The eighth program, the Weller Medical/Health Sciences Scholarship, is presented annually based on the rules and regulations as described in the attached summary of the program.

The purpose of this award is to provide financial assistance to students planning a career in the skilled trades.

AWARD:

Each participating school will be eligible for one* award recipient to receive a grant equal to the lesser of \$2,500 or 50% of the cost of tuition and fees of the vocational-technical program proposed. Payment will be paid for the benefit of the recipient directly to the institution giving the vocational program. Normally, one-half of the award will be paid on enrollment and one-half after receipt of an official transcript from the institution indicating satisfactory completion of the first half of the program and verification of continued enrollment for the second half of the program. In no case will more than two payments be made, nor will any payment be made more than two years after the grant date. The program must begin within nine months of the date the award is granted or it shall be forfeited.

* If for any reason there is no eligible winner from a participating school(s), the Trustees may, at their discretion, select an alternate winner from the remaining schools.

ELIGIBILITY:

Applicants must be full-time students at Masuk, Newtown, Trumbull, Joel Barlow, or Shelton High School at the time the award is made and must not be a relative of a Trustee of The Weller Foundation, Incorporated. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, nationals, or permanent residents. The applicant shall demonstrate interest and talent in his or her chosen field and must be able to satisfy the admission requirements of the school selected.

If you're selected as a finalist...

You will receive \$200 to help defray expenses... and will have from November 5, 2010 until March 30, 2011 to submit your final project.

When will the scholarship be presented?

The finalists, who have successfully completed and submitted their projects on time, will be invited to a dinner in their honor on May 2, 2011. — RULES —

The Weller Foundation, Incorporated provides an annual scholarship in honor of Barton L. Weller who was the founder of Vitramon, Incorporated and whose generosity has made the award possible. Its purpose is to encourage academic excellence in a substantial independent project.

PROPOSALS

1. The Foundation will accept proposals from seniors who are full-time students at Joel Barlow, Masuk, Newtown, Shelton and Trumbull High Schools, each outlining a project to be developed during academic year 2010–2011. The student must remain a full-time student for the entire academic year.

2. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, nationals, or permanent residents. Winners must attend a four-year undergraduate degree program in the United States.

3. Topics for projects are not limited by content or scholastic field. For example

A study of economic or political forces influencing the immediate geographic area

A science or engineering project

A study of the effect of environmental factors on the immediate geographic area.

A project in the fine arts.

A computer system or software project.

A mathematics project.

Any proposal for a project requiring basic study and originality will be considered. The student must clearly demonstrate in the proposal that the project is logistically and financially feasible. Proposals requiring the use of non-student owned equipment or which necessitate classroom involvement of other students or school facilities must attach written authorization for such use. A student may submit only one proposal. If more than one proposal is received from a student, all his/her proposals will be disqualified.

4. Proposals of no more than 2 pages (not including required attachments) must outline the student's project by including the following sections entitled: Title, Stated Objective, Project Content, and Summary. The proposal will be judged by a committee of the Foundation Trustees for:

- Format of the proposal
- Project potential
- Originality
- Care with which proposal and its planned implementation has been thought through

Up to five proposals will be accepted. Each of the finalists submitting an accepted proposal will be awarded \$200 on November 16, 2010.

No proposal may contain any identification of the student, town of residence or high school attended.

A separate covering letter provided by the Foundation must be completed and attached to the proposal. Proposals and covering letters are to be mailed to:

Proposals must be received by the Foundation by October 18, 2010. We recommend you allow for possible delays in delivery. Proposals which do not comply with these Rules will be rejected. Late arrivals will be returned unopened.

5. Questions with respect to these Rules may be directed to JoAnne Davies, Foundation Administrator at 203-263-0229.

6. The Scholarship Program will be announced simultaneously at the five area high schools on September 3, 2010 to provide an equal chance for all eligible students to participate in submitting proposals.

PROJECT

1. Up to five finalists become eligible to participate in the project phase, carrying out the proposal submitted

2. The project period will run from November 5, 2010 to March 30, 2011 with submission and documentation of the project due to The Weller Foundation, Incorporated before 3:00 P.M. local time on or before March 30, 2011. The Foundation Administrator must be notified if the project cannot be readily mailed

3. There is no restriction on use of project content for legitimate academic credit or other purposes. For example, a science project may also be entered in another science talent search or local science fair; a study on the area economy may be submitted by the student for credit in an economics course

4. All aspects of the project must be performed during the current academic year (September 2010 through March 2011).

5. Each project is expected to be the student's own work without outside assistance in organizing and executing the project. Parents, faculty and other professionals may be consulted and must be acknowledged as resources for reference, but the student is entirely responsible for performing the work. The finalists will be asked to sign a statement to this effect.

A mid-project meeting will be held by the Trustees with the finalists on January 20, 2011 to review progress and answer any procedural question that might arise.

6. Final date for submission of the project will be March 30, 2011. Projects must be complete as submitted. A total of six completed photocopies (except as where deemed inappropriate by the Foundation) must be submitted for judging. (Copies will be distributed to the judges; one copy to be retained by the Foundation). They will be judged by a committee, selected from outside the Foundation's Board of Trustees. Each judge is paid an honorarium for this service.

The primary standards for judgment will be the degree to which, and the skill and care with which, the original proposal is developed into the final project. Changes in content from the original proposal may result in disqualification.

On April 14, 2011 the judges will convene to interview the participants about their projects and select the \$12,000 scholarship recipient. The judges' selection of the scholarship recipient shall be final.

These interviews are not intended to supplement the completed project material submitted on March 30, 2011. They will provide an opportunity for the judges to authenticate the student's knowledge of project content.

7. The scholarship recipient will be announced prior to the dinner of the Board of Trustees, judges, area high school representatives, parents and finalists to be held on May 2, 2011.

8. The student whose project is judged best will receive a \$12,000 scholarship, payable in increments of \$3,000 at the beginning of each of four academic years for which the student is accepted and attends a recognized college or university. Payments will be made directly to the college or university for deposit into the student's account. Subsequent payments will be made after receipt of an official transcript verifying satisfactory completion of studies for that year and that the student remains in "good standing". A maximum of one year out of college attendance will be allowed for substantial reasons such as health or family hardship. Beyond one year, the balance of the award will be forfeited.

9. The Scholarship will be awarded without regard to the student's existing financial status.

10. It is the Foundation's intention to return all but one copy of the material submitted to the student, and will not accept responsibility for loss or damage.

11. To be eligible for the \$12,000 Scholarship or runners-up award, the finalists must attend the required meetings: the Mid-Project Review; the Interview Session; and the Award Dinner

WELLER MEDICAL/HEALTH SCIENCES SCHOLARSHIP

The purpose of this scholarship is to encourage and financially assist a student upon graduation who has chosen a course of study in the field of Medical/Health Sciences. Healthcare careers acceptable under this Program are Nursing, Therapy, Medical Technology, Paramedics, and other licensed healthcare workers who provide one-on-one healthcare to people. Programs leading to MD or PhD Degrees are not acceptable. Academic programs shall be a minimum of one (1) year and a maximum of six (6) years in duration with a maximum of four (4) years of payments.

AWARD:

Qualified applicants from the five (5) eligible high schools shall be competing for (1) award.

The Award: A total of \$4,000 or 50% of the cost of tuition for the training program, whichever is less.

Payment: The Award will be paid in equal increments depending upon the number of years required to complete the program. For example,

1 Year Program: $\frac{1}{2}$ upon enrollment; $\frac{1}{2}$ at mid-point

2 Year Program: $\frac{1}{2}$ upon enrollment; $\frac{1}{2}$ at beginning of second school year

3 Year Program: $\frac{1}{3}$ upon enrollment; $\frac{1}{3}$ at the beginning of the second and third school year

4-6 Year Program: 4 equal payments at the beginning of each of the first four school years

The first payment of the award will be made upon the Foundation's receipt of a copy of the recipient's tuition bill. Proof of continuance of enrollment and verification of a 3.0 GPA is necessary for any payment during the subsequent academic period.

All payments will be made for the benefit of the award recipient directly to the institution providing the education.

The program must begin within nine (9) months of the grant date or the award shall be forfeited. An interruption of up to one (1) year will be allowed for substantial reasons such as health or family hardship. Beyond one (1) year, the balance of the award will be forfeited.

A minimum of three (3) qualified applicants will ensure granting of the award. If there should be less than three (3) qualified applicants, the award will be granted at the discretion of the judges.
