreement also places limits on the incurrence of additional borrowings and requires that the Hospital satisfy certain measures of financial performance, including a covenant that income available for debt service coverage must equal at least 110% of the maximum annual debt service requirement on all funded debt in any future year. For both years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital met the required 110% debt service.

Note Payable

Note payable, to a local bank, due in 2012 with monthly principal and interest payments, at a rate of 7.25%, of \$283. The loan is collateralized by a deed of trust for property.

NOTE 7 LONG-TERM DEBT (CONTINUED)

Capital Lease Obligations

Capital lease obligations consist of several capital lease obligations for medical equipment. The first lease matures in 2013, with monthly payments of \$1,758, the second capital lease matures in 2015, with monthly payments of \$1,422, and the third capital lease matures in 2016, with monthly payments of \$21,869. NOTE 9 PENSION PLAN

The Hospital has a defined contribution plan under which employees may elect to become participants. Upon completion of one year of service with 1,000 hours, the Hospital will make a matching contribution of the lesser of 3.5% of the employees' compensation or an amount equal to the employees' contribution, but not more than \$2,500. Employee and Hospital contributions are deposited in the employees' Tax Sheltered Annuity. Total employer pension plan expenses for the years ended June 30, 2011, 2010 and 2009 are \$89,082, \$86,903 and \$69,176, respectively.

NOTE 10 CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

NOTE 12 COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Hospital is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by commercial insurance; for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Hospital evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of legal counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each claim. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Malpractice Insurance

The Hospital has insurance coverage, to provide protection for professional liability losses, on a claims-made basis subject to a limit of \$1 million per claim and an aggregate limit of \$3 million. Should the claims-made policy not be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term, but reported subsequently, will be uninsured.

Risk Management

The Hospital is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions, injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by commercial insurance purchased from independent third-parties. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the three preceding years.

Compliance

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations, specifically those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Recently, federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously, billed and collected revenues from patient services. Management believes that the Hospital is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

We have audited the financial statements of Big Horn Hospital Association as of and for the year ended June 30, 2011, and have issued our report thereon dated December 20, 2011. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Big Horn Hospital Association's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings to be material weaknesses.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Big Horn Hospital Association's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain other matters that we reported to management of Big Horn Hospital Association in a separate letter dated December 20, 2011.

Big Horn Hospital Association's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings. We did not audit Big Horn Hospital Association's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, board of directors and others within the entity, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Material Weaknesses

11-1 Financial Reporting

As part of the audit, management requested us to prepare a draft of the financial statements, including the related notes to financial statements. Management reviewed, approved, and accepted responsibility for those financial statements prior to their issuance; however, management did not perform a detailed review of the financial statements and the completeness of the footnote disclosures.

Recommendation

We recommend that management implement effective review policies and procedures.

Response

Management feels that committing the resources necessary to perform a review of the footnotes disclosures for completeness would be a duplication of expenditures, as this is part of the cost of the audit engagement. In addition, the CEO and CFO review internal financial statements on a monthly basis and present the results to the board of directors.

11-2 Misstatements Detected by the Audit

Material misstatements were detected during the course of the audit which required management to post several adjusting journal entries to correct certain general ledger balances. Management is responsible for having controls in place to prevent or detect a material misstatement in a timely manner.

Recommendation

We recommend that the management implement effective accounting policies to prevent or detect material misstatements in a timely manner.

Response

Management will review procedures in order to limit the number of adjusting journal entries.
