An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall consolidated financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits and the report of the other auditors provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, based on our audits and the report of the other auditors, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of McLaren Health Care Corporation and Subsidiaries at September 30, 2011 and 2010 and the consolidated results of their operations, changes in net assets, and cash flows for the years then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity and Corporate Structure - McLaren Health Care Corporation and Subsidiaries (the "Corporation" or MHC), a not-for-profit corporation, is a major provider of healthcare services to residents of Flint, Lansing, Bay City, Lapeer, Mt. Clemens, Pontiac, and Mt. Pleasant, Michigan and surrounding communities.

The consolidated financial statements include the corporations listed below, as well as their subsidiaries and related foundations, of which MHC is the sole member:

Central Michigan Community Hospital (CMCH)

McLaren Homecare Group (MHG)

Significant accounting policies include the following:

Principles of Consolidation - The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of McLaren Health Care Corporation and its subsidiaries. Intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated in consolidation.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets - Temporarily restricted net assets reflect assets contributed or pledged to the Corporation and subsidiaries, the use of which is restricted by the donor. Temporarily restricted net assets are restricted for medical education, indigent care, and property and equipment purchases. Investment earnings on temporarily restricted investments are restricted by donors for specific purposes.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Permanently Restricted Net Assets - McLaren Foundation is the sole beneficiary of all interest and dividend income of the Minnie I. Ballenger Trust and the William S. Ballenger Trust (collectively, the "Trusts"). Permanently restricted net assets are primarily comprised of the estimated present value of the future cash receipts from the Trusts' assets. The present value of the future receipts from the Trusts is recorded at the fair value of the assets of the Trusts, net of liabilities.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding amounts limited as to use by board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements (see Note 6).

The Corporation routinely invests its surplus operating funds in money market mutual funds. These funds generally invest in highly liquid U.S. government and agency obligations. Investments in money market funds are not insured or guaranteed by the U.S. government; however, management believes that credit risk related to these investments is minimal.

Accounts Receivable - Accounts receivable for patients, insurance companies, and governmental agencies are based on gross charges. An allowance for uncollectible accounts is established on an aggregate basis by using historical write-off rate factors applied to unpaid accounts based on aging. Loss rate factors are based on historical loss experience and adjusted for economic conditions and other trends affecting the Corporation's ability to collect outstanding amounts. Uncollectible amounts are written off against the allowance for doubtful accounts in the period they are determined to be uncollectible. An allowance for contractual adjustments and interim payment advances is based on expected payment rates from payors based on current reimbursement methodologies. This amount also includes amounts received as interim payments against unpaid claims from certain payors.

Investments - Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are stated at fair market value. Investments in other equity securities are recorded at cost. Investment income or loss (including realized and changes in unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenue over expenses, unless the income or loss is restricted by the donor.

Securities Lending Arrangements - The Corporation engages in transactions whereby certain securities in its portfolio are loaned to other institutions, generally for a short period of time. The Corporation records the fair value of the collateral received as a current asset and a current liability since the Corporation is obligated to return the collateral upon the return of the borrowed securities.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Pooled Funds - McLaren Foundation has authorized investment pools for flexibility in investing its assets and maximizing its rate of return. Realized and unrealized gains or losses and income on unallocated investments are allocated to the unrestricted and temporarily restricted net assets participating in the pool based upon the average balance of the respective net assets.

Assets Limited as to Use - Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the governing boards of various subsidiaries for future capital improvements, over which the boards retain control and may at their discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Assets limited as to use also include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements, funds held in trust by foundations, funds restricted by donors for specific purposes, funds held in trust for payment of employee benefits, and self-insurance trust arrangements (see Note 6).

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Donated property and equipment are recorded at the estimated fair market value at the time of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Costs of maintenance and repairs are charged to expense when incurred.

Interest Rate Swaps - The Corporation has entered into interest rate swap agreements to manage its investments and capitalization, including risks associated with changes in interest rates. The Corporation records its interest rate swaps as either assets or liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet at fair value. None of the Corporation's current swaps are designated a hedge. Accordingly, both the unrealized and realized gains or losses related to the interest rate swaps are included in nonoperating income (loss) on the consolidated statement of operations (see Note 8).

Classification of Net Assets - Net assets of the Corporation are classified as permanently restricted, temporarily restricted, or unrestricted depending on the presence and characteristics of donor-imposed restrictions limiting the Corporation's ability to use or dispose of contributed assets or the economic benefits embodied in those assets. Donor-imposed restrictions that expire with the passage of time or that can be removed by meeting certain requirements result in temporarily restricted net assets. Permanently restricted net assets result from donor-imposed restrictions that limit the use of net assets in perpetuity. Earnings, gains, and losses on restricted net assets are classified as unrestricted unless specifically restricted by the donor or by applicable state law.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses - The consolidated statement of operations includes excess of revenue over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include net assets released from restrictions for the acquisition of long-lived assets, pension-related changes other than net periodic benefit cost, and other.

Net Patient Service Revenue - The Corporation has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Corporation at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactively calculated adjustments arising under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods, as final settlements are determined.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Management believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. Final determination of compliance of such laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation. Violations may result in significant regulatory action including fines, penalties, and exclusions from the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Contributions - The Corporation reports gifts of cash and other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statement of changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

The Corporation reports gifts of property and equipment as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Corporation reports the expiration of donor restrictions when the assets are placed in service.

Premium Revenue - MHP recognizes premium revenue in the period the subscribers are entitled to related healthcare services. Premium revenue is reported in other revenue in the consolidated statement of operations and was \$319,114,000 and \$303,404,000 for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Healthcare Costs - MHP contracts with various healthcare providers for the provision of certain medical services to its members. Healthcare costs include all amounts incurred under capitation payment agreements and services rendered under the fee-for-service arrangement, including an estimate of costs incurred but not reported at each year end. Healthcare costs are reported in other expenses in the consolidated statement of operations.

Professional and Other Liability Insurance - The Corporation, subsidiaries, and qualifying medical staff are insured for professional liability on a claims-made basis by MICOL, a multiprovider, offshore captive insurance company, wholly owned by the Corporation. The Corporation and subsidiaries accrue an estimate of the ultimate expense, including litigation and settlement expense, net of applicable reinsurance coverage, for incidents of potential improper professional service and other liability claims occurring during the year as well as for those claims that have not been reported at year end based on estimates provided by an independent actuary (see Note 14).

Charity Care - Subsidiaries of the Corporation provide care to patients who meet certain criteria under charity care policies without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because the Corporation and subsidiaries do not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue (see Note 4).

Tax Status - The Corporation and substantially all its subsidiaries are nonprofit, tax-exempt organizations; accordingly, no tax provision is reflected in the consolidated financial statements. Some subsidiaries are for-profit corporations. Income tax provisions are not material to the consolidated financial statements.

The Corporation adopted accounting standards related to uncertain tax positions and, accordingly, reviewed all tax positions. The accounting standard that refers to Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2006 for nonpublic entities that hold public debt. The standard addresses the determination of how tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded on the consolidated financial statement. Companies must recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more likely than not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by the taxing authorities, based on the technical merits of the position. The standard also provides guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties on income taxes, and accounting in interim periods, and requires increased disclosures. The evaluated potential exposure related to uncertain tax positions was found to be immaterial.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The Corporation is subject to examination by taxing authorities; however, no examinations are in progress. Management believes the Corporation is not subject to tax examinations for years prior to September 30, 2008.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassification - Certain 2010 amounts have been reclassified to conform to the 2011 presentation.

New Accounting Pronouncements - During 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) adopted new accounting guidance that will impact how healthcare organizations account for claims liabilities and charity care. The new guidance requires that the accrued liability for malpractice claims and similar liabilities and the related insurance recovery receivable be presented separately on the balance sheet on a gross basis. Prior guidance allowed the liability to be reported net of the estimated insurance recovery receivable. This new standard will be effective for the year ending September 30, 2012.

New guidance has also been adopted on how to measure the amount of charity care provided to patients. The new guidance requires that cost be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes and that the cost be identified as the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care. No other measurement basis should be used. Prior guidance did not dictate how charity care should be measured. This new standard will be effective for the year ending September 30, 2012 and will be applied retrospectively to all prior periods presented.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

During 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) adopted Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011 07 Health Care Entities (Topic 954), Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities. Topic 954 establishes accounting and disclosures for healthcare entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time services are rendered even though the entities do not assess a patient's ability to pay. The amendments in the ASU will change the presentation of the consolidated statement of operations and add new disclosures that are not required under current generally accepted accounting principles. The provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue is required to be presented on a separate line as a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) in the consolidated statement of operations. The ASU is effective for the Corporation for the year ending September 30, 2013.

The Corporation is currently assessing the impact these new standards will have on its consolidated financial statements.

Subsequent Events - The consolidated financial statements and related disclosures include evaluation of events up through and including January 5, 2012, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Cost Report Settlements

Medical centers of the Corporation have agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement at amounts different from the subsidiaries' established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with these third-party payors is as follows:

- Medicare Inpatient, acute care, psychiatric, and rehabilitation services rendered to
 Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per
 discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system based on
 clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Long-term acute care services are reimbursed
 on a prospectively determined per diem basis. Outpatient, physician, and homecare
 services related to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed based on a prospectively
 determined amount per episode of care or on an established fee-for-service
 methodology.
- Medicaid Inpatient, acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are also paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Capital costs relating to Medicaid patients are paid on a cost reimbursement method. Outpatient and physician services are reimbursed on an established fee-for-service methodology.
- Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan Inpatient, acute care services are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed on fee-for-service and percentage-of-charge bases.
- **Health Maintenance Organizations** Services rendered to HMO beneficiaries are paid at predetermined rates or at a percentage of hospital charges.

Note 3 - Cost Report Settlements (Continued)

Cost report settlements result from the adjustment of interim payments to final reimbursement under the Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan, and HMO programs and are subject to audit by fiscal intermediaries.

The Medicare program has initiated a recovery audit contractor (RAC) initiative, whereby claims subsequent to October 1, 2007 may be reviewed by contractors for validity, accuracy, and proper documentation. The Corporation is unable to determine the extent of liability for overpayments, if any. The potential exists for significant overpayment of claims liability for the Corporation at a future date.

Note 4 - Community Benefit (Unaudited)

The Corporation and its subsidiaries accept all patients regardless of their ability to pay. The Corporation has established a formal policy whereby a patient may qualify as a charity patient if certain criteria are met. These policies define charity services as those services for which no payment is anticipated. In assessing a patient's ability to pay, the Corporation utilizes the generally recognized poverty income levels, but also includes certain cases where incurred charges are significant compared to the patient's available resources. The Corporation participates in the JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A. Security Lending Program for its U.S. and non-U.S. securities held in custody at JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A. (JPMorgan Chase). These securities are loaned to certain unrelated third-party brokers in exchange for collateral, usually in the form of cash. Both the collateral and the securities loaned are marked-to-market on a daily basis so that all loaned securities are more than fully collateralized at all times. Collateral received is invested in a segregated account managed by JPMorgan Chase, which consists of high quality short-term investments. In the event that the loaned securities are not returned by the borrower, JPMorgan Chase will, at its own expense, either replace the loaned securities or, if unable to purchase those securities on the open market, credit the Corporation's accounts with cash equal to the fair value of the loaned securities.

The Corporation receives 40 percent of any residual income earned on the securities held as collateral. JPMorgan Chase receives the remainder of the income.

Although the Corporation's securities lending activities are collateralized as described above, and although the terms of the securities lending agreement with JPMorgan Chase require JPMorgan Chase to comply with government rules and regulations related to the lending of securities held by the Corporation, the securities lending program involves both market and credit risk. In this context, market risk refers to the possibility that the borrower of securities will be unable to collateralize its loan upon a sudden material change in the fair value of the loaned securities or the collateral, or that JPMorgan Chase's investment of collateral received from the borrowers of the Corporation's securities may be subject to unfavorable market fluctuations. Credit risk refers to the possibility that counterparties involved in the securities lending program may fail to perform in accordance with the terms of their contracts.

At September 30, 2011 and 2010, the fair value of securities loaned in the portfolio was \$15,112,000 and \$26,358,000, respectively, while the collateral held was \$14,906,000 and \$26,151,000, respectively. Collateral received consists of cash and fixed-income securities. The value of the collateral held and a corresponding liability to return the collateral have been reported on the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

Note 7 - Fair Value Measurements

Accounting standards require certain assets and liabilities be reported at fair value in the consolidated financial statements and provide a framework for establishing that fair value. The framework for determining fair value is based on a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs and valuation techniques used to measure fair value.

In general, fair values determined by Level I inputs use quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Corporation has the ability to access.

Fair values determined by Level 2 inputs use other inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly. These Level 2 inputs include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets and other inputs such as interest rates and yield curves that are observable at commonly quoted intervals.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs, including inputs that are available in situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the related asset. These Level 3 fair value measurements are based primarily on management's own estimates using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques taking into account the characteristics of the asset.

In instances where inputs used to measure fair value fall into different levels in the above fair value hierarchy, fair value measurements in their entirety are categorized based on the lowest level input that is significant to the valuation. The Corporation's assessment of the significance of particular inputs to these fair value measurements requires judgment and considers factors specific to each asset or liability.

McLaren Health Care Series 2008A and 2008B bonds (collectively, the "2008 Bonds"), consist of Revenue and Refunding Bonds issued by Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority to MHC, for MHC, and as credit group agent, on behalf of the credit group which consists of BRMC, IRMC, LRMC, MCRMC, MRMC, POHRMC, McLaren Foundation, Mount Clemens Regional Healthcare Foundation, and Lapeer Regional Medical Center Foundation (the "Credit Group"). As obligated group agent, MHC has the power to cause any member of the Credit Group to make required principal and interest payments on the bonds.

The Series 2008A bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group and consist of serial bonds with interest ranging from 4.625 percent to 5.25 percent and annual maturities ranging from \$3,875,000 in 2012 to \$5,135,000 in 2018, a term bond in the amount of \$68,890,000, due May 15, 2028 with interest at 5.625 percent, and an additional term bond in the amount of \$116,195,000, due May 15, 2038 with interest at 5.75 percent.

The Series 2008B bonds consist of variable rate bonds bearing interest based on a weekly interest rate determined by a remarketing agent to reflect current prevailing market conditions. The bonds are secured by the gross revenues of the Credit Group and have mandatory sinking fund redemption requirements in various amounts through 2038.

Holders of the Series 2008B bonds have the option to demand payment of their outstanding bonds. The Credit Group has entered into a remarketing agreement that requires the remarketing agent to utilize best efforts to remarket any such bonds that may be tendered for payment. The Credit Group has entered into a credit facility with a bank to provide for payment in the event any of the bonds cannot be remarketed. Draws on the credit facility are required to be reimbursed to the credit facility at the earliest remarketing or expiration of the credit facility. The credit facility expires on December I, 2013 and may be extended. Any outstanding draws on the credit facility at expiration will be converted to a term note payable over three years.

McLaren Health Care, Series 2005C bonds consist of revenue bonds issued by Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority to MHC, for MHC, and as credit group agent, on behalf of the Credit Group. The bonds are secured by gross revenue of the Credit Group and consist of term bonds with annual principal payments including mandatory sinking fund payments ranging from \$745,000 in 2012 to \$11,420,000 in 2035. The bonds bear fixed interest rates ranging from 3.625 percent to 5.0 percent.

McLaren Health Care Series 1998A bonds consist of Hospital Revenue and Refunding Bonds issued by Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority to MHC, for MHC, and as credit group agent, on behalf of the Credit Group. The bonds consist of term bonds payable in annual installments through June 1, 2028, ranging from \$2,535,000 to \$5,285,000, at interest rates ranging from 5.15 percent to 5.37 percent.

In connection with their loan agreements with the Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority, the Obligated and Credit Groups have made a covenant, among others, that net revenue, as defined in the bond documents, would equal or exceed 140 percent of maximum annual interest and principal requirements, as defined under the agreements.

McLaren Health Care, Series 2010 bonds consist of revenue bonds issued by Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority on behalf of the Credit Group. The bonds are secured by gross revenue of the Credit Group and are payable in annual installments beginning December 1, 2021 of \$3,356,250, plus interest. MRMC will pay the outstanding principal on December 1, 2040. The bonds bear interest at 3.25 percent per annum until the initial optional tender date on December 1, 2020.

Bonds payable, CMCH Series 1996, consisted of Hospital Revenue Bonds that were issued by the Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority. In January 2011, CMCH executed a redemption request on these bonds utilizing debt service reserve funds and draws on the line of credit.

Derivatives

The derivative instruments used by the Corporation are interest rate swap agreements that are used to manage variability in interest rates and to essentially convert variable-rate interest on long-term debt to fixed-rate interest. The variable interest rate on the debt generally exposes the Corporation to variability in rising or declining interest rate environments. The interest rate swaps reduce the variability of the interest rate of the debt.

(a) Objectives and Strategies:

The Corporation's objectives with respect to its use of derivative instruments include managing the risk of increased debt service resulting from rising market interest rates, the risk of decreased surplus returns resulting from falling interest rates, and the management of the risk of an increase in the fair value of outstanding fixed rate obligations resulting from declining market interest rates.

Debt obligations expose the Corporation to variability in interest payments due to changes in interest rates. Management believes that it is prudent to limit the variability of a portion of its interest payments. To meet this objective, management enters into interest rate swap agreements to manage fluctuations resulting from interest rate risk.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Note 8 - Long-term Debt (Continued)

By using derivative financial instruments to hedge exposure to changes in interest rates, the Corporation exposes itself to credit risk and market risk. Credit risk is the failure of the counterparty to perform under the terms of the derivative contract. When the fair value of a derivative contract is positive, the counterparty owes the Corporation, which creates credit risk for the Corporation. When the fair value of a derivative contract is negative, the Corporation owes the counterparty, and therefore, it does not pose credit risk. The Corporation minimizes the credit risk in derivative instruments by entering into transactions with high quality counterparties.

Market risk is the adverse effect on the value of a financial instrument that results from a change in interest rates. The market risk associated with interest rate contracts is managed by establishing and monitoring parameters that limit the types and degree of market risk that may be undertaken.

(b) Risk Management Policies:

The Corporation assesses interest rate risk by continually identifying and monitoring changes in interest rate exposures that may adversely impact expected future cash flows and by evaluating hedging opportunities. The Corporation maintains risk management control systems to monitor interest rate risk attributable to both the Corporation's outstanding or forecasted debt obligations, as well as the Corporation's offsetting hedge positions. The risk management control system involves the use of analytical techniques, including cash flow sensitivity analysis, to estimate the expected impact of changes in interest rates on the Corporation's future cash flows.

The Corporation does not use derivative instruments for speculative investment purposes.

(c) Transactions:

MHC has entered into three interest rate swap agreements to manage the overall variability in interest rates.

One swap agreement is for a notional amount of \$88,000,000. Under the terms of the agreement, MHC pays the counterparty a fixed rate of 3.355 percent and receives in exchange 65 percent of LIBOR plus 0.12 percent.

The second swap agreement is for a notional amount of \$75,000,000. Under the terms of the agreement, MHC pays the counterparty a fixed rate of 3.64 percent and receives in exchange 65 percent of LIBOR plus 0.12 percent.

The third swap agreement is for a notional amount of \$225,000,000. Under the terms of the agreement, MHC pays the counterparty a rate equal to the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association index rate and receives in exchange 61.3 percent of LIBOR plus 0.776 percent.

These swap agreements are recorded on the consolidated balance sheet at their fair value. Changes in the fair value of the swap agreements are reported as a component of excess of revenue over expenses, as well as any settlements on the interest rate swaps. There were no settlements in 2011 or 2010.

The Corporation's interest rate swap liability at September 30, 2011 and 2010 was \$46,186,000 and \$38,339,000, respectively. For the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, the amounts of loss recognized in the consolidated statement of operations attributable to derivative instruments as changes in fair market value of interest rate swap agreements were \$7,847,000 and \$12,788,000, respectively.

Under the terms of the ISDA master agreement, the Corporation is required to maintain collateral posted with the counterparty to secure a portion of the estimated value of the derivative instruments when said instruments are valued in favor of the counterparty, as periodically determined by the counterparty. Collateral must be posted when the applicable aggregate derivative values exceed \$25,000,000 in favor of the counterparty. The Corporation was required to post collateral of \$13,150,000 and \$16,172,000 at September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Corporation's accounting policy is not to offset collateral amounts against fair value amounts recognized for derivative instrument obligations. Accordingly, the posted collateral is included in cash and cash equivalents in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

In December 2011, the Corporation entered into novation agreements related to two of the three swap agreements. Under the novation agreement, the existing counterparty has transfered the swap agreement to two separate counterparties. The terms of the swap agreements are not changed as part of the novation, other than threshold for required collateral posting. Each of the three swaps will have a separate collateral threshold, as opposed to the aggregate collateral threshold that exists as of September 30, 2011.

Note 9 - Notes Payable

MHC negotiated, on behalf of the Corporation, a revolving line of credit agreement, secured by gross revenue of the Credit Group, with a bank in the amount of \$80,000,000, at an interest rate based on the eurodollar rate plus 0.5 percent at the time of borrowing (an effective rate of 1.25 percent and 1.40 percent at September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively).

There was \$26,265,000 and \$11,025,000 outstanding on the line of credit as of September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Note 13 - Pension and Other Postretirement Benefit Plans

MRMC, MHC, MHP, MHG, and MMG participate in a single defined benefit pension plan. BRMC, IRMC, LRMC, POHRMC, and MCRMC have separate noncontributory defined benefit pension plans covering substantially all of their employees. The Corporation intends to annually contribute amounts deemed necessary, if any, to maintain the plan on a sound actuarial basis.

The various defined benefit pension plans have taken steps to freeze accrual of future benefits or participation in the plans by new hires.

Substantially all employees of the Corporation also participate in defined contribution pension plans that provide benefits to eligible participants as determined according to the provisions of the plan agreements.

MHC, MRMC, IRMC, MCRMC, and BRMC also sponsor defined benefit postretirement plans that provide postretirement medical benefits summarized as follows:

MHC and MRMC - The plan includes substantially all employees who have a minimum of 10 years of service after the age of 45. Employees who elect for early retirement can purchase benefits at the group rate through the plan. MHC and MRMC currently fund the cost of these benefits as they are incurred. The retiree healthcare plan requires participant contributions and deductibles.

IRMC - The plan allows retirees to purchase health insurance coverage at group rates through IRMC. Individuals who retired before December 31, 1993 also receive a maximum monthly contribution for the purchase of health insurance coverage. Individuals who retire after January 1, 1994 and have attained the age of 65 do not receive postretirement medical benefits under this plan. IRMC does not prefund the plan and has the right to modify or terminate the plan in the future.

BRMC - The plan provides certain health care and prescription drugs for employees who retired prior to October 1994. BRMC funds the cost of these benefits as they are incurred.

MCRMC - The plan provides medical savings account plan benefits to substantially all employees who are subject to the collective bargaining units.

The overall expected rate of return on plan assets represents a weighted average composite rate based on the historical rates of returns of the respective asset classes adjusted for anticipated market movements. The Corporation's investment strategy is of a long-term nature and is intended to ensure that funds are available to pay benefits as they become due and to maximize the trust's total return at an appropriate level of investment risk.

Note 14 - Professional and Other Liability Insurance

The Corporation's professional malpractice liability coverage is provided by a multiprovider offshore captive insurance company (MICOL) on a retrospectively rated claims-made policy to MRMC, IRMC, LRMC, BRMC, MCRMC, POHRMC, CMCH, MHG, and MMG. MICOL covers claims occurring and reported after March 31, 2004 for MRMC, LRMC, IRMC, and MMG, as well as claims occurring after 1979 but not reported as of April 1, 2003 for IRMC. CMCH began participating in MICOL on January 1, 2011.

MICOL has purchased commercial excess insurance coverage for claims exceeding specified amounts.

The Corporation records an estimate of the present value of the ultimate settlement cost of settling and defending professional liability claims based on projections from a consulting actuary. The estimate of losses is based on the covered entities' own past experience along with industry experience. This estimate includes a reserve for known claims and unreported incidents. A discount rate of 5 percent was used in determining the present value of the claims. Claims expected to be settled within one year and the related assets are recorded as a current liability and current asset, respectively, in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

Note 14 - Professional and Other Liability Insurance (Continued)

For professional liability claims occurring prior to April I, 2003, MRMC, IRMC, MMG, and LRMC maintained a program of self-insurance for professional and other liability claims. Revocable trusts are maintained with local banks as trustees to maintain funds for payment of any future settlements. MRMC, IRMC, MMG, and LRMC make necessary contributions to the trust funds, as determined by an independent actuary, to adequately provide for asserted or expected claims. The assets of the trust are included in the consolidated balance sheet with assets limited as to use (see Note 6).

Prior to July 1, 2006, MCRMC participated in a separate multiprovider offshore captive insurance company. MCRMC terminated its participation in this company effective July 1, 2006 and obtained insurance coverage through MICOL. MICOL covers claims reported after July 1, 2006. MCRMC continues to be responsible for retrospective premiums which may be assessed by the former insurer.

Prior to July I, 2008, POHRMC participated in a separate multiprovider offshore captive insurance company. POHRMC terminated its participation in this company effective July I, 2008 and obtained insurance coverage through MICOL. MICOL covers claims reported after July I, 2008. POHRMC continues to be responsible for retrospective premiums which may be assessed by the former insurer.

Prior to January I, 2011, CMCH was insured against potential professional liability claims under a claims-made policy, whereby only the claims reported to the insurance carrier during the policy period are covered regardless of when the incident giving rise to the claim occurred. MICOL covers claims reported after January I, 2011.

Note 15 - Investment in Anthelio Healthcare Solutions, Inc.

The Corporation had an investment in PHNS, Inc., along with other healthcare providers and investors. PHNS provided outsourced information technology services, system support, and other services such as transcription and communications to healthcare providers, including the Corporation and its subsidiaries. In connection with the original investment in 2000, the Corporation transferred information technology equipment and infrastructure having a net book value of approximately \$48,600,000 and cash in the amount of \$700,000 in exchange for common and preferred stock in PHNS. The stock received was recorded at the net book value of assets transferred.

The Corporation had 3.3 million shares of Class B common stock. The investment in common stock of PHNS is included in other assets (see Note 6) at a basis of approximately \$22,000,000 as of September 30, 2010.

In October 2010, PHNS entered into a transaction agreement with ConJoin Global (ConJoin), in which ConJoin acquired all shares of PHNS. The existing stockholders of PHNS at the time of the transaction received a combination of cash consideration and shares of ConJoin stock. In exchange for its shares, the Corporation received approximately \$13,500,000 at the time of the transaction and subsequently received \$1,500,000 that was initially held in escrow. The Corporation anticipates receiving an additional \$3,600,000 that is still being held in escrow. In addition, the Corporation received 8.8 million shares of ConJoin.

Conjoin subsequently changed its name to Anthelio Healthcare Solutions, Inc. (Anthelio).

The Corporation is currently negotiating a five-year contract extension with Anthelio as part of the transaction agreement. As part of the transaction and extension agreement, the Corporation received an additional 30 million shares of ConJoin stock. The investment in common stock of Anthelio is included in other assets at a basis of \$38,104,000, which approximates the value of the stock at the time of the transaction. A deferred liability has been recorded corresponding to the value of the shares received in the contract extension. The deferral will be recognized as a reduction to purchased services over the contract period.

During the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, the Corporation and its subsidiaries purchased services from Anthelio of approximately \$90,213,000 and \$83,655,000, respectively.

Fair Value of Interest Rate Swap - The fair value of the interest rate swap is based on a mark-to-market calculation of the notional amount of the interest rate swap.

Long-term Debt - The fair value of bonds is estimated based on current traded value. The fair value of remaining debt is estimated using discounted cash flow analysis, based on current investment borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements.

Note 18 - Subsequent Event

In July 2011, the Corporation entered into a letter of intent with Northern Michigan Regional Health System (NMRHS), pursuant to which MHC would become the sole member of NMRHS.

NMRHS is a healthcare system comprised of 12 affiliates, located in Petoskey, Michigan. The most significant affiliate is Northern Michigan Regional Hospital, a 202-bed acute care hospital.

NMRHS has total assets of approximately \$165,000,000 and annual revenue of approximately \$230,000,000.

Subsequent to September 30, 2011, the board of directors of the Corporation has approved moving forward with the transaction, pending approval by Northern Michigan Regional Health System's board. Upon approval, the Corporation will become the sole member of Northern Michigan Regional Health System effective January 1, 2012.
