

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated January 23, 2012, on our consideration of the Hospital's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit

The accompanying management's discussion and analysis and pension information, as listed in the table of contents, are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it

Management's Discussion and Analysis Years Ended September 30, 2011 and 2010

Introduction

This management's discussion and analysis of the financial performance of Valley View Regional Hospital (the Hospital) provides an overview of the Hospital's financial activities for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010. It should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements of the Hospital.

Financial Highlights

- Total cash and investments increased in 2011 and 2010 by \$5,018,158 or 54 8% and \$2,208,233 or 31 8%, respectively
- Total short- and long-term debt decreased in 2011 and 2010 by \$1,106,092 or 35 6% and \$9,752,665 or 74 9%, respectively
- The Hospital's net assets increased in 2011 and 2010 by \$4,807,758 or 13 9% and \$13,344,478 or 62 8%, respectively
- The Hospital reported operating income in 2011 and 2010 of \$4,417,971 and \$4,871,981, respectively. The operating income in 2011 decreased by \$454,010 or 9 3% over the operating income reported in 2010.
- The Hospital did not receive appropriations from Valley View Hospital Authority in 2011 This represents a decrease of \$8.199,100 or 100 0% in 2011 compared to 2010

Using This Annual Report

The Hospital's financial statements consist of three statements—a balance sheet, a statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets, and a statement of cash flows. These statements provide information about the activities of the Hospital, including resources held by the Hospital but restricted for specific purposes by creditors, contributors, grantors or enabling legislation. The Hospital is accounted for as a business-type activity and presents its financial statements using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting.

The Balance Sheet and Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets

One of the most important questions asked about any hospital's finances is. "Is the hospital as a whole better or worse off as a result of the year's activities?" The balance sheet and the statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets report information about the Hospital's resources and its activities in a way that helps answer this question. These statements include all restricted and unrestricted assets and all liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting. Using the accrual basis of accounting means that all of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid

These two statements report the Hospital's net assets and changes in them The Hospital's total net assets—the difference between assets and liabilities—is one measure of the Hospital's financial health or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in the Hospital's net assets are an indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other nonfinancial factors, such as changes in the Hospital's patient base, changes in legislation and regulations, measures of the quantity and quality of services provided to its patients and local economic factors, should also be considered to assess the overall financial health of the Hospital

The Statement of Cash Flows

The statement of cash flows reports cash receipts, cash payments and net changes in cash and cash equivalents resulting from four defined types of activities. It provides answers to such questions as where did cash come from, what was cash used for and what was the change in cash and cash equivalents during the reporting period.

The Hospital's Net Assets

The Hospital's net assets are the difference between its assets and liabilities reported in the balance sheet The Hospital's net assets increased by \$4,807,758 or 13 9% in 2011 over 2010 and by \$13,344,478 or 62 8% in 2010 over 2009 as shown in Table 1

Some significant changes in the Hospital's assets and liabilities at September 30, 2011, are the increase in cash, cash equivalents and investments, the decrease in short- and long-term debt and the decrease in accounts payable as compared to September 30, 2010. The increase in cash, cash equivalents and investments by \$5,018,158 or 54.8% compared to 2010 and the decrease in both short- and long-term debt of \$1,160,092 or 35.6% were primarily due to the continued improved performance of the Hospital in 2011 over previous years. Management has used the increased operating income to build up cash and investment reserves and pay down debt and accounts payable over the past years to improve the financial stability of the Hospital.

