

These financial statements are the responsibility of the Health System's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. We were not engaged to perform an audit of the Health System's internal control over financial reporting. June 30, 2011

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

St. Joseph Health System and Affiliates (the Health System) is a non-profit organization previously sponsored by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange, a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church, with its Motherhouse in Orange, California. The sponsorship of the Heath System was expanded to include the laity in a new non-profit organization, St. Joseph Health Ministry (SJHM). SJHM is a public juridic person, a pontifical structure that allows laypeople to assume sponsorship responsibilities of "temporal goods" of the Catholic church such as the Health System. SJHM formally assumed sponsorship responsibilities previously exercised by the General Council of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange. There was no direct impact on the operations of the Health System and its affiliates as a result of the expanded sponsorship.

The Health System is the corporate member of 13 acute care hospital affiliates (3,621 licensed beds) which also offer associated ancillary, skilled nursing, psychiatric, substance abuse, rehabilitation, outpatient surgery, home health, and hospice services. The Health System also provides outpatient services and physician practice management through its affiliated non-profit subsidiaries and controlling interests in various partnerships. In 1998, the Health System entered into an affiliation agreement with Lubbock Methodist Hospital System and Affiliates (LMHS). The agreement provided for the formation of Covenant Health System (Covenant) (1,181 licensed beds) with contributions by the Health System and LMHS of substantially all of the assets, liabilities and operations of St. Mary of the Plains Hospital and Rehabilitation Center and Foundation, Lubbock, Texas, and LMHS to Covenant.

Covenant is a non-profit corporation that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Firstcare, a licensed Texas Health Maintenance Organization, is 67% owned by Covenant. Covenant's financial results have been consolidated with those of the Health System, as the two entities are operated under common management and control and certain Covenant hospitals are members of the Health System Obligated Group (as defined below).

Together with its hospital affiliates, the Health System owns a captive insurance company, American Unity Group, Ltd. (the Captive). The Health System's hospital affiliates are also the corporate members of St. Jude Hospital Yorba Linda dba St. Joseph Heritage Healthcare (Heritage), a non-profit corporation providing physician practice management services. The Health System is also the sole corporate member of St. Joseph Professional Services Enterprises, Inc. (PSE), a company formed to participate in health care-related ventures, Revenue Cycle Services, LLC, a company formed to provide collection services from health plan payors on behalf of the hospital affiliates, and St. Joseph Health System Foundation, a company formed to administer funds for charitable purposes. Through PSE, the Health System owns a controlling interest in Heritage Investment Group I, LLC, a real estate company formed to construct, own and manage a medical office building.

On July 1, 2009, Mission Hospital Regional Medical Center purchased substantially all of the assets of South Coast Medical Center (SCMC) for \$35,700,000, which was funded through cash from operations and a draw on a line of credit. SCMC is a 208-bed facility located in Laguna Beach, California, offering emergency, acute care, chemical dependency, psychiatric, skilled nursing, and various other inpatient and outpatient services. The business combination was accounted for as an acquisition under the purchase method.

The Health System office and its hospital affiliates, along with the northern division of the Health System's home health operations, are members of the Obligated Group, as defined under trust indentures, for purposes of entering into long-term debt arrangements (see Note 5).

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Basis of Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the affiliated members of St. Joseph Health System and entities controlled by its affiliates, and Covenant. Significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidated financial statements.

Reclassifications

The 2010 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the changes in the 2011 financial statement presentation resulting from the adoption of the new noncontrolling interest and provision for doubtful accounts accounting standards. Certain other reclassifications were made to prior year financial statements to conform to current year presentation.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the Health System's consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Equivalents

All highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased are considered to be cash equivalents. The carrying amount approximates fair value because of the short maturity of the investments.

Marketable Securities

Marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at fair value based on quoted market prices or similar instruments in markets that are not active. Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses, unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The Health System has designated its investment portfolio as "trading." Unrealized gains and losses on marketable securities that have been designated as trading securities are included within excess of revenues over expenses. In addition, cash flows from the purchases and sales of its investment portfolio designated as trading are reported as a component of operating activities in the accompanying consolidated statements of cash flows.

Direct investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all direct investments in debt securities have been measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets based upon quoted market prices. Investments that are not anticipated to be utilized in the current period are classified as noncurrent.

Investments in partnerships and limited liability companies with underlying interest in equity and debt securities are recorded using the equity method of accounting with the related changes in value in earnings reported as nonoperating gains, net in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Patient Accounts Receivable

The Health System receives payment for services rendered to patients from the federal and state governments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs, privately sponsored managed care programs for which payment is made based on terms defined under formal contracts, and other payors. The following table summarizes the percentages of gross accounts receivable from all payors:

The Health System believes there are no significant credit risks associated with receivables from government programs. Receivables from contracted and others are from various payors who are subject to differing economic conditions, and do not represent any concentrated risks to the Health System. Accounts receivables are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Health System analyzes its historical experience and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for doubtful accounts. The Health System regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Health System analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for doubtful accounts, if necessary. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill, the Health System records a significant provision for doubtful accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience. The difference between the standard rates, or the discounted rates if negotiated, and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is recorded against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Inventories

Inventories, consisting principally of supplies, are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out basis) or market value.

