### Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### **Nature of Operations**

White River Health System, Inc and subsidiaries (the System) is a multidimensional provider of healthcare services. White River Health System, Inc. offers health care services primarily to residents of North Central Arkansas. The not-for-profit organization operates two hospitals, White River Medical Center which is an acute care hospital providing inpatient, outpatient and emergency care to the residents of Independence County and surrounding areas and Stone County Medical Center which is a Critical Access Hospital providing inpatient, outpatient and emergency care services for residents of Stone County and surrounding areas. The System also includes outpatient facilities, primary care and specialty physician offices, long-term care facilities for the elderly and those unable to live independently, medical office buildings, and White River Health System Foundation, Inc., which provides support for furthering the purpose and promoting the activities of the System. The significant accounting policies used by the System in preparing and presenting the consolidated financial statements follow:

#### **Principles of Consolidation**

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the System and its controlled subsidiaries. All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses as well as disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Significant items subject to such estimates and assumption include the allowances for uncollectible accounts and contractual adjustments, reserves for professional and general liability claims, reserves for workers' compensation claims, reserves for employee healthcare claims, and estimated third-party payor settlements. In addition, laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates related to these programs could change by a material amount in the near term.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments purchased with original maturities of three months or less, excluding assets whose use is limited

#### Investments and Assets Limited to Use

Investments and assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the Health System for future long-term purposes, including capital improvements and self insurance. In addition, assets limited to use include amounts held by trustees under bond indenture agreements, amounts contributed by donors with stipulated restrictions and designated assets set aside by the System's Board of Directors. Amounts required to satisfy current liabilities relating to bond obligations have been reclassified in the balance sheet at September 30, 2011 and 2010

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet based upon quoted market prices Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities

Investments in partnerships and limited liability companies are recorded using the equity method of accounting (which approximates fair value) with the related changes in value in earnings reported as other non-operating income in the accompanying consolidated financial statements

#### Supplies

Supplies, consisting primarily of medical and surgical supplies and pharmaceuticals, are stated at lower of cost (first-in-first out method) or market.

### Patient Accounts Receivable

The System reports patient accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others. The System records a provision for accounts receivable that could become uncollectible in the future by establishing an allowance to reduce the carrying value of such receivables to their estimated net realizable value.

The System estimates this allowance based on the aging of its accounts receivable and historical and expected net collections, business and economic conditions, trends in federal and state governmental and private employer health care coverage and other collection indicators. As a service to the patient, the System bills third-party payors directly and bills the patient when the patient's liability is determined. Patient accounts receivable are due in full when billed. Accounts are considered delinquent and subsequently written off as bad debts based on individual credit evaluation and specific circumstances of the account. Additions to the allowance for doubtful accounts are made by means of provision for doubtful accounts. Accounts written off as uncollectible are deducted from the allowance and subsequent recoveries are added

### Property and Equipment

The System's property and equipment acquisitions with estimated useful lives of one year and a cost of \$2,500 or more are capitalized and recorded at cost, with the exception of Stone County Medical Center, whose capitalization policy is assets with a useful life of two years or more and a cost of \$5,000. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Donations of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used, and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets, are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed into service. Contributions restricted to the purchase of property and equipment which are met within the same year as received are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Long-lived assets, such as property and equipment, are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Assets to be disposed of are separately presented in the consolidated balance sheet and reported at the lower of the carrying amount or fair value less costs to sell, and are no longer depreciated. The assets and liabilities of a disposal group classified as held for sale are presented separately in the asset and liability sections of the consolidated balance sheets.

#### Costs of Borrowing

Bond issue costs and bond premiums are amortized using the effective interest method over the term of the related bond issue. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets, net of related investment income

Interest expense on debt issued for construction projects is capitalized until the projects are placed in service. The components of interest expense, net, include the following

#### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets consist of gifts with corpus values that have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity, which include endowment funds. Temporarily restricted net assets and earnings on permanently restricted net assets, including earnings on endowment funds, are used in accordance with the donor's wishes primarily to purchase equipment and to provide other health and educational programs and services.

#### Net Patient Service Revenue

The Health System has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the System at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

### **Charity Care**

The System provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

### Contributions

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date each promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions.

#### Pledges Receivable

Pledges of financial support are recorded at fair value by the Foundation and when a donor's unconditional promise to give has sufficient definition with respect to the amount and planned timing of the donation. Pledges receivable are primarily in association with capital improvement campaigns. Conditional promises to give and intentions to give are reported at fair value at the earlier of when the contingency is met or the date the gift is received. And allowance for uncollectible pledges is recorded based on an estimated percentage of pledges that may not be collectible based on historical experience. Significant pledges that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using a risk-free interest rate applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Amortization of the discount is included in contribution revenue.