Some significant changes in the Hospital's assets and liabilities at September 30, 2010, are the increase in cash, cash equivalents and investments, the decrease in short- and long-term debt and the decrease in accounts payable as compared to September 30, 2009. The increase in cash, cash equivalents and investments by \$2,208,233 or 31 8% compared to 2009, the decrease in both short- and long-term debt of \$9,752,665 or 74 9% and the decrease in accounts payable of \$4,329,331 or 74 0% were primarily due to the improved performance of the Hospital in 2010 over previous years. Management has used the increased operating income to build up cash and investment reserves and pay down debt over the past years to improve the financial stability of the Hospital. Additionally, long-term debt decreased in 2010 as a result of the early retirement of the note payable to Valley. View Hospital Authority (see *Note 7*)

Operating Results and Changes in the Hospital's Net Assets

In 2011, the Hospital's net assets increased by \$4,807,758 or 13 9% as shown in Table 2. This increase is made up of several different components and represents a decrease of 64 0% compared with the increase in net assets for 2010 of \$13,344,478.

Operating Income

The first component of the overall change in the Hospital's net assets is its operating income or loss—generally, the difference between net patient service and other operating revenues and the expenses incurred to perform those services. In each of the past three years, the Hospital has reported operating income

The operating income for 2011 decreased by \$454.010 or 9 3% as compared to 2010. The primary components of the decreased operating income are

- An increase in net patient service revenue of \$3,265,255 or 4 7%
- A decrease in purchased services of \$1,243,299 or 13 2%
- An increase in salaries, wages and employee benefits of \$3.803.880 or 11 8%

Net patient service revenue increased in 2011 due to an increase in patient volume and a reduction in contractual adjustments and provision for uncollectible accounts

Purchased services decreased in 2011 due to the Hospital gradually reducing its contract service agreements with several vendors and bringing the responsibility of these functions back to the Hospital

Salaries, wages and employee benefits increased in 2011 as the result of standard employee raises and the Hospital's continued emphasis on growth through physician employment

The operating income for 2010 increased by \$3.873.850 or 388 1% as compared to 2009. The primary components of the increased operating income are

- A decrease in net patient service revenue of \$423,909 or 0 6%
- A decrease in purchased services of \$2,368,294 or 20 1%
- A decrease in other operating expenses of \$1,175,835 or 5 6%

Net patient service revenue decreased in 2010 due to a slight decrease in patient volume, mainly related to the opening of the Chickasaw Nation Medical Center

Purchased services decreased in 2010 due to the Hospital gradually reducing its contract service agreements with several vendors and bringing the responsibility of these functions back to the Hospital

Other operating expenses decreased in 2010 due to lower supply costs as a result of improvements in materials management

Nonoperating Revenues and Expenses

Nonoperating revenues and expenses consist primarily of noncapital gifts and grants, investment income and interest expense. Interest expense decreased in 2011 and 2010 due to the reduction in long-term debt in those years. The Hospital recognized a decrease in noncapital gifts and grants in 2010 due to an increase in giving in 2009 in order to support the Hospital's operations.

The Hospital's Cash Flows

Changes in the Hospital's cash flows are consistent with changes in operating income and nonoperating revenues and expenses discussed earlier. In 2011, net cash provided by operating activities increased as a result of improved operations. In 2010, net cash provided by operating activities decreased primarily due to a decrease in accounts payable and accrued expenses discussed earlier.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital Assets

At the end of 2011 and 2010, the Hospital had \$17,488,821 and \$19,389,325 invested in capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, respectively, as detailed in *Note 5* to the financial statements. In 2011 and 2010, the Hospital purchased new equipment costing \$1,321,316 and \$1,581,235, respectively. Of these amounts, \$0 and \$155,866 were acquired through incursion of capital lease obligations in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Debt

At September 30, 2011, the Hospital had \$2,100,530 in capital lease obligations outstanding. Except for capital leases of \$155,866 initiated in 2010, the Hospital issued no new debt in 2011 or 2010. At September 30, 2010, the Hospital had \$3,153,306 in capital lease obligations outstanding. See *Note 7* for discussions related to the Series 1996 Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds issued for the benefit of the Hospital by Valley View Hospital Authority and the payoff of those bonds in 2010.

Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations and Reporting Entity

Valley View Regional Hospital (the Hospital) is an acute care hospital located in Ada, Oklahoma, staffed for 116 acute care and 20 rehabilitation beds. The Hospital's bylaws require the members of the Hospital's Board of Directors to be the Trustees of Valley View Hospital Authority (the Authority). The Authority is a component unit of the city of Ada, Oklahoma, and the city council approves members to the Board of Trustees. The Hospital primarily earns revenues by providing inpatient, outpatient and emergency services to patients in Ada and surrounding communities.

The Valley View Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) is a legally separate, tax-exempt component unit of the Hospital. The Foundation is organized and operated for the exclusive benefit and support of Valley View Regional Hospital.

Although the Hospital does not control the timing or amount of receipts from the Foundation, the majority of the Foundation's resources and related income are restricted for the benefit of the Hospital by the donors Because these restricted resources held by the Foundation can only be used by or for the benefit of the Hospital, the Foundation is considered a component unit of the Hospital and is presented in the Hospital's financial statements using the blended method

Valley View Management Group (VVMG) is a legally separate, for-profit entity which became operational in 2010 and primarily earns revenues by managing physician practices. The Hospital is the sole corporate member of VVMG, is considered a component unit of the Hospital and is presented in the Hospital's financial statements using the blended method.

All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated

Basis of Accounting and Presentation

The financial statements of the Hospital have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting using the economic resources measurement focus. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange transaction takes place. Operating revenues and expenses include exchange transactions and program-specific, government-mandated nonexchange transactions. Government-mandated nonexchange transactions that are not program-specific, investment income and interest expense on capital assets-related debt are included in nonoperating revenues and expenses. The Hospital first applies restricted net assets when an expense or outlay is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

The Authority is a component unit of the city of Ada. Oklahoma, and the city council approves members to the Board of Trustees—As the Hospital's bylaws require the Board of Directors of the Hospital to be the same individuals as the Authority's Trustees, the Hospital prepares its financial statements as a business-type activity in conformity with applicable pronouncements of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) in accordance with the Accounting and Auditing Guide for State and Local Governments—Pursuant to GASB Statement No. 20, the Hospital has elected to apply the provisions of all relevant pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) that were issued on or before November 30, 1989, and do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payers. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known.

Appropriations from Valley View Hospital Authority

As discussed in *Note* 7, the Authority issued the Series 1996 Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the Bonds) and loaned the proceeds to the Hospital pursuant to a loan agreement between the Hospital and the Authority. The terms of the loan agreement are identical to the terms of the Bonds. During 2010, the Authority received funds from the 1% sales tax discussed in *Note* 7 in sufficient amounts to pay the required debt service on the Bonds. Therefore, under the terms of the loan agreement, the Hospital was not required to pay the principal and interest on the loan agreement to the Authority. The principal and interest payments under the loan agreement were \$7,735,000 and \$464,100, respectively, in 2010. In 2010, these bonds were paid in full. This benefit of not paying the debt service on the loan agreement is reflected as appropriations from the Authority on the accompanying statements of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Net Assets

Net assets of the Hospital are classified in three components. Net assets invested in capital assets, net of related debt, consist of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of borrowings used to finance the purchase or construction of those assets. Restricted expendable net assets are noncapital assets that must be used for a particular purpose as specified by creditors, grantors or donors external to the Hospital, including amounts deposited with Trustees as required by bond indentures, reduced by the outstanding balances of any related borrowings. Unrestricted net assets are remaining assets less remaining liabilities that do not meet the definition of invested in capital assets, net of related debt or restricted expendable.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

Charity Care

The Hospital provides care to patients who are unable to pay for services. The amount of charity care is included in net patient service revenue and is not separately classified from the provision for uncollectible accounts.

Supplies

Supply inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market

Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition, or fair value at the date of donation if acquired by gift Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of each asset Assets under capital lease obligations and leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives. The following estimated useful lives are being used by the Hospital

Land improvements 5–20 years
Buildings and leasehold improvements 5–40 years
Equipment 5–20 years

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in U.S. Treasury, agency and instrumentality obligations with a remaining maturity of one year or less at time of acquisition and in nonnegotiable certificates of deposit are carried at amortized cost. All other investments are carried at fair value. Fair value is determined using quoted market prices.