Assets Limited As To Use

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements and designated assets set aside by the Health System's Board of Trustees (the Board) for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Expenditures which materially increase values, change capacities or extend useful lives are capitalized. Depreciation is recorded over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset, ranging from three to 40 years, and is computed using the straight-line method. Leases which have been capitalized are amortized over the life of the lease which approximates the useful life of the assets. Lease amortization is included within depreciation. Net interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Deferred Financing Costs

Costs incurred in obtaining long-term financing are deferred and amortized over the terms of the related obligations using the effective-interest method.

Goodwill and Other Intangibles

Goodwill and other intangible assets consist primarily of costs in excess of the fair value of tangible assets of acquired entities. As of July 1, 2010, the Health System adopted new accounting guidance that requires the Health System to test goodwill for impairment annually (see Note 6). Definite-lived intangible assets are amortized using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The Health System is currently amortizing an intangible asset over a period of 15 years. To the extent that operating results indicate the probability that the carrying values of such assets have been impaired, provisions for losses are recorded based upon the discounted cash flows of the acquired entities over the remaining amortization period.

Self-Insurance

The Health System is self-insured, through the Captive, for professional and general liability risks, subject to certain limitations. Risks in excess of \$5,000,000 per occurrence are reinsured with major independent insurance companies. Based on actuarially determined estimates, provisions have been made in the accompanying consolidated financial statements (included in both accrued liabilities and other liabilities) for all known claims and incurred but not reported

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

claims as of June 30, 2011 and 2010. The accruals for professional and general liability claims totaled \$32,808,000 and \$32,962,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and are not discounted. Estimation differences between actual payments and amounts recorded in previous years are recognized as expense in the year such amounts become determinable. In management's opinion, the estimated accrued claims provide an adequate reserve for loss contingencies at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Workers' Compensation Insurance

The Health System is insured for workers' compensation claims with major independent insurance companies, subject to certain deductibles of \$1,000,000 per occurrence as of June 30, 2011 and 2010. Based on actuarially determined estimates, provisions have been made in the accompanying consolidated financial statements (included in accrued compensation) for all known claims and incurred but not reported claims as of June 30, 2011 and 2010. The accruals for workers' compensation claims totaled \$76,145,000 and \$78,516,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and are not discounted. In connection with the workers' compensation plan, the Health System has filed bank letters of credit with the insurance companies. Estimation differences between actual payments and amounts recorded in previous years are recognized as expense in the year such amounts become determinable. In management's opinion, the estimated accrued claims losses provided an adequate reserve for loss contingencies at June 30, 2011 and 2010.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those assets whose use by the Health System has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Health System in perpetuity (see Note 12).

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Health System are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or the purpose for restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the consolidated financial statements.

Net Patient Service Revenues

The Health System has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments.

Patient service revenues are reported at net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated settlements under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Settlements are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

The Health System adopted the accounting standard addressing the presentation of the provision for doubtful accounts as of the current reporting period and as such, net patient service revenues are reported net of the provision for doubtful accounts on the statement of operations. The Health System records its provision for doubtful accounts based upon historical experience, as well as collections trends for major payor types.

The Health System is reimbursed for services provided to patients under certain programs administered by governmental agencies. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. The Health System believes that they are in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations, and they are not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties, and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Premium Revenues

Firstcare contracts with various employers to provide medical services to subscribing participants. Firstcare receives monthly premium payments from employers and contracts with various medical providers to provide medical care. Firstcare's premium revenue was \$288,179,000 in 2011 and \$319,289,000 in 2010.

In addition to the Firstcare contracts, the Health System has contracts with various health plans to provide medical services to subscribing participants. Under these agreements, the Health System's hospital affiliates and Heritage receive monthly capitation payments based on the number of each health plan's participants enrolled with participating affiliated or local physician groups that have designated the hospital affiliates as their provider. Under these arrangements, the hospital affiliates are responsible for hospital contracted services provided to plan

participants including services received at other health care facilities. The contracts call for risk-sharing arrangements between the hospital affiliates and the participating physician groups dependent upon utilization experience. The Health System's premium revenue for the contracts was \$366,197,000 in 2011 and \$356,249,000 in 2010. The hospital affiliates have accrued for estimated risk-sharing payments, and claims for professional services and services from other providers (included in accrued liabilities). Claims accruals related to these services are generally based on claims lag analyses and are continually monitored and reviewed.

Charity Care

The Health System provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policies without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Health System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue.

Effective July 1, 2010, the Health System updated its process for determining charity care whereby the Health System analyzes patient accounts receivable for eligibility as presumptive charity care through obtaining additional financial information for uninsured or under insured patients who have not supplied the requisite information. The additional information obtained is used by the Health System to determine whether the patients qualified for charity care in accordance with the Health System's policy. As a result of the adoption of this new policy and inclusion of presumptive charity care in the reported charity care in the consolidated financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2011, the Health System recognized a \$65,761,000 increase in reported charity care and corresponding decrease in provision for doubtful accounts.

