

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

June 30, 2011

1. Organization

San Juan Regional Medical Center, Inc (the Hospital) is a New Mexico not-for-profit corporation as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is exempt from federal and state income taxes on related income The Hospital is located in Farmington, New Mexico, and was incorporated in 1952 to furnish medical and surgical care to the residents of San Juan County (the County), New Mexico

San Juan Regional Rehabilitation Hospital, Inc (SJRRH) is a New Mexico not-for-profit organization located in Farmington, New Mexico, and is exempt from federal and state income taxes on related income The Hospital is the sole member of SJRRH SJRRH provides rehabilitation services primarily to the residents of the County

SJR Holding Company, Inc (SJH) is a New Mexico for-profit corporation and a wholly owned subsidiary of the Hospital SJH's ownership interest in an ambulatory surgery center is SJH's only activity

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital, SJRRH, and SJH (collectively referred to as the Company) Intercompany transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

New Accounting Pronouncements

In August 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued an accounting standard that will require the measurement of the amount of charity care provided to be based on the direct and indirect costs of providing that care The accounting standard will be effective for the Company beginning July 1, 2011, with retrospective application for all periods presented

In August 2010, the FASB issued an accounting standard relating to the accounting and disclosure of insurance claims and related insurance recoveries. The accounting standard will require companies to report the estimated ultimate cost of malpractice claims as a liability and any anticipated insurance recoveries will be reported as an asset on the statement of financial

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

position The malpractice liability cannot be reported net of anticipated insurance recoveries. The accounting standard will be effective for the Company on July 1, 2011. In May 2011, the FASB issued an accounting standard that further amends fair value measurement and disclosure requirements in U.S. generally accepted accounting principles. The accounting standard will require additional disclosure relating to transfers of any financial instruments between Level 1 and Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy, disclosure of the fair value hierarchy level for items that not recorded at fair value in the financial statements but are required to disclose the fair value of the item, and disclosure of additional quantitative information about the unobservable inputs used in the fair value measurement of financial instruments categorized within Level 3 of the fair value hierarchy. The accounting standard will be effective for the Company on July 1, 2012.

In July 2011, the FASB issued an accounting standard relating to the presentation and disclosure of patient service revenue, provision for doubtful accounts and the allowance for doubtful accounts for certain health care entities. The accounting standard will require health care providers to report the provision for doubtful accounts as a reduction of net patient service revenue in the consolidated statement of operations. In addition, the notes to the financial statements will include additional disclosures relating to the methods used to recognize net patient service revenue, amount of net patient service revenue recognized by major payor source, methods used to analyze the allowance for doubtful accounts by major payor source, and any significant changes to the allowance for doubtful accounts. The standard will be effective for the Company on July 1, 2011

Management is currently evaluating the effect of adopting these accounting standards on the consolidated financial statements

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the Company's consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period Actual results could differ from those estimates

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Cash Equivalents

Cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding assets whose use is limited by the Hospital and SJRRH Boards of Directors' (the Boards) designation or by other arrangements under trust agreements

The Company holds its cash in bank accounts with balances in excess of federal deposit insurance limits

Investments and Assets Whose Use Is Limited

Investments in equity securities (other than those accounted for under the equity method) and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are included in the excess of revenues over expenses, as the investments are classified as trading securities

Short-Term Investments

Short-term investments include certificates of deposit, money market investments, and other investment securities that will be liquidated within the next fiscal year

Assets Whose Use Is Limited

Assets whose use is limited consist primarily of assets designated by the Boards for future capital improvements, over which the Boards retain control and may, at their discretion, use for other purposes, assets set aside under insurance funding arrangements, and assets restricted under the terms of the outstanding hospital revenue bond issues. Amounts required to meet current liabilities have been classified as current in the consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Inventories

Inventories consist of drugs and medical supplies and are stated at the lower of cost (which approximates the first-in, first-out method) or market value

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset (which ranges from three to 40 years) and is computed using the straight-line method Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the consolidated financial statements Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds, net of interest earned on assets held by trustee during the period of construction of capital projects, is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets

Net Patient Accounts Receivable and Service Revenue

Net patient accounts receivable have been adjusted to the estimated amounts expected to be received based on contracted rates for the services rendered. These estimated amounts are subject to further adjustments upon review by third-party payors

The Company has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Company at amounts different from its established rates Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and investigations

For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard or discounted rates Historically, a significant portion of the uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided Accordingly, the Hospital

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

records an allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for doubtful accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided, based on historical collection experience

Other Non-Patient Revenues

Other non-patient revenues include gains and losses on the sales of assets, contributions, cafeteria sales, rental income, and revenues from other miscellaneous sources

