The Entity

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Community Health Network, Inc. (the "Corporation"), Community Medical Center of Green Lake, LLC (CMC), Community Health Network Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") (for 2010 and 2009), and Heartland Ventures, Inc. (dissolved in fiscal 2010), a wholly owned subsidiary, collectively referred to as the Organization.

The Corporation is a nonprofit, nonstock corporation, providing services to residents of Berlin, Wisconsin, and the surrounding area. The Corporation consists of the following divisions:

- Berlin Memorial Hospital - A 25-bed acute care facility that provides comprehensive inpatient, outpatient, emergency, and medical services
- Long-Term Care Services - Juliette Manor, a 70-bed extended care facility, and Juliette Terrace, a 4-unit elderly rental complex
- CHN Home Care - A home health agency
- CHN Rehabilitation Services - Provides inpatient and outpatient therapy, occupational health, and cardiac rehabilitation services
- CHN Medical Group - Medical clinics located in Princeton, Plainfield, Markesan, Montello, Wautoma, Wild Rose, Ripon, Redgranite, and Berlin, Wisconsin
- CHN Pharmacy - Provides retail pharmacy services to residents of Wautoma and the surrounding area

Effective November 5, 2009, the Corporation became the sole corporate member of CMC. CMC is a limited liability corporation that operates a clinic in Green Lake, Wisconsin.

The Entity (Continued)

The Foundation receives, raises, and administers funds in the form of gifts and bequests for the benefit of the community and families with special health care needs. Partners Health System, Inc. (PHS) became the sole corporate member of the Foundation during fiscal year 2011 and changed the Foundation's name to Partners Health System Foundation, Inc. ("PHS Foundation"). See Note 20 for further discussion.

Heartland Ventures, Inc. was dissolved during 2010, and all assets and liabilities were transferred to the Corporation.

All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in preparing the consolidated financial statements.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization follows accounting standards contained in the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC). The ASC is the single source of authoritative accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) to be applied to nongovernmental entities in the preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP.

Use of Estimates in Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of the accompanying consolidated financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that directly affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Estimates may also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents excluding amounts whose use is limited or restricted.

Patient Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy

Patient accounts receivable are uncollateralized patient obligations that are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. These obligations are primarily from local residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. The Organization bills third-party payors on the patients' behalf, or if a patient is uninsured, the patient is billed directly. Once claims are settled with the primary payor, any secondary insurance is billed, and patients are billed for copay and deductible amounts that are the patients' responsibility. Payments on patient accounts receivable are applied to the specific claim identified on the remittance advice or statement. The Organization has a policy to charge interest on past due accounts in accordance with a written patient agreement

The carrying amounts of patient accounts receivable are reduced by allowances that reflect management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected.

Management provides for contractual adjustments under terms of third-party reimbursement agreements through a reduction of gross revenue and a credit to patient accounts receivable. In addition, management provides for probable uncollectible amounts, primarily from uninsured patients and amounts patients are personally responsible for, through a charge to operations and a credit to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of historical collection likelihood and the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to patient accounts receivable.

Patient accounts receivable are recorded in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets net of contractual adjustments and an allowance for doubtful accounts.

Inventories

Inventories of supplies are valued at the lower of cost, determined on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method, or market.

Interest in Partners Health System Foundation, Inc.

Interest in PHS Foundation represents the Corporation's rights to the assets held by a recipient organization and is adjusted for its share of the change in net assets of the recipient organization in accordance with the provisions of ASC Topic 958, *Transfers of Assets to a Not-for-Profit Organization or Charitable Trust That Raises or Holds Contributions for Others*.

Investments and Investment Income

Investments are measured at fair value on the consolidated balance sheets. Investments in limited liability partnerships are reported using the equity method of accounting.

Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is reported as investment income and is included in the excess of revenue over expenses (operating indicator) unless the income is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the operating indicator unless the investments are trading securities. Realized gains or losses are determined by specific identification.

The Organization monitors the difference between the cost and fair value of its investments. A decline in market value of an individual investment security below cost that is deemed to be other than temporary results in an impairment, and the Organization reduces the investment's carrying value to fair value. A new cost basis is established for the investment, and any impairment loss is recorded as a realized loss in investment income.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under deferred compensation agreements and bond indentures, assets held under unemployment compensation funding arrangement, and designated assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes.

Fair Value Measurements

The Organization measures fair value of its financial instruments using a three-tier hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets.
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability.
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Unamortized Debt Issue Costs

Bond issue costs related to issuance of long-term debt are being amortized over the life of the related debt using the straight-line method and are included in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Intangibles

Intangibles acquired during business acquisitions are amortized on a straight-line basis over five years.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost or, if donated, at fair value at date of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives range from 8 to 25 years for land improvements, 20 to 40 years for buildings and building equipment, and 3 to 20 years for equipment and vehicles. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from the operating indicator, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Asset Retirement Obligations

ASC Topic 410-20, *Asset Retirement Obligations*, clarifies when an entity is required to recognize a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation. The Organization has considered the requirement to recognize a liability for conditional asset retirement obligations, such as asbestos removal, on its existing properties. The Organization believes there is an indeterminate settlement date for the asset retirement obligations because the range of time over which the Organization may settle the obligation is unknown and cannot be estimated. As a result, the Organization cannot reasonably estimate the liability related to these asset retirement activities as of September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009.

Impairment

The Organization reviews its property, equipment, and intangible assets periodically to determine potential impairment. If an impairment exists, an impairment loss is recognized. Management has determined no assets were impaired at September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009.

Investment (Loss) in Unconsolidated Affiliate

Investment (loss) in unconsolidated affiliate is accounted for using the equity method through November 5, 2009. Effective November 5, 2009, the affiliate's operations are included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Net Assets

Unrestricted net assets consist of investments and otherwise unrestricted amounts that are available for use in carrying out the Organization's mission and include those expendable resources which have been designated for special use by the Board of Directors. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets are those restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity.

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations and consolidated statements of changes in net assets include the classification excess of revenue over expenses, which is considered the operating indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from the operating indicator include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfer of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restrictions were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.

Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Organization are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is deemed to be unconditional. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and consolidated statements of changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Charity Care

The Corporation provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Corporation does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, such amounts are not reported as revenue.

Advertising Costs

The Organization expenses advertising costs as incurred.

Unemployment Compensation

The Organization has elected reimbursement financing under provisions of the Wisconsin unemployment compensation laws. Unemployment compensation expense is charged to operating expense when paid or when the amount of the claims can be estimated. The Organization sets aside investments to meet state funding requirements. These amounts are included in assets limited as to use.

Income Taxes

The Corporation and the Foundation are tax-exempt corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. The Corporation and the Foundation are also exempt from state income taxes on related income.

CMC is a limited liability corporation. Any income or loss is required to be reported on the Corporation's tax returns. The Corporation pays tax on certain activities considered taxable in accordance with code regulations.

Heartland Ventures, Inc. is a taxable corporation. Any income tax provision, if required, is not considered material to the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Income Taxes (Continued)

In order to account for any uncertain tax positions, the Organization determines whether it is more likely than not that a tax position will be sustained upon examination of the technical merits of the position, assuming the taxing authority has full knowledge of all information. If the tax position does not meet the more-likely-than-not recognition threshold, the benefit of that position is not recognized in the consolidated financial statements. The Organization recorded no assets or liabilities related to uncertain tax positions or unrecognized tax benefits in 2011, 2010, or 2009.

The Organization is also engaged, to a limited extent, in activities which the Internal Revenue Service considers unrelated to the Organization's exempt purpose and, therefore, taxable. These activities, however, annually result in net operating losses for income tax purposes. The Organization does not presently anticipate that a tax benefit from these net operating losses will be realized in the future. Accordingly, any potential deferred tax asset resulting from the availability of net operating loss carryforwards is offset by a valuation allowance of equal amount. No deferred tax assets and liabilities have been recognized since no other differences exist between the financial and tax bases of reporting the Organization's assets and liabilities.

The Organization's policy is to recognize interest and any penalties related to income tax matters in income tax expense when incurred. As of and for the years ended September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, there was no income tax expense, tax penalties, or interest related to tax penalties recorded by the Organization in the consolidated financial statements.

Federal income tax returns for the year ended September 30, 2008, and beyond remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service.

Real Estate Taxes

The majority of real estate owned by the Organization is exempt from real estate taxes by the state of Wisconsin and its political subdivisions.

New Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2011-07, *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities*. This ASU amends ASC Topic 954 and requires health care entities to change the presentation of their statements of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue. Entities are also required to enhance disclosures about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. In addition, this guidance requires disclosure of qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The guidance in this ASU is effective for the Organization's year ending September 30, 2013, with early adoption permitted.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU No. 2010-23, *Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure*. This ASU amends ASC Topic 954 and requires entities to use cost as the measurement basis for charity care disclosures, including both direct and indirect costs. Entities are also required to disclose the method used to determine these costs, such as directly from a costing system or through an estimation process. The guidance in this ASU is effective for the Organization's year ending September 30, 2012.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through November 23, 2011, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2

Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors

The Corporation and CMC have agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement to the Corporation at amounts that vary from its established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows:

- *Berlin Memorial Hospital - Medicaid Reimbursable Costs*

Through September 30, 2011, Berlin Memorial Hospital was reimbursed for cost-based Medicaid services at tentative rates received during the year. The final settlement of reimbursable amounts was retrospectively determined by the state of Wisconsin (the "State"), using cost reports that are filed annually and subsequently audited by the Medicare program (in conjunction with its audits of both Medicare and Medicaid reimbursable amounts).

Since the inception of the Medicare and Medicaid critical access hospital (CAH) programs, the State has completed relatively few hospital Medicaid settlements with CAHs. Berlin Memorial Hospital was designated a CAH as of December 2005 and the respective reimbursable hospital cost settlements for all subsequent periods through September 30, 2011, remain unresolved by the State.

Furthermore, the Organization is uncertain as to when these settlements may be resolved by the State.

- *Berlin Memorial Hospital - Other*

The Corporation has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Corporation under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

- *Juliette Manor - Medicare*

Reimbursement for Part A residents under the Medicare program is based on a prospectively based case mix system. Medicare reimbursement for outpatient rehabilitation services is based on the lesser of actual charges or the Medicare fee schedule amounts.

Note 2

- *Juliette Manor - Medicaid*

Reimbursement for services rendered to Medicaid recipients is based on a predetermined rate formula under a contractual arrangement with the Medicaid program under Title XIX of the Social Security Act. Rate adjustments under this program are reflected in income when determinable.

- *CHN Home Care - Medicare and Medicaid*

Reimbursement under the home health Medicare program is based on a prospectively based case mix system by home health resource utilization category. Services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed based on prospectively determined rates by type of visit.

- *CHN Medical Group and CMC*

Reimbursement for services rendered is based on charges, discounted charges, or in the case of governmental programs, prospectively determined reimbursement rates.

Wisconsin Hospital Assessments

During fiscal year 2010, the State passed a law under which eligible CAHs, including the Organization, will be required to pay the State an annual assessment. The assessment period will be the State's fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. The assessment is based on each hospital's gross inpatient revenue, as defined, and was effective July 1, 2010. The revenue generated from the assessment is to be used, in part, to increase overall reimbursement under Wisconsin's Medicaid program through the development of an access payment system. Under the new CAH payment system, Wisconsin's Medicaid program will pay a hospital-specific amount per discharge for inpatient and outpatient services, based on prior hospital cost reports, plus an additional access payment. In exchange for receiving these access payments, effective July 1, 2010, the State eliminated retrospective cost report settlements to CAHs.

Accounting for Contractual Arrangements

The Corporation is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at an interim rate, and final settlements are determined after an audit of the Corporation's related annual cost reports by the respective Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediaries. Estimated provisions to approximate the full expected settlements after review by the intermediaries are included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The Corporation's cost reports have been audited by the Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediaries through September 30, 2008 and September 30, 2005, respectively.

Compliance

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations, particularly those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenue from patients' services. Management believes the Organization is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) uses recovery audit contractors (RACs) as part of CMS's further efforts to ensure accurate payments. CMS uses RACs to search for potentially inaccurate Medicare payments that may have been made to health care providers and not detected through existing CMS program integrity efforts. Once a RAC identifies a claim it believes is inaccurate, CMS makes a deduction from or addition to the provider's Medicare reimbursement in an amount estimated to equal the overpayment or underpayment. RAC reviews of the Organization's activities are anticipated, however, the outcome of such potential reviews is unknown and cannot be reasonably estimated as of September 30, 2011.

Community Benefit and Charity Care

In pursuit of its primary exempt purpose of providing health care services, the Corporation provides medical care and other financial support through various programs that are designed, among other matters, to enhance the health of the community.

The Corporation actively provided or participated in the following community-based activities and programs:

- General health education services, such as health fairs, cancer education, heart disease education, diabetes education, family, parent, and sibling education, family planning, and women's health education
- Provided health information on the Corporation's website and through health-related publications distributed at no charge
- Support groups such as diabetes, cancer, and bereavement
- Self-help and wellness programs such as nutrition, weight management, and fitness
- Blood pressure screenings, cholesterol testing, and school-based testing
- Guidance, referral, and enrollment assistance for public medical programs and other family support assistance
- Discounted or free medical supplies and equipment to those unable to pay
- Delivered hot in-home meals
- Promoted participation in blood drives by employees
- Contributed to the education of student nurses and other health care professionals
- Provided first aid for community events
- Participated in work site health education programs
- Made cash contributions to support community events
- Provided meeting rooms to community groups at no charge

Consistent with the Corporation's mission, care is provided to patients regardless of their ability to pay, including providing services to those persons who cannot afford health insurance because of inadequate resources or those who are underinsured. The Corporation gives discounts from established charges to self-pay patients without regard to ability to pay and considers these discounts a part of its community benefit. Health care services to patients under government programs, such as Medicaid, are also considered part of the Corporation's benefit provided to the community since a substantial portion of such services are reimbursed at amounts less than the cost of providing care. Patients who meet criteria for charity care, generally based on federal poverty guidelines, are provided care without charge or at a reduced rate. Eligibility for charity care is determined based on qualifying criteria as defined in the Corporation's charity care policy and from applications completed by patients and their families.

The amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under the Corporation's charity care policy aggregated approximately \$2,691,000 in 2011, \$2,095,000 in 2010, and \$1,821,000 in 2009.

Management assesses individual investment securities as to whether declines in market value are other than temporary and result in impairment. For equity securities, the Organization considers whether it has the ability and intent to hold the investment until a market price recovery. Evidence considered in this includes the reasons for the impairment, the severity and duration of the impairment, changes in value subsequent to year-end, the issuer's financial condition, and the general market condition in the geographic area or industry the investee operates in. For debt securities, if the Organization has made a decision to sell the security, or if it is more likely than not the Organization will sell the security before the recovery of the security's cost basis, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred. If the Organization has not made a decision or does not have an intent to sell the debt security, but the debt security is not expected to recover its value due to a credit loss, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred.

Because the Organization has the intent and the ability to hold investment securities until a market price recovery or maturity, investment securities at September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, are not temporarily impaired. No impairment losses were recognized by the Organization during 2011, 2010, and 2009.

At September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, net unrealized gains (losses) on investments other than trading securities totaled (\$108,475), \$214,269, and \$88,565, respectively.

Fair Value Measurements

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

- Quoted market prices are used to determine the fair value of investments in publicly traded equity securities. Money markets, U.S. Treasury obligations, and corporate bonds are valued using quotes from pricing vendors based on recent trading activity and other observable market data.
- Fair value of hedge funds is determined by Level 3 inputs consisting of unobservable data points of the asset and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the asset.

Note 9 **Investment (Loss) in Unconsolidated Affiliate**

The Corporation and Ripon Medical Center, Inc. owned equally through November 5, 2009 (see Note 10) as a joint endeavor, Community Medical Center of Green Lake, LLC (CMC), a limited liability company. Prior to the termination, the Corporation's loss in the joint endeavor totaled \$507,247 as of September 30, 2009.

Note 10 **Business Acquisition**

As stated in Note 9, the joint endeavor between the Corporation and Ripon Medical Center, Inc. was terminated on November 5, 2009. The joint endeavor termination agreement provided the Corporation would become the sole corporate member of CMC. Effective with the termination date, the Corporation has recognized the operations of CMC as a wholly owned subsidiary. Since November 5, 2009, CMC is reflected as a separate entity in the consolidated financial statements.

The acquisition was accounted for using the purchase method of accounting, and therefore operating results for CMC have been included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements from the date of acquisition.

These amounts are amortized based upon the terms of the employment agreements. Should employment be terminated, any unamortized balance is required to be paid by the physician. The Corporation considers these amounts to be fully collectible, accordingly, no allowance for uncollectible advances was included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The total amount of accounts receivable from physicians was \$222,992, \$274,819, and \$152,054 at September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, respectively.

Based on the borrowing rates currently available to the Corporation for long-term debt with similar terms and maturities, the estimated fair value of the bonds at September 30, 2011, approximates carrying value.

In August 2004, the Wisconsin Health and Educational Facilities Authority Fixed Rate Revenue Bonds, Series 2004A, and Variable Rate Demand Bonds, Series 2004B, were issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$10,060,000 and \$5,000,000, respectively. The bonds are secured by any funds or property held by the trustee on behalf of the Corporation and a security interest in substantially all revenue, accounts receivable, and real and personal properties owned by the Corporation. The bond agreements contain various covenants and restrictions including the requirement that the Corporation maintains certain financial ratios. Management believes the Corporation is in compliance with all covenants and restrictions. Proceeds from the bond issues were used to satisfy the debt related to the hospital mortgage revenue bonds, Series 1996, and finance costs relating to the acquisition, construction, improvement, and equipping of the Corporation's health care facilities, as well as payment of various costs relating to the issuance and sale of the bonds.

The Series 2004B Bonds are secured by an irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit totaling \$4,482,576. The letter of credit terminates May 15, 2012.

The Series 2004B Bonds can be tendered by the bondholders on a daily basis. The Corporation has a remarketing agreement with an underwriter that provides for a "best efforts" to solicit offers to purchase bonds tendered. Under the terms of the aforementioned letter of credit, the bond trustee may draw on the letter of credit to purchase any tendered revenue bonds that are not remarketed. Any amounts drawn on the letter of credit are due immediately, and if not paid immediately, shall bear interest.

During 2009, conditions in the bond market declined significantly. As a result, holders of \$4,440,000 of the Series 2004B Bonds exercised their option to sell the Series 2004B Bonds back to the letter of credit provider. The Hospital purchased \$1,440,000 of the total \$4,440,000. The 2009 long-term debt amount was reduced by \$1,440,000 for the portion of the bonds held by the Corporation. The entire amount of \$4,440,000 was remarketed during 2010.

Note 17 **Retirement Plan**

The Corporation sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all of its employees. The Corporation matches each participant's contribution from 3% to 5% of covered earnings based on years of service. Total retirement expense for the years ended September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, was approximately \$822,000, \$789,000, and \$743,000, respectively.

Note 18 **Malpractice Insurance**

The Organization's professional liability insurance for claim losses of less than \$1 million per claim and \$3 million per year covers professional liability claims reported during a policy year ("claims made" coverage). The professional liability policies related to hospital and physician services are renewable annually and have been renewed by the insurance carrier for the annual period extending through January 1, 2012. Coverage against losses in excess of these amounts is maintained through mandatory participation in the Patients' Compensation Fund of the state of Wisconsin.

Under a claims-made policy, the risk for claims and incidents not asserted within the policy period remains with the Organization. Although the possibility exists of claims arising from services provided to patients through September 30, 2011, which have not yet been asserted, the Organization is unable to determine the ultimate cost, if any, of such possible claims, and accordingly, no provision has been made for them.

Note 19 **Health Insurance**

The Organization's health insurance coverage is provided through a sponsored self-funded health insurance plan. The plan covers the Organization's benefit-eligible employees and their dependents. The health insurance expense is based upon actual claims paid, premiums incurred, administration fees, and provisions for unpaid and unreported claims at year-end. Health insurance expense was approximately \$4,578,000, \$4,285,000, and \$3,740,000 for the years ended September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, respectively. A provision for unpaid and unreported claims of approximately \$477,000, \$1,003,000, and \$722,000 at September 30, 2011, 2010, and 2009, respectively, was included in other liabilities.

Note 20 **Related-Party Transactions**

Effective August 19, 2009, the Corporation and Wild Rose Community Memorial Hospital, Inc. (WRCMH) (a nonprofit corporation) entered into an agreement to organize an integrated health care system, consisting of the Corporation, WRCMH, and Partners Health System, Inc., a new nonstock, nonprofit corporation (collectively referred to as the "System"). Through the formation of PHS, the System will work toward achieving greater economic, clinical, and strategic integration. PHS does not exercise control over the Corporation, thus no change in accounting structure is necessary.

The Corporation provided management and general services totaling \$93,315 for the year ended September 30, 2011.

Prior to October 1, 2009, the Corporation had an agreement with WRCMH to provide management services, physician services, and anesthesia coverage. In addition to having two common board members, the Corporation provided daily management services to WRCMH and was therefore considered a related party through its ability to influence the management and operating policies of WRCMH.

Subsequent to October 1, 2009, the Corporation provided physician services, anesthesia coverage, and other services to WRCMH. Through the Corporation's relationship with PHS, WRCMH is considered a related party.

The note requires WRCMH to pay monthly interest payments until September 30, 2014, at which time WRCMH will be required to make monthly principal and interest payments to the Corporation for a term of 300 months. The note bears interest at a rate of 5% per year. The Corporation has set up a reserve for potential nonpayment of the note receivable in the amount of \$1,963,582 and \$1,683,582 as of September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Effective December 1, 2010, PHS became the sole corporate member of PHS Foundation. To represent the Corporation's beneficial interest in PHS Foundation, the Corporation has recorded its interest in Partners Health System Foundation, Inc. at September 30, 2011, in the accompany consolidated balance sheets. Prior to this change, the activity and net assets of PHS Foundation were consolidated into the Corporation's financial statements. Due to immateriality, management chose to not consolidate the two months of activity before the change in corporate membership. The cumulative net loss, including unrealized loss on investments for the two-month period ended November 30, 2010, totaled approximately \$16,500.

The Corporation also provided management and general services totaling \$62,707 for the year ended September 30, 2011, to PHS Foundation.

Note 21 **Concentration of Credit Risk**

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Organization to credit risk consist principally of cash deposits in excess of insured limits, accounts receivable, and investments which are uninsured.

The Organization maintains depository relationships with area financial institutions insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). On November 9, 2010, the FDIC issued a final rule implementing Section 343 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act that provides for unlimited insurance coverage of non-interest-bearing transaction accounts through December 31, 2012. The Organization maintains cash in interest-bearing accounts at these institutions that are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000. At September 30, 2011, the Organization exceeded FDIC-insured limits by approximately \$10,940,000. In addition, other investments held by financial institutions are uninsured. However, the Organization has received collateral from these financial institutions of approximately \$6,600,000, which management believes minimizes the credit risk.