Investment income includes dividend and interest income, realized gains and losses on investments carried at other than fair value and the net change for the year in the fair value of investments carried at fair value

Risk Management

The Hospital is exposed to various risks of loss from torts, theft of, damage to and destruction of assets, business interruption, errors and omissions, employee injuries and illnesses, natural disasters, medical malpractice, and employee health, dental and accident benefits. Commercial insurance coverage is purchased for claims arising from such matters other than employee health claims. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the three preceding years.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

The Hospital is self-insured for a portion of its exposure to risk of loss from employee health claims (see *Note 9*) Annual estimated provisions are accrued for the self-insured portion of employee health claims and include an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not yet reported

Medical Malpractice Coverage and Claims

The Hospital purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy on a fixed premium basis (see *Note 15*) Under such policy, only claims made and reported to the insurer are covered during the policy term, regardless of when the incident giving rise to the claim occurred Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require a health care provider to accrue the expense of its share of malpractice claims cost, if any, for any reported and unreported incidents of potential improper professional service occurring during the year by estimating the probable ultimate cost of the incidents. Based on the Hospital's own claims experience, an accrual of \$175,000 has been made in the accompanying balance sheets as of September 30, 2011 and 2010. However, because of the risks involved in providing health care services, it is possible that other events have occurred that may be the basis for a material future claim. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term

Patient Accounts Receivable

The Hospital reports patient accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others. The Hospital provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding receivables, historical collection information and existing economic conditions. As a service to the patient, the Hospital bills third-party payers directly and bills the patient when the patient's liability is determined. Patient accounts receivable are due in full when billed. Accounts are considered delinquent and subsequently written off as bad debts on individual credit evaluation and specific circumstances of the account.

Income Taxes

The Hospital is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the Hospital is subject to federal and state income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

Cash Equivalents

The Hospital considers all liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At September 30, 2011 and 2010, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market funds with brokers and money market mutual funds.

Effective July 21, 2010, the FDIC's insurance limits were permanently increased to \$250,000

Pursuant to legislation enacted in 2010, the FDIC will fully insure all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts beginning December 31, 2010 through December 31, 2012, at all FDIC-insured institutions

Investments in Joint Venture

The Hospital has ownership (equity) interests in a joint venture – Heartland Healthcare Reciprocal Risk Retention Group (Heartland) The investment in the joint venture is recorded using the equity method of accounting (cost plus equity in the joint venture's undistributed net income or loss since acquisition)

See Note 15 for additional information regarding the Heartland joint venture

Compensated Absences

Hospital policies permit most employees to accumulate vacation and sick leave benefits that may be realized as paid time off or, in limited circumstances, as a cash payment. Expense and the related liability are recognized as vacation benefits are earned whether the employee is expected to realize the benefit as time off or in cash. Expense and the related liability for holiday and miscellaneous paid time off benefits are recognized when earned to the extent the employee is expected to realize the benefit as time off or in cash determined using the termination payment method. Sick leave benefits expected to be realized as paid time off are recognized as expense when the time off occurs, and no liability is accrued for such benefits employees have earned but not yet realized. Compensated absence liabilities are computed using the regular pay and termination pay rates in effect at the balance sheet date plus an additional amount for compensation-related payments, such as Social Security and Medicare taxes, computed using rates in effect at that date

Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include

- Medicare Inpatient acute care services, inpatient skilled nursing services, inpatient rehabilitation services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, acuity and other factors. The Hospital is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare administrative contractor through September 30, 2009.
- Medicaid The Hospital has also been reimbursed for services rendered to patients covered by the state Medicaid program on a prospective per discharge method and fee schedules with no retroactive adjustments. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors.