Contributions

Unconditional pledges to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the pledge is received. The gifts are reported as temporarily restricted net assets if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and recognized as a component of other revenue, unless the donation was for property and equipment, in which case it is recognized as a change in net assets between permanently and temporarily restricted Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions

Excess of Revenue over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenue over expenses Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include contributions restricted for the acquisition of property and equipment and contributed property

Uncertainty in Income Taxes

Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 740, *Income Taxes*, prescribes criteria for the financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return ASC 740 also provides guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure, and transition In accordance with this accounting guidance, management has reviewed all open tax years and has determined that the Company has no significant uncertain tax positions

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Subsequent Events

The Company has completed an evaluation of all subsequent events through October 26, 2011, which is the issuance date of these consolidated financial statements, and has concluded that no subsequent events have occurred that required recognition or disclosure

The Company has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Company at amounts different from its established rates A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

Medicare

Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors

Substantially all other services rendered to Medicare beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates including inpatient non-acute services, certain outpatient services, and certain capital costs and medical education costs

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

3. Net Patient Service Revenue (continued)

Medicaid

Approximately 43% and 47% of services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries in 2011 and 2010, respectively, were reimbursed by the State of New Mexico Inpatient acute care services rendered to New Mexico Medicaid program beneficiaries not covered by a managed care program are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge Most outpatient services were reimbursed on a cost reimbursement methodology until November 1, 2010, when the State implemented an outpatient prospective payment system (OPPS) Services paid for on a cost reimbursement methodology were paid at a tentative rate, with final settlement to be determined after submission of an annual cost report by the Company and audits thereof by the fiscal intermediary

The Hospital participates in the New Mexico "Salud!" Medicaid managed care program Approximately 46% and 42% of services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries in 2011 and 2010, respectively, were paid under the Salud! program by third-party health plans Inpatient services paid under the Salud! program are reimbursed on a fee-for-service basis Outpatient services were reimbursed on a percentage-of-charge method until November 1, 2010, when the Salud! programs began implementing OPPS

Approximately 11% of services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries in 2011 and 2010 were paid by Medicaid programs of other states under various fee-for-service and percentage-of-charge methods. The prospectively determined payment rates are determined by each state and are accepted by the Hospital as payment in full as a condition of participation.

Medicare and Medicaid Cost Report Settlements

The Hospital's and SJRRH's Medicare cost reports have reached final settlement through June 30, 2007 The Hospital's and SJRRH's Medicaid cost reports have been final-settled through June 30, 2009 It is management's opinion that estimated Medicare and Medicaid settlements accrued at June 30, 2011, are adequate to provide for the settlement of any unaudited cost reports Estimates are continually monitored and reviewed, and as settlements are made or estimates adjusted, differences are reflected in current operations. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates could change by a material amount in the near term.

Other

The Company has payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Company under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates

4. Concentration of Credit Risk

The Company grants credit without collateral to patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The following reflects the estimated percentage of gross patient accounts receivable at June 30 by major payor group

5. Sole Community Provider Support

The Company receives support from the U S federal government, the State of New Mexico, and the County for the care of indigent patients The Company received approximately \$19,895,000 in 2011 and \$17,543,000 in 2010 related to the care of indigent patients The amounts received for indigent patient care are included in net patient service revenue in the applicable year The continuation of this program depends on the future availability of funding from the U S federal government, the State of New Mexico, and the County

6. Charity Care

The Company provides care to all patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. A patient is classified as a charity patient according to certain policies established by the Company regarding the ability of the patient to pay. Because the Company does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, such amounts are not recorded as revenue. Partial payments to which the Company is entitled from public assistance and other programs on behalf of patients that meet the charity care policy of the Company are reported as net patient service revenue. Charity care services, when measured at established rates, total approximately \$6,177,000 and \$6,207,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively. In addition, contractual discounts from state and county public assistance programs on behalf of patients that meet the Company's charity care policy total approximately \$58,000,000 and \$51,195,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

8. Fair Value Measurements

The Company adopted ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, on July 1, 2008, for all financial assets and liabilities that are recognized or disclosed at fair value in the financial statements. This statement defines fair value, establishes a consistent framework for measuring fair value, and expands disclosure for each major asset and liability category measured at fair value on either a recurring or nonrecurring basis. ASC 820 clarifies that fair value is an exit price, representing the amount that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants. As such, fair value is a market-based measurement that should be determined based on assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability. As a basis for considering such assumptions, ASC 820 establishes a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value as follows.