Operating Income

The Health System's primary purpose is to provide diversified health care services to the community served by its affiliates. Only those activities directly associated with the furtherance of this purpose are considered operating activities and classified as unrestricted operating revenues and expenses. Operating revenues include those generated from direct patient care, related support services, and other revenues related to the operation of the Health System. Other activities that result in gains or losses unrelated to the Health System's primary purpose are

considered to be nonoperating. Nonoperating gains and losses include gifts, grants and bequests not restricted by donors, community benefit expenses related to various programs for the poor and underserved in local communities, investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on trading securities, gains and losses from the sale of property and equipment, and gains and losses on extinguishment of debt.

The Health System considers the performance indicator to be the excess of revenues over expenses.

Income Taxes

The principal operations of the Health System are exempt from taxation pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and the related state provisions.

Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 740, *Income Taxes*, clarifies the accounting for income taxes by prescribing a minimum recognition threshold that a tax position is required to meet before being recognized in the financial statements. ASC 740 also provides guidance on derecognition, measurement, classification, interest and penalties, disclosure, and transition. The guidance is applicable to pass-through entities and tax-exempt organizations. No significant tax liability for tax benefits, interest or penalties was accrued at June 30, 2011 or 2010.

The Health System currently files Form 990 (informational return of organizations exempt from income taxes) and Form 990-T (business income tax return for an exempt organization) in the U.S. federal jurisdiction and the states of California and Texas. The Health System is not subject to income tax examinations prior to 2007 in major tax jurisdictions.

California Hospital Quality Assurance Program

The California Hospital Quality Assurance Program (the Program) was signed into law by the Governor of California and became effective on January 1, 2010. Amending legislation, to conform to changes requested by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) during the approval process, the Program was signed into law by the Governor of California and became effective September 8, 2010. The primary and amending legislation contains two components.

The Quality Assurance Fee Act governs the "hospital fee" or "Quality Assurance Fee" (QA Fee) paid by participating hospitals. The Medi-Cal Hospital Provider Stabilization Act governs supplemental Medi-Cal payments (Supplemental Payments) made to providers from the fund. Hospital participation is mandatory with limited exceptions.

The Program was approved by CMS in December 2010. The amended legislation allowed California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) to begin assessing fees and making supplemental payments in September 2010. DHCS began assessing fees in October 2010.

The Health System recognized payments to DHCS for the QA Fee in the amount of \$101,951,000 and pledge payments to the California Health Foundation and Trust (CHFT) of approximately \$2,496,000 within supplies and other expenses. The CHFT is administering a private program to aggregate and disburse financial resources to support charitable activities at various independent hospitals for measures to alleviate losses resulting from the implementation of the Program. The Health System recognized Supplemental Payment revenue in the amount of \$136,811,000 pertaining to the Program period from April 1, 2009 to December 31, 2010, within net patient service revenue.

Adoption of New Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, an accounting standard was released, which requires health care entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time the services are rendered even though a patient's ability to pay is not assessed to reclassify the provision for doubtful accounts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts). The standard also requires enhanced disclosures of policies for recognizing patient service revenue and assessing provisions for doubtful accounts. The Health System adopted the accounting standard as of the current reporting period and applied its presentation and disclosure requirements retrospectively.

In May 2009, an accounting standard was released relating to combinations of not-for-profit (NFP) entities. Under this standard, a combination may either be a merger or an acquisition, and the accounting for each is significantly different. The feature that serves to differentiate a merger from an acquisition is control. In a merger, the governing bodies of two or more NFP entities cede control of those entities to create a new entity. In an acquisition, one organization obtains

control over the net assets of another organization or business. The accounting standard amends accounting standards for goodwill and other intangible assets in which goodwill and indefinite-lived intangible assets are no longer amortized; rather, they are now subject to an impairment test at least annually. As of July 1, 2010, the Health System completed its transitional goodwill impairment test as required and recognized an impairment of goodwill of \$17,901,000 recorded as a reduction in unrestricted net assets as an effect of a change in accounting principle (see Note 6).

This accounting standard also established new guidance governing the accounting for and reporting of noncontrolling interests in partially owned consolidated subsidiaries by requiring that noncontrolling interests (previously referred to as minority interests) be reported as a separate component of the appropriate class of net assets. The Health System applied the standard's provisions regarding noncontrolling interests prospectively, except for the presentation and disclosure requirements, which were applied retrospectively to all periods presented. As a result, upon adoption, the Health System reclassified noncontrolling interests of \$29,755,000 and \$28,743,000 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, from other liabilities to net assets.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In August 2010, an accounting standard was released which requires health care entities to present insurance claims and related recoveries at gross values within the financial statements. This standard will be effective for the Health System on July 1, 2011. The Health System is currently evaluating the impact to the consolidated financial statements.