Approximately 59% of net patient service revenue is from participation in the Medicare and state-sponsored Medicaid programs for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010 Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider hospitals. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

Note 3: Deposits, Investments and Investment Income

Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure a government's deposits may not be returned to it. The Hospital's deposit policy for custodial credit risk requires compliance with the provisions of state law.

State law requires collateralization of all deposits with federal depository insurance and other acceptable collateral in specific amounts. No legal opinion has been obtained regarding the enforceability of any of the collateral arrangements.

At September 30, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital's bank balances of \$5,070,945 and \$4,270,374, respectively, were exposed to custodial credit risk as follows

The Hospital's investment policy generally limits investments in debt securities to maturities of 10 years or less. The money market mutual funds are presented as an investment with a maturity of less than one year because they are redeemable in full immediately

Credit Risk – Credit risk is the risk that the issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. All of the underlying securities for the Hospital's investments in repurchase agreements at September 30, 2011 and 2010, are held by the counterparties in other than the Hospital's name. The Hospital's investment policy does not address how securities are to be held

Concentration of Credit Risk – The Hospital's investment policy limits investments in any one issuer to 10% of the total investments, excluding U S government obligations. At September 30, 2011 and 2010, none of the Hospital's investments exceeded 5%

Note Payable to the Authority - 1996

On January 1, 1996, the Authority issued the Series 1996 Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the Series 1996 Bonds) in the original amount of \$29,100,000. The Authority loaned the proceeds of the Series 1996 Bonds to the Hospital pursuant to a loan agreement between the Hospital and the Authority. The terms of the loan agreement are identical to the Series 1996 Bonds, which require payments in annual installments through August 15, 2014, with interest at 5,75% to 6,00%. The loan agreement is secured by the net revenues and accounts receivable of the Hospital in addition to all property of the Hospital and requires the Hospital to comply with certain restrictive covenants, including minimum insurance coverage, maintaining an annual debt-service coverage ratio of 1,25 to 1,00 and restrictions on incurrence of additional debt. The Series 1996 Bonds are secured by the loan agreement, the net revenues and accounts receivable of the Hospital in addition to the assets restricted under the bond indenture agreement and the proceeds of a 1% sales tax levied by the city of Ada, Oklahoma, and appropriated to the Authority

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010

In August 2010, the note payable to the Authority and the related bonds were paid in full. In connection with the payoff of the Series 1996 Bonds, the 1% sales tax levied by the city of Ada, Oklahoma, is no longer appropriated to the Authority.

Note Payable to the Authority - 2009

On March 11, 2009, the Authority issued the Valley View Hospital Authority Taxable Hospital Revenue Bonds, Series 2009 (the Series 2009 Bonds) in the original amount of \$2,300,000. The Authority loaned the proceeds of the Series 2009 Bonds to the Hospital pursuant to a loan agreement between the Hospital and the Authority. The terms of the loan agreement are identical to the Series 2009 Bonds, which require monthly interest payments at 8.0% through July 11, 2009, then monthly principal and interest payments in sufficient amounts to retire the outstanding principal amount by April 11, 2010. The loan agreement is secured by the net revenues and accounts receivable of the Hospital in addition to all property of the Hospital. The Series 2009 Bonds are secured by the loan agreement, the net revenues and accounts receivable of the Hospital. This note was paid off during the year ended September 30, 2010.

Capital Lease Obligations

The Hospital is obligated under leases for equipment that are accounted for as capital leases Assets under the capital leases at September 30, 2011 and 2010, totaled \$6,525,414, net of accumulated depreciation of \$3,753,986 and \$2,599,597, respectively

On May 10, 2007, the Hospital entered into a five-year sublease agreement for \$1,063,455 with the Authority for certain capital assets maintained by the Hospital On January 3, 2008, the Hospital entered into a five-year sublease agreement for \$2,817,773 with the Authority for additional capital assets maintained by the Hospital

Note 8: Pension Plans

Defined Benefit Plan

Plan Description

The Hospital's defined benefit pension plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the plan's Board of Trustees which is appointed by the Hospital's governing body. The plan provides retirement, disability and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The authority to establish and amend benefit provisions is vested in the Hospital's governing body. The plan issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the plan. The report may be obtained by writing to the plan at Valley View Regional Hospital. Administrative Office, 430 North Monte Vista, Ada, Oklahoma 74820.

Effective January 1, 2006, the Hospital elected to curtail the defined benefit pension plan. This election ceased the accrual of additional pension benefits under the plan by the current participants and ceased the addition of new participants to the plan.

Funding Policy

The authority to establish and amend obligations of plan members and the Hospital is vested in the Hospital's governing body. There are no required or permitted contributions by plan members. The Hospital is required to contribute an actuarially determined amount.

The annual required contribution for 2011 and 2010 was determined as part of an actuarial valuation on October 1, 2010 and 2009, respectively, using the projected unit credit actuarial cost method. The actuarial assumptions included 7.5% investment rate of return (net of administrative expenses). There are no projected salary increases in the actuarial valuation as the plan was frozen effective January 1, 2006. The actuarial value of assets was determined using techniques that smooth the effects of short-term volatility in the market value of investments over a five-year period. The unfunded actuarial accrued liability is being amortized as a level dollar amount on an open basis.

Defined Contribution Plan

Effective January 1, 2006, the Hospital began contributing to a defined contribution pension plan covering all employees who have completed one year of service and who are at least 18 years of age. The Hospital's contributions to the plan are 2% of annual compensation and an additional amount determined annually by the Board of Directors. The contribution rate for plan members, expressed as a percentage of covered payroll, was 3.3% and 2.4% for 2011 and 2010, respectively. Contributions actually made by plan members and the Hospital aggregated approximately \$629,000 and \$392,000, respectively, for the year ended September 30, 2011, and \$508,000 and \$390,000, respectively, for the year ended September 30, 2010.

Note 9: Employee Health Claims

Substantially all of the Hospital's employees and their dependents are eligible to participate in the Hospital's employee health insurance plan. The Hospital is self-insured for health claims of participating employees and dependents up to an annual individual amount of \$150,000. Commercial stop-loss insurance coverage is purchased for claims in excess of the individual and aggregate annual amount. A provision is accrued for self-insured employee health claims, including both claims reported and claims incurred but not yet reported. The accrual is estimated based on consideration of prior claims experience, recently settled claims, frequency of claims and other economic and social factors. It is reasonably possible that the Hospital's estimate will change by a material amount in the near term

Note 10: Restricted and Designated Net Assets

At September 30, 2011 and 2010, there were no restricted expendable net assets

At September 30, 2011 and 2010, approximately \$3,097,000 and \$1,628,000, respectively, of unrestricted net assets have been designated by the Hospital's Board of Directors for capital acquisitions. Designated net assets remain under the control of the Board of Directors which may, at its discretion, later use these net assets for other purposes.

Note 11: Contingencies

Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Hospital is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Hospital's commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Hospital evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of legal counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Note 12: Uncompensated Care

In support of its mission, the Hospital voluntarily provides free care to patients who lack financial resources and are deemed to be medically indigent. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue. In addition, the Hospital provides services to other medically indigent patients under certain government-reimbursed public aid programs. Such programs pay providers amounts which are less than established charges for the services provided to the recipients and many times the payments are less than the cost of rendering the services provided.

In addition to uncompensated charges, the Hospital also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services which meet otherwise unfilled community needs. Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. Such programs include health screening and assessments, prenatal education and care, community educational services and various support groups.

Note 13: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Current Economic Conditions

The current protracted economic decline continues to present hospitals with unprecedented circumstances and challenges, which in some cases have resulted in large declines in the fair values of investments and other assets, large declines in contributions, constraints on liquidity and difficulty obtaining financing. The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using values and information currently available to the Hospital

Current economic conditions, including the rising unemployment rate, have made it difficult for certain of the Hospital's patients to pay for services rendered. As employers make adjustments to health insurance plans or more patients become unemployed, services provided to self-pay and other payers may significantly impact net patient service revenue, which could have an adverse impact on the Hospital's future operating results. Further, the effect of economic conditions on the state may have an adverse effect on cash flows related to the Medicaid program.

Given the volatility of current economic conditions, the values of assets and liabilities recorded in the accompanying financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments in investment values, including defined benefit pension plan investments and allowances for accounts and contributions receivable, that could negatively impact the Hospital's ability to maintain sufficient liquidity

Note 14: Management Services Agreement

In March 2009, the Hospital entered into a management services agreement with Mercy Health Systems. Inc (Mercy) for a period of one year with the option to renew for two successive one-year terms. Effective March 2012, the Hospital entered into a new agreement with Mercy that extended the management services agreement through March 2017 with the option to renew for two successive five-year terms. During the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital incurred expenses of approximately \$360,000 related to this management services agreement.

Note 15: Investment in Joint Venture

Beginning July 1, 2005, the Hospital became a member of Heartland Healthcare Reciprocal Risk Retention Group (formerly, VHA Oklahoma/Arkansas) (Heartland), a Reciprocal Risk Retention Group approved by the state of Vermont, to provide hospital professional and general liability coverage to its subscribers. Heartland was formed in order to stabilize the cost and availability of hospital professional and general liability insurance by taking advantage of the self-funding capabilities of a homogenous group of health care providers. Heartland members are provided hospital professional and general liability insurance under claims-made policies on a fixed premium basis.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2011 and 2010


The Hospital is a subscriber (member) of Heartland and at September 30, 2011 and 2010, has an approximate 13% ownership (equity) interest in Heartland. Heartland is formed as an unincorporated association approved by the state of Vermont to provide hospital professional liability and general liability coverage to its subscribers. The Hospital's investment in Heartland amounted to approximately \$894,000 at September 30, 2011 and 2010.

The Hospital purchases its professional liability (medical malpractice) and general liability insurance coverage from Heartland (see *Note 1*) For the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital paid approximately \$689,000 and \$641,000, respectively, to Heartland for the coverage



We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Hospital's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hospital's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hospital's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and, therefore, there can be no assurance that all deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses have been identified. However, as discussed in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses, we identified a certain deficiency in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be a material weakness

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Hospital's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiency described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses as item 2011-1 to be a material weakness.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Hospital's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We also noted certain matters that we reported to the Hospital's management in a separate letter dated January 23, 2012

The Hospital's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. We did not audit the Hospital's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it

2011-1	Criteria or Specific Requirement – Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to promote accurate recording and classification of accounting transactions
	Condition – Management's procedures for recording and classifying transactions within Valley View Management Group (VVMG) did not prevent inaccurate recording of transactions. In addition, procedures for preparing general ledger reconciliations within VVMG and other clinic accounts are not being performed timely and are inadequate to prevent inaccurate recording of transactions.
	Context – The reconciliation process for VVMG accounts receivable was not adequate to properly reflect gross or net accounts receivables at year-end. In addition, reconciliation of VVMG and other clinic cash accounts were not up to date and current. Several material journal entries were required to correct misstatements not identified or corrected by management.
	Effect – Potential material misstatements in the financial statements or material misappropriation of assets due to error or fraud could occur and not be prevented or detected in a timely manner
	Cause – Recording and monitoring procedures in the internal control over financial reporting process were not performed correctly
	Recommendation – Management should ensure that controls are adequate to properly record accounting entries. Management should also ensure that monthly general ledger reconciliations are completed timely and accurately and all reconciling items are researched and resolved on a timely basis.
	Views of Responsible Officials and Planned Corrective Actions – Management concurs with the finding and recommendation. Management will take steps to evaluate the current internal controls over the recording and classification of accounting transactions and prepare accurate monthly reconciliations, including resolving any variances.