- Level 1 Pricing is based on observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets
 Financial assets and liabilities in Level 1 include U S Treasury securities, listed equities,
 and mutual funds
- Level 2 Pricing inputs are based on quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities Financial assets and liabilities in this category generally include corporate bonds and loans and federal agency securities
- Level 3 Pricing inputs are generally unobservable and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the investment. The inputs into the determination of fair value require management's judgment or estimation of assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the assets or liabilities. The fair values are therefore determined using factors that involve considerable judgment and interpretations, including but not limited to private and public comparables, third-party appraisals, discounted cash flow models, and fund manager estimates

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

8. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are based on one or more of three valuation techniques noted in ASC 820 The three valuation techniques are identified in the tables below Where more than one technique is noted, individual assets or liabilities were valued using one or more of the noted techniques. The valuation techniques are as follows

- a) *Market approach* Prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets or liabilities
- b) Cost approach Amount that would be required to replace the service capacity of an asset (replacement cost)
- c) Income approach Techniques to convert future amounts to a single present amount based on market expectations, including present value techniques, option pricing, and excess earnings models

The Hospital will not be required to make any payments to the County with respect to the contribution to the Project of assets constructed using the County Revenue Bonds proceeds Therefore, the County Revenue Bonds have not been included as a liability of the Company The portion of the Project funded with the County Revenue Bonds is being recognized as a transfer of net assets from the County as the Project is completed In fiscal 2011 and 2010, the Hospital recorded \$197,720 and \$1,334,446, respectively, of construction in progress and a related transfer of net assets for the portion of the Project completed during the year with proceeds of the County Revenue Bonds and other contributed assets

The Hospital initiated several projects for the construction of physician office buildings (collectively, the POB) to provide office space for physicians on the Medical Center main campus Proceeds of the Series 2010B Bonds are being used for a POB for neurosurgery, neurology, and pediatric physicians

In 2010, the Hospital recognized an impairment loss of approximately \$904,000 to reduce the carrying value of a building considered for sale to the estimated fair value

The Series 2010A Bond issuance during 2011 was a private placement. The proceeds were used to retire the Series 2004B Bonds and to finance equipment replacement.

During 2011, the Company issued \$8,800,000 of tax-exempt Recovery Zone Facility Bonds (Series 2010B Bonds) The proceeds were used to finance the construction of a physician medical office building and to purchase other equipment The Series 2010B Bonds initially bear interest at a variable rate determined on a weekly basis The Company has the option to tender the Series 2010B Bonds at par, or to change the interest rate period on the Series 2010B Bonds to another variable interest rate period or to a fixed interest rate. The holders of the Series 2010B Bonds may tender the Series 2010B Bonds for purchase under the terms and conditions set forth in the related agreements. In connection with the issuance of the Series 2010B Bonds, the Company entered into an irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit with a bank, which expires December 20, 2013, for approximately \$8,916,000 to purchase the outstanding Series 2010B Bonds, if not remarketed. The Company also has the option to redeem the Series 2010B Bonds under certain conditions set forth in the related agreements.

During 2011, the Company issued \$8,103,000 in tax-exempt financing with a capital corporation. The proceeds were used to finance the acquisition of a replacement helicopter and to finance cardiac catheterization lab construction and equipment

During 2007, the Company issued \$12,000,000 in Hospital Revenue Bonds (Series 2007A Bonds) and \$12,300,000 in Hospital Revenue Bonds (Series 2007B Bonds) The Series 2007A Bonds were issued at a premium of approximately \$290,500 The proceeds of the Series 2007A Bonds and the Series 2007B Bonds are being used to finance various capital asset purchases and to pay for costs of issuance of the bonds

In connection with the issuance of the Series 2007B Bonds, the Company entered into an irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit with a bank, which expires December 20, 2013, for approximately \$9,321,000 to purchase the outstanding Series 2007B Bonds, if not remarketed. The Company also has the option to redeem the Series 2007B Bonds under certain conditions set forth in the related agreements. On December 21, 2010, the Company called \$2,720,000 of the Series B Bonds.

In 2004, the Company issued \$16,500,000 in Hospital Revenue Bonds (Series 2004A Bonds) and \$15,000,000 in Hospital Revenue Bonds (Series 2004B Bonds) The Series 2004A Bonds were issued at a premium of approximately \$483,000 The proceeds of the Series 2004A Bonds and the series 2004B Bonds were used to finance the Project and to pay for costs of issuance of the bonds

The Series 2004A Bonds maturing on or after June 1, 2015, are subject to redemption at the option of the Hospital prior to their respective maturities on June 1, 2014, and thereafter, in whole or in part at any time, at par

The Series 2004B Bonds initially bore interest at a variable rate determined on a weekly basis. The Company had the option to tender the Series 2004B Bonds at par, or to change the interest rate period on the Series 2004B Bonds to another variable interest rate period or to a fixed interest rate. The holders of the Series 2004B Bonds could tender the Series 2004B Bonds for purchase under the terms and conditions set forth in the related agreements. In connection with the issuance of the Series 2004B Bonds, the Company entered into an irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit with a bank, which expired August 15, 2011, for approximately \$15,000,000 to purchase the outstanding Series 2004B Bonds, if not remarketed. The Company also had the option to redeem the Series 2004B Bonds under certain conditions set forth in the related agreements. The Series 2004B Bonds were retired in December 2010.