In May 2011, an amended accounting standard was released and effective for financial statements for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011, relating to the intent of existing fair value measurement and disclosure requirements under ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures. The Health System is currently evaluating the impact to the consolidated financial statements.

Subsequent Events

The Health System has evaluated subsequent events occurring between the end of the most recent fiscal year ended June 30, 2011 and September 30, 2011, the date the financial statements were issued.

2. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is defined as an exit price, representing the amount that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants. As such, fair value is a market-based measurement that should be determined based on assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability. As a basis for considering such assumptions, the Health System utilizes a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value as follows:

- Level 1 Pricing is based on observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets. Financial assets in Level 1 include money market, treasury, corporate debt, and listed equities held by the Health System.
- Level 2 Pricing inputs are based on quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities. Financial assets and liabilities in this category generally include money market funds, U.S. Treasury securities, corporate bonds and loans, municipal bonds, and interest rate swap obligations.
- Level 3 Pricing inputs are generally unobservable and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the investment. The inputs into the determination of fair value require management's judgment or estimation of assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the assets or liabilities. The fair values are therefore determined using factors that involve considerable judgment and interpretations, including, but not limited to, private and public comparables, and discounted cash flow models. This category primarily includes certain corporate debt securities.

Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are based on one or more of three valuation techniques as follows:

- (a) Market approach. Prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets or liabilities.
- (b) Cost approach. Amount that would be required to replace the service capacity of an asset (replacement cost).

2. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

(c) Income approach. Techniques to convert future amounts to a single present amount based on market expectations (including present value techniques, option-pricing, and excess earnings models).

The Health System has invested in three funds which are included in long-term marketable securities and assets limited as to use in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. These funds use strategies such as long/short equities, arbitrage, and event driven strategies to seek positive returns, regardless of market direction. The terms and conditions upon which the Health System may redeem investments in the two hedge funds range from monthly within 30 days notice to within 45 days notice at calendar quarter end. These investments are made through limited partnerships where liquidity may be limited on new contributions for up to two years. The value recorded under the equity method of accounting and included within the tables below, was \$179,832,000 at June 30, 2011, and \$116,330,000 at June 30, 2010.

The Health System received restricted and unrestricted pledges and contributions totaling approximately \$42,770,000 and \$29,557,000 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Contributions and pledges were measured based on actual cash and pledges received. Long-term irrevocable planned gifts were measured based on discounted cash flow projections.

In accordance with ASC 350, as of July 1, 2011, goodwill with a carrying amount of \$59,373,000 was written down to its implied fair value of \$41,472,000 resulting in an impairment charge of \$17,901,000 recorded in unrestricted net assets as a cumulative effect of the adoption of the new accounting principle (see Note 6). The assets were measured using an income and market approach with significant unobservable inputs (Level 3).

In addition to amounts included in the previous table, the Health System's investments in partnerships, limited liability companies, and similarly structured entities amounting to approximately \$24,488,000 and \$19,443,000 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, included in investments and other in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, are accounted for using the equity method of accounting, which is not a fair value measurement.

Investment Gains and Losses

Net realized gains of \$66,213,000 and \$48,071,000 on sales of marketable securities are included in nonoperating gains, net for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Also included in nonoperating gains, net are net unrealized gains of \$110,893,000 and \$57,233,000 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The Health System is required to recognize a liability for the fair value of conditional asset retirement obligations if the fair value of the liability can be reasonably estimated. The fair value of a liability for conditional asset retirement obligations must be recognized when incurred, generally upon acquisition, construction or development and/or through the normal operation of the asset. The Health System estimated the fair value of known conditional asset retirement obligations relating to the costs of asbestos abatement that will result from the Health System's current plans to renovate and/or demolish certain of its facilities. This computation is based on a number of assumptions which may change in the future based on the availability of new information, technology changes, changes in costs of remediation, and other factors. The conditional asset obligation at June 30, 2011 and 2010, was \$14,534,000 and \$17,616,000, respectively, and is included in other liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Lease Financing Obligations

In June 2006, St. Joseph Hospital of Orange (SJO) executed a 55-year lease arrangement with a developer, whereby the developer agreed to construct a 130,000 square foot medical office building and a parking structure on SJO's land. Under the ground lease, SJO received nominal base rent until construction was completed in August 2008, at which time SJO took occupancy. SJO guaranteed to lease 64,000 square feet of the medical office building for 10 years and is required to pay lease payments for the parking structure for five years. At the end of the lease term, SJO will have title to both the parking structure and the medical office building. The aggregate cost of the project was approximately \$43,527,000 and is included in buildings and improvements. All construction costs were substantially financed by the developer.

In May 2005, SJO executed a 22-year lease arrangement, including two five-year lease term extensions, with a joint venture partnership in which SJO has a 35% ownership interest. The joint venture partnership owned and constructed a 56,000 square foot medical office building and parking structure on its land. SJO committed to leasing the whole building, but subleased approximately 43,000 square feet to Heritage for physician offices. The aggregate cost of the project was approximately \$28,158,000 and is included in building and improvements. Substantially all construction costs were financed by the joint venture partnership.

SJO is considered the owner of both the medical office buildings and parking structures for financial reporting purposes due to certain financial arrangements that effectively fund a portion of the construction costs. Heritage is also considered a separate owner of the medical office building since it is affiliated with SJO who has a 35% ownership interest in the joint venture partnership. Accordingly, the assets and long-term debt are recorded in the accompanying consolidated financial statements at June 30, 2011 and 2010 (see Note 5). The medical office buildings and parking structures are included in buildings and improvements as of June 30, 2011 and 2010. SJO and Heritage did not meet the criteria, necessary to derecognize the asset and related long-term debt when construction was complete in 2009 and the lease terms began.

The cost of the medical office buildings and parking structures are amortized over the economic life. Rent payments paid by SJO and Heritage are recorded as debt service payments on the debt obligation with the portion not relating to interest reducing the principal balance. Minimum estimated payments under lease financing obligations, excluding the effect of Consumer Price Index adjustments, are estimated to be as follows (in thousands):

4. Short-Term Debt

The Health System has a bank credit facility that provides for the issuance of up to an aggregate of \$50,000,000 under letters of credit. Such letters of credit are collateralized under trust indentures (see Note 5). At June 30, 2011, the Health System had provided an aggregate of \$37,299,000 of these letters of credit for its workers' compensation and other insurance plans. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, none of these letters have been drawn upon.

At June 30, 2011, the Health System is jointly and severally liable for certificates of participation and tax exempt revenue bonds issued on its behalf by the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA), California Health Facilities Financing Authority (CHFFA), and the Lubbock Health Facilities Development Corporation (LHFDC).

In August 2009, the Health System issued \$185,095,000 of CHFFA fixed rate revenue bonds, of which \$44,795,000 is due by 2029 at a 5.50% interest rate and \$140,300,000 due by 2039 at a 5.75% interest rate. The proceeds of the issuance were used to reimburse prior capital spending at the various hospitals. In addition, the Health System issued \$236,005,000 of CHFFA multiannual put rate bonds of three-, five- and seven-year terms at interest rates varying from 3.00% to 5.25%. The proceeds from the fixed rate revenue bonds and the multi-annual put rate bonds were used to refund and convert \$293,525,000 of the Health System's variable rate demand bonds with a self-liquidity feature initially issued in 2008.

The fair value of the fixed rate tax exempt bonds approximated \$1,256,725,000 and \$1,167,719,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Fair value is estimated using a discounted cash flow analysis, based on current market interest rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements. The carrying amount of the Health System's variable rate tax exempt bonds approximates its fair value as the interest rates change with the market.

At June 30, 2011, the Health System was party to seven interest rate swap agreements with a current notional amount totaling \$403,507,000 and with varying expirations. The swap agreements require the Health System to pay a fixed rate in exchange for a variable rate. The market risk exposure of these agreements occurs when the fixed rate paid is greater than the variable rate received. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, the total fair value of the interest rate swaps of \$44,964,000 and \$65,194,000, respectively, represent the estimated amount the Health System would have paid upon termination of these agreements as of these dates. Fair values are based on independent valuations obtained and are determined by calculating the value of the discounted cash flows of the differences between the fixed interest rate of the interest rate swaps and the counterparty's forward LIBOR curve, which is the input used in the valuation, taking also into account any non-performance risk. Changes in the fair value of the interest rate swaps are included within interest expense. The Health System restricted \$10,339,000 and \$29,010,000 in collateral held for the swap counterparty at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, as required by its swap agreements.

The Health System has a note payable with a bank to borrow \$60,000,000. Borrowings under this note bear interest at rates based on specified margins from published indices. The note payable expires on December 31, 2013. The Health System had \$34,700,000 and \$39,200,000 in outstanding borrowings under this credit facility at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Effective May 18, 2011, the Health System terminated an existing credit facility and transferred the outstanding balance to a credit facility established in March 2011 under which the Health System can cumulatively borrow up to \$80,000,000. Borrowings under this credit facility bear interest at rates based on specified margins from published indices. The Health System had \$34,000,000 and \$80,000,000 in long-term and current debt as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, in outstanding borrowings. The credit facility expires in March 2014.

The Health System has a line of credit with a bank to cumulatively borrow up to \$75,000,000. Borrowings under this credit facility bear interest at rates based on specified margins from published indices. The credit facility expires on August 25, 2011. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Health System did not have any outstanding borrowings under this credit facility.

The Health System has a note payable with a bank to cumulatively borrow up to \$17,800,000. Borrowings under this note bear interest at rates based on specified margins from published indices (ranging from 1.69% to 1.81% for the year ended June 30, 2011). The note expires on September 29, 2018. The Health System had \$14,000,000 in outstanding borrowings at June 30, 2011, and no outstanding borrowings at June 30, 2010.

In July 2011, the Health System issued \$302,110,000 of CHFFA variable rate tax exempt demand bonds with interest rates reset daily or weekly and liquidity supported by irrevocable credit facilities that extend through July 13, 2016, unless renewed or extended. Proceeds of this issuance will be used to finance prospective projects and reimburse prior capital spending at various hospitals. In addition, the Health System converted \$105,385,000 of LHFDC variable rate demand bonds with liquidity supported by an irrevocable credit facility into a fixed rate revenue bond at an interest rate of 3.12%.

In conjunction with the issuance of the CHFFA variable rate tax exempt demand bonds in July 2011, the Health System secured \$306,878,000 of credit facilities to provide liquidity for the outstanding bonds. The Health System also entered into a new syndicated credit arrangement for \$350,000,000 in revolving credit lines expiring on July 18, 2016.

Debt Covenants

The Health System's financing agreements contain restrictive covenants and limitations on certain working capital and liquidity ratios, amount of combined debt of the corporations comprising the Obligated Group, and amount of transfer of assets to Non-Obligated Group members. Additionally, the trust indentures require that funds are established with, and controlled by, a trustee during the period the bonds remain outstanding.

If the Health System does not have a maximum annual debt service coverage ratio at the end of any fiscal year, including June 30, 2011, of at least 2.0 to 1.0, pursuant to its trust indentures for the tax exempt bonds issued through CSCDA, CHFFA, and LHFDC, the Health System is required to fund the applicable debt service reserve fund seven days after the required reporting date. The calculation for its fiscal year ending June 30, 2009, indicated that the debt service coverage ratio was less than 2.0 to 1.0 due primarily to unrealized and realized losses in the investment portfolio. Accordingly, the Health System funded the applicable debt service reserve on September 5, 2009, with \$92,826,000 of cash and marketable securities included in assets held in trust at June 30, 2010. Such funds were released to the Health System on August 31, 2010, as the calculation indicated the maximum annual debt service coverage requirement was more than the 2.0 to 1.0 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010.

6. Goodwill

The Health System adopted the new standard related to the accounting treatment for goodwill and indefinite-lived intangible assets by not-for-profit organizations effective July 1, 2010 and accordingly, ceased the amortization of its goodwill. The new accounting standard requires that the Health System test the carrying value of goodwill for impairment at the reporting unit level on an annual basis, or more frequently if significant indicators of impairment exist. The standard also requires a transitional test in the year of adoption. The Health System primarily uses the income and market approaches to valuation that include the discounted cash flow method, the guideline company method, as well as other generally accepted valuation methodologies to determine the fair value of its reporting units.

Upon completion of the transitional goodwill impairment test, the Health System determined that the estimated fair value of two of its reporting units was less than their respective carrying values. As a result, the Health System recognized an impairment of \$17,901,000 recorded as a reduction in net assets. The Health System has elected an annual measurement date of April 1 and upon completion of the annual impairment assessment, the Health System determined that no impairment was indicated as the estimated fair value of each of the two remaining reporting units with goodwill exceeded its respective carrying value and no significant indicators of impairment exist for its goodwill that would require additional analysis before its next annual evaluation.

7. Children's Hospital of Orange County

SJO provides Children's Hospital of Orange County (CHOC) with specified facilities and ancillary services and other operating services under an agreement through March 2013 that requires CHOC to reimburse SJO for the costs of providing such services. Net patient service revenues include \$71,741,000 and \$65,148,000 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, relating to these services. SJO also provides management and other administrative support to CHOC. Revenue related to these arrangements, based on cost and included in other revenues, was \$2,000 and \$191,000 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. On March 31, 2008, CHOC provided SJO with their notice of intent to terminate this agreement effective March 31, 2013.

In January 1993, Mission Hospital Regional Medical Center (MHRMC) and CHOC entered into an asset purchase agreement, a long-term lease, and an operating agreement forming Children's Hospital at Mission (CHM). Pursuant to the asset purchase agreement, CHM purchased substantially all of the pediatric services and operations of MHRMC and certain tangible and intangible assets related to those activities and operations for \$10,200,000.

CHM rents space from MHRMC through January 2013 and has two ten-year renewal options under the long-term lease. MHRMC provides CHM and its patients certain hospital services and facilities at an agreed-upon cost plus a percentage mark-up under the operating agreement. Net patient service revenues include \$13,830,000 and \$13,924,000 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for these services. Other revenue includes \$8,026,000 and \$6,920,000 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for other services provided to CHM.

8. Acquisitions and Affiliations

Lubbock Methodist Hospital System Affiliation

The Health System entered into an affiliation agreement with LMHS to form Covenant. Covenant has two corporate members: the Health System and LMHS. Eight members of the Covenant Board of Trustees are appointed by each corporate member. In addition, the Health System appoints the CEO of Covenant who is also an ex-officio member of Covenant's Board of Trustees with voting rights. The Health System has management responsibility for Covenant and the operations of Covenant have been integrated into the Health System's operations.

Under the terms of the affiliation agreement, net asset transfers from Covenant to the Health System are limited to \$5,000,000 in the aggregate over the life of the affiliation. Exceptions to this limitation include: (i) payments made to the Health System for management, administration, and other services provided by it; (ii) debt service, repayments of loans and similar financing costs; (iii) payment under the joint and several obligation of the Health System Master Indenture; (iv) return of capital contributed or other advances from the Health System; (v) payments consented to by the corporate members; (vi) payment for services such as insurance, self-insurance, benefit and retirement plans and similar programs administered by the Health System, provided such payments are substantially comparable to charges made to other Health System affiliates; and (vii) payment for property or services provided by third parties through the Health System.

Also, under the terms of the affiliation agreement, the Health System and Covenant are required to leave certain deposits in local Lubbock banks. The maximum local banking amount per the agreement is \$50,000,000. Covenant is required to participate in the Health System's cash and investment management program for funds in excess of the maximum local banking amount.

In connection with the affiliation agreement, the Health System and LMHS entered into a "Members Agreement." The principle underlying the Members Agreement is that the affiliation is intended to constitute a long-term relationship. Additionally, as part of the affiliation agreement, Covenant became a member of the Health System Obligated Group. The accompanying consolidated financial statements present the combined balances of the Health System and Covenant and do not reflect any potential residual or noncontrolling interest related to the reciprocal offer described below based upon the integration of the operations and the related assets of Covenant into the Health System and the Health System Obligated Group.

The Members Agreement restricts the ability of the Health System to exit its relationship with Covenant and also precludes the Health System and Covenant from entering into a wide variety of transactions which could result in Covenant assets or affiliates being conveyed to a third party, except conveyances in the ordinary course of business. These precluded transactions are referred to as Covered Transactions. Should Covenant or the Health System undertake a Covered Transaction, they are obligated to provide notice and information to LMHS and to make a

"reciprocal offer" to LMHS, including an offer to purchase LMHS's membership rights in Covenant and a simultaneous obligation to offer to sell the Health System's membership rights in Covenant to LMHS at the same purchase price, adjusted upward by a formula that reflects the dissolution percentages (57% Health System, 43% LMHS). Covenant's net assets totaled \$469,168,000 and \$412,423,000 at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Certain changes in control do not constitute Covered Transactions under the Members Agreement. Generally, these changes include Covenant transactions with other federal tax-exempt organizations and transactions in which LMHS's rights are preserved.

9. Employee Benefit Plans

Retirement Plan

The Health System sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan that covers substantially all employees. The plan provides for employer matching contributions in an amount equal to a percentage of employee pre-tax contributions, up to a maximum amount. In addition, the Health System makes contributions to all eligible employees based on years of service. The Health System contributed \$75,740,000 in 2011 and \$71,176,000 in 2010 to the plan.

Postretirement Health

The Health System offers a retiree health reimbursement plan to provide employees who have satisfied the conditions of eligibility, with certain retiree medical expense reimbursement benefits. Eligibility for plan benefits is based on age and years of service. The Health System enacted an amendment to the retiree health reimbursement plan in September 2010, with an effective date of July 1, 2011, which allows participants access to an established lump sum rather than a predetermined monthly amount.

11. Charity Care and Community Benefits

The Health System's policy is to accept all patients regardless of their ability to pay. In assessing a patient's ability to pay, the Health System's policy uses generally recognized income levels, but also considers cases where incurred charges are significant when compared to income. Health care services rendered to patients who are unable to pay according to these criteria are classified as traditional charity care.

The Health System's policy is also to sponsor numerous health care-related programs for the general community and the medically underserved population in the area it serves. Some of these programs include mobile medical vans, health and dental clinics, prenatal programs, AIDs residences, health referral services, and bilingual health education and are referred to as community services.

In addition to traditional charity care and other direct community services, the Health System incurred a shortfall from services rendered to patients covered by certain public programs. This shortfall is defined as the cost of providing services to state Medicaid and local indigent program beneficiaries in excess of government payments.

The cost of the aforementioned programs was determined in accordance with the Catholic Health Association's "A Guide for Planning and Reporting Community Benefit," and is summarized for 2011 and 2010, as follows:

Effective July 1, 2010, the Health System updated its policy for determining charity care whereby the Health System analyzes patient accounts receivable for eligibility as presumptive charity care. Traditional charity care for the year ended June 30, 2011, in the above table, includes presumptive charity care amounts at cost.

In addition, the Health System incurred \$316,210,000 and \$282,076,000 in costs in excess of reimbursement from the Medicare program in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

In August 2010, an accounting standard was released which required health care entities to present charity care disclosures at cost. The Health System's policy is to report charity care and community benefits disclosures on a cost basis and does not expect the new accounting standard to impact the consolidated financial statements.

The Health System affiliated hospitals dedicate approximately 10% of revenues in excess of expenses attributable to controlling interests each year to the St. Joseph Health System Foundation (Foundation). The Foundation administers various programs for the poor and underserved in local and other communities. Such programs are reflected in community services for the poor.

Temporarily and permanently restricted net assets are donor-restricted assets appropriated for plant expansion, capital acquisition, health services, and other specific purposes.

Endowments

The Health System's endowment consists of approximately 87 separate endowment funds included in assets limited as to use established for a variety of purposes. The endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Trustees of the hospital foundations to function as endowments. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Board of Trustees has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor restrictions to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Health System classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified as permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily net

assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Health System in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Health System considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- a. The duration and preservation of the fund
- b. The purposes of the hospital and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- c. General economic conditions
- d. The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- e. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- f. Other resources of the hospital
- g. The investment policies of the hospital

The Health System has investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while balancing the risk of investment loss with the long-term preservation of purchasing power. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Health System must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period as well as board-designated funds. The Health System seeks to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets portfolio and to achieve rates of returns which

over time exceed inflation by a specified margin. To achieve its long-term investment objectives within prudent risk constraints, the Health System develops strategic asset allocation ranges and targets for the endowment portfolio and considers factors including, but not limited to, time horizon, liquidity, and risk tolerance. The current asset allocation targets emphasize diversification across asset classes to manage risk and enhance returns. Actual allocations may differ from target allocations in the short-term or during periods of significant market fluctuations. In addition, the Health System confirms the asset allocation ranges on an annual basis and updates the investment policy and/or target allocations, as needed, if there is a significant change in capital market expectations and/or investment objectives, including spending requirements.

The Health System expects that the returns achieved for the endowment portfolio will be accompanied by capital market risk, but the Health System seeks to achieve returns, adjusted for this risk, which will compare favorably to the returns of the applicable markets and representative peers.

The Health System's policy allows the individual hospital Board of Trustees to determine a spending rate from endowment investments. In establishing this policy, the Health System considers the fair market value and long-term expected return on its endowment and the factors described above.

Operating Leases

The Health System leases land, buildings and equipment under various noncancelable operating leases excluding lease financing obligations (see Note 3) for terms up to 18 years. Lease expense was approximately \$65,733,000 in 2011 and \$56,266,000 in 2010. Sublease revenues relating to building space under various noncancelable leases were \$24,957,000 in 2011 and \$19,160,000 in 2010. The leases provide that the minimum monthly lease payments may be adjusted for inflation. Minimum lease commitments at June 30, 2011, are as follows (in thousands):

Litigation

The Civil Division of the Department of Justice (DOJ) has contacted the Health System in connection with its nationwide review of whether, in certain cases, hospital charges to the federal government relating to implantable cardio-defibrillators (ICDs) met the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services criteria. In connection with this nationwide review, the DOJ has indicated that it will be reviewing certain ICD billing and medical records at certain of the Health System's hospitals for the period from October 2003 to the present. The review could potentially give rise to claims against the Health System under the federal false claims act or other statutes, regulations or laws. At this time, management cannot predict what effect, if any, this review or any resulting claims could have on the Health System.

As a result of a compliant validation survey completed by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) in September 2010, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) concluded that, due to alleged deficiencies relating to infection control, St. Joseph Hospital of Eureka (St. Joseph Eureka) was not in compliance with certain of the conditions of participation as a provider in the Medicare program. St. Joseph Eureka submitted a plan of correction to CMS addressing the alleged deficiencies, and CDPH conducted a full survey of the facility in January 2011 to verify compliance with all conditions of participation. As a result of that January 2011 survey, CDPH identified certain continuing deficiencies relating to infection control and certain additional deficiencies relating to quality assessment and performance improvement, dietary services, the physical environment, and surgical services. In response to these survey findings, CMS issued to St. Joseph Eureka a notice of non-compliance with specified Medicare conditions of participation. On June 2, 2011, St. Joseph Eureka submitted a plan of correction for review by CMS and CDPH.

While failure to comply with Medicare conditions of participation may result in termination under the Medicare program, management of the Corporation anticipates that the deficiencies identified by CMS and not already corrected will be corrected by St. Joseph Eureka within the time periods required by CMS and that Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement will not be materially adversely affected. Management of the Corporation does not expect that the cost of correcting the deficiencies and maintaining compliance will have a material adverse effect on the Health System's financial condition.

Certain claims, suits, and complaints arising in the ordinary course of business have also been filed or are pending against the Health System. In the opinion of management, such claims, if disposed of unfavorably, would not have a material adverse effect on the Health System's consolidated financial position, results of operations or cash flows.

Seismic Compliance (Unaudited)

The Health System has completed facility master plans for each of its California hospitals, including an assessment of earthquake retrofit requirements. The Health System has received an extension for compliance with seismic standards for all of its California hospitals through January 1, 2013, with an additional extension to January 1, 2015, for some hospitals for factors beyond the hospital's control. The Health System projects total costs of \$1,111,343,000 to meet these seismic standards, and in some cases these projects will meet enhanced standards for 2030.

Of the total projected costs, \$618,094,000 has been spent through 2010, with additional commitments of \$368,931,000. The Health System plans to fund these projects through operations, debt issuance and philanthropy. Through June 30, 2011, the Health System has received \$286,669,000 in philanthropic support for all construction projects.