#### Estimated Professional and General Liability Costs

An annual estimated provision is accrued for the System's portion of professional and general liability claims. The provision for estimated professional and general liability claims include estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported.

#### Income Taxes

White River Health System, Inc is a tax exempt corporation and has been granted an exemption from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Health System owns certain taxable subsidiaries and engages in certain activities that are unrelated to its exempt purpose and therefore subject to income tax, such amounts are not significant to the consolidated financial statements.

Management annually reviews its tax positions and has determined that there are no material uncertain tax positions that require recognition in the consolidated financial statements

### **Excess of Revenues Over Expenses**

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers to and from affiliates for other than goods and services and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets)

### New Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") No 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities ("ASU 2011-07") to provide greater transparency regarding a health care entity's net patient revenue and the related allowance for doubtful accounts ASU 2011-07 requires certain health care entities to change the presentation of the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue by reclassifying

the provision from operating expenses to a deduction from net patient revenue and requires enhanced disclosures about net patient revenue and the policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. The adoption of ASU 2011-07 did not have any material impact on the Health System's consolidated financial statements.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU 2010-23, *Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure* (ASU 2010-23) The provisions of ASU 2010-23 are intended to reduce the diversity in how charity care is calculated and disclosed across healthcare entities that provide it Charity care is required to be measured at cost, defined as the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care. Funds received to offset or subsidize the cost of charity care provided, for example from gifts or grants restricted for charity care, should be separately disclosed. As a healthcare entity does not recognize revenue when charity care is provided, this update will only require enhanced disclosures and will have an effect on the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. This new guidance is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010, with retrospective application required and with early application permitted. The Health System will adopt this guidance in fiscal year 2012.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU No 2010-04, Health Care Entities (Topic 954), Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries ("ASU 2010-04"), which clarifies that, expected insurance recoveries for health care entities should be reported separately from the related claim liability. A cumulative-effect adjustment is to be recognized in the opening net assets in the period of adoption if a difference exists between any liabilities and insurance receivables recorded as a result of applying this new guidance. This guidance is effective for fiscal years, and interim periods within those fiscal years, beginning after December 15, 2010. Adoption of this guidance will not have a material impact on the System's financial condition or results of operation.

In January 2010, the FASB issued ASU No 2010-06, *Improving Disclosures about Fair Value Measurements* ("ASU 2010-06"), which requires new disclosures related to transfers in and out of Level 1 and Level 2 fair value measurements, including reasons for the transfers, and to require new disclosures related to activity in Level 3 fair value measurements. The System adopted the provisions of ASU 2010-06 beginning October 1, 2010 which did not have a material impact on the System's consolidated financial statements

In January 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) released Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2010-07, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958). Not-for-Profit Entities. Mergers and Acquisitions, which amends FASB Statement No 164, Not-for-Profit Entities. Mergers and Acquisitions. The objective of ASU 2010-07 is to improve the relevance, representational faithfulness, and comparability of the information that a not-for-profit entity provides in its financial reports about a combination with one or more other not-for-profit entities, businesses, or nonprofit activities. ASU 2010-07 also provides relevant and comparable information that a not-for-profit entity provides for goodwill and other intangible assets after an acquisition by amending existing guidance, to make it fully applicable to not-for-profit entities. The provisions of ASU 2010-07, which are to be applied prospectively for business combinations, were effective for October 1, 2010 and had no impact on the Health Systems financial statements

#### Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2010 financial statements to conform to the 2011 financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets.

#### Note 2 – Net Patient Service Revenue

The System has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the System at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include.

#### **Medicare**

Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification System that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors Inpatient skilled nursing services are paid at prospectively determined per diem rates that are based on the patients' acuity. Other inpatient nonacute services, certain outpatient services and defined medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a combination of fee schedules and a cost reimbursement methodology. The System is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the System and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary

Stone County Medical Center has been designated as a Critical Access Hospital As a result of the Critical Access Hospital designation, inpatient and outpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology

#### Medicaid

Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology subject to certain limitations. Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries for long-term care are reimbursed under a prospective payment methodology. Outpatient services are paid based on fee schedules. The System is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the System and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary

Outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries by Stone County Medical Center, a Critical Access Hospital, are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology

Approximately 70 3% and 64 7% of net patient service revenues are from participation in the Medicare and state-sponsored Medicaid programs for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term

The System has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the System under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

Certain investments in debt and marketable equity securities are reported in the financial statements at an amount less than their historical cost. Total fair value of these investments at September 30, 2011 and 2010, was \$2,758,888 and \$2,563,232, which is approximately 6.3% and 14.6%, respectively, of the System's investment portfolio. These declines primarily resulted from decreases in market interest rates and failure of certain investments to meet projected earnings targets

The System reviews investments each period and assesses whether an other-than-temporary impairment has occurred. Each investment within the portfolio is evaluated individually. Major factors that are considered are: 1) fair value of the investment is below cost, 2) loss has been sustained over an extended period of time, and 3) whether the System intends to sell or could be required to sell the investment security, or, if not, whether it has the ability to hold an investment for a reasonable period of time sufficient for a forecasted recovery of fair value up to or beyond the cost of the investment Additional factors that might be considered include, but are not limited to 1) credit risk of the investment, 2) decline attributable to adverse conditions specifically related to the investment, its industry, or geography, 3) investment has been downgraded by a rating agency, 4) dividends have been reduced or eliminated or scheduled interest has not been paid, 5) changes in the value of the investment after the close of the period, 6) trading in the investment has been suspended, and 7) discussion with investment advisor.

Based on evaluation of available evidence, including recent changes in market interest rates, credit rating information and information obtained from regulatory filings, management believes the declines in fair value for these securities are temporary.

Should the impairment of any of these securities become other than temporary, the cost basis of the investment will be reduced and the resulting loss recognized in net income in the period the other-than-temporary impairment is identified. #### Fair Value Measurements

The System has adopted authoritative guidance issued that provides enhanced guidance for using fair value to measure assets and liabilities, provides a common definition of fair value, and establishes a framework to make the measurement of fair value in generally accepted accounting principles more consistent and comparable among entities. The authoritative guidance also expands the required disclosures concerning the extent to which fair value is used to measure assets and liabilities, the methods and assumptions used to measure fair value, and the effect of fair value measures on changes in net assets.

This authoritative guidance establishes a three-level hierarchy for disclosure of fair value measurements. The valuation hierarchy is based on the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. The three levels are defined as follows.

- Level 1 inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in an active market
- **Level 2** inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.
- Level 3 inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement

When available the System generally uses quoted market prices to determine fair value and classifies such items as level 1. The System's level 2 securities are bonds whose fair values are determined by independent vendors, or nontraded funds whose underlying securities would otherwise be considered level 1. The System's level 3 securities are comprised of alternative investments and bonds that have less liquidity, a stale quoted price, or varying prices from independent sources.

#### Note 5 – Endowments

The Health System's endowments consist of individual donor restricted endowment funds established for a variety of purposes. Net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. The Health System considers various factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds.

The Health System employs a total return investment approach whereby a mix of equities and fixed income investments are used to maximize the long-term return of endowment funds. The Health System targets a diversified asset allocation to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints. The Health System can appropriate each year all available earnings in accordance with donor restrictions. The endowment corpus is to be maintained in perpetuity. Certain donor-restricted endowments may require a portion of annual earnings to be maintained in perpetuity along with the corpus. Only amounts exceeding the amounts required to be maintained in perpetuity are expended.

Funds with Deficiencies- Periodically the fair value of assets associated with the individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor requires the Health System to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. Deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets. These deficiencies result from unfavorable market fluctuations and/or continued appropriation for certain programs that was deemed prudent by the Health System.

Under the terms of the Series 2011, 2010, 2004, 2003 and 1999 revenue bond indentures, the System is required to maintain certain deposits with trustees. Such deposits are included with assets limited as to use. The revenue bond indentures also place limits on the incurrence of additional borrowings and require that the System satisfy certain measures of financial performance as long as the bonds are outstanding. The bonds are callable by the System at the redemption price of par, plus accrued interest thereon to the redemption date for the Series 2011, 2010, 2004, 2003 and 1999 bonds, respectively. The bonds are secured by the gross receipts of the System and bond funds held by the trustees.

The fair value of the System's long-term debt is estimated using discounted cash flow analysis based on the System's current incremental borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements. The estimated fair value of aggregate long-term debt at September 30, 2011 and 2010 was \$65,844,413 and \$32,493,612, respectively

#### Note 9 – Community Benefits

In pursing its mission, the System provides services to the financially disadvantaged and to the broader community in which it operates, despite the lack or adequacy of payment for those services. These services are categorized as follows

### Note 9 – Community Benefits (Cont.)

Charity care – The System provides a level of charity care that is consistent with the needs of the community it serves and the financial resources that are available. All or a portion of the charges incurred at established rates are classified as charity by reference to White River Health System's established policies. Essentially, these policies define charitable services as those for which no payment is anticipated. In assessing a patients' ability to pay, the System utilizes generally recognized poverty income levels for the respective community but also includes certain cases where incurred charges are considered to be beyond the patients' ability to pay. In addition, the System provides services to other indigent patients under various state and local programs which pay health care providers amounts which are less than the cost of the services provided. Because the System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, such amounts are not reported as revenue in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Charges excluded from revenue under the System's charity care policy were \$4,956,992 and \$6,195,665 for 2011 and 2010, respectively

During the year ended September 30, 2011, the System implemented a policy of discounting 59 1% of self pay patient accounts to meet the requirements of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act The total discounts made were \$18,652,340 in 2011. The effect of the change in policy resulted in a decrease in charity care write-offs for which the amount was not determinable

Other community benefits – In addition to the services the System provides to the financially disadvantaged, it provides services to the broader community. These services include educational programs, community information on health services, donations and the cost of care in excess of payments for patients under federal and state programs.

#### Note 10 – Deferred Revenue

As a result of tornado damage in early February of 2008, the Health System experienced loss due to damage of its Stone County Medical Center facility

During the year ended September 30, 2009, Stone County Medical Center acquired modular buildings to restore its operating capacity until a permanent replacement could be constructed. Under the terms of the Hospital's insurance policy, any proceeds from the disposal of the modular buildings were to be remitted to the insurance company. Accordingly, the System recorded a liability at September 30, 2009 in the amount of \$2,252,181 for this contingency. During the year ended September 30, 2010, title to the patient rooms modular buildings was released to the Medical Center as part of the final settlement agreement with the insurer. A gain of approximately \$2,936,404 was recognized, net of amounts received for business interruption and extra expenses, from insurance recoveries related to destruction of property and equipment

#### Note 13 - Self-Funded Health Insurance Costs

The System has a self-funded health insurance program for its employees. The System has purchased insurance that limits its exposure for individual claims. An estimated accrual is made for claims incurred but not submitted for payment at year end. Total expense for claims for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, was \$13,060,853 and \$12,361,894, respectively.

### Note 14 - Pension Plan

The System has a defined-contribution pension plan covering substantially all employees Contributions by employees are matched up to 4% by the System Pension expense was \$1,324,164 and \$1,256,852 for 2011 and 2010, respectively, and are included in benefit expense in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations

### Note 15 - Medical Malpractice Claims

The System purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy on a fixed premium basis. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require a health care provider to accrue the expense of its share of malpractice claim costs, if any, for any reported and unreported incidents of potential improper professional service occurring during the year by estimating the probable ultimate costs of the incidents. Based upon loss run reports from insurers, \$425,000 and \$555,000 have been accrued as of September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. It is reasonably possible that these estimates could change materially in the near term

### Note 16 – Investment in Equity Investee

On August 5, 2008 White River Health System, Inc. agreed to enter into a subscription agreement with Batesville Endoscopy Center, LLC to purchase 1500 units of Class B membership units giving the Health System 50% ownership in the joint venture. The Health System has elected to use the equity method of accounting for the investment in the joint venture. Under the equity method, the initial investment is recorded at cost then reduced by any partnership distributions and increased or decreased by the Health System's proportionate share of the Endoscopy Center's net earnings or loss. The Health System's carrying value of its investment in Batesville Endoscopy Center, LLC at September 30, 2011 and 2010 was \$45,602 and \$94,077, respectively.

On August 31, 2010 White River Health System, Inc. agreed to purchase 100 shares of stock of KN Professionals, Inc. for an initial investment of \$222,579 giving the Health System a 33% ownership in the joint venture. The Health System has elected to use the equity method of accounting for the investment in the joint venture. Under the equity method, the initial investment is recorded at cost then reduced by any partnership distributions and increased or decreased by the Health System's proportionate share of the KN Professionals, Inc.'s net earnings or loss. The Health System's carrying value of its investment in KN Professionals, Inc at September 30, 2011 and 2010 was \$255,403 and \$258,239, respectively

### Note 17 - Medicaid Inpatient/Outpatient Access Payments

The Arkansas Medicaid State Plan provides for annual calculated inpatient and outpatient access amounts to be paid by Arkansas Medicaid in quarterly increments to in-state private hospitals. This is predicated in part on the enhanced Federal Medicaid Assistance Percentage ("FMAP") contained in the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act ("ARRA"). A total annual inpatient and outpatient access payment amount is calculated and then distributed to individual eligible hospitals based on the number of each hospital's Medicaid inpatient discharges and outpatient payments as determined from the hospital's most recently audited cost report. These Medicaid supplemental payments are funded through a "Quality Assurance Fee" which is imposed on certain Arkansas hospitals. The total amount recorded as received by the Health System net of quality assurance fees paid for fiscal year ended September 30, 2011 and 2010 was \$3,589,575 and \$3,772,125, respectively

It is the System's policy that Board members abstain from voting on any matters to which they have a conflict of interest and require each Board member and department manager to disclose any conflicts annually. Amount of borrowings outstanding at respective financial institution at September 30, 2011 and 2010 totaled \$842,278 and \$1,193,904. White River Health System, Inc. agreed in writing to sell Stone County Nursing and Rehab and Stone County Residential Care Facility including the land, buildings, improvements, furniture and fixtures and equipment of the two facilities for \$4,250,000 which will yield an approximate gain of \$697,000 net of broker's commission and closing costs. The effective date of the sale is expected to occur in the System's 2012 fiscal year ended September 30.