In 1997, the Hospital issued \$21,000,000 in Hospital Revenue Bonds (Series 1997A Bonds) The Series 1997A Bonds are callable without penalty

The Series 2010A Bonds, Series 2010B Bonds, Series 2007A Bonds, Series 2007B Bonds, Series 2004A Bonds, Series 2004B Bonds, and Series 1997A Bonds (collectively, the Bonds) are collateralized by a pledge of revenues and monies held in certain funds as required under the Bond Indenture throughout the term of the related agreements Bonds are subject to various covenants, including but not limited to maintenance of a minimum debt service coverage ratio

In March 2007, the Company entered into a sale agreement and a lease agreement for a building, the Outpatient Diagnostic Center (the ODC) The ODC building sale proceeds in the amount of \$2,768,000 were recorded as a financial obligation and are reflected in long-term debt, and the building was retained as a depreciable asset by the Company Payments on the lease are treated as a reduction of the financial obligation At June 30, 2011, the amount remaining on the obligation was \$2,113,594 The effective interest rate on the transaction was determined to be 7 2% The original lease term is twelve (12) years, through 2019 The Company has the option to extend the lease with two five-year extensions The Company has an option to purchase the ODC at fair market value at the end of each lease term in 2019, 2024, and 2029

12. Commitments and Contingencies

Malpractice Insurance Coverage

The Company's malpractice insurance coverage is based on a claims-made policy with a \$25,000 per claim deductible and \$18,000,000 aggregate coverage. The Company is involved in litigation arising in the ordinary course of business. Claims alleging malpractice have been asserted against the Company and are currently in various stages of litigation. Additional claims may be asserted against the Company arising from services provided to patients through June 30, 2011. The Company has accrued for estimated malpractice costs for various claims up to the deductible amount of the Company's malpractice insurance coverage as well as an estimate of incurred but not reported claims not covered by its claims-made policy at June 30, 2011. The Company has recorded a total present value liability of \$3,295,000, discounted at 3%, for estimated malpractice costs at June 30, 2011 (undiscounted liability is \$3,657,000). It is the opinion of management that estimated malpractice costs accrued at June 30, 2011 and 2010, are adequate to provide for potential losses resulting from pending, threatened, or unknown claims

Workers' Compensation Coverage

The Company has a self-funded program to provide workers' compensation coverage for its employees. To meet the State of New Mexico insurance reserve requirements, the Hospital obtained a surety bond in the amount of \$1,875,000.

Physician Income Guarantees

For physician income guarantees, the Company records an asset and liability for the estimated fair value of the physician income guarantees. The assets are amortized using the straight-line amortization method for the guarantee and service period. The unamortized portion of these physician guarantees, included in other assets, was \$1,879,000 and \$2,353,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The maximum amount of unpaid physician income guarantees was approximately \$556,000 at June 30, 2011

Health Care Regulatory Environment

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in exclusion from government health care programs, together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed and paid. Management believes that it has established adequate reserves to investigate, defend, and ultimately resolve any alleged instances of noncompliance. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review as well as to regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

13. Employee Health Insurance Plan

The Company is self-insured for employee medical coverage However, the Company purchased insurance that will pay up to \$2,000,000 per individual for medical expenses that exceed \$250,000 per individual per plan year Expenses related to self-insured employee medical claims totaled approximately \$14,376,000 in 2011 and \$13,445,000 in 2010

14. Employee Benefit Plans

The Company operates and supports a tax-sheltered annuity program. All individuals employed full-time or part-time for one year are eligible to participate, and participants are eligible for full vesting of all Company contributions after five years of employment. Contributions charged to operations approximated \$1,881,000 in 2011 and \$1,534,000 in 2010. The Company's policy is to fund these costs as incurred.

The Company also sponsors a Money Purchase Pension Trust Plan (the Plan), which requires the Company to contribute 3% of each participant's annual compensation Substantially all Company employees are eligible to participate in the Plan, regardless of length of service Contributions to the Plan charged to operations approximated \$2,879,000 in 2011 and \$2,488,000 in 2010

Beginning in 2010, the Company sponsors a 457(f) Deferred Compensation Program to attract and retain a select group of management or highly compensated employees. The funds are available to the Company until vesting has occurred, at which time they accrue to the benefit of the employee. Full vesting occurs after five years of employment or upon reaching age 62. The assets and liabilities for this program approximated \$386,300 and \$215,300 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively
